




STORY OF CHAMPAIGN COUNTY, ILLINOIS

In addition to possessing the University of Illinois, one of the oldest and largest state universities in America, Champaign County, in the fertile grain belt of east central Illinois, contains Chanute Air Force Base, a leading training center for airmen of the Army Air Force. The county is also of note, historically, as another of the several "Abraham Lincoln Counties" in this part of the Frairie State. For Champaign County was on the Eight Judicial Circuit, the circuit traveled by Lincoln as a lawyer, and on several occasions he represented clients in the courthouse at the county seat, Urbana.

The story is told that on one of these occasions Lincoln appeared on behalf of the Illinois Central Railroad, which then (1853) was under construction through Champaign County. After winning a condemnation suit for the railroad, the future President was paid his fee for the service. The fee amounted to \$25.00. On another occasion, the lanky Springfield lawyer delivered a speech in the Champaign County Courthouse in which he vigorously attacked Senator Stephen A. Douglas and the Nebraska Bill.

But a number of other celebrated persons were often in Champaign County during its early years and played apart in shaping its destinies. Among these was Jonathan B. Turner, a great American educator, who not only inspired the important Land Grant Act of 1862 (for the establishment of state universities) but who indirectly helped to found the University of Illinois. Two other distinguished educators of the county, ones who lived there most of their mature lives, were John Milton Gregory, first regent of the University of Illinois, and Thomas J. Burrill, a later regent who also was an outstanding scientist.

In a different category of Champaign County celebrities, of course, is that most famous of all American locomotive engineers, Casey Jones. Now a folklore hero of the first rank, thanks to the popular ballad about him, Casey Jones was something of a Champaign County character during the Gay Ninties when he ran a fast freight train on the Illinois Central Railroad between Chicago and the city of Champaign.

First Settler

Although there is some difference of opinion among local historians as to the first white settler of the region that afterwards became

Champaign County, the argument seems to be in favor of Runnell Fielder, who arrived in 1822 and settled on a tract of land about four miles northeast of where Urbana was later built. At that time there were still a few Indians in the area and Runnell Fielder set up a trading post for them in his log cabin home. He also planted an orchard on his tract—the first in Champaign County.

It is assumed, of course, that a number of United States surveyors, as well as itinerant hunters and trappers, were in the region before Fielder appeared, but none of these remained any length of time. At about the same period that Fielder arrived, there came to the region one William Tompkins -- whom some present-day historians say is really the county's first settler. In those early days, both Fielder and Tompkins were actually squatters. Fielder made no formal entry of land until 1828, when the area began to be permanently settled. That entry was in Section 12 of Urbana Township.

Another very early settler was Henry Sadorus, who came in 1824 and eventually owned 600 acres of land in the Kaskaskia River country southwest of Champaign-Urbana. His original farm was the nucleus of a settlement called Sadorus Grove, and out of this community grew the Sadorus Township of today.

Malarial Diseases

An old county historical work says: "Champaign, like all new counties in this State, until brought under cultivation, was the home and nursery of malarial diseases. They were a great hindrance to the settlement of the county. Sometimes there were not well persons enough in a neighborhood to take care of the sick. Physicians were few, or entirely wanting."

First Land Entry

The earliest settlers of the county, as we have seen, were squatters. On record as the first to make a land entry was Jesse Williams, who did so on February 1, 1827. That was five years after Runnell Fielder settled at Big Grove and three years after Henry Sadorus came to the Kas-Kaskia River countryside. Both Fielder and Sadorus, however, later entered their lands in the record books, as did other early squatters. At that time they had to enter their lands by traveling more than a hundred miles to the government land office at Vandalia, which then was the capital of Illinois.

Van Buren Post Office

Before Champaign County was organized, it was part of Vermillion County. During that early period the only public building in the wide-spread prairie region that afterwards became Champaign County was a post office on the farm of Mathias Rhinehart in the vicinity of Big Grove. It was called "Van Buren" after Martin Van Buren, who then was Vice President of the United States. But soon after the county was organized and Urbana was named as county seat, the Van Buren Fost Office was moved to the new county seat and its original name was abandoned.

William Tompkins

If it is uncertain as to whether or not William Tompkins was the first settler of Champaign County, local historians are agreed that he was the first settler and founder of the community that now is Urbana city. As we have seen, he came here sometime in 1822, the same year Runnell Fielder arrived. Urbana did not receive its present name, however, until Champaign County was established in 1833. A year before, the county's first schoolhouse was built near the settlement founded by William Tompkins.

Champaign County Established

When settlers came in increasing numbers to the western portion of Vermillion County after 1828, a demand soon arose for the creation of a new county in the region. For one thing, these newcomers complained that Danville, county seat of Vermillion, was too far away for their convenience. One who shared this view, who became leader of the movement to form a new county, was John W. Vance, an early settler of the Salt Fork countryside and a man of unusual abilities.

When John W. Vance was elected to the Illinois state legislature in 1832, he introduced a bill for the creation of a new county out of the western portion of Vermillion County, and suggested that it be named after his home county in Ohio. He also suggested that the county seat of the new county in Illinois be named after the seat of the Ohio county in which he was born and reared. All of his suggestions were approved, and, by act of the legislature on February 20, 1833, Champaign County was born.

At the county's first election, held in the log cabin home of John Light, three commissioners were chosen to administer affairs of the new county -- Isaac Busey, Jacob Bartley and George Akers. Later, these commissioners held their first meeting in the Philip Stanford home, located in the area now embraced by Somer Township. Their first order of business was to appoint Thomas R. Webber as county clerk, and Webber was continuously re-appointed to this post for the next 20 years.

"Vance's County"

So ardent was John W. Vance in seeking support for his new county that members of the state legislature soon were calling it "Vance's County." But John W. Vance was naturally an energetic type, and some of his contemporaries said he was even a more capable statesman than his brother, who then was governor of Ohio. In addition to being the "Father of Champaign County," John W. Vance was author of the legislation that brought about the building of a state road from Danville to Decatur. A present-day township in Vermillion County is named after him.

Urbana Named County Seat

With Champaign County now in existence, the next step was the selection of a county seat. Although a number of scattered hamlets made strenuous bids to obtain this honor, it was finally won by Urbana. On

June 20, 1833, a deed was recorded conveying thirty-three acres of land in the new town of "Urbanna" to the County Commissioners, this land to be used for county pyrposes. The conveyance was made by Isaac Busey, one of the commissioners, and his wife. Thus it was that on part of the original Busey farm, which lay just south of a place called the Big Grove, there was platted the nucleus of Urbana, seat of Champaign County and site, today, of a major portion of the University of Illinois.

First Courthouse of Logs

Until a courthouse could be built, the county commissioners, and other officials, held their meetings in the farm home of Isaac Busey. Then, in 1836, the county's first courthouse was erected at Urbana - a one-story log edifice. This was used until 1841, when a new building of frame construction was built at a cost of \$340. It was used as a school-house as well as courthouse. Seven years later a third courthouse was erected on the same site, and this was a two-story edifice of brick and stone costing \$2,744. It was in this courthouse that Abraham Lincoln often appeared as a lawyer, and, on one occasion, as a public speaker. It was demolished, however, in 1860 to make way for a fourth courthouse; one that was larger, and more ornate, than any previous edifice. But Forty years later this courthouse, too, was razed and a still larger struc are replaced it.

The Illinois Central Arrives

One of the most important factors in the development of Champaign County was the building through it, in 1854, of the Illinois Central System, which today is America's principal north-south railroad. It is mainly responsible for the creation of Champaign city, largest municipality of the county.

In the years after Urbana became county seat, residents of that town lived a quiet, orderly existence and took it for granted that their community would develop gradually in the future. But in 1854, when the Illinois Central arrived, they were thrown into a high state of excitement almost overnight.

For instead of building the new railroad through Urbana, the Illinois Central construction engineers laid their tracks out on the open prairie about two miles west of the county seat. At first, though, the engineers had considered a route through Urbana. Just why they chose to by-pass Urbana has never been made clear, although many rumors were afterwards heard hinting at secret real estate deals and similar manipulations.

"Depot" and "Old Town"

After the Illinois Central Railroad was built two miles outside of town, Urbana was faced with a dilemma: Should it move to the depot that had been erected alongside the tracks, or should it remain at its present site? As it happened, Urbana decided to remain where it was presently located. But almost immediately, a new settlement sprang up on the prairie around the Illinois Central depot, and in time was calling itself "West Urbana."

As more and more houses appeared in this settlement, as it began to show signs of rapid commercial development, the farmers of the country-side, perhaps to avoid confusion, got into the habit of referring to it simply as "Depot," and, on the other hand, they gave the name "Old Town" to Urbana. This was not very well received by the citizens of Urbana.

When, therefore, the town of Urbana sought to be incorporated as a city in 1855, it included in the bill for incorporation a clause calling for the annexation of the settlement at the Illinois Central tracks. But by this time the population of "Depot" had grown so large it was able to defeat the annexation clause.

Champaign City is Born

As we have seen, Champaign city was first settled in 1855, or a year after the coming of the Illinois Central Railroad. It was not until 1860, however, that the new community had enough population to incorporate as a city. From that date onwards, the two cities of Champaign and Urbana, separated only by Wright Street, have grown steadily in population and influence, but to this day they have continued to maintain their separate municipal identities. They might be called the "Twin Cities of Illinois."

In the years after the Civil War, Champaign city, with its rail-road connection, increased so rapidly in population and as a commercial and shipping center that its citizens soon were demanding the removal of the county seat from Urbana to their booming city. Aroused over this proposal, Urbana residents banded together in sufficient strength to prevent it from being carried out.

Township Plan Adopted

Before 1859, Champaign County was governed by a County Court. In that year, however, residents of the county adopted the township plan of government. Under this plan township supervisors compose the County Board of Supervisors, governing body of the county.

The original townships of Champaign County were East Bend, Hale, Middletown, Middle Fork, Newcomb, Pleasant Hill, Pera, Rantoul, St. Joseph, Sidney, South Homer, Sadorus, Tolono, Urbana and West Urbana.

But in 1861 some changes were made in township names. The name of Middle Fork was changed to Kerr; that of Hale to Philo; that of Pleasand Hill to Somer; and that of West Urbana to Champaign.

In 1868 the name of Pera Township was changed to Ludlow, and in 1871 that of Middletown to Mahomet. The Township of the City of Champaign was established in: 1920 and that of Cunningham Township in 1930.

Lincoln's Last Illinois Speech

It was in Champaign County, on a February day in 1861, that President-Elect Abraham Lincoln made his last speech to the people of Illinois

before assuming the office of President a month later. That brief address was delivered in the park at Tolono, a village on US 45 just south of Champaign-Urbana. Today it has a population of 1,065. A boulder in the village park marks the site where President-Elect Lincoln spoke.

Land Grant Act of 1862

Said by one authority to have been "probably the most important single enactment ever made in the interest of education," the Land Grant Act of 1862, which made possible state agricultural colleges, was largely inspired by a practical idealist who labored long and hard in Champaign County during early times and who, by his advice and counsel, had a part in the founding of the University of Illinois.

That influential man was Jonathan B. Turner, a pioneer Illinois scientific farmer, editor and friend of Abraham Lincoln. Although not a resident of Champaign County, Jonathan B. Turner was often in the county, delivering addresses to farmers, school teachers and businessmen. He outlined to them his plan for a practical "industrial university."

In writing afterwards about his friendship with Lincoln, Turner said that he and the future President "dreamed out together the hope for a new education in the practical things of life." At that period Turner was conducting a scientific farm near Jacksonville, Illinois.

It was from Turner's plan for an "industrial university" that Congressman Justin S. Morrill obtained the inspiration for his Land Grant Act of 1862 -- an act signed into law by President Lincoln. This act provided that public lands be granted to the several states for the establishment of educational institutions, especially agricultural colleges. One of the first "land grant colleges" to be established after the Morrill Act became law was the Illinois Industrial University, afterwards to become widely known as the University of Illinois.

Illinois Industrial University

After the Civil War was over, after many men from Champaign County were mustered out of the Union ranks, there was built on the broad muddy field then separating Champaign from Urbana a five-story brick building that was intended to be a seminary "for higher education" — an institution that both cities had joined hands in obtaining for their locality.

But Champaign and Urbana gave up the idea of opening a seminary in this building, which with its grounds cost \$100,000, when they joined in the battle among Illinois towns and cities to obtain the state's first "land grant college" under the terms of the Morrill Act of 1862. At that time such larger cities as Chicago, Bloomington, Jacksonville, Lincoln and Normal were in the race to obtain the prize.

When Urbana not only offered its intended seminary building but 970 acres of farmland, \$100,000 in county bonds, \$50,000 worth of free freight on the Illinois Central Railroad and \$20,000 in shrubbery, trees and other nursery stock, it won the prize. In 1867 the state granted a

charter to the Illinois Industrial University, and in the following year the former seminary building at Urbana opened to its first students.

That was the beginning of the University of Illinois, now one of the largest state universities in America.

A Horse-Drawn Streetcar and Gas Lamps

What were Champaign and Urbana like when the Illinois Industrial University held its first class in 1868? As we have already hinted, the new state university stood in the center of a broad muddy field that was almost two miles wide between Champaign and Urbana. The combined population of the two cities was less than 5,000. A single, horse-drawn streetcar was one of the means of transportation between the two towns. There were not many paved roads, and few of them were lighted at night. But here and there, in the towns, one could see gas street-lights, a new form of illumination at the time.

John Milton Gregory

One of the great educators of Champaign County, a man whose reputation went beyond the borders of the county, was John Milton Gregory, first regent of the University of Illinois. If it had not been for Gregory, who served as regent from 1868 to 1880, the university might have developed into a technical school only, specializing in industrial and agricultural courses. Instead, under Gregory's guidance, it evolved into a great university; an institution offering both a practical and a liberal education.

At the time John Milton Gregory resigned from the university in 1880, he stated that he wanted to remain a part of the institution, and thereafter continued as an adviser and councilor. One of his last requests before he died was to be buried on the campus of the university he helped to establish. On a marker over his grave between the present-day Mathematics and Administration buildings may be found these words: "If you seek his monument, look about you."

Morrov Plots

Oldest soil experiment fields in America, and oldest corn experiment fields in the world, are located in Champaign County. These are the renowned Morrow Plots, laid out by the University of Illinois in 1876. A sign at the entrance to this unique agricultural tract reads: "Here are being demonstrated practical lessons in soil management, exemplifying both soil improvement and soil depletion. Corn yields on these plots range from 27 to 93 bushels per acre, according to the way the land has been handled."

University of Illinois

In 1880, when John Milton Gregory resigned and Selim Hobart Peabody became regent, the Illinois Industrial University had four colleges — Agriculture, Engineering, Natural Science and Literature. It occupied grounds totalling 623 acres, which included a stock farm, experimental

farm, orchards and a military parade ground. The university's buildings totalled fifteen. Assets of the institution were valued at nearly half a million dollars. In its library rested more than 12,000 volumes, and here, too, could be obtained nearly 100 periodicals in many languages.

It was in 1885, during the regency of Selim Hobart Peabody, that the name of the Urbana state institution was changed to University of Illinois. In that same year, too, it received additional aid from the Federal Government and from the State of Illinois, and this new support made possible more faculty members and additional buildings.

Art Gallery

During the regency of John Milton Gregory, the Illinois Industrial University received a sizable sum of money from the citizens of Champaign and Urbana for the establishment of an art gallery on the campus. After Gregory went to Europe to purchase reproductions of famous Greek and Roman statues for the new gallery, he returned to Urbana to await shipment of the statues. When the casts arrived, however, most of them were found to be broken. In this emergency, a young sculptor and graduate of the class of '79, Lorado Taft, volunteered to repair the statues. His work was pronounced excellent, and many of the statues he repaired are still on exhibit in the university's College of Fine and Applied Arts. At the time Lorado Taft did this work, his father, Don Carlos Taft, was professor of geology at the Illinois Industrial University.

Thomas Jonathan Burrill

Another great figure in the history of the University of Illinois, a man who was also outstanding in the history of American scientific research, was Thomas Jonathan Burrill. Although he served only as an acting regent of the university from 1891 to 1894, Thomas J. Burrill is credited with doing more for the Urbana institution than many of its regents before or since.

But Thomas J. Burrill was as great a scientist as he was a university head. One of the first of the modern microscopists, ne was a botanist and horticulturist of the first rank. In the study or bacterial diseases of crop plants, Thomas J. Burrill achieved results that were far-reaching and of the greatest benefit to the American farmer.

During his term as regent, Burrill not only continued to teach courses in bacteriology, systematic botany, plant reproduction and pharmaceutical botany, but he established the university's Graduate School, started its first Summer School and inaugurated its University Extension program. He also brought into being the university's first athletic field.

Burrill, furthermore, had a flair for publicizing the University of Illinois; making it better known than it was to the people of Illinois. His most spectacular achievement in this field was realized in 1893 at the World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago. A publicity committee

Burrill organized sent nine freight cars of exhibit material to the Chicago exposition, and when this was displayed it was acclaimed "the most extensive and most representative exhibit shown by any educational institution."

Coach Zuppke

Not least among the celebrities who brought fame to Champaign County was Robert Carl Zuppke, appointed head coach of the University of Illinois football team in 1913. A colorful and witty personality, Coach Zuppke created nationally-famous football teams at Illinois in 1914, 1915, 1918, 1919, 1923, 1927 and 1928. Among Zuppke's innovations in football playing were the "flying trapeze," "whoa-back," "razzle dazzle," "blue eagle," "corkscrew" and the "flea flicker." Coach Zuppke was but one of a number of outstanding men and women who were brought to the university by Edmund Janes James, president from 1904 to 1920. It was during this period, too, that Coach Zuppke trained and brought out Harold "Red" Grange, one of the all-time "greats" of football history.

"Fraternity Row"

A widely read novel of the 1920's, one that was on best-seller lists throughout the nation for many months, was Fraternity Row, a story dealing with fraternity life at the University of Illinois. It was written by Lynn and Lois Montross, both of whom had been students at the Urbana institution. Most of the fraternity and sorority houses at Illinois are located in Urbana, a tree-shaded city that has the unmistakable atmosphere of a "university town." In addition to numerous "coke 'n smokes" and other student gathering-places, Urbana has many student rooming houses, as well as a sizable number of shops catering to the needs of the thousands of men and women who annually study at Illinois.

Dean Rexford Newcomb

In 1931, during the regime of President Harry Woodburn Chase, there was established at the university a College of Fine and Applied Arts. If this college has since developed into one of the most influential such institutions in America, credit for this, say authorities in the field, should go to Rexford Newcomb, who was named its first dean and who remained at this post until his recent retirement. But during the many years Dean Newcomb was head of the College of Fine and Applied Arts, he managed to find time to write numerous books in the field of architecture. Today, he is regarded as America's foremost architectural historian. His latest work, according to Who's Who in America, is Architecture of the Old Northwest Territory, a handsomely illustrated volume on historic buildings in those Midwest states that were born out of the old Northwest Territory.

Champaign City Building

Of outstanding interest to tourists and sightseers is the Champaign City Building, an edifice completed in 1937. Standing at Neil Street and University Avenue, it is distinguished for its strikingly "modern" design -- a radical departure from the usual classic designs

of Midwest city halls. Said to be an adaptation of the widely publicized City Building of Los Angeles, the Champaign edifice is marked by a two-story lower portion of strictly "functional" design. At the west end of this portion rises a six-story tower, which sheers upward in a receding shaft and is topped by an actagonal, five-stepped crown.

Chanute Air Force Base

Established in 1917, at the opening of the first World War, Chanute Air Force Base, located at the southeastern city limits of Rantoul, is one of America's leading centers for the training of Army Air Force pilots. The airfield was named in honor of Octave Chanute, a pioneer American experimenter with gliders and early types of airplanes. At the present time the commanding general at Chanute Air Force Base is General Byron Elihu Gates, a veteran flyer of World War II.

The University at Present

Aside from its extensive Chicago branch, the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana has a student enrollment of more than 17,000 each year. It occupies a vast, landscaped campus between the cities of Champaign and Urbana, but most of its red-brick Georgian style buildings are located in Urbana.

On this campus stand some thirty-five buildings and other structures, including the colleges of liberal arts and sciences, fine and applied arts, agriculture, engineering, commerce, education and law. Here, too, are the schools of library science and journalism, as well as the graduate school.

Including its Chicago branch, the university occupies a total of eighty-one principal buildings and many smaller service buildings. Among its main edifices at Urbana are experiment stations for research in agriculture and engineering. More than 1,000,000 volumes are on the shelves of the institution's numerous libraries. The university also owns 2,225 acres of land, of which 1,732 are under cultivation.

An outstanding sight on its widespread South Campus, in Champaign, is Memorial Stadium, which seats more than 70,000 and is regarded as one of the finest stadiums in America. The gift of some 20,000 graduates and students, Memorial Stadium was dedicated in 1924 to the memory of 183 students and alumni of the university who died in the first World War. It was in this stadium that Harold "Red" Grange rose to national fame as a football player in 1925, and here, too, Coach Zuppke won almost equal renown.

Another sight at the university of unusual interest is the Editors' Hall of Fame, located in the lobby of the handsome Auditorium building at the south end of the main quadrangle. Not only outstanding Illinois editors but those of national and international repute are commemorated in the Hall of Fame, an institution largely inspired by Lawrence W. Murphy, long-time director of the university's School of Journalism.

The Chicago Branch

After the second World War, and during the presidency of George Dinsmore Stoddard, enrollment at the University of Illinois increased to an almost phenomenal extent, and this resulted in an expansion of the university's Chicago branch. As a first step, the university obtained the use of Navy Pier, which extends for a mile out into Lake Michigan at Chicago. The pier was converted into a "lakefront university," and here, since then, thousands of students, many of them veterans of World War II, have been educated in the arts, sciences and professions.

Another branch of the university was set up at Galesburg, Illinois, and this was organized, equipped and staffed in such rapid manner that it became widely known as "the college that was made in a month." But in 1949, when the emergency situation had passed, the Galesburg branch was closed and its few remaining students were absorbed at Chicago and Urbana.

At its peak, the postwar student enrollment totalled 19,500 at the Champaign-Urbana campus and 5.500 at the Chicago branch.

It was more than fifty years ago, however, that the University of Illinois first established branches in Chicago. These are its colleges of medicine, dentistry and pharmacy -- all Leading institutions in their respective fields today. Most of the buildings of these colleges are located in the midst of the great Medical Center on the West Side of Chicago.

"Who's Who" in Champaign County

With the exception of Cook County, in which Chicago is located, Champaign County has more listings in the latest (1954-1955) edition of that standard reference work Who's Who in America than any other county in Illinois — a fact due, obviously, to the presence there of the University of Illinois. There are 190 men and women of achievement in Champaign County whose brief biographies are in Who's Who, and of this number all but eleven are associated with the university.

One of the county's most distinguished residents, however, died as recently as 1953. He was James G. Randall, who not only was a professor of American history at the university but who was nationally known as an author. His three-volume biography of Abraham Lincoln was acclaimed by critics as one of the best in the field. Professor Randall, who died at the age of seventy-two, had been in the history department of the University of Illinois since 1920.

Although we have said that eleven county residents in Who's Who are not connected with the university, yet a few of these have partial connections. For example, Quincy Howe, who resides in Champaign, is one of America's leading journalists and radio commentators, but part of his time is devoted to teaching in the University's School of Journalism.

Another is Charles M. Thompson, of Champaign, author of outstanding works on economy, dean emeritus of the university's College of Commerce, and part-time lecturer in the college he formerly headed. Still another is William H. Wisely, also of Champaign, a leading Midwest civil engineer, who, although mainly engaged in work as Illinois commissioner of the Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission, lectures frequently at the university on Sanitary engineering.

But the following Who's Who residents of the county are not associated with the university: General Byron E. Gates, of Rantoul, commanding general of the Chanute Air Force Base; Dr. Edward C. Thompson, of Champaign, chief of the medical staff at Carle Memorial Hospital in Urbana; the Reverend Ralph Cummins, of Champaign, general presbyter of the Synod of Illinois of the Presbyterian Church; Marshall E. Miller, of Champaign, lawyer and national commander of the Amvets; General Reginald C. Harmon, of Urbana, lawyer and judge advocate general of the U.S. Air Force; John A. McDermott, of Champaign, general manager of the Champaign News-Gazette; Henry I. Green, of Urbana, former corporation counselfor Urbana; and William L. Springer, of Champaign, former national commander of the Amvets and congressman of the Champaign-Urbana district.

"Cambridge of the Midwest"

Of the 190 men and women residents of Champaign County who are listed in the current Who's Who in America, the largest number -- fifty-nine -- come under the heading of "college professors." All but three of these fifty-nine specialists in various branches of the arts, sciences and professions reside in the city of Urbana, which, because of this, might be aptly termed the "Cambridge of the Midwest." Here, too, live the majority of those identified as "educators;" that is, individuals, such as department heads and administrative officials, other than professors.

Of the latter group, two of the most prominent are Arthur C. Willard, president of the university from 1934 to 1946, and George D. Stoddard, president from 1946 to 1954.

Champaign County Today

Located in the fertile, uniformly level, farming region of east central Illinois, a region forming part of the great Wheat Belt of the Midwest, Champaign County is primarily an agricultural county, renowned in the Prairie State for both its high grade cattle and its abundant harvests of corn, soybeans and wheat. At the last federal census in 1950, the county had a resident population of 106,100, but this figure is estimated by business interests to have gone up to more than 120,000 in 1954. Each year, the population of the county is greatly increased, temporarily, by thousands of students attending the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana.

An airman's view of the county, which occupies an area of 1,043 square miles, would reveal a vast checkerboard of fertile green farms and pastures, crossed at right angles by lines of federal and state highways and railroads, and with, at its center, a haze of smoke indicating the many industrial plants of Champaign-Urbana and vicinity. Numerous coal fields that dot the county would also be in view at intervals. A glimpse would be afforded, too, of the historic Sangamon and Kashaskia rivers, which flow through the western portion of the county.

Champaign is bounded on the north by Ford County, on the east by Vermilion County, on the south by Douglas County, and on the west by Piatt County and a corner of McLean County. It has thirty townships and forty-one township supervisors, including eleven assistants. These supervisors comprise the Champaign County Board of Supervisors.

In 1948, retail sales throughout the county, including Champaign and Urbana, amounted to \$92,280,000. But by 1954 this figure rose, according to business estimates, to \$113,550,000. Individual income of the county for 1954 was estimated at a total of \$190,500,000. The average of farm income in 1954 was estimated at \$16,143.

More than half of the county's population live in the twin cities of Champaign and Urbana. The total population of the two in 1950 was 62,397 -- making it the ninth largest urban center in Illinois. Of this total figure, 39,563 were dwelling in Champaign and 22,834 in Urbana. The latter is the county seat, and here is located the Champaign County Courthouse.


Champaign-Urbana is 126 air miles south of Chicago, 145 north of St. Louis and 111 west of Indianapolis. Serving this urban center directly is the Ozark Airline Company. It is also served by the Illinois Central System, the Big Four, New York Central System, the Wabash and the Illinois Terminal Railroad. Motor freight lines originating in, or most frequently serving, the community are the Decatur Carthage Company, the Hall Freight Lines, and the Illini Reefer Transit Company.

There are six banks here having total resources of \$67,941,630.73 and total deposits of \$64,096,414.57. The leading newspapers are the

Champaign News-Gazette, which has an evening circulation of 28,466 and a Sunday circulation of 29,168, and the Champaign Courier, with an evening circulation of 21,363 and a Sunday circulation of 21.608.

With the main part of the University of Illinois campus located in Urbana, Champaign devotes itself largely to commercial and industrial enterprises. Principal manufacturing plants of Champaign are the Clifford Jacobs Company (drop forgings); R. H. Bishop Company (air conditioners and freezers); Illinois Glove Company (leather work gloves); C. G. Johnson Company (construction equipment); Collegiate Cap & Gown Company (academic apparel); Harry Gill Athletic Equipment Company; Universal Bleacher Company; Leavitt Manufacturing Company; and the Magnavox Corporation.

In the two cities there are a total of 569 retail stores. Among leading department stores are F. K. Robeson Company, Field's, W. Lewis & Company, Illinois Department Store, C. C. Willis, Russell's, Sears Roebuck & Company, and Montgomery Ward & Company. Here, also, are branches of such national chain stores as Woolworth, W.T. Grant, Kresge, Walgreen, A & P, Kroger and Superhighway.

BROADLANDS

In the south portion of Ayers Township lies the village of Broadlands, with a 1950 population of 333. Through it runs an east-west paved road which connects with State 49. The village is located in a fertile, level farming area, and is a shipping point for agricultural products of the area roundabout. It is also a shopping center of the region.

Another, but smaller, village near Broadlands is Allerton. Both communities are in the vicinity of the Little Vermilion River, a stream that meanders eastward through Vermilion County. The township in which these villages lie, Ayers, had a total 1950 population of 636. It is located in the extreme southeast corner of Champaign County.

FISHER

Frincipal village of the Township of Brown is Fisher, with a population of 820. It is located in the southeast portion of the township, on the banks of the historic Sangamon River, a stream with many Abraham Lincoln associations. Through Fisher runs US 136, and just west of it is State 47, an important north-south highway. Another village in Brown Township is Foosland, located near the McLean County Line.

A well-known early settler of Brown Township was James H. Pollock, who arrived soon after the Civil War. He later acquired 160 acres of land in the township and developed this into a productive farm. He also became owner of property in the village of Foosland. As a public-spirited resident of the township, James Pollock held several offices, among them township clerk, assessor, collector and trustee. In 1880 he became a merchant in Foosland.

CITY OF CHAMPAIGN

For a detailed account of the history and present-day state, of Champaign city, see historical narrative at the opening of this book. When the township plan of government was adopted in the county in 1850, Champaign Township was originally called West Urbana, but several years later it was given its present name. It was in this township the city of Champaign grew rapidly after the arrival of the Illinois Central Railroad in 1853.

Not only is Champaign larger that Urbana but it is also the principal shopping, commercial and industrial center of the two communities. Among outstanding sights in Champaign is its City Building at Neil Street and University Avenue. This edilice was completed in 1937 and is distinctive for its "modernist" design — a radical departure from the usually classic forms of Midwest city halls.

Another attraction of interest to visitors as West Size Park, oldest of the city's recreation spots. But of concern the most famous sight in Champaign - as it is in Urbana - is the University of Illinois.







COLFAX TOWNSHIP


Colfax Township lies in the southwest portion of Champaign County, in the valley of the historic Kaskaskia River. It has a population of 528. A short distance east of the township is US 45, one of the main north-south highways in Illinois. Villages near Colfax Township, but not in it, are Sadorus and Ivesdale.

One of the early settlers of Colfax Township was Samuel Craw, a native of Vermont who first arrived in the township in 1858. He afterwards owned 260 acres of land, devoting most of it to stock-raising. About the same time Samuel Craw came to the township, his two brothers, George C. and Charles W., arrived, and they, too, became the owners of large tracts of farming land.




PENFIELD

CONDIT TOWNSHIP

Located north of Champaign-Urbana, in a fertile, level farming region, is Condit Township. It has a population of 476. The entire township is devoted to farming, and its rich black loam produces abundant crops of wheat, corn and soybeans each autumn. An early settler of the township, who came in 1857, was Alexander Yexley. He brought with him four horses, three of which he sold on his arrival in the township. With the money thus obtained, he bought land and became a farmer.

Another early settler was Henry Putnam, a lineal descendant of the Revolutionary War hero, General Israel Putnam. After his arrival in Condit Township in 1856, Henry Putnam bought land in ever larger portions until he finally owned 440 acres, all of which he brought under cultivation. Upon arriving in the township, Henry Putnam married Phoebe Condit, daughter of Wyckliff Condit, after whom the township was named.

CRITTENBEN TORNSHIP

at the south end of Champaign County stretches Crittenden Township, another of the richly fertile agricultural townships of the county. It has a population of 480. From its broad farms come crops as high in quality as any produced in this part of the Prairie State.


A well-known early resident of the township was Thomas acclintock, who arrived in 1868 and became a farter. He eventually had a total of 275 acres, of which a large portion was devoted to stock-raising. At various periods Thomas McClintock served as a justice of the peace, school director and road commissioner.

Another early settler was milliam Quinlan, who came in 1880 and acquired land in the township. He was a township school trustee for rany terms. Later, he became assessor of the township.

URBANA CITY

Most of Urbana city, which contains the principal portion of the University of Illinois, lies in Cunningham Township. A detailed description of the inception and rise of Urbana as a "university town is contained in the opening narrative of this book. The population of Urbana in 1950 was 22,834. One of the earliest settlers of what afterwards became Urbana city was Isaac Busey, on part of whose farm Urbana was platted in 1833.

In addition to the widespread campus of the University of Illinois, Urbana contains the Champaign County Courthouse, an imposing edifice at Main Street and Broadway. It was completed in 1901 and is the fifth courthouse to be built on this site since Champaign County was founded in 1833.

Other places of interest in Urbana are Carle Park, which features Lorado Taft's statue of Lincoln as a lawyer in Champaign County, and Crystal Lake Park, a landscaped tract containing a spring-fed lake and a recreation hall.


DEWEY

Dewey is the principal village of East Bend Township, which has a population of 740. It is located on US 136, an important east-west highway in this part of Illinois. Just west of the village flows the Sangamon River. East Bend Township lies in the north portion of Champaign County, and borders the neighboring county of Ford. A small part of the village of Fisher, situated mainly in Brown Township, is located in East Bend Township.

An early settler of the township was John G. Campbell, who arrived in 1857. After many years as a farmer, during which time he also served for a six-year period as township supervisor, John Campbell moved to the village of Dewey and there was appointed postmaster. His father-in-law was Stephen G. Peabody, another early land owner of East Bend Township.


PENSLEY TOWNSHIP

Hensley Township is located in the area northwest of Champaign-Urbana and has a population of 495. As with other townships in the vicinity, it is an entirely agricultural region, having a soil as rich, black and productive as any in Champaign County. One of the earliest settlers of the township was Samuel Hyde, a native of Vermont. He came here in 1850 with his wife and ten children, and in time was a leading farmer of the neighborhood.

Another New Englander who early settled here was George W. Johnston, whose birthplace was New Hampshire. He arrived in 1850 and eventually became the owner of 320 acres of land, most of which was under cultivation. Still another pioneer of the township was Frank H. Lange, who first came in 1860 and who afterwards was the proprietor of 500 acres.


KERR TOWNSHIP

At the northeast corner of Champaign County lies Kerr Township, with a population of 263. It is bounded on the north by Ford County and on the east by Vermilion County. Through part of the township flows Middle Fork River. Devoted entirely to agriculture, Kerr Township is typical of many such townships in the great Wheat Belt of the Midwest.

It was in 1845 that Lewis Kuder, an early settler of the township, arrived, and, after acquiring a few sections of land, established himself as a farmer and stock-raiser. In later years he became owner of 900 acres, which made him one of the largest land-owners of the region. At this period, too, he served for several terms as supervisor of Kerr Township.



LUDLOW

Principal village of Ludlow Township is Ludlow, which contains a population of 475. The village is in the northern portion of Champaign County, and is on US 45, a main Illinois north-south highway. Not many miles away is the town of Rantoul, where the Chanute Air Force Base is located. When the township form of government was adopted in Champaign County in 1859, Ludlow Township was at first called Pera Township.

One who early settled in the township was Joseph M. Harnit. He came in 1864, and, after many years as a farmer, moved into the village of Ludlow, where he took up the practice of law. He served as supervisor of Ludlow Township for a period of fifteen years, and at other times held the offices of assessor, collector and school trustee. Another early settler was William L. Braden, who came in 1866 and who engaged in the grain business. He also served as school treasurer of the township.




On the legended Sangamon River, in the western portion of Champaign County, lies the village of Mahomet, one of the oldest villages in the county. Today, it has a population of 1,017. Running through it is US 150, a main east-west highway of the Prairie State. The village is the principal community of Mahomet Township, which has a population of 1,614.

An early resident of the town was Fielding L. Scott, who came in 1836 and who afterwards became an eminent Champaign County judge. At a later period, one of his sons, Thomas J. Scott, was elected sheriff of Champaign County. His other son was killed in the Civil War. Another early arrival was Samuel H. Lyons, who settled here in 1849. He subsequently became owner of a farm comprising 260 acres. He also held numerous public offices in the township.





NEWCOMB TOWNSHIP

Another township in the Sangamon River region of western Champaign County is Newcomb Township. It has a population of 529. Agriculture is the main occupation of its residents, and the farms here are the equal of any in the county.

One of the best-known early residents of this township was James S. Hannah, who arrived in 1851. Popularly known as Squire Hannah, he was a justice of the peace for thirty years. He also held the offices of collector and school treasurer.

Another pioneer of the township was Phillip Shaffer, who settled here in 1868. As a farmer, he owned 120 acres of land. In 1880 he was elected supervisor of Newcomb Township and held this position for the next seven years. He and his wife were the parents of six children.


PESOTUM

Among the farms just south of Champaign-Urbana stands the village of Philo, with a population of 525. It is the principal community of Philo Township, which has a total of 1,021 residents. Practically all of the mature male residents of the township are engaged in farming, and the harvests here each year are a credit to their patience, industry and intelligence.

A well-known early resident of Philo Township was C. H. Van Vleck, who arrived in 1866. He was one of the first businessmen of Philo village, having started as a grain merchant. Later, he dealt in lumber, coal, livestock and real estate. He was also a surveyor, and in this capacity surveyed a major portion of Philo Township. He had also served, for a time, as justice of the peace.





RANTOUL

Named after Robert Rantoul, an early official of the Illinois Central System, Rantoul is the largest village in Champaign County and is the site of the Chanute Air Force Base, a leading training center for pilots of the U.S. Air Force. In 1940 it had a population of 2,367 and by 1950 this figure was increased to 6,387. Parts of Rantoul Township were annexed to the village in 1940, 1942, 1946 and 1948.

Rantoul is, of course, the principal community of Rantoul Township, which has a total population of 11,906. One of the best-known early businessmen of Rantoul village was Thomas W. Chamberlain, who in 1875 founded the Exchange Bank of Rantoul. He also served for a time as village treasurer and as director of the Rantoul Building & Loan Association. Another early businessman was Thomas Babb, who dealt in grain and livestock.



THOMASBORO

Just south of Rantoul, on US 45, lies the village of Thomasboro, with a population of 330. It is in the midst of a fertile farming area, and serves as a shopping center for residents of the countryside. One who played aprominent part in early days of the village was Thomas Babb, who arrived in the 1870's and became a farmer on land adjacent to Thomasboro.

In 1878, however, Babb started in business as a buyer and shipper of hogs in Thomasboro. Later, he engaged in grain operations. In the meantime, Babb added to his land holdings, and eventually he possessed a total of 680 acres in Rantoul and Condit townships.





LONGVIEW

Longview is a village of 239 population in the south portion of Champaign County. It is the principal community of Raymond Township, which has a total population of 731 and which is devoted entirely to farming. The township was named after Nathaniel Raymond, who settled in the area in 1864.

One of the best-known early residents of the township was Isaac S. Raymond, a son of Nathaniel. He was among the first students to enter the newly-opened Illinois Industrial University, afterwards re-named the University of Illinois. At a later period, Isaac Raymond served as school trustee of Raymond Township for a period of fourteen years, and as collector for four years.

IVESBALE

Situated on the west boundary of Champaign County, adjacent to Piatt County, the village of Ivesdale has a population of 402. It is one of the two main communities in Sadorus Township, the other being the village of Sadorus. The total population of Sadorus Township is 1,441.

Ivesdale grew up around a station on the Wabash Railroad built by William H. Johnson in the 1860's. Johnson was an early settler of Sadorus Township. In the beginning, Johnson served as postmaster, station agent and express agent at Ivesdale. He owned a total of 520 acres of improved land in the township.



SADORUS

The village of Sadorus, and the township in which it is located, were named after Henry Sadorus, one of the first settlers of Champaign County. Of German descent and a native of Pennsylvania, Henry Sadorus traveled west as a young man and staked out land in the township that now bears his name. He died in 1878 at the age of ninety-five.

Situated near the Kaskaskia River, the village of Sadorus has a population of 388. It is the commercial center of a fertile farming area. A prominent early settler of Sadorus Township was William Ellars, who arrived in 1850. He eventually became the owner of 1,300 acres of land in the township. He also served as township supervisor for several terms.

ST. JOSEPH

Just east of Urbana is located the village of St. Joseph, with a population of 941. It is on US 150, an important east-west highway. Near it flows the Little Vermilion River. St. Joseph is the main community of St. Joseph Township, which has a population of 1,536. One of the first settlers of the township was Samuel Mapes, who came in 1833 and settled on a tract of land near what was called "The Bend."

Another early arrival was Orrison Shreve, who acquired land here in 1853. Three years later there came Carson J. McElwee, who developed a sizable tract of land, and Jonathan N. Howser, who eventually became owner of 240 acres in the township. The latter's son, Leonidas Howser, was well known as a breeder of Belgian draft horses.




SCOTT TOWNSHIP

Another of the Kaskaskia River townships is Scott Township, with a population of 974. It is located in the western portion of Champaign County. Prominently identified with the early history of the township was Allison Lowman, who arrived in 1869. A native of Pennsylvania, Allison Lowman, after serving as a Union soldier in the Civil War, came west with his family and settled on a tract of land in Scott Township.


Eventually, the Lowman homestead consisted of eighty acres. In addition to tilling the soil, Allison Lowman served as a township road commissioner, school trustee and constable. He was also active in affairs of the Grand Army of the Republic, having been a member of Champaign Post No. 140 of that organization. The Lowmans were the parents of eight children.





SIDNEY

Southeast of Urbana, the village of Sidney, with a population of 653, serves as a shopping center for the countryside adjacent to the Little Vermilion River. It is the principal community of Sidney Township, with a total population of 1,203. Among early settlers in the township was R. G. Porterfield, who came with his family in 1867.

Robert M. Porterfield, a son of R. G., later became one of the best known residents of the township. After engaging in agricultural pursuits for many years in the southeast quarter of Section 22 of Sidney Township, Robert M. Porterfield removed to the village of Sidney and there entered the hardware business. He retained ownership of his farm, however, and at one time it was the most successful agricultural tract in the township.

SOMER TOWNSHIP


On either side of US 45, just north of Champaign-Urbana, may be found Somer Township, a fertile agricultural area of 963 population. When James H. Flatt and a few other early settlers first came to the township some seventy-five years ago, they found the land low, swampy and of little value for farming purposes.

But this did not discourage Flatt and his neighbors. After organizing the Beaver Lake Drainage Association, they found means of draining the land, and not long afterwards most of it was under cultivation. Today, the soil of Somer Township is as black and rich as any in Champaign County.

The village of Homer has a population of 1,030 and is situated on State 49 in the eastern portion of Champaign County, not far from the Vermilion County line. It is the principal community of South Homer Township, which has a population of 1,466. Just north of the village flows Salt Fork River.

One of the early settlers of the township was George **. Brown. He came in 1857 and soon afterwards was the owner of 369 acres of land. One of his sons, Isaac, in later years became a prominent livestock breeder of the region. Another early settler, William Henderson, arrived in the township after serving in the Civil War, and, subsequently, held the office of township supervisor for a period of fifteen years.


STANTON TOWNSHIP



TOLONO

The village of Tolono, with a population of 1,065, is of national interest as the place where President-Elect Abraham Lincoln last spoke to the people of Illinois before traveling to Washington to become the nation's chief executive. His address was delivered to a crowd in the village park on a February day in 1861. A boulder in the park today marks the spot where Lincoln spoke.

Situated on US 45, Tolono village is the principal community of Tolono Township, which has a population of 1,588. The name of the township is said to have been coined by J. B. Calhoun, an official of the Illinois Central System. An early resident of the township was Henry Fisher, who acquired 320 acres of land here in 1870.

URBANA TOWNSHIP

Living in Urbana Township, but outside the boundaries of Urbana city, are 3,489 residents. Most of Urbana city, as has been noted at the beginning of this book, lies in Cunningham Township. Parts of Urbana Township were annexed to the city in 1946, 1948 and 1949.

Originally, however, the city was part of Urbana Township, which was formed in 1859 when the township plan of government was adopted in Champaign County. The first settler of future Urbana Township was William Tompkins, who came in 1822. Some local historians claim he was the first settler of Champaign County, but Runnell Fielder seems to be more favored for this honor.



Knots and Miles

The U.S. Statute Mile is 5,280 feet in length. On the Continent most of the old miles, which varied in length from about 3,300 feet to over 36,000 feet, have been replaced, officially at least, by the kilometer, which equals 0.6214 statute mile or 3,280.8 feet.

The Nautical, Geographic, or Sea Mile at any place is considered, for purposes of navigation, to be equal to the length of one minute of latitude at that place.

The U.S. Nautical Mile is 6,080.20 feet in length and equal to one-sixtieth of a degree of a great circle of a sphere whose surface is equal in area to the area of the surface of the earth (Clarke's spheroid of 1866).

The Knot is a measure of speed; a speed of one knot being a speed of one nautical mile an hour.

A Nautical Mile — 1.1516 statute miles; a Fathom — 6 feet; a Cable — 100 fathoms or 600 feet or approximately 0.1 nautical mile.

To convert statute miles into nautical miles, multiply statute miles by 0.8684; to convert nautical miles into statute miles, multiply nautical miles by 1.1516, or roughly 11/7.

United States Air Forces and the Navy use the knot as the standard aeronautical unit of speed and the nautical mile as the corresponding unit of distance.

Points of Constitutional Law.

Congress must meet at least once a year. Congress may admit as many new states as

Congress may admit as many new states as desired.

One State cannot nndo the act of another.

By the Constitution every citizen is guaranteed a speedy trial by jury.

Congress cannot pass a law to punish for a crime already committed.

A person who commits a felony in one State cannot find refuge in another.

Treaties with foreign powers are made by the President and ratified by the Senate.

The territories each have a delegate to Congress

The territories each have a delegate to Congress who is allowed the privilege of debate, but not the

right to vote.

The Vice-President, who ex-officio presides over the Senate has no vote in that body except in case

the Schate has no vost in a tic ballot.

If the President holds a bill longer than ten days while Congress is in session it becomes a law without his signature.

An act of Congress cannot become a law over the President's veto except on a two-thirds vote of both houses

both houses.

The House of Representatives may impeach the

President for any crime, but the Senate has the sole power to try all impeachments.

Amendments to the Constitution of the United States require a two-third vote of each House of Congress, and must be ratified by at least three-fourths of the States.

The President of the United States must be at least 35 years of age; a Senator, 30; a Congressman, 25; The President must have been a resident of the United States fourteen years.

A naturalized citizen is not eligible to the office of President of the United States. A male child born in a foreign land to American parents has an equal chance to become the President with one born on American sail

on American soil.

The United States shall guarantee to every State a Republican form of government, and shall protect each of them against invasion, and on application of the Legislature or of the Executive (when the Legislature cannot be convened), against domestic trouble.

Avoirdupois Weight.

27 11-32 grains=1 dram. 4 quarters=1 cwt. 16 drams=1 ounce. 2,000 lbs.=1 short ton. 16 ounces=1 pound. 2,240 lbs.=1 long ton. 25 lbs.=1 quarter.

Dry Measure.

2 pints=1 quart. 4 peck. 1 bushel. 86 bush.—1 chaldron. 8 quarts=1 peck.

Liquid Measure.


