We hope that you will be proud to see your name listed as Fund contributor. You see . . . our "hopes" are numerous and our faith is substantial, but we have faced it . . . and we hope that you will, too . . . hope and faith alone are not very helpful to a student who turns to us for financial assistance. EDITORIAL

With some hesitation we ask, "Do the alumnae and the former students really wish the News?" Before discussing the question, we assure you that the business manager and the literary editor are glad to give their services if the News is fulfilling its purpose of giving pleasure to the Normal students scattered far and near. And just here we wish to thank each subscriber for her encouraging note of appreciation. This appreciation sufficiently compensates us for the time and energy we expend in editing the News, but it cannot finance the paper, and we cannot secure second-class postal rates till we have bona fide subscribers for one-half of the numbers published. Two thousand copies of the first issue were sent out, and we have at present one hundred subscribers, a good many of whom are college faculty. The postage on two thousand copies is twenty dollars as third-class mail instead of about four as second-class. We feel sure that the subscription price of twenty-five cents does not prevent you from co-operating with us and from making it possible for the association to publish this leaflet. It is probably our fault that you have not realized the importance of sending in your subscription at once, and so we hope to have your subscription within a few weeks, whether or not you are a member of the Alumnae Association, for you will decide whether the commencement issue will have several hundred or a thousand copies, and you, by your responses, will show whether the "News is just what the alumnae wish."

The May Day Fete is the most interesting—I may say the all absorbing—topic of College life just now. It demands and obtains by far more time, more work and more thought than any entertainment the College has ever before attempted. Nearly two years ago Mrs. Sharpe began to arrange the program and since last fall nearly every member of the faculty, the entire student body, and the children of the training school have been steadily at work, making flags, costumes, and other paraphernalia, or rehearsing the plays and dances. From present indications we feel sure that Mrs. Sharpe and her co-workers will have the rehearsals well in hand in the early spring, so that there need be no congestion of work at the end of the term. As the time draws near the interest grows more intense, and we are hoping for great success for this vast undertaking. May the alumnae come from far and near to help form an interested audience, and to show appreciation of the great effort put forth by their Alma Mater, and, best of all, to enjoy a most delightful old English May Day.

THE MAY DAY FETE

... Because our students . . . deplore the dearth of simple rustic sports, they are planning to show, as best they may, Old England taking a holiday. They are making no attempt to give a strictly historical pageant, or to confine their "shews" to any one reign. . . .

In our Fete there will be seven May-poles. A most interesting feature of the Fete will be the Old Folk Dances, over which Misses McAllester and Washburn have been indefatigable. Of course, if any spectator has eliminated from his Bible the one hundred and fiftieth Psalm, we shall not expect him to look at the dances. There will be plenty of other things to look at, and he need not hurt his conscience.

Several delightful numbers will be given by the Training School children, who are enthusiastic over the Fete, and among whom there is not one doubting Thomas.

As for the College girls, had their preparations done no more than call serious attention to England's ballads, the Fete would have been well worth while. . . .

Our hunt for Old English music has been intensely interesting. One of the many delightful "by-products" of the Fete has been the real courtesy and genuine interest manifested towards us by English strangers. With the exception of what our Library of Congress lent us, all the music for our May songs was sent us direct from England. Under Ethel Harris's enthusiastic leadership the girls are progressing well in the study of these old tunes. . . .

Miss Fort's girls are doing an excellent piece of work in heraldry. Their coats of arms—some six feet square—they have enlarged from one inch square plates. . . .

The editors of some of our best state's newspapers have been kindness and generosity itself—not only in their hearty encouragement of our students' plans, but in publishing free of charge our "May" stories."

If there is one thing of which we are prouder than any other, it is our "own" play of "Robin Hood"—the dramatization of which was the labor of love of Virginia Brown Douglas and her husband Mr. Robert Dick Douglas. Though many dramatic pieces have been written about this hero, none suited our purpose. So Virginia simply "saturated" her mind with the old legends and ballads about him, and told the stories every night to her husband. When they had reconciled the irreconcilable and separated the dross from the gold, together they wrote the play. . . .

For the entertainment as a whole we expect the sympathy of our Alumnae. When it is over, may it be truly said: "Zeale devised it, Love procured it, Boyes and Girles performed it, and none but Fooles dispraised it."

A VISIT TO WORDSWORTH'S HOME

The natural beauty of the English Lake Country is too potent to have need of "a remoter charm by thought supplied." . . . To me the most interesting spot in the Lake District is the little village of Grasmere. Here it was that the poet came, in 1800, with his sister Dorothy, and here in "Dove Cottage" he spent the seven years of his poetic prime. The cottage was originally a public house, bearing the "sensible sign" of a dove and olive bough; hence its name. . . .

From the porch "green to the very door," the visitor enters the dining-room. On the wall is a framed certificate of Wordsworth's laureateship and a picture of his dog. . . . Other rooms on this floor are Dorothy's bedroom, the kitchen, and the cellar.

Directly above the lower sitting-room is "the half kitchen and half-parlour fire", of which the poet speaks in the first edition of his *Personal Talk*. This was the living and working room of the Wordsworth family. . . . Opposite this room is Wordsworth's bedroom. . . . Adjoining the poet's bedroom is the guest chamber. . . .

The visitor goes back in imagination to the simple life lived here. Such "plain living and high thinking" has probably never been experienced by the poets of England before or since. . . .

The bulletin of the summer session of the State Normal College has just been issued. Any one may secure a copy by requesting it. "The special purpose of the State Normal and Industrial College in organizing the summer session is to offer the advantages of its instruction to those women of the State whose occupation during the other months of the year prevent this attendance upon the regular sessions. The courses are arranged to meet as nearly as possible the needs of the women of the State. A number of regular college courses will be offered on credit given for work completed in a satisfactory manner. In addition, there will be special courses in Pedagogy, in Domestic Science, in School Gardening, and Elementary Agriculture."

A LETTER FROM CHINA

Here I am, a refugee in Shanghai January 2nd, 1912. We had to leave Siangtan on December 2, and come here. The American Consul ordered all women and children to leave our province, as he considered it no longer safe. We left when we did because we were afraid of being caught between two armies and possibly robbed and murdered.

Terrible battles have been fought on here, but we feel that the war is about ended, as they have elected a president and are no longer fighting. A good many missionaries have gone home since things looked so dark that everybody feared it might be months before he could go back to his station. Some dreadful things have happened, but the papers have exaggerated things greatly. . . .

China is a great country. I wish you could come out to see me sometime. The Chinese are cutting off their queues and they certainly look improved. Many of them have put on American clothes. The Chinese are full of curiosity and never tire of watching us foreigners. They never try to hurt us, but follow us and crowd about us where we go on the main street. . . .

STUDENT ACTIVITIES AT SMITH COLLEGE

Perhaps if we only realized it, we are already too much like the "wise old owl". We see and hear much, and it is our privilege to read and know more, and with all our knowledge we are willing to give out so little to those about us. There are multitudes of people who, because they cannot do great things for God, and for those about them, refuse to do anything at all. Perhaps because we have not yet learned that God's greatest work is not done by a few great men and women, but by those who are living so close to the Father that they can feel His heart throbs for this needy world. After all, it is those who are faithful even in the least of the duties of life who accomplish most during a lifetime.

I wish that I might take you with me into some of the slum districts of our large cities, and I am sure you would not be willing to live another day without at least remembering the sin sick and poverty stricken ones in your prayers.

Just now I am living in southeast Philadelphia, about three blocks from what is known as "Hell's Half Acre"—the name of the district explains conditions there. . . .

In connection with the Baptist Institute for Christian Workers, where I am studying, we are carrying on the work of one of the Baptist city missions. . . . This is a stupendous work; at times it seems as if we were but playing at it, and yet with only thirty students we cannot do more. . . .

LINEN SHOWER

Last spring when we moved into the New Infirmary, some one was inspired to suggest a linen shower, and the idea seems to have been good if one may judge from the hearty response. All kinds of beautiful and dainty and useful things were sent, and it seems fitting that some public acknowledgment be made.

We could not expect people from a distance to come; yet there were many, who were interested, living within reach of the College. After a conference with President Foust and with committees from the two literary societies, we decided to throw open the Infirmary and invite former students now residing in Greensboro, the faculty, delegates from the two literary societies and from each class. . . .

About two hundred guests responded (to the invitation) and were received at the east door by Ivor Aycocock and Mary K. Brown. The large hall and the adjoining rooms were made attractive by (borrowed!) rugs, chairs and an abundance of cut flowers. In the room to the right of the hall, Lucille Elliott, chairman of the linen display, with Lucy Hamilton, Edith Haight, and Mary Worth had arranged the gifts. The glad-heartedness that prompted the sending seemed to pervade the place. Moreover, every one had been most generous. . . . and everything (was) just what we wanted!

I fancy that the wise selection was in many cases due to actual infirmary experience. I know that many a lagging appetite will be stimulated by a tray more attractive for its dainty linen cover, and surely the other linen will add much to the homeliness of our pretty white room. . . .

I cannot say whether it was the tea or the pleasure of being in the infirmary for once with no restrictions imposed, that made every one seem in such good spirits, but for some reason or other, all seemed in great good humor and talked of "old times" and visited and forgot their cares for a little while at last. As I moved about talking to different ones, I realized what a strong body of women has gone out from the College, and I was glad over and over again not only to have known them as students but also to see them again, to hear of their work, to learn of their plans and to know that every where and always "our girls" prove useful citizens. . . .

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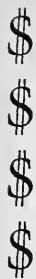
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women and education dollars

HIGHER EDUCATION for the girl student has come a long way from the days when Ellen Glasgow wrote about Southern education in her novel, "Virginia."

In those days, Miss Glasgow wrote: "Education was founded upon the simple theory that the less a girl knows about life, the better prepared she would be to contend with it. Knowledge of any sort . . . was kept from her as rigorously as if it contained the germs of contagious disease . . . the chief object of her upbringing was to paralyze her reasoning faculties so completely that all danger of mental 'unsettling' or even movement, was eliminated from her future."

Conditions are different, but in some ways the question of education for women still smacks of the 19th century. This is evidenced particularly by the difficulty a young woman faces in financing her education.

Donald S. Bridgman said in the College Board publication, *College Admissions 7: The Search for Talent, 1960*, that only 55 per cent of the girls in the top 10 per cent of high school graduates enter college. His report also says that financial problems present the greatest stumbling block to higher education for high school graduates in the upper levels of ability.

The Bureau of the Census said in a report this year that 29 per cent of America's young men between the ages of 18 and 24 were enrolled in schools of the nation and only 14 per cent of the young women of that age.

"Sons are twice as likely as daughters to be enrolled in college regardless of the level of their father's education," the census report continued, "but young women whose fathers had a higher level of education and who were in a higher income bracket had more chance of getting to college than the young woman from a home with less education and a smaller income."

There are several reasons for a girl's greater difficulty in financing her college education, the Joint Office of Institutional Research says.

Parents tend to educate a son first with the argument that a daughter "will just get married anyway."

Girls make less in vacation earnings and part-time jobs during high school than boys of their age and ability.

Scholarship aid for girls is less generous and less widespread than for boys. Many colleges and universities try to make up some of these differences by providing more campus jobs for women students.

The American Council of Education's Commission on the Education of Women has reported several suggested courses of action to make it easier for the talented girl student to finance a higher education. These suggestions were made at an invitational conference on the counseling of women students in Michigan last spring. They are:

- (1) The maintenance of reasonably low tuition charges at public institutions.
- (2) Increased scholarship and other financial aid for women.
- (3) Less emphasis on loans, especially large ones, as a regular source for financing education. Many girls hesitate to saddle themselves or a possible husband with a sizeable educational debt.
- (4) The provision of work opportunities related to the academic program through cooperation of universities, industry and other agencies.

- (5) Further research on methods by which families may accumulate finances in advance for children's education.

- (6) Creation of more and larger community colleges.

As the South moves toward the 21st century with its new problems of industrialization, space exploration, and urbanization, it will demand the trained talents of every citizen. The universities and colleges of the South have a special challenge in the preparation of women to serve the region and the nation.

A special collection of Emily Dickinson's works is being assembled by the Friends of the Woman's College Library in honor of *Jane Summerell '10*, past president of the Friends organization. Miss Dickinson's poetry has long been a subject of study by Jane. The collection, which includes first editions and other edition and related material, is a valuable addition to the Library's holdings.

A new \$400,000 residence hall at Bennett College in Greensboro has been named in honor of *Laura (Weill) Cone '10*, for nearly thirty years a member of the Bennett board of trustees. The hall, which accommodates 106 women, was designed by Mr. Edward Loewenstein, Laura's son-in-law and a Greensboro architect.

Margaret (Berry) Street '12 was selected as a 1962 recipient of a George Washington Honor Medal by the trustees, directors, and officers of the Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge. In the February 22 announcement of this honor, she was cited for her article in the DAR magazine, entitled "America's Fight for God-Given Rights." Hers was "an outstanding achievement in helping to bring about a better understanding of the American Way of Life."

Dora Coates '12, who retired in 1951 after twenty-nine years as a member of the East Carolina College faculty, was honored on February 28 when her portrait was unveiled at East Carolina. The portrait is a gift from the College's Association of Childhood Education which Dora founded, and from her friends. It has been hung in the library of the Wahl-Coates Laboratory School on the campus, which bears Dora's name and that of the school's retired principal. As a part of the "unveiling ceremony," tributes were expressed by her colleagues and former students and associates. From 1922 until her retirement she worked with students preparing to teach in the elementary grades. "Her competence and her high ideals and standards in the training of young children have exerted through her students an incalculable influence on elementary education in North Carolina."

Additional tribute was paid to Dora by Judge Susie Sharp at the time of her appointment as the first woman justice on the North Carolina Supreme Court. In a

newspaper interview Judge Sharp noted that when she entered the Reidsville public schools, "she enrolled in the second grade taught by Miss Dora Coates. Like all former pupils of this gentle educator, now retired, Susie remembers her as an inspired teacher."

Mary Teresa (Peacock) Douglas '23 was the *Raleigh News and Observer's* "Tar Heel of the Week" on November 26. She is supervisor of libraries in the Raleigh public schools, and she has won nationwide renown for her achievements in the field of library science. Her interest and success in encouraging boys and girls to read have been particularly noted, as the American Library Association's Grolier Award, won in 1958, testifies. This \$500 award is presented annually to the librarian who has done outstanding work in promoting reading among young people. She has written extensively about the operation of public school libraries: her first publication "The Teacher-Librarian Handbook" (1941) has never been out of print since its first appearance. Rather recently she was commissioned by UNESCO to write "The Primary School Library and Its Services," one of UNESCO's series of library manuals. No longer president of anything ("and it's wonderful"), she is a past president of the North Carolina Library Association, the Division of Libraries for Children and Young People of the American Library Association, and the School Library Section of the ALA.

Stella (Williams) Anderson '23 has announced that she will be a candidate for the State Senate, subject to the Democratic primary in May. A resident of West Jefferson, her senatorial district includes Ashe, Alleghany, and Watauga counties. She is the publisher of five newspapers, including West Jefferson's *The Skyland Post*.

Ruth (Wilkins) Sikes '24 is currently serving as President of the Garden Club of North Carolina, Incorporated, the "parent" organization of the myriad of garden clubs in the cities and towns of the State.

Mary Alice (Robertson) Poor '26, who is supervisor of teacher certification for the North Carolina State Department of Public Instruction, was the *Raleigh Times* subject for "This Week's Salute" on January 18. In the "salute" article, she was described as the "trouble-shooter, adviser, sympathetic listener, and rooter for the State's 42,000 men and women who staff North Carolina's public schools." She is a "walking encyclopedia of certification facts" as they are set-up

and required by the State Department. Each day brings mountains of mailed inquiries from teachers concerning their certification status and asking how it can be raised. About this mail Mary Alice says: "I have noted a very healthy thing. There's less talk about salaries. There's much more about how they (the State's teachers) can improve themselves. And they're talking more about good schools."

Hermene (Warlick) Eichhorn '26 was one of three composers honored by the Greensboro Euterpe Club during its February observance of American Music Month. A composer-member of ASCAP with more than 35 published works to her credit, Hermene's arrangement of "Three Ole 'Uns (Cindy-Shenandoah-Joshua)" was performed for the first time by Inga and Phillip Morgan, pianists and members of the Women's College faculty, before the Euterpe audience. A past president of Euterpe, Hermene has been organist and choirmaster at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in Greensboro for many years.

Girls—grown and not-so-grown—are the beneficiaries of *Frances (Gibson) Satterfield's '28* many activities. A resident of Atlanta, Georgia, "Gibby" is on the board of the Atlanta Girls Club and is the reporter for the regional news bulletin of the Girls Clubs of America. She is regional chairman of the Juliette Low Region of the Girl Scouts of the USA, and her responsibilities include the North and South Carolinas, Georgia, Florida, and the Canal Zone. As editor of the Legislative Forum for Women (in Georgia), she is classified as "a bill watcher." She is one of Georgia's "watchdogs in petticoats and high heels," who focus their concentrated attention on the Georgia General Assembly while it is in session to see that bills affecting education, juvenile delinquency, mental health, etc. are enacted into law. The Legislative Forum is a non-partisan cooperative effort of fourteen civic and religious organizations for women in Georgia.

Susie Sharp '28 was sworn in on March 14 as North Carolina's first woman Supreme Court Justice. Her appointment was made by Governor Terry Sanford who recognized her "outstanding record as a lawyer and as a Superior Court judge. She is eminently qualified to serve as a justice of the Supreme Court." This marked Susie's second "first": in 1949 the late Governor W. Kerr Scott named her as the State's first woman Superior Court judge. A graduate of the University of North Carolina Law School, she was a law partner with her father in Reidsville for twenty years before the 1949 appointment. Editorial comment across the State hailed her Supreme Court appointment as "a move which will bring a sound judicial mind to the state's high court." Following her appointment, Susie said: ". . . I know that in promoting me he (the Governor) was honoring the women of North Caro-

lina and encouraging their ever increasing interest and participation in government. I am the beneficiary of the efforts of many women and am grateful to them for the support and encouragement they have given me."

"This Christmas each taxpayer would be gratified if he could see what the money apportioned for the operation and expansion of Samarcan Manor has accomplished," began a December 23 article in the *Greensboro Daily News*. The Manor, a correctional school for girls and "one of the finest in the country," is located in the Sandhills of North Carolina near Eagle Springs. The superintendent of the school is *Reva Mitchell '32*. She went there as a temporary worker immediately following her graduation from college, but she remained to begin at the bottom and work in every capacity until 1944 when she was appointed to her present position. Her staff numbers 48, and together they have worked dedicatedly to make Samarcan Manor a school whose academic standards are on a par with the finest high schools in the State. The 200 girls in the student body, ranging in age from 10 to 16, come to the Manor via the juvenile courts, and as they are educated, they are rehabilitated.

Beulah (Welch) Bean '33 is head of secretarial recruitment for AID (the Agency for International Development). It is her job to secure secretaries for more than eighty government posts "in such story book places as the capitals of Vietnam, Cambodia, Iran, Iraq, Turkey, and Ethiopia." In mid-January she conducted her agency's first recruitment in North Carolina, coming to Charlotte, her home, with the hope that "I'll be taking some of my neighbors back with me." The fields in which "her" secretaries work are agriculture, engineering, finance, public health, and education.

Edythe (Latham) Bloch '36 has presented a gift of six books to each of the college libraries in Greensboro in memory of her father, the late John L. Latham, a resident of the city. The books (each set a duplicate) were selected on the advice of two literary "experts," one—a publisher and biographer, the other—the head of Athlone Press of the University of London, with whom Edythe consulted during a trip to England. The book titles are: *Ring of Bright Water*, *Hugh Walpole, Come Hither, Other Men's Flowers, China Court*, and *The Early H. G. Wells*. The Englishmen selected these as books they would like to have read by young American college students.

Irene Parsons '41 has been appointed Director of Personnel Service of the Veterans Benefits at the VA central office. This is the highest ranking civil service position ever held by a woman in VA. In her new position, Irene is serving personnel in the department's 67 regional offices,

located in 50 states and in Manila (more than 16,000 employees). A teacher in Roanoke Rapids for a year following her college graduation, she then became a Civil Service Commission representative. During World War II she was a lieutenant in the Coast Guard. She became associated with VA in 1946. For the past two years, prior to this appointment, she had been chief of the recruitment and placement division in the personnel service. Her work on VA's "Operation Secretary," a project which improved the status of secretaries in VA, received a great deal of favorable attention in national publications. In addition to her personnel duties, she served last year as president of the VA Gavel Club.

Mary (Chiles) Black '43, director of the Abby Aldrich Rockefeller Folk Art Collection in Colonial Williamsburg, presented a lecture on "Folk Art and Gardens" as a part of the annual Williamsburg Garden Symposium in March. Her lecture preceded the opening of a special spring exhibit at the folk museum on flowers and gardening as pictured by American 19th century folk artists. Joining Mary on the lecture stage during the five-day program, co-sponsored by Colonial Williamsburg and *Flower Grower* magazine, were fourteen nationally-known horticulturists, flower arrangers, and landscape designers.

While she was at home in Greensboro for a six-weeks vacation this winter, *Mary Elizabeth Keister '43*, who is a Home Economics Officer of the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations, was interviewed by *Anne (Cantrell) White*, Women's Editor of the *Greensboro Daily News*. Mary Elizabeth is based in Rome, although during the past year her official duties took her from Lapland to the equator. In her work she visits the countries whose governments invite her to advise officials on various kinds of programs for women in an effort to raise the standards of living. If a county has higher education, she works through the college or university; if not, it is adult education at a lower level. Her primary intention is to train women who will, in turn, work with the other women in their own communities. While on a leave of absence from the faculty of the University of Tennessee of which she was a member for eleven years, Mary Elizabeth worked for two years in India under the foreign aid program of the United States government prior to her FAO assignment.

A poem by *Frances (Bryant) Ausband '44*, entitled "The Acrobat," was accepted for publication in the Winter number of *The Georgia Review*, a quarterly published by the University of Georgia Press. *The Review* selects for publication articles, short stories, poems, and book reviews which are distinctive for thought and statement.
