flis might be understood as boing merely a natural display of modeaty. But the Roosevelt family talks about everything: Nothing seems to be sacred as far as domestio problems are concerned. Divorce scandals, profiteering scandaks, money-making enterprises indulged in by Eleanor Roosevelt and the children, seem to cause them no ansiety or chagcin. Eleanor Foosevelt in her column Jas discussed everything from the mating dates of the household dogs on up to how much an American girl should drink. She has advooated the intimate and social intermixture of black and white. She bas entertained Communists in the White House. She has addressed, encouraged, and inspired practically every left wing, pro-Stalin, pro-Commonist organization in the United States. The Roosevelt sons have indulged in all the more crude forms of conduct necessary to establish themselves as brazen extroverts. Framklin, Jr, while in Paris, squirted cham. pagne in a diplomat's face. Elliott obtained air passage priority, in timo of war, for a dog belonging to his second wife (an actress) at it time when it was necessary to leave military personnel strandod in order to care for this dog belonging to the wife of a 'prince,' In the midst of a blare of trumpets the Roosevelt daughter, Anma, divoroed the father of lier children and remarried. The anties of the elder son are too mimerous to mention. As a manipulator of high finance, he has been more successful than his brother Elliott, although neither ever missed an opportunity to use their father's power to turn a good deal for themselves.

Along with everything else, Franklin, Jr, who would like to step into his father's boots, marvied a DuPont. Johin, the youngest son, has been the most retiring mem. leer of the family.

John Roosevelt's secret is little known. While the

President and his wife Eleanor were shoutine for war, their youngest son was a conscientious objector. He believed that the war was mmecessary, that it could have been avoided, and that it was precipitated by the lovers of war. He refnsed at first to enlist or to serve in any military capacity whatsoever: Finally, under pressure from lis mother, ha accepted a military post in the South Seas with the understanding that at no time would it be neosssary for him to take a life or engage in combat. Chieago secreted in the Presidential ear on the railroad tracks in the submebs, and there manipulated and prilled the wives. It was on this oocasion that he uttered the much-publicized statement eoncerning the choice of a Vice-President : "Olear it with Sidney."

Some were shown in private previews. A few of the best ones were shown to the public, but even they porfrayed the President as a haggard, broken, palsied man.

The conservatives, inclading the Southern Democrats, believed that Roosevelt was going to die, and although they had suffered Henry Wallace to stand in second place at other times, they could not swallow even the thought of his ever becoming President of the Thited States. The elimination of Byrnes, the defeat of Wallace, had thrown the convention in Chicago into the land of the professional politicians in the North and the conservative Democrats in the South. Against Roosevelt's wilh, Truman was the choice.

Warm Springe, Gcorgia, had beeu the vneation howe of Franklin D, Foosevelt before be was President, amil before he was even Governoy of New Yorlt. He and his boyhood pal Henry Mortenthau had hoped to make some money in Georgia raising rabbits, Later Ronsovelt developed infantile paralysis. In this condition bo fomd sume minor relief in bathing in the warm water at Werm Springs. Dltimately the Warm Spriage Foundation was formed. Millions and millions of dollars were raised for this Foundation. As of today, no ohild cau be admitted to the Warm Springs Sanitorium for less than between $\$ 10$ and $\$ 16$ per day.

Various stories have been told about the actual deatli of Ronsevelt. No details were made available to the publie. It is believed that when he died the only meuson with him wat a Russian artist, whose name was Elivabeth Shumatoff: The picture that fluis artist whs anking

There is no eye-witness to his death as far as publie conventional information is concerned. It is alleged that he was alone at least two hotirs. Some suy that these two hours of solitudo took place in the Little White House. Others say that he drove into the mountains and there requested that he be left absolutely alone.

There was no more money to spond, no blood to spill, no promises to make. The end had come.

The sonless mothers, the baukrupt rations, the legless vetorans, the battle dead, and the inevitable world ohaos remain as the monuments and the memorials to this man who wanted to rule the world and failed.

## NINE GHOSTS THAT HAUNTED FDR

Ghost No. 1; The Tyler Kent Episode. Among wellinformed students of contemporary history thore is no doubt that Franklin D. The Russians became suspicious of Kent, and because of this suspicion he became 'persona non grate' in Moscow. Ho was transferred from Moscow to London. He was followed to London by the Russiau scoret police. Here he was charged with the responsibility of interpreting and translating code massages sent by the United States to England. Late in 1938 and in 1989 young Kent bogan to see messages from President Roosevelt that alarmed him. He began to translate these messages for Wixston Churchill and others, only to dis cover that there was a deffnite program on tho part of Roosevelt to get us into this war, At that time Mir. Chambeilain was the Prime Minister. According to the cablegrams, Roosevelt wauted Ohumberlain ousted. Winston Churchill in his cable messages to Roosevelt is alleged to havesaid: "You and I eap rtile the world," Something like 1000 messages were exchanged under the shocked eye of this young American - Kent. He felt within his heart that treason was boing committed, that a great poople was being betrayed. When the messages first began to be exchanged, Churehill was not the Prime Minister; in fact, he had no right to these messages. Kent was furced to decide batween his technical duty and his pstriotic duty; He cliose the Iatter. He copied these messages and took them to his apartment. He did not know that he was being followed by the Russiau steret police. It is
helieved by informed and shrewd olisorsers that the Kussians copiod theso messages and sent them to Josef Stalim, who, even to this dar, has them securely locked in the Kremlin safe. It is believed that he nade it known to Mr. Roosevelf that he had copies of those messiges and used this fact as a bhageon over the liead of the ambitious President.

Kent had hoped to get copies of thege messages out of England in oriler that he might bring a report to suofi men as Cnited States Senator Bupton K. Wheeler, Lniter States Senstor Gevald P. Nye, and other courageous men who were ready to expose the truth to the Nation. Kent was inntuccessfic. Roosevelt ordered that he be fired. Later he was picked up on the street by the British secrof police and sentenced to seven years in a concentration camp ou the Isle of Wight. Tis trial was searet, and he was given little opportunity to defend limself. Gradually the truth concerning this young man began to leak out in the United States. He was kopt in this concentration camp for five years. A. ferv months ago he was returued to the United States. It was hoped that he would tell all. Howaver, shortiy after le amived, he was reminded indireetly by a representative of the State De partment that if he told what he knew he would be centenced under a new law to ten years in prisoll. It is believed that this new law was foreed through purposely by $\operatorname{FDR}$ in orden to prevent the truth from evev coming out conceming the secret eable messages hetween Rooserelt and his British con-conspirators,

The recent Pearl Harbor investigation, outside of a rather limited report made for the minority by United States Senator Ferguson of Miohtgan, was little more than a whitewash. It is still n mystery why they decided to have Long assnssinated in Baton Rouge, the capital of Louisiana. Suffice it to say, the plot was fulfilled, and on the 8 th of September, 1935, Long was shot by a young Jewish doctor by the name of liarl Weiss. Weiss was killed on the spot by the bodyguards. Long died two days Inter and was buried on September 12. Two himdred and fifty thousand people ittended the fumeral. Floral tributes covering two neros surpounded the grave. Every informed individual in Washington knew that Roosevelt desired the death of Hney Long, and it is believed by many who have evidenve to smpport their contentions that he cooperated with those who desired and precipitated the assassination of the only man who really ever threatened his power over the solid South.

Therefore, in Boston he made a complete, unconditional promise, io these words: "I say to you fathers and mothers again . . . and again . . . and nggin . . . your sous shall not be sent to die on foreign soil," This promise was the most hypocritical promise evor made by a man in the history of the wortd. Others, of course, had marle lyppocritical promises. Woodrow Wilson had heen electerl to a second terim because 'le kept us ont of War!' althongl before his first term was onded Le kney that we werd gome to wai. The thing that onade Roosevelt's promise hyper-hypoeritical was becauso he was the brost powerful tuan ori carth, and for him to be so noworfill nad know so completely that ho wanted wat and give this false encouragoment io the molhers and fathers of the Nation marked him as one of the most dithbolieal betragers of confidence the buman race bas ever known,
