Osceola, Seminole Chief



The word "Seminole" means outlanders or runaways in the language of the Creek

Indians. The Seminole tribes of Florida had emigrated to Florida after breaking away from the Creeks in Georgio.

For many years the Seminoles shaltered

slaves who had fled the plantations of Georgia. In the early 1800's the United States began sending soldiers to recover the escaped slaves. Negroes and Indians olike were captured and sold into band-

In bitter resentment the Seminoles took up arms and fought the raiders, order wiping out whole Army units. In 1832, the Covernment demanded that the Seminole Government demanded that the Seminole would agree to move their tribe west of the Missisteph. Those of partly Negro blood, however, were to be sold into slowry. A few frightened chieftonis signed the agreement. But one flery warrior, Oscoelo, the kinds through the treaty partners.

"This land will always be ours," he procloimed. Osceolo swore the Seminoles would fight to the last drop of blood. Arrested by the Indian agent, Wiley Thompson, Osceolo was imprisoned briefly and then freed. The Seminole chieftain had another score to settle with Thompson. Some years before, this Indian agent had captured Osceola's wife and sold her into

slavery.

The Indian chieftain realized that only by force of orms could the Seminoles hope to keep their land. In a carefully laid am-

same day in December, 1835, another war porty of Seminoles almost wiped out an Army detachment under Major Francis Dade. The Seminole wars were on. Troops poured into Florida, From the swemps and

poured into Frontal. From the swomps and undergrowth Oscool and his tribesmen fought back. Under his skilled leadership, and in spite of overwhelming odds, they fought the soldiers to a standstill. In 1837, however, 3,000 Seminoles

gathered to surrender, but Oscoola convinced them to return to the swompland and confinue their deficance. General Jesup, leader of the Government traops, tricked Oscoola into a truce conference and then arrested him. Oscoolo died in prison soon afterwards. Bitter at the betroyal, the Seminole

chiefs where to average Osceolo. Inspired by the dead chief's example, they swept out of their swomp-land forters to fight one bloody engagement after another with the Army, Novy and Marines. After each bottle they melted back into the trockless morshes.

In a new tactic the military beann o

In a new tactic the military began a scorched-early policy, burning the Indian crops and villages. Faced with storvation, thousands of Seminoles surrendered and were deported west of the Mississippi. But hundreds of others, true to their dead chief, Oscoola, retreated still deeper into the swamp-land fostness, refusing to give up the fight for freedom. Their descendrant live in that area to this day.

In their six-year fight the Seminales cast the United States 6,000 cosualties and up to \$50,000,000 in military expenditures. Yet this gollont tribe was never truly de-

As for their leader Osceolo, today his grave bears the simple inscription—PA-
