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The Sixth Annual Arts Forum, March 17, 18, and 19, will again feature student creative work in the fields of music, drama, writing, dance and visual arts.

Since its beginning in 1943, the Arts Forum, designed to promote understanding and appreciation by bringing together professionally and informally, students, teachers, and leaders in the various fields of art, has continued to expand in size and scope, providing expert criticism and guidance to young artists from many colleges and universities.

Experts who will participate in the Forum this year include:

Mr. Henry Cowell, a noted pianist, composer of orchestral and pianistic music, critic and lecturer. He has been lecturer in music at Sanford University, Bennington College, and Mills College. He has served as music director for the New School of Social Research for a number of years and also as consultant for the music division of the Pan-American Union. Mr. Cowell, recipient of a Guggenheim Fellowship, is author of two books, *New Musical Resources* and *The Nature of Melody*. He edited *American Composers and American Music, a Symposium*.

Critic and teacher of drama. Mr. Walter Prichard Eaton, who has served as dramatic critic for the *New York Tribune*, the *New York Sun*, and the *American Magazine*. Formerly professor of play-writing at the Yale School of Drama. Mr. Eaton has this year been visiting professor at Chapel Hill. He is a member of the National Institute of Arts and Letters and the author of a number of books, including *The Actor's Heritage*, *The Drama in English*, *Plays and Players*, and *Ten Years of the Theatre Guild*.

Mr. Louis Horst, composer of music for the dance, critic, and teacher, was principal musician for the Dennishawn Group. He has been composer of music for the principal music adviser to Martha Graham, has conducted orchestra for Miss Graham's concerts, and has taught choreography and musical camp for dance at Bennington College, and at the Graham Studios. He is editor of the leading dance magazine, *Dance Observer*, and author of *Pre-Classical Dance Forms*.

Jean Stafford, novelist, and Peter Taylor, short-story writer, will lead the writing panel in discussion of fiction, rather than Katherine Anne Porter as was previously announced.

Mr. Taylor and Miss Stafford will appear on the panel with Richard Wilbur, who is to criticize student poetry. Mr. Wilbur, considered one of the most prom-

ising young American poets, published his first volume of verse in 1947 at the age of twenty-six. Many of the poems in the collection *Beautiful Changes and Other Poems* were published previously in leading literary magazines. David Daiches in the January 10, 1948, issue of *Saturday Review of Literature* said that "Mr. Wilbur is on the right track and is working his way towards impressive poetry."

Jean Stafford, novelist and short-story writer, is a graduate of the University of Colorado and has taught at Stephens and Queens Colleges. To date she has published two novels, *Boston Adventure* and *The Mountain Lion*. Her stories appear regularly in leading periodicals. Miss Stafford has worked under a Guggenheim Fellowship for two years.

Peter Taylor, former member of the English faculty and instructor of writing, at Woman's College, is now teaching writing at the University of Indiana. After two years on the faculty here, Mr. Taylor went to Indiana last year to form a writing section in the curriculum there. Mr. Taylor's stories have been appearing in the major literary quarterlies for a number of years. Portions of his novellette are now being published in *The New Yorker* and in *Harper's*. Mr. Taylor, a graduate of Kenyon College, came to Woman's College for his first year of teaching after service in the U. S. Army.

Mr. James Johnson Sweeney, critic, lecturer, and author, noted in the fields of painting and sculpture, has been director of the department of painting and sculpture of the Museum of Modern Art and lecturer on fine arts at New York University. He has also directed exhibitions of twentieth century painting and sculpture at the University of Chicago; and of African Negro Art, and showings of the paintings of Joan Miro, the sculpture of Alexander Calder and of Alfred Steiglitz at the Museum of Modern Art. Mr. Sweeney is associate editor of *Transition* and author of books on Alexander Calder, Stuart Davis, Henry Moore, Marc Chalfale, Georgia O'Keefe, Joan Miro, and Alfred Steiglitz.

According to the tentative schedule, the

Forum opens on the morning of Thursday, March 17, with a discussion of sculpture by Mr. Sweeney. Thursday afternoon Mr. Taylor and Miss Stafford will lead criticism of student writing published in the Arts Forum edition of the *Coraddi*. Friday morning Mr. Eaton will discuss the writing and production of the three student plays presented Thursday night.

Other Friday events will include a performance of student choreography, with a discussion by Mr. Horst, a dance concert by visiting groups, and a concert of student works to be criticized by Mr. Cowell.

The Greensboro Orchestra and the Chamber Music Players will appear in concert Saturday night, concluding the Forum. In addition to public appearances, leaders, during the three-day period, will conduct classes and conferences with various groups of students.

During the Forum, contemporary American sculpture and student work from undergraduate, graduate, and professional schools will be exhibited. Woman's College student photography will also be displayed.

Faculty members on the Forum staff include Mr. Charles Adams, college librarian; Dean Hugh Altwater, of the School of Music; Miss Kathryn England, drama professor; Miss Ione Grogan, counselor; Mr. Gregory D. Ivy, department of art; Miss Ethel Martus, department of physical education; Miss Virginia Moomaw, also of the department of physical education; Dr. Anna Joyce Reardon, department of physics; Miss Katherine Taylor, Dean of Woman; Miss Elvira Prondecki, counselor; Mr. W. Raymond Taylor, drama; Mr. George M. Thompson, School of Music; Miss Helen Thrush, art; Mr. Elliot Weisgarber, School of Music; and Dr. Marc Friedlaender, chairman, of the department of English.

Mary White Scott is First Lady of North Carolina

When an alumna changes her address, the Alumnae Office of the Woman's College is always interested, and topping in interest the list of recent changes of address to be noted by the office is that of Mrs. Mary White Scott, Class of '20, from Haw River, N. C., to the Governor's Mansion, Raleigh, N. C.

When one of her daughters takes over the role of the First Lady of North Carolina, or any other high office, the Woman's College naturally is very proud, but not surprised. For many years alumnae like Mary White Scott have filled positions of prominence, responsibility, and leadership.

As the wife of Governor W. Kerr Scott, the State's newest chief executive, Mary White Scott for the next four years will preside over the gubernatorial household and social affairs with the same modesty and efficiency for which she has long been known by her friends and neighbors. Nor will she be a stranger to Raleigh, for her husband for several years was Commissioner of Agriculture for the State and she had frequent occasion to become familiar with the administrative and legislative life at the State Capital.

Aside from the fact that as the wife of the Governor she is a very special and unique person, Mary White Scott can be regarded from many points of view as an ideal North Carolina wife and mother. Her highly successful home and her healthy, active family attest to this. She has been quite as successful in her field as her husband has been as a dairy farmer, business man, and public official.

After leaving Woman's College, she taught school for a year. She gave up schoolroom duties to marry her girlhood sweetheart, Kerr Scott, on July 2, 1919, shortly after he had returned from World War I. The Scotts built a seven-room house on their 225-acre

farm, both of which, along with their family, increased substantially during the subsequent years. The house has been added to considerably, and the farm, known as Melville Dairy Farm now, extends over 1,300 acres. From the furnishings within to the flower gardens without, the home reveals Mrs. Scott's love of order, comfort, and beauty. It is a home that bespeaks love and contentment, and it isn't too much to predict that the sixty miles from the Governor's Mansion in Raleigh to Melville Farms will be frequently travelled by the Scotts during the ensuing four years.

Governor and Mrs. Scott have three children, Osborne Scott, who attended N. C. State College and will bear most of the burden of operating the family farm while Governor Scott is in Raleigh; Robert Scott, a pre-medical student at Duke, and Mrs. A. J. Lowdermilk, formerly Mary Kerr Scott, Woman's College, '41, of Akron, Ohio. And there's a five-year-old

granddaughter, Mr. and Mrs. Lowdermilk's daughter.

During the strenuous political campaign of 1947 Mrs. Scott was an indefatigable campaigner with her husband. She accompanied him on numerous tours and partook with him of countless dinners and luncheons, met thousands of North Carolinians.

No new governor in recent generations has attracted more attention than W. Kerr Scott. He has vigorously espoused a broad program of service to the people of the State, particularly with regard to good roads and education. He is the first governor of North Carolina since well back in the last century who hasn't been a lawyer. He has undertaken a program that will be as strenuous on him as it is to be extensive in its effect on the State. Mrs. Scott knows just what is to be her first responsibility during the years ahead. "My duty," she declares, "is to keep the Governor healthy, happy, and at his best."

Mary Lois Ferrell, who had been a member of the School of Music at Woman's College since 1922, fell asleep on Sunday night, December 19, 1948, after an illness which had been progressively painful and confining.

If it is true that some people were born to do a given work, then Miss Ferrell was born to teach music in such a way that her pupils would continue her work long after she had met her last pupil. She studied at Meredith College in Raleigh, at Northwestern in Chicago, Ill., and studied as a private pupil of Ernest Hutcheson in New York and Emil Lauer in Vienna, Austria, but she was born in a family which had made great contributions to education in North Carolina and had an innate knowledge of the beautiful things which came before any of her training.

To those who had the privilege of studying with her during the twenty-six years she taught at Woman's College, she was more than a teacher of piano. Teacher of piano she was to such a degree that each student began building anew on the great fundamentals of the art when first the visits to her studio began, and then each addition of progress was laid carefully and thoroughly toward the realization of the beautiful edifice which housed Music. Yet this training in the Art was only a part of what Miss Ferrell gave each of her girls, which was an intangible guidance toward other Fine Arts which later enriched the life of each of them.

With the beginning of the first semester of the current college year Miss Ferrell resumed her classes and continued to go to her studio as long as her strength permitted. Later, her pupils went to her home for instruction, and even in the final weeks she continued to teach her Seniors.

Miss Ferrell made a rich contribution to the musical life of the campus and Greensboro as a recitalist. Other pianists might concentrate on virtu-

osity; Miss Ferrell concentrated on the poetry contained in the music. In the Wade R. Brown Series as a soloist and member of ensembles, in two piano programs with Miss Aleine Minor, and in the various chamber music ensembles with other members of the faculty she gave richly to the capacity audiences which heard her recitals. For a great number of years she took an active part in programs presented by the Euterpe Club, and at one time was an officer in the club.

She will be greatly missed by those who knew her as a friend and as a talented hostess. But very few people have the ability she had to efface herself completely in anticipating the needs and pleasures of others. A group of friends met at her home one Sunday afternoon a year ago in September, just before the opening of the college year, and after a delightful visit during which Miss Ferrell and Miss Minor made each guest feel that he or she enjoyed the impromptu visit to the fullest, went home happy and eager for the year's work. Within forty-eight hours those guests learned that after the last of them departed, Miss Ferrell took her already-packed bags and went to the hospital for the scheduled critical operation. Such thoughtful lovingly concern for the comfort and happiness of others marked her entire life.

With her going, Woman's College has lost a remarkable teacher, pianist and friend.

New Library Building at Woman's College

On September 24, 1948, Walker Avenue was closed from Forest Street to McIver Street. Three days later Dr. Jackson broke ground for the new library building. This brief ceremony was held in the middle of Walker Avenue between Forest Street and the bridge. Since that date students and faculty have watched with interest the bulldozer as it piled great mounds of dirt in front of South Spencer, and the pouring of concrete. During the Christmas holidays bright orange steel girders appeared and the sound of riveting is heard more and more frequently. As steel construction appears it is easier to visualize just how large the building is going to be. Facing the bridge, it stretches from approximately 60 feet of South Spencer and to within the same distance of the Infirmary.

The building has been designed by the architectural firm of Northrup and O'Brien, Winston-Salem, N. C., which will supervise its construction. This firm has also developed a new plan for the campus, involving a large building program of which the library is the first major unit. The exterior architecture reflects the traditional pattern already established in other buildings on the campus. Sand-finish colonial face brick and Georgia marble are the principal exterior materials.

The library will consist of three complete floors and a smaller fourth floor above the central sections of the building. On the ground floor there will be a small lecture hall seating approximately 350 people, a student lounge, faculty studies, carrels for individual study, and stack area for shelving a large per cent of the book collection. The first floor as in the present building will include reference room, periodicals room, charging desk, public catalog, offices for the librarian and other members of the staff. Space on the second floor will be divided between reserve rooms for freshmen and upperclassmen, a room for general reading, which is intended as an expansion of the present recreational reading room, soundproof areas for radio, phonograph, and other audio-visual materials, seminar rooms, staff lounge and study areas in the stacks. The smaller fourth floor will be given over to stacks, carrels, seminar rooms, College Collection, Woman's Collection and other special materials.

Plans for the building were based on the following general considerations: (1) flexibility; (2) administration by a relatively small professional staff; (3) space priority to public services and staff work areas; (4) stacks designed for work as well as storage. The interior is constructed so that changes required by new teaching methods, or by different ideas of the functions of the library, could be made with as little expense as possible.

Much thought has been given to the use of color, the problem of lighting and the choice of furniture that will be both attractive and durable. The first-floor vestibule walls are to be of Loreda Chiaro marble, and the main lobby walls of a rift-sawn oak, limed finish. Colored walls will be used in the reading rooms throughout the building. Fluorescent lighting is to be used throughout the building with minor exceptions. It is planned to obtain good reflective values through the use of light-colored furniture and the green terrazzo floors. Selection of furniture is incomplete, but preliminary specifications call for occasional chairs near the windows in the reserve rooms and for an informal grouping of tables and chairs in the reference and periodicals rooms as well as in the general reading room.

In the new building the library will be able to provide special services to readers which, because of limited space, are not possible in the present building. These services will include: (1) carrels throughout the stacks where students may do serious work undisturbed; (2) an attractively furnished alcove in the main lobby for the display of new books; (3)

a room where bibliographical material may be used by readers and is equally convenient to the staff in the reference, catalog and order departments; (4) soundproof rooms for listening to radio and phonograph records and for viewing films and slides; (5) faculty studies; (6) seminar rooms where groups may meet for discussion or for examining library materials; (7) small lecture hall for book talks and other college meetings; (8) student lounge, and (9) staff kitchenette.

Plans for the library represent the combined thought and work not only of the architects but also of the library staff and the faculty library committee. Questionnaires on certain needs and policies were sent to the whole faculty, and preliminary drawings were made numerous times. When the doors of the new building are opened officially sometime in 1950 Woman's College will realize the consummation of plans begun more than ten years ago.

Plans for a dinner Tuesday, May 17, to honor Chancellor W. C. Jackson who is retiring July 1, 1949, are being made as the Alumnae News goes to press. Miss Jane Summerell is chairman of the Alumnae Committee and notices with reservation blanks will be sent out in April.

Many Alumnae are contributing to the Chapel Fund in honor of Dr. Jackson and a report of the amount received will be made at the dinner.

Completion of the Chapel Fund is one of our Chancellor's fondest dreams and this is our opportunity to help make that dream come true.

Woman's College Home Economics and Physical Education graduates of 1948 have lost no time in taking over a wide variety of positions for which their four-year courses prepared them.

A count of the 80 graduates of the Home Economics Department places most of them at teaching home economics in schools and in county home agency work. A dozen are working for industrial and business organizations, others are in hospital dietetics, directing nursery schools, managing school and industrial cafeterias, practicing interior decorating, or are doing graduate work.

1948 Physical Education majors have located in eleven states, nine of them here in North Carolina. Two of them are doing graduate work; five are in recreation either in Y.W.C.A.'s, cities, or hospitals; eight are teaching in colleges; and six teach in the public schools.

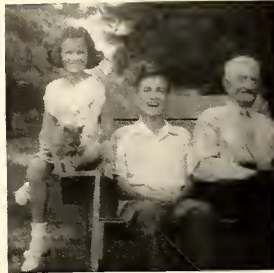

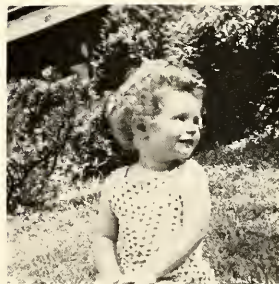

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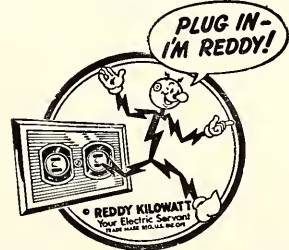
