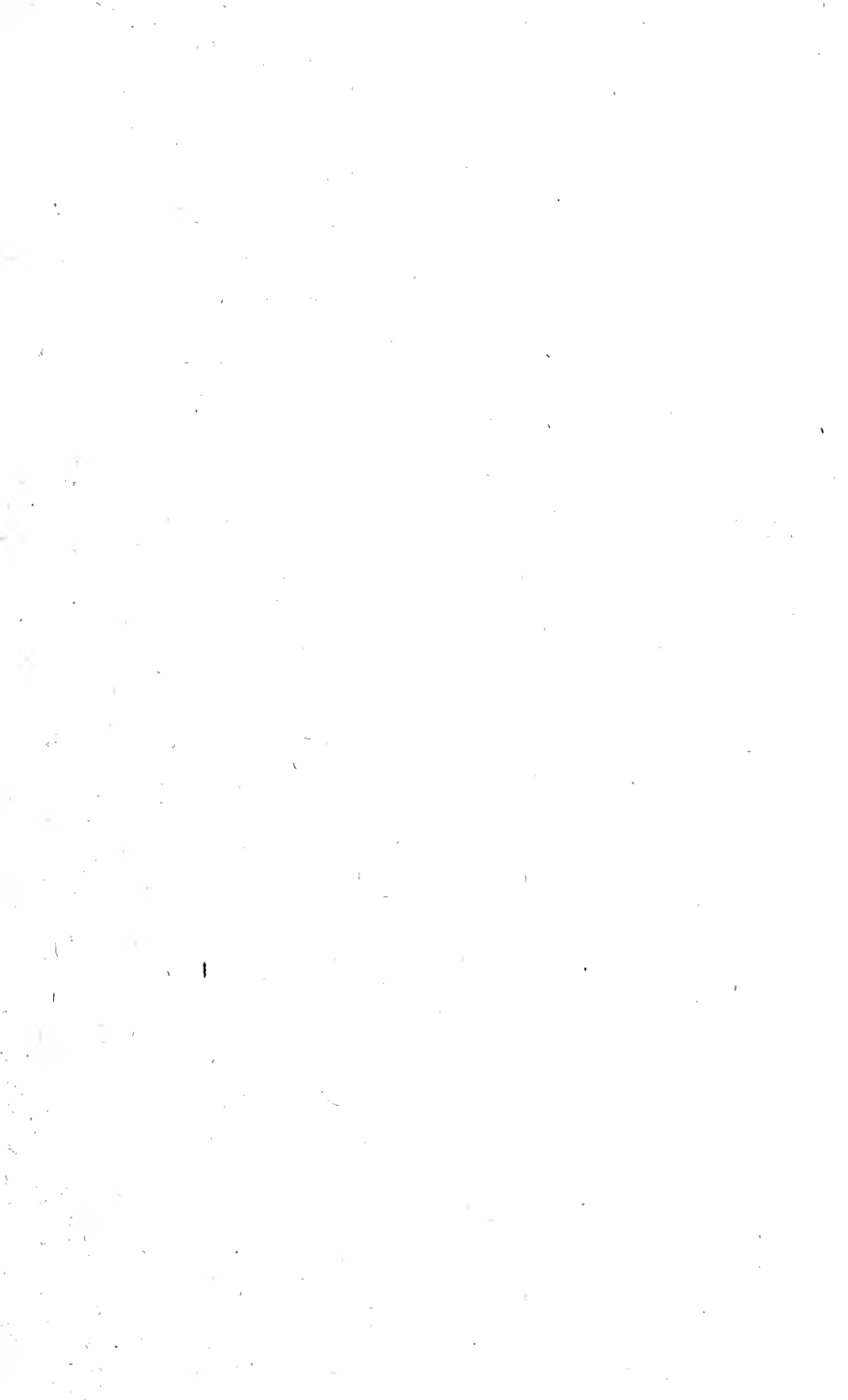

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*Twentieth Annual Meeting.*

## ACTS AND PROCEEDINGS

*Of the Synod of the Potomac of the Reformed Church in the United States at its Annual Sessions, in Martinsburg, W. Va., in the month of October, in the year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Ninety-two. The Sessions commenced on the evening of the eleventh and continued until the evening of the seventeenth day of the month, inclusive.*

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### ARTICLE I.

#### OPENING OF SYNOD.

The Synod convened in the Reformed Church of Martinsburg, Berkeley County, W. Va., on Tuesday evening, October 11th, A. D. 1892, at 7:30 o'clock, agreeably to appointment of the last annual meeting, and was opened with appropriate religious services. The opening sermon was preached by the Rev. C. U. Heilman, the retiring President, from 1 Cor. 4: 1, 2, "Let a man so account of us, as of the ministers of Christ, and stewards of the mysteries of God.

Moreover, it is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful."

At the conclusion of the sermon the Synod was called to order by the President, and formally opened with prayer. The Provisional Synodic Roll was then called, and a quorum was ascertained to be in attendance.

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## ARTICLE VI.

4. The Annual Reports of the Bi-Synodic Board of Missions, the Treasurer of Home Missions and the Report of the Secretary of the Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions were received and severally referred to the Standing Committee on Missions for further notice.

5. The Annual Report of the Publication Board of the Reformed Church was laid before the Synod and read, after which it was referred to the Standing Committee on Publication for consideration.

6. The Annual Report of the Sunday-school Board was presented to the Synod, read and disposed of without reference. It will be found in its proper place.

7. A number of communications were received and referred to the Standing Committee on Overtures.

## ARTICLE VIII.

## MINUTES OF SYNOD.

The reading of the Minutes of the last Annual Meeting publicly before the Synod was dispensed with, and the printed "Acts and Proceedings" of the last annual sessions of the Synod were referred to the Standing Committee on Minutes of Synod, to report such items of business as properly claimed the consideration of the present meeting of the Synod. During the session of Wednesday afternoon this Committee presented its report, which was received, considered item by item, adopted as a whole and is as follows:

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MINUTES OF SYNOD.

*To the Reverend Synod of the Potomac:*

Your Committee, to whom the Printed Minutes were referred for examination, begs leave, after careful inspection of them, to report the following items as claiming in our judgment, the notice and consideration of the present sessions of the Synod, namely:

*Item 1, page 7.* The usual Standing Committee on Ministerial Necrology is appointed, whose duty it will be to report to the present meeting of the Synod.

*Item 2, page 7.* The Standing Committee on Invested Funds is appointed, whose duty it is to report to this meeting of the Synod, of which committee Elder G. N. Forney is chairman.

*Item 3, page 37.* The Theological Professorship Endowment Committee is instructed to present a summarized statement of the contributions to the Endowment Fund to Synod, as soon as all the collectible pledges have been paid.

*Item 4, page 40.* The committee to raise funds to cancel the indebtedness of Mercersburg College is continued.

*Item 5, page 44.* A committee of conference is appointed to confer with similar committees from the Pittsburgh and Eastern Synods to secure joint ownership and control of the Institutions at Lancaster, Pa., to report plans, etc.

*Item 6, page 44.* A committee to act with similar committees from the Eastern and Pittsburgh Synods to select a location, collect funds and procure plans for the erection of a Seminary Building.

*Item 7, page 44.* A committee is appointed to confer with the authorities of the North Carolina Classis and of Catawba College in reference to establishing a Theological Department in said college, and report a plan for the consideration of the Synod, if satisfactory arrangements can be made with said authorities.

*Item 8, page 44.* It will be necessary to nominate for election by the Eastern Synod for the term of one year, four members of the Board of Visitors and six members of the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary.

*Item 9, page 44.* It will be the duty of Synod to fill by election the vacancies that are about to take place in the Board of Education, of those whose terms of office expire at this meeting of Synod.

*Item 10, page 44.* It will be necessary for Synod to elect three members of the Board of Regents of Mercersburg College, to fill the places of those whose terms of service will terminate during the present month.

*Item 11, page 59.* The Treasurer of Synod is directed to advance a certain amount to the Treasurer of the General Synod's Board of Home Missions for Harbor Missions, and the Classes delinquent in the payment of their apportionments for said cause are enjoined to pay their arrearages without further delay. In the same connection an error is pointed out by the Stated Clerk, showing that the amount not paid by the Synod on Harbor Missions apportionments is much less than claimed.

*Item 12, page 60.* It becomes the duty of the Synod to elect two members of the Synodic Board of Missions for four years, and one member for three years, to fill the vacancy caused by the removal of Rev. S. Z. Beam.

*Item 13, page 66.* Apportionments are made for Home Missions, Beneficiary Education, Church Building, Church Extension in Baltimore and Hungarian Missions.

*Item 14, page 66.* Assessments are made for Contingent Fund of Synod, Mercersburg College and Theological Seminary.

*Item 15, page 67.* Various arrearages are noted on apportionments and assessments for Contingent Fund, Contingent Fund of General Synod, Mercersburg College, Theological Seminary, Hungarian Missions, Harbor Missions, Beneficiary Education and Wichita College.

*Item 16, page 69.* It will be necessary to elect a member of the Synod's Board of Trustees to fill the place of Elder Edgar Slagle, whose term of office will end on the first of January next, agreeably to the charter.

*Item 17, page 72.* It becomes necessary to elect a member of the Sunday-school Board, to fill the vacancy that will occur therein, during the present sessions of the Synod.

*Item 18, page 75.* The Stated Clerk is directed to have two thousand copies of the Acts and Proceedings of the last annual meeting published.

*Item 19, page 79.* The Stated Clerk is instructed to prepare and issue a circular to the pastors of the Church, setting forth the objects and needs of the Society for the Relief of Ministers and their Widows of our Church.

*Item 20, page 80.* An evening of the present sessions of Synod is ordered to be set apart as an anniversary of said Society for the presentation of the object and claims of the Society, and the officers of the said Society are requested to arrange a suitable programme for said meeting.

*Item 21, page 81.* A committee is appointed to attend the unveiling or dedication of the monument erected to the memory of the late Rev. Dr. E. E. Higbee, at Emmitsburg, Md.

*Item 22.* It will be necessary for the Synod to make the sixth apportionment of five hundred dollars upon the several Classes for Church Extension in Baltimore city, in order to meet the pledge of the Synod, at Mechanicsburg, Pa., in 1887.

*Item 2.* A communication from Rev. J. G. Schmid, asking that himself and the other delegates of the Portland-Oregon Classis be excused on account of their inability from attending the present sessions of the Synod.

*Item 3.* A letter from the same, requesting aid for his work as missionary, in building a church in Astoria, Oregon.

*Item 4.* A communication from Rev. J. Muellhaupt, of Salem, Oregon, setting forth the condition of the congregation at Stockton, California, accompanied with certain requests.

*Item 5.* A copy of the resolutions passed by the Board of Trustees of Catawba College in reference to establishing a theological professorship in connection with said College.

*Item 6.* A communication from the Pittsburgh Synod with reference to the observance of the centennial of the autonomy of the Reformed Church.

*Item 10.* A statement of the condition and wants of St. Paul's Orphan Home.

*Item 11.* A letter from Rev. Prof. J. C. Bowman, who was appointed to convey to the Eastern Synod the action of last annual meeting, adopting certain recommendations concerning the transfer of the missions of the Bi-Synodic Board to the care of the General Synod's Board of Home Missions, stating that he had attended to the duty assigned.

The Standing Committee on the Minutes of Classes presented its report during the session of Saturday afternoon, which was received, disposed of item by item, amended and adopted as a whole. The report as adopted, is as follows:



## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINUTES OF CLASSES.

*To the Reverend Synod of the Potomac:* Your Committee on Minutes of Classes begs leave to present the following report. The Minutes of all the Classes for the past year have been placed in our hands. From these the following items have been obtained :

## I. IRREGULARITIES.

1. Zion's and Portland-Oregon Classes failed to call the roll before final adjournment.
2. Zion's and North Carolina Classes neglected to number the pages of their minutes.
3. Gettysburg Classis does not record the Treasurer's Report, nor a synopsis of it.
4. North Carolina Classis failed to make marginal references, and to affix the seal of Classis to its minutes.
5. In recording the dismissal of a minister, North Carolina Classis makes the record simply "request granted."
6. The same Classis fails to state whether a Treasurer was elected.
7. The same Classis failed to furnish Synod with copies of its special meetings.
8. Maryland Classis, in its minutes of a special meeting, fails to state that the meeting was held at the time and place, for which it was called.
9. The same Classis failed to read and approve the minutes at the close of the two special meetings held in Hagerstown and Cavetown.
10. Virginia Classis failed to furnish a copy of its minutes in accordance with the rules of Synod, namely, the full proceedings on legal cap paper, paged, and with marginal references.

## II. REQUESTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS.

11. Maryland Classis asks Synod to excuse it from the apportionment of \$91.00 for Church Building of last year.
12. The same Classis overtures Synod with reference to an omission in the Minutes of 1891.
13. North Carolina Classis learns with pleasure of the willingness of Synod to co-operate with it in establishing a theological department in connection with Catawba College, and authorizes the Synod to furnish an endowment for one professorship in said department.
14. Gettysburg Classis requests Synod to remit its arrearage of \$80.00 on Harbor Missions, and \$205.00 on Beneficiary Education.
15. Virginia Classis asks to be excused from the payment of apportionments for Home Missions, Church Building, Mercersburg College, Church Extension in Baltimore, and Harbor Missions.
16. The same Classis asks for a larger number of the copies of the Minutes of Synod.
17. The same Classis requests the Synod to secure an earlier publication of its Minutes.
18. The Carlisle Classis asks to be exonerated from the payment of arrearages on Mercersburg College, Theological Seminary, Hungarian and Harbor Missions and Beneficiary Education.

## III. APPEALS AND COMPLAINTS.

## IV. SUBJECTS REFERRED TO THE CLASSES.

19. All the Classes took favorable action on the subjects referred to them, except as follows :

Virginia Classis on all subjects except on apportionments as noted above under item 15.

Zion's Classis on all except on apportionments for Church Extension in Baltimore, Theological Seminary, and the request to patronize the publication interests at Philadelphia.

Maryland Classis all except as to the apportionment for Church Building.

North Carolina Classis assumed only \$250.00 of the apportionment for Home Missions, and nothing for Church Building, Mercersburg College, or Hungarian Missions.

20. Zion's, Maryland, Mercersburg, Virginia, North Carolina, Gettysburg, Carlisle, and Juniata Classes severally adopted the Constitution and recommendations of the General Synod for the formation of a Federal Synod of the Reformed Church in the United States and the Reformed Church in America, as referred to the Classes for approval or rejection. The Portland-Oregon Classis seems to have overlooked the matter.

Neeff, a graduate of the Theological Seminary at Lancaster, Pa., for examination with a view to licensure, begs leave to report, that the Committee has attended to the duty assigned, and his examination has been satisfactory, and the Committee recommends him to Synod for licensure.

On motion, Mr. Gottholdt A. Neeff was granted licensure to preach the Gospel, and having signed the Constitutional *Formula*, the Officers of Synod were instructed to furnish him with the proper Certificate of Licensure. He was placed under the care of the Maryland Classis.

## ARTICLE XII.

## STATE OF RELIGION AND STATISTICAL REPORTS.

The Standing Committee on the State of Religion and Statistical Reports submitted its report to the Synod during the session of Monday evening, which was received and adopted. The report is as follows, to wit:

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF RELIGION.

*Dear Fathers and Brethren:*

"It is very meet, right and our bounden duty, that we should at all times and in all places give thanks unto Thee, Lord God Almighty, Father, Son and Holy Ghost."

From the classical reports placed in our hands, we learn that we have great reasons for gratitude to the Great Head of the Church for the manifold evidences of His love, presence and help. And the Pastors have been enabled to continue their labors, and blessed results have crowned their efforts. While compelled to wage war against the great adversary; after the many bitter contests that have been passed through only under the leadership of the Great Captain, was it possible to go on conquering and to conquer. Some have been overcome, yet how many have been preserved and what numbers were won for Christ.

The *missionary* work has made some progress, and a number of Woman Mission societies, with Young Peoples' and Children's Bands, have been organized during the year, beside the Young Peoples' Society of Christian Endeavor, and chapters of the Brotherhood of Andrew and Philip, all having for their object the organizing of our young people for more effective work in the church.

With our educational system of religion we welcome this more earnest effort to set to work the young as they are gathered into the full communion of the church. Perhaps we have been too often satisfied when we had instructed them in the doctrines and duties of our holy religion, and confirmed them; forgetting that education is complete not when the intellect is instructed, but only when we have learned to put into practice what we have learned.

A number of beautiful and comfortable churches were built, showing a love for the sanctuary and a desire to make it a place where the Lord's people may be reminded of His presence when they come to worship Him in spirit

and truth. Others have been repaired, and yet others enlarged to make more convenient.

New *parsonages* were built and old ones repaired, showing what regard was had for the comfort of pastors and their families, and thus add another tie to bind pastors and people in a common church or congregational life.

New *missions* have been established at promising points in the bounds of several of the Classes, thus having a care for those who have removed from the bounds of their former church homes, and extending our fields of usefulness to new territories.

New *charges* have also been formed by dividing the larger fields, and enabling pastors to have a better oversight of the people committed to their care.

There is a call for more laborers in that part of the Lord's vineyard committed to our care. One Classis reports that out of its nineteen charges there were only six pastorates which remained unchanged during the entire year, of which some were without pastors for years. Such a state of affairs does great injustice to the vacant fields, and also interrupts the work of those who are called to supply them.

We are hopeful as to the future; for this same Classis has under its care now eight young men who are preparing for the ministry, and at its last meeting licensed three young men to preach the Gospel.

The *Sunday-schools* are made more and more the nurseries of the church, yet there are some who are not reached by the schools, which leaves room for enlarged work.

The sacrament of *Holy Baptism* has been faithfully administered; in only one report is there complaint that parents are negligent in bringing their children into covenant relation with the Lord, where nearly one-half are adult baptisms; while others express joy that there is such a general appreciation of the covenant relation, with all its duties and privileges growing out of it. Too much stress cannot be laid upon its necessity.

*Catechization* has been made more effective by parents sending their children for instruction for years before they made a public confession, and are received by confirmation. While the additions are not near so numerous as they are by some other systems, yet a fewer number forsake Christ and return to the beggarly elements of the world, where they are harder to reach than at first.

While some report that the communicants are more regular, yet a larger number have absented themselves from the Holy Communion during this year than formerly, which may be accounted for in part by the fact that so many charges were without pastors. Among the many who have fallen asleep in Jesus throughout our Synod during the past year, were a number of elders who were called from the midst of their duties while laboring for the benefit of their congregations, and encouraging the people by the faithfulness of their lives and works of faith, thus ending their conflicts with the great adversary, and entering upon the joys in store for the faithful soldiers of the cross.

The Rev. Cyrus H. Reiter was the only minister among our whole number who was asked to lay down his pilgrim's staff. He loved his Master, and with joy accepted every opportunity which presented itself to preach the Gospel of Christ after he was deprived of the privilege of serving a regular charge. He labored until almost the end of life; being suddenly called, he lingered only a few days longer in a state of unconsciousness before he took his departure. The officers and ministers of Juniata Classis, after suitable services, carried his body and laid it in the cemetery of the Reformed church at Marklesburg, Pa., where it now rests side by side with many of those to whom he ministered in holy things during a former pastorate.

Each annual meeting will add new names to this list, and soon ours will also be recorded here. What a summons to put forth our utmost efforts, for the

night of death approaches, yet with this will also come the blessed reward. Let us remember the admonition: "Be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life."

We may, and should, still rejoice in the blessed communion of all the saints, "wherein he giveth us also to have part," as they are now like a cloud of witnesses by which we are compassed about, and who continually behold us as we are engaged in the conflict, and we pray that the Great Shepherd may keep us in the faith, and at death we may enter into their joy.

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## ARTICLE XIII.

### EDUCATION.

The Board of Education submitted its annual report to the Synod during the session of Wednesday forenoon, which was received and then referred for consideration to the Standing Committee on Education. The report is as follows.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

*To the Reverend Synod of the Potomac:*

Your Board of Education begs leave, through its Treasurer, to submit the following Annual Report for the Synodic year just ended:

At the close of the last annual meeting of the Synod at Chambersburg, the members of the Board then and there in attendance, being a quorum or majority, met and effected an organization for the year by the re-election of the officers of the previous year, namely, Rev. W. C. Cremer as *President*, Rev. J. David Miller as *Secretary*, and Rev. Wm. M. Deatrick as *Treasurer*.

The good work of the Board has moved forward with an encouraging degree of progress, and we are happy in being able to report the past year as a prosperous one, under the benign favor of our gracious Heavenly Father. The young men under our care made commendable advancement in their various studies. A larger amount has been contributed by the several Classes for beneficiary education, during the past fiscal year, than in any former year of the Board's existence. Three of the beneficiaries, namely, Daniel G. Hetrick, Atvill Conner, Jr., and E. William Stonebraker, completed their theological course of training for the holy ministry in the Seminary at Lancaster, Pa., last May. The first named was examined and licensed by the Juniata Classis, whilst the other two were examined and licensed by the Maryland Classis. Mr. Conner was ordained by the Maryland Classis, and is laboring within its bounds. Messrs. Hetrick and Stonebraker were set apart to the work of the Christian ministry by the Juniata Classis, and are now serving pastoral charges of said Classis. Ira L. Bryner, of the Carlisle Classis, has withdrawn from the care of the Board as no longer desiring its financial support. Two young men have been taken under our care with appropriations at the request of the Juniata Classis, namely, George W. Beaver and Ross Wicks. C. Edgar Reber was enrolled at the request of the Mercersburg Classis, George W. Shellenger at that of the Zion's Classis, Urban C. E. Gutelius at that of the Gettysburg Classis, and Frederick Cromer of the Maryland Classis. During the year your Board has aided thirty-three young men with funds in their preparation for the holy ministry, supplied by the Maryland, Juniata, Virginia, Carlisle, Mercersburg, Zion's and Gettysburg Classes, as the Treasurer's

Report, constituting a part of this report, will show. The beneficiaries now on our list stand connected as follows: Maryland Classis, six; Juniata Classis, six; Zion's Classis, five; Mercersburg Classis, four; Virginia Classis, four; Carlisle Classis, four; and Gettysburg Classis, four. They are J. Philip Harner, Lewis T. Lampe, Homer S. May, and Paul M. Spangler, *Seminary Seniors*; Jacob S. Garrison, George S. Gill, Louis C. Harnish, Frank L. Kerr, Otto K. Spessard, and Louis C. Summer, *Seminary Middlers*; J. Calvin Bolger, Lewis P. Krome, and F. J. Emil Muebe, *Seminary Juniors*; William E. Bushong, Joseph S. M. Isenberg, C. Edgar Reber, Charles E. Wagner, Wm. G. Welsh, and David J. Wolf, *College Seniors*; Charles A. Bushong, Frederick Cromer, Urban C. E. Gutelius, Henry H. Hartman, Ezra D. Lantz, and Albert F. Nace, *College Juniors*; Amos T. Bennett, Frederick C. Satz, George W. Shellenberger and John N. Wolff, *College Sophomores*; and George W. Beaver, Moses A. Kieffer, Nevin L. Weidner, and Ross Wicks less far advanced in their studies.

The Treasurer of the Board thankfully acknowledges the reception of the following amounts during the fiscal year ending on the first of the present month, for beneficiary education, omitting the dates of payments into the Treasury, and summarizing them where there have been two or more contributions from the same charge or church, and also including the amounts from Sunday-schools, where such have given, so as to give the sum total contributed by each pastoral charge respectively, except in the cases of the Virginia and Gettysburg Classes, where the sources of the receipts were not furnished. The amount accredited to the Third Reformed Church, of Baltimore, was contributed by the Brotherhood of Andrew and Philip, of that congregation. Sixty-four dollars and fifty cents of the sum placed to the credit of the Woodberry Church, of Baltimore, were refunded to the treasury of the Board by its pastor.

And here the inquiry may very properly be made, why others who have been liberally assisted in their preparation for the sacred office by funds furnished by the Church, through your Board, and who are in pastoral charges paying good salaries, should not commence the duty of refunding, and thus save the Synod, in part at least, from making the heavy apportionments for beneficiary education that have become necessary from year to year. Of the many thousand dollars furnished to former beneficiary students of the Board since the present treasurer has been in office, the foregoing case is the only one where even a beginning has been made at refunding.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF MERCERSBURG COLLEGE.

The Board of Regents of Mercersburg College presented their annual report to the Synod, during the session of Wednesday forenoon, which was received and then referred to the Standing Committee on Education. The report is as follows :

*To the Reverend Synod of the Potomac:—*

The Board of Regents of Mercersburg College begs leave to present to your reverend body the following annual report :

The Board, at the annual meeting last June, at Mercersburg, organized by the re-election of the officers of the previous year, to wit: Rev. W. M. Deatrick as *President*, Rev. T. F. Hoffmeier as *Secretary*, and E. J. Bonbrake, Esq., as *Treasurer*. An Executive Committee was appointed according to the requirements of the charter, composed of the aforementioned officers of the Board, *ex-officio*, and Rev. W. C. Cremer and Elder S. Hoeflich.

The educational work of the college has been conducted during the past year the same as for ten years previous, by the Rev. Dr. Aughinbaugh, without involving the Board in any expense or debt, according to the directions of the Synod in 1880, at Woodstock, Va. At the opening of the present session in the college, the teaching force was very materially changed, but not deteriorated by said change.

Three young ladies completed the prescribed course of study in the Female Department of the College last June, and were granted diplomas to that effect by the Board. Four young men were fitted to enter the Sophomore Class, and entered other institutions of learning, one of them having been admitted into the Theological Seminary at Lancaster, Pa.

The Board thankfully acknowledges the reception of \$339.29 through the Treasurer of Synod towards the College indebtedness and accrued interest thereon. Since the last meeting of the Synod, between eight and nine hundred dollars of the principal of the debt has been cancelled, and the interest of the debt paid up to last April. An endowment fund has been invested amounting to \$625.00.

The Board held an adjourned meeting in Chambersburg, Pa., June 28th and 29th, at which there was a full attendance of the members of the Board, when, after prolonged discussion and prayerful consideration, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted, namely :

In response to the deliverance of the Synod in 1891, on the subject of Education in connection with Mercersburg College, the Board of Regents of Mercersburg College would respectfully submit the following :

WHEREAS, the Synod of the Potomac at its annual sessions in Chambersburg, Pa., in October, 1891, made certain requests of the Board of Regents of Mercersburg College, with regard to the management and course of study in said institution, so as to command the better patronage and influence of the entire Synod, and also to make a better provision for female education within the bounds of the Synod ; and,

WHEREAS, The Synod has also pledged its moral and financial support in any reasonable effort to secure the above end ; therefore,

1. *Resolved*, That provision be made to carry students to the end of the Sophomore year in the regular College course.

2. *Resolved*, That provision also be made for Liberal, Literary, Scientific, Normal and Commercial Course.

3. *Resolved*, That a liberal course of studies be provided for young ladies.

4. *Resolved*, That the Preparatory Building and property shall be thoroughly repaired and fitted for a ladies' school.

5. *Resolved*, That the College or Seminary Building be also thoroughly repaired and made comfortable and inviting for the male students.

6. *Resolved*, That both be comfortably heated with modern appliances.

7. *Resolved*, That the necessary apparatus be provided for the different departments, so that more efficient work can be done in the Institution.

8. *Resolved*, That this plan shall be put into operation with the opening of the Fall Term of 1893.

9. *Resolved*, That we ask for the sum of ten thousand dollars to make these necessary improvements, besides what may yet be needed to pay the remaining indebtedness.

10. *Resolved*, That the endowment of thirty thousand dollars, already commenced, be completed as speedily as possible.

11. *Resolved*, That to facilitate the raising of funds, and thus enable our Church to keep abreast with the general spirit of education, we ask the Synod to have in an especial manner the need and importance of this matter laid before all our people, so as to prepare them for more free and favorable responses to the call to be made upon them.

12. *Resolved*, That we respectfully submit the foregoing plan to the Synod for its approval.

13. *Resolved*. That we ask the Synod at its next annual meeting to be held at Martinsburg, W. Va., to direct one evening to be set apart for the consideration of our educational work.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF VISITORS OF THE THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

*To the Reverend Synod of the Potomac:*

*Dear Brethren:*—As Secretary, the undersigned hereby respectfully presents to your honorable body the annual report of the Board of Visitors of the Theological Seminary for the year 1891–1892.

The Seminary was opened in September, 1891, under encouraging auspices. At that time the following young men were enrolled on the list of students as members of the Junior Class: *Charles F. Althouse, Harry N. Bassler, D. Franklin Boomershine, Charles W. Brugh, John W. Buck, George S. Butz, J. Silor Garrison, George Samuel Gill, Louis P. Goerrig, Louis C. Harnish, Ellis S. Hay, John D. Hunsicker, George Kinso Kaneko, Frank L. Kerr, Thomas H. Leinbach, Edwin D. Meirell, Christopher Noss, John W. Reinecke, Charles M. Smith, Otto K. Spesard, D. Snider Stephan, Louis C. Summer and J. Grant Walter, twenty-three in all.*

Of this number fourteen are graduates of Franklin and Marshall College; three of Heidelberg College; one of Catawba College; one of Calvin College, and of the remaining two, one had received his preparatory training at Ursini College, and the other at the State Normal School at Bloomsburg, Pa.

The Middle Class, numbering twenty-two members, consisted of those who constituted the Junior Class as named in our report one year ago, without any changes.

The members of the Senior Class, fifteen in number, having completed the course of study prescribed by the Synod, and having, moreover, sustained a satisfactory examination in the presence of the Board of Visitors, were dismissed at the end of the seminary year, and awarded the usual Testimonials to that effect at the Anniversary of the Seminary in May last. Their names are as follows: *Henry H. Apple, Albert B. Bauman, Atwill Connor, Charles E. Creitz, Daniel G. Hetrick, William Mann Irvine, U. Oliver H. Kershner, Charles E. Schaeffer, Isaac M. Schaeffer, Andrew H. Smith, George B. Smith, E. William Stonebraker, Simon U. Waugaman, Gotthold A. Neeff and Frederick A. Rupley.*

Of this number seven will be able to officiate both in the German and English languages.

Thus there were sixty students in connection with the Seminary during the year 1891-1892, which shows a considerably larger number in attendance than there was during any previous year in the history of the institution. Such evidences of progress go to indicate that as the wants and necessities of the Church increase the Lord is providing for us a more plentiful supply of ministers of the Gospel to enter vacant fields at home and abroad.

The instructions in Elocution under Prof. Silas S. Neff, Principal of the School of Oratory in Philadelphia, supported by a corps of able assistants, has been satisfactory, and, as it is believed, highly useful to the students. The Board, together with the Faculty, are therefore of the opinion that the present arrangement should be continued for another year, or until a more permanent arrangement can be made for the College and Seminary, to take its place. Should the three Synods so decide, it will devolve on the Synod of the Potomac to pay over to the Treasurer of the Seminary \$75.00, the same as last year, to meet the necessary expenses thus incurred.

The Board has the pleasure of informing the Synod that the endowment of a prize essay in Church History was completed during the year by voluntary contributions amounting to \$2,000 for this purpose. A distinguished friend of the Seminary proposed to give \$1,000 for this object, provided an additional amount of \$1,000 should be contributed by other friends of the Seminary. The full amount was made up in Dec., 1891, without any difficulty. Thereupon the Faculty decided that the interest of this fund should be awarded as a prize each year to that member of the Senior Class who, in the judgment of the Faculty, shall have attained to superior excellence in Church History, and written the best essay on any previously assigned topic in Church History in the judgment of the Faculty or of three competent examiners. Said prize shall be called "The Schaff Prize in Church History."

Further, it affords the Board much satisfaction to be able to say that the class of 1892, which completed the regular course of study last spring, offered to establish a prize in Sacred Rhetoric by paying the interest of \$500 to the member of the Middle Class who in the opinion of three judges writes the best sermon. "The prize is to be awarded on the ground of Christian truth and the literary finish with which the sermon is prepared." This proposition was accepted, and the thanks of the Board extended to the class.

The Board has endeavored to discharge its duty in its supervision of the Seminary during the past year, and it is happy that it is once more able to report that it is in a prosperous condition. The professors have endeavored, as we believe, to perform their duties in the fear of God as teachers of His word. As it regards the conduct of the students, and their industry in their studies, there is no room for complaint. Satisfactory evidence of their progress was given in their examinations, which were creditable. Generally they are active in Sunday-schools, in missionary societies, in prison visitation, and assisting the pastors in the city churches. During the year there was a large demand, perhaps too much so, for their services from pastors and vacant charges outside of the city of Lancaster. These were rendered as freely as the claims of their regular duties would allow.

In conclusion, we wish to add that the growing prosperity of the Seminary and of our other institutions at Lancaster is most truly a matter which should call forth sincere gratitude to God throughout all our churches. Founded in great weakness yet in faith by the fathers, they are becoming more and more fruitful each year in supplying our vacant congregations and missionary fields with faithful, well-equipped ministers of the Gospel.

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REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The Standing Committee on Education, to whom the foregoing reports had been referred, reported during the session of Saturday afternoon, which was received, considered item by item, amended and adopted as a whole. The report is as follows:

Your Committee on Education begs leave to report, that they had referred to them the Annual Reports of the Board of Education, the Board of Regents of Mercersburg College, the Board of Visitors, and the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary at Lancaster, Pa., the tract or booklet of Rev. Prof. J. C. Bowman on the "Needs of the Theological Seminary," and the Catalogue of Franklin and Marshall College for 1891-92.

From these reports your Committee learns that the work of Christian education, during the past Synodical year, has been vigorously prosecuted, with the most encouraging success. All of the institutions are in a prosperous condition. In Franklin and Marshall College proper there were 126 students, in the Academy 74 students, 61 males and 13 females, and 60 students in the Theological Seminary, making a grand total of 260 students—more than in any previous year.

The Board of Visitors of the Theological Seminary reports that fifteen of the students have completed their theological course, and have gone out into the work of the ministry, and are doing good work in filling up the ranks of those who fall in the ministry, and of our vacant congregations. The Board of Visitors requests that this Synod provide \$75 00 of the salary of the Professor in Elocution in the Seminary.

From the report of the Board of Education we learn that thirty-three beneficiary students have received aid during the past year, and have conducted themselves well, and have made commendable progress in their studies. The receipts of the Board during the fiscal year were \$4,294.97. The disbursements were \$4,051.47, leaving a balance of \$243.50 in the treasury.

From the report of the Board of Regents of Mercersburg College we learn that the work of the College has been carried on successfully, without involving the Synod in expense. The effort at reducing the debt of the institution has been carried forward to the extent of nearly one thousand dollars, and would

have been more successful, if the policy of our educational work had been fully defined, and all the members of Synod had worked harmoniously to this end.

We recommend the adoption of the following action, to wit:

*Resolved*, That the tract of Rev. J. C. Bowman on the Needs of the Theological Seminary at Lancaster, Pa., be commended to the pastors and elders of this Synod, and that they be requested to have it circulated among the congregations of the Synod in such a way as may be deemed best.

*Resolved*, That this Synod rejoices in the progress of our educational work, and that our pastors be earnestly requested to present the claims of our educational interests in all its departments, so essential to the life and prosperity of our beloved Reformed Zion to their respective congregations.

*Resolved*, That the request of the Board of Visitors be granted, and the sum of \$75.00 be referred to the Committee on Finance to be apportioned upon the several Classes.

The action of the adjourned meeting of the Board of Regents of Mercersburg College last June was referred to a special Committee for consideration, consisting of Revs. S. N. Callender, J. S. Kieffer, T. R. Dietz, P. M. Trexler, G. B. Resser, W. C. Schaeffer and Elders S. N. Hench, W. A. Pence and A. Heberlig, with instructions to report at the opening of Monday morning session. At the time designated, the committee presented the following report, which was received and adopted, namely:

Your Committee to which was referred the consideration of the general interests and provisions necessary for the well-being of Mercersburg College, beg leave to report:

That, after hearing a further expression of opinion on the part of persons interested in the wise resolution of the questions relating to this College, your Committee endeavored to consider the whole subject with an earnestness and care which were felt to be due its grave importance. There was but one opinion as to the indispensable importance of suitable provision for the education of the sons and daughters of our church within the bounds of the Synod of the Potomac. We were impressed with the fact that notwithstanding the limitations and embarrassments under which the institution has labored for the last several years, its management has been successful not only in largely abating its disabilities, but at the same time in contributing a service in the maintenance of the cause of Christian education within our bounds, by no means inconsiderable, but at once valuable and thankworthy. It was felt with unbroken unanimity that it would be gravely unwise to abandon, or in any way to impair the vantage ground we now hold in Mercersburg, without any superior or even equal advantages within reach. And yet it was felt that some changes ought to be made to widen the reach and enhance the efficiency of our School.

After a free interchange of views, and a careful balancing of the views submitted to our consideration, your Committee unanimously concluded to recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

*Resolved*, That the Committee now in existence, to solicit means for the liquidation of the remaining indebtedness, be instructed to vigorously press forward the work of providing means for the extinguishing of the remaining debt, and also to secure such additional means as may be necessary to put the Seminary Building in a suitable and presentable condition.

*Resolved*, That one or both of the residences in the Seminary campus, as may be necessary, be utilized for the accommodation of such female students as may be in attendance upon the instructions of the College, as long as they may be needed.

*Resolved*, That the Board of Regents be advised to sell, if it can legally be done, and upon terms wise and judicious, the Preparatory and adjacent buildings and grounds.

*Resolved*, That a committee of five be appointed, whose duty it shall be to make inquiries to ascertain where a suitable location may be found, what inducements and grants, etc., can be secured for the establishment of a Female College, south of Mason's and Dixon's line, with a view of transferring the female department of Mercersburg College to that place. It being clearly recognized by this Synod that the establishment of such an institution is at this time an urgent and keenly felt necessity.

Revs. E. R. Eshbach, C. S. Slagle, Elder H. J. Seibert, Gen. John E. Roller and Wilford H. McCardell were appointed the committee called for in the last resolution of the foregoing report.

During the session of Monday afternoon the subject of beneficiary education was referred to a special committee, consisting of Rev. J. A. Hoffheins, T. F. Hoffmeier, and Elder C. A. Shultz, for consideration.

At the evening session, the committee reported as follows, which was received and adopted, to wit :

Your special committee on Beneficiary Education offers the following as its report :

1. That the several Classes be earnestly urged to raise in full the apportionments made for the present Classical year.

2. That all our beneficiary students be placed under the care of the Board.

3. That the Classes hereafter examine the applicants for beneficiary aid that apply to them, and if they be found worthy, recommend them to the Board, and the Board shall determine whether they shall be aided, and to what amount, reserving to the Classes the right to say where the student shall pursue his studies.

4. That the Beneficiary Bond of each student shall be made to and held by the Board.

5. That the Board hold a meeting annually after the meetings of the Classes, at which it shall act upon the applications made, and determine the amount required for the ensuing year, which amount shall be apportioned by the Synod upon the Classes, and paid into the Treasury of the Board as a common fund, from which all the beneficiaries shall alike be paid.

6. That the sum of \$4 200.00 be referred to the Committee on Finance for apportionment at the present session of the Synod.

The committee to collect funds for the liquidation of the debt resting upon Mercersburg College submitted the following report, which was received and adopted, and the committee continued, to wit :

Your Committee, appointed to collect money for the payment of the debt resting on Mercersburg College and increase its efficiency, would report that we have made special efforts in only three congregations during the Synodical year, and have received in cash \$317.26, which has been paid over to the Treasurer of the College.

Had we made a canvass of the charges of the Synod, which we might have



done (could we have secured the permission of the pastors), we would no doubt have secured the funds for the payment of the whole debt, and probably more. But as the Synod, at its last annual meeting, requested the Board of Regents to arrange a course of study, and prepare such further improvements, in order that the wants of the Church would be more fully met, we waited for its action, which was delayed until a little more than three months ago, when it was again made subject to the approval of this meeting of the Synod. We feel assured that should the Synod come to such conclusion as will meet the wants of the Church, and will have the hearty support of pastors and people, that we will be able to commence our work at once, and bring you a very favorable report by the end of this coming year, not only of the debt being cancelled, but also many of the improvements made and paid for.

The committee on the Seminary Professorship Endowment submitted the following report, which was received and adopted, and the committee continued.

*To the Reverend Synod of the Potomac:*

Your Committee on the Seminary Professorship Endowment begs leave to report, that during the year a few of the still delinquent subscribers have made good their pledges. There still remain however, a few such pledges in small amounts outstanding. In view of this fact the Committee would suggest that Synod urge upon these delinquents full and prompt settlements of the claims made upon them, that the account may be closed during the present Synodical year.

The committee, appointed a year ago, to act in conjunction with similar committees of the Eastern and Pittsburgh Synod, in selecting a site for the contemplated Seminary Building at Lancaster, Pa., &c., reported progress, and was continued, the Synod withdrawing its restrictions of last year in regard to the plans of said building being submitted in advance to this Synod.

The following report was received from the joint committee of the three Synods appointed a year ago to secure joint ownership and control of the Theological Seminary and Franklin and Marshall College at Lancaster, Pa., on a just and equitable basis.

REPORT ON JOINT OWNERSHIP OF THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY AND FRANKLIN AND MARSHALL COLLEGE.

*To the Eastern, Pittsburgh and Potomac Synods :*

FATHERS AND BRETHREN:—The joint committee of the Eastern, Pittsburgh and Potomac Synods, charged with the work of formulating a plan according to which such changes in the Charters of the Theological Seminary and Franklin and Marshall College at Lancaster, Pa., may be made, as shall give to these three Synods the joint ownership and management of said Institutions, beg leave to offer the following report :

Two meetings of the Committee were held.

1st. A preliminary meeting in Salem Reformed Church, Harrisburg, Pa., October 23d, 1891, at 5 o'clock, P. M., at which the following members were present, viz.: From the Eastern Synod, Revs. E. N. Kremer, T. O. Stem and Elder John W. Bickel; from the Pittsburgh Synod, none; and from the Synod of the Potomac, Revs. C. Clever, D.D., C. Cort and Thos. J. Barkley. Rev. C. Clever, D.D., was chosen president *pro tem.*, and Rev. T. O. Stem, secretary *pro tem.* After some conference, it was resolved that the committee adjourn to meet in the College building at Lancaster, Pa., on Monday of Commencement week, June 13th, 1892, at 3 o'clock, P. M., and that the Secretary *pro tem.* notify all the members of the Committee of this action at least four weeks prior to the time of meeting.

2d. The second meeting was held at Lancaster, Pa., as per adjournment of the preliminary meeting, June 13th, 1892, and the two following days, the committee adjourning from time to time until the work was completed; some of the sessions being held in the College building, and others in the lecture-room of the First Reformed Church. The following members were present at this meeting, viz.: From the Eastern Synod, Rev. S. G. Wagner and Elder D. S. Keller; from Pittsburgh Synod, Revs. Wm. Rupp, D.D., D. B. Lady and C. R. Diefenbacher, D.D.; from the Synod of the Potomac, Revs. S. Clever, D.D., C. Cort, D.D. and Thos. J. Barkley. The committee organized by the election of Rev. S. G. Wagner, D.D., Chairman, and Rev. D. B. Lady, Secretary.

The business with which the Committee was charged was carefully considered, both at its sessions and by means of correspondence. The results of the Committee's deliberations are embodied in the following resolutions, which are recommended to each of the three Synods represented for adoption :

1st. *Franklin and Marshall College.*

*Resolved, 1st.* That the ownership of the property of Franklin and Marshall College at Lancaster, Pa., and the management of the Institution be vested, as heretofore, in a Board of Trustees consisting of thirty persons, to be held in trust for the Eastern Synod, the Pittsburgh Synod and the Synod of the Potomac of the Reformed Church in the United States, and to be carried forward

in their interest; and that the charter of the College be so changed as to give to the Eastern Synod the right of electing twelve, the Pittsburgh Synod three, and the Synod of the Potomac six members of the Board of Trustees, the remaining nine members to be chosen by the Board itself; the term of office of said Trustees to be, as heretofore, ten years.

*2d. The Theological Seminary.*

*Resolved, 2d.* That the ownership of the property of the Theological Seminary of the Reformed Church in the United States at Lancaster, Pa., be vested in a Board of Trustees consisting of eighteen laymen, to be held in trust for the Eastern Synod, the Pittsburgh Synod and the Synod of the Potomac of the Reformed Church in the United States, to be managed by them in the interest of these three Synods; and that the charter be so changed as to give the Eastern Synod the right of electing nine, the Pittsburgh Synod three, and the Synod of the Potomac six of such Trustees; the full term of service of such Trustees to be six years, but of those first chosen by each Synod under this arrangement, the term of one-third shall be only four years and one third only two years.

*Resolved, 3d.* That there be, as heretofore, a Board of Visitors consisting of twelve ministers six of whom shall be elected by the Eastern Synod, two by the Pittsburgh Synod, and four by the Synod of the Potomac of the Reformed Church in the United States, who shall perform the duties of said Board as designated by the three Synods interested, and as set forth in the articles of incorporation; the full term of service of said visitors shall be four years, but of those first chosen by each Synod under this arrangement, the term of one-half shall be only two years.

*Resolved, 4th.* That vacancies occurring from time to time in the three Professorships existing prior to the year 1890, shall be filled by the Eastern Synod, subject to the approval of the other two Synods. Professorships endowed since the year 1890 by any particular Synod shall be filled by such Synod, subject in like manner to the approval of the other Synods; in the case of the trial and discipline of Professors of Theology, as provided for in the Constitution of the Reformed Church in the United States, the authority and action of the Synod having control of any particular professorship shall be final as regards the case of the incumbent of such chair.

In case any Synod or Synods refuse to approve the election of a professor of theology, a committee of conference, consisting of three members from each Synod, shall be appointed, who, after carefully considering the case, shall report their recommendations to the Synods represented for their action; but no election of a professor of theology shall be final until the approbation of all the Synods controlling the Seminary has been obtained.

*Resolved, 5th.* That all endowment funds of the Seminary be held by the Treasurer of the Corporation, but that the account of each of such funds be kept separate and distinct from all other funds, and that the income thereof be applied to the particular purpose for which it was created; should any Synod at any time withdraw from this compact, the particular endowment fund or funds raised by such withdrawing Synod shall be returned to it.

The officers of the joint committee, with Elder D. S. Keller, were appointed a committee to revise the report and present it in due form to the three Synods at their approaching annual meetings. It is the opinion of this sub-committee that it will devolve on the Eastern Synod, in case the recommendations made by the committee are adopted by the Synods, to secure such changes in the charters of the two Institutions involved as will give effect to the legislation enacted.

The special committee, appointed last year, as stated in item 7 of the Report on Minutes of Synod, submitted its report, which was received, amended, and then adopted, as follows :

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE TO CONFER WITH THE AUTHORITIES OF THE CLASSIS OF NORTH CAROLINA AND THE TRUSTEES OF CATAWBA COLLEGE, IN REGARD TO THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THEOLOGICAL INSTRUCTION IN CONNECTION WITH THAT INSTITUTION.

The Committee appointed at the meeting of the Synod of the Potomac held at Chambersburg, in October, 1891, for the purpose of conferring with the Classis of North Carolina and the Trustees of Catawba College, in regard to the matter of establishing (as had been proposed and requested by said Classis and Trustees) a Theological Department in connection with Catawba College, at Newton, N. C., would respectfully present the following report:

The Committee proceeded at as early a date as practicable after the adjournment of Synod, to perform the duty which the Synod had imposed upon it. Having received word that a special meeting of the Classis of North Carolina had been appointed to be held at Newton, on Tuesday, November 17th, at 2 o'clock, P.M., the members of the Committee presented themselves there at that hour, and were kindly welcomed by the members of the North Carolina Classis there assembled, constituting a majority of the members of that body, and including, as we understood, a majority, also of the Trustees of Catawba College. To these brethren the Committee extended the salutations of this Synod, and reported the action of the Synod in regard to their request, viz., that the Synod had recognized the reasonableness of the request; had expressed its willingness to co-operate with the Classis and the Board of Trustees in the matter of organizing theological instruction, should that be found practicable in connection with Catawba College; and had appointed us as a committee to visit them for the purpose of ascertaining their wishes more definitely and making report as to what should seem wise and proper in the circumstances.

In the conversation and discussion which followed, there seemed to be entire unanimity of opinion as regards, not merely the advisability, but the absolute necessity for the preservation of our foothold as a Church in North Carolina, of making provision for the imparting of theological instruction within the bounds of the North Carolina Classis. The beginning, it was conceded, would of necessity be a humble one; a single professor at first who might be assisted to some extent by those professors in the College who are ministers of the Reformed Church. With such apparatus it was thought that it would be possible to give their young men seeking to prepare themselves for the ministry, not such theological training, indeed, as is furnished by our older Seminaries, but such instruction as regards the Bible and the way to use it, with outlines of Church History and Dogmatic and Pastoral Theology, as might, for the time being, meet the wants of the case. Having such general plan in view, three resolutions were eventually presented by a member of the Classis, the first of which expressing the earnest desire of the Classis for the establishment of theological instruction in connection with Catawba College, pledged the Classis, in case of the establishment of a theological professorship, to contribute the sum of two hundred dollars annually towards the support of said professor; while the second, having reference to a movement for the endowment of the professorship, signified the willingness of the Classis to raise \$5,000 towards the endowment of it provided the Synod should raise \$10,000. These two resolutions were adopted. The third resolution was to the effect that the Professor of Theology was to be elected by a vote of two-thirds of the Trustees of Catawba

College, the election to be confirmed by the Synod of the Potomac. This was felt by members of the Classis to be necessary, because of the charter of the College which requires that all its Professors shall be so elected. The Committee of Synod, however, stated that such an arrangement would not be possible, because by the constitution of the Church, the interest of theological instruction is committed entirely to the Synod, theological professors being amenable to the Synod and eligible only by it; on which account the Synod would not be able to concede the election of such professors by another body. The Committee explained, also, that such Professor, if elected, would not be properly speaking, a Professor of Catawba College, but that the organization of theological instruction in connection with that institution would be, in effect, the beginning of a new institution,—an incipient Theological Seminary, which, it was intended, should find lodging, for the time being, within the bosom of the College, and, if possible, some assistance from its Professors, until, in the course of time, if God's blessing should rest upon the movement, it should come to have an independent existence with proper accommodations and resources of its own. There would thus be no violation of the charter of the College, since it was not proposed to elect a member of its Faculty; the question being simply one on the part of the Synod, of seeking to provide for the welfare of its Churches in that quarter by organizing theological instruction, and, on the part of the Classis and the College, of favoring and assisting to the best of their ability such effort.

It not being possible at that time to arrive at agreement in regard to this question, or at least the members of Classis present feeling the need of further and more careful deliberation, it was finally moved and carried to lay the whole matter on the table until the next regular meeting of the Classis. Thus the errand of the Committee came to an end without any conclusion being reached at that time.

We have been informed, however, that the question was duly considered and acted upon at the next following stated meeting of the Classis of North Carolina; and that it was then nearly unanimously resolved by the Classis to request the Synod of the Potomac to organize theological instruction in connection with Catawba College in such manner as may be required by the Constitution of the Church.

Such are the facts in the case. As the result of their visit and conference, the Committee would report that in their judgment the Synod was right, one year ago in expressing its sense of the reasonableness of the request of the Classis of North Carolina to have theological instruction established within its bounds. To do this seems feasible; the more so because of the flourishing institution of learning already existing there. It seems, also, a necessity, if our Churches in that region are to thrive and prosper. The distance and the expense are too great for candidates for the ministry from the Churches in that region to be educated at the Theological Seminaries of the North. It is justly complained of that of the young men whom they do send to the North to be educated, some fail to return. There seems to be here a legitimate want to be supplied, as also an opportunity for the beginning and carrying forward of a beneficent work by this Synod.

The Committee, therefore, in order that a beginning may be made, recommend the adoption of the following action:

*Resolved*, That this Synod undertake the work of establishing and supporting theological instruction in connection with Catawba College, at Newton, N. C.

*Resolved*, That the Synod pledges the sum of one thousand dollars for the support of a Professor of Theology, to be paid annually for five years, less the amount which may accrue from any endowment fund that may be gathered.

*Resolved*, That steps be taken at once to secure a permanent endowment of

twenty-five thousand dollars, that a committee of three be appointed to mature plans for raising this fund, and that the committee report to the next meeting of Synod.

*Resolved*, That the sum of one thousand dollars be apportioned among the Classes, and that so soon as that amount shall have been secured, the Synod proceed to elect a Theological Professor to have charge (with such assistance as may be possible from said institution) of the work of such instruction.

The Committee called for in the third resolution consists of Revs. C. U. Heilman, W. C. Schaeffer and Elder G. L. Freet.

Revs. S. N. Callender, A. H. Kremer, E. R. Eschbach and J. G. Noss were nominated as members of the Board of Visitors, and Elders Edgar Slagle, S. Nevin Hench, George N. Forney, Israel Laucks, Jacob Heyser and H. Wirt Shriver as members of the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary, at Lancaster, Pa., from this Synod for election by the Eastern Synod, for the term of one year.

At the election for members of the several Boards of the Synod, held during the session of Saturday forenoon, Revs. W. M. Deatruck, J. W. Santee, and W. Goodrich were elected members of the Board of Education, for the term of three years; and Rev. W. C. Cremer, Elder A. R. Schnebly and Rev. J. B. Shontz were chosen members of the Board of Regents of Mercersburg College, for the period of three years.

The following persons constitute the Board of Education, and the Board of Regents of Mercersburg College, at the present time, namely :

BOARD OF EDUCATION: Revs. W. M. Deatruck, J. W. Santee and W. Goodrich, for three years; Revs. W. C. Schaeffer, T. F. Hoffmeier and J. A. Hoffheins, for two years; and Revs. W. C. Cremer, J. D. Miller and T. J. Barkley, for one year.

BOARD OF REGENTS: Revs. W. C. Cremer, Elder A. R. Schnebly and Rev. J. B. Shontz, for three years; E. J. Bonbrake, Esq., Rev. C. U. Heilman and Elder S. Hoefflich, for two years; and Revs. W. M. Deatruck, T. F. Hoffmeier and E. R. Eschbach, for one year.

## ARTICLE XIV.

### MISSIONS.

The Annual Reports of the Bi-Synodic Board of Missions and of the Treasurer of said Board, and the Report of the Secretary of the Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions were severally referred to the Standing Committee on Missions for consideration. The Committee presented its report during the session of Saturday forenoon, which was received, considered item by item, amended, and then adopted as a whole. As such, it will be found subjoined in its proper place. The several Reports are as follows :

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS FOR 1891-92.

*To the Reverend Eastern Synod and the Reverend Potomac Synod :*

DEAR BRETHREN: The Board of Missions of the Reformed Church in the United States, representing the Eastern and the Potomac Synods, present their

report for the year ending October, 1892. The Board having held two special meetings during the year, and circumstances making it difficult to secure a quorum for an annual meeting at the usual time, this report has been prepared and adopted by the Executive Council.

The Synods will notice that this report differs from those of former years, lacking their details and statistics and giving only a general view of the work. This is owing to the fact that the yearly report of General Synod's Board now in a large measure takes the place of our report, with all necessary details and statistics.

The most important act of the Board during the year was the transfer of all our missions to the management and control of the General Board, in accordance with the action of your reverend bodies a year ago. Your Board met the Executive Committee of the General Board in Altoona, Pa., in January, 1892, and in joint conference with them agreed upon the details of transfer which are as follows:—

- 1.) The transfer to take effect April 1, 1892.
- 2.) All missions outside the bounds of the Eastern and Potomac Synods to be transferred absolutely, this Board retaining all pecuniary claims that we hold against said missions.
- 3.) The missions within the bounds of the Eastern and the Potomac Synods shall report to Superintendent Whitmer, who shall transmit these reports with his recommendations to the General Board through the General Superintendent.
- 4.) Money for home missions raised by apportionment on the Classes within the bounds of the Eastern and the Potomac Synods shall be sent to Treasurer Seibert, who shall make monthly remittances to Treasurer Santee.
- 5.) This Board shall hold its legacies and trust funds, and shall control the use of its Church-building Funds.
- 6.) The Eastern and the Potomac Synods shall nominate the Superintendent of their own territory, said nomination to be referred for election to the General Synod or to the General Board as the case may require.
- 7.) This Board and Executive Council shall meet as heretofore.
- 8.) Superintendent Shuey to be retained until October 1, 1892, the General Board fulfilling our financial obligations to him.
- 9.) The General Board is requested to send a representative to the annual meetings of this Board.
- 10.) The Bi-Synodic Department of the *Missionary Guardian* to be discontinued.
- 11.) The General Board shall fulfill our obligation to the German Board of the East for \$150 a year until October 1, 1892.

After a brief discussion and explanation these details were unanimously adopted. The formal transfer was made at a meeting of the two Boards, in Lancaster, Pa., April, 1892; and therefore while your Board continues to have the oversight and care of the missions within your bounds, we have only advisory power in their management.

We rejoice to say that our work is in good condition. Three missions have become self-supporting, namely: Bangor, Pa.; Stafford, Ore.; and Williamsport, Pa. The following missions have been enrolled during the year: Royersford, Pa.; Tower City, Pa.; Memorial Church, Allentown, Pa.; Northeast Baltimore, Md.; West Rowan, N. C.; Harrisville, Va.; Albino, Ore.; and St. Thomas, Reading, Pa. (Seattle, Wash., was only re-enrolled.) The following missions were enrolled by request of the General Board: Franklinville, Bethel and Messiah missions, Philadelphia, Pa.; Phoenixville, Prospectville and Scranton, Pa. Accordingly the roll at present numbers 37 missions, only one of which is now vacant.

As our missionary year began October 1, and as the missionary year of the General Board begins April 1, it has been found necessary to allow the appropriations of the present year to continue to April 1, 1893.

The reverend Synods will be pleased to hear that the Board has now on record twenty Church-building Funds, six of which have been received during the year; but we regret to add that less than \$1500 have come into our treasury on the apportionment for this part of our work.

As your Board must have money for this work, we again ask that the same apportionment as last year be sent down to the Classes, namely: \$2500 by the Eastern Synod and \$1500 by the Potomac Synod.

We gratefully report the gift of \$1000 from Mrs. Louisa F. Wirt, of Hanover, Pa., being amount of legacy of Elder Henry Wirt, to this Board, but awarded by the Court to Mrs. Wirt owing to a defect in the will. In this gift Mrs. Wirt sacredly carries out his intent.

As the apportionment for the coming year will be asked by the General Board, we need only urge the full payment of what is assumed; and this we most earnestly and affectionately do, not only because so many new missions within your own bounds have lately been enrolled, but also for the sake of other new and important fields that should have early enrollment—to say nothing of a great and growing work within the bounds of other Synods toward whose support much help must come from the East.

It pains us to report the death of Elder William H. Seibert, the treasurer of this Board from its organization; and we desire here to record our high appreciation for his long and faithful service in the Board, especially as its patient and painstaking treasurer. The Eastern Synod will please note this vacancy in its representation; and both Synods will please note that Elder John J. Nissley, of Hummelstown, Pa., has been elected treasurer of the Board.

Herewith we transmit the report of the treasurer, duly audited, calling your attention to the small amounts received as compared with the large apportionments assumed. Brethren come to our help, that your work may be fully done.

Many things might profitably be added to this report, but even then much would be left unsaid. We humbly lay our work upon the altar of the Lord, praying for acceptance in His name.

REPORT OF BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS.

*To the Synod of the Potomac:*

*Reverend and Dear Brethren.*—In the absence of a formal authorized report by the Board, which will be in full presented to the General Synod next Spring, I beg leave to present to your Reverend Body a very general statement of the present condition and outlook of our missionary work in Japan.

It is with profound gratitude to God, that I am able to say, that our work in Sendai is moving forward with indeed unexpected success. Ever since the establishment of our institutions for the raising up of a native ministry, our work has been largely preparative, it requiring several years before the students could be conducted through the necessary educational course. This summer the first class completed its course, and henceforth we may expect annual reinforcements to our band of native evangelistic workers. The Training School had had a body of some 35 to 40 students up until the completion of our new Seminary Building. Since the occupancy of this new building during the last scholastic year, the number of students has increased at a surprising rate, till it reached its maximum number of 119. Thirty-eight of these are candidates for the Christian ministry. Of the whole number 61 are Christians. This unlooked for increase in the number of students forced the Board, even without the necessary funds in sight, in faith, to send out another missionary teacher, to relieve our greatly overburdened missionaries Hoy and Schneder, in the person of Rev. Henry K. Miller, who is now on his way to San Francisco, Cal., whence he expects to sail for Japan on the 27th inst. With these three fully equipped American teachers, in whose hands will be the branches which relate both directly and more remotely to our holy Christianity, aided by several native teachers of the secular branches, the Board believes the force of teachers will be sufficiently strong for the present wants of our school.

We have not had so large an increase of students in the Girls' School, the number being as per last report, 43. A considerable inflow of new scholars is expected during the coming term. Since Miss Hollowell has been added, the teaching force is considered adequate to the present wants of the school.

During the last several years the labors of our mission have, as already said, been largely devoted to the preparatory work of raising up a force of native evangelistic workers. As a consequence, evangelistic work proper has received only partial attention, Bro. Moore being the only one to whom this depart-

ment was committed, Bros. Hoy and Schneder rendering such help on Saturdays and Sundays as their oppressive labors as teachers in the Training School permitted. Now, however, that workers are coming out of our school, the grand aim of our work, viz., to win souls to Christ, is expected to go forward with new and growing activity. It is very clear then, that with increased activity and more widely extended labor in this department, it will become necessary in the near future to reinforce this branch of work by sending out one or two additional American evangelists, to labor in and supervise this department, manned as it largely will be, by those who in reality are but babes in Christ themselves.

Thus with the blessing of God's Spirit is our work and field of service rapidly growing in our hands. The anxious question, now more than ever before, is coming to oppress us, "Will the home Church sufficiently respond to this clear and loud call of God?" He has graciously blessed us in our day of small things, will we now with growing and brightening opportunities, rise to our opportunities and go forward under the leadership of Him who has promised to be with us always unto the end of the world?

*Dear Brethren in the Lord*, the Board appeals to you in the Saviour's precious name, to adopt such measures as will serve to so quicken the zeal of our Ministers and Members, as will enable it to press forward in the winning of souls, and in the upbuilding of Christ's Kingdom even to the end of the earth.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

*To the Reverend Synod of the Potomac:*

Your Committee on Missions begs leave to report as follows: The following communications were placed in our hands, viz. The Report of the Bi-Synodic Board, and that of the Treasurer of the same Board, the Report of the Secretary of the Foreign Board, the Report of the Board of the General Synod, and a communication of Rev. J. G. Schmid, and one also from Rev. J. Muellhaupt.

From the Report of the Bi-Synodic Board, we gather the following facts, namely, that the transfer of our missions to the General Board has been fully made; that three missions have become self-supporting; that quite a number of new ones have been enrolled; that the funds have been increased by the gift of a legacy of \$1,000 from Mrs. Louisa F. Wirt, of Hanover, Pa., and that six Church-building Funds have been received, during the year. The Committee recommends the adoption of the following:

*Resolved*, That Synod rejoices in this prosperous condition of the work, and commends it anew to the consideration of the Classes, pastors, and congregations.

*Resolved*, That the sum of eight thousand dollars recommended by the General Board for the cause of Home Missions, be assumed and apportioned among the respective Classes.

*Resolved*, That the Classes be requested to order collections to be lifted in their congregations for Church Building purposes.

*Resolved*, That the Synod does not see its way clear to comply with the request of the General Board by assuming the additional sum of five cents per member for Church Building, but that the Treasurer of the Bi-Synodic Board be instructed to pay over to the Treasurer of the General Board one-half of the collections just ordered by Synod.

*Resolved*, That the Synod assumes the sum of five hundred dollars for Hungarian Missions, and that the amount be apportioned among the Classes.

As to the appeal for aid in behalf of the Astoria Mission, Oregon, the committee learned that the necessary aid has already been granted by the Bi-Synodic Board.

As to the communication from the Rev. J. Muellhaupt with reference to Stockton, California, it is recommended that the matter be referred to the General Board.

In regard to the Foreign Work, the committee recommends the adoption of the following action :

*Resolved*, That we rejoice in the prosperous condition of our work in Japan, and in the loud call for increased activity in it, as presented to us in the report of the Secretary of the Board.

*Resolved*, That this cause be again most urgently recommended to the Classes, and that the plan of interesting the Sunday-schools in this great cause, by supporting the missionary, Rev. Henry K. Miller, be approved by the Synod, and that the pastors and consistories be urged to aid the Secretary of the Board in his endeavors to make this plan effective. Respectfully submitted,

The balance on the amount borrowed (\$1600.00) June 30, 1887, by the Treasurer of Synod to pay the pledge of the Synod, being \$4,000.00, to Wichita College, was cancelled during the past year, and the following action was moved and adopted :

*Resolved*, That the thanks of the Synod are due and hereby tendered to the brethren, Revs. J. O. Miller, A. H. Kremer, C. Cort, C. U. Heilman, A. K. Kline, and I. N. Peightel, for personally endorsing said Wichita College loan, authorized by the Synod at the annual meeting in Mercersburg, and for their successful management of the important financial matter thus assumed by them, and now happily brought to a close, by the full payment of the balance of the loan, by the Treasurer of Synod, as appears from this year's report.

The following rule was adopted with reference to making assessments for the contingent fund of the Synod and General Synod :

*Resolved*, That assessments for the Contingent Fund of the Synod and the Contingent Fund of the General Synod be hereafter made upon the Classes on the basis of membership.

## SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

The Sunday-school Board presented its Annual Report to the Synod during the session of Wednesday forenoon, which was received and adopted, and is as follows :

## THE SUNDAY-SCHOOL BOARD TO THE SYNOD OF THE POTOMAC.

*Brethren*.:—It is gratifying to be able to report a growing interest and encouraging progress in the Sunday-school cause within the bounds of our Synod.

We do not know of any Christian labor more pre-eminent in spiritual results, or more effective in increasing the membership of the Church. As previously reported, in a single State of our Synod, 16,994 members were brought into the various Protestant denominations through the instrumentality of the Sunday-school in the year 1891.

On the Allegheny Mountains there is a large limestone rock, and upon its surface are the foot-prints of birds and of wild beasts and the trail of the serpent. These were made, it may be, five thousand years ago, when the rock was soft and pliant, but the impressions are still there. Many storms have swept over them, and many rains and snows have fallen upon them, but no power has been able yet to efface them. The heart of the child is just as pliant, and the impressions for good or evil are being made upon it which are forming character that will exist when rocks and mountains have been swept away. Then how diligent, how careful we should be to imprint upon the fair surface of the child's heart that which will beautify life and glorify God.

The Sunday-school Conventions which have been held during the past year have resulted in much benefit in awakening increased interest in the work, and a broader conception of its importance.

Children's Day and the Church Festivals have been observed with commendable zeal, and, we believe, with excellent results.

We most respectfully suggest that Friday evening be set apart for the anniversary of the Sunday-school. We have selected the questions to be discussed, and appointed speakers as follows :

1. "The Sunday-school Teacher in his Study; in his Class; in his Life." Rev. Prof. William C. Schaeffer and Rev. J. B. Shontz.
2. "The Bible, the Catechism, the Lesson-Help, their Place and Use in the Sunday-school," Rev. Geo. B. Resser and Rev. C. S. Slagle.

The following preamble and resolution were moved and adopted:

WHEREAS, There are in the bounds of all the congregations of the Synod persons who ought to attend the Sunday-schools in their communities, but who either on account of distance or carelessness, neglect this privilege; and,

WHEREAS, It is possible to organize in our Sunday-school Home Departments with home classes to study the lesson by those who do not attend any school, and thus finally bring them into our schools, and do a much greater work for Christ than now; this system having been extensively introduced into a number of States, and now has the earnest support of a number of denominations with blessed results; therefore,

*Resolved*, That we recommend to the pastors and Sunday-school officers the propriety of organizing Home Departments with home lessons for the purpose of securing the systematic study of the Holy Scriptures, and thus win for Christ and His Church many who are now beyond their influence.

At the election held for members of the several Boards of the Synod, Rev. I. N. Peightel was elected a member of the Sunday-school Board for the period of five years.

#### REPORT ON PUBLISHING THE MINUTES.

The undersigned begs leave to report, that he had two thousand copies of the “Acts and Proceedings of the Nineteenth Annual Sessions of the Synod” printed and bound in pamphlet form, as instructed, and distributed them according to the rules and regulations of the Synod in the case. The work was executed by the Reformed Church Publishing House, of Philadelphia, at the cost of \$147.97. The bill was promptly paid by the Treasurer of Synod. Unfortunately there was very considerable delay in getting them out, for which the Stated Clerk is not responsible. They were not ready for distribu-

tion until after the middle of February, notwithstanding the manuscript was expressed to Philadelphia before the middle of November, the usual time.

Through an oversight, the report of the special committee on items, 4, 5, 6, and 7, of the Report on Overtures, requesting the Synod to organize a Women's Synodical Missionary Society, was not included in the Minutes as printed. It is found in the Minute-book in its proper place, and, if so ordered by the Synod, will be included in the minutes of the present sessions.

REPORT OF THE PUBLICATION BOARD OF THE REFORMED CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES, 1892.

*To the Pittsburgh, Potomac and Eastern Synods.*—The Publication Board of the Reformed Church in the United States begs leave to submit to the Synods named its annual report:

During the year one meeting was held, September 7th, 1892. At this meeting but three members were present, viz.: George W. Hensel, James T. Reber and Edward J. Durban. In the absence of a quorum the Executive Committee met and authorized the secretary and treasurer of the Board to prepare the annual report to the Synods.

The books of the publisher and lessee were examined and verified by two members of the Board, and the gross receipts for the year exhibited an increase over those of the past year to the amount of \$3,121.52, and the total amount being within the limit of \$40,000, the basis of the guarantee, the treasurer received the \$1200 from the lessee as will appear in the report of the former.

It is to be regretted that the several members of the Board fail to attend the meetings, as their absence not only prevents organization and the election of the necessary officers, but also precludes the consideration and action on various matters of importance, among which is the undetermined and seemingly misunderstood question as to whether the Synods are observing the true intent of the contract with the lessee, notably in their printing and publishing contracts. This subject should be intelligently and fairly discussed on the floor of the several Synods, and a conclusion reached that will clearly and finally determine it, and that in strict keeping with the equities and rights of both parties concerned.

The advantages and benefits arising from a concentration of interests are so apparent in all the activities of life, that there should not be any occasion to plead for like purpose in our publishing interests, and there seems to exist in some quarters an indifference or lukewarmness, amounting at times to opposition in promoting the growth and prosperity of this powerful and valuable adjunct to our Church organization.

The direct pecuniary advantages under the existing lease, to the Synods, and which could be largely increased by concerted action, are shown in the following report as submitted by the treasurer, George W. Hensel:

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REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PUBLICATION.

The Committee on Publication would respectfully report as follows:

The document placed in the hands of the Committee was the Report of the Board of Publication of the Reformed Church in the United States for 1892.

The Report of the Board of Publication complains of the non-attendance of most of the members of the Board at the one meeting held during the year; announces an increase in the gross receipts of the past year over the previous year of \$3,121.52; reports the payment by the lessee to the Treasurer of the Board of \$1,200 for the year, the total amount of sales being within the prescribed limit of \$40,000; expresses a desire for the intelligent and fair discussion by the Synod of the question whether the Synod is fully observing the true intent of the contract with the lessee, and for the clear and final determination of the question in strict keeping with the equities and rights of both parties concerned; and calls attention to the fact that the total amount at present in the hands of the Treasurer is \$5,793.39.

In regard to the matters thus presented for the consideration of the Synod, your Committee would recommend the following:

*Resolved*, That this Synod is gratified to hear, through its Board, of the good management and sound condition of its Publication affairs.

*Resolved*, That the Synod urgently requests the members of the Board to attend such meetings as may be necessary for the management of its affairs.

*Resolved*, That this Synod once more expresses its sense of the solemn obligation resting upon it, and upon its members individually, to abide faithfully by the terms of the contract made and now existing, between the three Synods interested, and the lessee and publisher to whom by said contract our publication interests were committed.

*Resolved*, That this Synod earnestly and affectionately reminds the several Classes under its care, together with all pastors and consistories of congregations within its bounds, of the great importance, for our church life and church work, of our publication interests; and urgently recommends that, in every pastoral charge, a distinct and energetic effort be made to increase the circulation of the periodicals of the Church.

Your Committee to whom were referred the several papers from Christian women, representing different sections of the Synod, begs leave to report:

*First.* That we sincerely rejoice over the missionary ardor and zeal exhibited in so high degree by these documents, an ardor and zeal consistent with the noble type of Christian womanhood, which is the product, and has ever been the pride of the Holy Religion which we profess.

*Second.* That we gratefully acknowledge the unfaltering devotion, the self-sacrificing faith and steadfast love which have characterized the work of women

in the entire history of the Church, and which so pre-eminently appear in the manifold labors of the present age, and in our portion of the Lord's vineyard.

*Third.* That we congratulate ourselves, especially upon the evidences of the increasing activity of our own women in the work of Foreign and Home Missions, and we hereby assure them of our thankful appreciation of their work, praying that the God of missions may abundantly bless their labors in behalf of their interests so dear to the heart of the Church.

*Fourth.* That while appreciating the desire to enlarge the sphere of woman's usefulness, as expressed in the requests submitted to the Synod; and whilst cheerfully ready to express our approval of their work, we deem it inexpedient to authorize the organization of a Woman's Synodical Missionary Society, trusting to the wisdom and discretion of woman for the direction of her own work. During the session of Friday forenoon the Standing Committee on Nominations presented its report, which was received and adopted, and a sufficient number of tickets of the nominations were ordered to be printed for the use of the Synod. The election was made the order of the day for 10 o'clock of Saturday morning's session. At the time designated, the election was held, Revs. I. M. Beaver, H. F. Dittmar, and Elders S. M. Hench and S. B. Kissell, acting as tellers, who collected the ballots, counted the votes, and furnished the President with the result of the election. The result will be found elsewhere, in connection with the action of Synod on the Reports of the Boards of Education, Regents of Mercersburg College, Visitors and Trustees of the Theological Seminary, Missions, Trustees of Synod and Sunday Schools.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ORPHAN HOMES.

The Standing Committee on Orphan Homes, to whom items 9 and 10 of the Report on Overtures were referred, presented the following report, which was received and adopted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ITEMS 9 AND 10 OF REPORT ON OVERTURES.

Your Committee, to whom were referred items 9 and 10 of the Report on Overtures, begs leave to present the following report:

From the Bethany Home Report we are much gratified to learn of the valuable property and well-equipped Home we have at Bethany with all indebtedness occasioned by the erection of the needed addition fully met. The present number of children in this Home is one hundred and two, all of whom with the exception of two are supported by the charities of the Church. The health of the inmates has been good. The moral and religious training of the children

as in former years in the church service, Sunday-school, catechetical class and family altar has received due consideration, and as a result of this seven of the children who had arrived at the proper age were received into full communion with the church by the solemn rite of confirmation during the year.

Practical industrial training is maintained in the Home to the extent of familiarizing the boys with farm labor in all its details, and the girls with the entire routine of domestic duties. We learn with pleasure that efficient schools are maintained in the Home for ten months of the year. Commendable discipline is enforced and encouraging progress in acquiring an elementary education reported.

The Board reports a deficit in the current expenses of the Home amounting to about \$2,000. In view of the above facts we respectfully recommend the following action:

WHEREAS, This Synod learns with much gratification of the increasing efficiency and prosperity of Bethany Orphans' Home; therefore,

*Resolved*, That we hereby express our confidence in the able and judicious management of the same on the part of the Superintendent and Board.

*Resolved*, That we as a Synod pledge anew our sympathy, prayers and contributions for the care of the fatherless and motherless wards of the church, and that earnest efforts be made by pastors, churches and Sunday-schools to lift liberal collections in church or school, or both, during the approaching Christmas season, or at such other time as may best suit their convenience.

The communication from St. Paul's Home at Butler, Pa., informs us that a similar line of Christian work is conducted there. The number of children in this Home as reported is 60, a large number of whom, however, are supported by parents or friends. The intellectual, moral and spiritual culture of the children receives proper attention.

We further learn that facilities at hand would enable them to accommodate a larger number of children than now find a home and Christian nurture there, provided the contributions for this worthy charity were largely increased; therefore,

*Resolved*, That this institution be earnestly recommended to the confidence and charity of the Church as eminently worthy of patronage and support.

*Resolved*, That the Historical Sketch of the Society, read by the President at the Anniversary on Wednesday evening, be incorporated in the published minutes of the Synod, and that he be requeſted to have it alſo published in the papers of the Church.

*Resolved*, That the Claſſes be recommended to take due notice of the fact that this is the *Centennial* of the Society.

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THE ORIGIN AND HISTORY OF THE SOCIETY FOR THE RELIEF OF MINISTERS AND THEIR WIDOWS OF THE REFORMED CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES.

*Brethren Beloved in the Lord*:—The Society for the Relief of Miniſters and their Widows of the Reformed Church in the United States, whoſe CENTENNIAL we begin to celebrate this evening, is the oldeſt charitable inſtitution of the Reformed Church in the United States. The date of its formation cannot be accurately aſcertained or poſitively determined.

The earlieſt records of the original Society have unfortunately been miſlaid or loſt—in all probability deſtroyed.

There is good ground, however, for believing, that as a “Widows’ Fund,” it had its origin conſiderably over one hundred years ago—as early as 1755, under the foſtering auſpices of the Synods of North and South Holland.

It is well known, that thoſe Synods, together with the Classis of Amsterdam, took a very lively and deep intereſt already in the welfare of the German emigrants to Pennsylvania, nearly one hundred and fifty years ago. This intereſt diſplayed itſelf by the churches of Holland taking up collections for this *Widows’ Fund*, as it was called, amounting to very conſiderable ſums, from year to year, and ſending them ſtatedly or regularly over to America, for the uſe of the German Reformed Church.

Full and particular accounts or ſtatements of the appropriations made of this fund were always returned by the Coetus, as the eccleſiaſtical body of our Church in this country was then denominated.

The fund, no doubt, brought relief to the ſtricken houſehold of more than one miniſter, who had fallen at his poſt.

Accordingly, in the “Letters from Holland relating to the organization of the German Reformed Church,” translated by the Rev. Dr. Dietrich Willers, by direction of the Synod, a number of years ago, and published in the *Messenger* at the time, mention is made of this *Widows’ Fund*, as being in exiſtence, to which contributions were frequently made, before and during the ſtruggle of the Colonies for Independence, in ſums of from 150 to 600 guilders, at a time, by the Reformed Church of Holland.

Theſe contributions from Holland gradually ceaſed ſome years after the War of Independence cloſed, when the congregations became themſelves able to make provision for the needy widows of miniſters.



As near as can now be ascertained, the present Society was organized or formed one hundred years ago, when the Reformed Church in the United States became separate and independent of the Church in Holland, which was consummated by the action of the Synod held in Lancaster, Pa., at its session April 30, 1793, adopting a Constitution and Rules of Order, and changing its name and title from Coetus to Synod.

Showing the trend of things in that direction, the Coetus, at its annual meeting in the same city, June 27, 1791, proceeded to ordain to the work of the Christian ministry, without having first obtained the consent of the Fathers in Holland, the licentiates J. Philip Stock and Jonathan Rahauer. The former of whom served the congregations at Shippensburg, Chambersburg and surrounding points for a number of years; and the latter, Hagerstown and affiliated congregations for many years.

Henceforward, the Society dispensed its benefactions under Synodical supervision, and, although its annuities were limited, they nevertheless made glad the hearts of their recipients from year to year.

It would seem that the Society at first, and for a long time, did not exist apart and altogether independent of Synodical control.

If it was not, strictly speaking, a Synodical organization, it was, nevertheless, a voluntary association, made up and composed of the ministers of the Synod or Coetus, as the Synod continued to be denominated until 1793. And as such it acted, to some extent at least, under the Synod's direction and supervision, and was, it is said, "to continue at its pleasure." But at length, for the greater security of their funds, and also to give validity to their acts, a charter was deemed necessary. Application was accordingly made to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania for a charter, which was granted March 10, A.D. 1810, by that body. The charter officers of the Society were: John Henry Helfrich, President; Philip Pauli, Vice-President; Samuel Helffenstein, Secretary; George Geistweit, Assessor; William Hiester, Assessor; William Hendel, Treasurer.

The association was originally, or at first, named "The Society of Guardians for the Relief of the Widows of the German Reformed Clergymen." This with the addition of "being members of this Society," became the title of the Society under the charter granted by the Supreme Court of the State in 1810, as already stated. The name of the Society was thus unduly long and cumbersome. Besides, the benefits were wholly confined to ministers, who were citizens of the State of Pennsylvania.

As an instance of well-applied charity by the Society, it may be mentioned that the widow of the sainted Winckhaus, one of the worthiest pastors of what was formerly known as the Race Street Church of Philadelphia, was kept from actual want by the relief extended to her by the Society for many years. Mrs. Winckhaus survived nearly fifty years after the death of her husband, who died in Philadelphia, October 3d, 1793, from that dreaded disease, yellow fever.

Another instance may be given that comes down nearer to our own time and locality, namely, that of the widow of the Rev. Jonathan Rahauer, of Hagerstown, Md., who outlived her husband also many years, and who was the last widow who was entitled to the benefits of the Society, as chartered in 1810. For many years she was an annuitant of the Society until removed to her Father's House on high, where there is bread enough and to spare.

The question may present itself to your minds, How did it happen that she could be a recipient of the Society's benefactions, if its benefits, according to the charter, were limited to citizens of Pennsylvania? The answer is, That her husband was a native of the State, and his first field of labor was in said State.

The Society as first organized and chartered was not only limited, as already stated, but seems to have lacked in other respects. It failed to expand with the

growth of our Church, consequently it nearly died out. In 1832, the membership of the Society was reduced to only four—some accounts say three—and there was actual danger of the corporation becoming extinct. The members were Samuel Helffenstein, Sen., William Hendel, Casper Wack, and Thomas Pomp.

These venerable men represented the fact to the Synod, held in Frederick, Md., in 1832, and requested the appointment of a committee to confer with them as to the proper disposition to be made of its funds. Accordingly, the Synod appointed a committee for that purpose, but the chairman of the committee, who was also President of the Synod, Rev. J. W. Dechant, died of the cholera on his way home from the meeting of the Synod, and nothing was then done in the matter. But the subject was again brought up at the Synod of Easton, Pa., the ensuing year, and another committee was appointed, with instructions to confer with the surviving incorporators, and request them to transfer their funds to the Theological Seminary, at that time located at York.

A joint meeting of the corporators and the committee was held, and after long and earnest discussion, it was agreed to submit the whole question for decision to the judgment of the Synod, at the next annual meeting, to be held in Pittsburgh, Pa., in 1834.

At the Pittsburgh Synod, it was wisely decided to perpetuate the Society, with such amendments and changes of its Charter, By-Laws, and Rules, as would present greater inducements to the ministry of the Church to become members of the Society.

The proposed alterations were submitted to the surviving corporators by a committee appointed by the Synod for the purpose, of which committee Rev. Dr. B. C. Wolf, a native of this place, was chairman.

At the Synod held in Chambersburg, Pa., in 1835, the committee reported, that the propositions of the Synod of Pittsburgh had been accepted, and that the Society would be perpetuated, according to the wishes of Synod. The result was, that a number of the ministers became members of the Society, and it was reorganized, and it was resolved to apply for a new charter to the Legislature of the State in due form, and it was understood that a new charter had been obtained.

Meanwhile, however, little or no interest seems to have been taken in the affairs of the Society; and it was not until the meeting of the Synod at Norristown, Pa., in 1849, that the Society was organized under what was supposed to be the new charter.

Things ran along for several years in this manner, until at length it was ascertained that the new charter had never received proper legislative sanction, and consequently was no charter at all.

It had passed one branch of the Legislature of Pennsylvania, but owing to the hurry and bustle of business at the close of the session, it had been overlooked in the other branch of the Legislature, and so was of course invalid.

This threw the Society back upon the old Charter obtained from the Supreme Court of the State in 1810. Upon a careful examination this was found to require nothing more than an extension of its powers and a change of name or title, to make it all that was really desirable. An Enabling Act, as it has been termed, was applied for to the Legislature to that effect, and obtained under date of February 28, 1865, and is now in full force and virtue by law.

The title and name of the Society was changed to "The Society for the Relief of Ministers and their Widows of the Reformed Church in the United States." The Society's annual income was extended so as not to exceed the sum of ten thousand dollars, from "the clear yearly value of five hundred pounds," as in the original charter. It extends the privileges to all ministers of the Reformed

Church, resident in any of the United States and Territories. It covers three classes of annuitants :

1st. The widows and children of deceased members of the Society needing aid.

2d. The widow and family of any deceased minister of our Church, if in needy circumstances.

3d. Disabled ministers themselves, who are members of the Society, and require pecuniary assistance.

The progress of the Society, numerically and financially, has been much more rapid since the Charter was revised and changed, twenty-seven years ago, and especially during the past few years. The invested fund then amounted to about \$5,000.00 ; now it is more than six times that amount.

REPORT ON PREPARING A CIRCULAR AND ISSUING THE SAME.

The undersigned begs leave to report, that he prepared a circular setting forth the object and needs of the Society for the Relief of Ministers and their Widows of the Reformed Church, as instructed, had it printed, and sent a copy to the pastors generally of our beloved Zion. The expense, amounting to between twelve and thirteen dollars, has been paid by the Society.

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The following report was received and adopted, viz :

*To the Potomac Synod :*

The committee appointed at the last annual sessions to represent this Reverend Synod at the dedication of the memorial stone erected to the memory of the late Rev. E. E. Higbee, D.D., LL.D., at Emmitsburg, Md., by the Public Schools of Pennsylvania, respectfully reports that it attended to its duties on October 31, 1891. The services consisted of the dedication of the memorial stone in the Mountain View Cemetery, and of a number of addresses delivered in the Reformed Church by members of the committee and others. The ceremonies and addresses connected with the occasion are fully reported in the November number of the *Pennsylvania School Journal*, a copy of which accompanies this report. The committee also presents a copy of the September number of the same journal, which contains two excellent cuts of the memorial stone, and the report of the monument committee under whose direction the stone was erected.

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Items 12 and 13 of the Report on Overtures were referred to a Special Committee composed of Revs. S. N. Callender, T. K. Cromer, and Elder S. B. Your Committee to which was referred two copies of the "Order of Service" with the "Heidelberg Catechism," by Rev. N. Z. Snyder, and *The Anxious Bench*, for examination, beg leave to report :

We have given the books such examination as our limited opportunities afforded. We find the "Order of Service" to be a carefully prepared manual for the conduct of the service in the Sunday-school and Catechetical Classes, and as such is eminently adapted to the improvement of these services.

*The Anxious Bench* is a reprint of "A Tract for the Times," published originally a number of years ago. This reprint is to be welcomed as affording an opportunity on the part of the Church of to-day to procure an interesting part of our Church literature, for some time out of print,

Your Special Committee, to whom item 6 of the Report on Overtures was referred for consideration, beg leave to recommend, that a committee of five be appointed by this Synod to confer with a committee already appointed by the Pittsburgh Synod, and with one which in all probability will be appointed by the Eastern Synod, to arrange for a suitable observance of the Centennial landmark in the history of our beloved Zion.

*Resolved*, That the action of this Synod on this matter be communicated by the proper official to the Eastern Synod, at its approaching meeting in Lancaster, Pa.

The committee called for in the foregoing report consists of Revs. J. O. Miller, W. C. Cremer, J. D. Miller, and Elders J. Wetzel, and S. B. Kissell.

At the session of Wednesday morning, Revs. J. D. Miller, C. Cort, J. S. Kieffer, M. L. Firor and L. E. Coblenz were constituted a Reportorial Committee to report the proceedings of the Synod for the public press. Shortly before final adjournment, the committee submitted the following report, which was received and adopted :

Your Committee, appointed to report the proceedings of Synod for the use of the press, beg leave to report, that they have attended to this duty, and have furnished abstracts of the proceedings to the *Altoona Tribune*, the *Martinsburg World*, *York Daily*, *Baltimore American*, *Baltimore Sun*, *Hagerstown Daily Globe*, *Hagerstown Daily Mail*, *Philadelphia Press*, and *Reformed Church Messenger*. Expenses 70 cents.

The bill of expense was ordered to be paid by the Treasurer, and the thanks of Synod were returned to the committee. In the same connection, the following was adopted :

*Resolved*, That Rev. T. J. Barkley be appointed to confer with the agent of the Associated Press, in order to arrange that our proceedings next year be reported to the Associated Press, and through it to the papers within its jurisdiction.

The following action was also adopted :

*Resolved*, That the pastor of the place in which the Synod meets together with the officers of Synod constitute a committee, which shall have in charge the arrangements of subjects for the several evenings, while the Synod is in session, and shall appoint the persons who shall speak, and shall inform them at least two weeks beforehand.

The following overture to the General Synod was moved and adopted, namely :

WHEREAS, It is evident that the office of Deaconess existed in the Apostolic and the post-apostolic Church ; has always been appreciated in some of the Reformed Churches ; is being revived by other Protestant denominations ; and is so well adapted to the needs of much practical Christian work ; therefore,

*Resolved*, That we overture the General Synod, at its next meeting, to authorize and define the office of Deaconess, and having taken such action, to send it down to the Classes for approval or rejection.

The following action was adopted :

*Resolved*, That the Committee appointed to mature plan, &c., be instructed to inform the trustees of Catawba College and North Carolina Classis of the action of Synod in regard to establishing a Theological Professorship in connection with Catawba College, and that they enter into negotiations with North Carolina Classis and trustees of Catawba College as to further arrangements for establishing said Professorship.

The Treasurer of Synod was instructed to pay to the Consistory of the Reformed Church of Martinsburg, twenty-five dollars to defray the incidental expenses of the Synod.

At Monday morning's session a committee on leave of absence was appointed, composed of Revs. J. O. Miller, G. P. Stem and Elder G. W. Hartman. Those granted leave of absence by the committee, as well as others obtaining leave of absence before the appointment of the committee are marked by the letters of the alphabet as their names occur in Article II.—Delegates Present.

On motion, the Classes were directed not to receive defective or incomplete statistics from their pastoral charges, but require them to be made complete in all particulars.

At the session of Monday evening, Rev. T. J. Barkley, pastor of the Gettysburg charge, presented the Synod with a gavel made from a fence rail taken from the Culp's Hill section of the Gettysburg Battle ground, containing a Minnie rifle ball in it. The thanks of the Synod were returned to Pastor Barkley for the relic.

## ARTICLE XXII.

### MINISTERIAL NECROLOGY.

The Standing Committee on Ministerial Necrology, appointed at the last meeting of the Synod, having failed to furnish the proper report, the Stated Clerk was instructed to prepare the report from such data as are at hand. Accordingly the following report is presented.

#### REPORT ON MINISTERIAL NECROLOGY.

In the kind providence of the Great Head of the Church, by whom the Father governs all things, there was but one death in our ministerial ranks, during the

past Synodical year, the Lord being very merciful to His servants in sparing their lives for future usefulness.

Rev. Cyrus H. Reiter of the Juniata Classis was called from the Church militant to the Church triumphant, November 17, 1891, after a brief illness. He was stricken down by apoplexy about a fortnight before he died, at the age of 75 years and 1 month, having been born October 17th, 1816.

The deceased graduated from the Theological Seminary at Tiffin, Ohio, in 1855, when nearly thirty-nine years of age. His first pastoral charge was at Carrollton, Ohio, where he labored for four years. From there he removed to Smithville, Wayne Co., Ohio, and labored in the Bristol charge, and from there he went to Wadsworth, Medina Co., same State, and served the Union charge, laboring nine years successfully in both fields of labor. He was next called to the Aaronsburg charge in Centre Co., Pa., his pastorate there lasting seven years. He then successively served the Augusta charge in Northumberland Co., the Woodcock Valley and the Orbisonia charges in Huntingdon Co., Pa., each three years. His last pastoral charge was at Glencoe, Somerset Co., Pa. He then removed with his family to Marklesburg in the Woodcock Valley charge, in which he had labored formerly, where he spent the last few years of his life in retirement from active service, yet laboring in supplying vacant charges within the bounds of the Juniata Classis, as occasion required. For thirty-six years he was permitted to preach the unsearchable riches of divine grace.

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## ARTICLE XXIII.

### RESUMPTION AND CLOSE.

The following resolutions of thanks were moved and unanimously adopted, to wit :

*Resolved*, That the Synod of the Potomac hereby tenders its hearty thanks to the pastor and members of the Reformed Church and other kind citizens of Martinsburg, who have so hospitably entertained us during our present annual sessions, and that we implore the richest blessings of the Lord upon them in the varied relations of life.

*Resolved*, That the pastor *loci* be requested to read the foregoing action to his congregation at next Lord's day services.

*Resolved*, That the thanks of the Synod are hereby returned to the management of the Cumberland Valley and Baltimore & Ohio Railroads for the favor of excursion rates granted to the members of Synod passing over those roads.

The Synodical roll was then called, and none were found absent unexcused.

The minutes were then read finally, and approved, and ordered to be engrossed.

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## ARTICLE XXIV.

### ADJOURNMENT.

The following was adopted before adjournment, namely :

*Resolved*, That when the Synod adjourns finally, it be to meet in the Reformed Church of Gettysburg, Adams Co., Pa., Tuesday evening, October 3d, 1893, at 7.30 o'clock.

The next annual meeting will be as a delegated Synod.

The Synod adjourned finally on Monday evening, October 17th, at 9.15 o'clock, with repeating the Apostles' Creed, joining in the Lord's Prayer, singing a doxology and the Apostolic Benediction by the President.

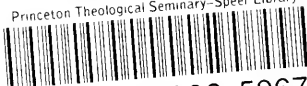






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
