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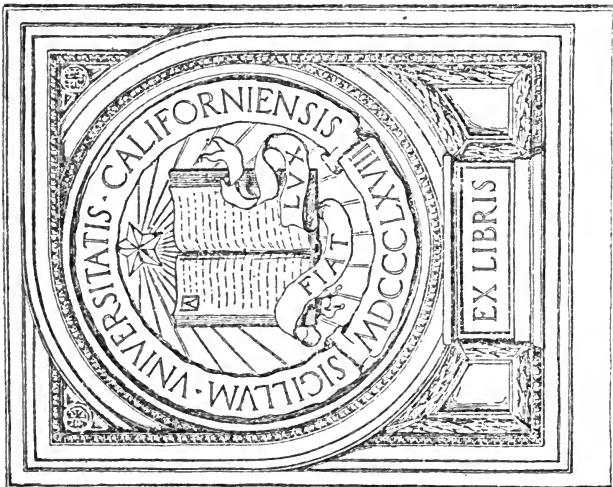

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PREFACE.

THE City of Albuquerque has reached a point of commercial development at which her origin and history have become of more than passing interest, and which renders statistics of her business and progress a safe basis for calculations for the future, in social, commercial and political points of view.

That New Mexico is destined soon to enter the family of sovereign states, which constitute the American union, and that Albuquerque is to be the social, political and commercial center of the new state, are generally recognized certainties of the near future. It is with a full appreciation of these facts that I entered upon the preparation and publication of this book.

It has been prepared with great and careful painstaking and research, that every statement of fact should be reliable, and every inference legitimate, and the initiatory step to the presentation of all the essential facts of the past, present and future history of the city, and in some sense, of the territory.

In this connection I desire to acknowledge the kindness of Judge Hazeldine and Prof. Bryan for the use of records from which was drawn much of the information herein contained; also, to Father Durante, for the translation of the statement of José Lucero, sacristan of the church in the West End, whose father, for many years before, held the same office in the old structure that preceded the present one.

José Lucero says that his father and himself, for many years, owned the book from which were drawn many of the facts of the earliest history of this city and the territory. That book is now lost, but he distinctly remembers often reading it, and the statements of the journeyings and discoveries, and the founding of colonies and cities by the first governor, Don Juan de Uñate, herein related.

Although it is a settled point in the minds of the intelligent people, that this place has had a history in the past, that which is herein written is what remains, though meagre, yet may be of interest and importance to the generous people of this city and community, to whom this work is dedicated.

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ALBUQUERQUE.*

BETWEEN 1540 and 1550 is the date of the first recorded presence of Europeans in this locality. Sometime during these years, in the reign of Ferdinand VII, King of Spain, Don Juan de Uñate was commissioned the first governor of the province of New Mexico. On his route to his new jurisdiction Gov. Uñate passed through Chihuahua and El Paso northwesterly to pueblo Zuñi, in the western part of the now territory of New Mexico, apparently in search of a place for headquarters to the province. The record states that to these people he offered friendship, civilization and the catholic religion. He left with them a priest and several families. From there he turned eastward to pueblo Laguna, wheré he also left a priest and a few families. From Laguna his route led him to Isleta, where he left a Franciscan father and some families. From Isleta he followed up the river, which he is supposed to have named the Rio Grande del Norte, by reason of it being the first large river he had met on his northward journey from the city of Mexico. Arriving immediately opposite where the present town of Albuquerque is located, he found a village on the west bank of the river, which must then have been of considerable importance, as the ruins can yet be traced on the bank of the river for more than a mile in extent. These ruins plainly define its location and indicates its size.

On the east bank of the river where Albuquerque now stands, were a few occupied houses, the ruins of which can yet be seen. Here a military post was established and garrisoned with 500 soldiers, and named the post Presidio de Albuquerque. Here he also left a Franciscan father and several Spanish and Mexican families. After some delay in regulating the new post and settlement, Gov. Uñate resumed his journey of observation and discovery, going in a northerly direction, and in due time arrived at what he found to be the largest pueblo in the province—now the historic city of Santa Fe. Here he established his headquarters and the seat of provincial government. From this point and base of oper-

ations he made occasional journeys over the province, establishing the Spanish authority and missionary stations.

In the year of 1659, history informs us that Francisco Fernandez de la Cueva, Duke of Albuquerque, ruled in this country as viceroy of Mexico to the expiration of 1660. Now appears the name of San Filipe de Albuquerque, and in a few years, by edict of the King of Spain, it was declared a ville (city), and from that circumstance it is a legitimate inference that it was a place of importance. Another and more conclusive proof that such was the fact is, that in the archives of this territory, in the city of Mexico, has been found the registry of the church at this place, in which are registered the names of 4031 persons as belonging to the catholic communion here in 1698, nearly equally divided, male and female; so to allow one non-communicant for each communicant, would make a population of at least 8000 souls at that time.

In the year 1701 the Duke of Albuquerque returned to this country as governor. He was reputed a good man of great justice, and while just, was also a kind and human ruler. As an evidence of the estimation in which he was held by his people, the ville (or city,) was named Albuquerque in the year of 1703. His administration continued in this country until during the year 1711, when he ceased to rule here.

If there was, as many suppose, and not without good reason, a settlement of the native population at this place prior to 1550, it is not given in any tangible form or authentic history. Such opinion has to rest entirely upon tradition, which, however, is of such a character that it is not at all unworthy of credit. Another very important fact which goes far to prove the long ago importance of this location to the Aztec population, ante-dating the presence of the Spaniards, is this, all the ancient roads of the country converge at this crossing of the river and center in this fertile valley, where the people came, not unlike those who are coming now to this same place, where their best interests can be developed and their comfort promoted.

The reasonable conclusion of the matter is, that far beyond where the memory of man begins, or knoweth anything to the contrary, in this valley a prosperous people lived and sought their highest welfare—just as we are doing now. The city is in the beautiful valley on the eastern shore of the Rio del Norte, or the Rio Grande of to-day, on the 35th parallel north latitude, 4918

feet above the sea level, with a mild and balmy climate, very healthy; so much so, that many invalids have visited this place, most of whom have been greatly benefited, while others have been entirely restored in health.

The valley is wonderfully fertile, producing almost every variety of grain, vegetables and fruits of large size and in enormous quantities, of most delicious flavor, nutritious and health giving.

The crops are uniform in their yield, as most of them require irrigation, which, when done, insures an abundant return for the labor, which is less than is necessary in the states, where farmers are generally satisfied with one-third to one-half the quantity harvested by the well-to-do farmers in these valleys. An ample supply of water can be had and conducted to the arable lands for purposes of irrigation, throughout the extent of the valleys.

This location has long been a place of much importance; equally so to four distinct nationalities—Aztec, Spain, Mexico and the United States, under which latter government all its capabilities will, most likely, soon be fully developed.

Under the auspices of the New Mexico Town Company, the new portion of the town was laid out on the west and east sides of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railroad track during the early part of the year of 1880. The two first lots were sold to Maden Brothers, on the 8th day of November of that year, for \$825. The next lot sold was to Ulery & Zeiger, perhaps same day, for \$500. The first house occupied was by Maden Brothers, who afterwards built a two story house on four-sevenths of the ground, which ground and house they recently sold for \$30,000 cash. Zeiger has fine improvements on his lot and refuses to sell.

Within the two years just past, the town has enjoyed a wonderful increase in population and business, almost unprecedented in the country. At the beginning of 1881 old town population was estimated at 2000 souls, all told. To-day, the beginning of 1883, the whole population, (old and new town as one,) is estimated at 10,000 souls, and others coming daily, making this city their homes.

The character of the buildings is good, the most of those recently erected are of first-class brick with cut stone trimings in good taste, quite ornamental to the city. Amongst those of note is, first, the Armijo hotel, Harrison building, Cromwell block, Harsch's, Childers', First National bank, Central bank, Daily Journal, Monroe's, Baca's, Talbott's and other fine stores. The residence of Col.

Perfecto Armijo, Judge Bell's and W. Trumbull's, also the new residence of Franz Huning, Esq., which will be known as "Castle Huning." The Atlantic & Pacific railroad offices is an excellent structure. All these buildings are large, and would be first-class in any western city. Many contracts are already made for the erection of residence and business property the ensuing season, the most notable of these are the new hotel and the Armijo building of two large store rooms, second floor devoted to the use known as the Athenæum. Many of the new houses will be fine.

The hotels of the city are good and well kept, first among them, the Armijo, Rio Grande, Ballingall, Maden and Girard. A large new hotel will be completed this year for the public.

This city already enjoys many facilities for a large and important trade. This trade will be augmented with the development of her resources for business, by the construction of railroads other than those now in operation, and accommodating her enterprising population.

Her present system of railroads is as follows: The Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railroad extends through the territory from north to south, at El Paso connecting with the Mexican Central to Chihuahua, thence to the city of Mexico, reaching the entire Mexican system; also, the Southern Pacific and other lines entering El Paso. This company does a large business in this place, both on account of passengers and freight. The aggregate receipts at the office of this company in this city during the year ending Dec. 31, 1882, amounted to the sum of—freights, \$941,046.17; tickets, \$127,465.46; total, \$1,068,511.63, with a constantly increasing business.

The Atlantic & Pacific railroad starts at this city and goes west to the crossing of the great Colorado river at the Needles, there connecting with that portion of the same line from San Francisco eastward, on which road passengers at this place can step on board trains and in sixty hours step aground in San Francisco, on and after next April, (said to be an assured fact). This line of road across the country is on the least dangerous ground, is located through one of the finest grazing districts on the continent, which is from the head-waters of the Rio Puerco, and the valley of the Little Colorado to its mouth, and possesses as fine natural scenery as is found anywhere in these mountainous regions. We invite special attention to the country round about San Francisco moun-

tain; and, especially it should be known, that this road passes within eighteen miles of the Grand Cañon, on the great Colorado river, which, to see, is worth a trip from any portion of our country; yea, more; the grand, the sublime sight is worth a trip from any part of the world. Nowhere else is such a sight to be seen. It is to be expressed in a simple word, as indescribable. And not least of matters in this region of interest to the traveler, are the many rich mines to be seen, and all are of importance attaching to Albuquerque.

This road, from St. Louis to San Francisco, is shorter, when finished, by 795 miles, than by way of the Southern Pacific.

Receipts of the Atlantic & Pacific railroad, at this station, for 1882, was, freight, \$188,890.43; passenger, \$17,941.15; total, \$205,831.58—the first regular fiscal year for this company. It is a fine showing for this station's business while the road is being built through an almost unpopulated country. This all, however, goes to show the importance of this city and her enterprises to the whole country.

Of the roads yet uncompleted, nevertheless, sure to reach this place in the near future, is, first, the St. Louis & San Francisco, which is being vigorously pushed through the Indian Territory in this direction, so as to make an early connection at this city with the Atlantic & Pacific; thus making, doubtless, the favorite highway across the continent; partly on account of the mildness of the climate at all seasons of the year; also, the safety to passengers, assured by the easy grades and gentle curves, and the security felt in avoiding the many long, high and dangerous bridges and trestles found on other roads.

Next in course is the Denver & Rio Grande, narrow gauge, which will, doubtless, soon reach this place—a very important enterprise to this whole district of our country.

The Copper City, narrow gauge, will, of necessity, be built within the lapse of a very short time, to secure to this city the minerals, stone and fine timber found contiguous to the line of this prospective railroad, and which will contribute immensely to the manufacturing and commercial advantages of this community. This road will connect with a branch of the Denver & Rio Grande from southwest Colorado, tending southeast to reach the New Mexico railway system at Albuquerque.

Another very important railroad organization has been recently

accomplished, which is calculated to give this city a direct line of communication with the central south, at Napoleon, on the Mississippi river, below the mouth of the Arkansas river, by way of Little Rock west to this place. It is styled in the charter the Mississippi, Albuquerque & Inter-Ocean Railroad Company. It will be of easy construction. The propriety and utility of this enterprise should insure the speedy construction of the road from Albuquerque to Fort Smith. The eastern division is completed from Napoleon to Little Rock, and west to Fort Smith.

Next we will call attention to the contemplated narrow gauge road from this city to the White Oaks mines and mineral district, and Lincoln, the seat of justice of Lincoln county. The White Oaks mining district is reputed very rich. On this line of road are to be found large quantities of excellent timber and splendid grazing lands, with water in great plenty.

That all these lines will ultimately be a completed fact, and at an early day, admits of little doubt.

The street railroad, which is extended from the West End up Railroad avenue to First street, and south on First street to the Atlantic & Pacific shops, thence to Second street, and to the southern limits of the city, in length of line three miles, with eight cars in use, is surely of great convenience to the citizens, in their business and social relations, as it connects the extreme limits of the city by a speedy and easy means of transit. This road was built during the spring months of 1881, and the first coach was drawn over it on the 15th of May that year, it being the first street railroad built in the territory. It is a good property, the stock is not on the market for sale.

The commercial interests of the city are in a healthy condition. Merchants and traders are carrying full stocks of a good class of goods, handsomely arranged in their rooms, and large amounts of all classes of merchandise, suited to the necessities of the population, are daily sold, amounting in the aggregate, during the past year, to the sum of \$5,563,700—the first fiscal year for the city. Many of the large dealers have been here less than one year, who reported only for the time engaged in trade in this place. It is a good showing, considering it is only two years since it was occupied. The sales computed—goods brought here and sold, and articles of home manufacture—compare well with the trade of other cities in the country.

In this connection we will mention, in a special manner, some of the leading features of the trade :

BANKS.

There are two at present of large capital, being under the control of a high order of financial ability, and of sterling integrity. Hence it is that both the Central Bank and the First National Bank are enjoying the confidence of the people, and are reckoned first-class institutions.

MANUFACTURES.

The oldest establishment is the Glorieta flour mill, which has been in operation several years, owned by a man of means, integrity and energy.

The Atlantic & Pacific railroad shops are large, and managed by master men, and the manipulation of skilled workmen, who receive the raw material, which they soon convert into a locomotive, passenger coach or a freight car, as may be required.

There is a foundry and machine shop, which is under judicious management and is doing a profitable business.

A plaining mill is in operation, which is doing a good business in a satisfactory manner.

A tannery is established here, and is prepared for a good, large and profitable business.

A paper mill is under construction at this place, which will, doubtless, enjoy a sure success, as such an enterprise is much needed at this point to supply the demand for that article.

Willey's flour mill was erected and put in order for business during the summer of 1880, and it has done merchant and custom work in the most satisfactory manner. The proprietor is a practical man of industry and integrity, and deserves all the good which can come to him.

A few months since some enterprising citizens organized a gas company and erected the works, by which means the city is well lighted, at reasonable rates. It is not only an important enterprise but profitable to the stock-holders.

Contractors and house builders, the head of an essential industry to the growth and prosperity of the city, and comfort of its people, are numerous, and first-class men, with ample means, combined with a cultivated taste in architecture.

There is a large quantity of Mexican filigree jewelry manufac-

tured in this city, which is made of both gold and silver, of the most unique designs, finished in workmanlike and skillful manner, and is beautiful.

Gas fitters have a good trade and have all they can do.

Gun and lock-smiths also have a profitable employment, which seems to be satisfactory.

A mattress factory is manufacturing goods in that line, and has a good business.

A candy establishment is converting a large quantity of refined sugars into pure candy, and is doing a good business to the advantage of its customers.

There are two well conducted saddle and harness establishments, which deserve a liberal patronage from the people.

A soda water manufactory is in the charge of an experienced party upon whom the public can depend for a pure article. It is sharing a liberal support.

There are several boot and shoe shops turning out a great amount of good work, giving entire satisfaction in good fits.

There are quite a number of blacksmiths and waggon makers, and a carriage factory. All these are important industries, and are amply sustained in the community.

There are several first-class tailoring establishments, where a man in rags may enter and soon come out so metamorphosed that he has to be introduced to his wife.

The Wheelock manufactory of galvanized iron cornice, late of Las Vegas, has been removed to this city, where a great deal of beautiful work is being put up. No establishment will do more for the ornamentation of the city, and contribute much to the good taste to be shown, both in private and public buildings in times to come.

A large quantity of native wine is made in this city and vicinity of an excellent quality, as it is the pure juice of the grape. The difference in the grapes raised here produces the red, white, sweet and sour varieties of wine, all of which find a ready market, both for home consumption and shipment to distant parts of the country, where it is consumed by the people in relief of their infirmities, similar to the ailments of which Timothy was so often afflicted.

The Gran Quivera (Hubbs smelter) is an important enterprise, involving the expenditure of a large amount of money in its erection, and much more in its management, in the purchase of ore-

bearing rock and the payment of the skilled hands who reduce it into a current shape. It is an enterprise of much importance to this city and surrounding country, as it will establish a home market for all the mineral-bearing rock of the hills and mountains with which our valleys are surrounded. The smelter will work gold, silver, lead and copper bearing rock, for which the best market prices are paid.

The organization known as the Albuquerque Woolen Mill Company is perfecting arrangements to commence the manufacture of cloths, flannels, janes, satinets, shawls, blankets, yarns and other articles of woolen fabric, at an early day.

The company is composed of a number of the most enterprising and substantial men in this community, with the addition of a gentleman from a distant city, of eminently practical qualifications for the management of the large concern it will be, backed with capital sufficient to make it equal to the wants of the country.

This is already an important wool market, and with the additional demand for the factory, the quantity received here will soon run up to four or five millions of pounds annually. The establishment of these mills here will be of great importance to the wool-growing interests of the territory, as well as to this community.

A shoe and boot manufacturing establishment, in connection with the tannery, would certainly pay well if undertaken by judicious parties—because it is greatly needed.

There is organized and maintained an efficient board of trade, composed of business men. It has in the past, as it is at present, accomplishing much good for the best welfare of the people, in the promotion of all laudable enterprises.

Real estate sold in the town by real estate agents in 1882, amounts to the sum of \$632,500. Amount of deferred payments on the same is \$33,000, which shows a small indebtedness on so large an amount of sales.

The number of dwelling, storerooms and other buildings erected for the year ending December 31, was 450, and the cost of erecting the same was \$850,000, all fully paid for, presenting a city almost entirely paid for.

The same year a bridge company was organized for the purpose of constructing a wagon bridge across the Rio Grande, which was completed at an expenditure of \$22,000, which is a substantial structure of great advantage to the people residing on the west side

of the river, and adds to the trade of the city.

A telephone company was formed and the apparatus with all the necessary appliances placed in working order and are now working seventy-six instruments which is of almost incalculable advantage to those who use them.

The postmaster furnished the following statement: The office was established in this place March 1881, and his receipts for the year 1882 amounted to the sum of \$12,000. The estimate for the ensuing year is placed at \$20,000.

This is a good place to invest money as property is still low, for a city with the advantages and prospects in the future which are clearly and distinctly defined, establishing its continued prosperity.

The mineral resources of the Sandia mountains, east a few miles, and the foot-hills within a short distance of the city, are known to be of great value by our best informed men on that subject. The various ores found and believed to abound in large quantities, are gold, silver, lead, copper and iron. The presence of each has been discovered in many localities. A great number of claims have been already located and registered, and prospectors are constantly in the mountain regions looking for the location of their future fortunes.

Copper City and many other mineral districts will contribute to the importance of this place steadily as our railroad facilities increase.

It is proper to remark that coal is also found in large quantities contiguous to this city, which is one of the sources of prosperity to all civilized communities.

On the 15th day of April, 1880, dates the advent of the first locomotive in this place, hauling a construction train. On the 22d of the same month, the first passenger coach was drawn to where the depot now stands, bearing guests to celebrate the dawning of a new era for Albuquerque and New Mexico. The most sanguine expectations of the enthusiastic men of that assemblage have been more than realized.

The supply of building material accessible to this town is abundant to assure reasonably low rates, an excellent quality of building stone, susceptible of being worked into ornamental patterns for caps, sills and posts for fronts and other uses.

An excellent quality of brick is made here, and most of the best buildings are of brick, handsomely trimmed with cut native stone.

Native timber, of good building varieties, is in great abundance, obtainable within a few miles of the city, and is sold now at reasonable prices.

Copper City and other large forests, will contribute all the timber and lumber required for this market, of the finest quality. It is also proper to remark that the expense of building here is no greater than in many eastern cities.

There is established at this place a bureau of mining and mineralogy, a miners' association for the purpose of promoting the development of that great interest in this territory. The officers are competent and urbane gentlemen. In their office they have a large stock of specimens, some of much value, and deserve an examination by the curious in such matters.

THE PRESS.

The champion of the rights and liberties of the people in the United States is creditably represented in this city in the three daily papers published here—The Journal, The Review and The Democrat. A weekly is also issued in connection with each.

The papers here have a substantial financial basis, and are fairly and ably conducted, contributing to the intelligence and energy of the people and the prosperity of the community. Their importance is fully recognized by the public.

The territorial or state fair organization has handsomely improved grounds at this place, where the annual fairs are to meet in exhibition of the products of the industry and ingenuity of the people, and the sample of ores taken from the rich mines of the country.

The cash premiums awarded at the first exhibition, held Oct. 3d to the 8th, 1881, inclusive, amounted to over \$2000, exclusive of silver medals awarded on the less important exhibits. The cash premiums awarded at the second exhibition held, Sept. 18th to the 23d, 1882, amounted to over \$5000, besides about \$400 for silver and gold medals. Over \$4000 was contributed by the citizens of Albuquerque in less than two days soliciting by the committee.

AN ANCIENT HOUSE.

A noted house in the West End, for antiquity, and for the fact that it was the home of the governor of this province, Armijo, is at this time the residence of Don Nicolas T. Armijo, vice president of the First National Bank of this city.

THE FIRST CHURCH.

The first church edifice in the territory was erected here by Gov. Uñate. Well authenticated tradition has it that he also had made a wooden statue to the patron saint St. Francis Xavier, and presented it to the church which bore that name. This antique piece of statuary, now not less than 335 years old, is still to be seen at the residence of a citizen of the west end, or old Albuquerque.

This church stood, and was used as such, until 1790, some 240 years, when it had so fallen into decay that it was taken down to make way for a new structure.

The new church which was erected in 1794 on the same foundations, and of the same size, form and style, is still standing and in use in the old town—both adobe buildings. It was built by Andras Garcia, the parish priest and a Franciscan father. The name given it is still retained, San Filipe de Neri. So it may be said that this is practically the oldest church edifice in New Mexico, being now not less than 335 years old, and preceding the landing of the pilgrims at Plymouth Rock and the establishment of protestantism in this country by three-quarters of a century.

Within the past two years other denominations have succeeded in organizing as follows :

The Congregational church own a neat and comfortable house in which they worship, administered over by an acceptable pastor, Rev. J. M. Ashley.

The Methodist Episcopal congregation have a good house of worship, with the Rev. W. R. Kistler as pastor.

The Methodist Episcopal Church South own a neat house of worship ; pastor, Rev. W. Y. Sheppard.

The Presbyterian congregation have recently finished a brick church building, with Rev. James E. Menaul as pastor.

The Episcopal church building is of stone, and has as pastor Rev. H. Forrester.

The Roman Catholics are erecting a new church edifice of stone on the corner of Copper avenue and Sixth street, for a church—a nice structure.

SCHOOLS.

The oldest school in this community is the Catholic parochial, for the education of both sexes. Has been in the past, as at present, of great good to the community in affording a means of educa-

tion to thousands of the native population during the years gone by as well as the present time.

The Congregational and Methodist churches also have parochial schools doing all they can for the education of the youth of the city. By these schools much good is being done, but they are inadequate to the end desired, and will be until we have an organized state government under which we can have an efficient common school system with a sufficient force behind to execute the laws and enforce their observance.

The Albuquerque Academy has a new brick building well adapted for the purpose, and is in a flourishing condition, with a good corps of teachers.

The Catholics will commence early next spring the erection, in the Armijo addition, of a large and costly building, at a cost of sixty-five thousand dollars, to be used as an academy and boarding school for young ladies.

Next is the Indian school for the education of the nation's infant wards—the education of these people so long neglected by the people who were willing, until recently, to let them be Indians still.

This being a new and important matter more than ordinary attention and space will be given to its consideration.

Through the efforts of Maj. B. W. Thomas, M. D., U. S. Indian agent, the Indian office determined to establish a boarding school for the education of the Pueblo Indian youth.

The contract for conducting the school was awarded to Rev. Henry Kendall, D. D., secretary of the board of Home Missions of the Presbyterian church. On behalf of the board, in December, 1880, an adobe residence was leased of Mrs. Candelaria Garcia de Armijo, situated a short distance north of the west end. The school was organized in January, 1881, and Prof. J. S. Shearer was made superintendent.

The school was not at first popular with the Indians, and all their prejudices had to be overcome before the parents were willing to send their children to it.

The efforts of their agent and the wise conduct of the officers at the school, had the effect to steadily increase the number of pupils to fifty-seven during the spring and summer term of 1882. In July Prof. Shearer resigned and Prof. R. W. D. Bryan was appointed to succeed him.

Indian Agent Thomas visited most of the pueblos previous to the

opening of the fall term, in October, 1882, found the Indians favorable to sending their children to this school, and succeeded in securing an attendance of eighty-six pupils, sixty-five boys and twenty-one girls.

Additional accommodations had to be immediately made for such an unexpected increase in numbers. Rough wooden structures were thrown up, but to make their quarters more comfortable the boys built an adobe wall on the out side, a la Indian, which makes them feel quite at home.

SYSTEM AND NAMES OF STREETS.

Railroad avenue, the longest and principal street, extends from the eastern to the western extremity of the city, upon which the street railway is operated. We adopt it as the line between north and south. For convenience, we say North Third street and South Third street, and in like manner speak of all the streets located north and south, crossing this avenue. That portion of the city east of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fé railroad track is denominated "east end," and that portion of the city embraced in what was the old town is designated "west end." By this, strangers and others, will the more readily understand the immediate location of any desired place or person. It is believed that by observing these distinctions the public convenience and interests will be subserved.

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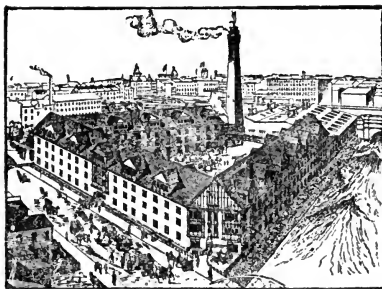

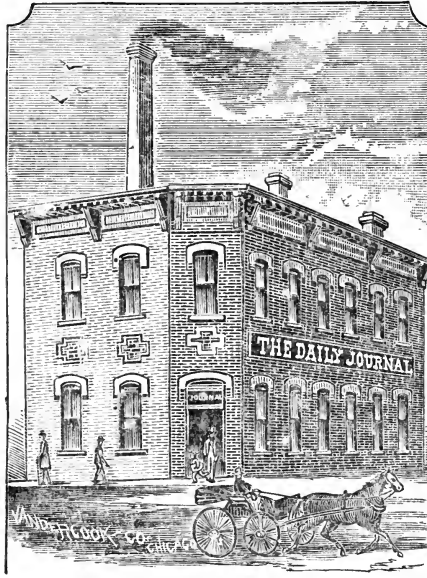

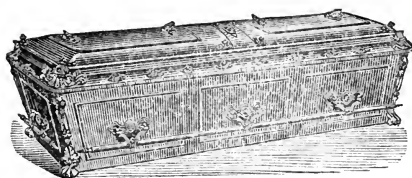

LAS VEGAS.

Las Vegas, the county seat of San Miguel county, is located upon the banks of the river Gallinas, and contains, according to a recent census, something less than seven thousand souls.

The early history of the town is somewhat obscure, but before the territory became a part of the union what is now known as Upper Las Vegas was the trading point for miles away. For many years the town increased in growth but slowly, and indeed, not until the advent of the railroad did anyone imagine that it would ever reach the proportions and importance of a city. Nor was such a conclusion, in those days, unreasonable, for in the olden time New Mexico was practically, and in fact, unknown except in name. If now and then a free-lance Bohemian wandered into the far-off land, his descriptions of the land through which he traveled and the people that he saw, were not calculated to induce others to follow him.

Sensational writers had accepted New Mexico as the field of their fertile imaginations, and many a scene of rapine and murder had been pictured as occurring within her borders by their romantic pens. A state of semi-civilization was exaggerated into a condition of heathenish barbarism, and the usual occupation of most of the residents was described as closely resembling the calling of Dick Turpin or Rob Roy.

Not a kindley word of the country or habits of its people ever reached the outside world, and for long weary years it was abandoned to the sloth of its primeval ways. The natives for the most part engaged in pastoral pursuits—living in quiet and peace as their ancestors lived; living as the patriarchs lived in the morning of the world. Children were born and old men passed away, but the rest remained unchanged. From some commanding knoll the herdsmen watched their flocks lazily browsing in the quiet valleys, or along the green banks of murmuring rivers; in the sequestered country home the mother washed and baked and sang a lullaby to her prattling child; in the curiously constructed and sleepily looking villages the merchant and postmaster sat in the doorway waiting for the incoming stage; at eventide the vesper bells broke the brooding silence, and in the white-washed chapels reverence knelt in prayer;

and across long stretches of mountain and desert, weary oxen drew enormous loads, coming from the States. These were the only signs of human habitation, and but for these the scene would have presented a country abandoned and forsaken.

This was the picture five years ago, but with the coming of the railroad all experienced a change and no where in the territory has the change been more rapid than in Las Vegas. In this city the one story adobe houses have given place to elegant and substantial structures of brick or stone. The work of building is rapidly going forward and the streets present an appearance well calculated to inspire the strongest confidence in its permanency and continued growth. You will find in the new city miles of side tracks, elegant and commodious offices of the management of the New Mexico division of the A. T. & S. F. R. R., mammoth wholesale and commission houses carrying stocks of millions of dollars. The hum of manufacturing industries will attract your attention. A line of street railway, water works, gas works and a telephone exchange will be found in operation.

The future of New Mexico, if written to-day, would be called an Aladdin's story; her possibilities are bewildering. A territory broader than Old and New England, whose mountains cover every shining metal, whose valleys are perfumed with every fruit and flower known to the temperate zone, is dawning upon the world. The elements that constitute financial greatness are hers, and when the approaching roads from Texas, Colorado and the Indian Territory shall have penetrated her vast domain and unsealed her now silent and unopened treasure houses; when immigration has cultivated and developed her resources; when men have peopled her waste places and have been rewarded by contact with her rich soil, the world will call a blooming garden what it once mistook for a wilderness of thorns.
