Amongst the numerous inventions and ap-AMONGST the numerous inventions and sp-ipliances of modern times, lithography has deserved and obtained a high position. To lithography we owe not only the introduction of colour printing for the ornamentation of paper, show-cards, labels, boxes, &c., but it has been the means of multiplying the creations of the artist's genius, fresh from the master's own hand, without the inevitable

deterioration consequent on the intervention of the inferior skill and servile imitation of a copyist. Litbography has done much in diffusing a knowledge of true art, and society at large owes something to its discoverer and improvers; the greatest of which latter (at least in this country) we regret to say has lately passed away from the scene of his lahours.

With the skill, knowledge, and taste of a travelled and accomplished artist, Mr. Charles Hullmandel arrived in England from a continental sojourn of some years, and, in 1818,

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
