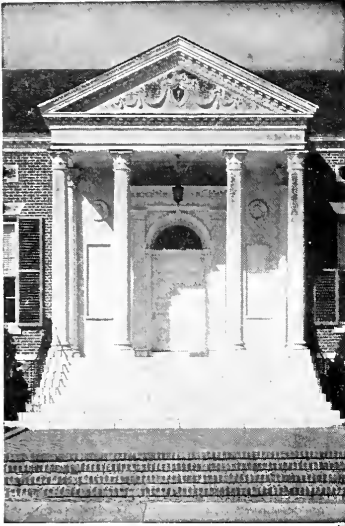

FOUNDER'S DAY

The sixty-first Founder's Day was observed at Woman's College Monday, October 5. At 9:30 that morning representatives of the student body, faculty and alumnae made the traditional pilgrimage to the grave of Dr. Charles Duncan McIver, Founder and First President.

At the cemetery, Chancellor Graham, Chancellor Emeritus Jackson, Misses Mary and Annie Petty and Miss Cora Strong, spoke briefly but appropriately of our rededication to the ideals and dreams of our Founder.

FOUNDER'S DAY SPEAKER

Major L. P. McLendon, who gave the main address on Founder's Day, is well acquainted with Woman's College and her traditions. His wife is the daughter of the late Gov. Charles B. Aycock for whom Aycock Auditorium was named; his daughter, Mrs. E. K. Atkinson, attended Woman's College; and his son, William, married Anne Whittington '52. The Major is a member of the Executive Committee of the University Board of Trustees and a prominent North Carolina attorney.

PROGRAM IN AYCOCK

At the evening program in Aycock Auditorium, students, faculty and guests heard the College Choir respond to the Litany; the reading of Dr. McIver's favorite Bible passage, 1 Corinthians 13; the hymn "O God Our Help in Ages Past"; and Major McLendon's address (full text on page 3).

Buffet supper honoring Founder's Day participants was served in Alumnae House prior to the program.

ALUMNAE MEETINGS

Since the Founder's Day Program was not broadcast this year as it has been in the past, Alumnae Chapters held Founder's Day Meetings during October, November, and December. As the News goes to press, twenty-five meetings had been held and several were planned before Christmas. The

general plan for the meetings was to honor the older alumnae in the community as well as the founders and builders of the College.

CHRISTMAS AT WOMAN'S COLLEGE

Woman's College really filled with Christmas spirit when a beautiful 30-foot cedar was placed on Elliott Hall Terrace, studded with Christmas lights and topped with a great white star. The Christmas Concert was given Saturday night, December 12 at 11 p.m., for students and their guests and again Sunday, December 13 at 5 p.m. for the public.

The gaiety of the Yuletide season began Saturday, December 5, with the Christmas Dance in Elliott Hall. The following Friday, the students had a fireside tea for the faculty in the lounges of Elliott Hall. Informal dances in the Residence Halls were enjoyed Saturday night, December 12, with the couples going to the Christmas Concert at 11 o'clock and returning for open house in the Halls.

FESTIVAL OF THE ARTS

In the calendar of Events, it will be noted that the Festival of the Arts replaces the Arts Forum of previous years. Rather than concentrate the program over a three or four day period, the committee, headed by Miss Katherine Taylor, decided to spread the activities out over several weeks devoting certain days to each of the creative arts.

UNC TELEVISION

Plans for the opening of the Consolidated University's educational television station are well underway and authorities hope the station will go on

the air in September 1954. Mr. Robert Schenken, formerly with the University Communication Center, will direct television and talent will be drawn from State, Woman's College, and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. The main tower and station will be erected on the outskirts of Chapel Hill, with studios also on the State College and Woman's College campuses.

The million dollars needed to finance television was raised from interested individuals and corporations throughout the State by Mr. W. D. Carmichael, Jr., comptroller of the University and his associates.

Plans for television were begun in June 1953 when representatives of the three faculties attended a two-day conference in Chapel Hill to explore the possibilities. Education by television promises to be a real forward step in adult education. Who knows but that her own favorite professor will call upon her via television come next year.

NEW INFIRMARY OPENS

A trip to the infirmary is no longer a terrible experience at Woman's College since the opening of the new Anna M. Gove Infirmary. Pleasing colors, a beautiful solarium for convalescents, and up-to-date much needed equipment, all add up to the current expression, "A treat instead of a treatment"—with apologies.

STUDENT HELP RATES INCREASED

Announcement was made early in December that rates for student help on the campus have increased from 45c to 55c an hour for work other than dining room work which increased from 55c to 65c per hour. These raises went into effect in December checks issued before Christmas.

According to Mrs. Kathleen Hawkins, student aid officer, approximately 550 students are doing part-time work to help defray college expenses. These jobs range from office assistants to baby sitters, but do not include the students who have employment in downtown Greensboro.

Miss Louise Alexander Speaks at Alumnae Meeting

"The Office of the President of the United States" was the subject of the delightful and informative speech by Miss Louise Alexander, Professor of Political Science and Acting Head of the History Department, at the mid-winter business meeting of the Alumnae Association, Saturday, November 21, in Alumnae House.

Buffet luncheon served at one o'clock was followed by a brief business meeting with Miss Annie Lee Singletary '31, President of the Alumnae Association, presiding. Miss Marion Sifford, upon request of the president, introduced several special guests present for the meeting, including Chancellor and Mrs. E. K. Graham, Chancellor Emeritus W. C. Jackson, Dean Katherine Taylor, Dean Mereb Mossman, Mrs. J. I. Foust, Miss Miriam MacFadyen.

The nominating committee report was presented by Mrs. Herbert Falk

(Louise Dannenbaum '29), chairman, and approved unanimously. (See slate of nominations, page 5).

The amendment to the Constitution changing the fiscal year of the Association from July 1—June 30 to January 1—December 31, was ratified and will be put into effect January 1, 1954.

In presenting Miss Alexander, the president explained that she could mention her excellent teaching, the fact that she received the first O. Max Gardner Award "for the greatest contribution to humanity" and the fact that she is "reported to be a Democrat," but instead she would say, "Ladies and gentlemen, Miss Alexander."

With her accustomed wit and charm, Miss Alexander traced the office of President from the time of George Washington to the present, giving statistics and figures to bear out the fact that the duties of the President are too

many and too burdensome to expect one man to perform.

She pointed out that George Washington, for instance, had only three ambassadors from other countries to receive; today, there are 71; in Washington's day there were only 141 appoints to be made; today, the President is expected to appoint 16,000 persons and he cannot possibly do this without a great deal of help from his advisers. To begin with, there were only three departments under the President; today we have 10, and in addition some 30 agencies that report directly to the President. It has been said that if the President gave one hour a day to each of these departments and agencies, it would take him ten hours a day, seven days a week, leaving only 14 hours for sleeping, eating and doing all the other thousands of things he must do.

Miss Alexander made only brief reference to the recent White Case when she emphasized the need for the President to remain responsible to the people for his actions and not to Congress.

"It takes an intellectual giant to be President," she said.

Founder's Day Address

Delivered at Founder's Day Exercises in Aycock Auditorium
Monday, October 5, 1953

We are assembled to celebrate a birthday, the birthday of this institution we now call Woman's College of The University of North Carolina. Nothing is so interesting as the beginning of things, whether it be the beginning of a flower garden or the beginning of human life itself. It is worthwhile to try to understand the beginnings of this College. Such task is not an easy one, because its beginnings did not follow any known design and the pattern of thought and action of that day appears to us in 1953 as being so strange that we are inclined to treat it as historical fiction rather than historical fact. But, it is this very difficulty which makes our inquiry into the history of the beginnings of this College both tantalizing and inspiring.

The North Carolina General Assembly of 1889 defeated a proposed law providing for the establishment of a school for the training of both men and women teachers. It was argued that the Bill was intentionally written by its supporters to apply to both sexes so that it would be more palatable to a General Assembly composed entirely of men. On the other hand, it was argued that the opponents of the Bill were really responsible for making it apply to both sexes because, as thus written, it would arouse the opposition of many people who entertained two prejudices, one against the higher education of women, the other against co-education.

The following General Assembly, on February 18, 1891, passed an Act entitled: "An Act To Establish A Normal And Industrial School For White Girls." I doubt if many of you had realized that this College began its existence under the handicap of such a name! Thus, one General Assembly refused to establish a school to train the heads of men *and* women, and the next General Assembly decided to create a school to train the heads *and* hands of women only. This bit of history justifies the conclusion that the

law makers decided white girls should have both their heads and hands trained so that women might add to their social graces, greater efficiency as hewers of wood and drawers of water!

One of the provisions of this new charter for the education of women directed that a "Matron's Hall" be established at which board "shall be furnished at actual cost, not to exceed eight dollars per month." Thus, we discover the origin of food for students—a subject of perennial discussion and gripe on every college campus in America!

The General Assembly really exhausted its wisdom when it provided further that this new school with eight dollars per month board should be operated on an annual appropriation of \$10,000—the equivalent of the salaries of four or five janitors today!

The attitude of people toward women and the place accorded women

in society at the time of the birth of this College was described recently by a distinguished alumna, Mrs. Virginia Lathrop, in these words:

"Young ladies were not supposed to be interested in much beyond the home back in the 90's when Dr. McIver sold the State of North Carolina on an institution of higher learning that, he pointed out at the time, was the first institution opened to the women of North Carolina except prisons and insane asylums."

This picture of the place of women in the scheme of things is not complete without recalling the provoking indictment by Walter Hines Page in his famous speech "The Forgotten Man" delivered on this campus in 1897—five years after the new school first opened its doors. This is his description of the "Forgotten Woman" of that day:

"Thin and wrinkled in youth from ill prepared food, clad without warmth or grace, living in untidy houses, working from daylight till bedtime at the dull round of weary duties, the slaves of men of equal slovenliness, the mothers of joyless children—all uneducated if not illiterate. This sight every one of you have seen, not in the countries where we send missionaries, but in the borders of the State of North Carolina, in this year of grace."

Shakespearean Treasures

Exhibited at W. C. Library

The library of Woman's College exhibited the Traveling Shakespeare Exhibit of the Folger Shakespeare Library of Washington, D. C., from September 21 through October 2.

This was the first traveling exhibit of early editions of Shakespeare ever to be put in circulation, according to Librarian Charles M. Adams. It consisted of a copy of each of the folio editions of the dramatic works, two quarto editions of single plays, and a number of prints, facsimiles, and reprints published by the Folger Shakespeare Library to illustrate the life and times of Shakespeare, and especially the Elizabethan stage. The traveling exhibit is intended to acquaint the public with examples of the treasures in the library which on April 23, 1932, were accepted by President Herbert Hoover as Henry Clay Folger's gift to the American people.

Since the dedication twenty years ago, the library's collections of early English books has increased to the point where it exceeds in size that of any other library in America and stands second only to that in the British Museum. It is exceptionally rich in English Renaissance works dealing with literature, history, theology, science, and philosophy; in books illustrating the development of printing in England, and in books about the discovery and colonization of the New World.

The present director, Dr. Louis B. Wright, who was for many years Research Professor at the Henry C. Huntington Library, is giving special attention to building the collections which relate to political, theological, and economic developments in the second half of the seventeenth century that determined in large measure the nature of colonial civilization in America.

Rosa Blakeney Parker

Retires from Teaching



Rosa Blakeney Parker '16 resigned in June as principal of Central Elementary School in Albemarle, a position she had filled successfully for twenty years.

The following excerpts from the *Stanly News and Press* give evidence of the high esteem in which Mrs. Parker is held:

"... An able educator and one who has contributed greatly to the progress of the local school system. Possessed of unusually keen insight into the best methods of instruction, Mrs. Parker continually sought to expand the curriculum of Central School to meet the needs of all the students, to increase the amount of individual attention given to each student by the teachers, and to conduct a general program intended to promote good citizenship in high school and in the community.

"Proof of the excellent type of school conducted under her leadership is the fact that it was repeatedly given a very high rating by state department inspectors.

"During her work as principal at Central the school was given a 'super' rating by the state inspectors. This rating was made by so few schools in the State that it has since been discontinued.

"Claud Grigg, superintendent of the city schools, had high praise for the work done by Mrs. Parker at Central school. He repeated the information already given concerning the high rating given the school by the state educational authorities. 'This standard was maintained largely through Mrs. Parker's efforts,' he said. 'It is not possible to bring the standard of a school up much higher than the level of its principal. I wish to express my sincere appreciation to her for the fine work she has done and the contribution she has made to the city school system.'

"R. L. Brown, Jr., chairman of the city school board, agreed with Mr. Grigg, and said, 'I wish to express appreciation on behalf of the school board for the long and faithful service Mrs. Parker has rendered in the capacity of principal. Under her leadership it has come to be recognized as one of the outstanding elementary schools in the State.'

Mrs. Parker graduated from Woman's College in 1916, was active in the organization of Student Government and served as its second president her senior year. She was president of her class and active on the magazine staff, in the Y. W. C. A., and in athletics.

Her interest and activity in Woman's College affairs has continued through the years. She served as president of the Alumnae Associa-

tion 1929-1930; is founder and past president of the Weatherspoon Gallery Association; and is a member of the Home Economics Foundation.

Mrs. Parker has been a member of the University of North Carolina Board of Trustees for several years and is at present chairman of the Trustees Building Committee for Woman's College, and is on President Gray's Long-Range Planning Committee for the Consolidated University.

In 1933 she received her master's degree from Columbia University and before becoming principal in Albemarle, she taught in Charlotte, Shelby, Monroe, Marshville and Wingate public schools, and during several summers at the U.N.C. College Center in Albemarle and Appalachian State Teachers College in Boone.

Mrs. Parker's husband, the late B. C. Parker, was an alumnus of the University of North Carolina. Their three children are: Anne (Parker) Stevens '42, Benjamin Parker, U.N.C. '46; and Rosa Blakeney Parker of Albemarle.



Faculty Members Return from Leave

Ten members of the faculty of Woman's College have returned after leaves of absence of a year or more.

Three of the returned teachers spent the past year in study and research under Ford Foundation fellowships. These are Dr. Warren Ashby, associate professor of philosophy, who was at Princeton University and Haverford College; Dr. Lenore O'Boyle, assistant professor of history, who studied at Harvard; and Dr. Eugene E. Pfaff, professor of history, who also studied at Harvard.

A fourth Woman's College Ford fellowship holder, Dr. Richard Bardolph, associate professor of history, spent last year at Harvard and was to have returned to his teaching duties here this fall. Several weeks ago, he received a State Department and Fulbright appointment as visiting professor at the Johnstrup and Jahle Colleges in Copenhagen, Denmark, for the coming year.

Other returnees are Miss Laura Anderton, instructor in biology, who spent the past year in England as a Fulbright Scholar; Miss Mary Eleanor Craig, instructor in economics, graduate study at Duke; Robert Darnell, assistant professor of music, graduate study in piano at Juillard School of Music; Mrs. Elizabeth Holder, assistant librarian, graduate study at University of North Carolina; Dr. Francis A. Laine, assistant professor of classical civilization, Carnegie Fellowship study at Harvard University; and Mrs. Mary Barwick Sink '44, instructor in English, at home; and Randall Jarrell, associate professor of English, teaching at Princeton University and University of Illinois.

Cartoon Book Depicts Life at Woman's College

"It's a 50-50 proposition," is the way that two Winston-Salem girls describe the new cartoon book which they have just completed together. The joint authors are Trilby Boerner '53 and Norma Cofer '54.

The entire book is based on their experiences as students at Woman's College, UNC, in Greensboro; the cover is yellow to conform with the school colors of gold and white; the title, "Oh College Dear, to You," is taken from the College Song; and the college seal decorates the cover with a picture of a girl in a dripping rain-hat, however, replacing that of the time-honored Minerva.

In clever line drawings and black and white they have depicted college life with tongue in cheek. And the humor ranges from a jaundiced view of rainy days, eight o'clock classes, and examinations, to the more cheerful subjects of dances and dates and soda shop. Furthermore, the two girls have worked so well together that the book looks consistent, throughout, and, except for the initials, it would be difficult to tell who did which.

Two W. C. Students from Abroad Hold Rotary Scholarships

Two of the foreign students studying at Woman's College this year are already aware that the coming winter is going to be unusual for each of them.

For Adriana Paula Josefina Gaspar of Vienna, Austria, it will be her first winter in many years that she won't be able to practice her favorite sport, skiing, at which she has been good enough to win prizes.

For Evelyn Joyce Burrows of Antofagasta, Chile, it will be her first winter above the equator where December to March suggest something else besides trips to the beaches and mountains to escape the heat.

The two students have something else in common. Each is in this country on Rotary scholarships. Miss Burrows's scholarship has been provided by Rotary International and Miss Gaspar's largely by the Greensboro Rotary Club.

Miss Burrows, 25, was born in Antofagasta. She attended the Girls' High School in that city, and was graduated from the Teachers' College of the University of Chile in Santiago in 1950. She received a certificate from the Chilean-North American Institute in 1952 after a Summer Seminar for Teachers of English. Her grandfather was English.

She has come to Woman's College to study new methods of teaching, and observe American teachers. She is one of 101 outstanding graduate students from 32 countries to be awarded a Rotary Foundation Fellowship for advanced study abroad during the 1953-54 school year. Before her decision to continue her studies, Joyce was a teacher of English at the Antofagasta Commercial Institute and the Antofagasta Girls' High School.

Miss Gaspar, 20, was born in Austria. Adi, as her new American friends call her, lived in Vienna for 13 years, and was schooled there. She attended the University of Vienna for two years and is classified as a Junior at Woman's College.

She was brought to Woman's College by the Greensboro Rotary Club. She will attend Woman's College for one school year, but unlike Miss Burrows, Adi will remain in the United States for the summer of 1954.

Miss Gaspar is studying economics and languages. She hopes to be a government service interpreter. Even now, she speaks fluent Italian, English, and German. In Austria, she was a ski champion. She also swims, sails, plays the piano, and makes many of her own clothes.

The two students are pleased with their new way of life. They appreciate the informality of the classes and the personal attention from the teachers much more than the average student.

Both are Catholics. On the first Sunday they spent at the Woman's College they chose to attend the early mass at the same church. These two new girls in a strange land, purely by chance, sat down side by side in the same row. Thus they first happened to meet, and through a mutual sense of newness, have become good friends.

Founder's Day Address

In the fall of 1892, sixty-one years ago, 176 students and a faculty of twelve assembled on this spot and, as was said of General Andrew Jackson, the baby "kicked the kiver off the first day!" And, we may truthfully add that the baby has been kicking, fussing, storming, and growing ever since!

Even the freshmen, who are not supposed to know very much, do know that from this inauspicious beginning this institution has grown into its present status as one of the truly great colleges for women in America. Beginning with few friends and well-wishers, today it is respected and loved by uncounted thousands. Beginning with meager financial resources and becoming, at times, an object of charity, today its annual budget is in terms of millions, and a proud and grateful State appropriates generously for its continuous growth and development. Beginning in an atmosphere of open hostility from some, of derision from others, and of doubt from many, today it has, so to speak, won its spurs and is now proudly proclaimed by the people as "Our College."

We may well ask ourselves why and how this truly remarkable growth and development has occurred. The answer is not hard to find. The answer is, there were people capable of following and there were leaders to lead them. We think first, of course, of Dr. Charles Duncan McIver, who was not only more responsible than any other one person for the establishment of the College, but was also its first president. Figuratively, he taught the baby to walk! We think of his successor, Dr. Foust, and of his successor, Dr. Jackson, who, in retirement, witnesses his own immortality. These men have been the engineers, if you please, who have laid the foundations deep, broad, and strong.

We think of the many men and women, too numerous to mention by name, composing the faculty and who, by their scholarship, great teaching ability, and leadership, have made this College known and respected among scholars and educators throughout the United States. As representative of this distinguished group of great and faithful teachers, we think of Miss Harriett Elliott whose reputation as

an outstanding leader among American women was earned while she served as a teacher on this campus.

Having briefly considered the beginnings of this College and its growth and development, it remains to inquire about its present and future.

The Chinese have a saying that there are really five directions on the compass—North, South, East, West, and where you are! In truth, in whatever direction we choose to travel, we must start from where we are.

Speaking as a lay-private citizen, without any knowledge of educational problems, I make bold to invite you to consider the college education of women for active participation in three areas of service. I am quite aware of the probability that after I have spoken, the distinguished scholars and professional educators of the faculty will say my boldness exceeds my sagacity, as well as my discretion! In that event, I can only rely on the sympathy of those in the audience who are as ignorant as I am—if there be any.

I would place first, in importance, the profession of teaching. Let us not forget that in the beginning and continuously thereafter, the training of teachers has been a primary objective of this College. It has been and must remain a training place for teachers—a college to teach teachers to teach.

At the beginning of this century, just fifty-three years ago, there were only about 400,000 college and university graduates in the entire United States. Now, more than that number are graduated every year. In 1900, our public school system, as we now know it, did not exist. The education of children was left to the religious denominations and the parents of those financially able to provide private instruction. This year, almost thirty-one million children have enrolled in the elementary and secondary schools.

I would not discount the urgent need for more teachers, but I would like to suggest that this College ought to be a place where students and faculty alike acknowledge the fact—or what appears to be a fact to laymen—that we have not exhausted all possibilities of improving teachers and teaching. Your distinguished Chancellor, Dr. Graham, finds himself in good company, including the brilliant young new president of Harvard University, in declaring that the best education of teachers cannot be accomplished by following a rigid pattern laid down under the guise of "certifica-

tion." To laymen, this appears to be especially true because the rules of certification are made by those who, under the necessity of standardizing compensation, would also standardize educational training. Such a system may have served some useful purpose in other days; if so, its usefulness disappears before the ever present necessity for teachers to be so well educated that they can relate the currents of present day thinking and action to the past and present efforts of mankind to improve civilization. Those who are to be responsible for training young minds in the processes of logical thinking should not themselves be trained in educational straight-jackets. Dr. Graham is right when he insists that the teaching profession needs women who can enter the class room with the assurance that comes only from a genuine education in the liberal arts. The very best certification of a teacher should be that which goes with a diploma from Woman's College.

The second area of great opportunity for women is in the field of health affairs. In the half century since 1900, life expectancy in this country has been extended more than in all previous history. In that same fifty years, unsurpassed and almost unbelievable advancements have been made in medicine, surgery, pharmacy, chemistry, and the related sciences. Good health has been accepted as the companion of education. As the result of a crusade for better health for all the people, the Federal and State governments have poured out billions of dollars for more and better hospitals and for public health services.

The prejudices against women in the professions of medicine, dentistry, surgery, pharmacy, and numerous related specializations have all but disappeared—and why should not such prejudices disappear? Can you imagine any profession for which women are by nature better qualified than that of medicine and related professions? To be sure, it has required courage on the part of individual women as well as of faculties of professional schools to invade the fields so long regarded as reserved for men only. But, you have only to look about you for convincing proof that women have come to stay in these professions. Indeed, there is scarcely a hospital in the whole country which could open its doors tomorrow if all the women nurses and technicians were suddenly eliminated today.

Look, if you will, at the open door of opportunity awaiting you in the fields of research where many laboratories and equipment are all begging for women to come and furnish the brains for their intelligent use. We have built so many hospital beds in North Carolina and in other states during the past few years, many cannot be used because of the shortage of nurses and technicians. A health conscious people are begging, as never before, for doctors, dentists, pharmacists, nurses, public health workers, and qualified technicians. At Chapel Hill, our State has constructed the facilities for one of the greatest health centers in the nation, with schools of medicine, dentistry, nursing, pharmacy, and public health, all open to women.

I am not suggesting that this College give professional education in the health professions. I am suggesting, as in the case of teachers, this College provide the very best basic education in the liberal arts for women and then prepare them for professional education so that they may finally enter these professions prepared to compete with men, but what is more important, prepared to blaze new trails and reach greater heights of service to society.

Thirdly, I invite you to consider the place of women in government.

For some time now, we have witnessed strange developments in our own government as well as world wide clashes and conflicts between different philosophies of government. We have suffered from a sort of hysteria of name calling, of condemnation without notice and a hearing, and of character assassinations by anonymous persons or by persons who, themselves, have little or no character to risk. Recently, we have even had a disgraceful illustration of this sort of thing here in North Carolina. We have seen this kind of thing make its appearance in political campaigns. We have witnessed bold and reckless appeals to religious and race prejudices. But, the really alarming thing is that the people are showing an increasing loss of respect for public offices and public officers.

I need not point out to you young ladies the seriousness of these symptoms of trouble and the danger they hold for the very existence of our democratic society. I prefer to appeal to you to equip yourselves for responsible service in government. Do not be frightened and discouraged by the argument that government services and public office holding are men's jobs

and that women cannot preserve their pride and high ideals in what is sarcastically called "politics." On the contrary, the great overwhelming percentage of our people respect character and intelligence.

Since this College first opened its doors sixty-one years ago, women have won equal rights with men to vote and to hold public office, to compete in any and all the professions and trades, to serve on juries, and to own and deal with property. These victories for women were not won in the drawing room, but they were won by vigorous, intelligent, and persistent appeals for the sympathetic understanding by all the people. These victories for the rights of women were won by thousands of women like Miss Harriet Elliott who coined the phrase "Responsible Freedom" and then proved its meaning by her tireless efforts in behalf of equal opportunities and equal responsibilities for both men and women.

Let us remember that the danger to our democracy does not lie with the great masses of our people. The danger lies with those who attain high places of leadership and are thereby given the opportunity to color the truth and to manufacture falsehood and error. The dictatorships of Hitler, Mussolini, and of the Kremlin, are recent proofs of that assertion. It is, therefore, the duty of educated women to take their stand in the front line of shocktroops of democratic government. Their very presence will lift the morale of their brothers and their moral courage and intelligence will expose and put to rout the forces of ignorance and prejudice.

On this birthday, the spirit of those who have built this College and brought it to its present proud position appeals to you to stand on tiptoe and look over the horizon of man's achievements and recognize the manifold opportunities awaiting you for service to mankind. To you is given the task of making the light, started here sixty-one years ago as a tiny flickering flame, as bright as the untarnished brilliance of a great star in the heavens. The light of this College must always be a beacon to guide young women from everywhere to come here to find the kind of instruction, enlightenment, culture, and inspiration to make the weak grow strong and the strong to grow great.

In conclusion, I commend to you these beautiful words from the Prayer Of St. Thomas Aquinas For Students several centuries ago:

"Do Thou who givest speech to the tongue of little children, instruct our tongues and pour into our lips the grace of Thy benediction. Give us keenness of apprehension, capacity for remembering, method and ease in learning, insight in interpretation, and copious eloquence in speech. Instruct our beginning, direct our progress, and set Thy seal upon the finished work. . . ."

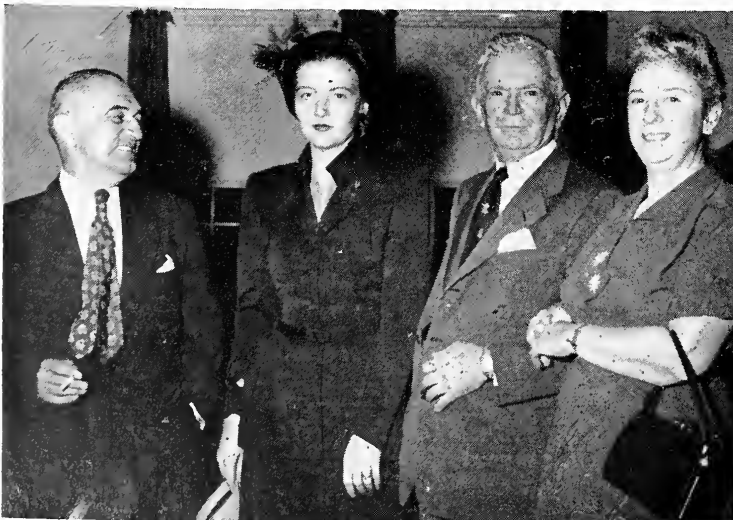
