PREFACE

The fifth edition of the Canadian Newspaper Directory may fairly claim to be a thoroughly complete and up to date hand-book of Canadian Journalism. The newspaper lists have been corrected with the utmost care, accuracy in circulation ratings achieved as nearly as possible, and the details concerning each paper carefully revised. Apart from its avowed purpose, the book will be found a valuable gazetteer of every city, town and village that can boast of a local paper. This gazetteer is compiled to show the business possibilities of any particular section of the country, and within its scope will be found very complete. It gives the population of each town, indicates county seats, gives the railroads touching each place, names the villages surrounding each newspaper town, shows the telephone, telegraph and postal facilities and mentions the principal industries and chief shipments. Its usefulness to advertisers and others who have dealings with newspapers is obvious. From no other source can they obtain the data given in this volume, which is the condensed result of many years' study and experience in the newspaper field.

The Canadian Newspaper Directory is useful in a sphere wider than the local advertising field. It is an advertisement in foreign countries for the Dominion of Canada. Copies of this edition will find their way into the hands of hundreds of prominent manufacturers in Great Britain and the United States, giving them a better idea of the progress and importance of Canada than they would otherwise have.

The condition and influence of the press of a country is an accurate indication of its advancement, and the fact that Canada possesses so many excellent papers, circulating so widely and extending over so great an area, will show outsiders how extensive is the field here and how great its possibilities. A special feature of the Directory is a set of five news-paper maps, covering the whole Dominion. These maps have been corrected up to date, but instead of binding them in the book where they are easily torn, they are issued as a supplement and enclosed in a special envelope. They give in a very prominent way the names and correct location of every city, town and village in which one or more news-papers are published. This is a manifest advantage, as it enables the reader to pick out the principal town in any section of the country at a glance.

The publishers of the Directory gratefully acknowledge the generous support given by the most prominent dailies, weeklies and monthlies throughout the country to this and former editions of the Directory, and thank them for the promptness with which all the information asked for has been supplied. It is gratifying to note the increasing number of publishers who keep careful records of their circulation and furnish detailed and sworn statements whenever required, as evinced by the black face and starred ratings in this edition. There is still, however, a very large number who neglect to keep records in their own offices and decline to give any information whatever, which, of course, renders it absolutely impossible for any directory to give correct figures regarding their circulations. In such cases the ratings are of necessity only approximate, as they are based upon what information can be gleaned from other sources.

Every care has been taken to avoid doing any publisher an injustice, and no pains will be spared to rectify as far as possible any error that may have occurred.

SYSTEMATIC ADVERTISING

Intelligently Planned and Placed

Forms a Highway to Success.

Many of the leading firms in almost every line of business owe their success largely to newspaper advertising. Many have started in a very small way—the advertising brought active demand for their goods—with this active demand capital came easily, larger premises were secured, modern equipment introduced, expanded systems of production and sale inaugurated, economy of administration enforced, and with larger profits more extensive advertising, until almost the limit of consumption has been reached.

Being associated with many of these successes in the capacity of advertising agents, A. McKim, Limited, are naturally interested in analyzing the relation of advertising and the advertising agency to modern business.

Looking broadly over the field of advertising, it is apparent that there is scarcely any limit to its profitable application.

Every manufacturer producing an article that the public needs requires to advertise in some form.

No business is so solidly established, or enjoys so large a trade, as to be superior to the advantages of advertising.

In this age of keen competition and close margins, business success depends to a great extent upon an efficient system of selling the goods, and advertising is simply salesmanship in print.

A good article is of no more value than a poor one as a money maker until the public knows about it. Just here is where the work of the Advertising Agency begins. It places before its client the means of communication with every man, woman and child in the whole country who is able to read. It can lay out for him the most economical way of talking to the people of any particular district, class, trade or profession throughout the land, thereby enabling the

producer of any saleable article to reach the purchasing public with economy of expenditure and in a way to secure the best possible results.

Newspaper Values—An Unknown Quantity to the Inexperienced.

There are very few commodities in which the basis of value is so continually shifting as in that of Newspaper Advertising.

In Canada there are over one thousand Daily and Weekly papers, outside of the Magazines and other monthly publications. Each publication, from the big city Daily down to the little village Weekly, has its own individual basis of value, and that, too, is subject to constant change. Even if the circulation of a paper remain the same from year to year, there are many other conditions that influence the price which the publisher will ask for his space. It is therefore evident at a glance that the producer who starts out unaided in an extensive campaign of newspaper advertising, would go floundering around in the dark, wasting valuable time and a great deal of money in gaining the knowledge which he could have had for the asking from the experienced agency, without it costing him a single dollar.

What the Agency Must Know.

To have absolutely correct information as to the circulation of every newspaper would make a long draft upon all the knowledge of gods and men. Only the agency with the work of many years behind it, and the knowledge gained by the regular publication of such a work as The Canadian Newspaper Directory, can be expected to give to an advertiser anything like correct figures regarding circulations. But circulation is only one of the many things that go to make up the value of a newspaper as an advertising medium. The quality of the circulation is almost as important as the quantity. A paper circulating entirely among the working classes is of little value to the advertiser of an article which only the rich can afford to buy and vice versa.

A paper may be well or badly printed—contain a great deal of original matter and small proportion of advertising, or the reverse—it may be made up largely of "boiler-plate" of little interest to anybody, or nearly all of local news that is of live interest to everybody—it may comprise four outside pages of live matter and four inside pages where the black cure-all advts. are dumped—it may, in its editorial columns, advocate principles which are diametrically opposed to the interests of certain advertisers—and there are many other circumstances and conditions that must be taken into consideration in estimating the real value of a medium to any particular advertiser.

The Agency, besides knowing the papers, must know something of the localities in which they are published, the class of people they reach, and something of their habits and modes of living, and the class of goods that meet their requirements. As an illustration—some districts are large consumers of tea—others drink coffee almost entirely. Throughout the Province of Quebec large quantities of tonic wines are used, while in parts of Ontario and the Maritime Provinces to advertise anything of a spirituous nature would be absolute waste of money. The up-to-date agency must be informed upon all these points, and be able to use the information intelligently in placing the business of its customers.

Prices.

In the Advertising Agency business, as in all other lines of trade, the concern that has ample capital and controls the largest volume of business is in the best position to command the lowest prices. It goes without saying, therefore, that an Agency, such as A. McKim, Limited, carrying well on to half a million of business yearly with the newspapers of Canada, can get for its clients everything in the way of price, position and other preferments that it is possible to secure. The publishers of the country recognize this Agency, with its splendid system and its admirable methods of paying accounts promptly, as business builders, and are anxious therefore to assist them in every reasonable way in their work of promoting and creating advertising.

There Are Agencies and Agencies.

As in other lines of business, and other professions, only by long experience, large practice, extensive operations, can one gain the information, create the system, build up the organization necessary to render the most efficient service. The so-called agent, with office in his hat, without information, experience or capital, who exists for the purpose of trying to get the legitimate agent's commission, has come to be considered a destroyer rather than a promoter of the best interests of advertiser and publisher, and is not now recognized by papers of any importance.

Planning Advertising is the First Step.

Each of the large general advertisers throughout the country who are clients of A. McKim, Limited, has added valuable experience to this Agency's store of knowledge. Experience in advertising eliminates experimentation. Experiments are often expensive, but they are reduced to the minimum by an Agency that has scored many successes and secured the knowledge that enables it to steer clear of the breakers which are likely to bring disastrous results.

This experience is particularly valuable in the first step of profitable advertising—the planning.

To plan well, the agent must know the field to be cultivated for the particular article to be advertised, the amount of money necessary to be expended. He must consider the people that are to be influenced, whether men or women, or both, whether rich or poor, or everybody, whether city or country, whether English or French, or both and this is important in Canada—very important. The points that must be brought out to influence trade. points that will stimulate the dealer as well as the consumer. What papers to use—whether Dailies or Weeklies, or both. What size of advts. will bring the best results for the money. What style of type will get the best display in What wording. What illustrations, if any. the space. What booklets, circulars, and follow-up letters should be used so that all may work in harmony and within the appropriation, and all be done at the right time.

It is safe to say that many a large advertiser would never have used the newspapers at all but for the agent, who planned his campaign so as to enable him to grow from small beginnings to large results.

Preparing Advertising.

Next to planning comes the preparing.

For this the Agency has to maintain a staff of advt. writers and illustrators, who must take up the points which have been decided upon in the planning and put them into advts. which are the right size, style, shape, tone and type. The Agency and its staff of artists, writers and experts, working in conjunction with the advertiser with his practical knowledge of the goods, turn out a series of advertisements that will tell the story in such a way as to attract and influence the public—creating for each different advertiser a style of advertising that will fittingly represent the goods advertised.

After copy and illustrations comes the problem of getting the best effect with type and cuts in the different classes of publications which must be used. What would come out well in a magazine might appear only as a black smudge in the ordinary daily paper. Usually an entirely different character of advt. is required for publications that use highly calendered paper. Again, a style of advt. which would be suitable for a medicine would be quite inappropriate for a brand of flour.

The advts. of each advertiser should have a distinctive appearance—an originality of typesetting and illustrating that will make his advertisements stand out from other advertisements and be seen and read wherever they are published.

Thus the Agency works with the engraver and the compositor to get the right result, and even goes so far as to have special fonts of type purchased to give his client something new.

Then there is the question of plates.

Most general advertising goes out in plate form, as in no other way can an advertiser have his advertisement appear exactly as wanted in each paper. The type is sent from the printer to an electrotyper and a copper plate electro made of each advertisement. This electrotype is kept as an original from which duplicates can be made at any time. From the

original electrotype a sufficient number of duplicate stereo plates is made to furnish each paper on the list with a complete set of the advertisements to be used.

The plates put out by A. McKim, Limited, are the finest that modern machinery and equipment can produce, and their requirement is so large as to take almost the entire output of one stereotype factory.

Now, as to the placing of advertising.

The Advertising Agent as a Purchaser of Space.

The agent having figured as counsel of advertising, editor of advertising, and distributor of advertising, is called upon to serve also in the capacity of purchasing agent. He is for his clients the expert buyer of advertising space.

He has all the advantages that accrue from long experience and from doing this work for a large number of clients—practically a purchasing combination by which each client secures many advantages. In the case of A. Mc-Kim, Limited, this advantage is particularly notable, as the amount of advertising purchased in Canadian newspapers by this agency is about equal to that of all other Canadian agencies combined.

All dealings with A. McKim, Limited, are free and above board. The exact amount paid to each paper is known to the client. The advertiser has access to every item regarding his expenditures, the same as he would have if the accounts were kept under his own roof. In effect this advertising agency might be a department of the advertiser's own business as far as transactions for his account are concerned. Likewise every publisher may know the exact amount paid to this agency by any advertiser for his particular paper. By this method a mutual confidence is at once established between the advertiser, the agency and the publisher.

Every issue of every paper in which a client's advertising appears is carefully checked to see that he gets what is contracted for—the right position, the right insertion and the right space—and these papers are kept on file as vouchers which the client may examine at any time.

The accounting is done as it is in a bank—with a system that brings the most perfect and accurate results—a large staff being maintained so that the work can be subdivided into departments with responsible heads to supervise the details; in fact, the manager of one of the largest agencies of the United States, after visiting the McKim Agency, said that this agency has the most complete system of any agency on the continent, a fact mentioned to show that Canada in this particular is quite abreast with any other nation.

The McKim Agency may be considered conservative, in that it invariably recommends spending the smallest amount of money that will do the work effectually. The plans are carefully thought out, large advertisements being used when they will be most effective, but never for the sake of size. Advts. are illustrated or not, accordingly as they will bring the best results for the money. What is aimed at all through is not so much "smart" advertising, but the honest, frank, confidence-inspiring advts. that make the reader feel like giving the article a trial.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.

Ontario is the most populous and wealthy of all the provinces of Canada. It has a land area of 220,508 square miles and a water area of 40,354 square miles, with a population at the census of 1901 of 2,182,947, It has 43 counties besides six districts as large as some European states out of which future counties will be formed. The province has 16 incorporated cities, 121 incorporated towns and about 131 (organized) villages-Its facilities for railway and water communication combined are not surpassed by any division of the American continent. The River St. Lawrence and the great lakes, Ontario, Erie, Huron and Superior, touch it on its entire southern and western boundaries, while from the "Height of land," which forms the back bone of the province, many fine rivers flow down to those lakes on the south, or to James Bay or Hudsons Bay on the No important county is unreached by a railway, and out of a total of 21,353 miles of railway in Canada about 40 per cent. are in Ontario. In the extent and variety of its agricultural, dairy and fruit products Ontario leads the Dominion, while its wealth of gold, nickel, silver, iron, cobalt and other valuable minerals is proving to be greater than was ever anticipated by geologists ten years ago. Not over ten per cent. of the land is as yet cultivated, yet so large is the total area of the Province, and so great the fertility of the land, that the crops are very large. The province in 1905 showed 672,781 head of horses, 2,889,503 head of cattle, 1,324,153 head of sheep, and 1,896,460 head of swine, while some items of the agricultural products in the same year were as follows: 21,516,588 bushels of wheat, 24,265,394 bushels of barley, 105,563,572 bushels of oats, 7,100,021 bushels of pease, 4,700,000 bushels of other grain, 14,366,049 bushels of potatoes, 92,717,675 bushels of turnips and other feeding roots, and 8,132,306 tons of hay and silage. The average yield per acre of crops in Ontario, though not so large as in the Northwest Provinces and Territories, is greater than in any state in the American Union, the comparison holding good in all kinds of grain in all states, except one kind of grain in one state—oats in Kansas. In 1904 Ontario had 5,753 public schools, besides 419 Roman Catholic separate schools, and 5 Protestant separate schools, 129 kindergartens and 11 night schools. Of pupils, the public schools had 396,495, the R. C. separate schools 47,807, the Protestant separate schools 319, the kindergartens 12,021, the night schools 702. The teachers in public schools numbered 8,610, and in all other primary schools 1,218, making a total of 9,828 primary teachers. In higher education Ontario has a normal college and several normal schools for the training of teachers, 54 model schools, an art and industrial school, two technical schools, 138 high schools and collegiate institutes, with 27,709 pupils and 661 teachers. It has also a training institute, at Guelph, for teachers and others in manual training and domestic science and art. It has 140 free and 306 subscription libraries. In 1902 the province had 3,321 post offices, through which passed 105,600,000 letters, and 17,180,000 post cards, 2,332,000 registered letters, 5,172,000 free letters and \$10,565,274 in money orders. Ontario is represented in the Dominion parliament by 22 senators and 86 members of the House of Commons. Its local government is carried on by a single chamber having 98 members. Capital, Toronto.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.

The Province of Quebec, the cradle of civilization in Canada, has a history more abounding in romance and episode than that of any other division of the American continent. Its discovery dates from 1534, and its regular colonization from the beginning of the 17th century. From this colony went forth the hardy French pioneers, who penetrated through the wilds surrounding the Great Lakes, into the plains and prairies of the unknown West and North-West, and down the valley of the Mississippi to the Gulf of Mexico, and whose names still survive in many a town, lake and river, of Western Canada and the United States. The scenery of Quebec, along the St. Lawrence and Saguenay to Lake St. John and the regions beyond, is unsurpassed in grandeur, and is year by year attracting visitors from all parts of the continent and from Europe. The wealth of Quebec in minerals is proving to be very great, the asbestos mines, among others, being now acknowledged to be the richest in the world. The production from these mines in 1904 amounted to \$1,186,795, while the other mineral products of the province totalled \$1,771,657. There are large deposits, yet undeveloped to any great extent, of peat, gold, silver, etc. Quebec is penetrated in every part by rivers and streams, and the amount of water power still unutilized is inconceivable to those who have not explored the province. The facilities thus afforded for mill operations point out the province as a great future seat of manufacturing, especially in paper and pulp making, these water powers being interspersed among vast tracts of spruce, poplar, hemlock and other pulp woods, unequalled in the world for their qualities for pulp and paper making. By an Order in Council passed in 1896 the northern boundaries have been extended to the shores of Hudson Bay, the area of Quebec being now 351,873 sq. miles. The population at the last census in 1901, was 1,648,898, and is now estimated at 1,650,000. It has 65 counties, five districts, eight cities, 101 towns, and over 1,500 villages. A dual system of education exists in the province, there being Roman Catholic school boards and Protestant school boards. The Roman Catholic boards have under their charge 4,464 elementary schools, 528 model schools, 149 academies, two normal schools, 16 classical colleges and two universities, these institutions having 298,524 pupils of all grades. Under the Protestant school boards, there are 898 elementary schools, 44 model schools, 30 academies, one normal school, three classical colleges and two universities, these schools, with the exception of colleges and universities, having 37,407 pupils of all grades. Besides these, there are seven non-sectarian schools of arts and manufactures, five schools of agriculture and dairying and other miscellaneous institutions of learning. Quebec sends to the Dominion parliament 65 members, and is represented there by 24 senators, the same number as for Ontario. Its provincial legislature has two Houses, the Upper House, or Legislative Council, having 24 members, and the Legislative Assembly, 74 members. The provincial capital is Quebec city.

It is the headquarters of the two great railway corporations, the Grand Trunk and the Canadian Pacific, whose works here employ several thousand hands in each case. Chief shipments: grain, lumber, cheese, butter, horses, cattle, sheep and pigs, apples, potatoes, machinery, phosphates, asbestos, flour, boots and shoes, coal, fish, hay, paper, wooden ware, cottons, spools, furs and skins, cordage, furniture, and various other manufactured articles.

Montreal first began to be settled by Europeans in 1542; and exactly one century later the spot destined to be the city was consecrated with due solemnities, commended to the "Queen of Angels," and called Ville-Marie, a name which it retained for a long period. In 1760 it was taken by the English. Early in the last century vessels of more than three hundred tons could not ascend to Montreal, and its foreign trade was carried on by small brigs and barges. In 1809 the first steam vessel, "The Accommodation," built by the Hon. John Molson, made a trip to Quebec. She had berths for twenty passengers. Years of industry and intelligence, enterprise and labor have produced a mighty contrast. Ocean steamers drawing up to 30 feet of water, from all parts of the world, now lie alongside of the wharves in the harbor, which are not equalled in Canada in point of extent, accommodation, approach and clean-liness. Montreal was formerly the capital of Canada, but in April, 1849, a political mob burned the Parliament Buildings and the seat of government was in consequence removed to Quebec, subsequently to Toronto and finally to Ottawa. In July, 1852, a destructive fire laid waste a large part of the city, burning 1,108 houses and destroying property valued at \$1,363,264. Montreal is noted for its charitable and religious institutions, some of which were founded nearly 250 years ago. The oldest church in the city is the Bonsecours (Roman Catholic); it was erected in 1658, was burnt in 1764, but rebuilt in 1771. The city is abundantly supplied with water and is lighted by electricity and gas. The principal buildings are the City Hall, Court House. Post Office, Custom House, Board of Trade, Seminary of St. Sulpice, Convent of Notre Dame, General Hospital, Royal Victoria Hospital, Grey Nunnery, Montreal College, McGill University Buildings, Laval University, Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational Colleges, Young Men's Christian Association Building, St. Mary's College, Montreal Diocesan College, Academy of Music, Royal Victoria College, His Majesty's Theatre, Theatre Français, Arena, Victoria Skating Rink, Deaf and Dumb Asylum, bank buildings and armouries, etc. It has thirteen markets, including Bonsecours, a magnificent building with a lofty dome, fronting on the River. It has over eighty churches and five synagogues. Its parks and squares are numerous, the chief being Mount Royal Park, covering 430 acres, and affording from the magnificent new "Look out" one of the finest urban views of the continent. Montreal is the head of ocean navigation on the St. Lawrence, and its shipping trade is the largest of any city in Canada. It is the head port of eight steamship companies, one of which (the Allan line) is among the largest in the world. Over 6,000 vessels arrive annually during the season of navigation. Its granite docks extend nearly twelve miles up and down the river. Vast improvements are now in progress and when completed the harbor will be one of the finest in North America. Montreal has about two-thirds of the banking capital of Canada, no less than eight of its chartered banks having their head offices here. The

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Victoria Bridge across the River St. Lawrence at Montreal, was the largest tubular bridge in the world, being 9,184 feet in length. It contained 24 spans of 242 feet each and one (the centre 60 feet above the river) of 330 feet, and it cost nearly \$7,000,000. This bridge has now been replaced by a double track steel bridge laid on the old piers. The educational means of the city comprise the universities of McGill and Laval with faculties of law, arts, science, medicine, and veterinary science, and theological colleges connected with the Methodist, Congregational, Presbyterian, Church of England and Roman Catholic churches; a high school, normal school, and a number of private and public schools and several classical and scientific academies, also a medical college affiliated to Victoria College, Toronto, and the medical faculty of the University of Bishop's College, Lennoxville. Chief Industries: ship building, manufacture of iron castings, machinery, cutlery, nails, cartridges and shells, leather, paper, church ornaments, boots and shoes, rope, tobacco and cigars, steel, etc. Chief Shipments: timber is shipped by millions of feet to all parts of the world, potatoes, cabbages and turnips form a large portion of its exports, while all classes of merchandise are shipped to every civilized country. Levis immediately opposite is connected by a ferry and a great many of the business men and clerks of Quebec reside there. Quebec is the capital of the Province of Quebec. In the grandeur of its site and surroundings, in the strength of its fortifications, in the extent and romance of its history, and hospitality and kindness of its citizens, Quebec stands supreme among the cities of America. The city has a remarkably picturesque situation between the two rivers at the north-eastern extremity of a narrow but elevated tableland, which for about eight miles forms the left bank of the River St. Lawrence. Cape Diamond, the extremity of the tableland, is 333 feet above the level of the river, to which it presents a nearly precipitous face; the descent to the St. Charles River is more gradual. The distance from one river to the other is little more than a mile. Opposite Cape Diamond the St. Lawrence is contracted to a breadth of 1,314 yards; but immediately below, at the confluence of the St. Charles, it spreads out into a broad and beautiful basin, more than 2,500 yards wide, forming a capacious and excellent harbor. The Spring tides rise and fall 18 feet. Quebec is divided into two parts called Upper and Lower The Upper Town occupies the highest part of the pro-Towns. montory, a small part of it is surrounded with walls, and otherwise fortified. The ancient citadel, which crowns the summit of Cape Diamond, covers, with its numerous works, an area of 40 acres, and from its position is the strongest natural fortress in America. The from its position is the strongest natural fortress in America. Lower Town, which is the seat of commerce, is built around the base of Cape Diamond, where, in many places, the rock has been cut away to make room for the houses. The banks of both rivers are lined with warehouses and wharves, the latter jutting about 200 feet into the stream, and along them the water is sufficiently deep to admit vessels of the largest size. The city has several times suffered from disastrous fires, but the result has been the erection of more attractive buildings and a consequent improvement in the general appearance of the city. In the Upper Town are several squares and public walks commanding views unrivalled for their varied and picturesque appearance. In one stands a substantial monument, erected to the joint memory of Generals Wolfe and Montcalm, the English and French commanders who fell in the taking of Quebec in 1759. It is 65 feet high. A monument 40 feet high marks the spot where General Wolfe fell on the Plains of Abraham; while on St. Foy Road stands a monument presented by Prince Napoleon Bonaparte in 1855, commemorating a fierce struggle which took place here in 1760 between the British and French troops. The new Quebec Bridge, one of the largest in the world, spans the St. Lawrence above the city. Among the public buildings of Quebec

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may be mentioned the new Parliament Buildings; the Roman . Catholic Cathedral, with a seating capacity of 4,000 persons, and covering with the university attached an area of eight acres; the English Cathedral, surmounted by a lofty spire, both occupying elevated positions in the Upper Town. There are twenty-three churches in Quebec and one synagogue. The educational institutions comprise three Roman Catholic Colleges, viz: Laval University, with faculties of arts, law and medicine; the Grand Seminary and the Minor Seminary; the Ursuline Convent, an extensive establishment founded in 1641; several nunneries; Morrin College, with seven professors; Laval, Normal and Model schools; Girls' High school; the Quebec High school, and a number of private academies and public schools. There are in addition, a Canadian Institute, provided with a library and reading room; the Literary and Historical Society, the oldest chartered institution of its kind in Canada, having been founded in 1824, and possessing valuable "Records of the Realm" in eighty or ninety folios, and a large collection of historical manuscripts; but nearly the whole of its museum and a great part of its library were destroyed by fire, with the Parliament buildings, in 1854; the Entomological Society, St. Patrick's Literary Institute, Advocates' Library, Board of Trade, Merchants' Exchange and the Y.M.C.A. rooms. The principal benevolent institutions are the Marine Hospital, the Hotel Dieu, the (Jeffery Hale) General Hospital, and the Lunatic Asylum at Beauport. PROVINCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

In bare outline of fact New Brunswick may be described as the largest of the Maritime Provinces; as a stretch of country covering an area of 27,985 square miles and having a population estimated at something more than 350,000. But New Brunswick is more than that. It is a Province with mile on mile of valuable timber limits, extensive stretches of arable land, a number of mineral deposits, wonderful wealth of fisheries and a progressive people who are realizing more and more fully the possibilities of this part of the Dominion. Lumbering and fishing are the two great industries of the Province. Thousands of men find employment in various branches of the lumber industry. Upwards of 170,000,000 feet of lumber exclusive of laths, etc.—are sent out from the mills of the St. John River annually, and great quantities are exported from the North Shore ports as well. In 1905 the provincial fisheries employed 19,406 people, of whom 12,937 followed fishing in boats; 348 vessels and 7,600 fishing boats were in use, and the value of the fisheries amounted to \$4,847,000. Farming is, of course, another very important branch of the people's activity. Each year sees new lands available for the farmer and the adoption of more advanced agricultural methods. Deposits of coal, iron, copper, gold, galena, albertite, etc., have been found in different sections. Petroleum has also been found in Westmoreland County. Some of the coal mines, especially those of Queens County, have been declared to be very valuable properties. New Brunswick has a number of splendid rivers, chief among them the St. John-sometimes styled the Rhine of America. It is a beautiful scenic river 500 miles or so in length and navigable for over 200 Other rivers which may be mentioned are the Miramich Nepisiguit, and the Restigouche. During the school year 1905-1906 there were, roughly speaking, 1800 public schools in New Brunswick. teachers numbered about 1880, and the pupils over 66,600. Normal School the enrollment was 288. New Brunswick is the home of three Universities-the University of Mount Allison at Sackville, the University of St. Joseph's at Memramcook and the University of New Brunswick at Fredericton. PROVINCE OF NOVA SCOTIA.

The Province of Nova Scotia—called in its early days Acadia, and embracing under that term the territory of the present Province of New Brunswick-is bounded on the north and west by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, Strait of Northumberland and Bay of Fundy, and on the east and south by the Atlantic Ocean. Only a narrow neck of land separates the waters of the Bay of Fundy from the Strait of Northumberland. Standing out in the Atlantic, and commanding, in a commercial sense, the Gulf of St. Lawrence, the province is destined to be the great maritime force of the American continent. Each and every county in the whole province reaches the sea, and possesses one or more harbours; and the position of the province in this respect is unique in the geography of the The land area of Nova Scotia is 20,550 square miles, the internal water area 50 square miles, and the population in 1901 was 459,574. It has 18 counties, three cities, 25 incorporated towns and about 850 villages. The future maritime pre-eminence of Nova Scotia is not only indicated by its position on the sea, and by the natural tendencies of the population, but by the immense beds of excellent coal and large bodies of iron ore found side by side in the same counties, and eminently suited for ship building purposes. The output of Nova Scotia coal increased from 1,373,666 long tons in 1886 to over 5,866,000 in 1906, and valued at about \$11,700,000 at the mines. The output of 1906 was 800,000 tons more than that of 1905, and the demand for it in Quebec and other provinces is steadily increasing. The coal mines give employment to 12,100 men. During 1906 the quantity of gold mined in the province amounted to 15,000 oz., worth \$300,000. The product of the iron mines is also large, while the province is rich in gypsum, copper, building stone, and other minerals as yet but partially developed. The value of the fisheries averages \$8,000,000, and the annual value of farm produce is estimated at \$16,000,000. Among other products of the field, Nova Scotia has become famous for her apples, which are in great demand in England for their exceptionally fine flavour. In the last ew years the production of apples has ranged from 400,000 barrels to 600,000 barrels; the value of the exports to England in 1903 netted the growers \$1,000,000, and new areas are each year being planted. The foreign imports for 1903 were \$13,481,917, and the exports \$17,016,554. In 1906 Nova Scotia had 2,446 schools with 100,332 pupils. The province has five universities, a provincial normal school, an academy for the deaf, dumb and blind—the first in any British colony—a school of mining, horticulture and agriculture, and 18 county academies, besides high schools. Nova Scotia sends to the House of Commons 19 members, and to the Upper House 10 senators; its local legislature has 38 members in the Assembly and 21 in the Legislative Council. Capital, Halifax.

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PROVINCE OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

Though the smallest in area—having a land surface of only 2,000 square miles-Prince Edward Island is the most thickly settled and one of the most productive of the provinces of Canada. It had at the last census of 1901 51.5 persons to the square mile, while Nova Scotia, the next province in density of population, had at the same census only 21.8 per square mile. The population of the island at the census of 1901 was 103,258, the estimated population at the present time being about 104,000. scarcely a foot of land in Prince Edward Island not capable of cultivation, and the soil is uniformly rich. This natural advantage, coupled with the endowment of a temperate climate and regular rainfalls, has made the province famous as an agricultural and stock raising country. The Island horses, cattle and sheep are eagerly sought after both by Canadian and United States buyers. But it is in dairying and in the meat business that Prince Edward Island is making the most gigantic strides. It is now sometimes referred to as "The Denmark of Canada." In 1903 there were 41 dairy stations in operation, manufacturing 2,729,556 lbs. of cheese and 556,452 lbs. of butter, the total value of both being \$386,168. The number of stations has since grown to 47, with value of output varying from year to year. Among other agricultural products, the Island oats and potatoes are famous throughout America and the West Indies for their excellence, the foreign demand for these products being steadily on the increase. The hay crops are also celebrated, being produced from indigenous clover and grasses, and it is to the high quality of these crops that the superiority of the Island live stock is largely due. The fishing interests of the Island are also important, its position in the Gulf giving it great advantages for the future development of its marine resources. The value of the fish taken by Prince Edward Island fishermen in 1903 was \$887,024, of which \$581,000 was exported to foreign countries. The total tonnage of vessels engaged in the coasting trade of the Island in 1903 was 1,091,012. The principal fish caught are mackerel, herring, cod, hake, lobsters and oysters. The annual take of lobsters is about 2,422,144 pound cans, and of oysters about 20,000 barrels, the Prince Edward Island oysters—especially those of Malpeque Bay—being esteemed the finest in flavour of any on the Atlantic coast. The park-like scenery of the Island, and its even temperature and charming summer weather, together with an abundance of the finest sea trout and good shooting in season, are year by year attracting tourists and health seekers to the province from all parts of the continent. Prince Edward Island in 1906 had 480 public schools, with 268 male teachers and 294 female teachers, and a total of 19,031 pupils. In the same year it had 441 post offices through which passed 2,662,000 letters, 176,000 post cards, 65,000 registered letters, 60,000 free letters, 407,000 transient newspapers, circulars, etc., 26,500 parcels, and 15,040 money orders, besides papers from offices of publication. Prince Edward Island is represented in the Dominion Parliament by four senators and four members of the House of Commons. Its local government is carried on by a single house, the Legislative Assembly, having 30 members. Capital, Charlottetown.

PROVINCE OF MANITOBA.

Although one of the smallest Provinces in Confederation, measuring in area less than 75,000 square miles, Manitoba's population is growing rapidly, having increased in barely twenty-five years from 66,000 to somewhat over 400,000. A quarter of a century ago (1881) Manitoba produced 1,000,000 bushels of wheat and 1,270,000 bushels of oats. Last year the amount of grain inspected in Winnipeg for Manitoba alone was 42,876 carloads-averaging about 750 bushels-and of this 38,558 cars were wheat. The Province now possesses 899 elevators and 61 grain storehouses with a total capacity of 26,282,200 bushels. Manitoba is essentially an agricultural country, but industries, jobbing firms and financial institutions are being multiplied. Winnipeg possesses large meat packing and meat curing establishments; breweries, biscuit, bag, clothing, overall, underwear, box (tin and wood), awnings and tents, soap and perfumery, harness and saddlery and trunk factories, wire and wire bedding factories, wind engine works, oatmeal mills, machine shops, a brass foundry, candy factories, cigar factories, carriage and wagon works, and manufacturers of jewellery, furriers, etc., find it a profitable field for the location of their plants. Wholesale and jobbing houses are a conspicuous feature of the commercial life of Winnipeg, and in a lesser degree of a In financial institutions Manitoba is giving proof of her few other towns. inherent wealth. It is not enough to note the rapid multiplication of branches of chartered banks, of which there were 90 in 1904, 122 in 1905, and 166 last year. There are a number of strong institutions whose head offices are here and whose progress has been a matter of national comment, like the Great West Life Assurance Company, several loan, insurance and trust companies, the Northern Bank, the Annuity Company of Canada and many others. . In the Lake region and in the Northern part of the Province there is wealth of a different nature. The waters teem with white fish, trout, herring, sturgeon, pickerel, pike, bass and maskinonge, and the caviare industry is also being extensively developed. Surrounding the lakes is a vast territory filled with timber and mineral wealth, and as yet almost untouched. The Local Legislature of Manitoba consists of 41 members, while 10 members represent the Province in the Dominion House of Commons and 4 in the Senate. Religion and education are well cared for, and schools and churches are to be found in most of the newest settlements. There are in the Province 1,285 school districts with 1,847 departments. The number of teachers engaged during the past year was 2,265, and out of 77,044 children of school age 64,123 were actually enrolled. The system of education is most thorough, providing for all grades, and a university with numerous affiliated colleges is located in Winnipeg, the provincial capital.

The Dominion electoral constituencies are given as counties, they taking the same place as the counties in the older provinces.

The history of Winnipeg, with its wonderful growth and progress, reads like a chapter from some romance. Buildings erected in 1900 estimated cost \$1,441,863; in 1901, \$1,708,557; 1902, \$2,408,125; 1903, \$5,689,400; 1904, \$9,651,750; 1905, \$10,846,200; 1906, \$12,736,250. Thirty-three years ago Winnipeg's population was less than 1,000, and the school attendance was only 35; it was but a post of the Hudson Bay Co., without churches, streets or railroads, and but a few years previously the Indian chased herds of buffalo across the prairie where the city now stands. It is now the railroad and business centre of the Canadian Northwest. It is in the famous Red River Valley, and surrounded by good farming, timber, and mining districts with extensive lake fisheries. The streets of the city are generally wide, the principal avenues being 132 feet, and many are paved with asphalt, block and macadam. The sidewalks are concrete, tile and plank. The city is spreading rapidly over a wide territory, with its wide streets and its detached houses. Not less than 14,000 acres has been covered by its 140 miles of sewers, 100 miles of paved streets, 80 miles of which are boulevarded, and 315 miles of sidewalks. Approximately 140 miles of water mains have been laid down since the city's incorporation about 34 years ago; 10,362 houses have sewer and 15,000 have water connections. In 1890 the rateable assessment of the city was \$18,612,410; in 1900, \$25,077,460; in 1905, \$62,727,630, and in 1906, \$80,511,725. These facts give some idea of the rapid progress being made. The grain business of the Canadian West centres in Winnipeg, and for the last four years the average amount of wheat exports has exceeded 50,000,000 bushels per year. This is evidence enough of the nature of the soil tributary to Winnipeg. In addition to agriculture a considerable fishing business is done in the large Northern lakes, and timber and mining enterprises abound on their shores. Winnipeg city owns and operates its own asphalt paving plant, its own quarry, public lighting, water works, including high pressure system for fire protection costing \$560,000, and fire alarm plants. Winnipeg has decided to encourage manufacturers by affording cheap power. A power sight has been secured on the Winnipeg River where a total of 50,000 h.p. can be developed. The citizens have passed a by-law authorising the city to borrow \$3,250,000 to be used in acquiring this site and installing the necessary plant and works to bring additional power to the city, where a private power company now operates. A by-law to authorize the issue of \$600,000 for the purpose of constructing gas works for the city has also been endorsed by the citizens.

PROVINCE OF SASKATCHEWAN.

The Province of Saskatchewan was established by Act of the Dominion Parliament on September 1st, 1905, with capital at Regina. It comprises the eastern portion of what was formerly the territories of Assiniboia and Saskatchewan, and occupies a part of the great alluvial plain of the Canadian Northwest, the most fertile wheat field in the world-Saskatchewan lies immediately west of Manitoba, extending from the United States Boundary Line, 49° N. Latitude, to 60° N. Latitude, and from about 101° 20" W. Longitude to 110° W. Its length from north to south is 740 miles, and its breadth 375 miles. Its land area is 224,887 square miles, and its water area 27,000 square miles. - It has the largest acreage of any Canadian Province suitable for growing hard spring wheat -in fact, the largest area in the world. No less than 50,000,000 acres of its land are capable of raising an average of 20 bushels to the acre, a large proportion of which will grade No. 1 Northern. There are 86,000 square miles of land suitable for grain growing, 32,000 square miles more that only need irrigation to fit them for raising wheat, and over 100,000 square miles suited for ranching and mixed farming. Wheat growing is, of course, the chief business of the Province. The crop in 1905 amounted to over 27,000,000 bushels, and it is increasing many millions every year, as more land is taken up. Thousands of settlers are pouring in from Eastern Canada, Great Britain, the United States and Europe, attracted by the cheap, but exceedingly productive and valuable land. Timber is found in some sections, generally along the banks of streams, lakes and rivers. Valuable deposits of coal have also been found as well as petroleum. The population of Saskatchewan in 1906, according to the Government figures, was 257,763, an increase of 166,484, or over 180 per cent, from 1901. Towns and villages are springing up rapidly along the lines of railway. Already there are 4 cities and 95 towns and villages. The Canadian Pacific, Canadian Northern, Grand Trunk Pacific and Great Northern Railways are rapidly extending their lines, and the whole province will soon be supplied with means of transportation. Banking facilities are provided by a large and increasing number of branches of most of the chartered banks of Canada. The climate, although rather severe in winter, is more moderate than that of Manitoba, and is delightful in summer, the long, sunny days being admirably suited for maturing the wheat rapidly. The province is governed by a Lieutenant-Governor, an Executive Council and a Legislative Assembly of 25 members. Capital, Regina.

PROVINCE OF ALBERTA.

On Sept. 1st, 1905, the formal inauguration of the new Province of Alberta took place at Edmonton, the city which, after a lively struggle, had been chosen as capital. On that day there was added to the ranks of the self-governing provinces of the Dominion one of the best favored districts in the world—attractive in the beauty of its rolling prairie, foothills and mountains, in its magnificent climate, which has earned for it the name of "Sunny Alberta," and in the wonderful richness of its varied resources. Alberta extends from the 49th parallel on the south to the 60th on the north, a distance of 750 miles, and from the 110th meridian on the east to the 120th on the west, giving it a breadth of 400 miles. Its area is 254,559 square miles. The eastern part of the province is a rolling prairie, a large part of which is admirably adapted to raising the first quality of hard wheat. Farther west come the foothills of the Rockies, and a territory probably unexcelled for ranching, mixed farming and raising the famous "Alberta Red" wheat. There are very extensive irrigation schemes under development, which are opening up some remarkably fertile land, and settlers are rapidly taking it up. At the west of the Province, forming the boundary line for nearly 400 miles between it and British Columbia, rise the grand old Rocky Mountains. Here much of the mineral wealth of the province is located. "The Pass" district in which Crow's Nest, Frank, and other well-known mining towns are situated, has a large and steady output of good coal. Coal mines are also found at various points throughout the province-near Medicine Hat, Edmonton, Calgary, etc. Zinc deposits are extensively worked in the neighborhood of Frank. The climate of "Sunny Alberta" is very different from that of the prairie provinces to the east. The Rockies shelter it from the cold north-west winds, and the warm Chinook winds sweep down from the mountains and foothills, clearing away the winter snows almost as fast as they fall. The result is that n most parts of the province cattle can be wintered out of doors, and it makes an ideal ranching country. The Peace River District at the north, almost 400 miles square, has been scarcely opened up yet for farming, though it ranks as one of the greatest fur producing districts in the world. More raw furs are marketed at Edmonton than in any other city in the world. Tests have proved, too, that almost every part of this territory will grow wheat and rough grains, and it is the intention of the Government to introduce reindeer in the northern part. The province is served by three great railway systems, the Canadian Pacific, Canadian Northern and Grand Trunk Pacific. It has five cities and 51 towns and villages, while new towns are springing up very rapidly. The Government consists of a Lieutenant-Governor, Executive Council and a Legislative Assembly of 25 members. The population of the province at the end of 1906 was 184,000. Capital at Edmonton.

BRITISH COLUMBIA.

British Columbia, the largest of all the provinces of the Canadian Confederation, has a land area of 370,191 sq. miles, and a water area of 2,439 sq. m., being more than the combined areas of France, Italy, Belgium and Holland. All the great natural features of the other provinces are here reproduced on a magnified scale, the great prairies of the North-West alone excepted. It has a greater variety of climate than any other province, for while the upper slopes of the Rockies are as cold as Labrador, the southern coast is so warm that oranges have been ripened in the open air. Taken as an average the climate is mild and equable and resembles that of many parts of England. Its many splendid valleys and level plateaus are exceedingly fertile. Agriculture is growing rapidly with the spread of mining, both south and north. In 1901 the average production per farm was \$1,047—the highest in the Dominion. fisheries, its vast salmon industries make it a close second to Nova Scotia, the value of British Columbia catch in 1901 being \$7,942,771; this is a fair annual average, and in addition nearly \$500,000 worth of sealskins are taken annually in the open season. Its wonderful coast line of thousands of miles embracing hundreds of harbors; its unrivalled fisheries; its stupendous forests, many trees of which measure from 8 to 10 feet in diameter; its incalculable wealth in those minerals which are the most valued by, and most necessary to man, and its peculiar geographical position on the Pacific Coast, all mark out the province as one of the imperial realms of the future. The wealth of British Columbia in minerals can as yet scarcely be calculated, for tracts of country thousands of sq. miles in extent, are as yet untraversed by the prospector, and many regions known to be rich in minerals can not yet be reached by railways. Among the minerals mined or exported to a greater or less extent are gold, silver, coal, iron, copper, galena, mercury, cinnibar, platinum, antimony, bismuth, molybendum, plumbago, salt and mica, while many other minerals are known to exist. The coal of the province ranges from common lignite to anthracite, and most of it is admirably suited for steam The steam shipping trade of the whole American coast of the Pacific is now looking to British Columbia for its coal supplies. The vast coal beds of the Crows Nest Pass have been proved to be excellent steam coal. The coal bearing areas so far explored are 65,000 sq. m. in extent, the quantity underlying portions of this area being estimated at four and a half to nine million tons per sq. mile. Gold is found in greater or less quantity all over the province, but the mines of the Kootenay and Cariboo districts are becoming prominent as quartz mining regions, while the Cassiar, Atlin Lake and other regions have developed rich placer mines. In 1905 the mineral production of the province was as follows: gold, \$5,902,402; copper, \$5,876,222; coal, \$4,152,936; lead, \$2,399,022; silver, \$1,971,818; coke, \$1,358,925; other materials, \$800,000, making a total of \$22,461,325. The population of British Columbia in 1891 was 92,767; at the census of 1901 it was 178,657, and at the present time it is estimated at about 200,000. In 1902 there were 337 schools, with 570 teachers and 23,903 pupils. The annual expenditure for education has increased from \$171,311 in 1891 to \$438,086 in 1902. The province is represented in the Dominion Parliament by three senators, and six members of the House of Commons. The local government is carried on by a single chamber, the Legislative Assembly, having 42 members. Capital, Victoria.

YUKON TERRITORY.

Yukon Territory, Canada.—Population, 25,000. Industry: mining. The territory produces annually \$20,000,000 in gold from its placer mines. Everything needed by the entire population must be imported. Wages and prices are high, and margins of profit correspondingly high. The better class of manufactured articles is mostly imported. Dawson is the capital of the territory, and has a population of 5,000. It is the supply centre of all Yukon and the lower river gold fields in Alaska. Has \$1,000,000 worth of government buildings, churches and schools, well graded streets, a fire department, that cost \$100,000 per year to maintain, and is the most important city north of Vancouver. Quartz mining is fast coming to the front in Yukon. Last year the Government gave \$15,000 in bonuses to quartz development, with the result that some good prospects will turn into good mines. In 1906 the Guggenheims, under the name of the Yukon Consolidated Gold Fields Co., invested \$15,000,000 in the purchase of claims and installing a water system and dredger. Fifty thousand tons of goods are shipped into Yukon annually, all this amount being shipped in practically four months' time (the open season). Every ton of these goods could be sold by Canadian manufacturers had they the enterprise to advertise for and go after this trade.

DAWSON CITY, pop. 5,000. The metropolis and seat of government of the Klondike gold fields on Yukon River. Two banks, government telegraph, T., Ex., M.O. In proportion to its population, the richest town on earth; smallest piece of money in circulation there, 25 cts.; labor paid \$1.00 per hour and upwards. Has five iron and steel foundries, five saw mills, etc. Chief Shipment: gold dust. Has five churches, three schools, insane asylum, court house, public buildings to value of \$500,000; twenty steamboats, three opera houses, five docks, twenty-nine hotels, perfect fire protection, water works, electric lights, etc. Outfits the vast Klondike area of gold filled sands, and exports over \$20,000,000 in gold dust per year.

NEWFOUNDLAND.

Newfoundland, the oldest colony in the British Empire, embraces the Island of Newfoundland and a portion of the Labrador coast of the mainland, and is the only part of British North America not as yet included in the Dominion of Canada, though proposals for confederation have at various times been made, and although the question is a live one, many of the leading men of the island are opposed to a union with Canada. The area of the island is estimated at 40,200 sq. m., and the Labrador coast at 120,000 sq. m. The population at the census of 1891 was 202,040, including Labrador. From its settlement in 1614 to a very recent time the fisheries have formed practically the only industry of the inhabitants, but the building of railways, and the exploration of the interior, is leading to the discovery and development of hitherto unknown resources that will give a steadiness and balance heretofore lacking in the commerce of the island. In minerals the island has copper, coal, iron, gypsum, sulphur, graphite, lead, asbestos and gold. Iron and copper are the principal minerals. Copper was discovered at Tilt Cove in 1856, but the mines were not operated until 1864. Since then several large deposits have been uncovered, and to-day Newfoundland stands sixth among the copper producing countries of the world. In 1895 brown hematite iron was discovered at Bell Island, Conception Bay. It is estimated that in the two deposits on the island there are 40,000,000 tons. The output of these mines and the shipments of iron pyrites are materially adding to the exports of the colony. Talc deposits have also been uncovered at Topsail, some 14 miles from St. John's, and shipments were made in 1904 to the United States. Besides the above, slate quarries were opened in 1904, and shipments sent to Wales. The value of minerals exported in 1902 was \$1,260,381, and since then the output has been much larger. Within a couple of years vast timber limits have been operated, modern saw mills constructed, and numerous shipments made to the United Kingdom and South America. The lumber trade bids fair to become extensive. The value of the exports of lumber in 1905-6 is placed at \$176,157. The pulp industry is also assuming large proportions under the management of British capitalists. More attention is being paid to agriculture. The number of acres under cultivation has increased within a few years from about 100,000 acres to close on 200,000 acres. The annual value of agricultural products is over \$750,000, and the value of land under cultivation, together with horses, sheep, etc., is nearly \$3,000,000. A movement is on foot to utilize the vast plains in the interior raising sheep and cattle for export to the United Kingdom. Fish is the chief product of Newfoundland, and out of a total value of \$12,086,276 exports in 1905-6, \$10,117,951 were of fish and fish products. The herring fisheries are commanding the attention of the Government. Expert herring packers were brought from Scotland, with the result that shipments of herring were sent to St. Petersburg, Russia, and sold at good prices. The whale fisheries are also becoming more extensive. The value in 1904 was \$365,953. The settlement of the French shore question will be the means of adding greatly to the development not alone in connection with the fisheries, but other resources of the treaty shore. Plans are now being made for settlements there. The lobster fisheries alone in 1905-6 were valued at \$376,490. The imports of Newfoundland in 1903-4 were \$9,460,000, and the exports \$10,380,000. In 1895 there were 2,339 vessels on the shipping register of the colony, with a total tonnage of 108, 180 tons, and of the whole population no less than 53,502 persons were engaged in fishing. There are 846 post offices in the colony, but statistics of this department are not available. The government is carried on by a Legislative Council, consisting of 15 members, and a Legislative Assembly of 36 members. Capital, St. John's.

For statistics and other information regarding the newspapers of the province see other parts of this work. BAY OF ISLANDS, pop. 2,500, western headquarters of the Newfoundland Ry. and terminus for the short steamship service between Newfoundland and Labrador; rendezvous for the English and French naval ships in Newfoundland waters. Chief Industries: herring fishing worth \$150,000 annually, salmon, cod and lobster fisheries, copper mining; the shores are densely timbered and large saw mills are operated: a gigantic pulp industry is being inaugurated in the vicinity which will employ 2,000 operatives. There are ten surrounding towns, each with a population of from one to two thousand, where no newspapers are published. The scenery is magnificent. Salmon and trout and big game are abundant; these attract hundreds of tourists and sportsmen each season. Regular steamship service between Halifax and this part of Newfoundland.

It has two high schools and three Protestant schools, a library with 1,250 volumes and a reading room. The harbor is about five miles in extent and can accommodate the largest vessels. It has good water works and an efficient fire department. Surrounding towns and villages where no papers are published: Carbonnear, Mosquito, Spaniards Bay, Island Cove, Bryant's Cove and Tilton.

It is 1,076 miles from Montreal. Tel., T., Ex., M.O., Bank. Chief Industries: cordage, foundries, breweries, nails, butterine, biscuits, boots and shoes, furniture, sashes and doors, tobacco, soap, cod liver and seal oil refineries, net manufacturing, fishing and fish drying. 


Diagram showing dimensions of posters.





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

The Montreal Star was established in 1869. The Canadian Confederation was then only two years old and embraced but Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. Prince Edward Island was not yet in the Dominion.

The Starthen was a four-paged paper, printed on a single cylinder press. It was, however, one of the forces which was to develop Canada, and the paper grew with the country's growth. It inculcated a spirit of faith in the great-

ness of the Dominion, the vastness of its possibilities, and the certainty of its future. Canada had its time of discouragement, its period even of distress, and the press had its struggles in those early days, too; but the Star was ever among the factors for national progress, fighting against every discouragement and putting strength and hope into others.

From the beginning it was a one cent paper, adhering to this in face of the advice of all its comrades. To-day it has a circulation of more than 61,000 daily, and over 129,000 weekly. It has kept fully abreast of the times in equipment, using the various type-bar casting machines among the first of the Canadian papers, the present plant was that decided upon as necessary to get up the large amount of reading and advertising matter carried. The press room originally was equipped with one cylinder press, to-day the capacity of several big Goss and Hoe webb presses is taxed to get out their many editions.

As to the advertising value of the Star, "Printer's Ink, the leading advertising paper in America, says: "In the Montreal retail field the Star carries as much advertising, proportionate to its number of pages, as any New York daily, though Montreal has rather a slender department store patronage. The Weekly carries a large proportion of general and mail order advertising, and for both the Daily and Weekly, supremacy in classified advertising is claimed."

In securing its great mail circulation, the Star does not employ a single canvasser, but relies on the attractiveness of the paper, with its low price, to get subscribers. The Family Herald and Weekly Star is a paper of twenty-four to thirty-two pages, weekly, at one dollar a year. Competitors sell a weekly about the same size for one half the price with premiums. Yet the Star gives no premiums other than a picture on renewal, and more than holds its Part of its attraction lies in its complete departments devoted to farm matters, children, general reading, news and magazine features, while the rest of its success seems to be found in the number of postmasters and school teachers throughout Canada who act as its subscription agents.

It forms the only literature outside of the bible in thousands of homes in the remotest parts of the country as well as in the big centres. In hundreds of schools the teachers read from a special department in the paper every Friday afternoom—a department made up of problems and puzzles.

The Daily Star is sold to newsboys and dealers on a strictly non-returnable basis, so that its circulation is essentially net.

Canada offers to manufacturers a good market for their products and one capable of great expansion. The total trade of Canada has grown from \$231,000,000 in 1896 to \$547,000,000 in 1906. Her trade ten years ago with the United States was \$103,000,000. Last year her trade had increased to \$273,000,000. Canada purchases more from the United States than from any other country as its merchants and manufacturers more fully realize the value of the market in bringing their products before the eye of the Canadian The American buver. facturers are recognizing in Canada a market of more value to them than that of any other country in the world; and by advertising largely, sending commercial travellers and establishing branch houses, they are strenuously trying to hold and enlarge the market.

The Star has offices in London, New York, Chicago, Toronto and Winnipeg, and is to Canada what the London Times is to the British Isles, the fearless friend of the oppressed; a paper which is part of the country and has accomplished results of which any paper in the world might well be proud.
