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Foreword

This volume is the second in a series on active Air Force bases and a continuation of a recent line of works prepared for the Center for Air Force History under the Reference Series. These reference books contain specific information about a number of topics of interest to the United States Air Force and other arms of the Department of Defense. They are designed to present fundamental data about such diverse subjects as Air Force aircraft, combat action, unit lineage and honors, campaign medals and streamers, and air bases, for those who will write more extensive narrative accounts about Air Force activities and operations. Volume II in the *Air Force Bases* series provides important background information about overseas installations that are less well known than domestic stations.

The active installations included in this volume, to be sure, represent only a fraction of the overseas bases, fields, and stations operated by the United States Air Force and its predecessor organizations since the beginning of World War II. Nevertheless, many of the most significant and enduring air bases appear in these pages, some of which are essential to America's defense posture. This work represents a starting point for military students and staff officers involved in defense research or planning, and for scholars interested in serious research of air bases and the Air Force organizations that operated from them.

Preface

Several years ago the Center for Air Force History began a series of reference works designed to provide vital information concerning various aspects of Air Force history, from the lineage of individual units to the medals and campaign honors awarded by the United States Air Force to its personnel and organizations. Brief resumes of bases and stations of the Air Force appeared ideal for inclusion in the reference series because basic data about Air Force installations are infrequently found in published works that most often feature the exploits of combat flyers and organizations. All Air Force organizations and personnel have nevertheless been quartered and trained for operations at some base, field, or station; every aerial exploit began at one of them. Day-to-day aircraft repair and maintenance took place there, while the base host organization looked after buildings of all kinds; maintained roads, runways, taxiways, revetments and supply dumps; and furnished health services, security, messing, legal, and recreational facilities. Base operating units and their commanders have all too often been overlooked, even though they supported important tactical units and often dozens of off-base and detached installations.

This book, *Air Force Bases, Volume II*, contains fundamental data on forty-four major air bases located outside of the territorial limits of the United States in fifteen countries or territories overseas. All of these bases, stations, or airports were of vital national significance as America grappled with the challenges of the Cold War. Volume I, published previously, provided similar information about domestic United States Air Force bases.

These works do not offer definitive accounts of each base; they do offer data of value to those interested in the histories of these stations and provide a ready reference for others seeking immediate, pertinent information about them. The emphasis has been placed upon major primary bases, most of which host major operational units of the active Air Force. A few installations covered in this work are exceptions to this rule. They have been included because they have significant missions in support of defense alliances, such as the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO),

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and possess impressive histories of their own. Installations in this category include Lindsey and San Vito dei Normanni Air Stations and RAF Chicksands. Camp New Amsterdam, on the other hand, hosts a combat unit of the USAF, but is itself an off-base installation of Hahn AB, a primary installation. Andersen, although an Air Force base, is located in an unincorporated territory outside the United States, and therefore is included in this volume. Many great bases of the past, bases discontinued or disposed of before 1982, provided important support for the worldwide mission of the Air Force. It is hoped that some of these may be included in future works on Air Force bases.

A number of people played important roles in the preparation of this volume. At the Air Force Historical Research Agency, Mr. Lloyd H. Cornett, Jr., then Director, provided overall direction, while Mr. R. Cargill Hall, then Chief of the Research Division, guided the research effort, provided counsel on details, and edited the final manuscript. Air Force Reserve individual mobilization augmentee Captain William T. Branum assisted in the identification of many unit commanders and indexed thousands of USAF Installation Characteristics Reports. In the Research Division, Mr. Robert Mueller, author of volume I of this series, completed important parts of the basic research for a number of the bases included in this volume. Mr. Gerald E. Hasselwander and Mr. Charles A. Ravenstein offered helpful advice concerning base operations and unit assignments, while Captain Barry J. Anderson and Master Sergeant Martin E. James provided information concerning specific bases in Europe. Ms. Pauline Tubbs, editorial assistant, typed the first part of this manuscript, while Mrs. Jacqueline Blamires, editorial assistant, rendered outstanding service in typing, editing, and proofreading the major part of this work. I also owe a debt of thanks to Mrs. Helen J. Weaver, historical research assistant, and, especially, to Mr. Jack C. Pettee, who assisted in the research and verification of units from over 30,000 Unit Data Cards and compiled lists of organizations assigned at the various bases and stations. Mr. Julius A. Augustus did yeoman service in completing the work begun by Mr. Pettee.

Special thanks are also owed Mr. W. Gurvis Lawson of the Cartographic Information Division, Air University Library, who quickly and accurately resolved problems connected with the precise location of installations and the state or territory of jurisdiction. Dr. Charles H. Hildreth, former Command Historian, United States Air Forces in Europe, and Dr. Robert J. Parks, Command Historian, Pacific Air Forces, generously provided brief narratives and additional information regarding bases assigned to their respective commands. Mr. John T. Bohn, Command Historian, Strategic Air Command; Mr. Robert M. Kipp, Command Historian, Air Force Space Command; Mr. Robert J. Smith, Command Historian, Tactical Air Command; Mr. Robert T. Cossaboom, Command Historian, United

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States Air Forces in Europe; and Dr. James K. Matthews, Command Historian, Military Airlift Command, all rendered invaluable assistance to the project by disseminating drafts of individual base sections to the appropriate historians for their critical review, additions, and corrections. I am also indebted to the historians at the various overseas installations who diligently read the draft manuscript and constructively added their comments and suggestions thereby making this a more precise and useful work. Mr. Larry R. Benson, Palace Team Chief, Historian Civilian Career Program, offered the author several helpful suggestions about European bases; his study, *USAF Aircraft Basing in Europe, North Africa, and the Middle East, 1945–1980*, published by the United States Air Forces in Europe (USAFE) in 1981, was particularly beneficial in the preparation of this volume, especially with regard to the operational capability of the respective USAFE bases. Mrs. Barbara J. Spears and other members of the Air Force Reference Branch, National Personnel Records Center at St. Louis, Missouri, assisted Mr. Mueller in identifying base commanders and in securing orders not available in the holdings of the Air Force Historical Research Agency. 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The Author

HARRY R. FLETCHER, before his retirement in 1990, was a historian in the Research Division, Air Force Historical Research Agency, Maxwell AFB, Alabama. Born in Platteville, Wisconsin, he served in the armed forces during World War II and the Korean conflict. After receiving a bachelor's degree in history at Wisconsin State University, Platteville, in 1955, he completed work for the MA in modern European history at the University of Wisconsin in 1961 and pursued further graduate work in British and European history at Louisiana State University and the University of Wisconsin. In 1963 Mr. Fletcher joined the Studies Branch of the USAF Historical Division, Aerospace Studies Institute, where he served until 1969 as Editor, German Air Force Historical Monograph Project. From October 1969 to October 1974 he was Assistant Professor of European history, Chairman of the Department of History and Social Sciences, and, for a time, Chairman of the Department of Criminal Justice, Troy State University in Montgomery, Alabama. He rejoined the Research Division of the Air Force Historical Research Agency in 1974. Mr. Fletcher edited six monographs of the German series, all published by Arno Press, New York. He is the author of several articles on German Air Force history and the disposition of captured German and related records held by the United States Air Force.

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Introduction

United States Air Force installations date only from the creation of the United States Air Force in September of 1947. Many present-day bases, stations, and airports, however, trace their origin to Army Airfields of World War II, and thence back to the Army Air Corps and Air Service. Few of the current overseas bases that appear in this work were activated prior to 1950, although some originated as British, German, or Japanese camps or flying fields during or prior to World War II. Clark Air Base in the Philippines and Howard Air Base in Panama are two exceptions having military aviation connections dating from the days of the Air Service and Army Air Corps.

Following World War II, the Army Air Forces possessed a massive complement of permanent, temporary, standby, leased, and confiscated air bases, stations, and airfields throughout the United States and beyond, bases scattered from the Caribbean to the Far East and Arctic, and from the Mediterranean basin through central Europe. Many of these were discontinued or inactivated in 1946–1947 in the postwar U.S. military demobilization. By 1948 the new United States Air Force still retained an impressive number of overseas bases, but many of them, such as Andersen, Tempelhof, Rhein-Main, Lajes, and Wheelus had become bases primarily for the support of air transport operations and for the logistical activity of U.S. occupation forces in Europe and Japan.

In 1948 some of the existing fields were suitable for expansion and renovation to meet the increasing global requirements of an Air Force primarily oriented for strategic warfare. Others, however, proved poorly situated, delimited by encroaching population, or otherwise unsuitable for further military purposes and were therefore discontinued. By this time the extension of U.S. tactical and strategic air power in the postwar world was clearly limited by the requirements for foreign basing. When the Cold War ensued, the Air Force increasingly needed operational bases in many overseas areas to ensure a rapid U.S. response to military threats from the Soviet Union. Since bases in the desired areas were frequently nonexistent or inadequate, except as standby installations, a number of new bases had to be constructed. The Berlin Airlift of 1948–49, followed soon afterward

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by the Korean conflict, underscored the critical requirement for first-class operational bases in many parts of the world.

In the early 1950s, following the National Security Council's plan for U.S. military expansion, the Air Force planned and constructed installations in the Far East, Spain, French Morocco, and Greenland, while bases in Libya, the Azores, and the central and western Pacific were improved to accommodate the largest U.S. military aircraft. Most of the building tasks were directed by the Corps of Engineers, U.S. Army, although in Korea and elsewhere in the Far East Air Force Engineer Aviation units took a direct hand in building bases. In Spain, the Navy Bureau of Yards and Docks supervised construction performed by local contractors and construction firms. Elsewhere in Europe, the major part of building and renovating was handled by British, German, Dutch, and French engineers and construction companies.

Building installations in the postwar world proved to be far more difficult and expensive a process than was true in World War II, since bases had to be larger and facilities constructed in a far more permanent way for high-performance jet aircraft. Moreover, the service encountered delays in securing leases and contracts and even more problems in basing certain types of aircraft—unsettling political issues that had previously been resolved quickly in the press of a world war. Changes in governments, international lease and rental expirations, and alterations in defense alignments modified USAF basing plans. In September 1961 the Berlin Crisis increased Cold War tensions and provoked new demands for a stronger military presence in Europe, but by June 1963 other international pressures compelled the Air Force to abandon its bases in Morocco. Three years later, French President Charles de Gaulle announced the withdrawal of France from NATO, obliging the United States to withdraw from French airfields on 1 April 1967. Shortly thereafter, Colonel Muammar el-Qaddafi's *coup d'état* in Libya forced the USAF to abandon Wheelus Air Base, prompting a hasty and massive relocation of units and equipment to the European continent.

Changes in technology and strategic doctrine also affected the use and of various overseas bases in the postwar years. With the introduction of long-range turbojet transports, for example, Lajes Air Base in the Azores declined in use and was nearly inactivated in the early 1970s, until the 1973 “Yom Kippur” war and the denial of overflight rights in Europe forcefully reminded American policymakers of the vital strategic value of this Atlantic air base. Other shifts in basing occurred in the United Kingdom, Germany, and the Far East as a result of new acquisitions, contracting of new leases, expiration of old agreements, and the fortunes of war in Southeast Asia. The movement of key organizations, such as Headquarters

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United States Air Forces in Europe, to new locations also entailed considerable base and base support modification.

In the 1960s the Air Force constructed numerous bases in South Vietnam, Thailand, and elsewhere within range of the Southeast Asia combat area. As the conflict took an unfavorable turn and began to wind down, however, many of these bases were quickly discontinued and, with the termination of direct U.S. participation in 1973, USAF basing in the Far East shrank to its present complement of installations. The changing complexion of conventional and nuclear threats in the 1970s produced new demands upon tactical units and their supporting bases. These changes required the building of specially hardened shelters and maintenance facilities, and improved base defenses to thwart guerrilla and terrorist attacks. Volume II of Air Force Bases provides a comprehensive survey of major existing Air Force installations overseas in the post-Vietnam era.

Explanatory Notes

The following notes explain the particular terms, format, and methodology used in presenting information concerning USAF overseas bases appearing in this volume.

Location. Refers to the distance and direction of the base from the nearest city or town, and the base's location in relationship to other well known cities or geographical reference points. At the time this volume was prepared, Germany was divided into the German Democratic Republic in the east and the Federal Republic of Germany in the west. Because the tension between East and West was, in many cases, the reason for the existence of bases in Germany, the locations for facilities in Germany indicate Federal Republic of Germany and West Berlin.

Name. A few overseas bases memorialize prominent individuals, primarily Air Force personalities. Most overseas installations, however, derive their names from those formerly used by the host country, usually the names of nearby cities or towns, or geographical features. Diacritical marks frequently have been ignored in names given to Air Force bases. Consequently, no diacritical marks were used in preparing this volume.

Date of Current Name. Date the installation officially received its present designation.

Previous Names. Only the official names designated by the Air Force, former names used by the U.S. Army, or names used by the host country that originally operated the base appear, together with pertinent dates if known. With the establishment of the Department of the Air Force and the United States Air Force in September 1947, Army Airfields and Army Air Bases became Air Force Bases or Air Force Stations, but overseas installations in the territory of another country became Air Bases or Air Stations.

Date of Establishment. Date on which a base began operations, or when the administrative unit of an establishment was activated or organized by either a military service or a major command.

Date Construction Began. Date actual construction commenced, as opposed to preliminary surveying, soil testing, and transport of construction equipment.

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Date of Beneficial Occupancy. Date of occupancy of an installation before completion, when the air arm occupant began its mission, or the initial base support unit assumed responsibility for the base. The chronological sequence of establishment, construction, and occupancy often varied greatly, with establishment frequently occurring prior to construction. When two dates appeared to be equally valid for any given action, both are cited with appropriate annotations. For example, two primary documents of equal authenticity might exist, one providing the date on which construction was supposed to begin or the date construction personnel arrived at the site, and another reporting the actual beginning of construction. Here, as elsewhere in this volume, primary sources were consulted whenever possible.

Base Operating Units. Identifies organization providing custodial and support functions for the installations. These were generally Army Air Force base units, which became Air Force base units after 1948 and subsequently became air base or combat support groups. They must not be confused with other support and combat units having a tactical or operational mission and assigned at the base, such as a field maintenance squadron or a bombardment wing. These latter units are shown under "Units Assigned." In some instances a combat wing operated the base. The date base operating units were stationed at a base does not always coincide with the activation, inactivation, or disposal dates of the base. During the early history of a base, the operating unit was sometimes a U.S. Army, U.S. Navy, or civilian organization that briefly performed custodial functions on a *pro tem* basis until the first operating unit of the air arm arrived.

Base Commanders. The rank shown for each commander is the highest rank held by that individual while serving as base commander. The first senior base officer, who supervised most of the initial construction, was usually called "project officer," but all such officers (if known) are shown in the list of base commanders. The term "temporary" describes commanders who served briefly until the arrival of the designated commander. In some instances, bases reduced to subbase or off-base installation status were commanded by the base commander of the controlling primary installation. Occasionally base commanders remained on site beyond the date of base inactivation in order to complete final transfer of property or equipment, while at other times they departed prior to the official base closure. Sometimes only an initial could be found for the commander's first name; at other times the identity of the commander could not be established at all. Whenever the name of a commander or his tenure at the base could not be determined, the gap is indicated by "unk" (unknown). Likewise, when only an approximate date could be found, a "c." (circa) is used.

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Major Off-Base and Detached Installations. “Off-base,” “detached,” and “detached/leased” installations important to the mission of the base are cited in chronological order according to their activation date or date of transfer to the base’s accountability. They are further cited in alphabetical order and in numerical order, so that “Airman Housing Annex #1” would precede “Airman Housing Annex #2” on the listing. Off-base installations are accountable and are assigned property of the primary base or installation. A detached or detached/leased installation may belong to another base or agency, but it either furnishes support to or receives support from the primary base. Those ancillary, unmanned support facilities, such as small electronic or radio communications and landing instrumentation sites, and facilities having no direct bearing upon the base’s overall operational capability, have generally been excluded.

The date of assignment or transfer of jurisdiction to another USAF base, to another U.S. Government agency, or to a foreign government are cited when available to complete the dates of actual jurisdiction. Known activation, inactivation, and disposal dates are shown. “Disposed” signifies that a primary installation had been relieved of jurisdiction and property accountability for a given subinstallation. The term “inactive” signifies that property and operational responsibility and jurisdiction continued to remain with the primary installation.

Major Changes in Operational Capability. This section provides a brief summary of the base’s major mission and activities, together with references to major renovations and expansion of existing facilities and construction of new buildings and structures.

Major Commands to Which Assigned. This section sets forth the chronological assignments of each base to a major command or branch of the U.S. Armed Forces. Some of the older bases may show assignments to commands that no longer exist, while a few may trace base assignments from the time the installation served as a foreign air base or military establishment. Changes of assignment signify a transfer of the base to another command, the discontinuance of the command itself with the installation and its components being absorbed by other commands or other parts of the U.S. Armed Forces, or its reversion to the control of a host country.

Major Changes in Status. Legal changes in the status of each base are shown whenever applicable and known. In a few cases, the term “none” is used to indicate that the base has remained active. Temporary or permanent periods of inactivation are listed, as are the dates showing transfers between military services, other agencies, and host countries; renewed activation (reactivation); annexation or transfer to host countries. Any changes from subbase to off-base to primary base status, or vice-versa, as well as from “under construction” to “active,” or from “reduced opera-

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tional” to “caretaker” status are also listed. An installation in caretaker status supports only those personnel and operations required for its physical upkeep, preceding or following a period of active status. A major command or service declares an installation “surplus” to government needs upon approval by the General Services Administration, after which it is designated “excess” and referred to an appropriate agency for disposal. In areas overseas, property is often leased or licensed by a host country and the property reverts back to that country upon expiration of the lease or license.

Other terms used in this section are “inactivation,” “discontinuance,” and “standby.” The first indicates the inactivation or discontinuance of the base administrative unit, or an announcement of such action by the service. The term “standby” means the installation had ceased to be used as an operational site and had been placed on the inactive roll. Even though a caretaker unit might continue to be stationed there, the facility no longer had a mission in support of Air Force activities. In some instances, however, the installation is retained in anticipation of future needs. Other terms used under this heading are already explained under “Major Off-Base and Detached Installations.”

Units Assigned. Assigned combat and support organizations from numbered flights upward appear chronologically by date of activation or assignment to the particular station. The activation/assignment date at a given base is listed first and the date of inactivation or transfer from that installation is listed second. If there is no closing date, a dash indicates that the unit is still active at that base. To determine all of the units on base in any given year, consult those assigned in earlier years. In compliance with military usage, all dates of assignment, activation/inactivation, or transfer appear by day, month, and year. Redesignated names of units appear in parentheses sequentially, beneath the original name. Brackets around words indicate that the words enclosed are a part of the unit’s actual designation.

Numbered units precede named organizations, and are further aligned alphabetically in accordance with the precise designation of the unit as it would appear if spelled out rather than abbreviated. Only one entry is used for each continuous period of a unit’s assignment at any installation. If a unit transferred and later that year returned to the base, however, two entries will appear, one for each period of assignment. Army units that never subsequently became a part of the Air Force, but may have been stationed at bases contained in this volume, have for the most part not been listed. Air National Guard units, except for those periods in which such units were serving on active federal assignments, are also excluded. Units briefly attached at a base while deployed from home bases are not usually shown among the list of units at the base of deployment.

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As in the “Base Operating Units” section, unit prefixes and parenthesized suffixes identifying the specialty of the organization have been excluded. This and other unit information can be found in the lineage and honors of specific units contained in Air Force reference works on combat units, combat squadrons, and combat wings—all prepared by the USAF Historical Research Center and published through the Office of Air Force History. (See Maurer Maurer [ed.], *Air Force Combat Units of World War II* [1961; reprint ed., Office of Air Force History, 1985]; Maurer Maurer [ed.], *Combat Squadrons of the Air Force, World War II* [1969; reprint ed., Office of Air Force History, 1982]; and Charles A. Ravenstein, *Air Force Combat Wings: Lineage and Honors Histories 1947–1977* [Office of Air Force History, 1984].)

It is conceivable that a few, long-defunct organizations have been omitted that could not be located among the records of active, inactive, or disbanded units of the Air Force. Likewise, units assigned to off-base installations have been excluded, except in instances where the primary base itself was for a time an off-base installation.

Explanations of Air Force terms used in the volume may be found in the glossary in the back of this book. The abbreviations used are not always standard Air Force abbreviations, but have been designed for the understanding of the reading public at large.

Andersen Air Force Base

Location: Located 13 mi NE of Agana on NE tip of Guam.

Name: Named for Brig Gen James Roy Andersen (1904–1945). General Andersen graduated from the U.S. Military Academy in 1926, served at various Army installations, and obtained his wings at Kelly Fld, Texas, in 1936. During 1943–1944 he served on the War Department General Staff. In Jan 1945, General Andersen was assigned to HQ AAF, Pacific Ocean Area. He died on 26 Feb 1945 in an aircraft accident near Kwajalein Island, en route to Hawaii.

Name: Named in honor of Maj Harold M. Clark (1890–1919). A native of St. Paul, Minnesota, Maj Clark grew up in the Philippines, was commissioned in the cavalry in 1913, and later transferred to the Aviation Section of the Air Service. He subsequently commanded an aero squadron in Hawaii, setting numerous records as the first military aviator in the islands. Major Clark became executive officer of the Aviation Section of the Signal Corps in Panama, and died when the Curtis HS2LS flying boat he was piloting crashed into the gates of the Miraflores Locks in the Panama Canal on 2 May 1919.

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Major Changes in Operational Capability: U.S. 7th Inf Div captured Kadena Afd on 1 Apr 1945, and artillery spotting aircraft began to use the field when the runway became serviceable on 6 Apr 1945; Army Air Forces engineers constructed new fuel tank farms, a new 6,500-ft bituminous runway, and a 7,500-ft runway for bomber aircraft by Aug 1945; Japanese forces in the Kadena area surrendered at the field to Lt Gen James H. Doolittle on 7 Sep 1945; field closed for resurfacing of runways, Sep–Oct 1945; in Oct 1945 the base suffered severe hurricane damage with some amphibious aircraft lying offshore destroyed; 100 hardstands completed for B–29 operations, late 1945; base improvements allowed for the support of tactical air units between 1945 and 1949 and instrument flying programs in 1950; base roads, quarters, runways, and base operations facilities renovated and enlarged, and the main runway lengthened to 12,000 ft, 1951–1953; Kadena became a fighter base in Nov 1954 with assignment of the 18th Ftr-Bmbr Wg; four hardened eight-bay Mace missile launch sites installed, 1961–1968; engineers completed first increment of a 500-unit family housing project in Aug 1964; base dedicated its largest housing project to date, Seville Manor, in Sep 1965; 14 major construction projects, including hangar installations, dining halls, ammunition maintenance facilities, and an extensive arresting barrier system completed by mid-1967; base hosted a SAC refueling wing and several large tenant units from other MAJCOMs during late 1960s; U.S.-Japanese Reversion Agreement of 15 May 1972 returned the Ryukyus Islands to Japan and transferred several Kadena off-base installations to Japanese jurisdiction; responsibility for air defense of the Okinawa Air Defense Sector transferred to the Japanese Air Self-Defense Force on 1 Jul 1973; the USAF undertook a vast construction program of operational facilities under the Japanese Facilities Adjustment Program, including a taxiway, ground equipment building, and two hangars for the USN between 1973–1975; the Japanese Facilities Adjustment program also reduced U.S. presence on Okinawa, beginning 27 Jul 1973; other U.S.-Japanese agreements permitted Okinawans to farm unused portions of Kadena AB and some parts of its off-base installations beginning in Jul 1973; several operational facilities were shared with or transferred to the USN and USMC in 1975; the POL pipe line project from Chimuwan Bay completed in the fall of 1976; a 200-unit family housing facility for U.S. Navy families, several BOQs, EM quarters, and the expanded medical facility also accepted in 1976; functions performed by the U.S. Army, including the milk plant, laundry plant, all family housing on the island, the telephone exchanges, and consolidated servicing for civilian personnel transferred to the base during 1977; Okuma Recreation Center transferred from the Army in 1978; a number of older structures, including school buildings and warehouses returned to Japanese control 1979–1980; F–15 engine test stand and maintenance

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facilities for supporting F-15 operations completed 1980; the base converted from F-4D to F-15 aircraft and added an Airborne Warning and Control System (AWACS) squadron of E-3As during 1980; new facilities, including a commissary and primary school, 50 aircraft weather shelters, a large number of family housing units, and the first of many programmed hardened aircraft shelters completed 1981-1982.

Major Changes in Operational Capability: In 1870 the Japanese Emperor established a stud farm for the household cavalry in the area that later became Misawa AB, and kept his own (Tenno Heika) cavalry there until 1931, when the Sino-Japanese conflict required their use in China; Misawa remained a training center for Japanese Cavalry until the Japanese Army constructed the first runway at Misawa for military aircraft in 1938; the Imperial Japanese Navy began construction of a base for long-range bombers in 1939; by early 1941 the Gensan Flying Corps trained at Misawa, and the 22d Imperial Naval Air Wg assumed control of the base on 10 Feb 1942; the Misawa area was heavily damaged (base 90 percent destroyed) in the latter part of World War II, and Misawa had to be almost completely reconstructed by occupying U.S. forces; the USA commenced work in Feb 1945; E-W concrete runway added 1948; operational use of the base began on 31 Mar 1948; a number of fighter, fighter-interceptor, fighter-bomber, reconnaissance and support units operated from Misawa AB between 1950 and 1971; parallel taxiways finished, 1954; the first Japanese Air Self-Defense Force (JASDF) unit arrived at Misawa in Oct 1954, and the Japanese Northern Air Defense Force began operations from Misawa in 1957; as early as 1953 units of the USAF Security Service (USAFSS) were stationed at Misawa; 1,500-ft extension added to E-W runway in 1958; the USN controlled all U.S. flight line facilities, and the JASDF controlled its own flight lines and the airspace over Misawa after 1 Oct 1978; base hosted various Allied exercises in the region and provided support for 13 AF Associate units, 14 Department of Defense agencies, and the JASDF units stationed in the Misawa area between 1 Oct 1978 and Sep 1982.

AIR FORCE BASES OVERSEAS

Major Changes in Operational Capability: In 1909 Count von Zeppelin used area as landing site for his dirigible *Z-II*; planned by Germany to be one of the most important European air terminals, base opened as German commercial field in 1936; northern part of base used as field for airplanes, with extreme southern part near Zeppelinheim serving as a base for rigid airships; that section of Rhein-Main later became port for the *Graf Zeppelin*, its sister ship *LZ-130*, and, until 6 May 1937, for the ill-fated *Hindenburg*; the airships were dismantled and their huge hangars demolished on 6 May 1940 in conversion of base to military use; Luftwaffe engineers subsequently extended the single runway and erected hangars and other facilities for German military aircraft; during World War II the Luftwaffe used field sporadically as fighter base and as experimental station for jet aircraft; U.S. 826th Engr Avn Bn arrived at Rhein-Main in Apr 1945 to begin task of clearing rubble and reconstructing major buildings; Army engineers also built new runways and extended and widened the existing runway, constructed aprons and hardstands as well as taxiways leading to the terminal; new Rhein-Main terminal completed in 1946; air traffic into Rhein-Main increased after the closure of the military passenger terminal at Orly Field, Paris, October 1946; hosted Eastern Air Transport Service in Jan 1947; although envisioned as a bomber base by the Ninth AF, base became a principal European air transport terminal 1947-1959; Rhein-Main was the main western base for the round-the-clock Berlin Airlift operations from Jun 1948 to Sep 1949; USAFE turned over the northern part of the base to the German government for use as *Flughafen* Frankfurt am Main, the chief commercial airport for the greater Frankfurt area, in Apr 1959; rest of the base remained in hands of USAFE as principal aerial port for U.S. Forces in Germany; base assigned to MAC on 1 Jul 1975; under terms of an agreement with the Federal Republic of Germany, only transport aircraft have been stationed at Rhein-Main since 1 May 1975.

Major Changes in Operational Capability: After constructing a 3,800-ft clay and gravel runway and a few buildings in 1937, the Japanese Army Air Forces continued to operate Taegu airfield as a fighter base until 1945; liberated by U.S. troops in 1945, base was turned over to the new Republic of Korea Air Force (ROKAF) in 1948; the Communist invasion of South Korea in Jun 1950 prompted a rapid buildup of U.S. forces in the Far East; new construction, which began at Taegu with the arrival of the 822d Engr Avn Bn, included hardstands, hangars, water lines, electrical layouts, barracks, and maintenance facilities, and a 5,000-ft pierced-steel-plank (PSP) runway adjacent to the old Japanese airstrip, which became operational on 7 Aug 1950; F-86 units began to operate from Taegu Feb 1951; the PSP runway, pounded by 10,000 weekly landings and takeoffs, became inoperable on 20 May 1951, requiring major airfield construction work; HQ Fifth AF closed at Taegu and opened at Seoul on 14 Jun 1951; a 9,000-ft reinforced concrete runway completed on 28 Jun 1952; Taegu hosted both ROKAF and USAF fighter and fighter-bomber units, chiefly F-84 and F-86 units, until the close of the Korean conflict; USAF and ROKAF officials signed an agreement for the joint use of Taegu AB on 2 Jan 1956, the ROKAF assumed sole control of the base on 19 Apr 1956; a USAF advisory staff and a communications detachment remained until 8 Jul 1965 when the U.S. began a gradual buildup of forces in the Far East; RED HORSE reconstruction work intensified following the *USS Pueblo* crisis of 23 Jan 1968; units transferred to Taegu included the 558th Tac Ftr Sq and air rescue and aerial port detachments, 3 Feb-22 Jul 1968; throughout 1968-1969 Taegu hosted rotating tactical fighters of the 475th Tac Ftr Wg from Misawa AB, Japan; Taegu again strengthened with additional U.S. air units in 1978 and has since been an active USAF base (organized as an off-base installation of Osan AB), owned by the ROKAF.

Major Changes in Operational Capability: A Royal Prussian parade ground under Frederick William I in 1721, Tempelhof remained a parade ground until 1918; from 1895-1918 field served also as a demonstration area for balloons, airships, and aircraft, including flights in 1908 by Orville Wright and his Wright Flyer; Germans used the field for commercial aviation in 1922; Ernst Sagebiel designed Tempelhof's futuristic base facilities and terminal 1934-1936; converted into a major European and international airport, the installation officially opened in 1936, with peak passenger traffic attained in 1938-1939; Germany did not use Tempelhof as a military airfield during World War II, except for occasional emergency landings by fighter aircraft; Americans assumed control of the airport and began restoration 2 Jul 1945; Tempelhof hosted passengers arriving and departing the Potsdam Conference, and served as Berlin center for the European Air Transport Service (EATS) Sep 1945 to Mar 1948; postwar airport also supported the mission of the Office of the High Commissioner of Germany (HICOG), and air-sea rescue operations center when USAFE assumed the direct responsibilities of EATS on 20 Dec 1947; Soviet troops closed off all surface routes into West Berlin on 20 Jun 1948, compelling the Western Allies to establish the greatest military airlift in history, flying millions of tons of fuel, clothing, and food into Tempelhof for the beleaguered West Berliners; engineers constructed a new 6,000-ft runway between Jul and Sep 1948 and another between Sep and Oct 1948 to accommodate the expanding requirements of the airlift; the last airlift transport touched down at Tempelhof on 30 Sep 1949; civil aviation agreement allowed the major airlines to use the airport 22 May 1950; U.S. authorities turned over the northeast corner of the airport to the City of Berlin for recreational purposes 1950; Tempelhof remained the main USAFE terminal for West Berlin from 20 Dec 1947 to 1 Sep 1975, when all civil air traffic was transferred to Tegel Airport in the French Sector of West Berlin; since that time Tempelhof's operations have been confined to U.S. military airlift traffic.

Major Changes in Operational Capability: During World War II Yokota became the center of Japanese Army Air Forces flight test activities and the site of the first meeting between Japanese and Italian wartime allies; a detachment of the American 1st Cavalry Div arrived at the base on 4 Sep 1945; base supported C-46 airlift operations from Sep to Dec 1945, when the old runway deteriorated under heavy usage; the runway was repaired and Yokota supported operations of the 3d Bomb Gp by Aug 1946; since that time base has provided support for fighter, bomber, and

military airlift operations, hosting B-26, B-29, P-51, KB-50, F-84, B-57, RB-57, RB-29, C-54, F-86D, F-102, F-4D, F-100, F-105, C-5, C-141, and C-130 units; the first C-141 Starlifter touched down at Yokota to begin extensive SEA cargo and medical evacuation operations in 1965; the 347th Tac Ftr Wg became principal operating unit 1970-71, when USAF operations at Yokota diminished in keeping with the U.S. Forces Japan and Japanese government joint agreement; became primarily a support base for MAC passenger and cargo operations on 1 Jul 1972; Yokota remains one of the largest airlift support bases in the Northwest Pacific.

Major Changes in Operational Capability: The construction work for enlargement and improvement of the existing Spanish Air Force Base near Zaragoza began in Sep 1954 under supervision of U.S. Navy engineers; installation initially designed for temporary or intermediate use as a war standby base; first U.S. construction project included strengthening the existing 9,921-ft runway and adding 1,000-ft overruns at each end; work on a new concrete runway, 200 ft by 12,200 ft, with 1,000-ft overruns at each end began in 1956 and was completed in 1958; base transferred from the

control of the Joint U.S. Military Group (JUSMG), Sixteenth AF, to SAC on 1 Jul 1957; base then furnished operational support for SAC alert force dispersal; with the arrival of the 531st Ftr-Intcpr Sq from Wheelus AB on 5 Sep 1958, Zaragoza hosted not only SAC bomber forces but also fighter-interceptor units; this support continued until 1 Jul 1964, when Zaragoza AB was placed on standby status; reduced to modified caretaker status on 1 Jan 1966 and reassigned to USAFE on 15 Apr 1966; with the closure of Wheelus AB in Libya, Zaragoza returned to active status on 19 Feb 1970; the first aircraft arrived on 9 Mar 1970; base subsequently supported F-102, F-4, and KC-135 operations; Project CREEK STEP, which began in Feb 1970, called for the buildup of Zaragoza AB as a USAFE weapons training site; actual use of the Bardenas Reales Air-to-Ground Bombing and Runnery Range (c. 45 mi NW of the base) began in Mar 1970; base supported DART TOW air-to-air gunnery missions to train detachments of USAFE and Spanish Air Force units, beginning on 1 Apr 1971.

Note on Sources

Most of the data appearing in this volume came from the narrative histories prepared by unit historians at the squadron, group, wing, division, and command level. These records, deposited in the Air Force Historical Research Agency at Maxwell AFB, Alabama, contained not only the story of the base operating units and their particular missions, but also useful appendices and supporting documents. Among the supporting documents are to be found general and special orders, station lists, personnel rosters, morning reports, movement orders, operations orders, letters, newspaper accounts, and photographs. Many histories also included maps, schematics, and sketches of the bases concerned, which often revealed new or recent construction projects.

Information concerning the establishment, activation, transfer, discontinuance, and disposal of installations was gleaned for the most part from the file of 17,000 Engineer Installation Characteristics Reports (AF Form 1192). Data from earlier periods was often found in the index card file known as "Historical Data—Post, Camp, Station or Airfield File," which included data from 11,000 active and inactive bases and provided useful information about the status of the installations. These materials, all held by the Real Property Division of the USAF Director of Engineering and Services, Bolling AFB, DC, were made available to the Air Force Historical Research Agency.

General and special orders issued by the War Department and the air arms of the War Department, and, later, by the United States Air Force and its major commands, provided key information about basing, base housing, off-base and detached installations, location of installations, activation, inactivation, transfer of installations, and names and dates of base commanders. Generally speaking, these orders are on file in the holdings of the Air Force Historical Research Agency. Some orders, however, were found in the collections of the Air Force Reference Branch of the National Personnel Records Center in St. Louis, Missouri, or in the Military Archives Division of the National Archives and Records Administration in Washington, DC.

Army and Air Force station lists and Air Force organizational directories located in the Air Force Historical Research Agency provided excellent background material for base operating units, units assigned, and base commanders. Information was then verified through general or special orders or other official records. Likewise, the Air Force Directory of Key Personnel proved useful in pinpointing the names of commanders of major base operating units, although these did not provide specific dates of assignment. In terms of units assigned and other definitive data on operating units and units assigned, the most valuable source was the collection of organizational record cards on file in the Research Division of the Air Force Historical Research Agency, a working collection constantly updated to reflect the current disposition of Air Force units worldwide. More than 30,000 cards of active, inactive, and disbanded units resolved hundreds of questions concerning locations, activation, inactivation, and assignments.

Finally, while reviewing the manuscript—or on request—many base and unit historians furnished valuable information not found elsewhere. These data contributed materially, making this a more accurate and useful reference work.
