Dear Graduates,



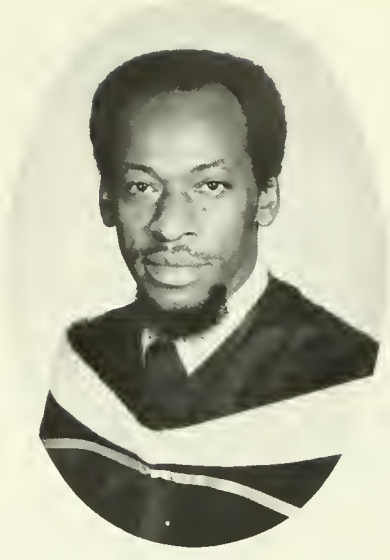

GENERAL STUDIES STUDENTS VISIT OTHER COUNTRIES TO STUDY HEALTH CARE SYSTEMS

General Studies students received college credit for studying the health care systems of Jamaica, West Indies (1979) and Cuba (1980). In April, 1983, students who enrolled in CHA 500-A, International Health Systems under Victor Brown, paid a health care fact finding trip to Jamaica, West Indies. This was made possible with the assistance of the Consul General and the Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Health. The visit provided participating students with cultural enrichment and enhanced their knowledge relative to the delivery of health care in that country. Students found the experience to be a successful, informative and quite educational medium which aided in learning about Jamaica, its inhabitants, and health problems.

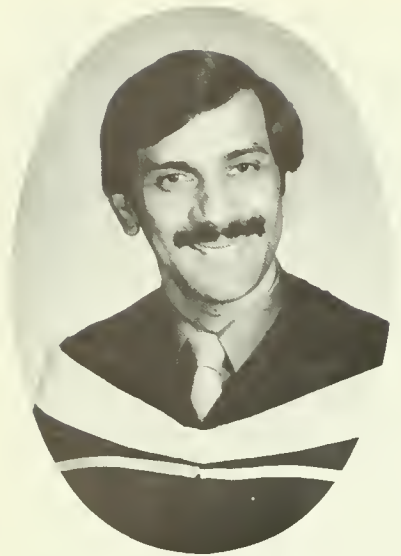

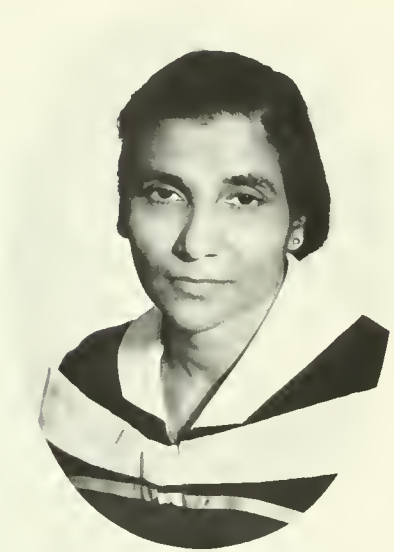
