Following the "International Day of Action against the Commercialization of Education" on Nov. 5th 2008 and the "Reclaim your Education – Global Week of Action" [20-29/04/2009] the "International Students Movement" is calling for another Global Week of Action in Nov. 2009.

More and more people realize, that the forces responsible for the increasing privatisation and commercialisation of public education (like many other aspects of life) function globally and therefore the only way to effectively confront them in the long run is to unite in our struggle worldwide.

Students, teachers, workers and parents around the world are asking themselves: "Is the public education system actually serving the interests of the public, or is the focus increasingly shifting to implement education systems that primarily serve private and business interests?".

Once introduced – the tuition fees sky-rocket, universities and schools are turned into businesses, student debt keeps increasing and public education budgets (unlike the budgets for military and "security measures") are cut in most places.

Institutions of higher education become highly dependant on their ability to attract private sponsorships (usually from economic actors). Consequently only those institutions and faculties that are deemed "valuable" by sponsors are able to survive.

Public education systems, from kindergarten to university, should make an individuals emancipation their priority, be tuition-free and accessible to all. A democratic society only exists, if it consists of emancipated and self-determined individuals, who are able to reflect critically on their (social) environment, developments and power structures. Any system, that doesn't fulfil these criteria should not be considered democratic.

The fact, that groups and movements in more than 20 countries on 5 continent united during the international day and global week of action confirms the global scope of our struggle. Education activists in various countries agreed to call for another Global Week of Action this year during the following time frame:

Nov. 5th 2009 ["Warm-up" Day of united Action] + Nov. 9 - 18th 2009 ["Global Week of Action"]

People around the world will unite to counter the commercialization and so-called "neoliberal" reforms within the sector of public education between November 9 – 18th. Furthermore Nov. 17th marks the "International Students' Day". With every internationally co-ordinated protest each local movement is strengthened. Barriers between different groups worldwide are overcome and we get closer to our goal of establishing free and emancipatory public education systems, which are accessible to all.
