



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
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# SAMUEL ELIOT, LL. D.

With this fourth volume of the AMERICAN BIBLIOGRAPHY the literary record of the American Colonies enters the period of the Revolutionary War for Independence. The passage by the Parliament of what is popularly known as the Stamp-Act, to take effect upon the first of November, 1765, aroused in the Colonies a bitter feeling of resentment against the British government, which even the quick repeal of the obnoxious Act, in March, 1766, did not allay. The spirit of the people at this infringement of their chartered rights was expressed in no uncertain tones. The pamphlets written by James Otis, and Samuel Adams, in Massachusetts ; by Stephen Hopkins, in Rhode Island; by John Dickinson, in Pennsylvania; by Daniel Dulaney, in Maryland; by Richard Bland, in Virginia; by Maurice Moore, in North Carolina; and by the Rev. J. J. Zubly, in Georgia, may well challenge attention by their brilliant and forceful arguments in behalf of the rights of the colonists. In more violent ways, the distributers of the stamped paper-Andrew Oliver, in Boston, and Jared Ingersoll, in New London-were hung in effigy. Lieutenant-Governor Thomas Hutchinson, of Massachusetts, fled from his residence in Boston as the angered populace entered to wreck it. And Governor Thomas Fitch, of Connecticut, only evaded the resentment of the people of that Colony by "humbly submitting his reasons for taking the oath" to enforce the Act. The Stamp-Act affecting, as it did, all the Colonies, at the initiative of the House of Representatives of Massachusetts-Bay, a Provincial Congress was held in the city of New York in October, 1765, which was participated in by representatives from nine of the Colonies. This was the first time that representatives from each Colony had met together in general Congress and the Proceedings of the Congress, printed at Annapolis, in 1766, gave grave portent for the future. The Congress contented itself, however, with a calm statement of the rights and grievances of the Colonies, and with a humble petition to the king, and a memorial to the Parliament beseeching the repeal of the Stamp-Act. This prudent action, combined with the influence of memorials from the merchants of Boston, New York and Philadelphia, to the merchants of London; and, perhaps, the reported violent deeds and excitement of the people, had due effect in the repeal of the measure. From the general rejoicing in the Colonies for the repeal of the Stamp-Act, there is missing the former feeling of gratitude for favors conferred by the crown, and in its place appears a tone of triumph, a note of exultation, that the combined spirit of the people had compelled the British government to the recognition of a right. In commemoration of this aroused spirit, the people erected liberty-poles, or dedicated some great elm to be a liberty-tree, as a meeting-place when they wished to express their feelings or opinions on public measures. The passage of the Stamp-Act awakened into new life the industry of paper-making, which had been almost a monopoly of English manufacture, so that the official

publications of Harvard College, from 1767, could proudly bear in their imprints that they were printed : "In papyrum Miltoni, in Nov-Angliâ, confectam."

In 1767, in accordance with the avowal of the British ministry on the repeal of the Stamp-Act, that some form of taxation would be devised to produce a revenue for the support of a military establishment in the Colonies, three measures passed the Parliament. One, fixing a port-duty on six articles of commerce-tea being one of them. Another, for commissioners of customs to collect and enforce that measure. The third, suspending the legislative functions of the Province of New York until provision was made for the maintenance of troops. Again, led by the action of the Province of Massachusetts-Bay, a chain of non-importation agreements, to abstain from the purchase of all goods of English manufacture until the duties levied in England upon the six articles of general use were rescinded, was formed, which stretched from New Hampshire to Virginia, along the Atlantic seaboard. It meant much patient work to complete it, and some suffering to maintain it, and necessitated legislative action for the relief of the poor of Boston, New York, Philadelphia, and Baltimore, and establishment of manufactures for their employment. Individuals who violated these agreements suffered their community's persecution; their compliances and apologies were demanded to be publicly made, and such was the aroused state of public opinion, that this waited not on a week, or even upon a day, but was the action of the hour. In May, 1768, the commissioners of customs assumed the functions of their office in Boston, and in the fall of that year British soldiers were quartered in Boston and in New York, where General Thomas Gage had established his headquarters, to compel the observance of the government measures. In 1769, Sir Francis Bernard, who had been for ten years royal Governor of Massachusetts-Bay, returned to England, leaving the government of the Province in the hands of Lieutenant-Governor Thomas Hutchinson, who was no better liked by the people. The death of Sir Henry Moore, royal Governor of the Province of New York, in September, 1769, left that Province nominally under the control of Lieutenant-Governor Cadwallader Colden; but, as the governmental functions were practically suspended, actually under the power conferred on Thomas Gage, as General and Commander-in-chief of all his majesty's forces in America. The Honse of Burgesses of Virginia having boldly resolved, on the sixteenth of May, 1769, that the sole right of imposing taxes on the inhabitants of Virginia, is now, and ever hath been, legally and constitutionally, vested in the House of Burgesses, the Assembly was dissolved by the royal Governor, Lord Botetourt, on the seventeenth ; and, on the eighteenth, the members had formed an Association for mutual support in maintenance of that principle. The growing discontents and offensive attitude of the soldiers, which appears to have been particularly shown in cutting down the liberty-poles and liberty-trees, and reviling the organization of Sons of Liberty, who were accustomed to hold their meetings there, led to frequent clashes between individual citizens and soldiers. This was the situation when, in January, 1770, a more serious conflict between the citizens and the soldiers in New York was only averted by the prompt and pacificatory action of Whitehead Hicks, mayor of the city. On the fifth of March, 1770, occurred the fatal clash between the citizens and soldiers in Boston, known as the Boston massacre, an event which did more to heighten the quarrel between the American Colonies and Great Britain than anything which had yet occurred. Up to this time pacification and reconciliation were possible, for the habit of loyalty in the Colonies was strong ; but the shedding of blood of those who were impelled by honorable motives to oppose the measures wrongfully imposed upon them by the British government was never forgotten or forgiven by the American Colonies.

That the British ministry could have remained blinded to the intense state of public opinion in the Colonies, even when the dangers of their measures were eloquently declaimed by the greatest orators the Parliament has ever heard, can only be accounted for, by what was openly

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charged at the time, that they were purposely deceived by the letters and memorials of their agents and placemen in the Colonies. At length aroused, partly, to the seriousness of the situation, they attempted to remove the objections of the Colonies by rescinding the duties on five articles, but, as a matter of principle, retained the duty on tea. So far as the Colonies were concerned, the principle they were contending for—that the right of taxation belonged only to themselves—was the same whether the duty was on one article or on six, and the relations grew more strained until when, in 1773, the closing year of this volume, at the instigation of the government, a concerted effort was made by the British East India Company, to land cargoes of tea at the ports of Boston, New York, Philadelphia and Annapolis, with the purpose of forcing the payment of duties. This attempt signally and disastrously failed. The shipments to Boston and Annapolis were destroyed. At New York and Philadelphia, the pilots, heeding the warnings of the citizens, refused to assist the vessels containing the tea into the harbors, and the sailors were not permitted to land, except for the purpose of replenishing provisions for their return to England without accomplishing their mission.

Among modern historians of this period of American history there is a growing belief that one of the important underlying causes of the discontents existing was the aggressive policy pursued by members of the Church of England in the religious and political life of the Colonies. This belief finds ample testimony in this volume to confirm it. To clearly understand the intensity of sectarian feeling towards the polity of that Church, it should be remembered that the New England Colonies, in particular, had been founded by people of English birth in assertion of rights of worship denied them by the Church of England. And that it was this Church now, in a land redeemed by them in hardship and suffering from a wilderness, which was again decrying their faiths and beliefs with all the old rancor and arrogantly demanding a voice in their government, more particularly in New York and Virginia, not upon their rights as citizens, but as members of the Church of England, and with the purpose of forcing upon the Colonies the support and maintenance of their churches and their clergy. It may not be that this was in furtherance of a concerted plan by the Church in England and in the Colonies, but this view seems probable. The abusive reflections upon the colonists contained in the Sermon preached before the Incorporated Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, by the Right Reverend William Warburton, Lord Bishop of Gloucester, at their anniversary meeting in 1766, was replied to by the Reverend Andrew Croswell, of Boston. The vituperation of the Right Reverend John Ewer, Lord Bishop of Landaff, in his Sermon before the same Society, in 1767, received well-merited rebuke from the Reverend Dr. Charles Chauncy, of Boston, and William Livingston, of New York. These two sermons, in particular, justly aroused resentment in the Colonies. In sharp contrast to these, however, should not be forgotten the eloquent and encouraging Sermon delivered by the Right Reverend Jonathan Shipley, Lord Bishop of St. Asaph, before the same Society in 1773. This good Bishop, choosing to take his political principles from Pitt, and Burke, and Fox, and his charity from the New Testament. While it does not appear that any official action of the clergy of the Church of England in the Colonies had as yet been taken with that purpose, a controversy was begun, in 1767, by the Reverend Thomas Bradbury Chandler, in favor of an American Episcopate, which was ably debated by the Reverend Dr. Charles Chauncy, of Boston, perhaps the greatest polemical writer of the colonial period. In view of this controversy at this critical time, it is interesting to note that one writer, signing himself An Englishman, reveals the probable reasons in other minds as well by bluntly declaring for the establishment of bishops in the Colonies, so that the New England Puritans would vent their spleen upon the ceremonies of the Church instead of upon the political measures of the British government. The acrimony with which the subject of the Church of England in

the Colonies was debated, is revealed in the writings of William Livingston, and in the heated issues of the press during the elections in New York in 1768 and 1769; and in the Collection of tracts first issued under the title of The American whig, with other essays of like nature, in the same years.

Although the literary activities of the Colonies are overshadowed by the political during the period covered by this volume, there is good evidence of a stronger and truer literary tone, and a wider culture, in the writings of Andrew Barton, Benjamin Church, Nathaniel Evans, Philip Freneau, Thomas Godfrey, junior, Francis Hopkinson, John Trumbull, and Mercy Otis Warren. The intellectual movement being well represented in the works of Joseph Bellamy, Charles Chauncy, Samuel Hopkins and John Woolman. In History, by Amos Adams, Thomas Clap, Nathan Fiske, Stephen Hopkins, Thomas Hutchinson, Samuel Smith and Justice William Smith; and, in Ecclesiastical History, by Isaac Backus and Morgan Edwards. In Science, by John Winthrop, Benjamin West and Andrew Oliver, junior. In Medicine, by Samuel Bard, Peter Middleton, John Morgan and Benjamin Rush. And in Music, by Daniel Bayley, William Billings, Francis Hopkinson, James Lyon, and the English masters, William Tans'ur and A. Williams. The idea of Circulating Libraries, an institution invented by Rev. Samuel Fancourt, a dissenting minister in London who died in 1768, was first made use of by the Boston bookseller, John Mein, in 1765; and his example followed by the Philadelphia bookseller, Thomas Bradford, in 1769; from whence the idea spread to Baltimore soon after the establishment of William Goddard's press in 1773.

In New Hampshire, in 1765, Thomas Furber and Ezekiel Russell began printing, at Portsmouth, *The Portsmouth Mercury*, the second newspaper printed in the Province, which was continued to the year 1768. In 1771, Daniel and Robert Fowle printed a collection of the *Acts and laws of New-Hampshire*, and began the long series of the *New Hampshire Register*.

In Massachusetts, in 1767, John Mein and John Fleeming began the publication of The Boston Chronicle, which was continued in the name of the firm to June, 1770, though previously Mein, whose tory sympathies were notorious, had returned to England. It is said that the patriot John Hancock, angered by Mein's attitude in defiance of the non-importation agreement, and general disagreement with public sentiment in Boston, bought up Mein's debts and, by making an unexpected demand upon him for payment, which he could not meet, forced him into bankruptcy, and into the Fleet Prison. In this year, also, Kneeland and Adams printed Charles Chauncy's reply to the undeserved reproaches cast upon the Colonies by the Lord Bishop of Landaff in his anniversary Sermon before the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, which James Parker reprinted at New York in 1768. Thomas and John Fleet printed the second volume of Thomas Hutchinson's History of the Province of Massachusetts-Bay; and Edes and Gill reprinted Charles Lloyd's Conduct of the late administration examined, which, with its illustrative documents, is the best collection of arguments in behalf of the government measure known as the Stamp-Act. In 1768, Edes and Gill printed The Result of the conference, of ninety-six towns and eight districts convened at Boston, 22 September, 1768. Thomas and John Fleet printed Andrew Croswell's reply to the abusive reflections contained in the Lord Bishop of Gloucester's Sermon before the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts in 1766, and Richard Draper printed the result of A Conference between the commissaries of Massachusetts-Bay, and New-York, held at New Haven in 1767. In this year, also, Samuel Hall established a printing press at Salem, the third town in the Province where printing was introtroduced, and began the publication of The Essex Gazette, which was continued by him at Salem, Cambridge and Boston, to August, 1776. In 1769, Kneeland and Adams printed Amos

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Adams' Concise historical view of the perils, hardships, difficulties and discouragements which have attended the planting and progressive improvements of New-England. Edes and Gill printed Samuel Adams' Appeal to the world, published by order of the Town of Boston ; and Observations on several Acts of Parliament, published by the merchants of Boston. And Mein and Fleeming reprinted The Controversy between Great-Britain and her Colonies reviewed, by William Knox, under-secretary for American affairs. In 1770, Edes and Gill printed A Short narrative of the horrid massacre in Boston, prepared by James Bowdoin, Joseph Warren and Samuel Pemberton. John Fleeming printing the official report of The Trial of the soldiers of the 29th regiment, for the murder, taken in short-hand by John Hodgson. The unconstitutional removal of the place of meeting of the House of Representatives from Boston to Harvard College in Cambridge this year led to the delivery, on the same day, of two sermons in the long series of Massachusetts election sermons. One, in the audience of the Lieutenant-Governor, Council and House of Representatives, was delivered by Samuel Cooke at Cambridge. The other was delivered by Charles Chauncy, at the request of the friends of the liberties of North America, "in that house of worship at Boston, in which our tribes, from the days of our fathers, have annually sought to Him for direction previous to the choice of his majesty's Council." In July of this year, Isaiah Thomas, at first in connection with Zechariah Fowle, began the publication of The Massachusetts Spy, which was continued by him in Boston till 1775, when he permanently removed his press to Worcester, continuing the publication of the Spy there, either personally or under lease, until he disposed of his interests in 1819, nearly fifty years from its founding, after which, with varying proprietors and fortunes, the Spy was continued until its publication ceased in 1904. In the fall of the year occurred the death of the Reverend George Whitefield at Newburyport, an event which occasioned more sincere expressions of regret in the American Colonies than had heretofore been accorded to any man, citizen or sovereign, and this in a land which had earlier denied this eloquent preacher a hearing. In 1771, Edes and (fill printed, by order of the town of Boston, James Lovell's Oration, to commemorate the bloody tragedy of the fifth of March, 1770. The first of the long series of Boston Orations delivered by men chosen by the municipality as representative of the highest type of its citizenship. And reprinted John Lathrop's sermon preached the Lord's day after the Boston massacre, entitled, Innocent blood crying to God from the streets of Boston, which was first printed in London. In November of this year Ezekiel Russell began the publication in Boston of The Censor, a weekly political paper, designed to defend the administrative measures of the government, which was discontinued in April of the following year. In 1772, Edes and Gill printed Joseph Warren's Oration delivered March 5th, 1772, on the second anniversary of the Boston massacre. The Poem which the committee of the Town of Boston had voted unanimously to be published with the late Oration, written by James Allen, was suppressed from a doubt of the author's political principles, and printed afterwards, by Ezekiel Russell, for the author's friends. Edes and Gill also printed The Votes and proceedings of the freeholders and other inhabitants of the Town of Boston, which contains a particular enumeration of the grievances which have led to the discontents in the Colonies. John Fleeming printed William Gordon's Plan of a society for making provision for widows by annuities, the first life assurance scheme projected in America. In 1773, Isaiah Thomas printed Benjamin Church's Oration delivered March fifth, 1773, the third of the Boston Orations; and, in December, in connection with Henry Walter Tinges, Thomas established a printing press in Newburyport, the fourth town in which printing was introduced, and began the publication of The Essex Journal, which was continued to the year 1795. Joseph Greenleaf printed A Declaration of the warrantable grounds and proceedings of the first Associates of the government of New-Plymouth. D. Kneeland and N. Davis printed Isaac Skillman's The American alarm, or the Bostonian plea, for the rights,

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and liberties, of the people; and his Oration, on the beauties of liberty, or the essential rights of the Americans, published under the signature of a British Bostonian, both of which are sometimes attributed to John Allen. And Edes and Gill printed a Copy of Letters sent to Great-Britain by his excellency Thomas Hutchinson, the hon. Andrew Oliver, and several other persons born and educated among us, "in which the judicious reader will discover the fatal source of the confusion and bloodshed in which this Province especially has been involved, and which threatened total destruction to the liberties of all America."

In Rhode Island, in 1765, at Providence, William Goddard printed, and published by authority, The Rights of Colonies examined, by Stephen Hopkins, which precipitated a spirited controversy. Martin Howard, junior, replying to this with A Letter from a gentleman at Halifax to his friend in Rhode-Island, which was printed at Newport by Samuel Hall. To Howard, James Otis replied with A Vindication of the British Colonies against the aspersions of the Halifax gentleman, which was printed by Edes and Gill in Boston. Howard's rejoinder to this is entitled, A Defence of the Letter from a gentleman at Halifax, to his friend in Rhode-Island, printed by Samuel Hall at Newport; and it elicited from Otis Brief remarks on the Defence of the Halifax libel on the British-American Colonies, printed at Boston by Edes and Gill; being sustained by the anonymous writer of A Letter to the author of the Halifax Letter, occasioned by his book, entitled A Defence of that Letter. In 1767, at Newport, Samuel Hall printed the fourth revision of the Acts and laws of Rhode-Island. In 1768, at Providence, John Waterman printed Silas Downer's Discourse at the dedication of the Tree of Liberty, the reported interesting ceremonies being general, probably, on like occasions in the Colonies. In 1769, fostered and encouraged by the Philadelphian Association, was founded the Warren Association of Baptist Churches in New England, whose influence in the cause of civil and religious liberty has been continuous to the present time.

In Connecticut, in 1766, at New Haven, Benjamin Mecom printed Thomas Clap's Annals or history of Yale-College; and Benjamin Trumbull's Letter to an honourable gentleman of the Council-Board, shewing that Yale-College is a very great emolument, and of high importance to the State. Samuel Green printed Jared Ingersoll's Letters relating to the Stamp-Act. At Hartford, Thomas Green printed Benjamin Church's Liberty and property vindicated, and the st - pm - nburnt, in derision of Ingersoll; and Governor Thomas Fitch's Some reasons that influenced the Governor to take, and the Council to administer the oath, required by the Stamp-Act, "humbly submitted to the publick." At New London, Timothy Green printed Ebenezer Devotion's The Examiner examined, in answer to William Knox, on taxation of the Colonies. In 1767, at New Haven, Thomas and Samuel Green began the publication of The Connecticut Journal, which was continued to about the year 1834. The claims of Connecticut to disputed lands held under its Charter and by purchase become, during the period of this volume, an important subject for debate. In 1765, at New Haven, Benjamin Mecom printed James Brown's Claim or title to a certain tract or gore of land, granted to the proprietors of New Fairfield. In 1767, at Hartford, Green and Watson printed A Geographic historical summary; or, narration of the present controversy between the Wappinger Tribe of Indians, and the claimants under the original patentee of a large tract of land, in Phillips's Upper Patent, so called. In 1770, in New York, was printed The State of the lands said to be once within the bounds of the Charter of Connecticut west of New York, considered. Connecticut's claim to Wyoming is asserted in A Petition to the General Assembly of Connecticut to take into consideration the distressed state of the settlers at Wyoming, printed in New York in 1771, and by The Right of Connecticut, to claim and hold land within the limits of their Charter, lying west of New-York, stated and considered, printed by Ebenezer Watson at Hartford in 1773. At Hartford, in 1771, Ebenezer Watson printed Luke Stebbins' Genealogy of the family of Samuel and Hannah Stebbins, the earliest family genealogy printed in the American

Colonies. In 1772, at New London, Timothy Green printed A Sermon, preached at the execution of Moses Paul, an Indian, for murder, by Samson Occom, an ordained Indian minister. The circumstances and the preacher gave to this sermon unusual interest, and it passed through a number of editions, and was turned into metre. Timothy Green also printed this year the first of the Freebetter Almanacs, which were continued by Nathan Daboll, his son, Nathan Daboll, junior, and by his grandson, David Nathan Daboll, for one hundred years. At New Haven, Thomas and Samuel Green printed the first part of John Trumbull's satire *The Progress of dulness*, and the second and third parts in the following year. In 1773, at Norwich, the fourth town in the Colony in which printing was begun, Timothy Green 3d and Judah Paddock Spooner established a printing press; and, at about the same time, Alexander and James Robertson, of Albany, and John Trumbull, of Norwich, also established a press, and under the firm name of Robertsons and Trumbull began, in September, the publication of *The Norwich Packet*, which was continuously published to the year 1804.

In New York, in 1766, John Holt began the publication of The New-York Journal, giving to it the successive numbering of The New-York Gazette which he had been publishing under a lease from James Parker since 1762, and continued its publication at Esopus and Poughkeepsie during the occupancy of New York City by the British troops, and at New York from the conclusion of the Revolutionary War until his death in 1784. In the same year Holt printed for Isaac Pinto his translation of Prayers for Shabbath, Rosh-Hashanah and Kippur, the ritual of the Spanish and Portuguese Jews ; and Considerations upon the rights of the colonists to the privileges of British subjects, by an anonymous writer. In 1767, James Parker printed for the Consistory of the Reformed Dutch Church in New York their version of The Psalms of David, with the Ten Commandments, Creed and Lord's Prayer, in metre. Also the Catechism, Confession of faith, Liturgy, &c. Translated from the Dutch and edited by Francis Hopkinson. The decline of the use of the Dutch language in New York making the adoption of the English language for their church services necessary. This is the first book of music printed from type in America: the type for the musical notes was obtained from Amsterdam. James Parker is also supposed to have printed The Conduct of Cadwallader Colden, an anonymous work which the Assembly vainly attempted to discover the authorship, and which was written, probably, by Lieutenant-Governor Colden himself. In 1768, James Parker printed The Power and grandeur of Great-Britain, founded on the liberty of the Colonies, an anonymous publication which was also printed by William Goddard in Philadelphia this year. In December, 1769, appeared a communication headed : To the betrayed inhabitants of the City and Colony of New-York, signed, A Son of Liberty, which attacked the grant of money for support of British troops by the Assembly, and suggested a public meeting in opposition to the bill. This was declared by the Assembly to be a "false, seditious and infamous libel," and a reward of one hundred pounds was offered for the discovery of the author. In February, 1770, James Parker acknowledged bimself to be the printer, and named Captain Alexander McDougall as the author. The latter was arrested and confined in prison for a year notwithstanding his appeals for vindication in the liberty of the press-a principle established by the trial of John Peter Zenger in 1735, and for his eloquent defence of which, Andrew Hamilton, of Philadelphia, was then given the freedom of the City of New York. At the same time a reward of fifty pounds was offered, unsuccessfully, for the author of a "seditious paper" of like nature, directed To the public, and signed, Legion. In 1769, Hugh Gaine completed printing The Order for morning and evening prayer, with other offices of the Church of England, in the Mohawk Indian language, which William Weyman began printing in 1763. And printed A Plain and full state of the demands and pretensions of New-York, against New-Jersey, respecting the boundary line; together with An Argument delivered before his majesty's commissioners to settle

and determine the boundary line between the Colonies. In May of this year, Alexander and James Robertson began printing The New-York Chronicle, which was probably continued to the removal of their press to Albany early in the year 1771. In December of that year they began the publication of The Albany Guzette, which they continued to the year 1775. And, in 1773, printed the Laws and ordinances of the City of Albany. In 1771, Hugh Gaine printed The Charter for establishing an Hospital in the City of New-York, granted by the Earl of Dunmore. In 1772, Samuel Inslee and Anthony Car printed Philip Freneau's poem, The American village ; Joseph Crukshank, at Philadelphia, printing his A Poem, on the rising glory of America, delivered at commencement of the College of New Jersey. In 1771, Hugh Gaine printed Governor Tryon's Proclamation asserting the right of the Province to an eastern boundary on the Connecticut River; and, in 1773, printed A State of the right of New-York, with respect to its eastern boundary on Connecticut River, so far as concerns the late encroachments under the government of New-Hampshire, principally drawn up by James Duane, and published by the General Assembly. John Holt printing, in continuation, A Narrative of the proceedings, concerning the lands, lately usurped by New-Hampshire; together with an Appendix, containing Grants, Acts, and other proofs concerning the encroachments of New-Hampshire. In April, 1773, James Rivington began the publication of the New-York Gazetteer, a paper always opposed to public sentiment in the Colonies, and particularly obnoxious to the friends of American liberty, which he continued with varying fortunes to the end of the year 1783.

In New Jersey, in 1766, at James Parker's press at Woodbridge, William Goddard printed a single number of The Constitutional Courant, directed against the Stamp-Act, of which a large edition was sold by hawkers in New York. In this year James Parker removed his press temporarily to Burlington, and there printed Samuel Smith's History of the Colony of Nova-Cœsaria or New-Jersey, the only work printed in Burlington before Isaac Collins permanently established his press there in 1770. In 1766, at Woodbridge, Samuel Franklin Parker, James Parker's nephew, printed David Ogden's The Claim of the inhabitants of the Town of Newark: in virtue of the Indian purchase made by the first settlers of Newark, in 1667, stated and considered ; and, in 1767, Ogden's To the several persons claiming under the Indian purchase, called the Mountain, Horsneck and Van Gieson purchases, of which only a single copy is known. In that year, William Goddard printed, at Philadelphia, John Hunt's Bill in the Chancery of New-Jersey against William, Earl of Stirling, and others. In July, 1768, Governor William Franklin, of New-Jersey, and Lientenant-Governor John Penn, of Pennsylvania, both issued proclamations of the robbery of the Eastern Treasury, but no action appears to have been taken until the session of the Assembly in 1772. In 1769, James Parker printed in New York, A Brief of the claim, of New-Jersey, and the proof offered in support of it, before the commissioners, for settling the boundary line, between New-Jersey and New-York. In 1773, Isaac Collins printed Robert Barclay's Bill in the Chancery of New-Jersey, against William, Earl of Stirling, and others.

In Pennsylvania, in 1765, William Bradford printed John Dickinson's The Late regulations respecting the British Colonies on the Continent of America considered; John Morgan's Discourse upon the institution of medical schools in America; and Justice William Smith's Historical account of the expedition against the Ohio Indians, in the year 1764. Henry Miller printing Thomas Godfrey, junior's Juvenile poems on various subjects. With the Prince of Parthia, a tragedy, the earliest dramatic production of a native American author printed in the American Colonies. In 1766, Benjamin Franklin and David Hall printed Thomas Letchworth's poem, A Morning and evening meditation, the last work to bear Franklin's name in the imprint issued from the press he founded thirty-seven years before. William and Thomas Bradford printed Four dissertations on the reciprocal advantages of a perpetual union between Great-Britain and her

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American Columies, by students of the College of Philadelphia. In 1767, William Goddard printed Andrew Barton's The Disappointment, the earliest ballad-opera composed in the American Colonies; and began the publication of The Pennsylvania Chronicle, which he continued to the year 1774. In 1768, Hall and Sellers printed John Dickinson's Letters from a farmer in Pennsylvania to the inhabitants of the British Colonies. Nothing which had previously appeared in the Colonies produced so great a sensation as did these celebrated Letters. Their arguments and reasonings were deemed unanswerable; they wielded great influence, and distinguished honor was accorded their author wherever he appeared. In this year, John Dickinson also wrote a song for American freedom, known as The Liberty song, which was much in vogue, and inspired the Sons of Liberty as well as aroused the ire of their tory opponents. William and Thomas Bradford printed The Nature and extent of Parliamentary power considered, by an anonymous writer, which John Holt reprinted in New York. In 1769, William and Thomas Bradford printed nine numbers of The American magazine, edited by Lewis Nichola, in which first appeared Observations on the angina maligna, by Benjamin Rush; and to which were appended the first printed Proceedings of the American Philosophical Society. In this year Benjamin Mecom began the publication of The Penny post as a tri-weekly paper, which was the nearest approach to modern journalism yet attempted, of which nine numbers only were printed. In 1770, Joseph Crukshank and Isaac Collins printed the first volume of Morgan Edwards' Materials towards a history of the American Baptists, relating to the Baptists of Pennsylvania, one of the most important historical works attempted in the Colonies, and also printed Alexander Cluny's The American traveller. William Goddard printed his account of The Partnership; or, the history of the rise and progress of the Pennsylvania Chronicle. In this year, Robert Bell, the most progressive publisher in the Colonies. successfully published an edition of William Robertson's History of the reign of Charles the fifth, in three volumes; and, in the years 1771 and 1772, successfully published an edition of Sir William Blackstone's Commentaries on the laws of England, together with An Interesting Appendix, in five volumes. The large list of subscribers showing the aroused interest in the subject. In 1771, John Dunlap began the publication of The Pennsylvania Packet, which he continued to 1795. On the 21st of September, 1784, it appeared as a daily newspaper-the first daily newspaper issued in the United States. In 1772, William and Thomas Bradford printed Invitation serieuse aux habitants des Illinois, by a resident of Kaskaskia, the first work written in the western territory printed in the American Colonies.

In Maryland, in 1765, in Annapolis, Jonas Green printed the Laws of Maryland, collected by Reverend Thomas Bacon, the most sumptuous work issued from his press; and, also, Daniel Dulaney's Considerations on the propriety of imposing taxes in the British Colonies, of which four editions were issued. In this year Nicholas Hasselbach established a press in Baltimore, and printed in the same year A Detection of the conduct and proceedings of Mess<sup>rs.</sup> Annan and Henderson, by John Redick, the only known issue of his press, and the only known work printed in Baltimore before the year 1773, of which only a single copy is known. In 1766, Jonas Green printed the Proceedings of the Congress at New-York, held in relation to the Stamp-Act in 1765, the first time the Colonies had met in general Congress. In 1773, William Goddard removed from Philadelphia to Baltimore and permanently established a press there, beginning, in August, the publication of The Maryland Journal and the Baltimore Advertiser, which was continued by the family of its founder for twenty years.

In Virginia, in 1766, Alexander Purdie & Co. printed, at Williamsburg, Richard Bland's An Inquiry into The Rights of the British Colonies, in a letter addressed to James Otis, its author. In May of this year, William Rind, who had been associated with Jonas Green at Annapolis for seven years, founded Rind's Virginia Gazette, instigated by the undue bias of Purdie and Dixon's

Virginia Gazette, and continued it in the interests of the people of Virginia until his death in 1773.

In North Carolina, at Wilmington, in 1765, Andrew Steuart printed Maurice Moore's The Justice and policy of taxing the American Colonies, in Great-Britain, considered. In 1767, Adam Boyd is said to have begun printing The Cape-Fear Mercury at Wilmington, continuing it to the year 1775. In 1770, was printed Herman Husbands' An Important relation of the first rise and cause of the recent differences in publick affairs in North-Carolina. And, in 1771, at Boston his A Fan for Fanning, and a touch-stone to Tryon. In 1773, at Newbern, James Davis printed the third revisal of the Acts of Assembly, of North-Carolina.

In South Carolina, in 1765, Charles Crouch established a press at Charleston, and founded The South Carolina Gazette and country journal, the third Gazette printed there, which he continued until his death in 1775, when his widow continued it to 1780. The frequency of the name. Gazette in colonial newspapers was occasioned by local laws requiring public notices in Gazettes, using the word in the general meaning now applied to newspapers, which made each paper so named eligible under the law. In 1767, Charles Crouch printed A Representation of facts, relative to the conduct of Daniel Moore, collector of customs, transmitted to the agent of the Province at London, by the merchants of Charleston. In 1768, William and Thomas Bradford printed, anonymously, Henry Laurens' Extracts from the proceedings of the Court of Vice-Admiralty in Charles-Town, with some remarks on American Custom-House officers, and on Sir Egerton Leigh, sole Judge of that Court, a second edition of which was printed by Peter Timothy, in Charleston, to which Judge Leigh replied with The Man unmasked, printed by Peter Timothy, in Charleston, in 1769. In this year was also printed Reverend John J. Zubly's An Humble enquiry into the nature of the dependency of the American Colonies upon the Parliament of Great-Britain. By A Freeholder of South-Carolina.

In 1769, the Chronicle was printed by William Goddard and Company, after which the imprint varies frequently, being printed by Goddard and Towne to July 1770, when Towne's name was permanently withdrawn. Beginning with the number for December 3, 1767, and continuing for twelve numbers, the Chronicle, in common with every other newspaper printed in the Colonies, except the German newspapers and Fleet's Boston Evening-Post, reprinted John Dickinson's "Letters from a farmer in Pennsylvania." Their publication led to a breach between the partners, which culmi- nated in an address "To the public" by Towne, on his with- drawal, in July 1770, to which Goddard, who had the popular side of the controversy, replied with his account of "The Partner- ship," of which three editions were printed in the same year. Goddard continued the publication, withdrawing the cut of the Royal Arms from the title in 1771, to February 8, 1774, when his valedictory appears, and the publication of the Chronicle ceased. In June, Alexander Robertson was forced to make a public apology for violating the non-importation agreement, and it is probable that their continued disagreement with public sentiment in the Colonies, then, and afterwards at Albany, Nor- wich, and again in New York City during the British occupancy, made it an unprofitable venture. The publication of the Chronicle was probably continued to April 1770, and may have been con- tinued to the end of the second year in April, 1771. Thomas continued the publication, with a few lapses, to the first of June, 1776, when he leased his printing establishment to William Stearns and Daniel Bigelow, who continued its publication to August, 1777. In that month Thomas leased his press to Anthony Haswell, the first num- ber of the new management appearing August 14th, as Haswell's Massachusetts Spy, and so continued to the number for December 11th, when "Haswell's" was dropped for three months, and then resumed. Beginning with the number for June 25, 1778, Isaiah Thomas again assumed the control of his press, and the paper appeared at that date, and was continued as Thomas's Massachusetts Spy, and the Worcester Gazette. Heaven grant that the freedom of the press, on which depends the freedom of the people, may in the United States be ever guarded with a watchful eye, and defended from shackles of every form and shape until the trump of the celestial messenger shall announce the final dissolution of all things." In 1789, Gordon's History of the American Revolution was republished in successive numbers. In 1792, Leonard Worcester was admitted to partnership. And from 1793 to March 1799 the paper was printed and published by Leonard Worcester for Isaiah Thomas. From March 1799 to October 1810 it was printed and published by Isaiah Thomas junior, for Isaiah Thomas. In October 1810, the paper Was leased to James Elliot for a term of years but, for political reasons, the lease was rescinded in February 1811, the younger Thomas resuming control from that date until August 1812. In that month Isaac Sturtevant became its printer and publisher to October 1814, after which date it passed into the control of William Manning. The real ownership of the Spy, however, remained in the elder Thomas until 1819, when after a period of nearly fifty years from its founding, he sold his interests to William Manning and George Trumbull.
