



POD: So, do you want to talk about the DMZ closure or anything like that?

STEVE: No, the DMZ is history for the moment. So long as this club is happening, why should we waste our time. Why should we try to compete with something we're not trying to break up in the first place. We've got a happening here, leave the happening here. Once this place closes up then we'll get something going.

POD: So there will be nothing for you then opening wise?

STEVE: No, we'll just be doing all age gigs. All age gigs in halls so you don't have to deal with the cops, you don't have to deal with i.d., you don't have to worry about liquor licenses, you don't have to put up with any bull-shit. Its great because everybody gets to come.

POD: Is there a lot of problems with that, like opening it up?

STEVE: There's no money in hardcore. Most people who go to hardcore, especially when they're paying heavy bucks to get it in, are broke and even afford to buy a fuckin' beer. Of course, the management sweats that out because they got 500 people in their bar and they make themselves fuckin' two grand for the night and they-get really pissed off and after a while it adds up, and the bills aren't getting paid and they fuckin' kick the hardcore haps out. STEVE: It's true. It's really true. But thats why the whole deal with under-age gigs are the best. Because, less overhead, and as long as you have an alright p.a., you can do whatever you want. Bars are alright.

POD: But band wise. Aren't they gonna be assholes because "we're not getting paid enough" or whatever?

STEVE: Yeah, but in the under-age shows, everyone makes money, especially the bands. Always. Its really good. You see, when you play at a club, there's such thing as regulars who don't pay a cover, but there's no regulars at a hall. Everybody pays. And the bands end up making much more money than they would playing at some sleazy bar. Bars like Larry's Hideaway, which happened to fuckin' rip us off two weeks ago. They said that they weren't going to pay us, so they decided to call the cops. Seven cruisers came in, tried to bust us, and impound our truck with all our equipment so that we couldn't play any gigs. Then they gave us \$112 for a Saturday night fuckin' gig. They're history. Good-bye Uncle Fred. Good ol' Fred. Uncle Fred.

SCUM BAG: He said something about giving the bands a break. He said he supports hardcore. (laughter)

STEVE: Well Fred's a fuckin' asshole and he won't be booking any more hardcore gigs and by the time the Crucifucks come around this bar will be closed and hopefully they'll play in an all age hall with us. We want to play with them.

POD: You put on some shows yourself. Did you find it enjoying or was it like just a big pain in the ass and stuff?

STEVE: Both. Both. It's a big pain in the ass and I like doing it. Its something to do. It gives everybody something to do. All the way through. We have somebody making posters, we've got people putting up posters, we've got people talking around the club, we've got people who put up money to set the whole thing up. So, it all goes. BunchoF effort.

POD: Do you want to bring up the election thing?

STEVE: Nah, that's history too. Except that I will run again next time there is a municipal election. 8% of the vote for \$190.

POD: Are you ever going to quit with the election or what?

STEVE: Yeah, when I get the job. Wouldn't you like to make forty grand a year for straightening out your street.

POD: Do you think you'll ever get the job?

STEVE: Yeah. Of course.

POD: You don't think that there's a bias towards a punker, eh?

Everyone else wa just there for the money and you know. Nobody had any valid points in their election campaign. Like I had about fifteen to twenty valid points. POD: What about playing. You guys play a lot of gigs now, practicing.

STEVE: Yeah, the Quoc Te mostly. We played Larry's two weeks ago, we're playing the El Mo next week, we're playing here in about a month.

POD: So what about records, are you going to be recording soon?

STEVE: We've already got the three songs on the Jonestown comp and we should be finishing our demo pretty soon. 18 songs. We don't know what we're going to do with it, but we'll have it.

POD: Are you going to try to put an album out on your own or what?

STEVE: Oh yeah, yeah. That's the idea. The album's the idea. Let the people make the tapes, why sell them the tapes.

POD: You guys are probably the best band in Toronto right now.

STEVE: No, we're not the best band in Toronto, we're the funniest band in Toronto, because we're so serious.

POD: In the summertime, you guys were a lot of mixed media stuff.

STEVE: Yeah, we'll play with anybody, anywhere. Yeah, we play with bands like Alto Moda. We play with rock-a-billy bands and psychedelic bands. You name it, because we'll play with anybody, play anywhere, we'll do anything that's a joke.

SCUM BAG: We'll even play Pizza Nova.

STEVE: Yeah, that's our next one, Pizza Nova.

POD: When did you guys originally first start out?

STEVE: We were all pretty drunk and someone asked us if we wanted to put a band together and do a gig, so we did it. But it's a completely different band now. It's just me and the drummer from the original, so it really doesn't matter. We're not really a band, we're more like a... more like an institution. We're not just a band. We have basic philosophies that we live by and everybody who hangs around us basically lives by those philosophies, and its sort of like a big family type thing.

POD: What are some of your philosophies?

STEVE: Well, its basically quite simple: don't lie, don't steal. And don't fuck up on your obligations, because how many real responsibilities are there in life, not many. So its quite easy to keep your act together.

SCUM BAG: What's there to lie about? There's nothing to lie about.

STEVE: What's there to steal that somebody wouldn't give you if you asked them for it. Nothing. You lie and steal and you'll die. Why steal a pack of smokes when you can say "hey man, can I have a smoke?" It all comes back in the end.

POD: OK, whose your favorite band, the generic question.

STEVE: The Crucifucks. Fear. Fear the way they were. Old Fear.

POD: Have you played outside Toronto?

STEVE: Montreal.

POD: How did they take it there?

STEVE: I don't know, I was too drunk. They said it was good. We were a big hit there because the beer was cheep that night. They loved us.

POD: You've been labeled a violent punk.

STEVE: That's right. What can you do? I don't care. As long as I don't go to jail, what do I care.

POD: What do you categorize yourself as?

STEVE: A person. Overly defensive bordering on offensive. Put it this way; it's better to stop a problem before it gets out of hand. I don't believe in fighting if that's what you mean. If someone is going to fuck around with me, I'd rather smack him to the ground and finish it off in a second so that I don't have to fight, because I don't like fighting.

Carloads of Torontonians ventured out into the dismal depths of Detroit last May 24 to see the Surfers along with the Laughing Hyenas, Killdozer and Scratch Acid. POD: Is promoting hardcore in Toronto tough?

DON: The Bridge is very co-operative. You get the odd person trying to scam their way in, but I'm pretty wise to that now. A neat scam was five guys came in and tried to tell me they were the roadies of Son's of Ishmael. Didn't quite cut it.

POD: Is there any competition between the promoters?

DON: No. Two-Neat Guys just started so their not into the thick of things yet. Between Jill and I, I don't think so. We always try to talk to each other about what shows are coming, and we try to avoid each other as much as possible because there is no way I want to back the same weekend as she does because the money just isn't there. People aren't that rich. She repeats for me for what I do, she doesn't think I'm a shit promoter because she dumped all her shows when she was going with Black Flag to S.F. And I respect her for what she does, and she puts out alot of great shows. The only difference is I charge lower door prices.

POD: What's your views on the Toronto scene?

DON: Well, I went across Canada with Hype on tour. There's some good scenes out there, but I think T.O. is second to none. The west and Montreal seem to think we're a bunch of poseurs. And that's bullshit. Toronto's a fucking really good scene, we're getting a good reputation for paying the bands well, and we're going to see alot of really big bands coming through. And we shouldn't take a second to anyone. We've got the best scene in Canada and we've got a better scene than most American scenes. From what I hear them American bands -- they like it!

POD: Any last words?

DON: Aah, I don't know...I'm actually a nice guy. Trust me!

How did the Montreal show go?

Those people there, they were just like .. real dead, they just kind of stood there. I don't think they got the whole point. They just clapped and yelled after every song. I think they might have been scared of us because we were really far away. And as the set progressed, they got just a little closer closer and closer, and you know...it was just kind of dead.

Musically, were you pleased with the show?

Oh yeah, we were great. They sucked, not us. It was really weird because in Boston it was total chaos. The audience's energy level was really high and when we got to Montreal, like I said, the people there were just yelling and screaming. It was just really weird.

What do you think of this place? (KPM) You are the first real hardcore band to play here.

I love it. But who knows? We may be the last hardcore band to play here too.

Lyrically, your songs seem to feal with subjects that one may find in horror movies. Are they of any influence to you?

That may have been true for the Misfits, but even then, it was just something to base a song upon. It's not true for Sam Hain at all.

Where fo you get ideas from now?

Everything. Things I'm interested in. Life, my views on life (which sucks), my views on the world. All of the people in it aren't worth a shit.

What about musical influences?

Just everything I like. Things I come into contact with, orce you start seriously writing a song, you get to a point where it's totally you, and not your influences any more. All the little things that brought you to that point become you, and that happened a long time ago for me.

Do you think that you stand agert from other hardcore groups:

Ve're not a hardcore band. A lot of hardcore fans like us and metal reorle and all of that shit. I lly dont care who comes to see us as long as they come. I dont want to draw any lines and say that "you aren't cool, so youcan't come to our shows." Anybody who can turn on to our stuff is welcome to our shows. I think classification is stupid. The whole idea of doing

this type of music is to turn on as many people as possible to alternative music. That's what it is, to get people to become aware that them's other stuff out there. That means getting as many people interested as you can. You don't have to listen to that other shit. That's what it's all about.

What kind of music do you listen to?

Horror sound tracks, and I listen to Elvis. Lerie listens to a lot of Elvis, Foetus, and stuff like that.

What about Canadian bands?

We don't hear about many of them down in America.

When you were forming SamHain, what were you looking for in other members?

parallel ideas ... It was just basically Kerie and me who had the idea to from the band even when the Misfits were together. We were both really unhappy with our situations. It worked out really well.

Do you find you get asked to do a lot of Misfits material?

what we play anyway. It's basically my stuff I wrote those songs. It's just that the Misfits recoreded them, that's all.

"Legacy of Brutality" just came out. Can we expect any more stuff to be released?

We can't wait.







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
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"...we'll be touring England soon and they wanted to hear our most recent stuff and our live stuff, but that thing was done a couple of years back. We had to get something out in Europe, we didn't have anything out there. We would've done something later, but we were pressed for time, so we used the best stuff we had. The thing is also we thought there was only going to be four live songs and it ended up to be seven whatever, but I don't think it was done to par, I think that we could have done better. I think it should give England an idea what we sound like..."

"...Great, great, totally fun. He's a great guy, great inspiration, he's done a lot of good for a lot of people and he's done a lot of good for us. He's a good friend, and to sort of narrow it down, he's a very very busy man but if you can nail him down to work him, do it. He's a total inspiration. Ian's always in the studio and he's always doing something with somebody different..."

"...I like producing a lot. I think it's a lot of fun but I've learned a great deal too. It's sort of a weird thing because I'm listed as the producer on the Youth of Today record, which I'm not, I didn't produce it, and what was suppose to happen was that they went out with this guy, a friend of mine, and we were suppose to remix it before the release, and they put my name on the cover before we got a chance to remix it, and the release the record..."

"...Molson Golden, yeah, everybody always talks about that stuff, so it must be good. I'm sure that if I drank beer it would probably drink that, I guess..."

"...The thing is that in the last couple of days we have come to the conclusion that the smallest places we play tend to be our best shows, and like when its tight and hot and packed and cramped then we usually pull really good shows. We've played the bigger places, its just that, I think that they're good shows and the audiences are incredible, maybe we just don't play enough of them so we feel out of place. It's really weird seeing a sea of faces and you can't even read what their T-shirts say. We've only played maybe ten of those type of shows in our whole seven years of existence..."



"...We've gone hungry and we've decidenthat we would make our lives this thing. I mean, we eat and sleep and drink anyway so why not travel and make the best out of it that we can. We're not living high on the highway or anything and we still struggle but it's worth it because the feeling is the best. If I had a job, and my last job was driving a cab ten hours a night, seven nights a week, and if I do that then I can do it forever. I'll still be a cab driver when I'm forty years old and I don't want to do that when I'm forty. And I want to be on stage, not break my neck or anything, but feel good and proud with what I've done with my life and never regret anything or at least not a whole lot..."

"...yeah, any type of violence in the scene for sure sucks, and like that's what we're mostly about. We try to stop it anyway possible, even if it means personally breaking up a fight..."

"...to try to think for yourself, and that's very cliche and stuff and a lot of people like to shout it around and a lot of people make fun of, but it's very important to me to be able to come out and exercise the option that I want to with my thoughts, and we try to encourage that, encourage people to look within themselves instead of always trying to pin the blame on everything because I've done that a lot in my life and I see where that gets me. It gets me in a corner screaming at a wall, and it's a lot more enjoyable to be able to scream at other people and to have them scream back and get some crushing down around me..."

"...The main message is to always try, even though everything else may be fucked up, keep going. It's hard, but it's possible. You got to do it for your own sake if for nothing else..."

"...not really, not really, other than just the fact that the way people talk and stuff. I think it's pretty much the same everywhere. The only difference we noted was the way things look. It's really different for us. I mean everything down to a can of soda pop is like 'What the hell is this?', and your money confuses the hell out of us. Funny money..."


"...Actually there seems to be a more of, but maybe not, at least from the people we talked to, seemed to be more relaxed and not so uptight, seems to be a more, I don't know, articulate sort of, it's cool, I like it. we did the whole western coast and Montreal and Toronto and we had a great time and everyone was very hospitable..

"...The I.A. scene is great. It so big and so intense and crazy, and you can't imagine four thousand or five thousand punks being in one place. It's just not possible. There is bad gang violence and stuff, and we're totally against the gang stuff, and I can't even see what for the reason there is, gangs..."

"...I still love the fast hardcore stuff, I love U2, we love classical music, some of us, not me, like metal stuff. I like soul, I like funk and stuff. Everyone in the band likes so many different things and different types of music, its almost good that all those infuences don't come out because if they did, we would be wacko, we'd be crazy. The thing is, I don't think that speed is what determines a great band. I like to hear speed like Dag Nasty, a fast band, they're so great, and they do so much with their speed, and others like Youth of Today. There are so many bands it doesn't matter whether they're fast or slow as long as it has some sort of spirit or something. I think it's great..."

"...last year when went out there, there was a lot of confusion with the promoters and help people and we didn't make the show at CBGB's with Agnostic Front and there was all this hassle. There was a big bunch of crap and stuff. We went there last year and we played two shows and it was great, with a great response. Everyone was right into it and everyone was very supportive. This year, the support was definitely there, but the place we played at was like a huge theatre and it was so big and so massive, so rock concert-like. I don't know if it was us or if the crowd wasn't ready for the new stuff. There was a good response except that there wasn't any warm feelings and sometimes I got the feeling people were being sort of polite..."

"...In a practical way, when we're at home we live the best way that we can, we try to share rent and stuff, and we make do. We live better on the road because we're playing every night, actually we live a hell of a lot better on the road than at home. We help eachother and watch eachother and stuff. I realized this time around, we went through someone to help book our east coast thing because we wanted to have it a bit more organized, because tours in the past have been flaky and stuff, the fact that we get a place to play is great but also the fact a lot of things we didn't know about like tour prices being amazingly high on the east coast, and that's something that is getting really scary because it looks like all over the place door prices are more, before they were really cheap but now it seems that you can't get into a bigger show for under twelve bucks. Places like Reno you can still get in for about for bucks, and even that's kind of endangering the scene. I think it's really sad. It's a good thing that we've kept going for so long and all of a sudden we're paying ten or twelve bucks. I've paid it and it's not really fun and for people who can't afford it, it's definitely

"...I'm along the same lines, the same sort of feelings, if I have something to say then I'll speak out. We're all individuals in the band but we all care all on the same lines, even though we have our own ideas and things..."

"...We see all kinds of bands. It's hard for us because where we live there's no clubs or no hall or anything, so if we want to see some bands, we kind of have to put them on ourselves. "...We keep personal journals of our tour and we write in the bands we see and the people we meet. We love to see bands and meet people so any chance we get we go out and do it. It changed my life..."
