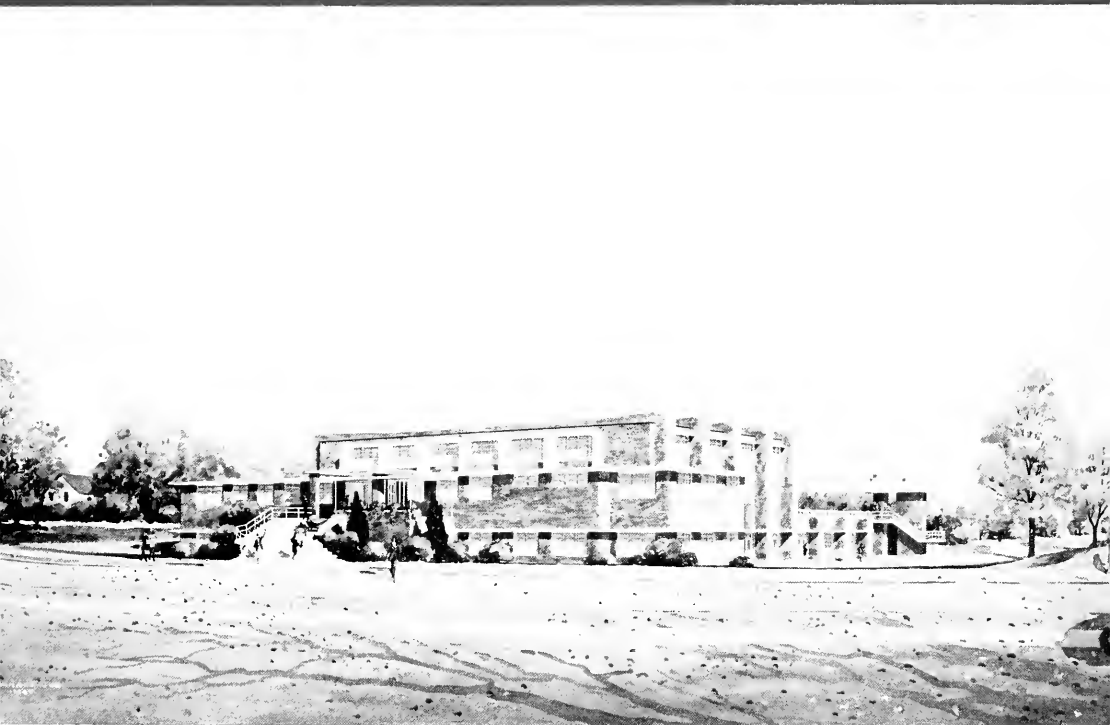

Board of Trustees Selects New University President

President Gordon Gray, United States Secretary of the Army, was unanimously elected President of the Greater University of North Carolina, at the meeting of the Board of Trustees, February 6, 1950. He is expected to take over his duties as president as soon as possible, but at least by September 1, 1950. President Gray succeeds Dr. Frank P. Graham, who resigned as president of the University March 22, 1949, to become U. S. Senator.

Our new President is well qualified by experience and training for this important post. He was graduated from the University of North Carolina in 1930 with an A.B. degree. He received his LL.B. degree from Yale Law School in 1933. An outstanding scholar as an undergraduate, he served as president of the Phi Beta Kappa his senior year.

For two years after his graduation from Yale, he was associated with a law firm in New York City and in 1935 returned to his home in Winston-Salem to practice law. He interrupted his law practice in 1942 to volunteer as a private for service in the army during World War II. In 1945, he was separated from the army as a captain, having served with General Omar Bradley's 12th Army Group in the European theater.

President Truman appointed him Assistant Secretary of the Army in 1947 and Secretary of the Army in June 1949.

Mr. and Mrs. Gray, the former Miss Jane Craige of Winston-Salem, have four sons: Gordon Jr. 10, Burton Craige 9, Boyden 7, and Bernard 3.

President Gray is president and publisher of the Winston-Salem *Journal and Sentinel*. He represented Forsyth County in the State Legislature in 1939, 1941, and 1947.

His appointment was not only the unanimous wish of the University Board of Trustees, but also has met with enthusiastic response throughout the State as evidenced by the following expressions from the press:

Washington Post: The University of North Carolina will gain a public servant of truly exceptional ability and stature in its new president, Gordon Gray.

Raleigh News and Observer: The committee has proposed a young man of high character, great ability and devotion to both University and the State. His announcement that he will accept the post is the acceptance not only of a job, but the greatest challenge in the life of the State today. His readiness to accept it is the basis of the hope that he will meet it.

Greensboro Daily News: In intellect, ability and experience Mr. Gray has abundant qualifications to justify the assumption that he will carry on the administration of the University in the style to which it has been accustomed, which is saying a great deal.

Durham Herald: Mr. Gray will bring to the University a fine mind and a broad experience in administration and in public service. He will bring to it a sincerity and earnestness of purpose that will insure that the qualities which have made the University great, will be cherished.

Dr. Jackson Returns to His Office

It's good news to all of us that Chancellor W. C. Jackson is back in his office following an enforced and well-earned rest. A fortnight at Wesley Long Hospital, several weeks at his home, and a trip to Florida in February have completed the "rest cure" made necessary by overwork and exhaustion.

It is well known that Dr. Jackson asked for retirement in 1947 and 1948 but twice was asked by the Administration and Trustees to stay on one more year. His gracious acceptance of these additional responsibilities account for his illness, but they leave us doubly glad to see the Administration Building take on a new look because of his return to his place.

Woman's College Receives Valuable Art Collection

The Weatherspoon Gallery is the recipient of an art collection valued at approximately \$20,000 from the estate of the late Mrs. Etta Cone of Baltimore, Md. The collection will be exhibited sometime this spring, according to Professor Gregory D. Ivy, head of the Woman's College Department of Art.

In the Cone collection received by Woman's College are: 6 Matisse bronzes, 9 etchings by Matisse, 59 Matisse lithographs; three etchings by Picasso; 10 Estampes of Modern French paintings by Jacques Villon; 11 etchings by Ben Silbert; 8 portfolios; 271 art books; and 15 large color reproductions.

The College is very grateful for this collection, which added to the permanent collection valued at more than \$40,000 already owned by the Weatherspoon Gallery, makes the need for an adequate and fireproof Art Gallery in a Fine Arts Building at Woman's College more urgent than ever.

Enrollment in the Art Department has steadily increased for the past decade. There are now 578 students enrolled in art courses. This growing interest in art is part of a general pattern and not just a local situation, which means that our responsibility and opportunity for service in this field increases.

The Art Department at the present time is housed on three floors of McIver Building and classes in Industrial Design and Textile Design are held in the old laundry building. The Weatherspoon Gallery is the old Physics Lecture Room with several floor levels, and the foyer of McIver Building is also used for exhibits.

The work done by our Art Department is recognized as outstanding among colleges of the southeast, and with the addition of the Master of Fine Arts Degree granted for work done at Woman's College, this department will continue to expand.

The Annual Arts Forum held at Woman's College receives nation-wide attention. The International Textile Exhibition at Woman's College each fall is an outstanding event. Art Ex-

hibits by alumnae and other artists are continually on display in the present gallery.

Even with limited gallery and laboratory facilities, Woman's College is doing exceptional work in Art. The time has come when there should be an Art Building on our campus with facilities designed for uses to which they would be put to provide for the expansion and development of Woman's College as the Art Center of the South.

Betsy Hammer '43 is Secretary in White House

"My most exciting experience occurred on May 16, 1949, when I met and shook hands with President Truman," writes Betsy Hammer '43. But we imagine there were also moments of excitement when she walked in to her job as secretary to Honorable John R. Steelman, Assistant to the President of the United States.

"Our offices are in the east wing of the White House and, that in itself adds a thrill to each day," she says. "Of course I frequently see members of the White House staff, government officials, and members of Congress too.

"It is rather difficult to go into detail about my job other than to say it is 'secretarial'—but there is much that can be said about Dr. Steelman. I was proud to learn that Dr. Steelman attended our University—to be definite, he received his Ph.D. from the University of North Carolina in 1928. He is a wonderful boss and it is indeed a pleasure to be associated with such a grand person."

In speaking of her community activities, she writes: "I am a member of the American Association of University Women, the Young Democrats, the North Carolina State Society, and the Beta Sigma Phi International Sorority. As President of Xi Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi last year, my chapter won the Lyda Huff Trophy, which is presented each spring to the most outstanding chapter in the District of Columbia. Our welfare and service work was particularly outstanding."

"I think this is a good opportunity for me to say 'thanks' to the faculty at Woman's College for providing me with an education that was in part instrumental in my being chosen for the position I hold today. That 'Shorthand by Spruill' just can't be beat!"

Woman's College takes pride in adding to our distinguished alumna roster the name of Betsy Hammer, whose success is noted by her appointment to such a high position.

Faculty Members Give Concert in High Point

Three members of Woman's College School of Music faculty were presented in an outstanding concert by the High Point Alumnae Chapter and the Musical Art Club of High Point, Monday, January 30, 1950, at the Y.M.C.A. at 8:00 p.m., before a capacity audience which was visibly impressed with their artistic ability, versatility and attractive appearance.

Henry Whipple introduced the guest artists who were, Miss Jean Schneck, contralto; Robert Darnell, pianist; and Hugh Altvater, violinist, and Miss Frances McBane and Philip Morgan as accompanists for the program. Mr. Altvater, a graduate of the University of Michigan and now a graduate student in composition at the Woman's College, played "Sonata in A Major" (Vivaldi) and "Poem" (Chausson) to open the program, the latter being especially well executed and enthusiastically received. Miss Schneck, who has been at Woman's College since 1948, then sang several selections. She began her portion of the program with "Over The Steppe" (Gretchaninoff), following with "The Sleep That Flits On Baby's Eyes" (Carpenter), "Shelling Peas" (Duke) and "Moon-Marketing" (Weaver), concluding her number with "Time You Old Gypsy Man" (Bosly). The piano numbers of Mr. Darnell included "La Terrasse des Audiences du Clair de Lune, Op. 28, No. 22 (Chopin); Prelude in G Sharp Minor (Rachmaininoff) and "Sonata Number 4 on F. Sharp Major" (Scriabin).

Mrs. R. S. Caperton, Jr. (Sara Sears '43), is chairman of the High Point Alumnae Chapter and Mrs. C. F. Tomlinson (May Lovelace '07) is president of the Musical Art Club.

Frances Butler Spends Year Teaching in France

Frances Butler has returned to Savannah, Ga., after a most exciting year teaching in Toul, France. She spent some time in Washington, D. C., and California this fall and stopped over in Greensboro for a couple of days in January.

Dr. Meta Miller, of the Romance Language Department, who visited with Frances while she was in France last summer, gives us some interesting highlights:

"Frances got to France in July, 1948, while much of the food was still rationed. Potatoes were the principal item of diet. She was assistante d'anglais in the college de garçons at Toul, a small town not far from Nancy, where she attended courses at the University of Nancy. She held conversation classes at the college de garçons and at the lycée de jeunes filles in the same town. Since the town was practically bombed out, there was no place for her to live except at the college de garçons, where they managed to fix her up a room. It had a stove in it and the servants and boys kept her well supplied with fuel. Every one teased her about her warm room. All the rest of the school was cold.

"She became very much attached to all her students and they to her, and at the end of the school year in mid-July each one gave her a gift, the pupil's own most prized possession. The head of the college, an Oxford trained Frenchman, and his British wife were ever so good to her. They, the students and the students parents were particularly solicitous when Frances had an attack of pleurisy in February.

"She got to know a girl who was a native of Strasbourg and visited her several times. That led her to making a tour of Alsace in July after school closed. Several times during the school year she was able to go to Paris to see her friends and revisit the sights, go to theaters, concerts and exhibits. She had spent more than a year in France in 1938-39 with her mother and sisters. She and Ellen had attended the Ecole Alsacienne at that time. She visited her sister Joey '37 in Geneva at Christmas and at Easter she went to Rome and Florence. Before returning to Savannah in September, 1949, she spent more time in Paris and went to Mt. St. Michel."



Lettie Hamlett Rogers Writes Story in McCall's

Mrs. Rogers is on leave of absence from her teaching of creative writing at Woman's College this year.

Seventh Arts Forum Planned March 9, 10, 11

Plans for the Seventh Arts Forum to be held at Woman's College, March 9, 10, 11, included, for the first time, student-directed experimental puppet plays, and work in music and art by graduate students. The Southeastern College Art Conference was also scheduled to be held at Woman's College at the same time.

"The Arts Forum" according to the *Carollian*, "is designed to promote understanding and appreciation by bringing together, professionally and informally, students and teachers in the fields of music, drama, writing, the dance, and the visual arts. Since its inception in 1943, the Forum has continually expanded in size and scope, providing expert criticism and guidance to young artists from numerous states enrolled in various colleges and universities."

The emphasis of the Forum will be on student creative work in the various media of the arts. The work of students from thirty-three institutions will be performed, exhibited and otherwise presented. Students and faculty from more than that number of colleges will attend.

Exhibits of student work in the graphic arts, sculpture, and prints will be shown in Weatherspoon Gallery. Student work in photography will be on display in the college library.

At various scheduled hours during the three day period, choreography of southern colleges will be reviewed and evaluated, student poetry and prose will be read, student musical compositions will be heard, student plays will be produced, and will be criticized by the leaders. Opportunity for informal conferences and group discussions will be provided with the leaders in the several fields.

Leaders for the Forum include *Richard Blackmur*, poet, critic, and teacher at Princeton University; *Barrett H. Clark*, dramatic editor and critic, executive director of Dramatists Play Service; *Stanley William Hayter*, graphic artist and teacher, professor of art at Brooklyn College; *Aline B. Louchheim*, art critic and at present art editor for *New York Times*; *Quincy Porter*, composer, professor of music at Yale University; *Bessie Schonberg*, dancer and teacher of the dance, former member of Martha Gra-

ham's Company, director of dance at Sarah Lawrence College; *Lionel Trilling*, fiction writer, critic, teacher of literature at Columbia University. Mr. Trilling also participated in the Arts Forum in 1946.

Dr. Marc Friedlaender is chairman of the Arts Forum Committee, which is composed of students and faculty. Miss Marilyn Shaw '50 is secretary.

The Alumnae House will be headquarters for the Forum and many of the discussion groups will be held throughout the house. Leaders of the Forum will be housed in the Alumnae House guest rooms.



Alumnae Exhibit In Weatherspoon Gallery

Two art exhibits by Woman's College Alumnae, Elizabeth (Reeves) Lyon '38 and Mrs. Callie Braswell '46-sp. have been displayed in Weatherspoon during the past few months.

Mrs. Braswell, who is art supervisor for the Greensboro City Schools, had a number of water colors, crayon drawings, and several etchings on display. She has studied at Woman's College several years as a special student and also took courses at the Beaufort Art Colony. She teaches art at Burnsville during the summer at the Woman's College School of Fine Arts.

Mrs. Lyon, who lives in Durham, taught art at the Durham Junior High School for two years. She has exhibited and won awards at the Federation of Women's Club Exhibition, National Water Color Show, Baltimore Museum and North Carolina Artists Exhibition. Her exhibit at Weatherspoon Gallery which opened January 5 was on display through February. "Her work is notable for the variety of technique employed and excellent color quality as well as a fine sense of composition", says Mr. Ivy.

Committee Makes Report on New Amendment

The special committee appointed by the Alumnae President to consider the advisability of a referendum to increase the minimum membership contribution to the Alumnae Fund, submits the following report:

Having studied carefully the income and the increased expenditures of the W. C. Alumnae Association, the Committee recommends that Article II Section 3a of the By-Laws, which now reads:

"Active membership at any one time shall be confined to those who have contributed at least two dollars to the Alumnae Fund of the Association during the fiscal year, which shall run from May 1 through April 30."

be amended to read as follows:

"Active membership at any one time, except for outgoing seniors and outgoing one-year commercial students, shall be confined to those who have contributed at least three dollars to the Alumnae Fund of the Association during the fiscal year, which shall run from May 1 through April 30. Members of the outgoing Senior Class and outgoing one-year Commercial Class shall be considered active members for one year after graduation upon contribution of one dollar to the Alumnae Fund."

The committee based its decision on very significant facts; for example, the alumnae fee of \$2.00 has been in effect over a quarter century, during which time the cost of printing the ALUMNAE NEWS has increased 50% (from \$.96 to \$1.50 per subscription); the cost of postage has increased approximately 50%; cost of student help has increased 80%; cost of experienced help has increased 100%. This is only a partial list of necessarily increased expenditures, and does not in any way include additional cost for such items as increased contribution to the Social Science Forum, increased communication with individual members, greater variety of services to local chapters, and reten-

tion of the lowest possible fee for use of the Alumnae House.

The recommendation of a fee of \$1.00 for outgoing seniors and commercial students is intended both as a courtesy to our new members and as a means of encouraging more of our graduates to join us immediately upon graduation.

Dr. Dixie Lee Bryant Dies in Asheville, N. C.

Dr. Dixie Lee Bryant, charter member of the Woman's College Faculty, and for nine years, 1892-1901, teacher of science, died in Asheville, Friday, November 18, 1949.

Dr. Bryant was born in Louisville, Ky., January 7, 1862. She attended Columbia Female Institute, Columbia, Tenn., and Massachusetts Institute of Technology in Boston, where she specialized in mineralogy, receiving her B.S. degree in 1891.

At the State Normal and Industrial College she taught science and was instrumental in the establishment of laboratories in chemistry, biology and physics. She resigned after nine years to study microscopical petrography in Heidelberg, Germany, with Professors Rosenburch, Wildermann and Colerader. She received her doctorate in 1904.

Dr. Bryant was an honorary member of Delta Kappa Gamma and for 59 years was an active member of American Association of University Women.

Her many friends among the alumnae are grateful for her contribution to the early years of our college and share with her family their grief.

PLANS BEING MADE FOR BURNSVILLE SCHOOL OF FINE ARTS

An extensive expansion program for the fourth year of the Burnsville School of Fine Arts includes credit courses in drama, voice, art, dance, creative writing and education, to be offered July 3 through August 18, according to Mr. C. W. Phillips, newly appointed director of the project.

For the past three summers, the Burnsville School has been most successful with some three hundred students in one season taking courses for credit while enjoying a delightful vacation in Burnsville, situated at the foot of Mount Mitchell, one of the most scenic spots in North Carolina.

The quaint little Parkway Playhouse with a real summer theatre atmosphere, attracts attention from visitors and tourists as well as students. The schedule for 1950 calls for six plays including a light opera with music and drama departments combining their efforts. A different play is given each weekend.

Miss Elvira Prondecki, director of residence, has charge of the dormitory which houses about fifty students. Cottages are provided for staff mem-

bers and the facilities of the Burnsville Public School—cafeteria, auditorium, library, classrooms and workshops—are used by the School of Fine Arts.

Courses in the dance and creative writing will be offered for the first time this year. Miss Virginia Moomaw, member of the Woman's College Physical Education Faculty, will teach the courses in the dance.

In addition to Mr. C. W. Phillips, Miss Prondecki, and Miss Moomaw other staff members include: George M. Joyce, business manager and auditor; Prof. William R. Taylor, drama; Dr. Leonard B. Hurley, creative writing; and Prof. Gregory Ivy, art.

The Burnsville School of Fine Arts is a project made possible through the combined efforts of the Woman's College, the Carnegie Foundation, the Veterans Administration and the town of Burnsville.

The school is open to men and women of all ages with high school diploma or equivalent. Courses may be taken for credit or simply audited for pleasure and personal satisfaction.

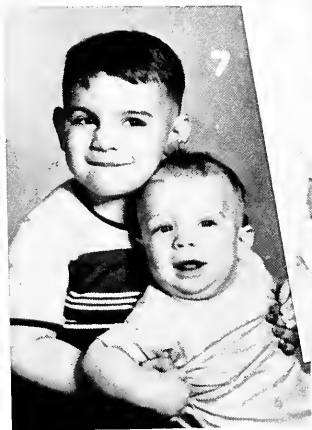
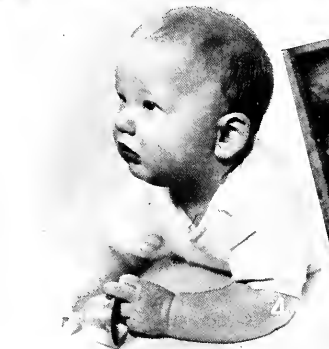

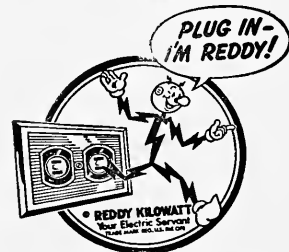
