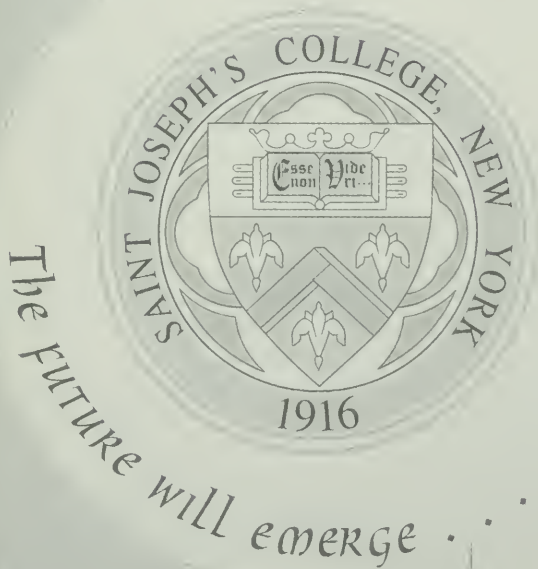

Dear Graduates:

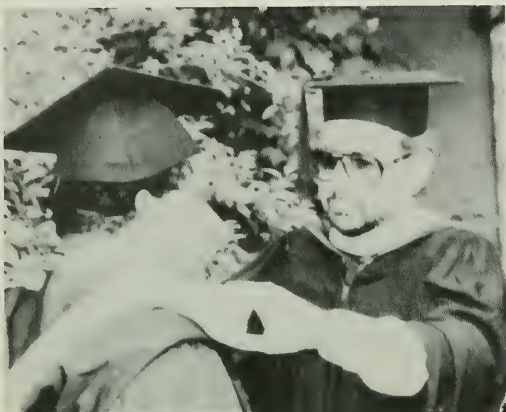
