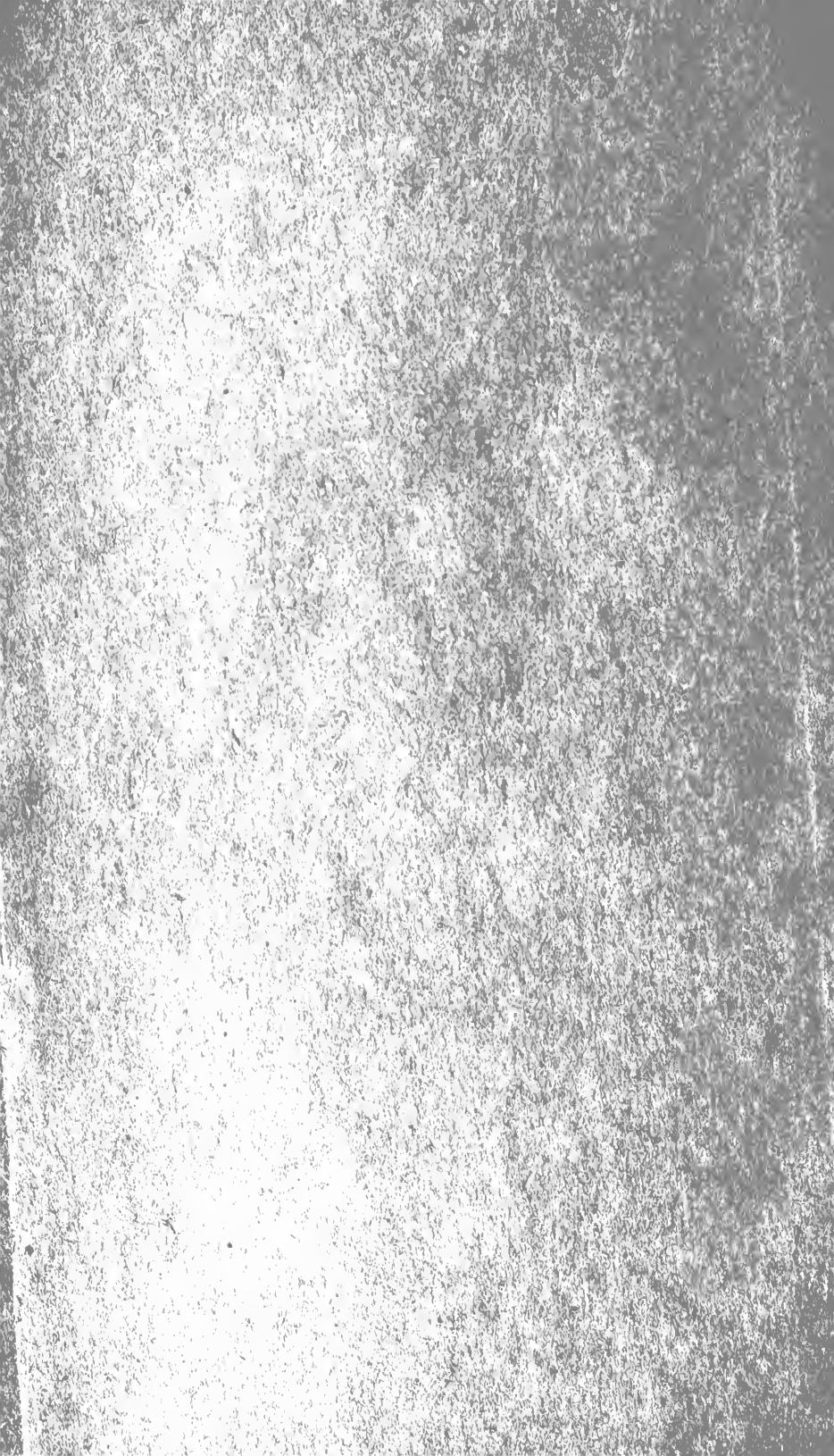
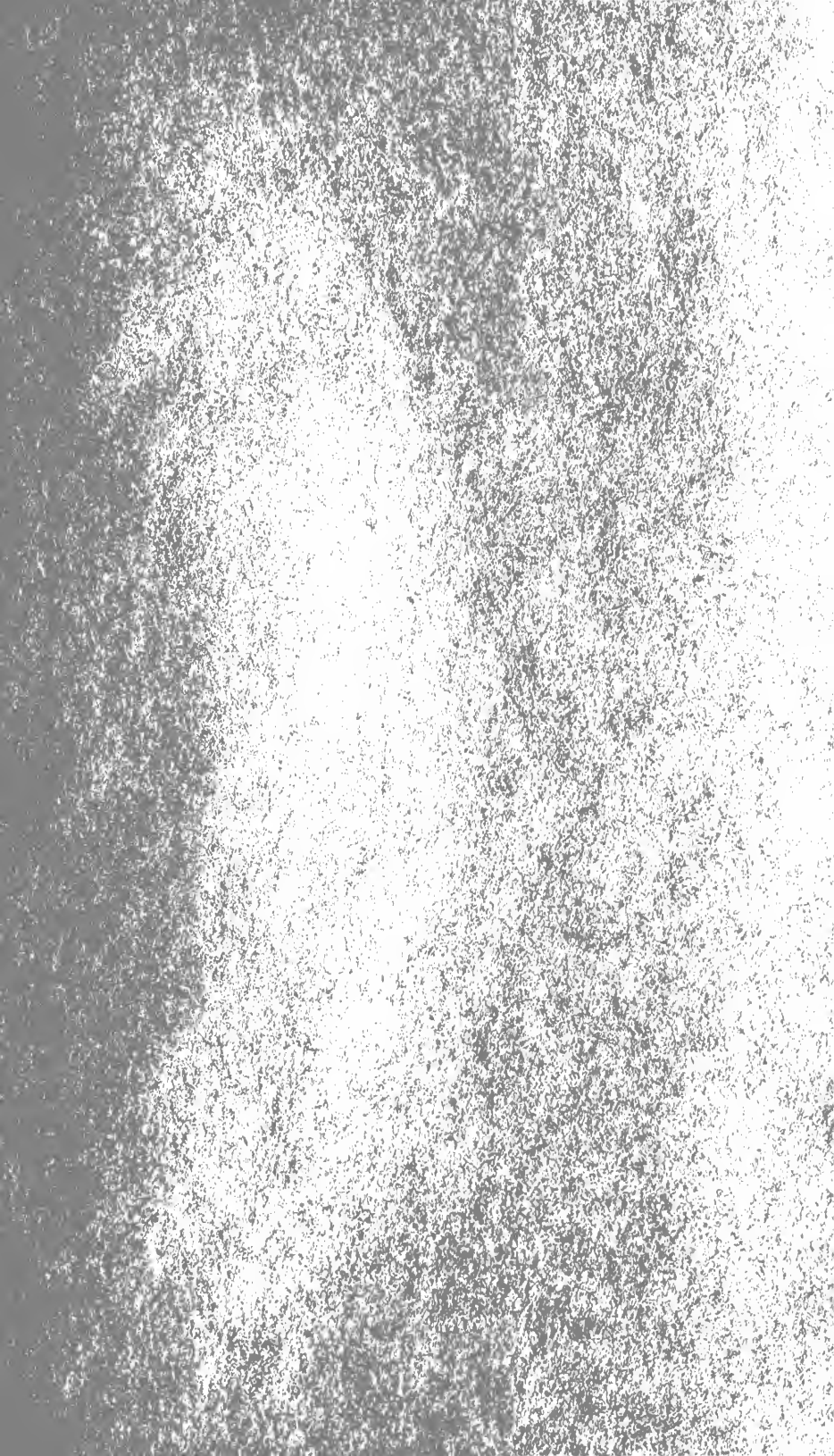

Alabama Baptist State Convention

Eighty-Sixth Session, 1907.

DOTHAN, ALA., JULY 24, 1907.

1. THE ALABAMA BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION met this day in the city of Dothan, Ala., in the meeting house of the Baptist Church in its eight-sixth session, and after a service of "Prayer for the Men of Our Churches," conducted by A. J. Dickinson, the Convention was called to order at 9:30 A. M. by N. D. Denson, the President of the Convention.

2. The names of delegates were next enrolled as appears at the close of these proceedings, including all who were enrolled during the session of the Convention.

3. Officers were next elected as follows, viz:

On motion of J. L. Thompson, W. A. Davis cast the vote of the body for N. D. Denson for President.

On motion of George W. Ellis, the Secretary cast the vote of the Convention for R. E. Pettus for First Vice-President, and on motion of W. A. Taliaferro, for J. V. Brown for Second Vice-President.

On motion of John W. Stewart, the President cast the vote of the Convention for M. M. Wood for Secretary.

4. C. A. Stakely presented the report of the Program Committee. A. J. Dickinson moved to adopt that part of the program for Wednesday morning and to recommit the balance of the report for changes. M. B. Wharton moved to amend the motion by striking out the clause to recommit. After discussion by A. J. Dickinson, M. B. Wharton, W. A. Taliaferro and G. L. Comer the amendment was adopted and the report as presented by the Program Committee was adopted.

5. Visitors and representatives of various interests were received and their names enrolled as appears at the end of these minutes.

7. W. M. Anderson, pastor of the Baptist Church in Dothan, made the welcome address, which, by request of the President, was responded to by J. R. Tyson.

8. The report of the State Board of Missions was called for and read by W. B. Crumpton, its Corresponding Secretary, as follows:

Report of the State Board of Missions.

Led, as we trust, by the "good hand of our God" through another year, we are enabled to make a good exhibit of the year's work, probably the best ever made. We congratulate you on

YOUR PLACE OF MEETING.

Here, where the fair city of Dothan now stands, a few years ago was a cross roads in the piney woods, noted for its grog shop and rowdyism. This church, with its large membership and commodious building, doubtless would have been, if there had never been a Mission Board; but it is a pleasure to us to think that the work was hastened by an appropriation for three years from the Board, which the struggling band gratefully received.

The first meeting of the Convention in this section was made possible by this church, a child, in some sense, of the Convention.

In almost every report, we have emphasized the importance of

HOLDING THE CENTRES.

No finer vindication of the wisdom of the suggestion can be found than at Dothan. What a power this church, with its members and wealth and zeal, may be for God through the years to come in all this region, throughout Alabama and to the uttermost parts of the earth.

We reaffirm the conviction that the wise investment of mission money in the centres is the best investment that can be made. We should not neglect the

country; we dare not neglect the towns, or the evil influence flowing out from them will ruin the country.

At our annual meeting in November we made appropriations on the basis of \$20,000, independent of a debt of \$2,500, which was upon us. One of our members, at the annual meeting, expressed the fear that we might be \$7,000 in debt a year hence. The first day of July, it looked like his fears might be realized; but the receipts for the next three days brought us nearly \$5,000, which saved us from reporting a debt.

The last thirty-six hours of the Home and Foreign Missions campaign in April brought us \$10,000, which saved Alabama from a disgraceful falling off from last year. It seems that the brethren prefer the whirlwind method of closing things. It is good to have the money at the very last for our Boards, but how awful the suspense and how unnecessary, if the collections were regularly taken. Many of the letters containing money said: "This money you should have had earlier."

The following is the summary for the year:

For State Missions.....	\$20,818 30
For Home Missions.....	17,797 91
For Foreign Missions.....	25,559 05
For Associational Missions.....	718 40
Making a total of.....	\$64,893 66

Of the State Mission contributions \$1620.19 comes from the churches where the evangelists held meetings. Leaving this off, State Missions would stand \$19,198.11, an increase over last year of \$2366.80. While this is not strictly missionary money, yet it was given to the evangelists for services rendered, and charged up to them on their salaries, and must so appear on our books.

The increase for Home Missions, as indicated by the figures is shamefully small. The figures for Foreign Missions show a decrease, really, for the year, of \$6,240.05. It should be remembered, however, that a special contribution of \$10,000, by one of our brethren last year, pushed our figures forward far in advance of anything we had ever done. In estimating, if this is left off, our church contributions would put us \$3759.95 in advance over church contributions for last year. While this is the fact, we are very sorry we did not come up to the advanced figures of last year.

The total increase for the year for missions is \$11,052.09.

THE APPORTIONMENT.

Your committee on the proper observance of the centennial of the establishment of the first Baptist church in Alabama, we are informed, will make a suggestion to the convention, which, if adopted, will suggest the figures for missions next year. Of course the amount will be in advance of last year.

The Convention, at the last session, failing to reappoint a committee of co-operation, it might be well to have such a committee appointed at once to consider the apportionment for the various interests for the next year.

There can be no standing still. An o'd artist, examining the picture of a student, for criticism, wrote on the margin, "Amplius." Larger is the word for all of us. Larger ideas, larger plans, larger efforts, larger giving, larger sacrifices, etc. All this must be, if our asking of the great Father is the result of a larger faith. Littleness with contentment would be our ruin. Nothing pleases our Master like great demands upon him. Dr. Truett, in a great speech before the Texas Convention, said: "If we are to be the great people we ought to be, we must give our church members something that will stir their souls and fill their hearts. The

pastor who does not keep his church on a dead run in the doing of great things is on a mighty cold trail. And I will say to him that all history authenticates the statement, that if he does not keep them on a dead run, the time is not long off until they will have him on a dead run." Nothing is truer than that. The pastors who are urging their people and leading them in the doing of great things are those who hold their pastorates longest.

A SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

was elected by the Board, according to the instruction of the Convention before we left Talladega last year. Rev. T. V. Neal was the man. After working only a few weeks, he was advised to go West, on account of his health. So well satisfied were we with the wisdom of our choice, we waited nearly the whole year, in the hope that he would be able to resume his work; but his physicians recommended finally that he remain in the West permanently.

On the recommendation of his pastor and teachers and others who knew him, we have secured Mr. C. E. Crossland, a young man of great promise, a recent graduate of Howard College. Mr. Crossland is not a preacher, but a consecrated young layman.

He has been spending some months this summer studying under the finest Sunday School workers in the South. He is now ready for active work wherever Providence may open the way. We recommend him to the brethren everywhere and trust they may use him on their fields. If our people are aroused on this important department of work, the time is near when we must have more than one man. We are asking the Sunday Schools to give us at least one good collection a year, to aid in the support of the Sunday School Secretary. We feel very certain of help from the Sunday School Board at Nashville.

LITERATURE SENT OUT.

The *Home Field* and *Foreign Mission Journal* are furnished us regularly and are sent out to the church clerks, with the request that they be given out and subscribers secured. Besides the thousands of tracts sent us by the Home and Foreign Boards and the American Baptist Publication Society, we have printed 43,000 at a cost of \$100.45. For the tract fund, we have received from various sources \$82.69, not a sufficient amount to pay the printers. We have donated from the Bible and Colportage fund many Bibles and religious books. Eternity alone will reveal the value of this work to the cause of Christ.

THE SCHEDULE

is adopted by about four hundred churches, less than a third. The larger churches do not use it. Most of them are satisfied with the plans they have. Many others refuse to use it, because they are opposed to any method; but the idea is growing and patience and perseverance will eventually bring it into well nigh universal use.

Regular collections for all objects, giving each its turn, with now and then room for a special collection on an emergency call, is the ideal plan and will be adopted by those whose hearts are enlisted. Of course it means trouble for somebody, but the results will richly repay for all the trouble. After all, it is far less trouble than to have no plan.

BIBLE AND COLPORTAGE

does not receive the contributions its importance deserves. NONE OF THE LARGE CHURCHES EVER REMEMBER IT. We have sold more books this year than ever before. The expenses are greater, because of the necessity of another room. The pastors are reading more. Some of them carry a few books

to their appointments, which the members readily purchase. Where consecrated zeal is found in an intelligent, energetic man, who has business sense, you have all the elements that go to make a successful colporter.

The Secretary lately said, in an interview to the *Montgomery Advertiser* :

"Not much may be said about it at Dothan, but at no distant day the Baptists expect to possess themselves of some of this splendid property right in the heart of Montgomery for Baptist headquarters. I never look at the handsome building occupied by the Alabama Bible Society, on Dexter Avenue, but I bless God for the deed of one of our citizens, Mr. McGee, who died in 1857, leaving that property for the Bible Society. The income from the rents enable the Society to sell the Word of God at cost to the people. Who that ever lived in this beautiful city has so grand a monument as this old servant of God? He caught a vision of the future, revealing the greatest need of the people and provided for it.

"I confidently expect another such monument to be erected here before many years. I could easily do a ten or twenty thousand dollar colportage and Bible work next year, if we had suitable quarters."

Why should not this be one of the great things we have in mind to do in the near future? Eighty letters could be sent out in one mail to as many men and women who could, without the least sacrifice, give \$500 each and make the building an assured fact in one week's time. We are living in the days when great things are undertaken for our King; why not this, which would mean so much for our people through all the ages?

THE AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND

grows some each year from contributions. It is surprising that any preacher should neglect it. Not a man of them can tell what awaits him in life. It may be the time will come when a small monthly stipend from this source will come as a great boon to some preacher, who is now listening to the reading of this report. Some have received aid from this fund, who, in other days, were not enthusiastic for the Convention and its work. It was cheerfully granted, without inquiry into the past. With how much better grace it would have been received if they had been conscious of having spent their earlier and more prosperous years in helping to build up the agency which extended a helping hand to them in their old age.

We would not suggest a

CHURCH BUILDING FUND FOR ALABAMA

but we would urge upon all our people the importance of helping the Home Board liberally on their fund. Very often a small appropriation will encourage a church to build and build a better house, who might otherwise not build at all, or, building, would be satisfied with a very indifferent structure. The Home Board has had some transactions with some of our Alabama churches which were highly satisfactory. A long time loan was made to the First Church, Anniston, of \$1000. In three years time they raised the full amount and paid off the note. The same was true for smaller amounts to the North Side, Birmingham, and the Second, Gadsden.

We suggest that the Committee of Co-operation be instructed to appropriate \$7000 to the Home Board church building loan fund, independent of the regular amount apportioned to that Board. The fact that this is a loan fund, to be used over and over again through the years, ought to appeal to our people.

THE COLORED PEOPLE.

For the help that we extend to the theological department of the Selma University, the Secretary is constantly receiving evidences of appreciation from

the colored brethren all over the State. Brother Owens, who has charge of the young preachers, says :

“Selma University enrolled 700 during year, of which number 75 were ministers of the gospel. Of the 75 preachers 45 are pastors of one to four churches. The majority of the pastors are in the preparatory department, where they are taught the elementary branches in connection with their Bible lessons. There is great thirsting for knowledge of the Bible and the preachers generally say their hours for study are too short.

“During our week of prayer in January, 63 souls were converted.

“I am still praying for the five hundred dollars which I asked the white brethren for at the last Convention. There is great need for funds to help poor preachers. My work is hindered by good men leaving school before the close, on account of funds exhausted. The help rendered through this channel (the University) by the white brethren is doing good in many ways—developing gratitude and, by example, the lesson of self-denial.”

We firmly believe the hope of the colored people is in their ministry. If they are trained, pious and consecrated, they can lead their people into a purer and better life.

The tidal wave of temperance reform, which is sweeping over the State is meeting with a hearty response from the more intelligent of their race. We believe that the whiskey and cocaine habit is destroying the best labor on earth for the cotton planters. One of their great leaders, in a pathetic appeal, in behalf of his race, said : “We negroes make no laws, we construe no laws, we execute no laws. No board of aldermen, no judge or jury would establish saloons on the recommendation of negroes. The negro brute is the product of the white man's gambling hells, low dives and saloons, where he is dehumanized, brutalized and licensed to go through the land, a demented brute, to commit outrages on fair women. Our black arms are too short. The long, Anglo-Saxon arms only can reach him.” That is a terrible arraignment, but who can deny its truth?

The children of the generation of white people now rapidly passing away should not allow the children of the slaves, who were so faithful to their parents, to be destroyed body and soul, when the gospel of Jesus would save them from their sins. The greatest missionary field on earth for Southern Baptists is right here among the descendants of the slaves, whose unremunerated toil made the South rich. We believe the old time feeling of the negro towards the whites would come back, if we would protect him from evil men of both races and give to him the gospel of Christ.

EVANGELISM

is still an important question for consideration. We have had in the field for full time J. V. Dickinson, since March 1; W. J. Ray, since January 1, and W. D. Hubbard, since May 24. These brethren have done efficient work. Many have been added to the churches, the pastors strengthened with their people and much good done.

We feel that some of the churches do not deal fairly by us. Knowing that the Evangelist is employed by the Board, they do not pay as liberally as they would if he were independent. Others are inclined to charge up the amount as given to State missions, and when the time comes for collections for that cause, they feel justified in cutting it out. Still another problem confronting us, with reference to evangelism is, to keep our men at work during the winter. In our climate, that is the season best adapted for holding meetings; but the old idea obtains, of giving a few weeks in the heat of summer. During these weeks, fifty men could easily find work; but in the winter it is hard for three men to keep busy. The Associations have a fine opportunity to employ the Evangelists to hold Baptist rallies at important centers during the winter. If they would do

this, they would thereby render the best service to their churches and at the same time help the Board solve a most perplexing problem.

The work of

THE WOMAN'S CENTRAL COMMITTEE

continues to grow, as indicated by the increased number of societies and increased contributions. Generally, the women are in the majority in our churches. They are a mighty power in the homes and in society. Their tender hearts are easily turned to sympathize with efforts to uplift the race. They are rapidly coming to be a potential factor in the work of our boards. It is wicked not to encourage them. One good woman, after hearing Mrs. Hamilton at one of the Associations, said to the Secretary: "We are so grateful to you for sending Mrs. Hamilton to us. I was made ashamed of myself, when I discovered how ignorant I was. We have never done anything because we didn't know what to do or how to do. If we could only have this good woman to visit us in our churches, we would soon be enlisted in the mission work."

Many of our preachers have stood aloof from and some of them have even opposed the women's movement; but reflection and observation will bring the most of them around to right thinking on this subject.

THE OTHER BOARDS

are in full sympathy with us in our work and are helpful in every way. The Home and Foreign Boards pay a part of the salary of the Corresponding Secretary and share the expenses of the office. The Sunday School Board gave us \$303.39 worth of Bibles and \$200 in cash to help in the support of our Sunday School Secretary.

VACANCIES ON THE BOARD.

The terms of the following members of the Board expire at this session: D. C. Cooper, J. W. Minor, A. J. Dickinson, Geo. W. Ellis, J. B. Ellis, J. W. O'Hara and M. B. Wharton.

W. D. Hubbard has become an employee of the Board and asks to be retired as a member.

We regret to report Brother W. G. Curry in poor health and unable to attend the meetings. Through many years he has been one of our most faithful members. He suggests that his name be left off.

THE ASSOCIATIONAL MEETINGS

are soon to begin. These annual meetings are of so much importance to the denomination, we want to urge upon moderators, clerks, members of executive committees, and all who have the cause of God on their hearts, to make more of them this year.

We have seen a circular letter sent out by one moderator to the churches, urging them to prepare their letters carefully, and select the best men as messengers, who will give the work of the Association their best service. We beg the preachers and others, who may be messengers to the Associations this fall, to do what they can to make the next sessions the best ever known.

OUR SCHOOLS.

Reports will be submitted from Scottsboro and Healing Springs, so it is not necessary to speak of them, further than to say—some repairs are needed at Healing Springs. The trustees may not feel authorized to make them and the State Board of Missions may want instructions.

At Gaylesville, in Cherokee county, a good school property has been secured and turned over to the Home Board, and school will be opened in the fall. At Eldridge, in Walker county, the same is true. A dormitory is in course of erection there, which will accommodate, when finished, 50 boys. They are finding it very difficult to raise the needed funds to complete the dormitory. No school in any section is more needed than this. We have helped in supporting brother Reeves this year, while he was engaged in the work of raising the funds.

At Newton the Baptists have a most flourishing school, having near 300 pupils in attendance. They came from a dozen or more counties. If they had the room, they could easily have 500 pupils. The discipline is fine; the religious and moral influence cannot be excelled. They have some debt. We understand that the trustees will propose at this session to turn the property over to the Convention. We would suggest that a committee be appointed at once to confer with the Newton brethren and report to the Convention at as early hour as possible.

"THE CARE OF ALL THE CHURCHES"

was a great burden on Paul's heart and mind. How anxiously did he consider their every interest! How solicitous he was about everything that might disturb their peace! How he prayed and counseled and labored for their development! With feelings akin to these, we long for the greatest development of the churches which Christ has planted in Alabama. We hail with pleasure every indication of improvement. The men who are their pastors deserve our sympathies and prayers. Under God, they are leading them gloriously forward, in spite of the difficulties under which they labor. But their salaries are so meagre and the demands upon them are so great, many times their hearts fail them when they see how far short they come in the solemn duties of the pastor's office. When will the churches see their duty and untie the hands of these glorious men whom God has called and whom they have recognized to be their leaders? Wages for everybody are advancing, but the pastors' salaries remain the same. The cost of living is increasing constantly; the pastors have new demands made upon them every day, but their wages are no more. The country prospers, the membership grows in numbers and wealth, but the pastors' anxious cares about his family, coupled with his anxiety about the cause committed to him, is not abated by increased interest on the part of the membership in his personal well-being. Our Secretary has received scores of letters from pastors, breathing the most earnest devotion to the cause, who express their deep regret in not being able to attend this Convention on account of the cost. Doubtless there are pastors who are now present, whose pleasure is greatly marred by the fear that they have taken from the meagre living of their families too much in paying their way to this Convention. One of our great laymen, at the Richmond Convention, said: "Tell the churches to untie the hands of their pastors. Men who are cramped cannot fight. Poverty makes men timid." How true are these words.

The other side of the question is of equal importance. Our churches cannot be developed by pastors, however pious or consecrated, who give most of their time to secu'ar pursuits. We reiterate what we said last year on this subject: "A ministry, unburdened by secular business, giving themselves 'wholly to these things' and the churches furnishing the needed support" is the question of the hour among Baptists.

SPECIAL MENTION.

If we were asked what are the mightiest agencies now employed in Alabama for the upbuilding of the cause we would say the Alabama Baptist, reinforced by the circular letters sent out from the Montgomery office. The paper is at our service every week of the year. It has no ambition but to serve our Baptist interests in Alabama. We would be practically helpless without it. What might it not accomplish if all our people read it?

The circular letters are sent to the clerks and pastors and others by the thousands. Some of them may not be read; but the responses we receive indicate that most of them are read and appreciated. If we would quicken Missionary zeal and excite denominational interest, it is imperative that we give information about the work. It is impossible for the Secretary to carry it to the churches. It would still be impossible if every evangelist and missionary should come to his aid; but the printed page can and will do the work.

At Richmond during the Southern Baptist Convention, the Laymen formed an organization. It is believed by many the most important movement that ever stirred the denomination. We are sure it is if the interest can be extended to all the States. Too long the preachers have been left almost alone in the struggle to upbuild and forward the Cause of God in the earth. If a great enterprise was to be inaugurated, the preachers, in their poverty and inexperience in business matters, have had to plan it and lead it. If some of our interests were tottering the preachers were allowed almost alone to do the propping. Our membership is crowded with men of great talent and great wealth. God seems to be moving upon their hearts and stirring their spirits to consecrate their business sense and their money for the extension of His Kingdom. It will be a glorious day for His cause when they move out, like a mighty army, to join battle with the enemies of their King. It means more money in the treasury for God; it means the emancipation of the ministry from corroding care and anxiety; it means more missionaries with better equipment. God only knows all that it means. We trust our Alabama laymen, sometime during the session of the Convention, will organize and get in touch with the movement, which has its headquarters in Baltimore.

With this we submit the Summary of Work and Financial Statement which we ask the brethren to study carefully with the Report.

Crumpton read the report of the committee appointed at the last session to report on a proper observance of the hundredth anniversary of the organization of a Baptist Church on Alabama soil, and the report was referred to the following committee: C. A. Stakely, P. V. Bomar, J. H. Foster, Austin Crouch, Richard Hall, J. W. Sandlin, G. L. Yates and R. E. Pettus. (See Items 25, 42.)

10. The hour for preaching the Convention sermon having arrived, the sermon was preached by the appointee, J. L. Rosser, of Selma, Ala. Text, Isa. 32 : 2, 3.

11. After announcements the Convention adjourned to 2:30 p. m. with the benediction by R. G. Patrick.

FIRST DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

12. At 2:30 p. m. a service of "Prayer for Our Baptist Institutions" was conducted by J. W. O'Hara.

13. The Convention was called to order by the President at 2:45 p. m. and on motion of W. B. Crumpton, a committee on co-operation was appointed consisting of W. M. Blackwelder, J. L. Thompson and P. V. Bomar, and a committee to confer with the brethren at Newton, Ala., as suggested by the State Board of Missions in its report, was appointed, as follows: H. S. D. Mallory, J. R. Tyson, D. C. Cooper and G. G. Miles. (See Items 29, 46, 52.)

14. The report of the Trustees of Howard College was read by its President, J. B. Ellis, as follows, viz :

Report of the Trustees of Howard College.

To Alabama Baptist State Convention :—

DEAR BRETHREN: For reasons given below, the last session, 1906-1907, was the most successful and notable in the History of Howard College, during the sixty-five years of its life.

1. The number of student's was 205, within one of the largest number ever enrolled.

2. The number of Ministerial students was sixty, seven of whom have pledged themselves for the fore'gn field.

3. The income, including the Denominational Education Fund, nearly all of which was paid, will meet the expenses.

4. The Endowment Cavvass was fully completed during last session, the first payment made by the General Educational Board of New York and the sum of \$20,000 endowment has been placed at interest by the Finance Committee appointed by your body.

5. The New Library building was opened for use; it was erected and furnished at a cost of about \$10,000. It is one of the nicest and handsomest school buildings in Alabama.

6. The Faculty is well arrauged for work, four of its members are pursuing advance studies in great universities this summer, one being in Germany. In addition to the Faculty for next year, is Prof. Olive, recently an instructor in Cornell University, who will have charge of chemistry and biology.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

1. That the Baptists of Alabama give, as they did last year, \$5,000 for the maintenance of our college. In consideration of the large number of ministerial students who receive free tuition, and sons of minis'ters, who are educated at one-half rate of tuition, the college is compelled to receive aid beyond its income from students who pay. The larger the student roll the larger must be the teaching force, and good men cost much money. We recommend the plan pursued at the last Convention, to-wit :

That those making pledges guarantee the payment thereof.

We earnestly request every church represented at the Convention to make promise of help to our college. The larger its usefulness the more pronounced is its success, the more vigorous and the stronger in activities will our Denomination be. Howard College is the training school of our ministers, and it is also the cherishing mother of Laymen, whose usefulness cannot be over estimated.

2. That donation be made to our Library. We need hundreds, even thousands of books for the education of our boys in Howard College.

3. That certain societies of ladies in the State undertake the improvement and beautifying of the Chapel and the several recitation and lecture rooms.

4. That every Baptist Father and Mother in Alabama regard Howard College as the educational home of his and her son, that parents train their sons to look upon Howard College as the institution of learning for Baptist boys, and that Baptists over the entire State pray, plan and give for the development of Howard College.

16. The report of the Trustees of the Judson College was presented and read by G. G. Miles as follows, viz (See Item 39) :

Report of Judson College Trustees.

We beg to submit the report of the Sixty-Ninth Annual Session of Judson College. Under the blessing of God the year has been the most successful in the history of the Institution. The enrollment has exceeded that of any previous year, the total number registered being 317 and nearly 100 applicants for admission were declined for lack of room. There was some crowding in the Dormitory, in the Class Rooms and in the Dining Room. Each year for the past three has witnessed the same situation and emphasized the necessity of enlargement to meet the demands of the ever-increasing constituency. During the session forty officers and teachers have been engaged in the work of a ministration and teaching of the pupils, and the session from the standpoint of high attainments by students in all departments was highly satisfactory. Notwithstanding the advanced curriculum and the improved standards of instruction, there were thirty-two graduates the present year. The teaching force was enlarged in proportion

to the number of students, there being employed two additional music teachers and two additional teachers in the regular college course, and yet the work has been too heavy for the number that have been employed. From the present registration of students for the coming session, it is already evident that there will be at least as many students in attendance as in the past year.

ENLARGEMENT AND IMPROVEMENT.

Since the last meeting of the Convention, the Judson has added to its property about fifteen acres of land adjoining the Judson grounds, valued at \$8,000, with the view of erecting suitable buildings to provide for the accommodation of the larger number of students and to furnish all the equipments and facilities necessary for the broad and thorough education of our girls. In his annual report, the President in discussing the needs of the Institution, presented a broad and comprehensive plan for the development of the Institution in the next ten years, and says "the ultimate aim of the Judson should not be less than an equipment to cost \$500,000 and an endowment of a similar sum." Each year the Institution becomes financially stronger and will be able to do much toward paying for improvements out of its income, and yet it will be necessary for the denomination to give more largely than ever in the past to the endowment and equipment of the Judson which has contributed so much to the advancement of the Kingdom of God throughout its long history.

CARNEGIE LIBRARY ASSURED.

We have the pleasure of reporting the success of the Carnegie Library movement which was inaugurated last year. Mr. Carnegie has notified the President to draw on his treasurer for the amount necessary as the building progresses. It is expected that in a few days a contract will be let for the erection of this building, which with the endowment, will add \$25,000 to the value of the Judson's property.

THE ZADIE ELLIS ASHCRAFT MEMORIAL.

Among the needs of the Institution emphasized at the last meeting of the Convention, was that of an adequate home for the President. We beg to announce that this has been provided for by the gifts of Hon. B. F. Ellis, members of his family and other interested friends. The building is to cost \$10,000, and will be Memorial to Mrs. Zadie Ellis Ashcraft, the daughter of President Ellis, and one of the most accomplished graduates of the Judson, whose life was a shining example of the highest type of Christian womanhood.

OTHER IMPROVEMENTS.

The President has been authorized to enlarge the Dormitory as early as possible, and to provide for an adequate Infirmary, and we recommend that the Convention endorse this movement and request the churches to give their hearty support to raising \$30,000 for this purpose. In this connection, we are glad to report that a step forward has been taken in the employment of a trained nurse to preside over the Health Department under the direction of the College physicians.

VALUE AND CONDITION OF PROPERTY.

The committee appointed to appraise the value of the Judson buildings and equipments report a total valuation of \$160,000, and including the Library Building for which the money is in hand and which will be erected this fall, the valuation is \$195,000. We are pleased to report that the buildings are in good condition and the grounds are well kept and are being continually improved.

The Trustees announce the death of Miss Lydia Hornbuckle, in her seventy-first year, as she was about her work. Miss Hornbuckle who was known and

beloved by all Judson girls had been connected with the Institution the greater part of her life as student and officer, and we desire to express our high appreciation of her true womanly character and of the excellent service she rendered to the Institution.

The terms of J. W. Bailey and C. A. Wilkerson, as Trustees, expire during the present year, and it will be necessary to appoint their successors.

On motion, R. G. Patrick and G. G. Miles were appointed a committee to express the loving sympathy of the Convention to B. F. Ellis, President of the Board of Trustees, and his family, in the great sorrow referred to in the report.

17. W. B. Crumpton presented the reports of the Trustees of the Scottsboro and Healing Springs Schools as follows, viz :

Report of Scottsboro Institute.

The session has been the most prosperous in the history of the school. Two hundred and six pupils were enrolled—95 males, 111 females. Six ministerial students were among the number. There were three graduates. Six students professed conversion.

The girls' dormitory, purchased by the Home Board, has been filled with boarders and needs enlargement. Additional land has been purchased and a canvass is being made for funds with which to erect a boys' dormitory. The Home Board proposes to give \$5,000 if we will raise as much. The total value of the school property now is \$20,000.

We have employed Prof. W. L. Yarbrough as principal for another year, with five assistants. We commend him to the brotherhood wherever he goes seeking funds for the new building.

The school is growing in favor with the people of North Alabama. If we have the room to accommodate them we will double the present number in three years.

Report of Healing Springs Industrial Academy.

We closed the fourth session under Convention control in May. There were sixty-three pupils. We find it necessary to have a male assistant room with the boys in their dormitory. We have contracted with a young man for the place.

We have employed Prof. Brock for another year.

Some additional furniture will be needed and some repairs are necessary on the building.

We ask the Convention to assist us through the State Board of Missions in this emergency. The people have shown themselves ever ready to help.

The church at Healing Springs has erected a commodious house of worship, which is worth much to the school. Besides attending Sunday school regularly the students, with the young people of the community, have organized a very active B. Y. P. U.

The Tombigbee Railroad, now completed to within a mile and a half of the school, is bringing new settlers into the community and property is increasing in

value. Some families are moving into the neighborhood for the sake of the school. If we had cottages on our own lands we could easily keep them rented to patrons of the school.

Prof. Brock is hopeful of having a considerable increase in the patronage another year.

18. John W. Stewart, Superintendent, presented the Report of the Trustees of the Orphan's Home as follows, viz: (See Item 56.)

Report of Board of Trustees Louise Short Baptist Widows' and Orphans' Home of Alabama.

The Board of Trustees of the Orphans' Home submit as their report in the main the report of their manager, but they wish to add, as an explanation of the debt that is reported, that a splendid four story concrete building has been erected, and is now under roof. It is very important that this building be finished within the next few weeks, so that the school may have the benefit of the commodious quarters it will provide.

This building is designed to give room in the basement for all the industrial work we may have occasion to inaugurate for many years — a much needed chapel, library, office, storeroom and printing office—while the fine, large school rooms will accommodate easily two hundred pupils.

Particular attention is called to the fact, that the family has increased more largely than ever before in one year, but the offerings have remained about the same. Also to the further fact that a splendid ten thousand dollar building stands on our lawn waiting to be completed, and less than three hundred dollars have been given for that specific purpose.

Fourteenth Annual Report of the Financial Secretary and Manager of Louise Short Baptist Widows' and Orphans' Home of Alabama.

To the Board of Trustees:

DEAR BRETHREN—In submitting this, my fourteenth annual report, I do so with a full realization that the Lord has been manifestly with us during the year. We recognize his work, and bow to his will, in the loss we have sustained in the death of our brother P. M. Bruner, so closely connected with our work ever since it was started, for much of the time as physician, many years a trustee, and always a friend. After a long illness, he heard, on the eleventh day of September, the "Well done," and entered upon his rest. This leaves a vacancy in our local board to be filled at the approaching Convention.

The past year has been one of advancement along several lines of our work, despite the fact, that it was one of painful losses to us in the going away of our workers. Mrs. Garrett, who had been matron at the Girls' Cottage for four years, left us last fall. Miss Susie Bevis, a valued teacher, left us at the end of the year. Mrs. Jones, who had been with us since the first year of our work, and who had mothered the family of little ones ever since they had been in the Scott Cottage, left us with the ending of last year. These losses have in part been made good by the coming of Mrs. Hitte to the Girl's Cottage, and her assis'ant,

Miss Board, who are well trained for their work. It is cause for real gladness that Miss Cunningham is to teach our small children next year. The coming of Mr. C. E. Carter to take charge of the farm has in some measure relieved the situation, and at the same time added to our ability to make more of our own support on our farm.

The health of the children has been good.

A serious situation is presented in the fact that our family has grown to much larger proportions than formerly, and still the gifts of the people remain about the same. The ingathering of children has been the largest that we have ever had, there being about twice as many as we ever had in a single year before. During the year seventy-two children came to us, showing that the family increased about forty-five per. cent., while the gifts are about the same. This, too, in the face of the fact, that we needed a larger sum this year than usual for the building we have had on hand. Our friends will have to count the mouths we have to fill, and remember if they do not send something for them, we have no means of securing the necessities of life, except to ask them for them. There are more than sixteen thousand meals to prepare for this crowd every month. These meals at three cents a piece (and who would say they should cost less) would amount to almost five hundred dollars a month for groceries alone.

We have found cause for gratitude, as well as deep concern in the fact, that thirty-three children have been baptized since the last report. Of these, fourteen were girls and nineteen were boys. This is more than twice as many as ever joined the church in one year before. Since our work was started fourteen years ago, there have been only four boys who have remained with us till they were fifteen years of age without being baptized, and not a single girl has ever reached her fifteenth year without taking up her cross, and following her Lord in baptism.

Grateful acknowledgment is made for another and much larger car of corn from the friends in the Tennessee River Association. We also do not overlook the gifts of the ladies societies, Sunday schools, and mission bands, who have sent goods to us aggregating as follows:

19. The Report of the Directors of the Convention was presented by its chairman, N. D. Denson, as follows, Vice-President J. V. Brown presiding, viz :

Report of Directors.

The Board of Directors makes the following report :

At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Alabama Baptist State Convention in Montgomery on the 3d of May, 1907, the following resolution was unanimously adopted :

Whereas, The title to the property of the Marion Military Institute is vested in a self-perpetuating board of trustees; and,

Whereas, The instrument by which the title is so vested contains a clause which provides that if the Alabama Baptist State Convention appropriates \$50,000 for an endowment of the institution, the Board of Trustees shall deed the property to said Convention; and,

Whereas, A like clause is contained in said instrument giving the same privilege to the State of Alabama; and,

Whereas, At the request of the Board of Trustees of said institute, the State has, through the Legislature, relinquished its privilege, and the Board of Trustees desires that the Alabama Baptist State Convention make the same relinquishment :

Resolved, That the Board of Directors of the Convention recommend that the Convention relinquish its privilege under the said instrument by the adoption of the following resolution, to-wit :

Resolved, That the Alabama Baptist State Convention, in open session at Dothan, Alabama, does hereby relinquish the right and privilege conferred upon it to appropriate \$50 000 for an endowment for such Institute by the instrument by which the title to the property of the Marion Military Institute is vested in a self-perpetuating board of trustees, and also relinquishes its right to have a deed executed for said property.

20. The Report of the Board of Ministerial Education was presented by J. M. Shelburne, its Chairman, as follows viz: (See Item 33)

Report of Ministerial Board of Education.

It is with pleasure that your Board reports the largest work, possibly, in its history, with all obligations met. A right good balance from last year saved us from debt. With our increasing work, we trust the Convention will give this phase of its work an adequate hearing this year.

ENROLLMENT.

We have enrolled 59 students at the College this year, and 7 at the Louisville Seminary, a total of 66 ministerial students from Alabama. To this number should be added several students enrolled at Scottsboro and Newton; but, having no data, I make no report of these.

Of the 59 enrolled at the College, 40 remained through the entire year. Of the remaining 19, some resigned on account of poor health, some for financial reasons, and some because they did not have good grit.

Bro. A. J. Gross had to leave the Seminary early in the session (November) on account of ill health. Bro. G. B. F. Stovall did not stay for the second term. The other Seminary students remained for the entire year, and Mr. Smith writes us good reports of their work.

THE WORK OF OUR STUDENTS.

With a few exceptions, the work of our boys has been satisfactory. Half of the graduating class were young preachers, and some of these were the best students in the College. The following were our graduates this year: J. H. Akin, David Bryan, J. A. Cook, I. H. Dykes, W. L. Henson, I. L. Jordan, and A. E. Page. I give this list that the Convention may know the names of the young preachers who have graduated.

Almost the entire student body took one or two classes in the Bible this year. The Board is inclined to make this a condition of aid to the students. It is gratifying to report that almost all the men of moral purpose, that know what they are there for, take the Bible every year, whether required or not. Three courses in the Bible are given, each requiring one year's work. Two of these courses are given each year, so that any student remaining at College as much as two years may go over the entire English Bible. In addition to this Dr. Shelburne has done some work with a class in homiletics, and Dr. Montague has lectured to the class this spring on the general culture of the minister.

It is the purpose of the College authorities to do yet more for the young ministers that come to us. Their purpose is significantly emphasized by the fact that less than one out of nine ever get to go to the Seminary.

AID RENDERED.

Eleven (11) students received no aid at all through our Board this year, some of whom deserve special mention. The others received from \$10 (their College fees) up to \$155. In cases where large amounts were given, it was by special offerings of churches or associations. The Board recognizes the right of any association, church or individual to direct their gifts, if they so choose. A few of our very best students, with families, have had heavy expenses, and had to receive large help or leave College. Some of these have been too valuable men to be permitted to go home. Others of these have expected their associations to supply a large part of what they have needed, but in some instances have been disap-

pointed in this. In all these cases the Board has done the best it knew and was able. The women of the Birmingham district have rendered valuable aid to the married students by collecting boxes of groceries, dry goods, and other essential items for their families. This is comparatively a new work and will be greatly increased in the future, I think. We trust so, at any rate.

23. After announcements and the benediction by A. J. Dickinson, the Convention adjourned to 8 P. M.

FIRST DAY—EVENING SESSION.

24. The Convention re-assembled at 8 P. M. and was called to order by the President, and was lead in prayer by R. S. Gavin, after which the report on Home Missions was presented by A. J. Preston as follows, viz :

Report of Committee on Home Missions.

On the 8th day of May, 1845, in the Baptist church of Augusta, Ga., the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention had its birth. The first thirty-seven years of its life was spent in Marion, Ala. From there it was moved to its present location in 1882. Beginning life with an annuity of \$6,200, only six missionaries could be employed, who occupied twenty-five stations or churches, baptized seventy-six converts and organized five churches. The report of the Corresponding Secretary for 1907 shows that it raised for all purposes \$231,834.03; employed 820 missionaries, who preached at 3,168 points; organized 271 churches and baptized 18,798. What a marvelous growth in these 65 years! Do we not feel as did Dr. Gray in opening his report? "Come, let us sing unto the Lord. Let us come before his presence with thanksgiving and make a joyful noise unto Him with psalms."

Mr. Richard H. Edmonds says in his letter to Dr. Gray, introductory to that valuable pamphlet, "The South's Amazing Progress": "Never before has any denomination had such an opportunity as is now presented to Southern Baptists." This we believe the Board fully realizes, and they are lengthening the cords yearly to meet the responsibility this opportunity affords. This the Board can not do without the united action on the part of more than one million white Baptists within the territory covered by the Southern Baptist Convention. FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS FOR HOME MISSIONS this year!! Is it too much? These are the figures set by the Convention at Richmond, and to meet the immediate demand the Board must have every penny of this. We recommend that the Baptist of Alabama raise at least \$35,000.

The Board is doing work in ten States east of the Mississippi. The inflowing tide of foreigners, the material development and the growth of the cities create a demand that can not be ignored. Among the many needy points we call attention to the work in Florida. In Tampa, the work is faithfully done by Rev. W. H. Clark and Miss Bristol. At Key West, we find pastor M. A. Clonts, who is untiring in the service. Last August the Home Board went to the assistance of the Florida State Board at Ft. Myers, where they purchased valuable property. The work in Florida is growing rapidly, and the reports show that the outlook there was never so promising.

The frontier work is more promising than ever. This has brought about much activity in Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Indian Territory, Missouri and Texas. The Board is aiding here in the support of more than 1,500 missionaries and has expended above \$26,000. They still concentrate upon New Orleans, and the future grows brighter even though the reign of Romanism is stern.

During the year, about \$55,000 has been added to our mountain school properties which are now worth about \$200,000. This is an investment that will pay large dividends in strong physical, moral, mental, and spiritual boys and girls. Because of their simple faith in the pure gospel, they are as a stream of purity flowing into the ranks of leadership.

Your committee believes that the work among the negroes is of vital importance. His residence among us has much to do with the moral and religious development. This we are forced to admit; therefore, we should not only let the work being done continue, but, if possible, enlarge.

The political agitations which have prevailed in Cuba has disturbed the work there, notwithstanding this fact the prospects are brighter and more hopeful. On September 2, 1906, the "Cuban-American College" opened its doors to Cuban students. Although this was the first year, more than one hundred were enrolled. The College has been presided over by Dr. L. T. Mays, a consecrated and able man, who was assisted by Rev. M. N. McCall and nine other able teachers. Dr. Mays was pastor of the English speaking congregation in addition to his work in the College. Dr. Mays has resigned his work. The Board hopes to have his successor soon on the ground. M. N. McCall is pastor of the Spanish speaking con-

gregation, assisted by Eugenio Calijo. It would take too much time and space to dwell upon the work at Mantanza under the leadership of J. V. Cova; Colon, under the hard working pastor, F. T. Paez; Sagua la Grande, Santa Clara and three other important points. Too much can not be said or done for this gospel thirsty country, the "Pearl of the Antilles." The need of the pure gospel is great. Shall we give it to them?

Political disturbances in the Isle of Pines have interfered with the progress of the work. But now that the United States has decided that the Isle of Pines belong to Cuba, the disturbances have subsided and our work is in most hopeful condition, a recent meeting culminating in a most glorious revival, with 128 baptisms and the organization of a church, while many other candidates await baptism.

Now that the canal is being opened up through the Isthmus from Panama to Colon makes this, which is soon to be an international highway, a most strategic point of operation for Southern Baptist. We must not let this opportunity go by, but with the same vigor with which this titanic work is being pressed should we plant our forces and dispatch the Lord's business.

We must not close this report without calling special attention to the all important department of evangelism. We believe this to be one of the most important steps forward that the Convention has ever made. Soul saving is the underlying principle of Christianity. All other departments depend upon this. Here we gather strength and enlarge the constituency.

The Tichenor Memorial lacks only \$1,137.73 of completion, less now. That was the amount when the Southern Baptist Convention met at Richmond, and this will soon be raised by the good women. But we must add to this. The many "churchless churches" make this demand imperative. In the city of Birmingham \$10,000 are needed for chapels. The organizations are at present holding services in tents, school houses and the homes of the people. So much more could be done if we had homes for the congregations. Dr. Gray says, "We need five hundred thousand dollars for this purpose."

In conclusion let us call attention to *Our Home Field*, the organ of the Home Board. Each issue contains valuable information which every Baptist should have. We recommend that there be an active agent in each association and church in Alabama, for this valuable monthly which can be had for less than it cost to print it.

To accomplish all that needs to be done, every one must feel their own individual responsibility. The task may appear voluminous, but it is not when divided among more than one million Baptists. Let us be of good courage, for "the prospects are as bright as the promises of God."

SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION.

27. At 8:30 A. M. the Convention re-assembled and a service of "Prayer for the Women of Our Churches" was conducted by A. P. Montague.

28. The special order of the hour being the consideration of the Report of the Director's of the Convention (See Item 19), the Convention was addressed by H. S. D. Mallory, M. B. Wharton, Austin Crouch, J. M. Shelburne, J. V. Dickinson, who moved to postpone action on the matter until the session of 1908 and this motion was discussed by J. R. Tyson and W. A. Taliaferro. The time for its further consideration having expired, on motion of W. B. Crumpton, the time was indefinitely extended and the matter was further discussed by W. B. Crumpton, B. H. Crumpton, A. S. Smith, A. W. Briscoe, Austin Crouch, G. L. Comer. R. A. J. Cumbee moved to table the motion to postpone, which was carried by a vote of ninety-four to seventy-four. G. L. Comer moved the previous question which was sustained by a vote of one hundred and twenty to fifty-seven, and the report was adopted. Austin Crouch moved that the Convention bid the School godspeed, which was unanimously adopted.

29. H. S. D. Mallory, Chairman of the Committee to confer with the Brethren at Newton, Alabama (See Items 13, 46), presented the following report, which was adopted, viz :

Report on Newton School.

To the Alabama Baptist State Convention :

BRETHREN :—We, the Committee to whom was referred that part of the Report of the Corresponding Secretary, relating to the Baptist Collegiate Institute at Newton in Dale County, beg leave to report that we have made inquiry into the matter and find,

First. The school is owned and controlled by the Baptist denomination, and its purpose and teaching is to furnish a first class high school and education with special emphasis on moral and religious training. Beginning with a small enrollment in 1898—its enrollment the past year in the regular school was 292 and of new pupils in the summer school was 38—being a total of 330. During the nine years of its existence it has turned out 200 teachers, 8 music teachers, prepared for medicine 22, and prepared for various colleges, 70. The school is distinctly Baptist and of the graduates about 95 per cent. are Baptist believers.

The school is doing a great work in literary, moral and religious training and has been and is a great blessing to this section of the State.

Second. It has a property consisting of 8 acres of land and buildings worth between \$7,000 and \$8,000. It is indebted in amount between \$1,800 and \$2,000, contracted in the erection of buildings.

Third. The management and patrons of the school, realizing its greater possibility if taken charge of by the Convention, now offer to deed the property to this Convention and turn the school and its control and management over to it, if the indebtedness above mentioned is assumed and paid by the Convention.

Fourth. We find no legal obstacle to the acquirement of the property by the Convention and the conduct of the school or a Baptist institution by it.

We therefore recommend :

First. That the proposition be accepted by this Convention, and that upon a proper valid conveyance being made to it by the trustees of said school holding the legal title to the property, that this Convention assume and pay said indebtedness.

Second. That this Convention take steps to raise the amount necessary to discharge said indebtedness. In this connection, we will state that Dr. Hubbard has already secured subscriptions to the amount of \$1,000, which he reports as perfectly solvent on the amount necessary, and that he would in a few days have raised the full amount had he not ceased his efforts on being advised that the Convention could not secure a good title to the property. Of this amount \$400 was subscribed by the people of Newton.

Third. We further recommend that in the event the property is deeded to the Convention, that the first Board of Trustees be composed of Brethren A. N. Jones as President of the Board, S. S. Chapman as Secretary, and S. L. Jones, B. P. Poyner and H. J. Ward to hold until the next regular meeting of this Convention.

31. J. L. Thompson presented the Report of the Committee to which was referred the Report of the State Board of Missions (See Item 8), which was adopted as follows, viz :

Report on the Report of the State Board of Missions.

It is with great pleasure that your committee notes the advance in the increase of contributions to our State Mission work, and we do not hesitate to say that this increase is due largely to the persistent energy of Secretary Clumpton in keeping the work of the Board before our people.

We would urge upon our pastors and Sunday school superintendents the importance of using the new Sunday School Secretary in their work. There is no greater need among all the churches of the State than efficient workers in the Sunday school, and there is no better method of meeting their universal need than by making use of the Sunday School Secretary, who is a specialist along this line, and is well equipped for his duties.

Too much emphasis cannot be placed on the schedule adopted by the Convention. The churches adopting this schedule are being developed more rapidly than ever before in their history. This alone is sufficient to commend it to all of our churches.

The suggestion of the Corresponding Secretary in regard to securing property in Montgomery, or some other city, for Baptist headquarters is no idle dream. We see many advantages that would come to our general work in Alabama, if such a thing could be accomplished. We believe this Convention ought to give this important matter serious consideration.

We recommend the suggestion in the report in regard to appropriating \$7,000 to the Home Board Church Building Loan Fund be concurred in by this Convention, and that said appropriation be made. We also recommend that the State Board of Missions and the Board of Trustees of the Healing Springs School be instructed to make such repairs on the building as they deem in their wisdom to be necessary.

It is gratifying to note the increased interest in our Aged and Infirm Ministers Fund. The report tells us that the contributions to their object are gradually increasing. Surely these servants of God ought not to be allowed to suffer, and our churches ought not allow anything to interfere with this part of the schedule.

behalf of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Ky., and by J. M. Shelburne, its Chairman, in behalf of the Board, and the report was adopted, and the Convention adjourned to 2:30 P. M. after prayer by J. M. Shelburne.

SECOND DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

34. The Convention re-assembled at 2:30 P. M. and a prayer service "For Soul Winners" was conducted by W. D. Hubbard, after which the Convention proceeded to the transaction of its business.

35. On motion the Report on Encampment was called for and read by A. G. Mosely as follows, viz :

Report of Encampment.

1. Your committee begs to report its regrets that the execution of its fully prepared encampment plans were hindered by circumstances beyond the committee's control.

2. It is your committee's conviction that an annual encampment of Alabama Baptists would be of untold benefit to our work and growth in the State.

3. We recommend the appointment of a committee to take in hand the work of an encampment for 1908, if in the committee's judgment a satisfactory time and place for such a gathering can be secured.

F. P. Nichols moved to amend by substituting Roanoke for Andalusia. After discussion by F. P. Nichols, J. J. Hagood and T. J. Porter, the motion was adopted and the report as amended was adopted as follows, viz:

Report on Time, Place and Preacher.

Your Committee on Time, Place and Preacher recommend that the next session be held at Roanoke, Ala., on Wednesday after the third Sunday in July, 1908.

38. The hour for considering the Report of the Judson College Trustees (See Item 16), having arrived, the Convention was addressed

in that interest by Paul V. Bomar, L. R. Gwaltney, a former president of the college, G. G. Miles and R. G. Patrick, President of the college and the report was adopted.

39. Under the head of miscellaneous business, a telegram from L. O. Dawson was read as follows, viz :

“Greeting in Christ Jesus. With him as pilot let us quit hugging the shore and push out to the open sea for bigger things in Alabama.

40. On motion of W. B. Crumpton, the time for consideration of Foreign Missions to-night was fixed at 8 to 9 and the rest of the evening given to displaced reports, and the Convention adjourned to 8 P. M. after prayer by R. G. Patrick.

SECOND DAY—EVENING SESSION.

41. The Convention re-assembled at 8 P. M. and after prayer led by Byron H. Dement, the Report on Foreign Missions was read by A. A. Hutto as follows, viz :

Foreign Mission Report.

“Go ye” are our marching orders. “Into all the world” is the place. “Preach the gospel” is the work. “And to every creature” is the extent of effort. Baptizing believers and teaching them to observe all things commanded of Christ is the perfecting of the work. Christ was a foreign missionary in belief and practice, and he committed his work to his disciples. The first centuries of christianity witnessed marvelous strides in foreign mission efforts. Then a long season of apathy came till William Carry rekindled the flame from which has spread light and hope into all the nations. To-day practically all denominations of christians have their foreign mission societies, boards, missionaries and funds for world wide evangelization. The doors of the nations are wide open, knowledge is increasing, christian nations are rapidly growing in power and wealth. The nations of the earth are brought together by steam, electricity and the printing press. The world is getting a world-wide vision of world-wide conditions and obligations. Old religions are being abandoned, idol temples are being deserted, and false gods are falling and crumbling. The “tramp, tramp” of the mighty army of King Jesus, bearing the cross and white banner is distinctly heard everywhere. We have come to a great day in the kingdom. The signals of victory beckon us on, the pillar is moving forward. Let Israel’s host follow on and possess the land for we are well able to do so. Since the creation of the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, there has been a steady increase in contributions, intelligence, sympathy workers and conversions. The work goes forward by leaps and bounds. I take these figures from the report of Dr. Willingham made at Richmond last May :

In 1887, Workers on Foreign Fields, Native and Foreign.....	116
Baptisms for the year	228
Total membership	1646
Contributions for the year	\$ 87,830 00

Twenty years later, 1907, the figures are:

Workers on Foreign Field, Native and Foreign	500
Baptisms for the year	2,239
Total membership	14,437
Contributions for the year	\$403,811 54

This shows an increase of fourfold in workers, tenfold in baptisms, almost tenfold in membership, and more than fourfold in contributions during the twenty years. The past ten years have marked the most rapid progress in the history of the board's work. New fields have been opened and old fields enlarged and strengthened. We are now doing work in China, Japan, Africa, Argentina, Mexico, Brazil and Italy.

SCHOOLS.

The Foreign Board has found it necessary to conduct day schools, and now has under its supervision 108 such schools. Through these schools the converts and their children are held and trained, beside many others are brought thus under the influence of the missionaries. And this gives stability and respectability to the general work. These schools, with few exceptions, are self-supporting. Then there are seven Theological Seminaries on the foreign fields, conducted by our board, in which there are over 100 natives in training for their work. It is believed by some of our wisest men that this kind of work is the most far-reaching of any work on the field, as it trains men in spiritual things whose mode of thinking and living is like that of those whom we want to reach. These seminaries are under wise management.

MEDICAL MISSIONS.

It has been found that by ministering to the physical man the spiritual may be more easily reached. Hence men of skill in treating bodily ills, yet of deep piety and skill to win souls, have been selected as missionaries. There are twelve such medical missionaries, and they are doing a great work. Some of them have hospitals, others are pleading for hospitals and need them very much. These hospitals are called by the natives "Jesus Stations."

PRINTING PRESS.

The printing press has been found a potent agency in foreign mission work. Bibles, religious books, papers and tracts are sent out in great quantities. These printed pages are leaves of healing from the tree of life, to the sin sick captives of darkness.

We commend most heartily the splendid work done for foreign missions by our noble and godly women. We believe their work deserves greater consideration than it usually gets in our religious gatherings. Last year the women of the south gave for foreign missions \$74,124.00, of which the women of Alabama gave \$5,503 35.

We rejoice at the new movement known as the layman's movement. Their slogan is the world for Christ in twenty-five years. We are glad that our own brethren have now organized. We believe it is the most hopeful sign of the day. We most heartily commend our four secretaries, Drs. Willingham, Smith, Ray and Porter. Their work is divided as follows: Willingham is Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board, Smith is Editorial Secretary, Ray is Educational Secretary and Porter is Field Secretary. The "Service" recently put it in this way: Willingham stands for organization, Smith for information, Ray for education and Porter for inspiration. These men are doing their work nobly.

Also we most earnestly urge our people to take and read the Foreign Mission Journal published at Richmond, at the low price of 25 cents per year. It has

recently been enlarged and improved. Also we urge that the tracts sent out by the board be used to greater advantage. We recommend that our convention do her part in the proposed forward movement during the next convention year, and to this end that we endeavor to raise for foreign missions next fiscal year the amount of \$40,000. The future is as bright as the promises of God, and the promises of God are brighter than the sun in all his glory.

We make our appeal in behalf of lost men bound in darkness, and in behalf of those already doing rescue work on the field, but especially for the sake of our Christ who died and now intercedes for a lost world.

Anderson, of Kentucky, under appointment as missionary to China, who spoke to the report, which was further discussed by S. J. Porter and W. B. Crumpton, and the report was adopted.

42. The special order being the Reports on the Centennial (See Items 9, 35), the reports were re-read as follows :

Report of the Committee on Centennial Observance.

Your committee, to whom was referred the resolution relative to a suitable celebration of the year 1908, the 100th anniversary of the founding of the first Baptist church in Alabama, respectfully submit the following :

The first Baptist church constituted in Alabama, of which we have any trace, was the Flint River Church, a few miles northeast of Huntsville. It was constituted Oct. 2, 1808. The credit of its organization is due to Rev. John Nicholson. The membership was about one dozen. The church was constituted in the home of James Deaton. Like the primitive churches, it worshipped in private homes for a number of years. Rev. John Nicholson had as his colleagues in the ministry Revs. John Canterbury and Zadok Baker. These men were pioneers in the Northern part of the State for preaching and evangelization.

For many years Flint River Church has been out of existence ; but two years ago, at Brownsboro, near the spot where the old church stood, a church was constituted. Under the labors of one of the missionaries of our Board a neat house of worship has been erected and was dedicated on June 30.

It seems fitting that the Baptists of Alabama shall celebrate the one hundredth anniversary of the planting of their principles in our fair State. How marvelously God has blessed us ! The little one of only twelve members has become an immense multitude of 157,400, gathered into 1893 churches. The scream of the locomotive has long since taken the place of the war whoop of the savages. Broad fields of waving corn and blooming cotton can be seen where once was the trackless forest. In the place of the old log houses, which it took our fathers so long to build, we have convenient and comfortable houses of worship every few miles. Then a lone preacher, on foot or horseback, would thread his way along dim trails across the mountains to carry the bread of life to the settlements in the valleys along the water courses ; now, in a buggy, on a grav-

elled highway or sweeping along in palace cars, our preachers go to their appointments. Then not a man giving himself "wholly to these things;" now we have hundreds of consecrated, cultured men, doing the one thing of making plain the claims of the gospel. Then our people knew nothing but poverty and hardship; to-day but few know what want is, the great mass of them are in comfortable circumstances and many thousands are rich and growing richer every day.

Surely we ought, in grateful acknowledgment of "God's good hand upon us," devise some liberal scheme by which his goodness may be celebrated. In this age, when our people are beginning to read the commission of our Lord in a new light, what more fitting than to attempt a Mission Revival?

We recommend, therefore, that the Baptists of Alabama, for the year 1907-1908, do undertake to raise ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS FOR EVERY YEAR OF THE CENTURY. Can we do it? Your committee believe we can. Shall we undertake it? Let the brethren speak. Will we do it? The Lord grant that there may be one response: "BY HIS HELP WE WILL."

Should this suggestion meet with the approval of the Convention, we recommend: That the Committee of Co-operation, with the Corresponding Secretary, take the matter in hand and begin at once the agitation of the question; that each fifth Sunday during the year be devoted to the Centennial Movement; that the pastors in city and town churches, having preaching every Sunday, be asked to preach on suitable subjects for the occasion on that day; that the churches in the country appoint delegates to union meetings to be held at central points where discussions may be had on the subject; that the largest contribution possible be taken in town, city and country churches on that day for the Centennial Celebration, to be added to the mission contributions which are taken in the churches on the place of the regular schedule.

43. On motion of John W. Stewart, a Centennial Committee, consisting of C. A. Stakely, Chairman, P. V. Bomar, J. H. Foster, Austin

Crouch, Richard Hall, J. W. Sandlin, G. L. Yates, R. E. Pettus, W. B. Crumpton, C. W. O'Hara and M. M. Wood, was appointed who shall have in charge the Centennial Celebration for the next year.

44. J. M. Shelburne, by unanimous consent, offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted, viz :

Resolutions.

Inasmuch as it has reached us that the principles of separation of church and State, for which we, as a people have always stood, is being violated in Alabama in the form of appropriations of public money to the support of sectarian institutions.

Resolved, That we, the Baptists of Alabama in Convention assembled, hereby reaffirm our devotion to the time-honored principle, and express our sympathy with all persons in the commonwealth who are seeking to uphold and enforce it.

46. J. L. Thompson read the following communication, which was referred to a Committee composed of J. L. Thompson, R. G. Patrick, A. P. Montague, W. L. Yarbrough, Austin Crouch and R. S. Gavin to be reported on at the next session.

Resolutions of the Educational Rally.

To the Alabama Baptist State Convention :

At a meeting of an educational rally held in the town of Newton, Ala., on the 13th day of March, last, the following resolutions were adopted, and the brethren whose names are hereto attached were appointed a committee to bring these resolutions before the Convention. Therefore, we most respectfully urge that this matter be taken up by this Convention at once, and given due consideration, and that a judicious committee be appointed in accordance with the spirit of said resolutions, and that this committee be requested to make its report to the Convention as early as practicable.

Resolved, 1. That we recommend to the Alabama Baptist State Convention the appointment of a committee to consider and formulate a plan whereby the schools and colleges of the Baptist denomination of the State shall become *federated*.

Resolved, 2. That we, the members of the Educational Rally, recommend that a committee of five brethren be appointed to draft a suitable *Memorial* to be presented to the Convention at Dothan next July.

Resolved, 3. That the following principles be observed in the matter of *Federation* :

1. General combination and union.
2. Separate special management.
3. Board of directors for general supervision.

4. Each school and college with its own board.
5. Chancellor for the whole system.
6. Each school and college with its own president.
7. Occasional interchange of lecturers.

This memorial and these resolutions we now respectfully submit for your consideration.

We recommend further that the committee apportion to the Associations the amount expected of each, and that a co-operative committee be appointed in each Association, who shall apportion the amounts for the different objects to each one of the churches, and shall encourage all the churches to make offerings as the schedule provides.

51. The Report on Memorials was presented by M. M. Wood and adopted as follows, viz:

Report on Deceased Ministers.

Your Committee on Memorials beg to submit the following report. Eight of our ordained ministers have died since the last convention, as follows:

REV. E. F. BABER. (Letters written to secure data unanswered.) He was for many years connected with the *Alabama Baptist*, a pastor of churches, and was a soldier in the war between the States. He was a good and true man.

REV. W. H. CHEATHAM was born in Butler county, Alabama, February 3, 1829. He was ordained to the ministry by Indian Creek Church, Butler county, about 1874, and died near Greenville, Ala., November 9, 1906.

REV. IRA I. COLLINS. (Letter written for data unanswered.) He lived in the northwest corner of Tuscaloosa county, and died at New Lexington, Ala., near the close of 1906, at about fifty years of age. He entered the ministry late in life. Though blind, and without scholastic training, and with a family on his hands, he provided well for his family, and had been for many years one of the three most useful ministers in his association. (Sipsey)

REV. W. A. CRUMBIE was born in Pike county, Georgia, December 13, 1836. Moved to Coffee county, Alabama, in 1851. He was ordained to the ministry at the Bluff Springs Baptist Church in 1865, and died in Covington county, Alabama, September 13, 1906. He was pastor of several churches during his life, and at one time clerk of Zion Association.

REV. W. H. DEWITT was born April 3, 1851. He was an ordained minister and an active pastor of churches for over thirty-six years. He was twice married and the father of eighteen children, eight of whom are living. He died at his home near Gastonburg, Ala., December 5, 1906.

REV. J. L. GREGORY was born June 8, 1863. He was saved and received into Lebanon church, East Liberty Association, in early life. He was ordained to the ministry at Jackson's Gap, Ala., in 1888, and "fell on sleep" August 23, 1906. During the eighteen years of his ministerial life he was pastor of prominent churches in his association, and for eight years its loved and honored moderator. He was twice married. First, to Miss Anna Garlington, September 17, 1882. Two children were born to this marriage. Next, to Miss Alice Gammill, December 20, 1894, to which three children were born, all of whom, together with his first born, survive him.

REV. J. B. HAMBERLIN was born in Franklin county, Mississippi, November 21, 1830. He graduated from Mississippi College in 1856, and from Rochester Theological Seminary in 1858, and was ordained to the ministry a short while after, in Clinton, Miss. He was pastor of a number of prominent churches in Mississippi and Alabama, moderator of associations, and the founder of the Baptist Industrial Institute at Healing Springs, Ala., where he died Oct. 26, 1906. He was married three times and became the father of two sons, one of whom still survives him.

REV. C. L. HARRIS was born in Clay county, Alabama, ——— and ordained to the ministry ——— and died at China Grove, Ala., Dec. 6, 1906, where he had been pastor for three years, leaving a wife and five children.

52. The following resolution was read by R. E. Pettus by request of H. S. D. Mallory and adopted, viz: (See Items 13, 29, 46.)

Newton School Matter.

Resolved, That the Board of Directors of the Convention is hereby directed to take such measures as are necessary or proper for the further organization and conduct of the school at Newton, until the next meeting of this Convention, in event the said property is acquired by this Convention, and

That the Corresponding Secretary of the State Board of Missions shall take such steps as may be necessary to raise the funds required to discharge the indebtedness of the school, referred to in the resolution already adopted by the Convention.

53. H. B. Foster offered the following resolution which was adopted after a brief address by the author, viz:

Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund.

Resolved, That the President of the Convention appoint a committee of nine, whose duty it shall be to receive subscriptions to the "Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund." That only the interest on said fund so raised shall be used.

Resolved further, That the Convention select five trustees, one of whom shall be the Treasurer of this Convention, who shall be charged with the duty of lending or investing said funds.

54. On motion A. T. Owen, President of Selma University for Colored Baptists, addressed the Convention in the interest of his school.

55. The following resolution, offered by A. J. Dickinson, was amended and adopted after discussion by A. J. Dickinson, W. B. Crumpton and G. G. Miles, viz :

Resolution by A. J. Dickinson.

Resolved, That hereafter the Boards reporting to this Convention have their reports printed and ready for distribution at the opening of the session, when practicable.

56. The Report on Orphans' Home was called up (See Item 18), and the Convention was addressed by F. W. Barnett, C. S. Rabb, J. W. Stewart, and, after three little girls from the Home had recited a part of Forty-first Psalm, an offering of \$53.60 was made to the Home, and the report was adopted.

57. H. B. Woodward presented the Report of the Committee to which was referred the Reports of the Trustees of the Scottsboro, Healing Springs and Eldridge Institute (See Item 16), as follows, viz :

Report on the Report of the Scottsboro, Eldridge and Healing Springs Schools.

We, your committee to whom was referred the report on the Scottsboro, Eldridge and Healing Springs Schools, beg leave to submit the following :

1st. We find that the Scottsboro school is in a prosperous condition. The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has provided a dormi-

tory for girls, and proposes to contribute one half of the amount toward the erection of a dormitory for boys to cost \$10,000. Prof. W. L. Yarbrough has secured in bankable notes \$2,300 of the \$5,000 to be raised by the people of the State.

2nd. We find that the school at Eldridge has started out under favorable auspices. A dormitory for boys is being built, and the Home Board proposes when this building is completed to erect a dormitory for girls.

We therefore recommend that the State Board of Missions be instructed to employ suitable agency to secure the necessary funds for the completion of the buildings at Scottsboro and Eldridge.

With respect to the Healing Springs School we recommend that the State Board of Missions be authorized to provide for the additional furniture necessary and also the needed repairs on the buildings.

We rejoice to learn that the Home Board has acquired property and established a school at Gaylesville. The school will open its first session in September with Prof. J. J. Yarbrough as principal. This school has been located in a section where such an institution is badly needed, and we hope and expect much from it.

Addresses were made by W. L. Yarbrough, Principal of Scottsboro School, and A. N. Reeves, Financial Secretary of the Eldridge School, and a contribution amounting to \$57.00 in cash and \$181.50 in subscriptions was made to the Building Fund of the Eldridge School, and the report was adopted.

58. The Report on Temperance was called for and read by J. E. Barnes and, after addresses by Brooks Lawrence, Superintendent of the Alabama Anti-Saloon League, G. H. Malone and J. D. Flowers, the report was adopted as follows, viz :

Report on Temperance.

Great reformations never spring into existence at once, there must be times of seed sowing. It is line upon line, precept upon precept, here a little and there a little. It is true to-day as it was during the earthly life of Christ, that one soweth and another reapeth. It is also true, sometimes, that one is spared to help reap the fruits of what, in other days, he sowed.

It seems to your committee that what has been said applies to the temperance movement. Patiently and in faith has the sowing of temperance seed been done through the year, in the homes, by the press, in the Sunday schools, in the day schools, from the platform, from the pulpit, and in various other ways men and women have joined hands and hearts in this blessed work. Many different organizations, too, have had a part in this work. Public sentiment has been gradually aroused until to-day it seems that a mighty temperance wave is sweeping over our fair land that promises to rid the land of the greatest curse that afflicts our people.

We believe that God, through the year, raised men to lead in all important movements. We also believe that He guides men in the organization of important

movements so as to help crystalize public sentiment. As we study the far-reaching effects of this temperance movement, not only in this State, but in many others, we can clearly see the effective work which has been accomplished by the Anti-Saloon League. We need not be surprised at this for the League is uniting the efforts of all thinking people on this subject, of all the different denominations, and of many others who make no pretensions to christianity.

It is with gratitude to God that your committee can call attention to a few things that should greatly encourage us in this work at this time:

1. There is the passage of the local option bill, by the present Legislature, which was prepared by the leaders of the Anti-Saloon League. While this law is not all we could wish—two amendments having been made to the bill before its passage—still its passage was a great victory in behalf of temperance.

2. Another important measure that was passed is the anti-shiping bill. This will be far-reaching in its effects, thus helping to protect the prohibition sections of our State.

3. We greatly rejoice in the passage of the bill which regulates the closing of all saloons throughout the State in the early hours of the evening.

4. It gives us much joy to report that several dispensary saloons have been closed since our last meeting as a convention. Also that a few counties have been placed in the prohibition column, and others are getting things in shape for an early vote as to whether whiskey shall be legally sold in any form.

5. Your committee would emphasize that after a l, the religion of Jesus Christ is the only solution to the whi-key problem.

As a result of a gracious revival in the town of Dothan in which we met, and in several others, the dispensary saloon has either been closed or the people have been greatly aroused on the question and many others will probably be closed in a short time.

In conclusion your committee would call attention to the fact that the victory has not been fully won. The victories thus won should stimulate us to press with vigor on until the land shall have been fully possessed.

Let us stand nobly by the Anti-Saloon League in its splendid efforts, with our money, our sympathy and our prayers, and the day will not be far distant when we can praise God for the complete banishment of the liquor traffic from our beloved State.

59. The Reports on Sunday Schools and Baptists Young People's Union, were ordered considered together and the reports presented as follows, viz:

The Report on Baptist Young Peoples Union by C. J. Bently as follows, viz:

Report on B. Y. P. U.

The B. Y. P. U. has been organized in Alabama fourteen years.

During these years every department of our church work has been materially aided and quickened by the culture and consecration of our young people.

The B. Y. P. U. was not organized as a money collecting agency, but for the training of our young people in church work along all lines of activity.

The fact remains, however, that the B. Y. P. U. has during the last three years raised nearly one thousand dollars for Howard College. Some unions are

assisting the Orphans' Home, some are raising funds to aid their local church work, some give to missions and assist in paying pastor's salary.

The convention in Montgomery this year was thought by some to be the best State convention yet held.

In addition to the presence and aid of quite a number of pastors and other active brethren in the State, the unions in Montgomery secured the valuable personal help of the editor of *Service*, Dr. Geistweit of Chicago, Ill.

Let it be emphasized again that the B. Y. P. U. was organized —

1. To prepare our young people to be "Pastors' Helpers."

2. To train them for efficient church work.

3. To prepare them to aid church prayer meetings.

4. To encourage them to look out for strangers moving into the community and report to the pastor.

5. To train them to contribute in a systematic effort to support all church work the world over.

It is the purpose of the B. Y. P. U. to push a better and wider organization of the work in the future.

Bro. Crossland, so recently selected as S. S. evangelist, will aid in B. Y. P. U. work also.

Let us as a State Convention of Baptists in Alabama give due regard to this question of training our young people. They need our sympathy, our encouragement. They are a part of us, a large part of us. We need them now and in the future that is coming to our Baptist people in this State, in this great Southland, in this world that so much needs God and the religion of Jesus Christ.

The Report on Sunday Schools was read by H. J. Willingham as follows, viz :

Report of Committee on Sunday Schools.

In making a comparative study of statistics found in the current number of the proceedings of the Southern Baptist Convention, taking into consideration the number of churches with their membership in the several States of the South, it is found that Alabama is about an average with the other States in the percentage of Sunday schools and in enrollment in Sunday schools.

Conditions in Alabama favorable to this feature of our organized church work are certainly above a mere average when considered among the 15 States composing the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention. Are we satisfied with being

a mere average? Why not redouble our energies and our enthusiasm and find out how it would feel to stand first? True we are growing. Last year we had reported :

	1906	1907
Number of Sunday Schools	890	980
Enrollment	56,377	67,479
Number of churches	1,760	1,893

The percentage of income in the matter of enrollment is really gratifying.

By a careful search through all available records your committee finds that 915 churches had no organized Sunday school work during the year closing with 1906, while 978 reported regularly organized Sunday schools.

More importance is now being given to the work of the Sunday school than in former years. It is no longer regarded as a good place merely for children and a few consecrated women teachers. It is not only instructing the children, but our people now recognize the Sunday school as indispensable for training the membership of the churches.

Your committee takes it for granted that all Baptist Sunday schools in Alabama now insist on buying their supplies from our Sunday School Board at Nashville, Tenn. The many excellencies of these publications ought to be enough to guarantee their universal use in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention. But when we remember that this Board, our own Board, puts annually all its surplus earnings into the treasuries of these interests which we as a denomination foster, then the reason becomes doubly strong why we should secure all our Sunday school literature from the Sunday School Board at Nashville.

During the year just closed this Board was able to contribute in cash to—

This does not include colportage supplies and periodicals, \$9,000, making a grand total of more than \$50,000 for one year's contribution by this Board in promoting work in the Master's vineyard.

While in our own State there is a large number of the churches reporting no schools, yet the fact remains that the people as a whole believe in this great and glorious work. It would be impossible for any warm hearted Christian to present this work in any Baptist Church in Alabama, and not meet with a hearty response on the part of a large majority of those present. This is a state of affairs for which we have just reason to thank the God of all Grace.

Your committee on this subject, in making its report one year ago, said :

"The impression is taking hold and gaining popularity that the time is fast approaching, if not now upon us, when our State Board of Missions should put a Sunday school secretary in the field for the State at large to assist in organizing local work with institutes, conventions, etc."

The Alabama State Board of Missions seems to have concurred heartily in that view of the situation.

The committee noted with pleasure the appointment by the State Board of Missions of the Rev. T. V. Neal, who had recently taken a course in the Seminary, to the responsible position of Sunday School Secretary for Alabama. On

account of failing health, however, this brother was forced to go to a distant State in search of a climate more favorable to his condition.

At a recent meeting of the Baptist State Board of Missions, brother C. E. Crossland, a graduate of Howard College and a member of the Ruhama Church, was selected to take the place made vacant by brother Neal's resignation. Bringing into this work ambition, devotion and a thorough college training, we predict great usefulness for this consecrated layman. His labors will be in the interest of the Sunday school cause in Alabama, and if the brethren will give their aid and co-operation, excellent results may be looked for.

In closing this report your committee desires to stamp with its most earnest approval all that has been said from time to time as to the paramount importance of thorough preparation on the part of each teacher who stands before a class in a Sunday school. Each class will grow in interest and in numbers as the teacher prepares himself in every possible way for the great work intrusted to his hands.

THIRD DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

60. The Convention re-assembled at 2:30 P. M. and a service of "Prayer for Our Sunday Schools" was conducted by P. L. Mosely.

61. By common consent C. S. Rabb offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted, viz :

Resolved, that this Convention has heard with deep sorrow of the death of Dr. T. T. Eaton, of Louisville, Ky.

We thank God for his useful life as editor, preacher and his potential influence in our denominational work through the Southern Baptist Convention, our educational institutions and the Western Recorder.

We extend our sympathy to those most bereaved.

62. By special invitation Paul Dix and J. S. Porter addressed the Convention in the interest of the Baptist Young People's Union.

63. The President announced standing committees as they appear on the second page of the cover of these minutes.

64. The Report on Woman's Work was called for and read by R. S. Gavin, and after discussion by Spencer Tunnell, was adopted as follows, viz :

Report of Committee on Woman's Work.

Dr. A. T. Pierson has said : " Woman's organizations have had an increase so rapid, an influence so wide, an impulse so forceful, that no other agency compares with them in value and virtue." And yet it has not been so very long ago when the work of the women in the interest of the Kingdom of our Lord was not thought to be worth our while.

The last part of the last century has gone to record as the time when woman began to realize as she should something of her own possibilities, as well as the time when conditions first made it possible for her to stand erect enough for man to take her full measure. From the viewpoint of Southern Baptists, this is especially true.

It is true that woman's work for woman began among Baptist women as early as Feb. 28, 1871, in the Baptist Church of Newton Centre, Mass., when eleven of the female members formed themselves into a " Woman's Missionary Society." In April of the same year about 200 women met and effected what they were pleased to term " a permanent organization for the doing of missionary work among women."

In 1867 Mrs. A. J. Graves, mother of Dr. R. H. Graves, organized a " Female Missionary Prayer Meeting " in the city of Baltimore. This was the real beginning of organized missionary work among the Baptist women of Baltimore. In 1872 the " Woman's Missionary Society " of Richmond, Va., was organized for the purpose of supporting Miss Edmonia Moon. Other local organizations were effected at divers times. It has been only nineteen years, however, since the real Woman's Missionary Union was born. And never in the history of the affairs of Southern Baptists has there been born among us a likelier child than she. Born of purest parentage, she had the right kind of blood coursing through her veins from the beginning. To-day as we call attention to her in the vigor and beauty of only nineteen years' growth, the most sanguine are made to marvel, not only at what she has already accomplished, but at what she bids fair to accomplish in the future.

Our lamented Dr. Tupper used to say : " The hope of China is in the salvation of her women. The women of the South are doing a divinely inspired work in supporting these women missionaries. And why may not woman's societies spring up all over our land, fired with the desire to give the Gospel to the women of heathen lands? Let these societies be formed. Let them band together for the simple and grand purpose of sending the ennobling and saving Gospel to women who are worse than slaves to their husbands. Daughters of Zion, mothers in Israel, if you have love for the Savior of your race, who has honored your sex above all humanity, in becoming the son of a woman, now is the time to show that love by making your free-will offering to Him ; which, though less costly, may be no less acceptable than that which won for Mary the imperishable praise : ' She hath done what she could. ' "

Oh, how it must rejoice this faithful servant of the Lord of hosts, if from his place of eternal rest, he now sees the noble work being done by this, one of the fairest of all the fair daughters of the hosts of the Baptists of the South !

1. The work as now carried on by the Union is divided into three parts :

(1.) The work of the Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the work of the Southern Baptist Convention.

(2.) The work of the Young Woman's Auxiliary to Woman's Missionary Union.

(3.) Sunbeam work.

2. The Richmond reports showed that last year the Union of the South, through its three departments of work, contributed to the three Boards and for the maintenance of the Margaret Home for Missionaries' Children, the sum of \$125,027.01. That was a glorious achievement. But added to that sum were other gifts, making the grand total contributed by the Woman's Missionary Union of the sixteen states, approximating 5,000 societies, \$154,674.88.

3. The outlook for woman's work was never quite so bright as now. Well might the women of the Southland pause long enough to sing a song of thanksgiving to Him who has led their forces so signally thus far. But under the inspiration of that epoch-making gathering of Baptists in Richmond in May last, the Union set up a new Ebenezer, and carved on it this motto: "*Larger things in prayer, study, organization and contributions.*" And then to prove their faith by their works, they resolved by an enthusiastic vote to raise during the present year for Foreign Missions alone, \$100,000; and for Home Missions the lordly sum of \$75,000.

What does it all mean? It means that Woman's Work is ordained of Providence as one of the greatest of all the agencies which are yet to fill this earth with the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea!

4. As to the work of the Union in Alabama:

(1.) The year just closed has been the best in the history of the Union. Alabama was one of the few States that went to Richmond in May with all pledges redeemed and all apportionments met. Her apportionment for Foreign and Home Missions was \$9,000; and when the roll of States was called, Alabama was first to respond; and her report showed that for both Boards she had exceeded the amounts asked for. For all purposes the Alabama Union has contributed this year, the sum of \$36,990.11. The ideal to which the Union still aspires is: "An active Vice-President in every Association in the State, whose duty it is to keep in close touch with the Unions in the Association and with the Central Committee; to have a Missionary Union in every church, and every woman in the church a member of the Union."

(2.) The new feature of Woman's Work in our State last year was the appointment at Talladega of Mrs. J. W. Vesey, of Birmingham, as the leader for our young woman's work. At Talladega 25 young woman's societies were reported. This year's report shows 55. These societies contributed last year \$2,023.90. But the Woman's Missionary Union took even a more advanced step in the interest of our young women when it put Mrs. Vesey in the field as the State organizer of young woman's societies. She deserves the sympathy, prayers and hearty co-operation of us all; for she is doing a work the value of which cannot be over-estimated.

(3.) The Sunbeam work under the supervision of Mrs. Hamilton continues to yield most satisfactory results. All things being considered, it is safe to say that no part of our denominational work is in a more healthy condition, or is better organized than our Woman's Work.

66. The following resolutions offered by C. E. Crossland, after discussion by C. E. Crossland, W. B. Crumpton, C. A. Stakely and M. B. Wharton, was adopted, viz :

Resolved, that it is the wish of this convention that the subject of Sunday schools be given a more important place and more time in the program of 1908 by the committee.

And the Convention adjourned to 8 P. M., after the benediction by C. A. Stakely.

THIRD DAY—EVENING SESSION.

67. The Convention re-assembled at 8 P. M. and R. S. Gavin, by appointment of the Program Committee, preached. Text, 1 Kings 20:40.

68. The business of the Convention having been completed, after a number of talks by members of the Convention, expressing their enjoyment of the sessions of the body and the hospitality of the city and their bright hopes for the future of our beloved cause, the members indulged in the usual farewell greetings, W. B. Crumpton led in prayer, and the Convention adjourned.

ARTICLE II.—The officers of the Convention shall be a President, First and Second Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary and a Treasurer, together with a Board of Directors, as hereinafter named, who shall be elected at each annual meeting, and who shall hold their offices until their successors are elected.

* ARTICLE III.—The President, or, in case of his absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, in their order, shall preside at all the deliberations of the Convention, and discharge the duties usually imposed upon an executive officer of deliberative bodies.

ARTICLE IV.—The Secretary shall make a fair record of the proceedings of the Convention, and soon after the rising of each regular meeting of the body shall attend to the printing and distribution of the minutes of the same, of which he shall preserve a file, which file shall constitute the authentic record of the Convention. He shall also conduct the correspondence of the body. For his services he may receive a reasonable compensation. The printing of the minutes of the Convention and the compensation of the Secretary shall be paid for by a *pro rata* taken from the funds sent for the various objects fostered by this body each year.

ARTICLE V.—The Treasurer shall take charge of the funds of the Convention, and hold the same subject to the order of this body, or of the Board of Directors during the recess of the Convention; and he shall make an annual report of all receipts and expenditures, which shall be audited and published with the minutes.

ARTICLE VI.—The President, Vice Presidents, Secretary and Treasurer, with nine other brethren, shall compose the Board of Directors, five of whom shall form a quorum authorized to transact any business of the Convention during the recess thereof, and shall report their proceedings at each annual meeting of the Convention.

ARTICLE VII.—The President shall have power to call a meeting of the Board of Directors whenever the exigency of the circumstances may, in his judgment, require the same.

ARTICLE XI.—The Convention may employ agents, whose duty it shall be to make collections, obtain subscriptions from societies, solicit churches and associations to unite with the Convention and to further all objects of this body.

ARTICLE XII.—The Convention shall have power to send delegates to the Southern Baptist Convention, and to any other assembly with which, in its wisdom, it may wish to communicate.

ARTICLE XIII.—The Convention shall hold its meetings at such time and place as it shall, from time to time, appoint.

ARTICLE XIV.—The funds of the Convention shall consist of voluntary contributions or donations and not otherwise.

ARTICLE XV.—The Convention disclaims all right of exercising authority over any church or association, hereby acknowledging that every church is independent, and, within its own sphere, is accountable to no body of men on earth.

ARTICLE XVI.—This Constitution may be altered or amended by the concurrence of three-fourths of the members present at any annual meeting, but not so as to infringe the Fifteenth Article.

ARTICLE XVII.—All amendments or alterations of this Constitution shall be proposed at one session and acted on at the next.

Kerfoot's "Parliamentary Law" and Mell's "Parliamentary Practice," so far as applicable, have been adopted for the government of the Convention, the former to govern in points where they conflict. (Item 19, 1900.)

Ministers' Conference.

The Baptist Ministers' Conference met at 2:30 P. M., July 23, 1907, in the building of the Dothan Baptist Church. The meeting was opened by singing, after which R. A. J. Cumbee led in prayer.

On motion of A. A. Hutto, R. A. J. Cumbee was elected President.

On motion of A. J. Preston, Arnold S. Smith was elected Secretary.

The subject, "The Church and Politics," was then ably discussed by A. J. Dickinson.

On motion of J. L. Rosser, the Conference extended a vote of thanks to Dr. Dickinson for his interesting and informing address. The question was also spoken to by J. W. Sandlin.

A. A. Hutto raised the question: "Is it right for Baptists to accept the offer of the State to exempt their church and school property from taxation?" After much discussion, participated in by A. J. Dickinson, W. B. Crumpton, F. W. Barnett, H. P. McCormick, G. G. Miles and R. M. Hunter, it developed that taxation on all church property was provided against by the Constitution of the State of Alabama.

The following resolution was introduced by G. L. Yates:

Whereas, we believe that now is the time when a clear note should be sounded out among our people on the subject of "The Church in Politics" and "Separation of Church and State," we suggest to all the pastors of this State that they give this matter their serious consideration and zealously lay it on the hearts of their people.

The resolution was discussed by J. M. Shelburne, O. P. Bentley, A. J. Preston, and adopted.

On motion the Conference adjourned to hold session of the Alabama Baptist Ministers' Benefit Association.

The meeting of the afternoon emphasized afresh the time honored Baptist doctrine of the complete separation of church and State, and was full of enthusiasm.

EVENING SESSION.

Convened at 8 P. M. After singing by the choir, reading Scriptures by J. L. Rosser, and prayer by C. A. Stakely, J. D. Gwaltney preached on "The Contradictions of Life," from Hebrews, 12:11.

On motion of W. B. Crumpton, C. A. Stakely, M. B. Wharton and W. A. Taliaferro were appointed a committee to arrange program for next year's meeting.

On motion of J. M. Shelburne, the committee was instructed to have programs printed for distribution among the audience at next meeting.

The Conference then adjourned to meet the day preceding the State Convention.

Alabama Baptist Ministerial Benefit Society

The Alabama Baptist Ministerial Benefit Society held its fifth annual meeting in the First Baptist Church, Dothan, on Tuesday, July 23, 1907, at 5 p. m., with W. B. Crumpton, President, presiding, and W. J. Elliott as Secretary.

The report of the President was read, as follows :

To the Brethren of the Baptist Ministers' Benefit Society :

In this, our fifth report, we are pained to report the death of two of our members, Brethren J. L. Gregory and I. L. Collins. They were both with us last year and took part in the proceedings.

To Mrs. Gregory was sent from the assessments \$349, and to Mrs. Collins \$359.

We are glad to report that only a few of our members refused to pay the assessments. Many of those who paid, while expressing their regrets at the death of these brethren, also expressed great pleasure in having the privilege to contribute something to the support of their families. The fourteen failing to pay the assessment for thirty days were dropped from the roll, according to our rule. We are sorry to lose also six, who failed to pay the one dollar annual fee.

The Secretary-Treasurer is carrying out the Constitution to the letter, and I commend him for it. There is no other way to conduct the business.

We now number 170 beneficiary members and 25 honorary. We are sorry to say some of the latter class failed to pay their assessments.

Our Constitution does not provide any way for us to get rid of unworthy members between sessions. Somebody ought to have the authority to suspend or expel a member for conduct unbecoming a minister of the gospel. While we hope such a rule will never have to be enforced, yet the authority ought to be somewhere lodged.

It would be grievous to drop the name of a missionary, but it cannot be avoided according to the rule. It is impossible for them to make reply in thirty days. Brethren Provence and McCollum are of our number. We do not wish to see them dropped. Shall exception be made in their case? Can we do it under our Constitution? Efforts ought to be made to get every preacher, who is giving himself to the ministry in Alabama, a member of our organization. We ought also to have several hundred laymen who will join us. These we can have by the asking, and every member should become an agent to that end.

The Secretary-Treasurer made efforts last fall to have the Society represented at many Associations.

I am persuaded that most of those who fail to send in their annual dues do so from carelessness. The family of one brother who died last year was greatly disappointed. The husband and father did not look after the matter of paying his one dollar annual dues when he was notified.

I suggest that hereafter all communications be by letter, upon which the full postage is paid. A printed postal card is very easy to overlook.

Constitution.

PREAMBLE.

We, the women of the Baptist Churches of Alabama, desirous of stimulating the Missionary spirit and the grace of giving among the women and children of the churches, and aiding in collecting funds for Missionary purposes, to be disbursed by the State Mission Boards and the Boards of the Southern Baptist Convention, adopt the following

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I. *Name*—This organization shall be known as the Woman's Missionary Union of Alabama, and shall be auxiliary to the Alabama Baptist State Convention.

ARTICLE II. *Object*—The two-fold object of this Missionary Union shall be :

1. To distribute Missionary information, to stimulate effort, and to encourage the organization of Woman's Missionary Societies and Children's Mission Bands.

2. To encourage the earnest, systematic co-operation of women and children in contributing money for Missions at home and abroad.

ARTICLE III. *Powers*—It shall have power to form rules, make arrangements and appoint committees for the accomplishment of its work.

ARTICLE IV. *Officers*—The officers shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Band Superintendent, a Treasurer, an Auditor and five others; these five shall reside in or near Birmingham. The whole are to be known as the Central Committee.

ARTICLE V. *Annual Meeting*—The annual meeting shall be held each year in connection with the Alabama Baptist State Convention, at the day and hour designated at the previous meeting of the Union.

ARTICLE VI. *Representation*—Each society shall be entitled to two delegates, except the society entertaining, which body shall be entitled to five. The officers of the Union and members of the Central Committee shall be delegates *ex-officio*. Only such delegates as are personally present and duly accredited by the Union, or by the societies they represent, shall be entitled to vote.

ARTICLE VII. *Conduct of Meetings*—Every session of the Union shall be opened and closed with religious exercises.

ARTICLE VIII. *Amendments*—The Constitution and By-Laws may be altered or amended only at the regular annual meeting, and at that time only by the vote of two-thirds of the delegates actually enrolled; but for the transaction of any other business a majority of the votes cast by those present shall be sufficient.

By-Laws.

1. *Elections*—All officers of the Union and members of the Central Committee shall be elected annually by the Union through a duly appointed nominating committee.
2. *President*—The President shall preside at the annual meetings, and appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.
3. *Associational Vice-Presidents*—The Associational Vice-Presidents shall be appointed by the Central Committee. They shall keep in close touch by correspondence with the State Organizer, the Corresponding Secretary and the officers of all Woman's Missionary Societies, and Children's Bands in all the churches of their Association. They shall assist the societies in forming an Associational Union, which shall meet annually. In the Absence of the President of the Associational Union they shall preside at the meeting.
4. *Corresponding Secretary*—It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to keep a record of all societies, with the names of churches classified by Associations, and the address of the officers of these societies. She shall conduct the correspondence of the Union, present reports of the condition of the work at the annual meeting, and keep a record book as a source of information.
5. *Recording Secretary*—The Recording Secretary shall keep an accurate record of the annual and special meetings of the Woman's Missionary Union. She shall also notify officers of their election and committees of their appointment, and shall perform other duties usual to her office.
6. *Band Superintendent*—The Band Superintendent shall, with the co-operation of pastors, Vice-Presidents, State Organizer and officers of societies, seek to organize the children for efficient, systematic mission work. She shall, through correspondence and the columns of our State paper, seek to enlist the children in mission work. She shall report at the annual meeting.
7. *Treasurer*—The Treasurer shall keep an account of money received and disbursements made, and record of all reports of money contributed and disbursed by societies reporting. She shall follow specific directions of the donors and make a detailed report at the annual meeting. She shall perform all other duties pertaining to her office.
8. *Auditor*—The duties of Auditor shall be those usually pertaining to that office.
9. *Central Committee*—The Central Committee shall carry out the instructions of the Union, and transact all business between its sessions. It shall meet monthly, and oftener when necessary. Five members shall constitute a quorum. When a vacancy occurs the remaining members of the Central Committee shall be empowered to fill the unexpired term. The Committee shall report at the annual meeting.
10. *Associational Vice-President's Expense Fund*—Each society shall be requested to contribute ten cents a member annually as an expense fund, this amount to be given in September, forwarded to Treasurer of Central Committee, and incorporated in October's quarterly report.

In the absence of the President, Mrs. L. F. Stratton, on motion, Mrs. Chas. A. Stakely was elected as Presiding Officer.

Addresses of welcome were delivered in behalf of the Presbyterians by Mrs. Wm. Blackshear; the Methodists, by Mrs. J. A. Peterson; the Baptists, by Mrs. R. D. Blackshear.

Response made by Mrs. W. H. Samford.

Upon request of the Acting President, Mrs. Judson Perry offered special prayer that the session might prove a spiritual uplift to all present.

Memorable words, spoken by the Lord to Moses as he stood on the borders of the Red Sea, with Pharaoh's host behind him and the sea in front. He who gave the command opened up the way. The same Lord speaks to us to-day, "Go forward!" and in the very nature of God we have the ground of our confidence. He changeth not, neither doth He grow weary. If we will but lend a listening ear and read aright the signs of the times we will hear the voice of the Lord speaking no less clearly than He did to His servant of old, "Speak to the children of Israel that they go forward." From all over the land comes tidings of awakening interest in Missions. The study course recently inaugurated indicates the longing of the heart for a deeper insight into the needs and conditions of those we are endeavoring to help. The laymen's Missionary movement—four-fold in purpose, "to pray, to study, to work, to give" for the evangelization of the world during this generation—shows the mighty hold this thought has upon our people.

The enthusiasm aroused in our woman's convention in Richmond as they planned for an advance along all lines indicates that we have reached the flood, tide, for there is a tide in the human soul as well as in the sea, and it behooves us

to use this flood-tide for good just as the mariner uses the flood-tide to accomplish purposes which he could not otherwise do.

The keynote for the year was given, the banner is unfurled, and on it is inscribed "Larger things in prayer, study, organization and contributions." Note the order in which they come: Prayer first, by which all things are possible. Dr. Ellis says that prayer is the mightiest force in Missions, and, if we remember, the "Great Commission" was prefaced with "All power is given unto me in heaven and earth; ask of me and I shall give thee the heathen for thine inheritance," and "If ye will ask the Father anything in my name He will give it you." Second, study. If we are to be fully equipped workers we must be up to date in our knowledge of the great facts of Missionary progress and the conditions that confront us on every side. So great a hold has this taken upon the hearts of our people that all over the land classes are being formed for special study. Third, organization. I need not emphasize the importance of this point. The necessity is apparent. Individual effort cannot accomplish what organized effort can. The Training School is an outcome of it. Our women, recognizing the importance of trained workers, have banded themselves together to give our young women who will labor either in the home or foreign fields the necessary equipment. Prayer, study, organization, all lead to contributions. It is not possible for a child of God who has prayed "Thy Kingdom come," who has studied the great outlying worlds with their needs, who has heard the cry from our far-off sisters, "Give us the bread of life," and not respond to the call.

The Apportionment Committee in Richmond reported that in order to carry out the recommendations of the Home and Foreign Boards we must make an advance of 25 per cent. for Home and 33 per cent. for Foreign Missions. The women, in accepting them, only wavered for a moment. They remembered that the mighty Lord Jehovah, the Creator of the universe, fainteth not, neither grows weary. He giveth power to the faint, and to him that hath no power He increaseth strength. It brought them to their knees, and they were feeling that they could not stand in the way of the oncoming of Christ's kingdom; that only by sacrifice and self-denial can the evangelization of the world be accomplished.

We cannot waver. We have met here to-day to plan and to conceive how we can best carry forward the work. We must not fail, but be true to the record of the past. Alphabetically Alabama stands first in the list of the States, and may she stand first in making larger things possible. Let us remember that faith cannot go unanswered; the same God with the same power is over this people to-day.

The Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. D. M. Malone, read the following report:

REPORT OF SECRETARY OF CENTRAL COMMITTEE.

Alabama is keeping step with her sister States in the great forward missionary movement of the age. Each year records steady growth and improvement. Our delegates went to the Richmond Convention with every pledge redeemed and the apportionment met.

The Central Committee of Alabama follows closely the plans of work outlined each year at the annual meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The first work of the State Conventional year was sending out new literature to the Vice Presidents for societies and also sending to associational meetings. Every quarter your Secretary has written letters and sent packages of literature and blank reports to the Vice Presidents. And each quarter "Our Mission Fields" have been distributed by her. Literature which is sent from the mission rooms of Baltimore to the Central Committee of Birmingham is for free distribution. Whoever asks for this will gladly receive it. The "Monthly Literature" should be ordered from the Mission Rooms of Baltimore and cost 30 cents annually. Every society is entitled to one free copy of "Our Mission Fields," but a second, which every society should have, costs 20 cents a year.

In September, according to the Constitution, the societies were asked to contribute 10 cents a member as an expense fund. Something over \$100 was sent to the Treasurer. We hope next September more of the societies will contribute toward this fund.

The Christmas Offering amounted to \$910, an increase of \$130. Why not attempt \$1,200 for Christmas of 1907?

The Thank Offering for Home Missions was \$1,055.75. Last year's figures were higher. May we put forth special effort next year and attempt \$1,500?

Eighteen boxes, valued at \$2,129.20 were sent to frontier missionaries.

The Orphans' Home received from societies and bands 255 boxes of clothing, 2 boxes of books, 1 barrel of dishes and 1 box of dolls.

Our genial editor, Rev. Frank Willis Barnett, very generously gives us the use of a page for "Woman's Work" in the Alabama Baptist. May we show our appreciation by being loyal to the paper, putting it in the homes of our people, taking a keen interest in our own page and filling it with news from the societies.

Last year a Week of Prayer for State Missions was held in June, but it was found that attending the Southern Baptist Convention in May, having Week of Prayer in June, the State Convention in July and the associations following in rapid succession, was crowding the work too much. The fall was chosen as a more suitable time, and we regret that the change prevented the observance of the Week of Prayer during this year. Our women gave \$2,100 to State Missions and next year we must do larger things for State Missions.

The Central Committee commends the apportionment plan and feels that to it success of our work has been largely due.

We report this year 435 Woman's Societies, 40 Young Woman's Auxiliaries and 202 Sunbeam Bands.

Our ideal is: To have in every association an active Vice President, who keeps in close touch with the societies and with the Central Committee; to have a Missionary Society, a Young Woman's Auxiliary and a Sunbeam Band in every church, and every woman in the church a working member of one of these organizations!

The Alabama women feel a peculiar interest in the Margaret Home, the gift of an Alabama woman. The apportionment of \$110 was easily raised, and will be even easier this year as we are only asked for \$100.

The Woman's Missionary Union Training School from the first during its struggle for its existence has had the hearty approval and support of our women. We are rejoiced that this year it becomes a part of the regular work. Our apportionment toward the support of the Training School is \$250. The Central Committee asks that the Woman's Mission Societies raise this amount. The Young Woman's Auxiliaries have chosen as their special work the privilege of keeping one of our Alabama girls in the Training School. It was decided in the Richmond Convention to purchase a building costing about \$25,000. Over \$10,000 was raised at this meeting. May the Lord lay upon the hearts of our wealthy Baptists in Alabama to give large amounts to this great cause.

The motto of the Woman's Missionary Union of the South for the new year is—
"LARGER THINGS IN PRAYER, STUDY, ORGANIZATION AND CONTRIBUTION."

As a beginning of larger things the Executive Committee urges each State to inaugurate a vigorous campaign of enlistment and enlargement. The plan of the campaign will be—

To double the membership of the societies already formed.

To organize new societies.

To increase monthly society dues.

To form in every church the full graded system of missionary organization, viz.: a Woman's Missionary Society, a Young Woman's Auxiliary and a Sunbeam Band.

To enlist the Associational Vice Presidents especially in this campaign, getting each to pledge herself to visit five churches this summer.

The first Tuesday of October has been chosen as Enlistment Day and the Central Committee will provide suitable leaflets and cards to make the exercises attractive.

Our Southern women are also asked "to unite in a Circle of Prayer each Tuesday at noon for the presence, wisdom and power of God in and through the work of the Executive Committee and each and every State Central Committee, that we may fully accomplish all and more than the Larger Things we have planned for the advancement of God's kingdom this year."

The apportionment, presented by Mrs. Alexander Miller, in the national, state, associational and local unions, Alabama W. M. U. to raise her increase of \$7,300 for Foreign Missions and \$5,000 for Home Missions, apportioned by W. M. U. at Richmond.

Mrs. Chas. T. Davis read the following report :

REPORT OF STATE ORGANIZER.

Upon no page of profane history appears a scene so charged with solemnity and ending with such a tragedy as that depicted by John in the Revelation, when the "Book of Life" was opened and then *closed forever*. In the immense concourse standing before "the Great White Throne" there was the hopefulness of expectancy as the *book was opened*. As the book was closed there fell upon many the finality of despair, for "their names were not written in the Book of Life." As we stand close together to-day, in Christian love and work, have we no regrets that the book of the year containing our record as the Alabama W. M. U. is closed forever? I am asking myself these searching questions: Have we been "faithful in that which is least?" Have we been "instant in season and out of season?" Abounding in the work of the Lord, "steadfast," "immovable" of purpose, fertile of plan, prompt in action? I am humiliated as I sit beside my soul and look the facts square in the face. But we should not despond and never despair, for even if the *sower* lacks wisdom, or the *sowing* should not be tactful, falling on barren, sinful hearts or among the choking weeds of worldliness and fashion, or upon the shallow heart of the frivolous, nevertheless *the seed is perfect*, and the promise is that "*it shall not return unto Him void*."

Your Organizer brings a report that should keep back bitter disappointment, but laments that it is not fuller and more abundant as to results. *This problem* perplexes her oftentimes in her work, viz: Is the greater good done in the quiet hour with the faithful few—that little band found in every community and church—when the things pertaining to "the Kingdom" may be discussed in the heart-to-heart talk—a leading question often betraying how fondly the timid sister longs for greater information and more abundant opportunity—or, is it in the great convocations at our Associations, when many are gathered together, *some*, maybe, to learn "more perfectly," many perhaps possessed of the itching ear that longs to be tickled "with something new?" It is a question, but the answer comes, "*Sow beside all waters*," and we remember that the Master did not despise an

audience of one, but told the sin-soiled woman of Samaria just as great and as mysterious a truth as the one He committed to the learned and influential member of the Sanhedrin. We love to remember that the memorial bestowed upon the woman bringing the precious Word was a tribute to woman's affection, the deep truth taught the woman at the well was an appreciation of her intellect. On the other hand He invited the multitudes to sit down by fifties and by hundreds, refreshing their weary bodies, preparatory to feeding their starving souls. The work at the Associations has been gratifying, inasmuch as many are reached who perhaps would not come to the church for conference with the few in the quiet meeting.

Everywhere there is an awakening to the fact that it is not *optional* with God's people whether they co-operate with His Son in the work of evangelizing the world or not, but that *we are disobedient* children if we heed not the "go ye." If the study classes on Missions might be organized in every hamlet, village and city, what light would flood the subject for our women! And why should not a Mission study club be as interesting as any other literary club?

Personal work is counting more and more as the years go on, and if the plan of apportionment and systematic contributing and reporting can be made clear as to its importance and the necessity of just this much red tape in the W. M. U. work, there will be *increase of gifts, but better still increase of grace*. We should not be discouraged if the methods proposed are not readily adopted by our people. Remember for many generations we have been attending to the Lord's work by fits and starts and in a shiftless manner. It is said that "the way of the reformer is hard," but I am sure that the Alabama W. M. U. is willing to stand in the breach and be *sacrificed* if needs be, that our plan of work may not only *appeal* to the sisterhood, but that they should *fall in love* with doing all things "decently and in order."

The tabulated report appended to these lines gives *only* cold and uninteresting figures, but I beg that you will read between the lines how many times the visiting sister has been cheered by the leader's greeting, the generous welcome, the hearty "God-speed;" how little children have slipped their tender hands within the clasp of the Sunbeam mother's own and trudged along by her side, "helping her in the meeting" by carrying her literature or souvenirs.

It would be impossible to enumerate all the kindnesses that have crowned the way while continuing in this work. Let me speak again of the unfailing and self-sacrificing assistance given by the pastors—especially those in the country—and last but not least, the consideration and appreciation of the Secretary of the State Board of Missions, who in truth and verity is the protector and promoter of woman's work for Missions.

The Margaret Home—for Missionaries' Children and a Resting Place for Missionaries—its origin, plan, and conduct was discussed by Mrs. T. W. Hannon, Chairman of Advisory Board.

W. M. U. Training School for young women in training for Christian service at Louisville, Ky., discussed by Mrs. D. M. Malone, the W. M. U. President, Miss F. E. T. S. Heck having recently submitted to Alabama Central Committee, the plan of purchase of adaptable building. A letter of greeting was read from Mrs. George B. Eager, Chairman of Board of Managers, and the Union pledged \$320 of the \$5,000 needed by Aug. 15 to bind sale of purchased property. \$20,000 raised for it in Richmond.

Mrs. J. W. Vesey in the chair, led the Conference on Young Woman's Work.

The following report was read:

REPORT OF LEADER OF YOUNG WOMAN'S WORK.

Great emphasis was placed on the work of young women at our Southern Baptist Convention in Richmond, Va., last May, especially stressing the importance of enlisting the young women of our Southland in the great cause of missions, and fully equipping them for the work that is now being so nobly done by our women. May their mantles fall on our girls, trained and ready for service.

We present to you the recommendations as adopted by W. M. U. of S. B. C.

1st. That the universal name of our young women's societies be "Young Woman's Auxiliary," the name receiving the largest number of votes in response to the recent request.

2nd. Since the name, Young Woman's Auxiliary, has been adopted by Alabama, and as a badge, a gold pin, bearing the monogram, Y. W. A., that the same pin be adopted by the Union.

3rd. That the motto be: Dan., 11:3, "They that are wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament, and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars forever and ever."

4th. That each State appoint a leader for the Young Woman's Auxiliary.

5th. That at least one of the eight delegates from each State be from the ranks of the Young Woman's Auxiliary.

6th. That the aim of the Young Woman's Auxiliary be two-fold: First, the regular study of our mission fields and of the mission study course, and, second, ten thousand dollars in contributions for Home and Foreign Missions.

The work for the past year with the young women of Alabama has been very gratifying to the Leader, yet attended by many anxieties, lest an opportunity for advancing the work might not be seized. The consecration and willingness of the girls makes us realize larger things are in store for them.

Our specific work for the past year has been the support of Miss Emma Stovall at the W. M. U. Training School in Louisville, Ky.

A number of classes has been organized in the mission study course, and we heartily recommend this to our workers as the the best plan for the development of the young women. For further information, write Mr. T. B. Ray, Educational Secretary, Foreign Mission Rooms, Richmond, Va.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION.

Convened at 2:30 o'clock. Devotional exercises conducted by Mrs. W. E. Hudom. Prayer offered by Mrs. W. A. Taliaferro. Minutes read by Secretary and approved by Union.

State Missions, discussed by Mrs. J. W. O'Hara in pioneer times, and those of organization and activity.

Mr. A. R. Yarbrough, President of State Mission School at Scottsboro, introduced by the Acting President, told of the work, its past, present and future, under Baptist control and support. Mrs. D. M. Malone spoke of the great self-sacrifice of this earnest man for the school.

The Acting President conducted Question Box; replies made by Mrs. Vesey, Mrs. Smith, Mrs. Taliaferro, Mrs. Hannon, Mrs. Williams, Mrs. Malone, Mrs. Miller, Mrs. Crever, Miss Huey.

Reports of Associational Vice-Presidents submitted and incorporated in minutes.

In the absence of the Leader, the Symposium of Sunbeam Work was led by Acting President.

Mrs. D. M. Malone read the following report of Leader :

REPORT ON SUNBEAM BANDS.

"When our world learns this lesson—when pride bows down to meekness, and experience does homage to innocence, when every child is revered as a royal heir to heaven, because it is the brother of the Christ-child, then the epiphany will come and a great light will lighten the nations." Thus writes the inimitable Van Dyke, who in his maturity still pre-erves the heart of a child.

Campbell Morgan, in his stirring message to the Wor'd's Great Sunday School Convention, held in Rome in this year of our Lord, 1907, a meeting, the key note of which was the "Sunday School as a Mission Force," says, taking the familiar passage of the disciples contemning the little children (Mark, 10:13-15): "When men began to feel again the burning passion of the coming of the kingdom of God, when missionary zeal was fanned to a flame, when evangelism was the watchword of the saints, then men also began to think of the children, and the child began to take its right place in our midst. Believe me, Christ's words were not ideally or carelessly spoken, and when He said: 'Of such is the kingdom of God,' He was making His appeal to that which alone can be found to provoke man to holy service in the cause of children. There are *two soul qualifications in dealing with children: Be Christ's; be the child's—absolutely His, absolutely devoted to the child.* May God give us, my brethren and sisters, when this convention is over, to go back to look once again into the faces of the children and see a new light and a new glory, and hear a new appeal for Christ's sake." Again, "Froebel believed in child training. He did not refer to missions when he said, 'Children are the seed corn of the future,' but it is applicable just here, for under God, our future missionary crop depends upon what the children of the present become in their attitude to the tremendously important, 'Go ye' of God's word."

Thus the great and the good are catching the heavenly vision. It is a significant fact that in the latest recommendations of the Home and Foreign Mission Boards of the Southern Baptist Convention, the only special objects of work given for the coming year to the W. M. U. are confided to the Sunbeam Bands. Our missionary leaders are recognizing the children as a force in the work of the denomination—and thank God for their discernment.

But lest all these things puff us up with over weening pride, let us heed the clarion note of alarm sounded in the annual address of the peerless President of the Women's Missionary Union: "Why are children of Southern Baptist

churches giving far less to missions than Southern Methodist children? Why, when Southern Presbyterian missions need a mission ship they have only to whisper to the children and, a new Lap-ley steams its way up the Congo, carrying the message of the children's Saviour into the very heart of Africa? Is the fault at the door of the Union? Early in our history this solemn trust of training the future Southern Baptist church for missions was put into our hands. How have we kept it? Ah friends—I say it with grief—I fear, I greatly fear, we have been unfaithful. If not, why is it that to-day there are only 1,560 Mission Bands reported in the 21,000 Southern Baptist churches. It is our work, we are the one organization in the field to this end and the work has not been done.

“But yet more undone is another branch of our work—mark you, ours—the enlisting of the young women of our churches. Here we have but begun. *Our neglect of the children has found us out. The young women of to-day would be ours, if ten years ago we had gathered the children into Sunbeam Societies; there would now be no women's problem.*”

Do you mark, dear Alabama sisters, the subtle and serious influence of the past upon the present? Do you note how the neglect of the workers of the decade just gone paralyzes the work of the present day? Let us ask ourselves the soul-searching question, Are we so well fulfilling our trusts *this day that ten years hence* the fruit of our labors will be apparent?

I would call especial attention to the 3rd recommendation of the Executive Committee, viz :

“SUNBEAMS—That the W. M. Society of each church be urged to encourage and feel responsible for the maintenance of a Sunbeam Society.”

There you find in a nut shell the remedy for the amazing and alarming disproportion cited previously, of only 1,560 Mission Bands being organized in the 21,000 Baptist churches in our Southland.

The recommendations as adopted at Richmond read :

“Your Committee on Sunbeam Work submit the following recommendation :

“1st. That we heartily endorse the objects suggested by the Boards for the Sunbeam contributions, namely: \$5,000 for a Girl's School Compound at Yang-tak, China, and \$5,000 for a school building in El Paso for work among the Mexicans.

“2nd. That we commend the use of the Sunbeam programs in Our Mission Fields, in Kind Words, and the Band Portfolio. We also commend the Junior Mission Study Course prepared by Dr. Ray.

“3rd. We recommend to Sunbeam leaders that they use their influence to place the Juvenile Library in their Sunday School. We request that Mrs. Nimmo, in preparing information for State papers, include something special each month for Sunbeams.

“4th. That the Sunbeam motto be, ‘Whatsoever He saith unto you, do it.’

“5th. We suggest that suitable pin be selected by our Executive Committee. The design to resemble radiating sunbeams, the pin to be at minimum cost to purchaser.

“6th. We urge that each State appoint a Band Superintendent and that wherever possible boys' mission bands be organized.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PLAN OF WORK.

Your Committee recommend the adoption of the following plans for enlarged work of W. M. U. in Alabama during 1907.

1. We recommend as an aid to larger things in prayer the observance of the Week of Prayer for State Missions in October, also the adoption of the Missionary Calendar.

2. In furtherance of the plan of study, we urge societies to pursue the ten weeks course of study, as arranged by Educational Secretary of Southern Baptist Convention.

3. In order to strengthen our organization we recommend the establishment of Mission Rooms in Birmingham for work of W. M. U. in Alabama. That the offices of Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer be combined, and the said officer be remunerated for her full time and allowed clerical help as needed.

4. That ten institutes be held this year, under the direction of Central Committee, traveling expenses to be met by the State Board. That we make the doubling of our membership a prime object for one year.

5. That an honor roll be made from all Societies, Auxiliaries and Sunbeam Bands, which report regularly and in time, each quarter during the year, said roll to be printed in *Alabama Baptist* and incorporated in minutes of annual meeting of W. M. U.

6. In larger giving we recommend that our apportionments for Home and Foreign Missions and other objects be enthusiastically met, and our gifts to State Missions be increased fifty per cent.

7. That we co-operate heartily in the movement recommended by the Committee on the Celebration of the One Hundredth Anniversary of the Founding of the First Baptist Church in Alabama to raise \$100,000 for Missions.

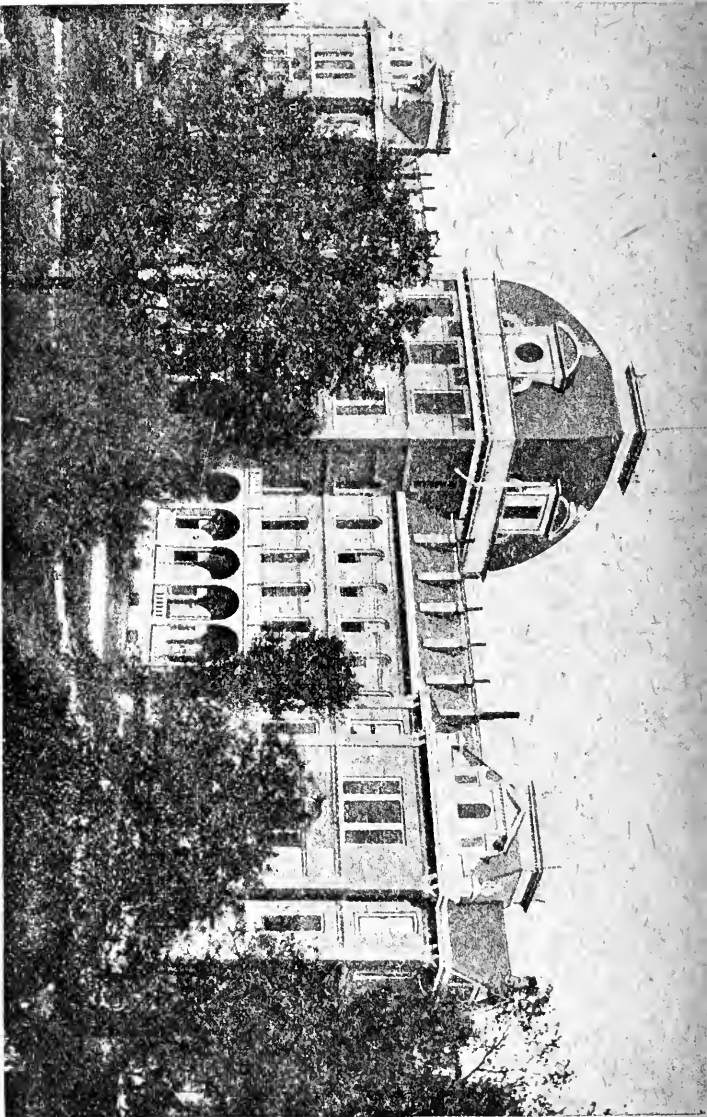
