Teachers must attend every session of the institute if they wish to receive compensation and credit for attending the county institute. Teachers are advised to enroll during the fore part of the week.

A teacher from each school corporation, outside the city of Fort Wayne, will be appointed to keep a roll of the attendance of the teachers of each school corporation. Teachers are requested to report twice a day to the roll keeper for Fort Wayne. A roll keeper for each school building will be appointed to keep a record of all teachers who taught in the same building last year.
