



Weekly recitations in Bible and Composition. Spelling, Reading and Writing, through the whole course. Arithmetic and English Grammar reviewed in the higher classes. Lectures and Experiments illustrating the Natural Sciences. Our Chemical and Philosophical apparatus is extensive and well selected.

Candidates for the Higher Classes must be prepared for examination on the previous course.

Diplomas will be given to those young ladies who stand an approved examination upon the regular English Course, and either Latin or French. Both Latin and French, however, may be studied, if desirable. Parents can select what Ancient or Modern Language, or Languages, they wish their daughters to study.

General Remarks.

The location of the Institution, in the quiet, retired village of Louisburg, noted for the intelligence, social refinement, and morality of its citizens, and entirely free from any local cause of disease, renders it a very desirable place for the education of young ladies.

The College Building, situated in the northern part of the village, on an elevated site, in a large and beautiful grove, imposing in appearance, well arranged for school purposes, and thoroughly ventilated, combines the advantages of taste, comfort, health and convenience.

The arrangement and management of the Domestic Department, the extensive and judicious course of study adopted, the thorough system of instruction pursued, the regulations pertaining to the government of the pupils, and the principles inculcated, are designed to secure physical health and vigor, judicious mental training, true refinement, and a high state of moral development. Our object is, not to establish a large school, but to afford superior advantages to a limited number.

The Faculty earnestly recommend to parents having daughters preparing for College, to have them well trained in Spelling, Reading, Writing, Geography, Grammar and Arithmetic. Applicants for admission, even into the advanced classes, are often found almost totally deficient in these essential studies.

Parents are sometimes disappointed in the classification of their daughters. This is not our fault. Our duty to the Instituiton, to our patrons, and to the pupils committed to our charge, forbids us to place a pupil in a class for which she is not prepared by previous training.

In the department of Music, a systematic and extensive course of instruction has been adopted, which will secure a high degree of excellence in the theory of the science, and also that ease and proficiency in performance, which is so desirable, and to which so few attain.

The religious advantages here enjoyed, are all that can be reasonably desired. The regular exercises of the school are opened and closed daily, with appropriate religious services. The young ladies are required to attend church, once at least, on the Sabbath; and when the weather is inclement, religious services are conducted in the College Chapel.

The young ladies are not permitted to spend a night out of the College; and visits in the day, will be regulated by the wishes of their parents, and the discretion of the Faculty.

To prevent unnecessary expense, and too much devotion to dress, a uniform has been adopted, to be worn only in public. Mazarine blue merino, for winter; for summer, plain white jaconet.

The young ladies are not allowed to make accounts at the stores, or elsewhere, unless by special direction of their parents.

We discourage extravagance. Pupils ought not to purchase fine jewelry, costly books, useless articles, or expensive presents. An important part of a young lady's education, is to learn how to use money judiciously.
