




PREFACE

THIS Eighth Report in most particulars deals only with events since the Report of the 30th year, published in 1925.

WALTER KIRKPATRICK BRICE prepared for College at St. Mark's School, and after taking his degree of A. B. *cum laude*, he returned to teach at St. Mark's, where he was a master for two years. He was later actively interested in the Department of Music at Harvard, and in 1910 he took the degree of LL.B. from the New York Law School and was admitted to the New York Bar.

When the Spanish American War broke out, he was making a trip around the world and had reached the Philippine Islands. He enlisted there in the United States Volunteer Engineers as First Lieutenant, 3rd Regiment, and acted as Aide to General Anderson. He later traveled very extensively in the Far East and in Europe, visiting the greater part of the civilized world, and studying conditions from the sociological standpoint. The broad outlook thus gained was of use to him in the philanthropic work to which he later devoted much of his time and fortune, and which interested him keenly up to the time of his death. After his return to New York, Brice spent some time in the Morton Trust Company, to get a first-hand knowledge of banking and finance, in preparation for his later management of the family interests in gas and electric properties in Ohio. During the Great War, he was chairman of the committee on Army and Navy camp music and did a great deal toward supplying music here and abroad. He also sponsored the Community Chorus movement in New York and elsewhere. He believed in fostering musical talent wherever he found it and many a struggling artist was helped by him.

"Pat" Brice as he was familiarly and affectionately called, not only by his Classmates but by his whole Harvard generation, was a man of ability, possessed of mental powers decidedly above the average; and in other circumstances and surroundings, with greater incentive to work and to make the most of his talents, it is probable that he would have risen to a position of national prominence. He learned easily and readily mastered any subject to which he set his mind. He was capable of intense and sustained mental effort. His sense of humor was keen and dry, as those who were associated with him in the editorship of the Lampoon can testify. His interest in his fellow men, always apparent, increased and mellowed with age. The writer recalls after thirty-five years his bright, pleasant smile and hearty greetings to all callers at his room in Beck Hall. Though his social and financial status was above the average of the college student, he was democratic, modest and friendly. Throughout his life he was truly the philanthropist.

I do not doubt that many of his Classmates remember a speech that he made at one of the early Class reunions, probably the Decennial. When the dinner was well advanced, in a scene of noise, disorder and conviviality, he stood up and made a ringing speech which silenced everyone, and held the attention of all. His theme was the dignity of such an occasion, when a group of friends, after a long separation, meet together for a day or two, and how they ought to prize the opportunity to renew old friendships. Harvard retained its significance for him up to the day of his death.

E LLERTON JAMES was the son of George Abbot and Elizabeth Cabot (Lodge) James. He was born at Nahant on June 28, 1872, and his life was passed at Nahant, Boston and Milton. He entered Harvard in 1891 and took the degree of A. B. in 1895 and LL.B. in 1898. Soon after graduating from the Law School, he married Miss Olivia B. Tappan and settled in Milton, passing his summers at Nahant and engag-

ing in the practice of law in Boston, where for twenty-five years he shared offices with his Classmate Phillips. Such is the brief outline of the facts of James's life.

Possessed of ample means and an established social position, he was under no necessity to work for his own advancement, and many men would have settled down to a life of ease and idleness, but James always regarded his wealth and education as a trust to be used for the benefit of others, and during his lifetime he was a tireless worker for the public welfare in the charities of Boston and in the political life of Nahant. When in 1906 the State decided to open a new institution for the feeble-minded, Governor Guild appointed James one of the original trustees, and for twenty years he actively devoted himself to its welfare. In the original choice of a site, the building of the institution, the selection of officers, and the development of the Wrentham State School into a great institution with nearly fifteen hundred inmates, he had a large part. He took a very keen interest in cases of supposed injustice and devoted an enormous amount of his time and energy to investigating and righting them. Public problems of all sorts interested him and he often contributed to the discussion in trenchant letters to the Boston papers.

His interest in and love for Harvard was great. As in politics, when he felt the College was adopting a policy he did not approve, he fearlessly criticized it, but as soon as the matter was settled, whether in accordance with his view or not, he was always ready to help again. During the War he served as assistant to Major Roger Wolcott in charge of the draft in Massachusetts and had the unpopular duty of looking up delinquents. To the town of Nahant, where he was born and where he passed his summers, and had his legal residence, he devoted much time. He served on all sorts of committees there, to build public buildings, examine town finances, and so forth, and did the work which was once expected of all good citizens, but which is rarely done nowadays by men in his position.

His great avocation was outdoor life and physical exercise. He and his wife had traveled extensively, not only on beaten paths, but in out-of-the-way places in Africa and on long hunting trips in remote parts of Canada. He was an enthusiastic sportsman and next to his public work enjoyed being in the woods. He owned a large tract of woodland near Milton, and enjoyed nothing so much as driving over there and working in the woods when he had a spare afternoon. Few men of his age and class had preserved the ability to take physical exercise that he had. He was an able bowler and an adept with rifle, paddle, axe, or canoe up to the very time of his death. Of his home life it would be an intrusion to speak, but it was singularly happy and delightful, as those of his friends know who were fortunate enough to enjoy a visit at his beautiful home in Milton. His death occurred there from pneumonia on February 14, 1926.

His war record in these various positions was first-class. He was useful and helpful, and his work in England was so conspicuous that he was decorated with the British Military Cross.

Always active, interested and popular, a thorough sportsman and a good friend, his death is a loss to many more people than is the death of the ordinary man. He died on December 6, 1927, after an illness of several months.

JAMES STURGIS PRAY, Charles Eliot Professor of Landscape Architecture, was born in Boston in 1871, the son of Benjamin Sweetzer and Francis Motley (Gavett) Pray. He prepared at the Chauncey Hall School and entered Harvard in 1891. In 1894 he withdrew because of poor health, but returned two years later, and in 1898 received the degree of A. B., "as of 1895". During his last two years at Harvard, he followed special studies at the Lawrence Scientific School and the Bussey Institute, leading to the then new profession of landscape architecture.

From October 1898 until April 1903, he was in the office of Olmsted Brothers. Among the projects with which he was concerned while there were the studies started under the late Charles Eliot for the development of the present Middlesex Fells Reservation, a part of the Metropolitan Park system. Leaving the Olmsted firm in 1903, he opened his own office in Boston; in 1905 the firm became Pray & Gallagher, and from 1906 until 1918, Pray, Hubbard & White. He retired from active practice in the latter year, although he had not been really active for some time, but had devoted his energies to the School of Landscape Architecture at Harvard. During the World War, however, with other members of his profession he served the Government in the designing of cantonments and of housing for war workers.

Pray's work for twenty years as chairman of the School of Landscape Architecture covered the early growth and development of professional instruction. In October 1902 he was appointed assistant in Landscape Architecture, the course being developed at that time under the direction of F. L. Olmsted, Jr. Various other appointments followed until in 1913 he was made chairman of the Council of the School of Landscape Architecture. He carried on these duties until 1928 when he was forced to resign on account of poor health. In 1915, on the resignation of Mr. Olmsted, he was appointed Charles Eliot Professor of Landscape Architecture, which position he occupied until his death.

Pray was a pioneer in his profession. His chief interest was the advancement of landscape architecture as one of the Fine Arts. He labored constantly toward this end, and his influence came to be felt not only in Cambridge and New England, but in the country at large. Commenting on this phase of his work, one eminent journal says:

"Many methods of instruction now regarded almost as standards were worked out by experiment in those days of beginnings, and the very status of the profession as a fine art, now generally accepted, was at first something to be explained and maintained, often against much inertia and misunderstanding. In this pioneering work Mr. Pray had a leading hand. His aims and ideals have been spread most effectively into other institutions through the graduates of the Harvard School. At the time of his death twenty-five former students of his were teaching landscape architecture at fourteen colleges and institutions, and the heads of six professional undergraduate schools were holders of the Harvard Master's Degree. . .

"In the fall of 1909, in response to a strong demand from the students, he gave the first course in city-planning instruction offered in this country; this was the beginning of a consistent sequence of instruction in this special field which was recognized by a special degree at Harvard in 1923. In many colleges throughout the country also, instruction in city planning thus initiated, has now been accepted as a desirable part of a general education; and to this more widespread academic recognition of the field, Mr. Pray's leadership at Harvard gave an early and lasting impetus."

"While looking through a catalogue of manuscripts in the British Museum," Robinson writes, "I discovered the legal notebook of Governor John Winthrop, which makes possible a reconstruction of the chronology and history of his life during the period immediately preceding the great Puritan emigration to Massachusetts. The first volume of my work on the subject was published in 1929; the second volume I expect to have ready before the end of this year.

"In connection with the preparation of the second volume of these papers, I visited England in the summer of 1929. I also visited Holland, England and Scotland in the summer of 1926. My youngest son, Oliver, graduated from Harvard *cum laude* in 1925. My daughter, Hilda, received the degree of A. A. from Radcliffe in 1928."

SINCE the first of July, 1925, Rockwell has been librarian of the Union Theological Seminary. Here, surrounded by a collection which is conceded to be the largest of its kind in the world, Rockwell dreams of books — and more books. His letter:

"My principal business is to administer a library in New York, with six miles of shelves; to lay out work for a staff of eleven library assistants, not to mention as many student helpers, and to answer (if I can) all sorts of questions put to me by letter, or in person by young men and women assiduously courting the higher academic degrees. There is also a very riot of discovering, importing and rendering available books printed in the last five centuries, with or without woodcuts, -- some in rags and tatters of renaissance bindings - these chilly from the ocean voyage undertaken too soon after publication; but in any case, like Browning's Old Yellow Book, the precipitates of human aspirations and passions. We bring them to America as a national service, that no youth shall need to cross the seas in search of any printed thought about God or duty. We lend them freely to libraries from coast to coast, provided the package will stand the perils of the parcel post. We classify and catalogue them, so that, as the ultimate custodian of two hundred and fifty-six thousand articles, nearly all different, my assistants can find in five minutes the one that vou lack.

"My work reminds me of *Major Barbara's* code, as Bernard Shaw depicts it; we furnish weapons to any man, 'on the faith of an armourer', so that the best may prevail. The conflict is not physical but intellectual and spiritual.

"My office windows look across a peaceful quadrangle to a Gothic chapel; and beyond the chapel to the soaring tower of the Riverside Church, soon to vibrate with the Rockefeller carillon; and beyond the tower, to the Hudson and to the clouds. On this outlook I deliberately turn my back, and dream of my library; and almost every steamer that comes from Europe has some parcel for us, which may, perhaps, throw new light even on quadrangle, chapel, church, tower and clouds. Who knows?

"As for fads, I am an ardent genealogist, a 'country member' of the Society of Genealogists (London). My father published a book tracing the Rockwells back to 1630; I have carried them back to 1560, and am following clues in Somerset and in London that run much further. As another diversion, I teach Latin Palaeography in Columbia University. Owning the Bedingfeld Book of Hours, illuminated in England about 1460, has led me frequently into the study of late Mediaeval Art.

"I taught Church History at the Divinity School of the University of Chicago during the summers of 1925 and 1927, and am to teach it this summer. Two years ago my wife and I traveled through Europe from Cherbourg to Constantinople, from Athens to Norway, and down through the British Isles, the chief thing for me being the sea-coast of Dalmatia and the five-year congress of European historians at Oslo. In 1929 I did a few days' work in England on the record of the Reverend John Warham of Windsor, Conn. (died 1670), and on his associates who came to Dorchester, Mass., in 1630 on the *Mary and John*. I also went to the Four Hundredth Anniversary of the religious colloquy between Luther and Zwingli at Marburg, Germany."

Just as the Report is going to press word is received from Rockwell that the Theological Faculty of the University of Marburg has conferred upon him the honorary degree of Doctor of Theology. This is a distinction that has hardly ever before been conferred upon an American.

THE Secretary was very much tempted to make Whiteside's letter serve a double purpose by printing it in the front of the Report as a Foreword. It expresses so well what most of us would like to say when in despair we jot down: "Nothing of any consequence."

"Five years more to record for our Class Report, and a review of these years leaves me little to say for myself. I do not seem to have made much material progress, and I have unquestionably deteriorated physically. My joints are just a little stiffer and I do not seem to need as much exercise as I used to think essential. Also doctors' and dentists' bills seem to be more frequent.

"I feel more hopeful mentally and morally. I think I have learned more in these five years than I did in the previous thirty. It is all such A B C stuff, however, that I am amazed I did not learn it twenty-five or thirty years ago. Indeed, I am surprised that some of it was not born in me. In spite of the fact that this newly acquired knowledge makes me seem different to myself, I have no doubt my Classmates will think I am just about the same proposition I was in 1895.

"Some of those whom we have loved are here no more. Billy Patten is among them. His death to me was a great grief, for I knew him well.

"It has just occurred to me this is not a cheerful document, but must we not remember that we are definitely on the down grade? We can get some comfort from the thought that in the gradual descent before us, we shall at times reach lovely little peaks from which we can still see some of the glory.

"While I do not yet seem to have hit a joyous note, it seems to me that after all, if we take them right, the next twenty or twenty-five years may be just as happy as any we have spent. We won't have the same excitement, but neither shall we be so constantly hoping for the impossible."

ROBERT DUFFIELD WRENN was born at Highland Park,Ill., on September 20, 1872, the son of George Lawson and Eliza (Everts) Wrenn. He prepared for College at the Cambridge Latin School. During the four years in Harvard he was a prominent figure not only in athletics but in every other form of college activity, and after graduation he maintained his interest in Class affairs as a member of the Class Committee. His business career did not really begin until 1900 when he went into the banking and brokerage business with his two brothers in New York, under the firm name of Wrenn Brothers and Company. He maintained an active interest in its affairs until 1922, when he was forced to retire on account of ill health. His death occurred three years later and was caused by Bright's disease. He left one child, a daughter; his wife, who was Grace Dabney of Boston, died following her daughter's birth.

Bob Wrenn was one of the outstanding figures of his college generation. His prominence was national. Of all the tributes occasioned by his death, perhaps the most comprehensive was the address which George T. Adee, representing the U. S. Lawn Tennis Association, made upon the unveiling of a tablet in Wrenn's memory at the West Side Tennis Club, Forest Hills, N. Y., on September 17, 1926. On the opposite page will be found a facsimile of the tablet and Mr. Adee's speech follows:

"Bob Wrenn was a great athlete and a great executive. He played quarterback on the Harvard football team, second base on the Harvard baseball nine, coverpoint on the St. Nicholas hockey team. He won the national singles tennis championship in 1893-4-6-7, and the doubles championship in 1895. He represented the United States in both the singles and doubles on the Davis Cup team in 1903. He served the United States Lawn Tennis Association well and faithfully for thirty-two years, and gave to it unstintingly of his time and labor with no thought of reward. He was a member of the executive committee of the association from 1900 to the day of his death, November 12, 1925, vice-president from 1902 till 1911, and president from 1911 to 1915. He guided the affairs of this association with rare tact, good judgment, and unfailing loyalty, steadfastly maintaining the highest ideals of amateur sport — and yet in spite of the time he gave to sport, his ability and his industry had made him successful in business. He was a soldier in two wars — as a private in the Rough Riders under Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, he charged up San Juan Hill in the Spanish War, and at the age of forty-three he was commissioned a major of aviation in the World War, flying his own machine and commanding a squadron of aeroplanes.

"But it is not so much because of these deeds that the United States Lawn Tennis Association honors him. No not so much for what he did, but because the compelling charm of his personality, his unfailing courtesy and fairness, his abiding respect for the rules of the game, his quick, clear thinking and instantaneous decisions, his resourcefulness, his aggressive attack, his steadfast courage, his dogged determination in competition both on and off the athletic field, his inborn patriotism, and his readiness to make the supreme sacrifice at his country's call make him a splendid example of the spirit of amateur sport.

"Modest, unassuming and genuine, his life was a vital contribution to sport of his time and generation. His death will not stay the inspiration of his work nor break the bond of affection of his friends."
