



AMERICAN ANCESTRY.

THE purpose of this work is, principally, to register in a convenient and simple form the pedigree of any one person, and thus record for all time many important facts in the history of families which would otherwise be lost. Another primary object is to publish here the ancestry of a person as complete as it is known, as a means of obtaining additional information regarding it. It is also designed to be a convenient work of reference, to show the origin of the various American families. However indifferent some may affect to be regarding this question of ancestry, those who have a good pedigree will usually have a natural pride in it. Many lineages must of necessity contain nothing but simple records of uneventful generations, but they will preserve facts of great interest to descendants which would otherwise in many cases be lost in the history of a family. The plan of the work is somewhat similar in idea to the well-known English works, but altered to suit the conditions of American society, and in detail is as follows:

The surname or family name is given first, with the given name, residence, birthplace, and date of birth. This is followed by remarks of a brief biographical character, giving the principal events in the individual's life, such as occupation, college degrees if any, authorship, public service, experiences, and if married, date, wife's name and parentage, with remarks relating to her ancestry. If the individual whose lineage is given had brothers, the same facts may be stated respecting each of them, in order of their birth, commencing with the eldest. This completes the first generation in tracing back the lineage. Next is given the father's name, followed by same class of facts, and so continued back in male line as far as can be traced. The name of son, father, grandfather, etc., in direct male line are printed in black type. As the abbreviations are all of the most ordinary kind, it is unnecessary to mention them here.

Donaldson, afterward major of same until end of war, practised law in Ky., member Ky. Legislature twice, moved to Texas in Sep., 1879, atty. for Rio Grande div. of T. & P.

R. R. (m. Feb. 2, 1871, Eleanor Patrick Flournoy, b. Paducah, Ky., Dec. 31, 1841, and had two children, viz.: Harry Lee, b. Apr. 12, 1872, and Nellie Girard, b. June 1, 1875); and ABNER FRANKLIN Bidwell, b. Oct. 10, 1839 (m. Jan. 5, 1869, Mary Frances Justice, and had eight children, viz.: Emma Frances, b. Oct. 18, 1869 [m. Dec. 28, 1892, Thomas Martin Walker of Pleasant View, Tenn.], Buna May, b. July 14, 1871, Charles Bell, b. Nov. 12, 1873, John Franklin, b. Jan. 3, 1876, Ruth Maedell, b. Nov. 8, 1878, d. Jan. 6, 1880, Paul Bernard, b. Dec. 21, 1880, Mather Marvin, b. Jan. 18, 1884, Mabel Elise, b. BIDWELL, DAVID of Stillwater, N. Y., b. Oct. 20, 1754, d. there, Apr. 6, 1829 (m. in Ballston, N. Y., Mary Gregory, b. there, May 20, 1751, d. Apr. 15, 1802, and had three children, viz.: Reuben, b. July 23, 1781, d. Mar. 18, 1852, Hannah, b. Jan. 20, 1785, d. Jan. 25, 1854, and Charles Moore, b. June 3, 1788, d. July 14, 1831); had brother JACOB, b. Sep. 9, 1758 (m. Dolly Andrews), moved from Stillwater with wife and child and never heard from, was a farmer, may have settled near Seneca Lake, and DANIEL of Carmi, Ill., moved from Stillwater to Pennsylvania, then to Kentucky, 1800-10, then to Carmi, served in Revolutionary war, had a soldier's claim to 160 acres on Susquehanna river in N. BIDWELL, DE WITT CLINTON of Pittsburgh, Pa., b. Feb. 23, 1828, engaged in business in Pittsburgh in 1849, where he has since continued as a successful manufacturer and merchant, residing at Shady Side, a beautiful suburb of that city, the golden wedding of his parents was celebrated at his residence, May 6, 1861 (m. July 12, 1854, Elizabeth Millingar, b. Mar. 17, 1835 [dau. of James and Elizabeth], and had six children, viz.: Laura Ella, b. Apr. 22, 1855 [m. Oct. 26, 1876,

Harvey L. Childs], Clinton, Millinger, b. May 24, 1858, Frank Chester, b. Sep. 19, 1860, Howard Ensign, b. Mar. 27, 1862, James Edgar, b. Nov. 17, 1867, d. Sep. 10, 1868, and Harry Du Pont, b. Bidwell, he removed to Poland, Ohio, 1830, engaging at that early day in the running of a line of mail coaches from Pittsburgh to Cleveland, and also in merchandising at Poland, removed to Warren, Ohio, 1840, continuing in merchandising, retired after some years, residing on his farm near there (m. May 5, 1811, Catharine Ensign, b. in Hartford, Ct., Oct. 23, 1790, d. Jan. 17, 1865, had seven children, viz.: Catharine W., b. Feb. 5, 1812 [see lineage of James C. McVayl, Mary Ann, b. chiefly by him (m. Apr. 10, 1856, Jane S. Orton, dau. of Gerrit V. Orton of Auburn, N. Y., and Rosamond Cook, his wife); son of Charles Eldridge Avery of Weedsport, N. Susannah Goss, 1774, Greenland, N. H.); son of Samuel, b. at Greenland, Apr., 1716, d. 1790, at Canterbury, N. H., a leader of the town, member of Legislature, justice, etc. (m. Sarah Whidden); son of Matthias, b. Mar., 1677. d. Apr., 1745, always recorded as Lieut. Haines (m. Mehitable Jenness of Rye, N. H.); son of Samuel of Portsmouth, b. 1646, d. 1689, farmer, and known as Deacon Haines on the records (m. Mary Fi-

field, 1672); son of Samuel, b. at Westbury, Wilts, England, 1611, and d. at Portsmouth, N. H., Greenland parish, abt. 1689. He sailed from Bristol, England, June 4, 1635, in the ship "Angel Gabriel," wrecked at Pemaquid, now Bristol, Me., 1635, finally settled at Portsmouth, N. H., 1650, on a large farm at "Great Bay," was an extensive land-owner, and one of the original founders of the first Cong. church at Portsmouth, nearly all the Haines or Haynes now in New Hampshire, Vermont or Maine, point toward him as their progenitor. His only dau. m. Leonard Weeks. The English Bible secreted in a feather bed on the "Angel Gabriel," and thereby saved from the zealous Catholics of that period, is now in possession of Andrew Mack Haines, Galena, Ill., whose line is the same from Matthias, 1750-1838, brother of Samuel, 1752-1838, as above. origin of the family was Shropshire county and Montgomeryshire, Wales. The records have Eines, Eynes, Eynns, and afterward the initial letter H was prefixed, when it became Heines, Heynes, Haynes and Some branches dropped the Haines. final "s," as Hayne and Haine; others two letters, "es," making Hayn, Hain, etc. The Welsh gentry are fond of genealogy, and they carry the armorial ensigns of the family to Lord Gwinn, son of Griffith ap Beli, descendant from Brockwell Yschithrog, Prince of Powys, who reigned over Powsland, Wales, 607 [see Botfield's Stemmata, also Harlian MS., No. 1068].

Phebe Thomas, b. 1747, d. 1829); son of Barnabas Raymond of Middleburgh, Mass.

Davis, Texas, Sep. 22, 1890); has two brothers: JEFFREY SAGE of Okobojo, S. D., b. at Windsor, N. Y., Jan. 21, 1856, owns a cattle ranch in South Dakota (m. Sep. 28, 1890, Lesbia Brownlee, and has child, Brownlee, b. in Okobojo, S. D., May 29, 1892); and ENOS BRAINARD SAGE of Red Rock, Pa., b. at Windsor, N. Y., Mar. 13, 1854, oil producer, florist (m. BLANCHARD, JOSEPH of Philadelphia, Pa., rector St. James Episcopal church; son of Justus W. of Albany, N. Y., brigadier-general in U. S. army; son of Joseph of Catskill, N. Y., educated at Albany med. coll., physician, surgeon, judge of courts of Greene county, N. Y.; son of Justus of Catskill, b. Nov. 22, 1757 [see lineage of Algernon S. Blanchard].

HAMER, DR. JAMES H. of Philadelphia, Pa., b. in Montgomery co., Pa., Oct. 1, 1847, grad. Freeland sem. now Ursinus coll., Collegeville, Pa., 1865, taught there, 1867-8, spent four years in Europe, grad. M. D. at Hahn. med. coll. 1875, demonstrator of chemistry there, 1889-92, professor of chemistry there since 1892 (m. May 15, 1879, Flora, dau. Henry A. and Mary [Weinberger] Hunsicker, and had five children, viz.: Bertha, Fannie, Carrie, d. young, James H. Mary and Sarah Putnam were daughters of Doctor John Putnam, a noted physician of Wilton, N. H., b. Nov. 24, 1774, and a relative of Maj. Hannah had three children, John Irwin, d. Nov. 20, 1892, Curtis Hussey and Mary Adair; Hannah d. Oct. 24, 1872, he m. 2d, Sep. 28, 1876, Emily E. Ferris, no children); son of John P. Veeder of Hoffman's Ferry, N. Y., b. in Broadalbin, N. Y., Feb. 14, 1796, d. at Hoffman's Ferry, July 29, 1849, brought up on his father's farm in Rotterdam, built a portion of Erie canal through the farm, 1822, then continued a contractor until his death, was large and commanding in appearance and enjoyed the confidence of all with whom he had dealings (m. Feb. 5, 1819, Rebecca Van Patten, b. Feb. 6, 1798, d. in Pittsburgh, Oct. 16, 1880, dau. of Nicholas, d. in Glenville, N. Y., July 15, 1829, there were slaves in her home in Glenville during her girlhood); son of Pieter Vrooman Veeder of Rotterdam, b. in the Woestine, Rotterdam, N. Y., Nov. 29, 1760, d. there, Oct. 9, 1814, was large and of fine presence, studied law in Albany, was a good speaker and somewhat of a politician, moved to Broadalbin where he erected a saw-mill and grist-mill, manufactured potash and carried on a farm, besides acting as justice of the peace and "general arbitrator," returned to the old farm in Rotterdam, 1801, built the large and handsome house, for its day, in which Herman Veeder, above, was born (m. It had an honorable antiquity, first appearing about the year 1180 with one John de Logan, who married a daughter of Tankard, a Flemish settler in Lanark, the charter from Tankard's son for land in frank-marriage with his sister being mentioned in Chalmer's Caledonia; Sir Robert Logan accompanied "good Sir James Douglas" in his journey with the heart of Bruce, and with him was killed by the Saracens in Spain, after which the family bore as a coat of arms three passion-nails piercing a man's heart. In 1398, these appear on the seal of Sir Robert Logan of Restalrig, who married a daughter of King Robert II, and became admiral of Scotland, and his son, Sir Robert Logan of Restalrig, married Geilles, or Giles, dau. of the Lord of Somerville. About a century later, another Sir Robert Logan of Restalrig married Margaret, dau. of the fourth Lord Seton; again, a Sir Robert appears about 1560 as marrying Agnes, dau. of Patrick, Lord Gray, she afterward became the wife of Alexander, fifth Lord Howe; and a Logan of Restalrig, in the sixteenth century, married Elizabeth, dau. of David Macgill of Cranston-riddle, king's advocate. The conspirator Logan married a daughter of Sir Patrick Howe of Fastcastle in Berwickshire, in that way acquiring that great fortress, whither, it is thought, the Gowrie conspirators intended to convey the king. The most probable object of the plot was to convey the Scotch king a prisoner to Queen Elizabeth. died in 1601, unsuspected of any connection with the affair. The borough of Restalrig or Lestarrick was obtained by a Logan in the reign of King Robert Bruce. Bartholomew Dupuy, above mentioned, whose name has been handed down to posterity as one of the leading Huguenots of France in the reign of Louis XIV, having rendered his country great service during the war with Flanders, and having been promoted in the army to high office, wedded a countess of much influence and distinction who, with himself, was a Huguenot in faith. When the Catholics gained the ascendancy in France, and commenced kindling the fire of persecution, it was to Bartholomew DuPuy that the eyes of all the Huguenots turned for a leader. He was not unmindful of his duty to his God and his brethren, and aided by the Fontaines, his relatives, he led them through

fourteen battles successful, chaining Catholic influences and wresting from the hand of his King the Edict of Nantes, granting an amnesty to all the Huguenots and promoting Bartholomew DuPuy to a commanding post in the State; subsequently, however, Louis XIV resolved to destroy many of the Huguenots, and accordingly many of them were falsely accused of misdemeanors and crimes and put to death. But DuPuy and his wife were fully on the alert, and many of his brethren were sent to Eng. and the U. S., which were the colonies of Great Britain. At length a conspiracy was made for his death, and accordingly an edict was signed by the King authorizing his destruction, but the providence of God was over him for his deliverance and future protection. A faithful sentinel notified him of his danger, and taking the faithful partner of his bosom he set out on horseback to gain the coast where a ship was in waiting, with many of his brethren, to set sail for the new world. With much difficulty he passed the various guards and felt that he was almost safe, when suddenly hearing the quick approach of horses, he turned to see who they were, when at that moment a fire was opened upon him by the guard who had been dispatched in his pursuit to bring them back. The shriek of his faithful wife by his side made him believe that the shot had proved mortal, and as the lion when brought to bay, he turned upon his pursuers and, raising his pistol, fired at the captain, who fell to the ground a lifeless corpse. Then drawing his faithful sword he charged the other members of the party, and after cutting down several of them he put to flight Then turning to his comthe others. panion with a view of soothing her affliction, he received the happy intelligence that the ball had lodged in a small psalm book that she had concealed in her bosom. O, the mercy of God to those who put their trust in Him! He succeeded in reaching the vessel and sailed for America, landed on the shore of Virginia, where he lived out a useful life, doing all he could to aid in forming the minds of the masses for the sweet enjoyment of liberty.

having raised a large family and just before the dawn of the Revolution, this father in Israel fell asleep in Jesus, but like the patriarch of old, called his children around him and after having admonished them, took his faithful sword and gave it to his first born, requesting that that sword should never be sheathed while there remained a cause of soul liberty and freedom of conscience for it to be used in. That sword did much in the hands of a Baptist Du Puy drinking the blood of English aggressions on the plains of Gilford Court House and several other battle-fields, and is now preserved as a relic among the descendants of Du Puy in Virginia. A great number of the descendants of Bartholomew Du Puy are eminent in the ministry of the gospel of Jesus Christ, and who have, as a rule, transmitted to his descendants an innate love of justice, devotion to principle, and hatred of oppression.

Andrew Lewis, Oct. 10, 1774, enlisted with five younger

there, abt. 1739, d. in Litchfield, Sep. 18, 1832 (m. Oct. 25, 1764, Hannah Webber); son of Jedidiah of North Berwick, Me., b. in Kittery, Me., Aug. 29, 1711, d. in North Berwick, Jan. 26, 1776, doctor, accumulated a large property in land there, about 2,000 acres, was a leading man of affairs in the town (m. 1st, Dec. 5, 1734; Elizabeth Jenkins, m. 2d, 1737, Anna Dow, m. 3d, Jan. 28, 1762, Sarah Gould); son of John, b. in Kittery, Me., 1675, d. in North Berwick, abt. 1763, planter, owned large areas of land (m. Dec. 16, 1701, Hannah Dixon); son of John, b. about 1640, first of the name in America, mason, active citizen, was living in 1736 (m. Sarah, dau. of Nicholas Hodgdon of Kittery). The Morrell families are numerous throughout New England but many of them are of no known relationship to John of Kittery. Abraham Morrell, an early settler in Salisbury, Mass., has numerous descendants in Maine and elsewhere, but his relationship to John of Kittery, if indeed he was related at all, is not known. John Morrell (written also Morrall and, more recently, Morrill) was granted land in Kittery in 1668, and, again, in 1669. In 1674 his father-in-law deeded him Birch Point, being part of his homestead, reserving the right to the water from a spring which, at this day, furnishes an abundant supply of excellent water. Birch Point is in the town of South Berwick and near the bridge that spans the river at that place. Two years later he sold the land to Abram Conley and bought a farm at "Coole Harbor," in the present town of Eliot, which has since been in the family. He had at least six children, viz.: Nicholas (m. Sarah Frye, 1695), Sarah (m. George Huntress), John (m. Dec. 16, 1701, Hannah Dixon), Edah (m. Jonathan Nason), Hannah (m. John Tidy) and Abraham who probably died unmarried. Nicholas Morrell lived on part of the old homestead. He was a blacksmith and also established the ferry between Kittery and Dover Neck. had two sons, John and Robert, and three daughters. John m. Hannah Hanscom and moved to Scarboro. Robert m. Sarah Roberts, of Dover, and was a prominent man in Kittery. His posterity, bearing his

name, still reside in Kittery. John Morrell, jr., lived on part of the old homestead and was also a large land-owner at what was called Doughtie's Falls in the present town of North Berwick. He was a slave-owner and a man of wealth and prominence in the town. He had five sons and two daughters, as follows: 1. John, jr., who m. Ruth Dow of Hampton, N. H. He had sons Pelatiah and William Pepperell and six daughters. Of the sons we know nothing, 2. Thomas, not named in his father's will and probably died young. 3. Peter m. Sarah Peasly of Hampton, N. H. He had a son, David, ancestor of the late ex-Congressman Morrell of Johnstown, Pa.; John. who m. Sarah Winslow and moved to Falmouth, and was the ancestor of Jedediah, of Vassalboro; Stephen, who m. Elizabeth Winslow and settled in Falmouth; Peaslee, the grandfather of the late Hon. Anson P. and Lot M. Morrell; Peter, jr., who m. Hannah Winslow and settled in Falmouth, also Thomas and Jonathan. He had three daughters, of whom Sarah was killed and scalped by the Indians near her father's house at North Berwick. 4. Jedediah, physician, farmer and lumberman, settled at North Berwick and also built mills at Bonnybeag Pond; he m. Elizabeth Jenkins, Anna Dow and Sarah Gould, made his will in 1761 and died in 1776. He had Abraham, who died; Abraham again, who lived on part of the old homestead and left a family; Josiah, who m. Hannah Webber and died in Litchfield, Me. His son Ebenezer settled in Windham, and was the ancestor of Hon. John White of Windham, and father of Elijah Morrell, who went to California in 1849 or '50. If any of his descendants are living they will please report. His son Aaron settled in Falmouth and left numerous descendants in Falmouth, Windham, and in Lynn, Mass. Hon. Carroll Willis Morrell of Portland is his grandson. Aaron's youngest son, Ebenezer Morrell, is now living in East Hiram, Me. He is a hale old man, 82 years of age, a blacksmith, and still works at his trade. He is the only living grandson of Josiah Morrell and Hannah Webber. Josiah's son Josiah settled in Litchfield. He was the ancestor of

H. K. Morrell of Gardiner, and the Litchfield families; Winthrop, who lived in Berwick and had sons who settled in Waterville, and John who m. Sarah Varney and d. soon after. He had a dau., Peace, mentioned in his will. 5. Richard, not mentioned in his father's will, and daughters Keziah and Mary. Robert Morrell (Nicholas, John) had twelve children. The eighth was Joel, who lived and died at the old place at "Coole Harbor" and has grandchildren still occupying it. Morrell's Corner, Deering, was named for Rufus and Levi Morrell, sons of Stephen of Falmouth and grandsons of Peter of Berwick. two sons of Stephen established tanneries at Deering and became wealthy and prominent men. Daniel J. Morrell, son of Thaddeus, grandson of David, and greatgrandson of Peter, was one of the chief owners and managers of the iron works at Johnstown, Pa. He was elected member of Congress and moved in Congress the measure for the World's Fair in Philadelphia, in 1876; he was chairman of the executive committee at the Exposition. James Morrill, brother of Thaddeus, settled in Buckfield, Me., and has posterity there.

His highest achievement was the invention of a new money system called "Cometallism" (co-metallism), the principle of which is embodied in a compound coin of a disk containing fifty cents worth of silver, in the center of which, is a disk containing fifty cents worth of gold and both of standard coin value, the dollar formed to be the unit of legal tender, thus the basis of all payments of debts and of redemption of currency would be one-half in gold and one-half in silver (m. Apr. 7, 1853, Elisha Allis, Jr.], Martha Isabel, b. Mar. 17, 1834, d. Jan. 3, 1867, unm., Archibald Horace, b. Apr. 7, 1836, musician, soldier in late war, lives on the homestead); son of Archibald of Londonderry, N. H., b. in Ireland, d. in Londonderry, 1749, see page 166.

CASHOW, JOHN of Mill Neck, L. I., b. in Brookville, L. I., Dec. 30, 1817, worked on a farm, attending district school until fourteen years old, then went to New York and learned the trade of a shoemaker, moved to Brooklyn in 1835, and carried on that business, held a number of city, and State government offices, was alderman five years, and was chairman of a number of the principal committees, also had passed a resolution for the removal of the remains of the martyrs of the British prison ships from Hudson avenue, or as it was then called, Jackson street, to their last resting place at Fort Green, and it was hoped either the State or national government would have erected a suitable monument before that time, to mark the spot where more than 11,000 martyrs perished for the blessings we now enjoy, he offered and had passed a resolution, and had a committee appointed that waited on President Lincoln on his way to Washington to be inaugurated on his first term, inviting him to Brooklyn as the city's guest, but time was precious with him, and he was forced to decline the invitation, held the office of harbor master of the port of New York, appointed by Gov. John A. King, reappointed by Gov. Edw. D. Morgan, reappointed by Gov. Reuben E. Fenton, returned to his native place, Mill Neck, town of Oyster Bay, Queens co., L. I., in 1880, elected town supervisor for three years, and was also member of Assembly from 1st dist. of Queens co. in 1878 (m. 1849, Hester Craig, b. in Brooklyn, and had 3 children, viz.: Thomas U., John C. and Phœbe); son of John K. of Oyster Bay, L. I., b. in Brookville, 1778, d. at Oyster Bay, 1852, capt. in War of 1812, was stationed at Ft. Green in Brooklyn (m. 1816, Elizabeth Underhill, dau. of Daniel, desc. of Capt. John Underhill of Long Island); son of John Cashow of Brookville, L. I., b. there, 1754, farmer, respected by all (m. 1778, Phœbe Kirk [and had: Daniel, John, Geo., Benj., Alex. and Phœbe A.], dau. of John Kirk, who in the Rev. war was imprisoned by the British in the old sugarhouse in N. Y. and died from the effects shortly after his release, his son John Kirk of Charleston, S. C., was a shipping merchant and lost eleven ships by French privateers, and d. in 1853).

SESSIONS, ROBERT LEE of Greenville, Tex., b. in Cherokee co., Tex., 1864, went to live with his uncle, John R. Looney, at age of 12 when his mother died, moved back to the old homestead at age of 17 when his uncle died, engaged in farming and stock raising, attended coll. in 1883, accepted a position with Jackson Bros. of Kemp, Tex., 1884, returned to homestead and sold stock, 1884, attended Lawrence's Commercial coll. of Dalton, 1884-85, accepted position with J. L. Beard & Co. of Ennis, Tex., I year, member real estate firm of Geo. Ellis & Co., a short time, solicitor for Dallas steam laundry, 2 years, weighmaster for International Traffic Assoc. of Fort Worth, Tex., traveling salesman, 2 years, has been with J. E. Cooper since 1892; son of William of Cherokee co., Tex., b. in Sampson co., N. C., 1791, d. in Cherokee co., Tex., 1867, moved from N. C. to Miss., then to Tex., planter, large slaveowner, was very wealthy at one time but lost it all during the war (m. 1st, 1814, Margaret Poitesvent, and had Richard, Isaac, Philip, Lorenzo, Jeptha, Joseph, Silas and De Kalb, all dead except Lorenzo, m. 2d, 1862, Sarah Looney, and had R. L., above, and Joanna, who d. aged 3); son of Richard of Sampson co., N. C., farmer, lived to old age and had a large family, of which William, above, was the youngest (m. Esther Boone, who was a niece of Daniel Boone of Ky., and dau. of Joseph Boone); son of John Sessions, who was a sea-faring man and known as one of Blue Beard's men.

NOWLTON, CHAUNCEY CARTER of Morgansville, Kan., b. in Brooklyn, N. Y., June 23, 1830, d. Apr. 14, 1891, educated at the Delaware, Ohio, Methodist coll., was a clergyman in Illinois and Kansas (m. at Richwood, Ohio, Aug. 21, 1855, Sarah Hastings, d. Jan. 23, 1880, dau. of L. H. Hastings, who m. Mary Carroll of Delaware, dau. of Peter and Ziporah [Truit] Carroll, and gr.-dau. of Clement Carroll, who m. a McCauley. Rev. Chauncey Carter Knowlton had 5 children, viz.: Annie H. [m. Chas. S. Hall of Binghamton], Marv, Elizabeth, Florence and William); son of Perrin Knowlton of Cincinnati, Ohio, b. in Shrewsbury, Mass., Aug. 22, 1801, d. in Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 24, 1884, a man of strong will, great natural intelligence and energy, a very handsome man, dark complexion, very black hair and eyes (m. May 2, 1826, Elizabeth [dau. of Chauncey | Carter of Brooklyn, N. Y., and had beside Rev. Chauncey Carter Knowlton, above, two daughters, viz.: Mary [m. Dr. S. F. Mixer of Buffalo] and Annie [m. Townsend Davis of Buffalo]);

son of Silas Knowlton of Mt. Vernon, Ohio, b. in Shrewsbury, Mass., June 3, 1773, d. in Mt. Vernon (m. about 1798, Mercy Wakefield of Sutton, Mass., and had: Irene, Perrin, Newell, Dexter, Lydia Bacheller, Mary Davenport and Calvin Fletcher); son of Abraham Knowlton of Shrewsbury, b. 1750, d. after 1789 (m. 1772, Lydia Bacheller of Upton, Mass., d. Sep. 28, 1803, and had: Silas, b. June 3, 1773, above, Martha, b. 1775, Sarah, b. 1777, Daniel, b. 1779, Lydia, b. 1781, Abraham, b. 1784, and Thankfull, b. 1789); son of Abraham of Shrewsbury, b. May 12, 1703, prob. in Marlborough, Mass., d. Shrewsbury, Nov. 3, 1768, admitted to church there, 1735 (m. Martha Lamson of Ipswich, Mass., and had: Paul, Silas, Sarah, Abraham, Robert and Martha); son of Thomas of Ipswich, Mass., b. 1670 (m. 1st, Margery, dau. of Dea. Wm. Goodhue, who was of Ipswich, 1635, she d. 1698, m. 2d, about 1702, Margery Carter, and had: Abraham, b. 1703, and Ezekiel, b. 1707); son of Thomas (m. 1668, Hannah Green, and had: Thomas, Robert, Ezekiel, Ephraim, Katharine, Deborah and Susanna); son of Thomas of Ipswich, Mass., 1642, deacon there, 1648, d. Apr. 3, 1692, aged 70, probably came from England between 1630-40 (m. 1st, Susanna, by whom he had a son Thomas, m. 2d, Mary Kenney, by whom he had a son Joseph).
