

IT IS EASY TO SUCCEED

WITH WATERLILIES

XPERIENCE is not necessary in the growing of waterlilies, a fact which appeals to many amateur gardeners. Success is almost sure to crown your efforts. Requirements of waterlilies are few—sunshine, soil and a pool to grow them in. Concrete pools, or even fairly good-sized tubs, will serve excellently as water-gardens. If you have a shallow, natural pond you have the very best equipment.

PONDS AND POOLS

A pond can easily be made in clay soil, or by lining with clay a hole in ordinary ground. Concrete or clay pools 1½ to 2 feet deep are entirely satisfactory. A tub may be about 2½ feet in diameter, but a pool should be not less than 6 feet long and 3 feet wide.

The soil for Waterlilies is preferably a mixture of two-thirds rich garden soil and one-third well-rotted cow-manure. Blood-meal can be used in the proportion of one quart to a bushel of soil. This mixture may be spread over the bottom of the pond or may be put into holes dug where the roots are to be planted. In a concrete pool the soil should be put into boxes and set on the bottom of the pool. About 2 cubic feet of soil should be provided for each plant.

PLANTING

Set the plant so that the crown, from which the leaves grow, is just beneath the surface of the soil. Sand or gravel should be sprinkled over the soil to prevent fouling the water, and to keep fish from bothering the plants. New waterlily plants should be started in shallow water but will later thrive at any depth from 4 to 30 inches. 8 inches seems to be about the best depth. Running water is neither necessary nor desirable as it tends to keep the temperature too low.

WINTER CARE

Hardy Waterlilies may be left in natural ponds during the winter. If in a pool that must be drained, the roots may be covered with leaves or straw

for protection. If planted in a box they may be taken up in tanks or stored in cool cellars, but they should not be allowed to become dry. Tropical Lilies are difficult to winter unless kept as growing plants in the greenhouse; they are best regarded as annuals and new plants purchased each year.

MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS

When provided with plenty of soil, the leaf-spread of a Waterlily will be 3 to 4 feet in diameter, hence a pool 10 by 15 feet should accommodate ten to fifteen Lilies. The leaf-spread of many varieties may be reduced to a degree suitable for tub culture by planting in a 6 or 8-inch pot; this dwarfs the plant so that the leaf-spread and the blooms are smaller. A little blood-meal should be added to the soil occasionally, or the plant may be repotted once or twice during the season.

Floating aquatic plants will grow without soil, but do better if the roots can reach it, particularly in the case of blooming plants. Marsh or bog plants should be potted and set so that the level of the soil is slightly above the water. Shallow water plants do well in 2 to 6 inches of water.


Oxygenating plants, such as Anacharis, Vallisneria, Myriophyllum, Sagittaria, etc., may be used to keep the water from becoming stagnant, and a few gold fish will eliminate mosquitoes.

Insects that attack the foliage of Waterlilies and other aquatics may be washed off with a hose so that the fish can get them. The green scum-like growth of algae makes good food for snails, or it may be removed by hand. If the pool has an over-flow this scum may be floated off. Clams will help to keep the water clear.

TROPICAL WATERLILIES

STANDING erect on slender stems, rearing their radiant, fragrant heads a foot above their richly colored leaves, the Tropical Water-lilles are rightfully called, "The Aristocrats of the

Water Garden".

Their great beauty of color is but one of the many points in favor of these floating aristocrats. Many of them possess perfumes both delicate and rich. Their season of blooming is long, also, as cold does not cause them to become dormant. Indoors, where the temperature averages 65 to 70 degrees, and in the southland, they will bloom the full year. Thus they are economical as well as beautiful.

We designate these lilies as "day blooming" and "night blooming" because of the "open hours" they keep.

NIGHT BLOOMING LILIES

The Night Blooming Lilies open their lovely faces in early evening. Instead of closing their petals at sunset as do the day blooming varieties, gorgeous pink, white and red flowers greet the eye just at twilight, and a water garden of surpassing loveliness remains all night and well into the day following or all the through the day on cloudy days.

Because of their exceptional quality and beauty, we are recommending a few outstanding varieties to your attention:

FRANK TRELEASE. Rich dark crimson flowers with mahogany colored stamens. Petals long, narrow and rounded at the ends. Mottled dark red and green shades of the young leaves merge to a rich bronze red in the matured plants. The most popular of its type. \$1.50,

- JUNO (Dentata Superba). The perfected modern flower developed by cultivation from the sacred white Lotus of Egyptian tradition. A flower of great substance composed of very broad heavy petals that open widely revealing the wide flat saffron yellow stamens. Blooms easily 8 to 12 inches across. \$3.
- OMARANA. The general effect is a pleasing variegated pink produced by deep shading on the outer edges of the petals that fades into a white stripe through the center line. Flowers quite large. Deserving of its popularity. \$1.50
- RUBRA ROSEA. There is some question about the color of the lily corresponding to this name as the orginal Nymphaea rubra differs in various localities in India. Our strain is a good, rosy carmine and quite star-shaped due to the unusual shape of the petals which are broad at the base and taper to a long point. \$1.50

DAY BLOOMING LILIES

Lilies which bloom in the daytime, and close as the sun goes down, are of innumerable varieties and colors. Those we have listed below are only a few of the many grown in our nurseries. CHROMATELLA. The clear, clean yellow of Chromatella makes it by far the best yellow variety grown. The broad petals are canary yellow, the stamens are of a deeper shade and altogether, this combination displayed among the leaves beautifully marbled in deep green and brown, make it a picture indeed. \$2.



OTHER AQUATIC PLANTS NEEDED IN THE GARDEN

JUST as the queen is surrounded by a court of beautiful, adoring subjects, so the Waterlily should be provided with a harmonious background. For the Waterlily—stately, colorful—is the true queen of the water garden. Her flower subjects should contribute grace and color to the royal setting.

The aquatics, which prove this background, are not difficult to grow. Many fine aquatics grow and bloom by merely floating on the water, deriving nourishment from air and water. These do not need soil or the sides of a pool to which to cling. Still others, growing under the water, will either absorb the impurities in your pool, or release oxygen to destroy them. These submerged or oxygenating plants are indispensible when fish are present, for they provide a perfect palance for the animal life.

We list below only a few of the many varieties.

FLOATING PLANTS



DUCK WEED. (Lemna minor). Appears as a series of green polka dots on the surface. The small roots are much appreciated by goldfish. Large portion, 50c.

SHELL FLOWER or WATER LETTUCE. (Pistia stratiotes). A hardy annual resembling the water fern in form but with mottled leaves and small white flowers. 50c for 2; \$2. per doz.

WATER HYACINTH (Eichhornia crassipes major.) Shiny dark green leaves, the stems of which are expanded into pseudo bulbs, which serve as air chambers. The orchid-like flowers of lavender form a pike like that of the true hyacinth. 50c for 3; \$1.50 per doz.

SHALLOW WATER PLANTS



FLOATING HEART. (Nymphoides peltatum). This plant has leaves like the nymphaeas and produces brilliant yellow flowers quite freely. It is hardy and will do well in water or on the border. \$1. per doz.

GIANT ARROWHEAD (Sagittaria Sagiggifolia). Distinctive leaves shaped as name indicates and standing 1 to 3 feet above water. Flowers freely in a series of white spikes. Hardy. \$1. for 3; \$2.50 per doz.

BOG PLANTS



Marsh or bog plants want wet feet. You will find them growing just at the edge of a pond. In a concrete pool you may have a ledge or box of soil partially immersed, or you may prefer to put individual plants in flower pots set so that the soil comes above the water level.

FORGET-ME-NOT (Myosotis scorpiodes). Small blue flowers with golden centers; will grow equally well in water or on the border. Hardy. \$1. for 3; \$2.50 per doz.



FANCY FISH

I T IS difficult to think of a pool, deep, clear and sparkling, without a few goldfish flashing through the water. The culture of ornamental fishes has become highly popular. The fish are not only a beautiful note of color in your pool—they are little care, other than feeding, and with a number of aquatic plants in your pool, you have all the attributes of a natural pond. When such a balance of animal and plant life is obtained it is never necessary to change the water.

We have many beautiful and brilliant varieties of ornamental fishes to offer—varieties collected from all parts of the world over a period of many years. Some are excellent for pools, while others are most valuable for the indoor aquariums.

GOLD FISHES

They may be wintered outside in natural ponds, but when in pools free from soil and plant roots, care should be taken to break the ice frequently so that the water does not become foul from lack of aeration. A glass aquarium is an excellent investment as it permits you to enjoy the beauty of the fish all winter; but if mere storage is desired, a tub in the basement will do nicely, changing the water when necessary or providing a continual drip from a faucet. There is no set rule for changing water except that when the fish gasp for air at the top it is evident that they are in distress and need at least a part of the water renewed.

The fish should be fed daily with dried shrimp, providing not more than will be eaten in fifteen minutes. Goldfish can be shipped at any season of the year. A flat charge of 50 cts. over and above the price of the fish is made for the shipping-can.

GIANT GOLDFISH. These large fish which are 10 to 14 inches long, lend distinctive color to the pool. They may be shipped safely in large containers to all parts of the country. Selected breeders, \$5. per pair; \$25. per doz.




