

- Suicidal Tendencies <u>Join The Army</u> 12": Occasionally I hear a bit of their old style of music, but, as I'm sure you know, it's mostly on the metal side. At first I was prejudice against this record because I've never really been a big metal fan, but as I listened to it, I found there was more to it than that.

- Beefeater House Burning Down 12": Following an unexpected introduction by Ian MacKaye comes the hard hitting Beefeater. If you've heard them before, you'd know that they have quite an original sound, and this record is no exeption at all. Listening to this is a nice break from the generic hardcore I tend to listen to.

- Dead Milkmen <u>Bucky Fellini</u> 12": They have not changed in the least bit!

 Their nonsense lyrics and strange music are there, same as always!

 In other words, this is another ruling DM record. But what I really like about this one is the excellent art on the cover. You suck if this isn't in your house. Enigma Records Canada:

- Rhythm Pigs Choke On This 12": Really powerful performance by the Pigs on this record as they display an obvious wide range of influences from hardcore all the way over to jazz. The music in each song seems to be constantly altering; no one melody lasts more than a minute before changing. This is worth having no matter what your musical tastes. Mordam Records/ P.O. - Articles Of Faith In This Life 12": The band is full of energy all throughout these songs. The lyrics aren't about any definite topics, just basically personal matters. - 7 Seconds Praise 12": Some songs are much like and even more mellow than U2, while others seem to be more like their last album, New Wind. The lyrics are drifting away from the personal subjects of their older material to more political and worldly matters. Even Amnesty International has some influence in their lyric writing these days! - Descendents All 12": This is probably their final release because they are about to split up (unless they already have). But that's no reason to buy it, right? This thing is full of the same basic sound and goofyness as on En.joy!. Now that is a reason to buy it. - The Ex Too Many Cowboys Double-12": I don't have anything else by this band so I can't compare it to their older material. This is really strange stuff. It's just completely different from anything I've ever heard before. It can't be catagorized, it's in a genre of its own. The lyrics touch on many different topics, including animal rights, politics and war. This well-packaged album comes with a lyric-sheet/poster and a huge newspaper which further expresses the band's ideas. If you feel like being freaked out by some unbelievable originality, go out and get this. Mordam Records.
- Life Sentence 12": Chances are you already have this because it's been selling amazingly. But I'll review it anyway. It rules!!! If you don't have it, get it, at all costs! It's the most powerful and energetic record I've ever heard. Pretty fast at most times, but always retaining a strong melody. Some say it's like 7 Seconds, but I say it's like nothing else. - Victims Family Voltage & Violets 12": Again, a lot of various influences are apparent in this record, much like with the Rhythm Pigs. Throughout these songs are very strong melodies giving this entire record originality found nowhere else in the land of hardcore. And a Lot of songs on this great album. Mordam Records.
- **EEVICLES**
 - Viva Umkhonto! Compilation 12": 13 great bands including Scream, Social Unrest, B.G.K., Rhythm Pigs, and 76% Uncertain each donate a song to this benefit compilation for Umkhonto We Sizwe in South Africa to help oppose apartheid. Altogether, this album rips. The songs chosen from each of the bands are probably their best ever, creating a record worth listening to over and over! Included in the album is a small newsletter containing information all about the U.S. and Corporate involvement in South African apartheid, a chronology of repression and resistance, international sanctions and movements, the African National Congress, and how you can help support the struggle during your daily life (e.g. boycott certain companies). Amazed? Well that's not all you get. You'll also receive a booklet giving a complete history of the apartheid situation, a description of the anti-apartheid actions in Holland, and the lyrics to the songs of the record. In other words, there's enough in this package to keep you listening and reading for quite a while! Mordam Records.
 - Youth Of Today Break Down The Walls 12" : Put it this way: if you like their Can't Close My Eyes 7", you'll worship this. It's just basically the same kind of stuff as on the 7", only way improved. What I'm trying to say is that it's still the same old Y.O.T., (no radical change or anything) only they've gone straight (ha ha) up hill. I guess that's the best way to describe it. Positive Force.
 - Sons Of Ishmael Hayseed Hardcore 7" : Okay, it's not a new record, but it just recently got a new pressing. Now to the review. It's fast. Very fast (compared to many things, excluding L'A'RM and Hersey). And it rules. Okay, I'm sorry, I shouldn't get too opinionated here. I'll just describe it. The music: some say it gets too monotonous, but if you want my opinion (which I'm sure you don't, but tough) it's fine the way it is: fast with catchy melodies. The lyrics: small towns (with residents who are all stupid, every last one of 'em), social and political structures, child abuse, drunk deadbeats and lots of other subjects. The price: \$3 ppd. - More Stupid Initials 7": It didn't take this band long to get out a record; they formed in October '86 and this 7" was released early in the summer of '87. Not bad, eh? Just shows how much popularity they've gained. And there's a good reason for that, they're a great band producing great songs, and this record is no exception. This Toronto positive band churn out songs about straight edge, unity, wizards and other stuff. The music really isn't like anything else, basically an original sound. - A.D.S. Man Made Another Destructive System Tape: I guess the best way to describe these guys would be to say they are the American version of Conflict, both musically and lyrically. Their lyrics tend to deal with such matters as animal rights, politics, war and apartheid in a very serious manner. - I'll See You In The Pit! Compilation Tape: A really great 90 minute cassette with 20 bands including Half Off, Sons Of Ishmael, Life Sentence and Face First. All together there are 53 songs plus lots of other odd things, including introductions to each band. This well packaged tape also comes with a booklet. All this stuff is yours for just \$4 ppd from WFOH records (see Sons Of Ish review).

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SMS OF TSHMAEL

Sons Of Ish, formally known as A.T.B. who released "Coathanger Abortions" tape, are an <u>all-boy</u> band from the Toronto and Meaford area. They gained their fame through their (twice-pressed) 7" e.p. "Hayseed Hardcore", and in Ohio through their tour with M.S.I. in the Ohio area. They also appear on many compilations, including the "Apathy - Never!" 12" compilation from Over The Top Records. This interview was done with all the members both by mail and tape.

Their line-up has gone through many changes since the beginning, but

now rests as: Tim Freeborn - vocals

Chris Black - drums Mike Canzi - bass

Paul Morris - guitar/vocals

Guy "Ditch Dog" Poirier (Glenn) - guitar

NPWF: What is the meaning behind the band's name?
Tim: Ishmael refers to the biblical character who was outcast by his stepmother because of her greed for his inheritance. We relate to Ishmael's outcast status because when we first formed the band, we were pretty well outcasts (hardcore wasn't exactly fashionable in Meaford).

NPWF: When was the band formed and could you give a brief history?
Tim: We formed in the spring of '84 as Angry Thalidomide Babies, released a demo ("Coathanger Abortion") and didn't do much 'til spring of '85; we changed our name to Sons Of Ishmael, began playing out of town and released an e.p. called "Hayseed Hardcore". Between the summer of '85 and '86 we didn't get much done 'cause people kept joining/quiting. 1987 has started off really well though, we've been playing lots and have lots to do.

NPWF: What are the band members' interests, concerns and beliefs?

Tim: Right now the band is taking up lots of my time as is school (grade 13). I don't do much outside of these two activities at the moment, though I like reading and watching a bit of T.V. My main concern, one whose outcome I'm in control of, is getting through school O.K. I'm not a great believer in getting high marks, unfortunately if I want to go to university, I have to worry about that kind of thing. I really don't like the competition aspect of school and the fact that marks are the only indication of a person's intelligence. fact is, what they do show is how well you co-operate with their system and how well your memorization skills are. That's been my experience, anyway.

Chris: I'm really into music a lot but I also like to work on my fallic extension automobile and catch the occasional episode of Star Trek - real television. I'm sorry - and I'll probably piss off a lot of people, but I do have religious beliefs. They don't neccessarily follow any particular doctrine, but I have images in my mind about what I think of God. They're personal beliefs for my own use - not for anyone else. Perhaps I've been influenced by my education and family upbringing (RC), but I still decide on what God means to me. I don't mean that I think that's what you're doing. I think it's real easy to jump on the bandwagon and say all religion is bad, because it's what everyone else is doing. For me it's a personal thing - not available for people to exploit one way or another. Enough.

Mike: My interests include music, politics/news/history, girls, pizza and girls.

Paul: My main interests are girls and music. There are so many concerns and beliefs of us that we could go on for pages and pages.

Glenn: Basically, my interests are music (I'm a record and tape freak), reading (Stephen King is amazing) and my guitar. As for concerns, too valuable orchards are being bulldozed and too much farmland is being paved over for useless, poorly-built and over priced housing developments. rent in Toronto is ridiculously high and the present vacancy rate of under 1% is a complete joke. Too many apartments are being illegally used as corporate hotel suites.

NPWF: What do you think of the straight edge idea?

Tim: I think it's O.K., it's good to see people taking a stand against the peer pressure drinking/drug thing. It starts to become annoying when people it's the only thing they can cling to and make sure everyone around them knows about it too...the hordes of drunken mutants I encounter make me like it more and more however.

Chris: Straight edge is a great idea for those who want it. If you feel good

about yourself and are happy with your decision, then great.

Mike: What is straight edge? Ask four people and get four different answers...

Paul: I'm straight but I try not to make a big deal out of it. I feel drugs and alcohol are unnecessary but people enjoy them and that's ok. It's when things get out of control then it becomes bad. Isn't it fun to watch young teens drink a whole lot then throw up!!!

Glenn: Straight edge is fine, as long as they don't preach or try to "convert" others; what you do is your own business.

NPWF: What are your opinions on the punk-metal crossover? Tim: Paul makes a very good point when he says that it's neither good nor bad because it's just the fusion of another type of music with punk. HOWEVER the creepy metal attitude seems to have appeared as well, and I can't think of anything that's farther away from what "punk" was supposed to be about. It's all very predictable and redundant, and it's too bad we're hearing much of it.

Chris: Musically they will be compared to each other but intellectually they are about as far apart as Oral Roberts is to mmmmm lets see, ummmm... Satan! I think crossover bands are fine - musically good but intelligent lyrics are a must.

Mike: If punk is a reaction to the pompous and pretentious excesses of 1970's rock, then six-minute metal "epics" (with obligatory five-minute guitar solo) are an incongruity.

Paul: Musically, metal is just another form of music to cross with hardcore. Glenn: Punk rock is becoming a legitimate business. This doesn't bother me, because I feel that a lot of hard working bands have the opportunity to be rewarded for their efforts.

NPWF: What are your political views? music for mutants Tim: I always have trouble explaining this...more than anything I want world where people can live without borders, in peace and equality, where they don't have to work themselves to death and where they can live outside of the claws of capitalism; I suppose you could say there are elements anarchist philosophy in there. Unfortunately we're past that point, and most I can hope for today is a government that takes better care of its people and leaves its money hungry desires behind them. Chris: Undecided.

Mike: No Peace Without Freedom - indeed! Freedom from the scourge that capitalism. As long as capitalism (an economic system based on aggressive competition and exploitation) reigns there will be endless war and grinding

Paul: Once again we could go on and on for this one. Briefly I will say that I despise capitalism, war, greed, racism etc. You may say "that's but these are things every human should be concerned with. I also believe that no large governments have any genuine concern for the people they govern.

Glenn: Politics; what can I say? There's too much red tape involved with the management of a nation. I think borders are a crime against humanity; why can't I freely travel anywhere on our planet?

NPWF: How do you feel about religion? Tim: Religion can be difficult to grasp because it's based on faith. I'm not one to spout off against religion itself, however I think T.V. evagelists are doing more to drive people away from religion than they are "saving" them. It's a personal choice though it's too bad so many people have died because of it. To the "punks" who say "fuck religion . . . let's slam", what are you talking about? You've got your own religion that's the same as the Christians' you put down. They've got God, you've got Wattie, they've robes, you've got your leather, they've got wine, you've got glue...what's the difference? That may be a bad sort of stereotype, but it's pretty true. Mike: Religion encourages fatalism. Fatalism fuels the fires of oppression. Paul: I don't believe in God. Religion can be distorted and perverted to justify actions on behalf of God. It does have some good qualities: it helps people live their lives happily when they have nothing else. motivates people (such as the Salvation Army) to help fellow men and women. Glenn: Religion is like one of those choke-collars you put on a dog; as long as you're good, there's no problem,, but if you upset whoever is playing the master, they'll strangle you.

NPWF: What do you think of vegetarianism and animal rights?

Tim: Aside from the unfair aspect of killing animals for our consumption, vegetarianism is lots healthier for a person. I've eaten next to no meat in the past couple of months and I've had no craving for meat, so why bother with it? As for animal rights, it's something I'm aware of to an extent, and I'm glad there are organizations like the A.L.F., but it's beyond me how people in general can respect the rights of animals when there are so many injustices to human beings on the planet. Before animal rights issues are tackled (on a large scale), people must learn to respect each other.

Chris: I'm not a vegetarian - yet, but vivisectionists really bother me. If anyone ever touched my cat... Animals must be liberated unless it's really necessary. I think science has become too used to using animals and they are finding it difficult to use other means of experimentation.

Mike: I'm not saying there aren't abuses...luxery items for humans (mascara, etc.) should not be tested on animals, for example...but one cannot deny the advances we've made due to experimentation on animals.

Paul: I'm not a vegetarian although it would be nice. I wrote a song called Ducks Unlimited? which basically says "If they're free...leave 'em be".

Glenn: Vegetarianism: do whatever you want, it's your life. Animal rights is something I believe in. Unnecessary torture and vivisection makes me ill, but I'm a hypocrite because I do nothing to stop it.

NPWF: How do you feel about censorship and the P.M.R.C.?

Tim: It's pretty obvious that no one has the right to dictate what others read or listen to or watch on T.V. or movie screens. Everyone has the right to voice their opinions or show their art. The PMRC has only succeeded in selling lots of records for those they attack (i.e. WASP & the Mentors). Their puritan actions only create more of a market for the items they're trying to get rid of.

Chris: Basically I'm against censorship, but on the other hand, I see some really scary stuff out there.

Mike: Any censorship is bad for it is a pox that spreads out-of-control.

Paul: Censorship must go as must the PMRC. That's all that needs to be said about that.

Glenn: Censorship and the PMRC are useless. Should a clique be allowed to determine what a nation should view or hear? You're never really free.

NPWF: What are the band's influences?

Tim: I'm not reallly sure if we have any <u>direct</u> influences, musically or lyrically. Our biggest influence, I guess, is our environment; things around

us and our own personal experiences. The people of Meaford were a big influence when we started the band; they were the subjects of lots of lyrics, and we also wanted to play as hard as possible for the sole purpose of offending them.

Chris: Everything.

Mike: Lyrical influences: anger and exasperation spured on by the absurdities of our society. Musical influences: Husker Du, Effigies, Youth Youth, Die Kreuzen.

Paul: Youth Brigade, MDC.

Glenn: I like all kinds of guitar oriented music. I feel that different styles have a lot to offer. Direct influences would include the chugging rhythms of Metallica, the twin-guitar harmonies of Iron Maiden (no doubt borrowed from wishbone ash) the aggression of Voi Vod and the emotion of Stevie Ray Vaughn or Eric Johnson. I listen to a lot of classical guitar music, jazz-fusion and progressive rock.

NPWF: What are your favorite bands and kinds of music?

Tim: Favorite bands/performers - Phil Ochs, the Crucifucks, Th'Inbred, the Dicks, Funeral Oration, X, among others...I happen to like any music, aside from opera and top 40 radio slop.

Chris: HC - DK's, SNFU, SCUM, Suicidal, Black Flag, the usual stuff! Other

stuff: Killing Joke, New Model Army, Echo & the Bunnymen, Gary Numan.

Mike: Right now I'm big on early Wine and Fall (thanks for the tapes, Richard). Also Bloodlake, Polkaholics and the "new" Freeze LP! I prefer music that is melodic yet abrasive. Innovation and a sense of humour doesn't hurt either.

Paul: Fave bands: Stompin Tom Connors, Jonathan Richman, Phil Ochs, Queen, Wards, the Spores, Brigade.

NPWF: Are there any other projects that you're working on?

Tim: I do Kill Poseurs fanzine.

Mike: Every Tuesday between 8 and 9 PM Steve Perry and I melt the eardrums of those (all three of them) who tune in to our show on Radio York. I am also 40% of the way through a degree in Political Science.

Paul: Yes, I also play in M.S.I.

Glenn: I'm currently working on an orchestrated piece of music for symphony that features a solo section for chainsaw and domestic short-hair cat.

NPWF: What about concerts and tours?

Tim: What about them?

NPWF: Why do you play Stairway To Heaven?

Tim: Why do we play Stairway To Heaven... because it is the ultimate rock and roll classic and it means so much to so many people, and some one had too wreck it. If we have ruined a moment for so many people, then that would be good, if it offends people, being that it is the rock and roll classic. And some one had to do it, so it might as well have been us.

NPWF: So Tim, why do you thrash when you sing if you hate thrashing?

Tim: I don't.

NPWF: Then what do you do?

Chris: He loses control of his bodily functions.

Tim: Yeah.

Paul: He hits me. He just about broke my fingers and they still hurt.

Tim: I express myself physically. That's it.

NPWF: Any future plans?

Tim: Get everything ready for the 12", tour the States and Canada during the summer, write more songs, get rid of Chris' filthy collection of out-of-doors-wear along with Paul's harmonica. Evereyone will be pretty happy if we can accomplish all of that stuff.

Chris: Album after album.

Glenn: Keep practicing guitar, and hopefully progress musically as a band.

NPWF: How can people contact you?



BETTER YOUTH ORGANIZATION

I wrote to the BYO to ask if they'd like to put together an article about the Organization, since I myself have been curious as to what kind of organization the BYO is ever since I first heard the name. Becca at the BYO in L.A. took some of her time to put the following together, which is a compilation of BYO literature clippings plus her knowledge written in her own words.

For those of you that don't know about us, the BETTER YOUTH ORGANIZATION was envisioned as a collective, positive voice for the malaigned alternative music community. We planned to promote shows, publish a magazine, start a record company and basically give young artists opportunity to create & maintain their ideals & individuality in a positive & productive atmosphere without having to rely on the "entertainment industry." The BYO was started in '79 as a reaction against police violence toward the alternative music scene in Los Angeles. At the time it was ideas from a bunch of idealistic kids. After running a big house called "Skinhead Manor" in Hollywood during the summer of '80, a place where kids from all over Southern California met and exchanged ideas, the group was able to run a rather large night club called Godzilla's for about three months during late fall/winter '81/'82. This was a great learning experience & also gave everyone the incentive & finances to promote shows at venues such as the Hollywood Palladium. We then released the first BYO LP, the "Someone Got Their Kicked In" compilation in spring '82. We then bought a big school bus & organized the first BYO tour, The Someone Got Their Kicked In Tour' 82. This tour took YOUTH BRIGADE & SOCIAL DISTORTION through about 20 shows, thousands of miles of travelling & a wild & wonderful time recorded on 60 hours of video tape & made into the movie, "Another State Of Mind. "Since then we have released 10 more records & are constantly looking for new ways to express our ideals. We believe that "youth" is an attitude, not an age & that every generation has the resposibility to change what they feel is wrong in the world. Unfortunately, it seems that many people either forget or grow weary of this responsibility as thy get older in years & so we feel it is really important that every new generation realize this responsibility & act upon it. You can do anything if you believe & we must try make the world a better place for everyone, cause if we don't will??!!!

Many people have written asking what exactly the BYO is and what we do. Well we believe that "youth" is an attitude, not an age and that the future of the world depends on the individual always striving to change what they feel is wrong. The youth of every generation have this responsibility, as do all human beings, but it sometimes seems that some people forget about this responsibility when they "grow up." So we are dedicated to helping creative ideals of youth expess themselves while they are fresh and new, before they can be molded and conformed. We live in the most exciting of human-kinds recorded history, but it is also a very confused and fearful time. We are on the threshold of change and we believe that it is possible to make this change for the good of all people. We are dedicated to this belief and will do anything we can to bring this about. We do this now by running a record company and promoting music and ideas that are dedicated to these ideals. We have also at times worked on other projects promoting live performances and we try to run a national music magazine "GENERATION" but we were unprepared at the time to carry on and so felt better to leave them to others. The important thing is the experience, because that is what life is all about, experieces. EXPERIENCE is KNOWLEDGE and knowledge is the only way to change the problems of the world because all of these problems are caused by one factor IGNORANCE! Ignorance causes fear, hatred, prejudice, war and murder. Knowledge breeds communication, understanding, friendship, trust and love. I think you know which is a more desirable world. Together we can all change the world, but it starts YOU. TIPATION TO THE PROPERTY OF THE PROPERTY

Now, these are tidbits of our background. Let's see about lately....

Alot has happened since our early newsflashes, let me see...Oh how about "employee" (huh?) history.

Many of you know that BYO is run by only a few people. Now both Shawn & Mark, who started & ran the company from the beginning, have decided to step down from the day to day business & concentrate on their band, BRIGADE. Any of you that have been following the BRIGADE know that they long overdue for their 2nd LP. The main delay for this has been the work involved in running BYO, so now Mark Brown has come in to take charge of the record company. Rose Ruther will be in charge of promotion (she was running it part-time off & on over the past 3 years) & Becca Porter will be charge of correspondence (mail order & answering most letters.) Shawn & Mark will still be here overseeing things, finding & producing new bands & of all playing in YOUTH BRIGADE. Mark, Rose & Becca have been working us since BYO first started & we have great confidence that they will carry on the ideals we've long maintained. We also feel that since they will doing this full time, BYO will become such more organized & able to take many more new projects & reach an even wider range of people.

And for later 86 -> present, Rose left early last year and I took on her part as well, but had too little time with school and an active social life, so I got some help. After going through several people, we adjusted everything into specific categories or "jobs" and now have Billy doing radio promo and video promo, Michael is sitting in as publicist, MB basically is the "head cheese" as well as all around great guy, and Shawn and Mark are still trying to get away!! (Our Art department will be growing, both visually and people wise, so maybe Mark can get away soon!) As for me, I do everything else, and help Shawn stay sane! I suppose you could call me the person link between business and the outside world (of sorts) NO AUTOGRAPHS PLEASE!!

As for bands and stuff on our label, we have started to expand to different areas of music (and some people DO NOT APPROVE) and keeping with our ideals, are maintaining the same attitude towards life as in the beginning.


... And the tide starts to turn....

Some people that are familiar with BYO & many of you who've only heard of us seem to classify us as a "hardcore" label. This is unfortunate as this "label" has always been quite conforming & therefore against our fundamental philosophy of individuality. The idea of BYO has always been to communicate ideas (most notably positive) to people through art (most notably music.) started. "PUNK" was the most interesting, inspirational adventurous music/lifestyle around. We feel strongly that in many respects it still is, though many things have changed that we will address in future UPDATES. The point is that these are our roots & they are firmly planted, yet we wish to grow & some people would wish to stifle our growth. It inevitable that the bands will grow and change and we hope that through greater degree of communication, from us to you, more people will open their minds to what we are doing & LISTEN.

Around this time or so, we changed from BETTER YOUTH ORGANIZATION BETTER YOUTH RECORDS, and now it's BYO Records (for reasons that might obvious).

This interview was done with Jack, the singer of Desecration, who are one of Arizona's many great bands. They are not to be confused with a metal band of the same name from California.

NPWF: What is the meaning behind the band's name?

Jack: What we mean by 'Desecration' is the upheaval or unfolding of certain's beliefs. We want to expose the true nature of such things as problems in society, nuclear power, mistreated minorities and get people to realise what is going on in this world.

NPWF: When was the band formed?

Jack: In July of 1985.

NPWF: Could you give a brief history of the band?

Jack: Well let's see...Dave and Erik started jamming one day and wrote a song which would be entitled 'It's Just Begun'. They sent it to me, I was at A.S.U. at the time taking a sociology course. I loved it and joined immediately. Andy was added later. We had all been friends a while and being in a band was something we always wanted to do. The AZ "scene" had no pardcore bands.

NPWF: What is the current line-up?

Jack: Me - screams, yells, political statements. Andy - bass. Erik - drums.

Dave - guitar.

NPWF: What are the members' interests, concerns and beliefs?

Jack: Interests - I like to draw, trade tapes, write poetry, spend time with friends. Concerns and beliefs - this is pretty broad but some things we are concerned with are global nuclear disarmament, the abolition of nuclear power - the search for a solar future, racial and sexual equality, animal liberation - peace for all. We are against any kinds of tyranny including fascism, racism and prejudice.

NPWF: What do you think of the straight edge idea?

Vack: I think it's really great that kids today can still be considered 'cool" when they aren't drinking. I myself am completely straight. Sometimes the straight edge crowd can get a little cocky - I've heard some negative comments from some about political bands like us. Not drinking is a personal choice - but it doesn't make you any better than anyone else - healthier

res - better no!

NPWF: What are your opinions on the punk-metal crossover?

Jack: Personally I'm not into it that much. It wouldn't be that bad if the metal bands actually were crossing into more intelligent ideas. To me it seems they have just speeded up the music and kept the same asanine lyrics. However I do like some metal bands (Black Sabbath, Trouble, Excel) because I feel they have something intelligent to offer. I also like a few HC bands with metal influences as long as the lyrics aren't sexually or morally offensive.

NPWF: What are your political views? AND WE SHALL RISE!

Jack: I am a free thinker. I believe in people helping people

Jack: I am a free thinker. I believe in people helping people in a nonviolent way without exploiting each other or the environment.

NPWF: How do you feel about religion?

Jack: It's great in personal ways but in general they are too concerned with themselves - add to the disunity of the world,, are hypocritical and apathetic.

NPWF: What do you think of vegetarianism and animal rights?

Jack: Important issues indeed! I am presently working on being a vegetarian.

I know by eating animals I am hypocritical to any beliefs in peace. There are many alternatives to vivisection, I wish people would just open their eyes.

NPWF: What are the band's influences?

Jack: Musically - old Discharge, old Raw Power, Crucifix and Black Sabbath. Lyrically any band with a positive, intelligent message like Final Conflict, Uniform Choice, Half Off, False Liberty, Conflict (UK), The Iconoclast, Extreme Noise Terror, Christ On Parade, etc...

NPWF: What material have you put out or are you on?

Jack: We have an E.P. (12!) called 'Who's In Control' available for \$4.00 at our p.o. box! We're running out so order today! We are on many comp. tapes also.

NPWF: Are there any other projects that the members are working on?

Jack: I do a fanzine called 'Hippycore'. Our guitarist is in a speed metal band called Hippyrock - the very first speed metal band with peaceful lyrics!

NPWF: What about concerts and tours?

Jack: None yet (just locally) but we are working on it.

NPWF: Any future plans?

Jack: To put out a full length L.P., tour and spread the words of peace and unity.

NPWF: How can poeple contact you?

Jack: At our address of course silly! P.O. Box 195/ Mesa, AZ/ 85201 USA

NPWF: Any last comments?

Jack: Thank ever so much Jon. May we all attain peace with ourselves and the





B.S.L. are from Ontario's storm-stricken city of Barrie, but are considered by many to be a Toronto band due to their numerous shows down here in the past while. Just shortly after this interview was written a second guitarist was added.

NPWF: What is the meaning behind the band's name? Mike: Our name, B.S.L., Actually has a few different names that we go by namely: Boys For Social Liberty, Brian Sucks Lemons, Brain Scanning Lunitics, and Board Skating Lunitics. The last one is more or less a name for the "B-Town Skate Crew" as only one member of the band skates on a regular basis and takes it seriously.

NPWF: When was the band formed?

Mike: The band was formed way back in November '85 but nothing really started happening until April '86 when I joined and we started taking things more seriously. MAKE IT HAPPEN

NPWF: Could you give a brief history of the band? Mike: Okay, I'll try to make it really brief. In November '85, Scott, Glenn and Dave started "Boys From Scuttlebutt Lodge". Dave wasn't really dedicated to his vocal duties so he kind of left. I joined later on playing guitar, with Glenn on vocals and Scott on drums. We never had a permanent bassist so Ditch Dog from Sons Of Ishmael filled in for us. But we realised this couldn't go on cos he had his own band to play in so we finally got a new singer, Kevin, and Glenn then switched to bass guitar. Kev joined in April '87.

NPWF: What is the current line-up?

Mike: I believe I've already answered this but here it is once again: Kev (17) on vocals, Mike (18) on guitar, Glenn (18) on bass, and Scott (18) on drums and bums. Scott sings one song and Glenn and I do some vocals as well.

NPWF: What are the band members' interests, concerns and beliefs? Kevin: A major concern of mine is opening the eyes of all the naive, narrowminded people in our world t'day, to all the bullshit that goes on in this world that they take to be an everyday thing (ie: no big deal). talking about government expenditure on things like defense, technology, and raising our own already high standard of living, where we should be spending on the development of third world countries and if they're too selfish to do that then at least help out the poverty stricken poeple in our own country. Once people realise the inhumane ways of our "leaders" we can all unite and put a stop to this shit! Maybe we can turn this country into a real democracy, at least. My strongest beliefs are of peace and equality. To gain these things internationally first we must do it individually. For example with peace, we must first not fight amongst each other, we must not infringe on the equal righs of each other. This means no stealing, etc. Another strong belief of mine is freedom, not so much as I could do other things (legally) if there was anarchy (because I can do most things I want to right now, with anarchy I would be able to kill, steal, etc. but I don't want to do that anyways). Why I do want it is because it would prove we do not need babysitters such as law and government.

NPWF: What do you think of the straight edge idea?

Mike: Well, I think that being straight edge is more than just an idea, it's more of a value or a way of choosing to live your life. Personally, straight as I see no need for beer, drugs, cigarettes, whatever. If abuse them they will only fuck you up inside, and they cost so much too. One thing that's really bothering me lately is this constant struggle superiority between people that are "straight edge" and people who are not. It is an individual's choice to do whatever they want to do with themselves.

If you drink that's cool too, just don't infringe on somebody else's fun or way of living. Also, on the other side of the coin, I wish some of these "open-minded straight edger's" would stop mocking people who do drink. I agree that one is doing it just to be cool and get attention to be accepted, then it's not worth it. I've gone on too long already so I'll just end this by saying that all "straight edge" really does is segregate people farther apart and create animosity.

Kevin: I respect straight edge a great deal, it makes a lot of sense to What I don't like about it is the barriers it forms around straight people and people who do drink or whatever. It is a great idea individually only, because this label "straight edge" is only another trend in the already too trendy hardcore scene. Do people have to wear X's on their hands? What does this show, that these people are a higher form of human being or something? So if you are straight, stay straight but get rid of the X's and you're just seperating yourself from the others. I thought we were supposed to be fighting together!

NPWF: What are your opinions on the punk-metal crossover?

Kevin: I don't know too much about the punk-metal crossover, all I knonw I don't like the metal rock star image.

NPWF: What are your political views?

Mike: Governments and the paranoia they have towards each other are leading us nowhere really but just down further into this lifeless reality. I am so sick of these fucking governments fucking up everyone's lives and not even listening to what the public wants (as a democracy is "supposed" to do). seriously wonder if mother earth will still be around say ten or twenty years down the line. The increased stockpiling of nuclear weaponary really depressing. All government is unfair as I see it and we really don't need all these rules and regulations to govern us. I believe that each individual should govern themselves whilst living in harmony with people and accepting them as they are. On a personal level, I don't the world will ever have an organized, non-violent type of anarchy as most people's minds are too corrupted and narrow and only think and see what they want to and fuck everything else. These people don't want change, and if they do they're being very lax about it. Really now, do you think there will ever be an end to apartheid in places such as South Africa? Do you ever think there will be some sort of unilateral or even multilateral disarmament from either the east or west? I'm not trying to be so negative and of course I want to see these changed (preferably banished) but remember: begins today.

Kevin: Politics is just a game. The "team" that fucks people around the most wins and they become the party in power. It is extremely obvious that it strickly a rich man's cheating game. If it were a true representation of the poeple than it would be an ex-factory worker or something that was leader, not an ex-stock broker or lawyer. They are all selfish capitalists who work to better themselves (the rich) and then the old adage becomes true: "the rich get richer and the poor get poorer". In these times violence, pain, and suffering we should be working as a world not as several individual countries, if these men and women who are called our leaders as great and intelligent as they are portrayed then why hasn't this happened already and why is our hope for survival getting worse each day?

NPWF: How do you feel about religion?

Mike: I have rejected all types of religion and I don't believe in God (or

Satan, scary stuff eh?) so I guess one could call me an atheist. Kevin: I don't agree with any religion (at least that I've heard of).

think maybe when religion started it was a good idea, it gave people something to look up to, something to live for but then it got waaaay out of control. Today it is just another money making scheme. It makes me very angry to see these evangelists, etc manipulating the naive people and stealing their lives and money. "For the love of God, give"!

NPWF: What do you think of vegetarianism and animal rights?

NPWF: How do you feel about censorship and the P.M.R.C.?
Mike: Are the P.M.R.C. still trying to ban (or restrict) rock music? I haven't heard anything lately so I'm not too aware as to what they're up to. I personally am against any form of censorship whether it be a minor or major type of censorship.

Kevin: I hate censorship, why don't these old fat christian ladies just fuck off and figure out what they are protesting against before they ban it. The DK's are trying to better our world not corrode it. By stopping them they are limiting our chances for a better future. I don't know, they just make me mad, telling us what we can't listen to. They all deserve a good boot to the head!

NPWF: What are the band's influences?

Kevin: Any band we listen to influences us in every way. No band influences us directly, that I know of anyway.

NPWF: What is the meaning of the band's name? Andy: Absolutely nothing. We couln't find a name that we could all agree on, and that just kind of describes our music and our attitude. We just sort of play whatever comes out and it doesn't have to be any style of music. It's just, if we like it we play it. We don't have any style really.

NPWF: When was the band formed and could you give a brief history? Andy: The band was formed basically May of '86. Myself and Richard have lived next door to each other all our lives. After I got thrown out of Nomind, we both had nothing to do so we sat around and played stuff for fun and realised that the songs are good. So after about a month, we got a drummer, and the rest is history.

NPWF: What's the current line-up?

Andy: Myself playing electric. Rich plays accoustic guitar. And Tom plays drums. We have a bass player too, his name's John.

NPWF: He wasn't playing at the Rhythm Pigs show in Toronto. Andy: No, sometimes he has problems with making it to shows.

NPWF: What are the members' interests, concerns and beliefs?

Andy: We don't really care about much. We basically have fun in life.

NPWF: What do you think of the straight edge idea?

Andy: That's been around for such a long time, and it's just as stupid as anything else. I myself don't drink, smoke or do drugs, but that has nothing to do with it. It's just another bandwagon for some one to jump on and say "I am this". People always want to be something. Either be a punk, skin, a straight edge, be a skater, be whatever, because every one thinks they have to be in a group so they can belong to something. Well, that's the worst thing to do, the best thing is to be yourself.

NPWF: Do you have any political views?

Andy: No...yeah, we're basically apolitical, I guess. As a band we are.

NPWF: What are your lyrics about, are there any certain subjects that you

write about ... or nothing in particular?

Andy: Yeah, exactly. What ever is happening around us at the time. There's no great meaning in our lyrics. Like, they aren't just totally dumb lyrics like "yeah baby, I love you baby" or whatever. But they're done as a complete joke. We don't try to say anything important, because it's all been said before. So we just sing about whatever's going on around us. Be it cars driving too fast down the street in front of our house, or be it just sitting in your back yard watching the grass grow.

NPWF: What do you think of animal rights and vegetarianism?

Andy: Well, I eat meat. I'm not too thrilled about factory farming, but...

NPWF: What do you think about censorship and the problem with the P.M.R.C.? Andy: I think it's funny. It's the same thing that's been going on since the time of Julius Caesar. There's been censorship all the time and this is just another round. It just happens all the time. It's nothing new. These people, they think that this is all so bad. But what you say is nowhere as bad as what your mind can imagine.

NPWF: What would you consider to be the band's influences? Andy: It could be anything. We all come from totally different backgrounds. Our drummer, he was into hardcore 5,6,7 years ago, he listened to Subhumans, D.O.A. stuff, that's where I met him. The Straw Dogs popped into Toronto for an unexpected show the day after they played in London Ontario. This is when I managed to ask Tom and Chuck a few questions. But why they originally planned to play London and not

Toronto is far beyond me. Anyway...

Paul Morris (M.S.I. & Sons Of Ishmael) insisted that he could ask the Straw Dogs the first question.

Paul: You guys do Queen's Tie Your Mother Down, are you guys big Queen fans or what?

Dogs: They're my favorite band, I love them. I'd copy the whole album if I could.

Paul: Okay, thanks.

Pleased with this response, Paul left to return to the show, and Tom and Chuck politely said bye to Paul.

Dogs: Talk to you later. See you in hell, be there soon, buddy.

NPWF: What is the meaning of the band's name and how did you get it?

Dogs: It's from the movie with Dustin Hoffman, Straw Dogs. They just copied it from that. It has no powerful meaning or anything. Some guy goes crazy and kills a bunch of people because he's had enough of abuse.

NPWF: When was the band formed and could you give a brief history. Dogs: It used to be the F.U.'s, started out like that, 1979, 1980. About 2 years ago, they changed the name to the Straw Dogs and a couple members joined. Went through a couple drummers. I used to be in Gang Green for the last 3 years. Tom was in the Proletariat and he quit. And we ended up in the Straw Dogs.

NPWF: What was the reason for the name change?

Dogs: They were just tired of being the F.U.'s. I kinda like the name the

F.U.'s, I wish they'd change it back. Don't you?

NPWF: I don't know, maybe. Dogs: You're neutral, huh?

NPWF: What's the current line-up?

Dogs: Me, Chuck on lead guuitar. That's Tom over there who plays drums. And John on vocals. Steve on rhythm guitar and nose. Wayne on bass. And uh, yeah, that's it.

NPWF: What are the members' interests, concerns and beliefs?

Dogs: Absolutely nothing. We're totally neutral. We couldn't give a fuck if a bomb got dropped on Toronto in the morning. As long as we're gone.

NPWF: What do you think of straight edge?

Dogs: There's nothing wrong with being straight edge, just keep it to yourself. Don't push any of your ideals on anyone else. I don't go around telling people to drink. Hardcore was somewhat of a movement and a feeling. But speedmetal is more commercial. Make money and play fast.

At this point some preppies walked by screaming "Why don't you assholes get a fucking education?"

Dogs: What's this, abusing punk rockers in Toronto. These jocks are everywhere.

NPWF: What exactly are your political views?

Dogs: I don't like to talk about that. Has nothing to do with Straw Dogs. Straw Dogs have no political views at all. It's not that we don't read the paper or watch the news, but it has nothing to do with the music whatsoever. It's just a good time. Just an open-minded good time.

NPWF: How about religion, what do you think of that?

Dogs: Well, let me tell you... I can go on for hours about religion. What do you think of Jim and Tammy Bakkker? She looks like divine. You can peel her makeup off like latex paint. No, religion's no big issue with us either. It's fine if you're Catholic, you believe in God, but don't lay it on me. And don't live your life by it. Don't let the church make decisions for you. God doesn't care, he just cares that you believe and try to stay partially moral or something. When you're fucking dead in heaven there's going to be a guy right next to you that raped and murdered 13 little girls. He's like "Hey, I had a great time down there. And I'm right next to you buddy. NPWF: What do you think of animal rights?
Dogs: I despise cruelty to animals. I'm not a vegetarian or anything but that's because I was raised on meat and I don't think I could just throw it away now. Finally the Guilt Parade can be called a Toronto band now that all three members have moved here from New Brunswick. This interview was done over the phone with Rich Bird and Jeff Beardall.

NPWF: What is the meaning of the band's name and how did you choose it? Rich: There's a band called The Birthday Party and before they were The Boys From Next Door and one of the songs on their first album was called Guilt Parade, so we just took it.

NPWF: When was the band formed and could you give a brief history? Rich: Well, Jeff and I have been in bands together since about 5 years ago. Jeff started a band called Voice Of The East, and their singer didn't show up one day and I was there and I sang. So they kicked that singer out and got me. He's singing for S.C.U.M. now. So after that we went through a lot of bassists and drummers with me on vocals and Jeff on guitar. But we couldn't find any, so finally I switched to bass and we found a great drummer, Todd, who was in a band that we had known for a while.

NPWF: What are the band members' interests, concerns and beliefs?
RIch: Well, I would personally like to see a great decrease in the amount of stupidity that goes on not only within the scene but just in general. You see so many cretins on a day to day basis that don't know what the fuck they're doing. If people could just use their common sense and try to use their brains I think that would help everything else just immensely. I think for the most part, punks have some good ideas about what's going on, but I don't think they know how to change it. If everybody felt the way about issues and concerned about the way most punks are, then things would probably take care of themselves. But that just isn't the way.

Jeff: I think the band's politics are just sort of the politics of common sense. There are a lot of issues to be addressed and I think there are some common sense viewpoints that can be held with most issues of any importance and I think that's what the band is all about, trying to send out the common sense side of things.

NPWF: Are there any specific issues which concern you? Jeff: One thing that Rich and I were talking about the other day was really pisses me off when issues become trendy, and they fall out of favour. South Africa's a good example of that, no one hears about that anymore. the starving kids in Ethiopia, no one cares about them anymore either. trendy for a couple of months, when you're fucking dancing to the song for famine relief, right? It's a trendy issue and you can be hip happening, and then the songs fall off the charts and hey, it's history. But there's still problems, and I just don't like to see that happening, because I think it often does more damage for political problems to have a flurry of interest in them for a couple months and then have them ignored after that, than it is to have a certain constant low-level activity or concern over them. Look what happened with the homeless in America, Hands Across America. Fuck, we were all happening, feeding people for a month and then now they're forgotten. It's completely bogus. Trendy politics and trendy issues really bother me. I like to see people who are really committed to doing something about it. Perhaps I'm a little hypocritical because I don't do anything

actively to help people in Ethiopia or in South Africa. Maybe that's

something that the band should change, I don't know.

NPWF: You mentioned politics earlier, do you have any specific political views?

Jeff: I think that politics are too difficult for any person like myself just off the sheet to blindly lie faith in any sort of political ideology. Although I would have to say that if I were to put myself and the band on the political spectrum it would probably be somewhere on the left.

NPWF: What do you think of the straight edge idea? Rich: Well, as a matter of fact, today I drew a black X on the back of my hand. Personally, I don't drink or smoke. and I will do drugs occasionally. But you know whenever I've been at parties and smoked a lot, my mind gets confused. I really dislike that, I like to be completely aware of what's going on and in control of my body and stuff. That's just my own personal opinion. But I don't think that straight edge should be so severe. If people want to label me straight edge and I smoke a joint once in a blue moon, I don't think they should call me a hypocrite. But I just drew the X on my hand today because I was bored. Jeff's definitely not straight edge. And Todd likes to get real drunk and then tell the lead singer of Negative Gain to shut up in the middle of a song. He has a bit of a death wish too.

NPWF: You guys haven't played in Toronto for, as far as I know, a long time. Rich: Yeah, we never have.

NPWF: What's the reason for that?

Rich: We used to live in New Brunswick. Todd and I came up in September Jeff waited until this spring. And we've been disciplining ourselves severely, and we have a show in two days. Hopefully we'll blast the living fuck out of everyone, redefining what music is and should be. Those are our goals.

NPWF: What do you think of censorship and the P.M.R.C.?

Rich: Well, as a matter of fact, we wrote a song about it. It's about censorship in general.

Jeff: I think it fucking sucks. Neo-conservatism has been sweeping the States for a long time and it's just another system of that particular political swing. I'm completely against censorship of any form.

NPWF: What are the band's influences?

Jeff: It's hard to say... I listen to a lot of DK's... and Richard listens to a lot of the Fall, the Pop Group, and Todd is the same way. He really enjoys Joy Division and all sorts of Manchester bands like Certain Ratio. we're a little more experimental then a lot of other hardcore bands.

NPWF: What material have you put out or are you on? Jeff: The two tapes, Animals That Talk Like Men and An Irrational Fear Clowns, released both in '85. Both reviews in Max R'n'R were pretty good. really don't have any sort of rough estimate of how many comps we're on.

NPWF: Are there any other projects that the members are working on? Jeff: Todd is quite heavily involved in a band that he plays guitar, keyboards and sings for called The History Of Torture. And Richard and I are going to form a band ... we have to find a couple of other members. The bass player for Sons Of Ishmael will be playing with us, Mike. But we all the Guilt Parade as our primary concern.

NPWF: Do you have anything planned as far as tours go? Jeff: Well, not since Todd sold the Guilt Mobile for \$32.

NPWF: Any future plans? Jeff: Only to keep going with the band and to keep improving our writing skills and to keep ourselves aware of what's going on, get a whole bunch of records out, play to a bunch of people.



Ian: What do you think bitch (Ian's girlfriend)? Fuck. I.T.B., I'm the best, obvious. We're all the best, we're all musicians. Wait, just a second, before we go on, how much do we get paid for this? No jokes. Bracken said we get money.

NPWF: When was the band formed?

Jon: The band formed when I became the best person, when I was born.

Dave: Who cares when it was formed fucker? The only thing that matters is the fact that we did form. From here on in we will insult and destroy all lesser and inferior beings. Therefore we will kill you all.

Ian: I can't remember. Seriously.

NPWF: Could you give a brief history of the band?

NPWF: How do you feel about censorship and the P.M.R.C.?

Jon: No one should have the right to censor my lyrics, because they rule, just like me! However all other bands should be censored, because that's what they deserve. As for the P.M.R.C., they aren't good people, only I am. Dave: Censorship is crap! I decide what I see but I won't bother seeing anything without me in it anyway, so who fuckin' cares? What the hell's the PMRC? Some punk rock garbage? I don't follow that fuckin' crap!

Ian: What's that word, censorship, what does that mean? Isn't that something

that senses something? Skip it.

NPWF: What are the band's influences?

Jon: Only my unbelievable personal greatness influences us.

Dave: I am influenced by myself. Everything I have done is unbelievably incredible and my perfection amazes me. Nothing else in life influences me, fucker! Why should it? Why am I still talking to you?

Hey fuck man, if you don't tell me we're getting paid, I'm going to get my straight edge heathens and I'm going to kill you. Ya you, the skinny one. Do you work out? No? Fucking wimp, you're lucky I'm doing the interview. Poseur.

NPWF: What about concerts and tours?

Jon: We give others the honor of seeing us play live once in a while, when

we feel like being generous to you stupid jerks.

Dave: Every once in a while we will grace the peasants and play a show. But only because it's fun to kick you inferior imbeciles. We will go on tour when we are paid unlimited amounts of money, fucker.



I managed to find all three members of Life Sentence together in their van just before their set at the first show of their summer tour, where their manager and I gave them a little interview.

NPWF: How long have you been touring?

LIFE: Almost 2 years. NPWF: Constantly?

LIFE: This is our 4th major tour. But we do weekend gigs all the time too.

NPWF: From east coast to west coast?

LIFE: Actually, this is the first tour where we'll do all of the U.S. and some of Canada. Mostly we do the midwest.

NPWF: What's your opinion between the east coast, west coast and mid-west

LIFE: They're very different. But in punk rock they're all the same. You've got your straight edge crowd, drunk-punk crowd, peace-punks, death-rockers. Everybody's playing a little character.

NPWF: Which group of people likes you the most?

LIFE: Actually, it's diverse. Metal people like us, even straight edge people, skinheads. We're a melting-pot band.

NPWF: When's your record going to come to Canada?

LIFE: It's only released in Canada as an import. We're going to have to find some sort of licensing deal in Canada. So if any of your parents own record companies, get in touch.

NPWF: When are you coming out with your new record?

NPWF: How did you get the name Dead Milkmen?

Dean: The name was around actually before the band was. I guess back in around 1979, Joe Jack was writing a story in high school or something, and he needed a name of a band and he came up with the Dead Milkmen. Then he used to write stories about this band and started putting out this newsletter. And then eventually the band formed.

NPWF: When did it form?

Dean: The band formed about 4 years ago. 4 years in July (of 1987).

NPWF: Did it form with the current line-up?

Dean: Yeah, the current line-up is the same that it's been for 4 years.

NPWF: You guys are kind of humurous on the records...


Dean: We don't take ourselves too seriously, our subject matter too seriously.



Mr. Giger is best known in America for his Academy Award winning set design for the 1980 movie "Alien". His works have been displayed in galleries throughout the world.

It is because of this poster that the authorities have alleged the album to be harmful.

It is a very short step from consoring rock music to censoring any free expression.

Effectively fighting any charges of this type can be vary costly. The NO MORE CENSORSHIP Defense Fund has been formed in to help with these expenses.

The NO MORE CENSORSHIP DEFENSE FUND is an organization in San Francisco working to raise funds and support for Jello Biafra, Ruth Schwartz and the three others involved in the Los Angeles based prosecution involving the "distribution of harmful materials to minors". This is the trial against the sale of an H.R. Geiger poster inside the DEAD KENNEDYS record "Frankenchrist".

It is essential that people everywhere react and show their support of this fight because the outcome of this case could personally affect all the people in this country. If the defendants are convicted in this case, a precedent will be set and a very ugly one at that! More and more suits of this type will be filed as the P.M.R.C (Parents Musical Resource Center, I.E. Washington Wives) right wing art haters see how easy it is to change what they don't like to see. So, by supporting this effort to stop the attack on free speech, you are not only standing up for Alternative Tentacles' rights but in a greater sense for your own rights.

The NO MORE CENSORSHIP DEFENSE FUND needs monetary help to continue. If you can send a few bucks or do a benefit show in your town that's a great help. The best thing you can do though, is to start talking to people about this problem. Not just your friends, but your parents, teachers, penpals, etc. Let's all work together to understand what we're up against.

If you are of voting age, then vote! Find out which candidates are not controlled by P.M.R.C.- type groups and help them get elected. You better do it soon or voting might become a thing of the past too! It's like erosion. It starts small and suddenly there's nothing left.

It will be a sad day when the only thing left to read is READER'S DIGEST and THE PLAIN TRUTH and the only thing on TV is "Wheel of Misfortune". This is where we're headed it seems.




From the desk of Mordam Records:

As of this writing, we just finished our first real round in court. We have been working on a demurrer instead of entering our plea. A demurrer does two things: firstly it says that there is a challange to this particular law and secondly that this law does not apply to these defendants and/or this situation. If we win the demurrer it means the case could be immediately dropped. If we lose we must go back to an arrainment to enter a "guilty" or "not guilty" plea. We lost this round. We are intending to appeal the rejection of the demerrur. But at this time have another arrainment set for March 24.

We estimate that we will spend ten times the amount of fines in order to keep lawyers fighting for us. And we definately feel that it is of the upmost importance for all artists, small business, and lovers of free speech that we don't let the conservative authorities get away with this, at least not easily. NPWF: How do you feel about religion?





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NPWF: What is the meaning or significance of the band's name?
Black: The Black Donnellys...it was an injustice out of London, a city called Luken, in 1880 this family was slaughtered by a bunch of local crazies who had differences against them and they're sort of a bad word around where we're from. For the area it makes a lot more sense.

NPWF: When was the band formed and could you give a brief history? Black: The original band was formed about 4 or 5 years ago. It's gone through 4 actual line-up changes since then, bringing us to the present date now. The present band has been together for about 8 months.

NPWF: What's the line-up right now?

Black: On bass is Rob. On guitar Jade. Drums Chad. Singing Dan. And Jeff on guitar.

NPWF: What are the band members' interests, concerns and beliefs?
Black: A lot of the songs deal with issues about how you feel and how you deal with things yourself. When you see something in the newspaper, how it affects you personally. The songs are more or less questions about yourself.

NPWF: What do you think of the straight edge idea?
Black: We're not pro or con either. The music has nothing to do, we don't sing songs about drinking beer. The songs are about things that are relevant to us. Whether you drink beer or not has nothing to do with the music. You can be straight and get into a band or you can be wasted and get into a band.

NPWF: What do you think of the punk-metal crossover?
Black: We love it. It's open. It's opening up things at gigs where we're not having problems between rockers and punks. The rockers, the punks and the skinheads used to always battle each other. 3 minorities. But we said to unite and became a majority. There's a lot of gigs that happen between punk and metal bands playing together at the same shows and we haven't had any problems.

NPWF: What are your political views, if any?

Black: The obvious, oppression of the innocent. I can't answer that.

NPWF: What do you think of religion?

Black: A joke. Why believe in something else if you can believe in yourself?

NPWF: What do you think of animal rights?

Black: There's lots of injustice. Eye-liner on a rabbit's face to see if it burns, that's stupid because you can use somebody who says "I want to wear a type of eye-liner, I put it on my eyes, if it burns I won't wear it again". Animals have different systems than we do. But just killing something for just the point of killing it is fucked.

NPWF: How do you feel about censorship and the P.M.R.C.? Black: The P.M.R.C. are nazis. They're doing the same thing the nazis did, brainwashing. Those politicians' wives, they'll sit down and say "Rock and roll, it deals with sex and violence". They'll say ban it. But they all go home and watch their favorite soap opera, like Dynasty every night. If they want to ban AC/DC, Elvis Presley, GBH, there's no way they can, because therefore you gotta ban Dynasty, Days Of Our Lives, As The Stomach Turns. If soap operas aren't violent, then who the fuck shot J.R.?

NPWF: What would you consider to be the band's influences? Black: Varied intensely throughout the band. Ranging from Sex Pistols to Slayer.

NPWF: What are your favorite bands and kinds of music? Black: I'm totally open minded. I like anything.

NPWF: What material have you put out?

with the Condo Christ, up to Ottawa, Montreal and Quebec City.



John: We play & tour as much as possible and hopefully are touring Canada after our 2nd European tour in June '87.



SPECIE-ISM

is just an animal, one species among many species. certainly a very clever animal, but he is also an destructive, aggressive and polluting animal. During the twentieth century the species of man has grown to overpopulate many areas of the planet has begun to expand outwards into space, taking with him his potential for creativity as well as his capacity to spoil and to destroy. He takes with him an advanced technology but only a primitive, intermittent and possibly declining morality. This clever and proud animal has already destroyed many other species; he now also has the power to destroy his own and, more individuals gain this cataclysmic power, so the probability of total doom for his species grows. Man is, after all, still an animal - he has greater strength than the storm-gods of antiquity but he programmed for the jungle.

Whether or not moral schemes are based upon faith, enlightened self-interest or compassion, changes in moral outlook often have been based upon some extension of sympathy so that individuals (such foreigners, slaves, those of other races) whose rights and interests not previously been recognised or respected, gain this acknowledgement; they are, as it were, included in the moral in-group. In the nineteenth century the Western world extended its boundaries of compassion encompass the poor and the enslaved. In some cases this in respect for the interests of others genuinely was based upon principle and compassion - it was not because of self-interest but in spite of it.

The first part of the twentieth century has seen the continuation this trend with an increased recognition by the powerful races of interests of the weaker ones. Perhaps the time has now come to extend borders of respect still further to include a concern for the sufferings of species other than our own.

NPWF: What are the members' interests, concerns and beliefs? Jim: Two of us (Jeff & I) go to Long Beach State University, Bill goes to a community college & Vadim is still in high school. Jeff & Bill have jobs & Vadim & I are currently unemployed. That's what we mainly do outside of the band.

NPWF: What do you think of the straight edge idea?
Jim: Straight edge is great for those people who it really means something for them, but at the same time there are a lot of people who go S.E. after hearing a Minor Threat record because it's "cool".

NPWF: What are your opinions on the punk-metal crossover? Jim: There are some bands who can use it really good, like C.O.C. & Excel, but there are too many negative aspects like apathetic attitudes, rock star image, blatant sell-outs.

NPWF: What are your political views?

Jim: We are all pretty much Liberal, believe our government could use a lot of improvement, especially in the area of military. But we draw the line at stuff like anarchy, because democracy (sort of) & capitalism give most (not all unfortunately) a chance to succeed & have a comfortable life.

NPWF: How do you feel about religion?

Jim: I don't know the other guys' opinions on this, so I'll speak for myself on this. I think religion is all right as far as most of the morals & ideas about treating other people go. But as far as it's an institution & its worthless ceremonies go, I don't believe in that.

NPWF: What do you think of animal rights?

Jim: None of us are veggies or really involved in animal rights. As close as we come in that is that Bill doesn't eat red meat, but that's only for health reasons.

NPWF: How do you feel about censorship and the P.M.R.C.? Jim: It's incredible that in this "enlightened & modern" world we are living in an era as conservative and idiotic as the 1950's. I think that as long as people try to censor and set up boundaries there are going to be people who go out of their way to break those rules.

NPWF: What are your favorite bands?

Jim: DYS, Black Flag, SSD, Youth of Today, Negative Approach, Bad Brains, Capitol Punishment, Underdog, Napalm Death, Final Conflict...

NPWF: What are the band's influences?

Jim: Influenced musically by all the bands in the last question. Lyrically we're influenced by personal experiences & things that need to be changed.
















This interview was done by mail with Crib Death's bassist, Rev. John Goodfish.

NPWF: What is the meaning behind the band's name?

John: Crib Death represents the ultimate freedom available to us as humans in that if we can die before we have to make any choices we have escaped the determinants of decision making and the constrainsts put upon us by any choice we think we make, or even think we have to make. Death while we are free to launch us back into the dark abyss of the unknown from whenst we came. Freedom that is unattainable in the frame work of our lives that are constantly being plagued with restricting decisions.

NPWF: When was the band formed?

John: The fall of '82, Billy and Jim got together on a duo project that Jerry and I incorporated ourselves into in January of '83...Jelo came into the scene in April of '83, after our April Fools tape was complete and we only had played one gig.

NPWF: Could you give a brief history of the band? John: Some of the history is described above, but we basically formed when we got a gig at a party in town and so we decided to actually be somewhat concrete with our songs, we scheduled almost all our gigs ourselves by organizing benefits in town and getting other bands to donate time and we gave all proceeds to various organizations, local animal shelter, cartoonists peace groups...etc...River Falls is a college town and so we rarely played in the summer but we managed to get enough gigs to keep the spirit flowing...we all but disbanded 'cept for gigs in '85 due to relocation of two members but we are really a live performance oriented band anyway ... we like to keep things fresh ... like humor and often lyrics that are spontaneous...we underwent a name change in '84-85 and we were known as The Utopian Peace Movement...it was big with the peaceniks...more so than Crib Death...we didn't change...just the name...we released A Year In The Making (tape) in the spring of '84 and 'cept for the extra 60 minutes on the tape...nothing has changed there. Currently we're trying to set a N.Y.C. tour for late June/early July.

NPWF: What are the band members' interests, concerns and beliefs? John: Big question...to highlite...Bill, world domination...Jer, accounting ...Jelo, lighting farts on dates...Jim, world cooperation, Rev. John, world consciousness thru the TAO. A more explicit answer can be found throughout the lyrics, as we all participate in them.

NPWF: What do you think of the straight edge idea?

John: Bill and I are straight edge, Jer, Jim, Jelo are not...personal reference.

NPWF: What are your opinions on the punk-metal crossover?

John: The progression (hopefully) or regression (uncool) depends upon the lyric content...in the words of Jello Biafra "the music's o.k. when there's more ideas than solos".

NPWF: What are your political views?

John: Personal politics, global politics are a personal issue and it would seem that anyone not corrupt by power, is simply using a different means to the same end ... global harmony (again, hopefully).

NPWF: How do you feel about censorship and the P.M.R.C.?

John: Plato was a believer in censorship for the good of the society but who decides ??? Only the informed individual can decide for themselves but by then they've been exposed...tough question. Maybe if we did not spend much time trying to fuck up everyone else's space and spent a little more time internally, we wouldn't need to answer that question.

NPWF: What are the band's influences?

John: Frank Zappa, Iggy Pop, Dead Kennedys, Flipper, etc...sex...life...you ...us...etc...

NPWF: Are there any other projects that the members are working on?

John: Yes, Jelo is in another band, Jer and I are too... Bill is in a dart league and Jim spends his free time running for state schollastic offices.



NPWF: When was the band formed and could you give a brief history of it? ADS: We were first formed about 2 1/2 years ago, but were first called A.I.D.S. We all have to communicate and work together to break down our barriers. If the barriers (morals, standards) still stand the problems of today and yesterday will still exist. That's how I see it in my eyes. Communication and working together will achieve change. It lies in all of us.

NPWF: What do you think of the straight edge idea?
ADS: It's up to you. I live my life the way I want and do not impose on anybody else's life whatsoever. Whether it's gay, a drunk, black or white. It doesn't matter. As in myself I drink heavily as I'm in a beer drinking club, we drink strong ales and stouts. Also I'm soon to do some homebrew.

NPWF: What do you think of the punk-metal crossover?

ADS: Again it doesn't matter. It's great to see a variety of music within the movement, but it would be better if most of bands didn't label themselves, follow a norm/conform to a look, and had more of a message!

NPWF: How do you feel about religion?

ADS: It too is conformity and brainwash. A profitable system with insecure ignorant people.

NPWF: What do you think of vegetarianism and animal rights?
ADS: As in vegetarianism everyone in A.D.S. is for their own reasons. Some of us are vegans. Animal rights we're all active in. We're all part of non-profit Animal-Human Rights groups.

NPWF: What are your influences and favorite bands?
ADS: Again cannot speak for the rest of A.D.S. As in myself a variety of music I listen to. Some for their sound, some for their ideas, desires, message. Some of my influences are Chumbawamba, Flux of Pink Indians, The Mob, Antisect, Icons of Filth, Exit-stance, Black Sabbath, Doors, Cultureshock, Atrocity, A.S.G.M., A.P.P.L.E., etc.

NPWF: What material have you released?

ADS: We put out our first demo back in June of 86 called "Man Made Another Destructive System" in the U.S. of Hate. It's sold through us distributed from Common Ground/Lethal Dose and in Europe through Dick of Bluurg. We're putting out a 12" e.p. on Mortarhate in Europe and USA should be out by late summer/early fall. Also maybe on Common Ground tapes we might do a split tape with Exit-stance from Milton-Keyes, England. I'm doing my own series of tapes as well, A.G.C. benefit tapes, first one out soon is called "Smash Promotion Exploitation".

NPWF: Are there any other projects that the members are working on? ADS: Me and Riley are going to start a war tax resistance campaign soon. Wron's in Naturecore. Matt's into jamming music all the time. I hope to start an activists' bust fund soon as well.

NPWF: Any future plans?

ADS: We'll be starting to do a mass of gigs again throughout California and hopefully a mini tour in the USA.


