TIRED OF WAKING UP FIRED

The Diodes, who came to life two years ago in the basement of the Ontario College Of Art in Toronto, played their Farewell (To Canada) concert in that same cellar on the night of January 26. Two weeks prior to this swan-song, Epic Records Of Canada, who signed the quartet to an exclusive recording contract in August 1977 and released their two singles and album, dropped The Diodes because, according to the company's director of artistic development (?) Joe Owens, "The band has not lived up to its potential in terms of the market we'd originally envisioned for it in this country".

Those on The Diodes' side of the fence insist that Epic was totally inept at promoting and marketing Diodes discs, and the poor sales which resulted were Epic's fault, not the band's. The Diodes also claim that their latest release, last summer's "Tired Of Waking Up Tired" single, received favourable critical and sales reaction in both England and California. Nevertheless, Epic recently scotched a proposed American West Coast tour which could have nicely capitalized on "Tired Of"'s

success there because, again according to Owens, CBS Records Of America, Epic's parent company, did not deem The Diodes' album suitable for Stateside

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However, the band are, despite break -up rumors Diodes insiders report are being generated solely to help clear the band from its contracts with Epic and their Canadian management firm Franklin House, currently preparing to relocate in London, determined not to let their British acclaim pass unexploited. Negotiations are now underway between the quartet and CBS of England who may possibly issue in the U.K. the second Diodes LP, completed many months ago but also judged by Epic to be unsuitable for North American release.

Cruelly left high and dry in the Diodes Vs. Epic conflict is the band's long-time champion and publicist Ralph "Bomp-de-Bomb" Alfonzo, who told PIG last week, "My last name is spelled A-L-P-H-O-N-S-O. Please make a note of it and spell it right in the future. In case you've been wondering why I haven't been too co-operative, that's why. If you can't even spell my name

right, it's obvious you can't do a lot of other things right either. I don't like the nasty things you print about me, especially since they're not true and you get it second-hand from Steven "Mr.Gossip" Davey. In the future, practice good journalism and check things out before printing dumb things. Just because THE PIG PAPER's a fanzine is no excuse. And what's even harder to believe is you're writing me letters saying what a great guy I am! Fuck Off! I've been putting out fanzines since 1970. I don't have to prove anything anymore. You still got to prove your credibility".

THE MUSIC DIED 20 YEARS AGO

MASON CITY,IOWA FEB.3 1959 (AP) - Three rock'n'roll singers whose records and appearances have stirred millions of teen agers were killed early today in a plane crash near here. The four-place chartered craft carrying the trio and their pilot crashed within minutes after taking off in light snow from the Mason City airport. The victims were Buddy Holly, 22 years old, of Lubbock, Texas; Ritchie Valens, 17, of Los Angeles; J.P. (Big Bopper) Richardson 24, of Beaumont, Texas; and Roger Peterson, 21, of nearby Clear Lake, Iowa, the pilot. The troupe with which the singers had appeared had played before about 1,100 teenagers and their parents at the surf ball-room in Clear Lake last night. The Beachcraft Bonanza, chartered from the Dwyer Flying Service here, was to take the three singers to Fargo, North Dakota in advance of the troupe's engagement there tonight. The others went by chartered bus.

IMPORTS, a mild-mannered record distribution business based in the Toronto
suburb of Mississauga (coincidentally,
also the Home Of PIG) has today very
much expanded, and given birth to a
proud off-shoot: BOMB RECORDS, one of
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This tough little up-start label, mockingly named in tribute to its inspiration, Stiff, is the brainchild of exiled Englishman Flying Phil Lubman. Its dual purpose since its inception eight short months ago has been not only to release domestically recordings previously available in Canada only as P.J. imports, but record the wealth of predominately Toronto newave talent that has yet to be recognized (let alone distributed) worldwide.

Bomb's first two releases dating back to Summer 1978 are examples of this something old/something new policy: The albums are Bomb #104.5:
"SHAPES OF THINGS", a collection of vintage selections by THE YARDBIRDS available previously on the English label Charly, and the debut release by fellow Britains-in-exile "THE BATTERED WIVES". Both LPs were enthusiastically received here in Canada, and the Wives record is now grabbing international

raves. Last fall saw long-time Canadian ex-Wacker and ex-Dude BOB SEGARINI become Bomb's second local signing, and his titilizing "GOTTA HAVE POP" album resulted. And when Toronto's prized new wave venue The Horseshoe Tavern held its punk-studded goodbye bash last December, Bomb was there recording the preceedings. This month, THE EVERGLADES, THE SECRETS, THE MODS, CARDBOARD BRAINS, THE UGLY, DRASTIC MEASURES, and THE SCENICS will be featured on the audio document of that farewell, to be entitled, after the concert itself, "THE LAST POGO".

Also due in the coming weeks from Bomb, according to their under-assistant promo man (and ex-DJ: see PIG PAPER \$8) have Daddy Cool Booth, is a 45 by TRUE CONFESSIONS, in which former members of The Curse croon The Shangri-La's immoral "Give Him A Great Big Kiss", a limited-edition "SEGARINI ON THE RADIO" album, and from the re-issue department, a half dozen LPs of European progressive rock and, in the first fruits of Bomb's merger with Greg Shaw's Bomp label, "THE BEST OF BOMP" album, with cuts by a clump of acts featuring IGGY POP, 20/20, and the luvly FLAMIN GROOVIES.

"Basically, we're still building a catalog", explains Booth. "And I can assure you that lots of rock's coming".

Better Late Than Never seems to be the style regarding TEENAGE HEAD, the Hamilton, Ontario quartet who have consistently fallen behind their newave contenders during the past two years. Recording being no exception; but at last, Frankie, Gord, Steve and Nick are about to bless us with their long-waited debut IP.

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
The album, to be titled (after much discussion) "Teenage Head", has a mid-February release date on Epic Records Of Canada, according to the band's mentor Paul "Kash" Kobak of Teen Agency fame. It will contain ten selections, all T.Head-authored, including their Summer '78 near-hit single "Picture My Face" b/w "Tearin Me Apart" plus such time-tested stage faves as "Top Down" and "Lucy Potatoe".

Kobak, who prayfully does not forsee a Diodes Relationship between his four-some and Epic, hopes to secure British release for both "Teenage Head" and the single which will be issued in its wake (most likely a cover of the Beach Boys classic "Be True To Your School").

And then what? Rash quickly snapped "A British tour by June or July. Then riches and fame".

the list above!); subsequently, the novelty (and most often quality) is diminishing in general. Toronto's most visible acts have been picked up by the
WeCan'tIgnoreItMuchLonger major labels (well, their Canadian subsiduaries),
and what results is watered-down mush on the whole. The Ugly's surprisingly
scorching 45 is the sole item of the above which captures the vibrancy and
fun of 'home-made" rock'n'roll. No Toronto newave recordings have been officially released outside of Canada, though negotiations are now underway
which should release in Britain the forthcoming blodes and Teenage Head LPs.
The top independent Toronto labels (the late Dishes' Regular label and, of
course, PIG Records) have set up quite effective worldwide self-distribution
schemes nonetheless, and are at the moment negotiating for foreign licensing

Forgotter Rebels, and True Confessions. Demo-tapes are under construction

From deep within the fabled PIG Archives, we've unearthed this relic from the Spring of '77: back when safety pins were still in (cheeks and noses mostly) and Glen Matlock was still a Pistol. It's the flyer which was pasted all over Toronto in the dead of night advertising that the basement of the Ontario Liberal Party headquarters had mysteriously (and briefly) become Canada's CBGBs: the aptly-christened Crash'n'Burn club. For its grand kick-off bill, the CBB imported The Nerves from the sunny south (who just happened to be in the neighbourhood - but, alas, where are they now?) and, fresh from the local art college, The Original Diodes (from L. to R.: John Korvette, now in Johnny's G-Rays; John Catto, before he discovered hair bleach; Paul Robinson, still pretending to be in Ian And The Zodiacs; Ian Mackay, before he learned bass; and John Hamilton, before he joined The Secrets). Ahh, those were the days, right? Remember how we danced all summer? Unfortunately, with fall came the eviction notice and, well, there hasn't been a bonafide Toronto punk club since. Tough tooshie, isn't it?
