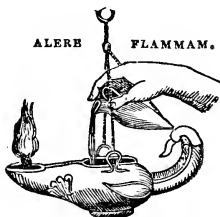

## PREFACE.



THE preceding edition of the present work was sent forth at a moment when the study of the Anglo-Saxon tongue was almost at its lowest ebb in England. It was compiled as an experiment, under the belief that a small volume of extracts in prose and verse—beginning with pieces couched in the simplest language and proceeding gradually to the most difficult—accompanied by a compendious Glossary, would much contribute to the revival of the study of the Anglo-Saxon language in the land where it once had its home, and had flourished more vigorously than any of its kindred dialects on the Continent. The belief above-mentioned, though not fully justified, proved not wholly groundless: the few copies printed were gradually disposed of, and the number of students sensibly increased, many of whom, it may reasonably be supposed, were indebted for their progress to the *Analecta Anglo-Saxonica*.

Issued under more favourable circumstances than its predecessor, the present edition appears in a cheaper form, and with some modifications and changes, it is hoped, for the better, it having been the editor's object to compile an initiatory book for beginners, which might at the same time not be devoid of interest to the lovers of Anglo-Saxon lore in general.

The editor feels much gratification in mentioning that this work is now adopted as a text-book for his lectures by the Rawlinsonian Professor of Anglo-Saxon in the University of Oxford, whence it may be hoped that the study of our ancient mother-tongue may find its way, as an essential branch of English education, into our higher schools, and thus tend to the formation of a style more impressive\* and more truly English than is to be found in many literary productions of the present, and very many of the last century. On this subject, the words of a very sensible and eloquent writer may with propriety be here quoted: "As Englishmen we have to think, to write, to speak in English and with Englishmen. Surely, then, it is a matter of concern to know and understand well our own tongue. How much better then would it be, if in our public and private schools as much attention at least were given to the teaching of English, as of Greek and Latin, that our youths

might bring home with them a racy idiomatic way of speaking and writing their own language, instead of a smattering of Greek and Latin, which they almost forget, and generally neglect in a few years' time! Let our English youth of both sexes be taught to drink deeply of the well of English undefiled. For this a study of Anglo-Saxon is absolutely needful; for after all, it has bequeathed to us by far the largest stock of words in our language. About the Anglo-Saxon tongue there was the strength of iron, with the sparkling and the beauty of burnished steel, which made it withstand with success the attacks that the Norman William and his fawning courtiers directed against it, as they tried in vain to thrust their French into the mouths of the English people. If the sword of the Normans vanquished the Anglo-Saxons, the Anglo-Saxons' tongue in its turn overthrew the French of the Normans. The greatest harm that was ever inflicted on the English language came from Johnson, who in giving English endings to long-drawn Latin words, foolishly thought to impart dignity of style to his writings by words big, not with meaning, but with sounding emptiness. Such silliness and childishness have happily died away; but still our young men have to be taught to follow our best and latest writers, and always to choose an Anglo-Saxon word before a Latin one. When this shall be done, then may we look forward to a bright period in our country's literature. We shall have our ears charmed with a flow of sounds as strong as they are sweet and beautiful, instead of, as often now happens, being wearied with a namby pamby gibberish

made up of Greek, Latin, and French words with English endings\*.”

In the Glossary the student will find numerous synonyms from the other Northern tongues, particularly German and Danish. These have been inserted solely with the view of showing to learners the great affinity that prevails among these tongues and our own ancient vernacular speech. To the old Germanic and Scandinavian dialects the references are few, being deemed needless in a glossary designed for beginners, and useless to the proficient. The references to the grammar frequently occurring in the Glossary apply to the editor's translation of Rask.

The volume, though of small dimensions, will, nevertheless, be found to contain no inconsiderable number of words, the several extracts of which the text is composed having been selected from among those which seemed to offer the greatest variety, with reference both to the vocabulary and the forms of expression. A brief notice of the several extracts will best enable the reader to form a judgement of the work.

From the Gospels†, p. 1.

Colloquium ad Pueros Linguae Latinae Locutione exercendos, p. 18.

In this Colloquy (MS. Cott. Tib. A. 3) the Saxon is only an inter-

linear gloss to the Latin; the design of its author (Ælfric) being, by means of a Hamiltonian version\*, to facilitate to children the acquirement of the Latin tongue. As presenting a curious picture of times and manners and of monastic life at that early period, it is both valuable and entertaining.

### Homilies of Ælfric, p. 36.

These are from "The Homilies of the Anglo-Saxon Church," in course of publication for the Ælfric Society.

I. Dom. I. in Mense Septembri, quando legitur Iob, p. 36.

II. IV. Id. Mart. S<sup>c</sup>i Gregorii Papæ, p. 44. This interesting homily, giving an account of the conversion of the English by St. Augustine and his brother missionaries, was printed in the year 1709 with an English translation by Mrs. Elizabeth Elstob, which edition has been lately reprinted. This learned lady's version is, generally speaking, close and faithful, though the Saxon text on which it is formed is extremely corrupt.

III. IV. Kal. April. Depositio S. Cuthberhti Episcopi, p. 52.

This homily is entirely composed from Beda's two lives of the Saint. It is alliterative.

IV. De Fide Catholica, p. 63.

V. Dominica Septuagesima, p. 73.

A very beautiful discourse on the parable of the labourers in the vineyard.

### From King Ælfred's Translation of Orosius, p. 81.

I. The Geography of Europe, and the Voyages of Ohthere and Wulfstan. These voyages have been frequently printed and translated. The text now given is from the original manuscript † of Ælfred's Orosius, to which they are prefixed, and will on collation be found in several places to differ from that printed in Daines Barrington's edition ‡, where it is accompanied by a very incorrect translation, and a commentary by J. R. Forster, abound-

This short extract is from the Anglo-Saxon version of a tale in the *Gesta Romanorum*, of which the only known MS. is in the library of C. C. Coll. Camb., and that is unfortunately imperfect. The version (which has been printed with an English translation †) is a model of Anglo-Saxon prose. For an account of the story and its versions, see Warton's *H. E. P.*

A Dialogue between Saturn and Solomon, p. 110.

This dialogue is one of a numerous family that flourished under a variety of denominations and in great estimation during the middle age. The text (from a Cottonian MS.) is in places corrupt, apparently from ignorance of the copyist. In the *Red Book of Derby* (MS. Bibl. C. C. C. Cantab.) is a metrical dialogue between the same parties, which, together with the above, is now in course of publication for the Ælfric Society by Mr. Kemble ‡, to whose

Introduction the student is referred for an abundance of curious information relating to these extraordinary compositions.

### The Mandrake, p. 116.

At the head of this article in the Cottonian manuscript is an illumination, representing a dog in the act of drawing the plant out of the earth, according to the method laid down in the text. The piece affords a striking instance of "the wisdom of our forefathers."

### A Spell to restore Fertility to Land rendered sterile by Witchcraft, p. 116.

The text of this interesting specimen of the simplicity of our forefathers is from the unique manuscript in the Cottonian Library (Calig. A. 7.).

### Homily in Natale S. Eadmundi, p. 119.

This homily, as we learn from the beginning, is founded on the narrative of Eadmund's sword-bearer to king Æthelstan, from which it was related by Dunstan to Abbo of Fleury. By Abbo the account was committed to writing, of whose narrative the present homily is a translation. Manuscripts of the homily are extant in pure Anglo-Saxon; but the present text is given as an interesting specimen of the dialect of East Anglia\*. It is from MS. Bodl. NE. F. 4. 12, and was apparently written at Bury. See p. 125. It is alliterative.

### Wills, p. 126.

- I. The will of Ælfric, bishop Elmham,—a curious specimen of barbarous Saxon in the dialect of E. Anglia.
- II. The will of Lufa, an East-Anglian lady, even more barbarous than the preceding. Both are from the Cott. MS.

### From the Gospels, p. 128.

This is a chapter from the Northumbrian Gloss of the celebrated

nounced as our *life*), etc. On the other hand, wherever the consonant is doubled, the vowel preceding is short and sharp, as in *zett* (pronounced as our *yet*, not *yate*, as it would be if written with a single *t*), *Godd* (pronounced *God*, not *Gode*), etc. Thus *hus* is to be pronounced *hoos*, whereas *þuss*, with a double *s*, is our *thus*. Mr. Tyrwhitt, therefore, had done well, even for his own sake, to have spared his injudicious remark upon this peculiarity of the author, for which every critical student of our early language is so much indebted to him\*.

Orm's dialect merits, if any, to be called Dano-Saxon: his name also betrays a Scandinavian descent †.

In conclusion, the editor does not hesitate in expressing his belief, that every student who has read through and well understood the contents of this volume will find no difficulty in understanding any Anglo-Saxon writer either in prose or verse.

\* "There is a peculiarity in the author's orthography, which consists in doubling the consonants; e. g. brother he writes *brotherr*; after, *affterr*, etc. He has done this by design, and charges those who shall copy his book, to be very careful to write those letters twice which he has written so, as otherwise he assures them 'they will not write the word right.' Hicke has taken notice of this peculiarity, but has not attempted to explain the author's reasons for it; and indeed, without a more perfect knowledge than we now probably can have of the Saxon pronunciation, they seem totally inexplicable. In the few lines which I think it necessary to quote here as a specimen of the metre, I shall venture (first begging Ormin's pardon for disregarding his injunction) to leave out the superfluous letters; and I shall also, for my ease as well as that of the reader, transcribe them in modern characters."—*Essay on the Language and Versification of Chaucer*.

 5 gewyldan ne mihte. And symle, dæges and nihtes, he  
 wæs on byrgenum, and on muntum, hrymende, and hine  
 6 sylfne mid stanum ceorfende. Soðlice, þa he þone Hæ-  
 7 lend feorran geseah, he árn, and hyne gebæd, and my-  
 celre stemne hrymende, þus cwæð: Eala mæra Hælend,  
 Godes Sunu, hwæt ys me and þe? Ic halsige þe, þurh  
 8 God, þæt þu me ne þreage. Ða cwæð se Hælend: Eala  
 9 þu unclæna gast, gá of þysum men. Ða acsode he hine:  
 Hwæt ys þin nama? Ða cwæð he: Min nama is Legio;  
 10 forþam we manega synd. And he hine swyðe bæd, þæt  
 11 he hine of þam ríce ne nydde. Ðar wæs embe þone  
 12 munt mycel swýna heord læswigende. And þa unclænan  
 gastas hine bædon, and cwædon: Send ús on þas swýn,  
 13 þæt we on hig gán. And þa lyfde se Hælend sona; and  
 þe eodon þa unclænan gastas on þa swýn; and on my-  
 clum hryre seo heord wearð on sáe bescofen, twa þu-  
 14 sendo, and wurdon adruncene on þære sáe. Soðlice þa  
 þe hig heoldon flugon, and cyddon on þære ceastre, and  
 on lande: and hig út-eodon þæt hig gesawon hwæt þær  
 15 gedón wære. And hig comon to þam Hælende, and hig  
 gesawon þone þe mid deofle gedreht wæs, gescrydne  
 16 sittan, and hales modes; and hig him ondredon. And  
 hig rehton him, þa ðe hit gesawon, hu hit gedon wæs be  
 þam þe deofol-seocnesse hæfde, and be þam swýnum.

And hig bædon þæt he of heora gemærum ferde. Ða 17  
 he on scyp eode, hine ongan biddan, se þe ær mid deofle 18  
 gedreht wæs, þæt he mid hym wære. Him þa se Hæ- 19  
 lend ne getipode; ac he sæde him: Gá to þinum huse,  
 to þinum hífum, and cyð heom, hu mycel Dryhten ge-  
 dyde, and he gemiltsode þe. And he þa ferde, and ongan 20  
 bodian on Decapolim, hu fela se Hælend him dyde: and  
 hig ealle wundredon. And þa se Hælend eft on scype 21  
 ferde ofer þone mupan, hym com to mycel mænigeo;  
 and wæs embe þa sé. And þa com sum of heah-gesam- 22  
 nungum, Iáirus hatte; and þa he hine geseah, he astrehte  
 hine to his fótum, and hine swyþe bæd, and he cwæð: 23  
 Min dohter ys on ytemestum siþe; cum and sete þine  
 hand ofer hig, þæt heo hal sy, and lybbe. Ða ferde he 24  
 mid him; and him fyligde mycel mænigeo, and þrungon  
 hine. And þa þæt wíf þe on blodes ryne twelf winter 25  
 wæs, and fram manegum læcum fela þinga þolode, and 26  
 dælde eall þæt heo ahte, and hit naht ne fremede, ac wæs  
 þe wyrse; þa heo be þam Hælende gehyrde, heo com 27  
 wið-æftan þa mænigeo, and his reaf æthrán. Soðlice 28  
 heo cwæð: Gif ic fúrþon his reafes æthrine, ic beo hál.  
 And þa sona wearð hyre blodes ryne adruwod; and heo 29  
 on hyre gefredde, þæt heo of þam wite gehæled wæs.  
 And þa se Hælend oncneow on him sylfum, þæt him 30  
 mægen of-eode, he cwæð, bewend to þære mænigeo:  
 Hwa æthrán mine reaf? Ða cwædon his learning- 31  
 cnyhtas: Ðu gesyhst þas mænigeo þe þringende, and þu  
 cwyst: Hwa æthrán me? And þa beseah hine, þæt he 32  
 gesawe þone þe þæt dyde. Ðæt wíf þa, ondrædende and 33  
 forhtigende, com and astrehte hig beforan him, and sæde  
 him eall þæt riht. Ða cwæð se Hælend: Dohter, þin 34  
 geleafa þe hale gedyde; ga þe on sibbe, and beo of þysum  
 hal. Him þa gyt sprecendum, hig comon fram þam 35  
 heah-gesamnungum, and cwædon: Ðin dohtor ys dead;

36 hwi drest þu leng þone láreow ? Ða he gehyrde þæt  
 word, þa cwæð se Hælend : Ne ondræd þu þe, gelyf for  
 37 ân. And he ne lét hym ænig ne fyligean, buton Petrum,  
 38 and Iacobum, and Iohannem Iacobes broðer. And hig  
 comon on þæs heah-caldres hús, and he geseah mycel  
 39 gehlyd, wepende and geomrigende. And þa he in-eode  
 he cwæð : Hwi synd ge gedrefede and wepað ? nis þis  
 40 mæden dead, ac heo slæpð. Ða tældon hig hine. He  
 þa, eallum ut-adrifenum, nam þæs mædenes fæder and  
 moder, and þa þe mid him wæron, and in-eodon suwi-  
 41 ende þar þæt mæden wæs. And hyre hand nam, and  
 cwæð : Thalimtha cumi : þæt ys, on ure geþeode gereht :  
 42 Mæden, þe ic secge, arís. And heo sona arás and eode :  
 soðlice heo wæs twelf wintre. And ealle hig wundredon  
 43 mycelre wundrunge. And he hym þearle bebead, þæt  
 hig hyt nanum men ne sædon : and he het hyre etan  
 syllan.

## CHAPTER XI.

1 Ða he genealæhte Hierusalem, and Bethanía, to Oli-  
 2 uetes dune, he sende hys twegen leorning-cnyhtas, and  
 cwæð to him : Farað to þam castelle þe on gean ínc ys,  
 and gyt þær sona gemetað assan folan getigedne, ofer  
 þæne nán man gyt ne sæt ; ungetigeað hine, and to me  
 3 gelædað. And gif hwa to ínc hwæt cwyð, secgað, Ðæt  
 Drihten hæfð hys neode ; and he hine sona hyder læt.  
 4 And þa hig út-ferdon, hig gemetton þone folan úte on  
 twycinan beforan dura, getigedne : þa untigdon hig hine.  
 5 And sume þe þar stodon, þus sædon him : Hwæt do gyt  
 6 þone folan untigende ? Ða cwædon hig : Swa se Hælend  
 7 unc bead. And hi leton hig þa. Ða læddon hig þone  
 folan to þam Hælende, and hig heora reaf on-áledon ;  
 8 and he on-sæt. Manega heora reaf on þone weg streh-  
 ton ; sume þa bogas of þam treowum heowon, and

streowedon on þone weg. And þa ðe beforan eodon, and 9  
þa ðe æfter folgodon, cwædon þus: Osanná: Sy gebletsod  
se þe com on Dryhtnes naman: Sy gebletsod þæt ríce þe 10  
com ures fæder Dauides: Osanná, on heahnessum. And 11  
he eode þa on Hierosolima templ, and ealle þing he be-  
sceawode: ða æfen tima wæs, he ferde to Bethaniam, mid  
his twelf leorning-cnyhtum. And oþrum dæge, þa hig 12  
ferdon fram Bethanía, hine hingrode. Ða he feorran 13  
geseah an fictreow þe leaf hæfde, he cóm, and sohte  
hwæper he þar-on aht funde: þa he him to cóm, ne funde  
he þær buton leaf áne; soðlice hit wæs þæs fic-treowes  
tima. Ða cwæð he: Heonon-forð on ecnesse ne éte ænig 14  
man wæstm of ðe. And hys leorning-cnyhtas þæt ge-  
hyrdon. Ða comon hig eft to Hierusalem; and þa he 15  
on þæt templ eode, he ongan drifan of þam temple syl-  
lende and biggende; and mynetera þrocu, and heah-setlu  
þe ða culfran cypton he tobræc; and he ne gefafode þæt 16  
ænig man ænig fæt þurh þæt templ bære. And he þa 17  
lærende, þus cwæð to him: Nys hit awriten, þæt min  
hús fram eallum þeodum bið genemned gebed-hús? soð-  
lice ge dydon þæt to sceapena scræfe. Ða þæra sacerda 18  
ealdras and þa boceras þis gehyrdon, hig þohton hu hig  
hyne forspildon; þeh hig him ondredon hine; forþam  
eall seo mænigeo wundrode be his lāre. And þa hit 19  
æfen wæs, he eode of þære ceastre. On mergen, þa hig 20  
ferdon, hig gesawon þæt fic-treow forscruncen of þam  
wyrtruman. Ða cwæð Petrus: Lāreow, loca hu for- 21  
scranc þæt fic-treow þe þu wyrigdest. Ða cwæð se 22  
Hælend, him andswarigende: Habbað Godes truwan.  
Ic secge eow to soþe, Swa hwyle swa cwyð to þisum 23  
munte, Sig þu afyrred, and on sáe aworpen; and on his  
heortan ne tweonað, ac gelyfð; swa hwæt swa he cwyð,  
Geweorðe þis, þæt gewyrð. Forþam ic eow secge, Swa 24  
hwæt swa ge gýrnende biddað, gelyfað þæt ge hit

25 onfoð, and hit eow becymð. And þonne ge stanað eow  
 to gebiddanne, forgifað, gif gē hwæt agén ænige habbað;  
 þæt eow eower synna forgife eower heofenlica Fæder,  
 26 se þe on heofenum ys. Gyf ge ne forgyfað, ne eow  
 eower synna ne forgyfð eower Fæder, þe on heofonum  
 27 ys. Ða com he eft to Hierusalem; and þa he on þam  
 temple eode, hym to genealæhton þa heah-sacerdas, and  
 28 boceras, and ealdras, and þus cwædon: On hwylcum  
 anwealde dest þu þas þing? and hwa sealde þe þysne  
 29 anweald, þæt þu þys dō? Ða cwæð se Hælend: And ic  
 acsige eow ānre spræce; andswariað me, and ic secge  
 30 eow þonne on hwylcum anwealde ic þys dō. Hwæper  
 wæs Iohannes fulluht, þe of heofone, þe of mannum?  
 31 andswariað me. Ða pohton hi and cwædon betweox  
 32 heom: Gif we secgað, Of heofone; he secgð ús: Hwi  
 ne gelyfde ge him? Gif we secgað, Of mannum; we  
 ondrædað þis folc: ealle hig hæfdon Iohannem þæt he  
 33 wære soðlice witega. Ða andswaredon hig þam Hæ-  
 lende, and cwædon: We nyton. Ða cwæð se Hælend:  
 Ne ic eow ne secge on hwylcum anwealde ic þas ðing dō.

## LUKE, CHAPTER II.

1 Soðlice on þam dagum wæs geworden gebod fram þam  
 Casere Augusto, þæt eall ymb-hwyrft wære to-mearcod.  
 2 Deos to-mearcodnys wæs ærest geworden fram þam  
 3 deman Sýrige Ciríno. And ealle hig eodon, and syndrie  
 4 fêrdon on heora ceastre. Ða fêrde Iosep fram Galilea  
 of þære ceastre Nazareth, on Iudeisce ceastre Dauides,  
 seo ys genemned Bethléén; forþam þe he wæs of  
 5 Dauides húse and hirede: þæt he fêrde mid Marían þe  
 6 him beweddod wæs, and wæs geeacnod. Soðlice wæs  
 gewórden, þa hig þær wáeron, hyre dagas wáeron gefyl-  
 7 lede þæt heo cende. And heo cende hyre frumcennedan



Sunu, and hyne mid cild-cláþum bewánda, and hyne on  
 binne aléde; forþam þe hig næfdon rúm on cumena-huse.  
 And hyrdas wæron on þam ylean ríce waciende, and 8  
 niht-wæccan healdende ofer heora heorda. Ða stóð 9  
 Dryhtnes engel wið hig, and Godes beorhtnes hym  
 ymbe scan: and hig him myclum ege ondredon. And se 10  
 engel him to cwæð: Nelle ge eow ondráedan. Soðlice  
 nu ic eow bodie mycelne gefean, se bið eallum folce.  
 Forþam to-dæg eow ys Hælend acenned, se ys Dryhten 11  
 Crist, on Dauides ceastre. And þis tácen eow byð: Ge 12  
 gemetað án cild hræglum bewúnden, and on binne aled.  
 And þa wæs fáringa geworden mid þam engle mycelnes 13  
 heofenlices weredes, God heriendra and þus cwependra:  
 Gode sy wuldor on heahnyse, and on eorþan sybb, 14  
 mannum godes willan. And hit wæs gewórden, þa ða 15  
 englas to heofene férdon, þa hyrdas him betwynan  
 spræcon, and cwædon: Uton faran to Bethléém, and  
 geseon þæt wórd þe gewórden ys, þæt Dryhten ús  
 áetýwde. And hig efstende comon, and gemetton 16  
 Marían and Iosep, and þæt cild on binne aled. Ða hig 17  
 þæt gesáwon, þa oncneowon hig be þam wórde þe hym  
 gesæd wæs be þam cilde. And ealle ða þe gehyrdon, 18  
 wundredon be þam þe him þa hyrdas sádon. María 19  
 geheold ealle þas wórd, on hyre heortan smeagende. Ða 20  
 gewendon hám þa hyrdas, God wuldriende and heriende  
 on eallum þam ðe hig gehyrdon and gesáwon, swa to  
 him gecweden wæs. Æfter þam ðe ehta dagas gefyllede 21  
 wæron, þæt þæt cild embsnyden wære, his nama wæs  
 HÆLEND, se wæs fram engle genemned, áer he on innoðe  
 geeacnod wære. And æfter þam þe hyre clænsunge 22  
 dagas gefyllede wæron, æfter Moyses á, hig læddon hyne  
 on Hierusalem, þæt hig hyne Gode gesetton; swa swa 23  
 on Dryhtnes á awriten ys: Ðæt ælc wæpned gecýnde-  
 lím ontynende, byð Dryhtne halig genemned; and þæt 24

hig offrunge seáldon, æfter þam þe Dryhtnes æ gecweden  
 25 ys, Twa turtlan, oppe twegen culfran-briddas. And þa  
 wæs án man on Hierusalem, þæs nama wæs Simeón ;  
 and þes man wæs rihtwís, and oð Israhela frofer ge-  
 26 anbidiende : and Halig Gast him on wæs. And he  
 andsware fram þam Halgan Gaste onfeng, þæt he deað  
 27 ne gesawe, buton he ær Dryhten Crist gesawe. And  
 on Gaste he on þæt tempel cóm. And þa hys magas  
 læddon pone Hælend, þæt hig for hym æfter þære æ  
 28 gewunan dydon, he onfeng hyne mid hys handum, and  
 29 God bletsode, and cwæð, Dryhten, nu þu lætst þinne  
 30 þeow, æfter þinum worde, on sibbe : forþam míne eagan  
 31 gesawon þine hæle, ða þu gearwodest beforan ansyne  
 32 ealra folca ; leoht to þeoda awrigenesse, and to þines  
 33 folces wuldre Israhel. Ða wæs hys fæder and his  
 34 moder wundriende be þam þe be hym gesæde wæron.  
 And þa bletsode hig Simeón, and cwæð to Marían his  
 moder : Loca nu, þes ys on hryre and on æryst aset  
 manegra on Israhel ; and on tácen þam ðe wið-cweden  
 35 byð ; (and hys sweord þine sawle þurh-færð,) þæt  
 36 gepohtas sýn awrigene of manegum heortum. And  
 Anna wæs witegestre, Fanueles dohtor, of Asséres  
 mægðe : þeos wunede mænigne dæg, and heo lyfede  
 37 mid hyre were seofen gear of hyre fæmnháde ; and heo  
 wæs wuduwe oð feower and hund-cahtatig geara, seo of  
 þam temple ne gewát, dæges and nihtes þeowigende on  
 38 fæstenum and on halsungum. And þeos þære tíde be-  
 cumende, Dryhtne andette, and be him spræc eallum  
 39 þam þe ge-anbidedon Hierusalem alysednesse. And þa  
 hig ealle þing gefyldon, æfter Drihtnes æ, hig gehwurfon  
 40 on Galileam, on heora ceastre Nazareth. Soðlice þæt  
 cild weox, and wæs gestrangod wísdomes full ; and  
 41 Godes gyfu wæs on hym. And his magas férdon ælce  
 42 gere to Hierusalem, on Easter-dæges freols-tíde. And

þa he wæs twelf wintre, hy fóron to Hierusalem, to þam Easterlican freolse, æfter heora gewunan. And gefyl-<sup>43</sup> ledum dagum, þa hig ongean-gehwurfon, beláf se Hælend on Hierusalem; and hys magas þæt nyston: wendon þæt he on heora gefére wære. Ða cómon hig<sup>44</sup> ánes dæges fær, and hyne sohton betweox his magas and his cuðan. Ða hig hyne ne fundon, hig gewendon to<sup>45</sup> Hierusalem, hine secende. Ða æfter þrim dagum, hig<sup>46</sup> fundon hine on þam temple, sittende on middan þam lareowum, hlystende and hig acsigende. Ða wundredon<sup>47</sup> hig ealle þe gehyrdon be his gleawscype and his andswarum. Ða cwæð his moder to hym: Sunu, hwi dydest<sup>48</sup> þu unc þus? þin fæder and ic sarigende þe sohton. Ða<sup>49</sup> cwæð he to hym: Hwæt ys þæt gyt me sohton? nyste gyt þæt me gebyrað to beonne on þam þingum þe mines Fæder synd? Ða ne ongeaton híg þæt wórd þe he to<sup>50</sup> hym spræc. Ða ferde he mid hym, and com to Naza-<sup>51</sup> reth, and wæs hym under-þeod, and his moder geheold ealle þas wórd, on hyre heortan smeagende. And se<sup>52</sup> Hælend þeah on wísdome and on ylde, and mid gyfe Gode and mid mannum.

## JOHN, CHAPTER III.

Soðlice sum Phariseise man wæs genemned Nichodé-<sup>1</sup> mus, se wæs Iudea ealdor. Þés com to him on niht, and<sup>2</sup> cwæð to him: Rabbí (þæt is, Læreow), we witon þæt þu cóme fram Gode: ne mæg nán man þas tácn wyrcean þe ðu wyrcest, buton God beo mid him. Se Hælend him<sup>3</sup> andswarode, and cwæð; Soð ic þe secge, Buton hwa beo edniwan gecenned, ne mæg he geseon Godes ríce. Ða<sup>4</sup> cwæð Nichodémus to hym: Hu mæg man beon eft acenned, þonne he byð eald? cwyst þu mæg he eft cuman on hys moder innoð, and beon eft acenned? Se Hælend hym andswarode, and cwæð: Soð ic þe secge, Buton hwa

beo ge-edcenned of wætere and of Halgum Gaste, ne  
 6 mæg he in-faran on Godes ríce. Ðæt þe acenned is of  
 flæsce, þæt is flæsc; and þæt þe of Gaste is acenned, þæt  
 7 is gast. Ne wundra þu, forþam þe ic sæde þe, Eow ge-  
 8 byrað þæt ge beon acennede edniwan. Gast oreðað  
 þær he wile, and þu gehyrst his stefne, and þu nast  
 hwanon he cymð, ne hwyder he gæd: swa is ælc þe  
 9 acenned is of Gaste. Ða andswarode Nichodémus, and  
 10 cwæð: Hu magon þas þing þus geweorðan? Se Hælend  
 andswarode, and cwæð to him: Ðu eart láreow Israhela  
 11 folce, and þu nast þas þing? Soð ic þe secge, þæt we  
 sprecað þæt we witon, and we cyðað þæt we gesawon;  
 12 and ge ne underfoð ure cyðnesse. Gyf ic eow eorðlice  
 þing sæde, and ge ne gelyfað, humeta gelyfe ge, gif ic  
 13 eow heofenlice þing secge? And nan man ne astihð to  
 heofenum, buton seþe nyðer com of heofenum, mannes  
 14 Sunu, seþe com of heofenum. And swa Moyses þa  
 næddran úp-ahóf of þam westene, swa gebyrað þæt  
 15 mannes Sunu beo úp-aháfen; þæt nán þæra ne for-  
 weorðe þe on hyne gelyfð, ac hæbbe þæt ece líf.  
 16 God lufode middan-eard, swa þæt he sealde his án-cen-  
 nedan Sunu, þæt nán ne forweorðe þe on hine gelyfð, ac  
 17 hæbbe þæt ece líf. Ne sende God his Sunu on middan-  
 eard, þæt he demde middan-earde; ac þæt middan-eard  
 18 sy gehæled purh hine. Ne bið þam gedemed þe on hine  
 gelyfð: se þe ne gelyfð, him bið gedemed; forþan þe  
 he ne gelyfde on þone naman þæs án-cennedan Godes  
 19 Sunu. Ðæt is se dóm, þæt leoht com on middan-eard,  
 and men lufedon þystro swyðor þonne þæt leoht: heora  
 20 weorc wæron yfele. Ælc þæra þe yfele deð, hatað þæt  
 leoht; and he ne cymð to leohte, þæt his weorc ne syn  
 21 gerihlæhte. Witodlice se þe wyrceð soðfæstnysse cymð  
 to þam leohte, þæt his weorc syn geswutelode, forþam þe  
 22 hig synd on Gode gedone. Æfter þyssum com se Hæ-

lend and his leorning-cnyhtas to Iudea-lande, and  
 wunede þær mid hym, and fullode. And Iohannes ful- 23  
 lode on Enón wið Salím, forþam þe þær wæron manega  
 wætro. And hig togædere comon, and wæron gefullode.  
 Ða gyt næs Iohannes gedon on cweátern. Ða smeadon 24  
 Iohannes leorning-cnyhtas and þa Iudeas be þære clæn-  
 sunges; and comon to Iohanne, and cwædon to him: 26  
 Rabbí, se ðe mid þe wæs begeondan Iordáné, be þam þu  
 cyðdest gewitnesse, nu he fullað, and ealle hig cumað to  
 him. Iohannes andwyrde, and cwæð: Ne mæg man 27  
 nan þing underfón, buton hit beo him of heofenum ge-  
 seald. Ge sylfe me synd to gewitnesse, þæt ic sæde, 28  
 Neom ic Crist, ac ic com asend beforan hine. Se ðe 29  
 bryde hæfð, se is bryd-guma: se ðe is þæs bryd-guman  
 freond, and stent and gehýrð hyne, mid gefean he ge-  
 blissað for þæs bryd-guman stefne: þés mín gefea is ge-  
 fylled. Hit gebyraþ þæt hé weaxe, and þæt ic wanige. 30  
 Se þe ufenan cóm, se ys ofer ealle: se þe of eorþan ys, 31  
 se sprycð be eorþan: se þe of heofone cóm, se ys ofer  
 ealle. And he cyð þæt he geseah and gehyrde: and 32  
 nán man ne underfehð his cyðnesse. Soðlice se þe his 33  
 cyðnesse underfehð, he getacnað þæt God ys soðfæst-  
 nes. Se þe God sende sprycð Godes word: ne sylð 34  
 God þone Gast be gemete. Fæder lufað þone Sunu, 35  
 and sealde ealle þing on his hand. Se þe gelyfð on 36  
 Sunu, se hæfð ece líf: se þe þam Sunu is ungeleaffull,  
 ne gesyhð he líf; ac Godes yrre wunað ofer hine.

## CHAPTER XV.

Ic eom soð wín-eard, and min Fæder ys eorð-tilia. 1  
 He deð ælc twig aweg on me þe blæda ne byrð; and he 2  
 feormað ælc þæra þe blæda byrð, þæt hyt bere blæda þe  
 swiþor. Nu ge synd clæne for þære spræce þe ic to eow 3

4 spræc. Wuniað on me, and ic on eow. Swa twig ne  
 mæg blæda beran hym-sylf, buton hit wunige on win-  
 earde, swa ge ne magon eác, buton ge wunion on me.  
 5 Ic eom wín-eard, and ge synd twigu : Se þe wunað on  
 me, and ic on him, se byrð mycle blæda : forþam ge ne  
 6 magon nan þing don butan me. Gif hwa ne wunað on  
 me, he byð aworpen út swa twig, and fordruwað ; and  
 7 hig gaderiað þa, and doð on fyr, and hig forbyrnað. Gif  
 ge wuniað on me, and mine word wuniað on eow, bid-  
 8 dað swa hwæt swa ge wyllon, and hyt byð eower. On  
 þam ys min Fæder geswutelod, þæt ge beron mycle  
 9 blæda, and beon mine leorning-cnyhtas. And ic lufode  
 10 eow swa Fæder lufode me : wuniað on minre lufe. Gif  
 ge mine bebodu gehealdað, ge wuniað on minre lufe ;

## HOMILIES OF ÆLFRIC.

### DOMINICA I. IN MENSE SEPTEMBRI, QUANDO LEGITUR IOB.

MINE gebroðra, we rædað nu æt Godes ðenungum be ðan eadigan were IOB; nu wille we eow hwæt lytles be him gereccan, forðan þe seo deopnys ðære race oferstihð ure andgit, and eac swiðor þæra ungelæredra. Man sceal læwedum mannum secgan be heora andgites mæðe, swa þæt hī ne beon ðurh ða deopnysse æmode, ne þurh ða langsumnysse geæðrytte.

Sum wer wæs geseten on þam lande þe ys gehaten Hús, his nama was Iob. Se wer wæs swiþe bilewite and rihtwis and ondrædende God and forbugende yfel; him wæron acennede seofan suna and þreo dohtra; he hæfde seofon þusend sceapa and þreo þusend olfenda, fif hund getymu oxena and fif hund assan and ormæte micelne hired. Se wer wæs swiþe mære betwux eallum Easternum; and his

suna ferdon and þenode ælc oþrum mid his góðum on ymbhwyrfte æt his huse, and þær-to heora swustru gelafodon. Iob soðlice arás on þam eahteþan dæge on ærnerigen, and ofirode Gode seofonfealde lác for his seofon sunum, þylæs þe hí wið God on heora gepance agylton. Þus dyde Iob eallum dagum for his sunum and hi swa gehalgode.

Hit gelámp on sumum dæge, þaða Godes englas comon, and on his gesihþe stodon, þa wæs eac swilce se scucca him betwux. To þam cwæð Drihten, Hwanon come þu? Se sceocca andwyrde, Ic ferde geond þas eorþan and hí beeode. Drihten cwæð, Ne beheolde þu lá minne þeowan Iob, þæt nan man nis his gelica on eorþan, bilewite man and rihtwis, ondrædende God and yfel forbugende. Swa stod se deofol on Godes gesihðe, swa swa dēð se blinda on sunnan. Seo sunne ymbscindþ þone blindan, and se blinda ne gesihð þære sunnan leoman. God geseah þone deofol, and se deofol swa-þeah wæs bedæled Godes gesihðe and his wuldres. Eorþe is geweden Godes fót-sceamel, and seo heofen is his þrym-setl. Nu stod se sceocca swilce æt Godes fót-sceamele up on þære eorþan, þaða se Ælmihtiga hine axode hwanon hé come? Hé cwæð þæt hé ferde geond þas eorþan, forþan þe hé færð, swa swa Petrus se Apostol cwæð, Beoð syfre and wacole, forþan þe se deofol, eower wiperwinna, færð onbutan swa swa grymetende leo, secende hwæne hé abite; wipstandað þam strange on geleafan. Micele wæron þises mannes gearnunga, þa se Ælmihtiga be him cwæð, þæt his gelica nære on eorþan. Ge magon gehyran sume his þeawas, swa swa hé be him sylfum awrat.

Iob cwæð: Ic alydsde hrymende þearfan, and þam steop-bearne, þe buton fultume wæs, ic geheolp, and wydewan heorton ic gefrefrode. Ic wæs ymbcryd mid rihtwisnyse. Ic wæs blindum men eage, and healtum fót, and þearfena

fæder. Of flȳsum minra sceapa wæron gehlywde pearfena sidan, and ic pearfum ne forwyrnde þæs þe hī gyrndon ; ne ic ne æt ana minne hlaf buton steop-bearne, ne ic ne blissode on minum menigfealdum welum. Ne fægnode ic on mines feondes hryre, ne læg ælþeodig man wiþutan minum hegum, ac min duru geopenode symle wegferendum. Ne behydde ic mine synna, ne ic on minum bosme ne bediglode mine unrihtwisnyse. Ne sæde Iob þis for gylpe, ac forþan þe hé wæs eallum mannum to bysne geset.

Þus mærne man wolde se mánfulla deofol, þurh þam micclum costnungum þe he him to dyde, fram Gode geweman ; and cwæð to Drihtne, Ne ondræt Iob on idel God : þu ymbtrymedest hine and ealle his æhta, and his handgeweorc þu bletsodest, and his æhta weoxon on eorþan. Ac astrece hwon þine hand, and getill ealle þa þing þe hé ah, and he þe on ansyne wyrigð. Drihten cwæð to þam sceoccan, Efne nu ealle þa þing þe he ah sindon on þine handa, buton þam anum, þæt þu on him sylfum þine hand ne astrece. Ne derode Iobe naht þæs deoffles costnung, ac fremode, forþan þe he wæs fulfremedre on gepincþum and Gode near, æfter þæs sceoccan ehtnyse. Se deofol gewende þa fram Godes gesihþe, and acwealde ealle his æhta anes dæges. Sum ærend-raca com to Iobe, and cwæð, Ðine syll eodon and þa assan wið hī læswodon ; þa færllice comon Sabei, and hī ealle us benamon, and þine yrplingas ofslogon, and ic ana ætbærst, þæt ic þe þis cydde. Mid þam þe se yrpling þis sæde, þa com sum oþer, and cwæð, Fyr com færllice of heofenum, and forbærnde ealle þine scep and þa hyrdas samod, and ic ana ætwand, þæt ic þe þis cydde. Ða com se þridda ærend-raca, and cwæð, Ða Chaldeiscan comon on þrim floccum, and ure olfendas ealle gelæhton, and þa hyrdas mid swurde ofslogon ; ic ana ætfleah, þæt ic þe þis cydde. Efne þa-gyt com se feorþa

ærend-raca inn, and cwæð, ðine suna and þine dohtra æton and druncon mid heora yldestan breþer, and efne þa færllice swegde swiplic wind of þam westene, and tosloh þæt hūs æt þam feower hwemmum, þæt hit hreosende þine bearn ofþrihte and acwealde ; ic ana ætbærst, þæt ic þe þis cydde. Hwæt þa, Iob arás and totær his tunecan and his loccas forcearf, and feol to eorþan, and cwæð, Nacod ic com of minre modor innoþe, and nacod ic sceal heonan gewendan. Drihten me forgeaf þa æhta, and Drihten hí me eft benam ; swa swa him gelicode swa hit is gedon, beo his nama gebletsod. On eallum þisum pingum ne syngode Iob on his welerum, ne nan ping dyslices ongean God ne spræc. Eal þis dyde se ealda deofol to gremenne þone góðan man, and symle he læfde ænne cucenne, him to cyþenne his æhta lyre, þæt his mod wurde fram Gode awend, þaða he þa ungelimp geaxod hæfde. Þæt fyr com ufan, þe þa scep forbærnde : ac hit ne com ná of heofenum, peah þe hit swa gehíwod wære ; forþan þe se deofol næs on heofenum næfre siþþan hé þanon þurh modignysse afeol mid his gefeferum. Eall swa deð Antecrist, þonne he cymð, he asent fyr ufan, swilce of heofenum, to bepæcenne þæt earne mancynn þe he on bið ; ac wite gehwá þæt se ne mæg nan fyr of heofenum asendan, seþe on heofenum sylf cuman ne móf. On eallum þisum ðingum ne syngode Iob on his welerum. On twa wison men syngiað on heora welerum ; þæt is, gif hí unriht sprecað, oþþe riht forsuwiað ; ac Iob ne syngode on his welerum, forþan þe hé dyslice ongean God ne spræc, ne eac Godes herunge ne forsuwade : he cydde þæt he buton gytsunge swa micle æhta hæfde, þapa hé hí swa eapelice buton unrotnysse forlet. Eft siþþan, on sumum dæge, ðapa Godes englas stodon on his gesihþe, þa wæs eac se sceuca him betwynan, and Drihten him cwæð to, Hwæt lá, ne beheolde þu minne þeowan Iob, þæt his gelica nis on eorþan, and gýt he hylt his unscæððignysse. Þu astyredest

me togeanes him, þæt ic þearfleaze hine geswencte. Se scucca andwyrde, Fel sceal for felle, and swa hwæt swa man hæfð, he sylð for his life. Astrece nu þine hand, and hrepa his bân and his flæsc, þonne gesihst þu þæt he þe on ansyne wirigð. Drihten cwæð to þam scuccan, Efne he is nu on þinre handa, swa-þeah-hwæpere heald his sawle. Ne gefafode God þis to forwyrde ðam eadigan were, ac þæt hé wære to bysne eallum geleaffullum mannum, and wurde swiþor gemærsod þurh his miccle gepyld and earfoþnyssum. Ða gewende se deofol of Drihtnes gesihþe, and sloh Iob mid þære wyrstan wunde fram his hnolle ufewerdan oð his ilas neopewerde. Iob sæt þa sarlice eal on anre wunde, up on his mixene, and ascrep þone wyrms of his lice mid anum croc-scearde. His wif him cwæð to, Gyt þu þurhwunast on þinre bilewitnysses; wyrig God and swelt. Iob hire andwyrde, Ðu spræce swa swa ân stunt wif. Gif we góð underfengon of Godes handa, hwí ne sceole we eac yfel underfon? On eallum þisum þingum ne syngode Iob on his welerum. Se swicola deofol genam þæt wif him to gefylstan, þæt he þone halgan wer þurh hí beswice, swa swa he ær Adam þurh Euan beswac; ac se ylca God, þe gefafode þæt he swa gecostnod wære, heold hine wið þæs deofles syrwingum and wið his sawle lyre. Witodlice, þa geaxodon þry cyningas, þe him gesibbe wæron, eal his ungelimp, and comon him to of heora rice, þæt hí hine geneosodon. Heora naman wæron þus gecigde, Elifaz, Baldað, Sofár. Hí gecwædon þæt hí samod cumende hine geneosodon and gefrefrodon. Hí þa comon and hine ne oncneowon for þære ormætan untrumnysses, and hrymdon þærrihte wepende. Hí totæron heora reaf, and mid duste heora heafod bestreowodon, and him mid sæton manega dagas. to gefrefrigenne: þa awendon hi heora frofer to edwite, and hine mid heora wordum tirigdon, swilce hé for his synnum swa getucod wære, and cwædon, Wite com ofer þe, and þu ateorodest ; sárny's þe hrepode, and þu eart geunrotsod. Hwær is nu þin Godes ege, and þin strençð ? Hwær is þin geþyld, and þinra dæda fulfremedny's ? And mid manegum þrafungum hine geswencton. Iob cwæð, Eala gif minne synna and min yrmð, þe ic þolige, wæron awegene on anre wægan, þonne wæron hí swærran gesewene ðonne sand-corn on sé. To þreagenne ge logiað eowere spræce, and ge þencað to awendenne eowerne freond. Mannes lif is campdom ofer eorþan, and swa swa medgildan dagas, swa sind his dagas. He cwæð þæt mannes lif wære campdom ofer eorþan, forþan þe ælc þæra þe Gode gepihð bið on gewinne wið þone ungesewenlican deofol, and ongean his agenum lustum, þa hwile þe hé on life bið : and swa swa se hyrman his edleanes anbidað, swa geanbidað se gastlica cempa his edleanes æt þam Ælmihtigum Gode. Godes gecorenan sind on gewinne on þyssere worulde, and þa arleasan on hire blissiað ; ac þæra rihtwisra gewinn awent to blisse, and þæra arleasra bliss to biterum sarny'ssum on þære ecan worulde, þe gewelgað þa þolmodan. Ealle þas costnunga deofol, and þæra æhta lyre, his bearna deað, and his agen untrumny's, his wifes witleast, and his freonda edwit, ne mihton awegean Iob of his modes anrædnysse, ne fram his micclan geleafan, þe he to þam Ælmihtigan Gode symle hæfde ; ac se scucca wearð gescynd þe hine beswican wolde. Iob cwæð eft : Min flæsc is ymbscryd mid forrotodny'sse and mid dustes horwum, min hýd for-searode and is forscruncen. Me habbað geswencedny'sse dagas, and on niht min bân bið mid sarnysse þurhdyd ; and þa þe me etað ne slapað. Ic eom lame wiþmeten, and yslum and axum geanlicod. Eft he cwæð : Ic wat soþlice þæt min Alysens leofað, and ic on þam endenextan dæge

of eorþan arise, and ic beo eft mid minum felle befangen, and ic on minum flæsce God geseo, ic sylf and na oþer; þes hiht is on minum bosme geled.

We sædon eow and gyt secgað, þæt we ne magon ealle þas race eow be endebyrdnysse seegan; forþam þe seo bōc is swiðe micel, and hire digele andgyt is ofer ure mæðe to smeagenne. Ða þry cyningas ða hæfdon langsume spræce wið þone gedrehtan Iob, and gewendan him ham siþþan. Ac God hī gespræc þa, and cwæð, þæt he him eallum þrim gram wære, forþan þe hī swa rihtlice ætforan him ne spræcon, swa swa Iob his þegen. God cwæð him to, Nymað eow nu seofon fearras and seofon rammass, and farað eft ongear to minum þeowan Iobe, and geoffriað þas lác for eow; Iob soþlice min þeowa gebit for eow, and ic his ansyne underfo, þæt eow ne beo to dysig geteald, þæt ge swa rihtlice to me ne spræcon swa swa min þeowa Iob. Hit wæs gewunelic on ealdum dagum, þæt man Gode þyllice lác offrode on cucan orfe, and þa acwealde; ac seo offrung is nu unalyfedlic æfter Cristes þrowunge. Elifaz þa and Baldað and Sofār ferdon ongear to heora mæge Iobe, and didon swa swa him God bebed; and Drihten underfeng Iobes ansyne, and heora synne þurh his þingrædene forgeaf. Ðeah þe Iobes ansyn wære atelice toswollen, and his lic eal maðan weolle, swa-þeah is awriten, þæt se Ælmihtiga underfeng his ansyne, þaða hé for his freondum gebæd. Drihten eac þa gecyrde to Iobes behreowsunge, þaþa he for his magum gebæd, and hine gehælde fram eallum his untrumnyssum, and his æhta him ealle forgeald be twyfealdum. Be þisum is to understandenne þæt se þe for oðrum gebit, fremað him sylfum micclum, swa swa þæt halige gewrit segð, þæt þaða Iob for his freondum gebæd, þa gecyrde God to his behreowsunge, and swa eaðelice hine eft gehælde, swa hé hine ær geuntrumode. Iob hæfde ær his untrumnyssse seofon þusend sceapa and þreo þusend olfenda, fif hund getyme oxena



and fif hund assan ; him wæron eft forgoldene feowertyne þusend sceapa and six þusend olfenda, þusend getyme oxena and þusend assan ; and Drihten hine bletsode swiþor on ende þonne on angynne. He hæfde seofon suna and þreo dohra ær, and siððan eft eal swa fela. Hwí nolde God him forgyldan his bearn be twyfealdum, swa swa hé dyde his æhta ? Hé nolde forþi þe his bearn næron forlorene, swa swa his æhta wæron ; his æhta wæron ealle amyrrede, and his tyn bearn acwealde ; ac þa bearn wæron swa-þeah gehealdene on þam digelan life betwux halgum sawlum ; and he forþi underfeng þæra bearna getel be anfealdon, forþan þe þa oþre him wæron gehealdene, þe þurh þæs deoffles ehtnysse acwealde wæron. Hwæt þa, Iobes gebroþra and geswustru, and ealle þa þe hine ær cuþon, comon him to, and hine gefrefrodon, and his micclum wundrodon, and him gife geafon. Næron gemette on ealre eorþan swa wlitige wimmen swa swa wæron Iobes dohra. He soðlice leofode, æfter his swingle, an hund geara and feowertig geara, and geseah his bearna bearn, oð þa feorþan mægþe. On eallum his life, he leofode twa hund geara and eahta and feowertig geara. He wæs se fifta man æfter Abrahamæ þam heahfædere. On þam timan wæs swiðe langsum líf on mancyne.

Gif hwile gelæred man þas race oferræde oþpe rædan gehyre, þonne bidde ic þæt hé þas scyrtinge ne tæle : him mæg his agen andgyt seegan fullice be þisum ; and eow læwedum mannum is þis genoh, þeah ðe ge þa deopan digel-nysse þæron ne cunnon. Hit gelámp þus soðlice be Iobe, swa swa hé sylf awrát ; ac swa-þeah seo gastlice getacnung þære gerecednysse belimpð to Cristes menniscnysse, and to his gelaðunge, swa swa lareowas trahtnodon. Gif ure ænigum sum ungelimp becume, þonne sceole we beon gemyndige þises mæran weres, and geþyldige beon on þam þwyrnyssum þe ús se Ælmihtiga on besent, and habban

maran care ure sawle, þonne þære scortan gesælðe þe we sceolon forlætan.

Sy wuldor and wurðmynt þam welwylendan Scyppende ealra his wundra and his weldæda, seðe ana is God á on ecnysse. Amen.

### III. ID. MART.

#### SCI GREGORII PAPÆ URBIS ROMANÆ INCLYTI.

GREGORIUS se hálga papa, ENGLISCRE ðEODE APOSTOL, on ðisum andwerdan dæge, æfter menigfealdum gedeorfum, and halgum gecnyrdnyssum, Godes ríce gesæliglice astáh. He is rihtlice Engliscere ðeode apostol, forðan ðe he, þurh his ræd and sáude, ús fram deoffles biggengum ætbræd, and to Godes geleafan gebigde. Manega hálige béc cyðað his drohtnunge and his halige líf, and eac ‘*Historia Anglorum*,’ ða ðe Ælfred cyning of Ledene on Englisc awende. Seo béc sprecð genoh swutelice be ðisum halgan were. Nu wylle we sum ðing scortlice eow be him gereccan, forðan ðe seo foresæde béc nis eow eallum cuð, þeah ðe heo on Englisc awend sy.

Þes eadiga papa Gregorius wæs of æðelborenre mægðe and eawfæstre acenned; Romanisce witan wæron his magas; his fæder hatte Gordianus, and Felix, se eawfæsta papa, wæs his fifta fæder. He wæs, swa swa we cwædon, for worulde æðelboren, ac hé oferstáh his æðelborennysse mid halgum ðeawum, and mid góðum weorcum gegleugde. Gregorius is Grecisc nama, se swéigð on Ledenum gereorde, “*Uigilantius*,” þæt is on Englisc, “*Wacolre*.” He wæs swiðe wacol on Godes bebodum, ðaða he sylf herigendlice leofode, and hé wacollice ymbe manegra ðeoda pearfe hógode, and him lífes weig geswutelode. He wæs fram cildháde on béclicum lárum getyd, and hé on ðære lære swa gesæliglice ðeah, þæt on ealre Romana-byrig næs nán his gelica geðuht. He gecneordlæhte æfter wisra lá-

reowa gebisnungum, and næs forgytol, ac gefæstnode his lāre on fæsthāfelum gemynde. He hlōd ða mid þurstigum breoste ða flowendan lāre, ðe hé eft æfter fyrste mid hunig-swettre protan þæslice bealcette. On geonglicum gearum, ða ða his geogoð æfter gecynde woruld-ðing lufian sceolde, þa ongann hé hine sylfne to Gode geðeodan, and to eðele þæs upplican lifes mid eallum gewilnungum orðian. Witodlice æfter his fæder forðsiðe hé arærde six munuc-líf on Sicilia-lande, and þæt seofōðe binnon Romana-burh getimbrode, on ðam he sylf regollice, under abbodes hæsum drohtnode. Þa seofon mynstru he gelende mid his agenum, and genihtsumlice to dæghwomlicum bigleofan gegōdode. Þone ofer-eācan his æhta hé aspende on Godes þearfum, and ealle his woruldlican aðelborennysse to heofonlicum wuldre awende. He eode ár his gecyrrednysse geond Romanaburh mid pællenum gyrlum, and scinendum gymmum, and readum golde gefrætewod; ac æfter his gecyrrednysse he ðenode Godes ðearfum, he sylf ðearfa, mid wācum wāfelse befangen.

Swa fulfremedlice hé drohtnode on anginne his gecyrrednysse swa þæt hé mihte ða gyú beon geteald on fulfremedra halgena getele. He lufode forhæfednysse on metum, and on drenc, and wæccan on syndrigum gebedum; þær to-eacan hé ðrowade singallice untrumnyssa, and swa hé stiðlicor mid andwerdum untrumnyssum ofsett wæs, swa hé geornfullicor þæs ecan lifes gewilnode.

Þa undergeat se papa, þe on ðam timan þæt apostolice setl gesæt, hu se eadiga Gregorius on halgum mægnum ðeonde wæs, and he ða hine of ðære munuclican drohtnunge genám, and him to gefylstan gesette, on diaconhāde geendeburdne. Ða gelāmp hit, æt sumum sæle, swa swa gýt for oft deð, þæt Englisce cýpmenn brohton heora ware to Romana-byrig, and Gregorius eode be ðære stræt to ðam Engliscum mannum, heora ðing sceawigende. Þa geseah

be betwux ðam warum cýpe-cnihtas gesette, þa wæron hwites lichaman and fægere andwlitan menn, and æðellice gefexode. Gregorius ða beheold þæra cnapena wlite, and befrán of hwilcere þeode hí gebrohte wæron. Þa sæde him man þæt hí of Engla-lande wæron, and þæt ðære ðeode mennisc swa wlitig wære. Eft ða Gregorius befrán, hwæðer þæs landes fole Cristen wære ðe hæðen? Him man sæde, þæt hí hæðene wæron. Gregorius ða of innweardre heortan langsume siccetunge teah, and cwæð, Wálawá, þæt swa fægere híwes menn sindon ðamsweartandeofle underðeodde. Eft hé axode, hú ðære ðeode nama wære, þe hí of-comon? Him was geandwyrd, þæt hí Angle genemnode wæron. Þa cwæð he, Rihtlice hí sind Angle gehátene, forðan ðe hí engla wlite habbað, and swilcum gedafenað þæt hí on heofonum engla geferan beon. Gýt ða Gregorius befrán, hú ðære scíre nama wære, þe ða cnapan of-alædde wæron. Him man sæde, þæt ða scírmen wæron Dere gehátene. Gregorius andwyrd, Wel hí sind Dere gehátene, forðan ðe hí sind fram graman generode, and to Cristes mildheortnyse gecygede. Gýt ða he befrán, Hú is ðære leode cyning geháten? Him wæs geandswarod, þæt se cyning Ælle geháten wære. Hwæt ða, Gregorius gamenode mid his wordum to ðam naman, and cwæð, Hit gedafenað þæt Alleluia sy gesungen on ðam lande, to lofe þæs Ælmihtigan Scyppendes. Gregorius ða sona eode to ðam papan þæs apostolican setles, and hine bæd, þæt he Angelcynne sume láreowas asende, ðe hí to Criste gebigdon, and cwæð, þæt hé sylf gearo wære þæt weorc to gefremmenne mid Godes fultume, gif hit ðam papan swa gelicode. Þa ne mihte se papa þæt geðafian, þeah ðe hé eall wolde; forðan ðe ða Romaniscan ceaster-gewaran noldon geðafian þæt swa getogen mann, and swa geðungen láreow þa burh eallunge forlete, and swa fyrren wræcsið genáme.

Æfter ðisum gelámp þæt micel mann-cwealm becom

ofer ðære Romaniscan leode, and ærest ðone papan Pelagium gestóð, and buton yldinge adydde. Witodlice æfter ðæs papan geendunge, swa micel cwealm wearð þæs folces, þæt gehwær stodon aweste hús geond þa burh, buton bugigendum. Þa ne mihte swa-ðeah seo Romana-burh buton papan wunian, ac eal folc ðone eadigan Gregorium to ðære geðincðe anumodlice geceas, þeah ðe hé mid eallum mægne wiðerigende wære. Gregorius ða asende ænne pistol to ðam casere Mauricium, se wæs his gefædera, and hine halsode, and micclum bæd, þæt hé næfre ðam folce ne geðafode þæt he mid þæs wurðmyntes wuldre geuferod wære, forðan ðe hé ondred þæt he ðurh ðone micclan háð on woruldlicum wuldre, þe he ær awarep, æt sumum sæle bepæht wurde. Ac ðæs caseres heah-gerefa, Germanus, gelæhte ðone pistol æt Gregories ærend-racan, and hine totær; and siððan cydde þam casere, þæt þæt folc Gregorium to papan gecoren hæfde. Mauricius ða se casere þæs Gode ðancode, and hine geháðian het. Hwæt ða, Gregorius fleames cepte, and on dym-hófon ætlutode; ac hine man gelæhte, and teah to Petres cyrcan, þæt he ðær to papan gehalgod wurde. Gregorius ða ær his háðunge þæt Romanisce folc, for ðam onsigendum cwealme, ðisum wordum to bereowsunge tihte. Mine gebroðra þa leofostan, ús gedafenað þæt we Godes swingle, þe we on ær towearde ondrædan sceoldon, þæt we huru nú andwerde and afandode ondrædan. Geopenige ure sarnys ús infær soðre gecyrrednysse, and þæt wite ðe we ðrowiað tobrece ure heortan heardnysse. Efne nu ðis folc is mid swurde þæs heofonlican graman ofslegen, and gehwilce ænlipige sind mid færlicum slihte aweste. Ne seo ádl ðam deaðe ne forestæpð, ac ge geseoð þæt se sylfa deað þære ádle yldinge forhradað. Se geslagena bið mid deaðe gegripen, ærðan ðe he to heofungum soðre behreowsunge gecyrran mæge. Hógiað forði hwile se becume ætforan

gesihðe þæs strecan Dēman, seðe ne mæg þæt yfel bewépan ðe hé gefremode. Gehwilce eorð-bugigende sind ætbrodene, and heora hús standað aweste. Fæderas and modдру bestandað heora bearna líc, and heora yrfenuman him sylfum to forwyrde forestæppað. Uton eornostlice fleon to heofunge soðre dædbote, þa hwile ðe we moton, ærðan þe se færlica slege ús astrece. Uton gemunan swa hwæt swa we dweligende agylton, and uton mid wope gewitnian þæt þæt we mánfullice adrugon. Uton forhradian Godes ansyne on andetnysse, swa swa se witega ús manað. Uton ahebban ure heortan mid handum to Gode, þæt is, þæt we sceolon ða gecnyrdnysse ure bene mid gearnunge gódes weorces up-aræran. He forgifð truwan ure forhtunge, seðe þurh his witegan clypað, Nylle ic þæs synfullan deað, ac ic wille þæt hé gecyrre and lybbe.

Ne geortruwige nán man hine sylfne for his synna micelnysse: witodlice ða ealdan gyltas Niniueiscre ðeode ðreora daga bereowsung adilegode; and se gecyrreda sceaða on his deaðes cwyde þæs ecan lifes mede gearnode. Uton awendan ure heortan; hrædlice bið se Dema to urum benum gebíged, gif we fram urum ðwyrnyssum beoð gerihlæhte. Uton standan mid gemaglicum wópum ongean ðam onsigendum swurde swa miccles domes. Soðlice gemagnys is þam soðan Deman gecweme, peah ðe heo mannum unðancwurðe sy, forðan ðe se arfæsta and se mildheorta God wile þæt we mid gemáglicum benum his mildheortnysse ofgán, and hé nele swa micclum swa we gearniað ús geysian. Be ðisum hé cwæð þurh his witegan, Clypa me on dæge ðinre gedrefednysse, and ic ðe ahredde, and ðu mærsast me. God sylf is his gewita þæt he miltsian wile him to clypigendum, seðe manað þæt we him to clypian sceolon. Forði, mine gebroðra þa leofostan, uton gecuman on ðam feorðan dæge þysre wucan on ærne-merigen, and mid estfullum mode and tearum singan seofonfealde læ-

tanias, þæt se streca Dema us geárige, þonne hé gesihð þæt we sylfe ure gyltas wrecað.

Eornostlice ðaða micel menigu, ægðer ge preosthádes gemunuchádes menn, and þæt læwede folc, æfter ðæs eadigan Gregories hæse, on þone wodnes-dæg to ðam seofonfealdum letanium gecomon, to ðam swiðe awedde se foresæda cwealm, þæt hund-eahtatig manna, on ðære ánre tide fealende, of life gewiton, ða hwíle þe þæt folc ða letanias sungon. Ac se halga sacerd ne geswác þæt folc to máni-genne þæt hí ðære bene ne geswicon, oðþæt Godes milt-sung þone reðan cwealm gestilde.

Hwæt ða Gregorius, siððan hé papanhád underfeng, gemunde hwæt hé gefyrn Angel-cynne gemynte, and ðærrihte þæt luftyme weorc gefremode. He na to ðæs hwón ne mihte þone Romaniscan biscop-stól eallunge forlætan, ac hé asende oðre bydelas, geðungene Godes ðeowan, to ðysum íglande, and he sylf micclum mid his benum and tihtingum fylste, þæt ðæra bydela bodung forðgenge, and Gode wæstm bare wurde. Þæra bydela naman sind þus gecigede, AUGUSTINUS, MELLITUS, LAURENTIUS, PETERUS, IOHANNES, IUSTUS. Ðas láreowas asende se eadiga papa Gregorius, mid manegum oðrum munecum, to Angel-cynne, and hí ðisum wordum to ðære fare tihte, Ne beo ge afyrhte ðurh geswince þæs langsuman færeldes, oððe þurh yfelra manna ymbe-spræce; ac mid ealre ánrædnysse and wylme þære soðan lufe þas ongunnenan ðing þurh Godes fultum gefremmað. And wite ge þæt eower méð on ðam ecan edleane swa miccle mare bið, swa micclum swa ge mare for Godes willan swincað. Gehyrsumiað eadmodlice on eallum ðingum Augustine, þone ðe we eow to ealdre gesetton: hit fremað eowrum sawlum swa hwæt swa ge be his mynegunge gefyllað. Se Ælmihtiga God, þurh his gife, eow gescylde, and geunne me þæt ic mote eoweres geswinces wæstm on ðam ecan eðele geseon, swa þæt ic

beo gemet samod on blisse eoweres edleanes, ðeah ðe ic mid eow swincan ne mæge; forðon ðe ic wille swincan. Augustinus ða mid his geferum, þæt sind gerehte feowertig wera, ferde be Gregories hæse, oðþæt hī to ðisum íglande gesundfullice becomon.

On ðam dagum rixode Æþelbyrht cyning on Cantwarebyrig ríclíce, and his rice wæs astreht fram ðære micclan eá Humbre oð suð sæ. Augustinus hæfde genumen wealhstodas of Francena rice, swa swa Gregorius him bebead; and hé ðurh ðæra wealhstoda muð þam cyninge and his leode Godes word bobade: hu se mildheorta Hælend, mid his agenre ðrowunge þysne scyldigan middanearð alysd, and geleaffullum mannum heofonan ríces infær geopenode. Þa andwyrde se cyning Æðelbriht Augustine, and cwæð, þæt hé fægere word and behát him cydde; and cwæð, þæt hé ne mihte swa hrædlice þone ealdan gewunan ðe hé mid Angel-cynne heold forlætan; cwæð þæt hé moste freolice ða heofonlican láre his leode bodian, and þæt he him and his geferan bigleofan ðenian wolde, and forgeaf him ða wununge on Cantwarebyrig, seo wæs ealles his ríces heafod-burh.

Ongann ða Augustinus mid his munecum to geafenlæcenne þæra apostola líf, mid singalum gebedum, and wæccan, and fæstenum Gode ðeowigende, and lífes word þam ðe hī mihton bodigende, ealle middanearðlice ðing, swa swa ælfremede, forhógigende, ða þing ána þe hī to bigleofan behófedon underfonde, be ðam ðe hī tæhton sylfe lybbende, and for ðære soðfæstnysse ðe hī bodedon, gearowe wæron ehtnysse to ðoligenne, and deaðe sweltan, gif hī ðorfton.

Hwæt ða gelyfdon forwel menige, and on Godes naman gefullode wurdon, wundrigende þære bilewitnysse heora unscæððigan lífes, and swetnysse heora heofonlican láre. Ða æt nextan, gelustfullode ðam cyninge Æðelbrihte heora



clæne líf and heora wynsume behát, þa soðlice wurdon mid manegum tǣcnum geseðde; and he ða gelyfende wearð gefullod, and micclum ða cristenan gearwurðode, and swa swa heofonlice ceaster-gewaran lufode: nolde swa-ðeah nænne to cristendome geneadian; forðan ðe hé ofaxode æt ðam láreowum his hæle þæt Cristes ðeowdom ne sceal beon geneadod, ac sylfwilles. Ongunnon ða dæghwomlice forwel menige efstan to gehyrenne ða halgan bodunge, and forleton heora hæðenscipe, and hí sylfe geðeoddon Cristes gelaðunge, on hine gelyfende.

Betwux ðisum gewende Augustinus ofer sǣ to ðam ercebiscope Etherium, and hé hine gehádode Angel-cynne to ercebiscope, swa swa him Gregorius ær gewissode. Augustinus ða gehádod cyrde to his biscop-stole, and asende ærendracan to Rome, and cydde ðam eadigan Gregorie þæt Angel-cynn cristendom underfeng, and he eac mid gewritum fela ðinga befrán, hu him to drohtnigenne wære betwux ðam níg-hworfenum folce. Hwæt ða Gregorius micclum Gode ðancode mid blissigendum mode, þæt Angel-cynne swa gelumpen wæs, swa swa he sylf geornlice gewilnode, and sende eft ongean ærendracan to ðam geleaffullan cyninge Æpelbrihte, mid gewritum and menigfealdum lácum, and oðre gewritu to Augustine, mid andswarum ealra ðæra ðinga þe hé hine befrán, and hine eac ðisum wordum mánode, Broðer min se leofosta, ic wát þæt se Ælmihtiga God fela wundra þurh ðe þære ðeode ðe hé geceas geswutelað, þæs ðu miht blissigan, and eac ðe ondrædan. Þu miht blissigan gewisslice þæt ðære ðeode sawla þurh ða yttran wundra beoð getogene to ðære incundan gife. Ondræd ðe swa-ðeah þæt ðin mód ne beo aháfen mid dyrstignysse on ðam tǣcnum þe God ðurh ðe gefremað, and þu ðonon on ídelum wuldre befealle wiðinnan, þonon ðe ðu wiðutan on wurðmynte aháfen bist.

Gregorius asende eac Augustine halige lác on mæsse-

reafum, and on bōcum, and ðæra apostola and martyra reliquias samod; and bebed, þæt his æftergengan symle ðone pallium and ðone ercehād æt ðam apostolican setle Romaniscre gelaðunge feccan sceoldon. Augustinus gesette æfter ðisum biscopas of his geferum gehwilcum burgum on Engla ðeode, and hī on Godes geleafan ðeonde ðurhwunodon oð ðisum dægðerlicum dæge.

Se eadiga Gregorius gedihte manega halige traht-béc, and mid micelre gecnyrdnyse Godes folc to ðam ecan life gewissode, and fela wundra on his life geworhte, and wuldorfullice þæs papan setles geweold ðreottyne gear, and six monðas, and tyn dagas, and siððan on ðisum dæge gewát to ðam ecan setle heofenan rices, on ðam he leofað mid Gode Ælmihtigum á on ecnyse. Amen.

### XIII. KAL. APR.

#### DEPOSITIO SCĪ CUTHBERHTI EPISCOPI.

CUTHBERHTUS, se halga biscop, scinende on manegum geearnungum and healicum geðincðum, on heofonan ríce, mid þam Ælmihtigum Scyppende, on ecere blisse rixiende, wuldrað.

Beda, se snotera Engla þeoda láreow, þises halgan líf endebyrdlice, mid wunderfullum herungum, ægðer ge æfter ánfealdre gereccednyse, ge æfter leoðlicere gyd-dunge, awrát. Us sæde soðlice Beda, þæt se eadiga Cuðberhtus, þaða hé wæs eahta wintra cild, árn, swa swa him his nytenlice yld tihte, plegende mid his efen-ealdum; ac se Ælmihtiga God wolde styran þære nytennyse his gecorenan Cuðberhtes, þurh mynegunge gelimplices láreowes, and asende him to án ðry-wintre cild, þæt hit his dyslican plegan, mid stæððigum wordum, wislice þreade. Soðlice, þæt foresæde þry-wintre cild þone

gæmnigendan Cuðberhtum befrán, To hwí underpeodst þu ðe sylfne þisum ydelum plegan, þu ðe eart fram Gode gehalgod mid roderlicum wurðmynte? Ne gedafenað biscope, þæt he beo on dædum folces mannum gelíc. Geswíc, la leof, swa unpæslices plegan, and geðeod þe to Gode, þe ðe to biscope his folce geceas, þam þu scealt heofonan ríces infær geopenian. Hwæt ða, Cuðberhtus þa-gyt mid his plegan forðarn, oððæt his láreow, mid biterum tearum dreoriglice wepende, ealra þæra cildra plegan fárlice gestilde. Witodlice, eall se cildlica heap wolde þæs anes cildes dreorignyssse gefrefrian; ac híf ealle ne mihton mid heora frofre his dreorignyssse adwæscan, ærðan ðe Cuðberhtus hit mid arfæstum cossum gegladode. And he sylf siððan, æfter þæs cildes mynegunge, on healicere stæððignysse symle þurhwunode.

Æfter þisum wearð þæs eadigan Cuðberhtes cneow mid heardum geswelle alefed, swa þæt he mid criccum his feðunge underwreðode. Þa gesæt he sume dæge under sunn-beame ana on sundran, and his sceancan beðode, him com þa ridende to sum arwurðe ridda, sittende on snawhwitum horse, and he sylf mid hwitum gyrlum befangen wæs; and he þone halgan mid gesibsumum wordum swæsllice grette, biddende þæt hé him dægwistes gedafenlice tiðode. Cuðberhtus þa to ðam engle anmodlice cwæð, Ic wolde þine þenunge sylf nu gearcian, gif ic me mid feðunge ferian mihte: min ádlige cneow is yfele gehæfd, þæt ne mihte nán læce-wyrt awiht geliðian, þeah þe heo gelome to-geléd wære. Þa gelihte se cuma, and his cneow grapeode mid his halwendum handum, and het hine niman hwætene smedeman, and on meolce awyllan, and swa mid þære hætán þæt topundene lim gewriðan; and, æfter þisum wordum, his hors bestrád, on þam siðfæte þe hé þider cóm, aweg ferende. Hwæt þa, Cuðberhtus, æfter þæs engles láre, his cneow beðode, and he sona gesundfull his færeldes

breac, and ongeat þæt God, þurh his engel, hine geneosode, seðe giú ær þone blindan Tobían, þurh his heah-engel Raphahel, mihtelice onlihte.

Eft se halga Cuðberhtus, þaða hé wacode mid hyrde-mannum on felda, on his geogoðe, geseah heofonas opene, and englas gelæddon Aidanes biscopes sawle, mid micclum wuldre, in to þære heofonlican myrhðe. Hwilon eac Cuðberhtus ferde geond lánd bodigende Godes geleafan, þa for unwedere gecyrde hé to sumes hyrdes cytan, þe stóð weste on þam westene þe hé oferferde, and getígde his hors þær binnon. Þa, mid þam þe he his gebedu sang, þa tær þæt hors þæt þæc of ðære cytan hrofe, and þær feoll adúne, swilce of ðam hrofe, wearð hláf mid his syflinge. He þa geðancode Gode þære sande, and mid þære hine sylfne gereordode.

Se eadiga Cuðberhtus æfter þisum ealle woruld-þing eallunge forlet, and mid halgum þeawum hine sylfne to munuc-life geðeodde; and he hrædlice, siððan hé munuc wæs, wearð geset cumena þén, þæt he cumena huses gymde, and mynsterlicum cumum geðénsūm wære. Þa, æt sumon sæle, on wintres dæge, him com to Godes engel on cuman híwe, and Cuðberhtus hine mid ealre cumliðnyse underfeng. Þa gecyrde hé út ymbe þæs cuman þenunge, ac he ne gemette nænne cuman þaða hé inn cóm, ac lagon þry heofenlice hlafas on lilian beorhtnyse scinende, and on rosan bræde stymende, and on swæcce swettran þonne beona hunig. Þa sceawode se halga Cuðberhtus on ðam snawe gehwær, hwyder se cuma siðigende ferde, ac þaða hé nane fot-swaðe on ðam snawe ne geseah, þa ongeat hé, þæt se cuma wæs engel and na mann, seðe þone heofenlican fodan him brohte, and þæs eorðlican ne rohte.

Þes foresæda halga wer wæs gewunod þæt he wolde gán on niht to sæ, and standan on ðam sealtan brymme oð his swyran, singende his gebedu. Þa on sumere nihtehlósnode

sum oðer munuc his færeldes, and mid sleáccre stalcunge his fót-swaðum filigde, oððæt hí begen to sáe becomon. Ða dyde Cuðberhtus swa his gewuna wæs, sang his gebedu, on sáelicere yðe standende oð ðone swyran, and syððan his cneowa on ðam ceosle gebigde, astrehtum handbredum to heofenicum rodore. Efne þa comon twegen seolas of sáelicum grunde, and hí mid heora flyse his fet drygdon, and mid heora blæde his leoma beðedon, and siððan mid gebeacne his bletsunge báedon, licgende æt his fotum on fealwum ceosle. Ða Cuðberhtus þa sáelian nytenu on sund asende, mid soðre bletsunge, and on merigenlicere tide his mynster gesohte. Wearð þa se munuc micclum afyrht, and ádlig on ærne-merigen hine ge-eadmette to ðæs halgan cneowum, biddende þæt hé his ádl eallunge aflígde, and his fyrwitnyse fæderlice miltsode. Se halga þa sona andwyrde, Ic þinum gedwylde dearnunge miltsige, gif þu ða gesihðe mid swigan bediglast, oððæt min sawul heonon siðige, of andwerdum life gelaðod to heofonan. Cuðberhtus þa mid gebede his sceaweres seocnyse gehælde, and his fyrwites ganges gylt forgeaf.

Fela wundra wurdon geworhte þurh þone halgan Cuðberht, ac we wyllað for sceortnyse sume forsuwian, þy-lás þe þeos racu eow to lang þince. Witodlice Cuðberhtus ferde, swa swa his gewuna wæs, ymbe geleaffulre bodunge, þæt he þam ungelæredum folce lifes weig tæhte. Ða fleah sum earn ætforan him on siðe, and he his geferan befrínan ongann, Hwá hi to ðam dæge afedan sceolde? Ða cwæð his gefera, þæt he gefyrn smeade hwær hi bigleofan biddan sceoldon, þaða hí ða fare ferdon buton wiste. Cuðberhtus þa him togeanes cwæð, La hwæt se Ælmihtiga God mæg for eaðe unc, þurh þisne earn, ætfore sceawian, seðe giú ær Elian afedde þurh þone sweartan hremm, ær hé to heofonan siðode. Hi ða ferdon forð-siðigende, and efne se earn on ðam ófre gesæt, mid fisce geflogen, þone he þærrihte

gefeng. Ða cwæð se halga to his geferan, Yrn to ðam earne, and him of-anim þæs fisces dæl þe he gefangen hæfð, unc to gereorde. Sy lóf þam Ælmihtigan, þe unc purh þisne fugel fedan wolde. Syle swa-þeah sumne dæl þam earne, to edleane his geswinces.

Hi ða, æfter gereorde, on heora weg ferdon, and Cuðberhtus þam folce fægere bodade, þæt hī wære wæron wið deofles syrnum, þy-læs þe hē mid leasunge heora geleafan awyrde, and fram þære bodunge heora mōd abrude. Ðæt folc þa færlice ongann forð-aræsan betwux þyssere mynegunge, micclum bepæht, þæt hī þære lāre to lyt gymdon. Hwæt se swicola feond hī swiðe bedydrode, swilce þær sum hūs soðlice forburne, brastligende mid brandum, gedwymorlice swa-þeah. Ða wolde þæt folc þæt fyr adwæscan, gif hit ænig wæta wanian mihte; ac þæs halgan andwerdnys eaðelice acwencte þæs deofles dyderunge, þe hī dwollice fligdon, and þæs lifes word lythwon gymdon. Ðæt folc þa ofsceamod ongean cyrde to ðære lāre þe hī ær forleton, biddende æt ðam lāreowe liðe miltsunge, þæt hī his lāre ær to lyt gymdon, þaða he ða fræcednysse him fore sæde.

Cuðberhtus swa-þeah on oðrum timan, eall byrnende hūs ana ahredde wið fyres dare, mid halgum benum, and pone windes blæd aweg fligde, seðe ær for oft þa ættrigan flān deofficere costnunge on him sylfum adwæsete, þurh gescyldnysse soðes Drihtnes. He wolde gelome leodum bodian on fyrleum lande unforhtigende. Hwæt þa him geuðe se Ælmihtiga God fægre getingnysse þam folce to lāre, and him menn ne mihton heora mōd behydan, ac hī eadmodlice him geandetton heora digelnyssa, and elles ne dorston, and be his dihte digellice gebetton.

Sum eawfæst man eac swilce hæfde micle cyððe to ðam halgan Cuðberhte, and gelomlice his lāre breac: þa getimode his wīfe wyrs þonne hē beðorfte, þæt heo þurh wōd-

nysse micclum wæs gedreht. Ða com se eawfæsta to ðam eadigan Cuðberhte, and hé wæs on ðam timan to prafoste geset on ðam munuc-life, þe is Lindisfarnea geháten. Ða ne mihte he for sceame him openlice secgan, þæt his eawfæste wíf on ðære wódnysse læg, ac bæd þæt hé asende sumne broðer þæt hire gerihta gedón mihte, ærðan þe heo of lífe gelæd wurde. Ða wiste Cuðberhtus eal be ðam wífe, and wolde þurh hine sylfne sona hí geneosian; forðan þe heo ærðan eawfæst leofode, þeah þe se unsið hire swa gelumpe. Ða begann se wer dreorig wepan, anðracigende þæs ungelimpes. Cuðberhtus hine þa mid wordum gefrefrode, cwæð þæt se deofol þe hire derigan wolde, on his geneosunge, hí forlætan sceolde, and mid micelre fyrhte aweg fleon, and þæt wíf mid gewitte wel sprecende him togeanes gán, and his bridel onfón. Hit ða gelámp, be ðæs láreowes wordum, þæt þæt wíf gewittig hine mid wordum gegrette, bæd þæt heo moste him mete gearcian, and cydde hú se deofol hí dearnunge forlét, and swiðe forhtigende fleames cepte, þaða se halga þider siðode.

Cuðberhtus se halga siððan gefremode mihtiglice wundra, on ðam mynstre wunigende. Begánn þa on mode micclum smeagan, hu he þæs folces lóf forfleón mihte; þylæs þe hé wurde to hlísful on worulde, and þæs heofenlican lófes fremde wære. Wolde þa ánstandende ancer-líf adreogan, and on digelnysse eallunge drohtnian: ferde þa to Farne, on flowendre yðe. Þæt igland is eal beworpen mid sealtum brymme, on sǣ middan, þæt wiðinnan eall, ær ðam fyrste, mid sweartum gastum swiðe wæs afylled, swa þæt men ne mihton þa moldan bugian, for þeowracan sweartra deofla; ac hí ealle þa endemes flugon, and þæt igland eallunge rymdon þam æðelan ceman, and he þær ána wunode, orsorh heora ándan, þurh Ælmihtigne God. Ða wæs þæt igland mid ealle bedæled wæteres wynsumnysse, on ðam westum cludum, ac se halga wer þa sona

het þa heardnesse swiðe hólian, on middan þære flore his fægeran botles, and þær wæter-æddre ða wynsum aspráng, werod on swæcce, þam were to brice, seðe hwilon wæter to winlicum swæcce wundorlice awende, þaða hit wolde God.

Se halga þa het him bringan sæd, wolde on ðam westene wæstmes tilian, gif hit swa geuðe se Ælmihtiga God, þæt hé mid his fotum hine fedan moste. He seow þa hwæte on beswuncenum lande, ac hit to wæstmæ aspringan ne moste, ne furðon mid gærse growende næs. Þa het he him bringan bere to sæde, and ofer ælcne timan þa eorðan aseow. Hit weox þa mid wyne and wel gerípode. Þa woldon hremmas hine bereafian æt his gedeorfum, gif hí dorston. Þa cwæð se halga to ðam heard-nebbun, Gif se Ælmihtiga eow þises geuðe, brucað þæra wæstmæ, and me ne biddað; gif he þonne eow þises ne getiðode, gewítað aweg, wælhreowe fugelas, to eowrum eðele of ðisum iglande. Hwæt, þa hremmas þa ricene flugon ealle tosomne ofer þone sealtan brym, and se halga þa his ge-swinces breac.

Eft þa siððan oðre twegen swearte hremmas siðlice comon, and his hús tæron mid heardum bile, and to neste bæron heora briddum to hleowðe. Þas eac se eadiga mid ealle aflíge of ðam eðele mid anum worde; ac án þæra fugela eft fleogende com, ymbe þry dagas, pearle dreorig, fleah to his fotum, friðes biddende, þæt he on ðam lande lybban moste symle unscæðdig, and his gefera samod. Hwæt þa, se halga him þæs geuðe, and hí lustbære þæt land gesohton, and brohton þam láreowe lác to medes, swines rysl his scon to gedreoge, and hi þær siððan unscæðdige wunedon.

Þa wolde se halga sum hús timbrian to his nedbricum, mid his gebroðra fultume: þa bæd he hí ánre sylle, þæt he mihte þæt hús, on ða sé healfæ, mid þære underleggan. Þa gebroðra him beheton, þæt hí woldon þæt treow, þonne



hí eft comon, him gebringan. Þa comon hí, swa swa hí cwædon, and wurdon, swa-þeah, þæs treowes ungemyndige; ac se Ælmihtiga God his wæs gemyndig, and him þa sylle sylf asende mid þam sǣlicum flode, and þæt flód hí awearp þær þær hé sylf smeade þæt hús to arærenne, on ðam sealtum ofre. Þa wunode se halga wer manega gear on ðam ancerc-life swiðlice stiðe, and hine geneosodon gelóme eawfæste menn, and be his láre heora líf gerihtlæhton.

Þa com him to sum abbudysse, seo wæs Ælflæd geháten, þæs cyninges sweoster Ecgfrides; wolde, þurh his mynegungum, hire móð getrymman. Þa, betwux heora spræce, begánn heo to halsigenne þone halgan wer, þæt hé sceolde hire secgan hū lange hire broðor Ecgfridus moste his ríces brucan. Þa andwyrde hire se halga, mid twylicere spræce, and cwæð, For nahte bið geteald ánes geares lust, þær ðær se swearta deað onsigende bið. Þa undergeat heo þæt se broðer ne moste his lífes brucan ofer þam ánum geare, and þærrihte, dreoriglice wepende, hine befrán, La leof, sege me, hwá sceal to his rice fón, þonne he broðer næfð, ne he bearn ne belæfð. Þa cwæð se halga wer eft to ðam mædene, Se Ælmihtiga Scyppend hæfð gehealden sumne gecorene þyssere leode to cyninge, and se bið þe swa leof swa nu is se oðer. Þa gedyrstlæhte þæt mæden þæt heo him þa-gyt to spræc, and cwæð, Mislice smeagað manna heortan; sume wilniað geðincðe þyssere worulde, sume gefyllað heora fracedan lustas, and hí ealle syððan sorhlice wædliað. Þu forsihst þone healican wurðmynt, and þe is leofre on ðisum wacum scræfum, þonne þu on healle healic biscop sitte. Þa cwæð se witega, þæt he wurðe nære swa miccles hádes, ne ðæs heah-setles, ac, swa-þeah, nán man Godes mihte ne forflihð, on nánum heolstrum heofenan, oððe eorðan, oððe sǣ þridan. Ic gelyfe, swa-þeah, gif se Ælmihtiga me hæst þæs hádes beon, þæt ic eft mote þis

íglanđ gesecan, æfter twegra geara ymbryne, and þyses eðeles brucan. Ic bidde þe, Ælflæd, þæt þu uncre spræce on minum lífe nánum ne ameldige.

Æfter pisum wordum wearð gemót gehæfd, and Ecgfridus þær-on gesæt, and Þeodorus, þises íglanđes ercebiscop, mid manegum oðrum geðungenum witum, and híf ealle ánmodlice þone eadigan Cuðberhtum to biscope gecuron. Þa sendon híf sona gewritu mid þam ærende to ðam eadigan were; ac híf ne mihton hine of his mynstre gebringan. Þa reow se cyning sylf Ecgfridus to ðam íglanđe, and Trumwine biscop, mid oðrum eawfæstum werum, and híf þone halgan swiðe halsodon, heora cneow bigdon, and mid tearum bædon, oððæt híf hine wepende of ðam westene atugon to ðam sinoðe samod mid him; and he þone háđ be heora háese underfeng, swa swa hit gefyrn ær gesæd wæs, þurh þæs cildes múð, and þæs mæran biscopes Boisiles, þe him mid soðre witegunge his lífes endebyrdnyse sæde.

On ðam ylcan geare wearð eac ofslegen Ecgfridus, se æðela cyning, on his unsiðe, þaða he on Peohtum begánn to feohtenne to dyrstelice, ofer Drihtnes willan; and his cyfes-borena broðor siððan rixode, seðe for wisdome wende to Scottum, þæt he ælðeodig on láre geðuge. Þa wæs gefylled seo foresæde spræc, swa swa se halga wer sæde þam mædene be hire gebroðrum, ær he biscop wære. Hwæt þa, siððan se halga Cuðberhtus, Lindisfarnensiscere gelaðunge leod-biscop, mid ealre gecneordnyse his folces gymde, to geafenlæcunge þæra eadigra apostola, and híf mid singalum gebedum gescylde wið deofol, and mid halwendum myngungum to heofonan tihte; and he swa leofode swa swa he sylf lærde, and á his bodunga mid gebysnungum astealde, and eac mid wundrum wel geglengde, and mid soðre lufe symle geswette, and gemetegode mid micclum geðylde, and wæs swiðe estful on ælcere

spræce. He nolde awendan his gewunelican bigleofan, ne his gewæda, þa he on westene hæfde, ac ða stiðnyssa his stearcan bigleofan, betwux læwedum folce, on his life geheold. He wæs swiðe welig wædlum and þearfum, and sýmle him sylfum swiðe hafenleas.

Þa geworhte hé fela wundra eac binnon þam fyrste þe hé biscop wæs. Mid halgum wætere he gehælde sum wíf, anes ealdormannes éwe, fram earmlicere coðe, and heo sona gesund him sylfum þenode. Eft, on ðære ylcan tide, hé mid ele gesmyrode an liegende mæden on langsumum sare, þurh hefigtymum heafod-ece, and hire sona wæs bet. Sum eawfæst wer wæs eac yfele geháfð, and læg æt forðsiðe, his freondum orwene. Þa hæfde heora sum haligne hláf, þone se eadiga wer ær gebletsode, and he þone þærrihthe on wæter bedypte, and his ádligum mæge on ðone muð begeat, and he þærrihthe þæt ádl gestilde. Eac on oðrum timan, sum ádlig cniht færllice wearð gefeferod ætforan þam witan, þaða hé mid lare geond lánd ferde; þa bædon þa bærmen his bletsunge georne, and hé þærrihthe þone cniht arærde, swa þæt hé gesundful siðode on fotum, seðe on báre þider geboren wæs. Sum earm moder uneaðelice bær hire samcuce cild swiðe dreorig, on ðam ylcan wege þe se wita ferde; þa besargode hé þære sorhfullan meder, and geswæsliche ða hire sunu cyste; cwæð þæt hire cild gesund beon sceolde, and eal hire híwisc hælðe brucan; and þæs witegan wórd wurdon gefyllede.

Ælfæd þa eft, þæt æðele mæden, þone halgan láreow to hire gelaðode: þa gesæt hé æt mysan micclum onbryrd, he beseah to heofonum and his sex áwearp. Þa axode hine sec eadige fæmne, hwí hé swa hrædlice his gereord forlete? Þa cwæð se biscop, mid onbryrdum mode, Efnu nu ic ge-seah englas ferigan gesælige sawle of ðinum bóc-lande, to healice heofenan, mid halgum sange, and his nama þe bið arðlice gecydd on ærne-merigen, þonne ic offrige Gode þa

líflican lác on geleaffulre cyrcan. Hit wearð þa gewídmærsod, swa swa se witega cwæð, þæt hire hyrdeman, þurh holdrædene þa, sume ác astah, and his orf læswode mid treowenum helme, and he hearde feoll, gewát of worulde mid wuldre to Gode, for ðære hylde his hirdrædene. Hwá mæg æfre ealle gereccan þa mihtigan tácna þises halgan weres, hu oft hé eaðelice ádlige gehælde, and þa sweartan gastas symle aflígde, and fægra manna forðsið fore-gleaw sæde, wis þurh witegunge wisdomes gastes.

Þa wunode sum sacerd swiðe gelyfed on ancer-setle æfter his láre, and on gehwilecum geare hine geneosode, Hereberhtus geháten, hohful on mode. Cuðberhtus þa sona hine on-sundron gespræc, cwæð þæt he þa sceolde swiðlice befrínan his nyd-pearfnysse, áer his nextan dæge; cwæð þæt hé ne moste on menniscum lífe hine eft geseon, of þam andweardan dæge. Hereberhtus þa swiðe hohful wearð, and feol to his fotum, mid flowendum tearum bæd, þæt hé moste him mid siðian to heofenicum þrymme, of ðisum gewinne, swa swa hé on lífe his láre gehyrsumode. Hwæt þa, se biscop his cneowa gebigde to þissere bene, mid bliðum mode, and syððan þone sacerd sona gefrefrode; cwæð þæt him geuðe se Ælmihtiga Wealdend, þæt hí ætsomne siðian moston of ðisum earfoðnyssum, to ecere myrhðe. Hereberhtus þa hám gewende, and, on legerbedde licgende, abád þæs oðres geendunge, mid ádligum lymum.

Cuðberhtus se halga þa swiðe onette to ðam ancer-setle, þe he áer gesáet, þurh halige mynegunge mihtiges Drihtnes: wolde on ðam lande his líf geendian, þær þær hé áer lange lybbende drohtnode. And hé on ðam lande þa gelegered wearð on his torðsiðe swiðe fús to Gode, on ðam þridan geare his biscophádes, and on þisum dæge to Drihtne gewát, and Hereberhtus samod, se halga sacerd, swa swa hí on lífe áer geleornodon, þurh Godes Gast,

mid góðum willan. His líc wearð bebyrged on Lindisfarneiscre cyrcan, þær wurdon geworhte wundra forwel fela, þurh gearnungum his eadigan lífes. Þa gelicode hit þam leod-biscope, Eadberhte sylfum, his æftergengan, þæt he his lichaman up þa gelógode, on ðam endlyftan geare his geendunge. Þa wearð þæt hálige líc hál on eorðan gemét, gesundful licgende, swilce hé slæpende wære, liðebige on limum, swa swa hé geléd wæs.

Sy wuldor and lóf þam welegan Drihtne, seðe his gecorenan swa cystelice wurðað, æfter deadlicum lífe, mid him lybbende á on ecnysse ealra worulda. Amen.

## FERIA IIII.

## DE FIDE CATHOLICA.

Mannum hé sealde uprihtne gang; þa nytenu hé lét gán alotene. Mannum hé forgeaf hláf to bigleofan, and þam nytenum gærs.

Nu mage ge, gebroðru, understandan, gif ge wyllað, þæt twa þing syndon, án is Scyppend, oðer is gesceaft. Hé is Scyppend, seðe gesceop and geworhte ealle þing of nahte. Þæt is gesceaft þæt se soða Scyppend gesceop; þæt sind ærest heofonas, and englas þe on heofonum wuniað; and syððan þeos eorðe, mid eallum þam þe hire ón eardiað, and sæ, mid eallum þam þe hyre ón swymmað. Þæt fyr acenð þa beorhtnysse, ac hit ne bið næfre butan þære beorhtnysse. Se leoma is æfre of þære sunnan, and æfre mid hire, and þæs Ælmihtigan Godes Sunu is æfre of þam Fæder acenned, and æfre mid him wunigende. Be þam cwæð se apostol, þæt he wære his Fæder wuldres beorhtnys. Þære sunnan hætu gæð forð of hire and of hire leoman; and se Halga Gast gæð æfre of þam Fæder and of þam Suna gelice. Eft, se Fæder is soð Lufu, and se Sunu is soð Lufu, and se Halga Gast is soð Lufu; and hí ealle ætgædere ân God, and ân soð Lufu. Eac swilce is se Fæder Gast and halig, and se Sunu is Gast and halig, untwylice: þeah-hwæðere, se Halga Gast is synderlice gehāten Halig Gast, þæt þæt hí ealle þry sind gemænelice.

Swa micel gelicnys is on þyssere Halgan Þrynnysse, þæt se Fæder nis na māre þonne se Sunu on þære Godcund-

nysse, ne se Sunu nis na máre þonne se Halga Gást, ne nán heora án nis na læsse, þonne eall seo Þrynnys. Swa hwær swa heora án bið, þær hí beoð ealle þry, æfre án God untodæledlic. Nis heora nán máre þonne oðer, ne nán læssa þonne oðer, ne nán beforan oþrum, ne nán bæftan oþrum; forþan swa hwæt swa læsse bið þonne God, þæt ne bið na God; þæt þæt lator bið, þæt hæfð anginn; ac God næfð nán anginn. Nis na se Fæder ána Þrynnys, oððe se Sunu Þrynnys, oððe se Halga Gast Þrynnys; ac þas þry hádas sindon án God on áne Godcundnysse. Þonne þu gehýrst nemnan þone Fæder, þonne understenst þu þæt he hæfð Sunu. Eft, þonne þu cwyst Sunu, þu wást butan tweon þæt he hæfð Fæder. Eft, we gelyfað þæt se Halga Gast is ægðer ge þæs Fæder ge þæs Suna Gast.

Ne bepæce nán man hine sylfne, swa þæt he secge oððe gelyfe þæt þry Godas syndon, oððe ænig hád on þære Halgan Þrynnysse sy únmihtigra þonne oðer. Ælc þæra preora is God; þeah-hwæðere hí ealle án God; forþan þe hí ealle habbað án gecynd, and áne Godcundnysse, and áne edwiste, and án geþeagt, and án weorc, and áne mægen-þrymnysse, and gelic wuldor, and efen-ece rice. Is þeah-hwæðere se Sunu ána geflæschamod, and geboren to men of þam halgan mædene Marian. Ne wearð se Fæder mid menniscnysse befangen, ac þeah-hwæðere he asende his Sunu to ure alysednysse, and him æfre mid wæs, ægðer ge on lífe ge on þrowunge, and on his æriste, and on his upstige. Eac eal Godes gelaðung andet on þam rihtan geleafan, þæt Crist is acenned of þam clænan mædene Marian, and of þam Halgan Gaste. Nis se Halga Gast þeah-hwæðere Cristes Fæder, ne nán Cristen man þæt næfre ne sceal gelyfan; ac se Halga Gast is Willa þæs Fæder and þæs Suna: forþi þonne swiðe rihtlice is awriten on urum geleafan, þæt Cristes menniscnys wearð gefremmed þurh þone Halgan Willan.

Beheald þas sunnan mid gleawnysse, on þære is, swa we ær cwædon, hætu and beorhtnys; ac seo hætu drygð, and seo beorhtnys onlyht. Oðer þing deð seo hætu and oðer seo beorhtnys, and þeah-hwæðere hī ne magon beon to-twæmde; belimpð hwæpere-þeah seo hæþung to þære hætān, and seo onlihting belimpð to þære beorhtnysse. Swa eac Crist āna underfeng þa menniscnysse, and na se Fæder ne se Halga Gast; þeah-hwæðere hī wæron æfre mid him, on eallum his weorcum, and on ealre his fare.

We sprecað ymbe God, deaðlice be undeaðlicum, tyddre be ælmihtigum, earmingas be mildheortum; ac hwā mæg weorðfullice sprecan be þam þe is únasecgendlic. Hē is butan gemete, forþy þe hē is æghwær; hē is butan getele, forþon þe he is æfre; hē is butan hefe, forþon þe hē hylt ealle gesceafta butan geswince, and hē hī ealle gelogode on þam þrim þingum, þæt is on gemete, and on getele, and on héfe. Ac wite ge þæt nān man ne mæg fullice embe God sprecan, þonne we furðon þa gesceafta, þe hē gesceop, ne magon asmeagan ne areccan. Hwā mæg mid wordum þære heofenan freatewunge asecan? Oððe hwā þære eorðan wæstmbærnysse? Oððe hwā herað genihtsumlice ealra tida ymbhwyrft? Oððe hwā ealle oðre þing, þonne we furþon þa lichomlican þing, þe we onlociað, ne magon fullice befōn mid ure gesihðe? Efne þu gesihst þone mannan beforan þe; ac, on þære tīde þe þu his neb gesihst, þu ne gesihst na his hrieg: ealswa, gif þu sumne clað sceawast, ne miht þu hine ealne togædere geseōn, ac wenst abutan, þæt þu ealne hine geseo. Hwyle wundor is, gif se Ælmihtiga God is unasecgendlic and unbefangenlic, seðe æghwær is eall, and nawar todæled?

Nu smeað sum undeopþancol man, hu God mæge beon æghwær ætgædere, and nawar todæled: beheald þas sunnan, hu heage heo astihð, and hu heo asent hyre leoman geond ealne middangeard, and hu heo onliht ealle þas

eorðan þe mancygn on-eardað. Swa hraðe swa heo up-asprincð, on ærne-merigen, heo scinð on Hierusalem and on Rome-byrig, and on þisum earde, and on eallum eardum ætgædere; and hwæðere heo is gesceaft, and gæð be Godes dihte. Hwæt wenst þu, hu mícle swiðor is Godes anweardnys, and his miht, and his neosung æghwær? Him ne wiðstent nán þing, naper ne stænen weall, ne bryden wáh, swa swa hí wiðstandað þære sunnan. Him nis nán þing digle ne uncuð. Þu sceawast þæs mannes neb, and God sceawað his heortan. Godes Gast afandað ealra manna heortan; and þa þe on hine gelyfað, and hine lufiað, þa he clænsað and gegladað mid his neosunge; and þæra ungeleafulra manna heortan he forbyhð and onscunað.

Wite eac gehwá, þæt ælc man hæfð þreo þing on him sylfum untodæledlice and togædere wyrcente, swa swa God cwæð, þaða hé ærest man gesceop. He cwæð, Uton gewyrcean man to ure gelicnyse. And hé worhte þa Adám to his anlicnyse. On hwilcum dæle hæfð se man Godes anlicnyse on him? On þære sawle, na on þam lichaman. Þæs mannes sawl hæfð on hire gecynde þære Halgan Þrynyse anlicnyse; forþan þe heo hæfð on hire þreo þing: þæt is gemynd, and andgit, and willa. Þurh þæt gemynd, se man gepencð þa þing þe he gehyrde, oððe geseah, oððe geleornode. Þurh þæt andgit he understent ealle þa þing þe he gehyrð, oððe gesihð. Of þam willan cumað gepohtas, and word, and weorc, ægðer ge yfele ge gode. An sawl is, and án líf, and án edwist, seope hæfð þas þreo þing on hire togædere wyrcente untodæledlice; forþi þær þæt gemynd bið, þær bið þæt andgit and se willa; and æfre hí beoð togædere. Þeah-hwæðere, nis nán þæra þreora seo sawl, ac seo sawl þurh þæt gemynd gemanð, þurh þæt andgit heo understent, þurh þone willan heo wile swa hwæt swa hire licað, and heo is hwæðere án sawl and án líf.

Nu hæfð heo forþi Godes anlicnyse on hire, forþan þe heo hæfð þreo þing on hîre untodæledlice wyrrende. Is þeahhwæðere se man án man and na þrynnys. God soðlice, Fæder, and Sunu, and Halig Gast, þurhwunað on þrynnysse háda, and on ánnysse áure Godcundnyse. Nis na se man on þrynnysse wunigende, swa swa God, ac he hæfð hwæðere Godes anlicnyse on his sawle, þurh þa þreo þing þe we ær cwædon.

Arrius hatte an gedwolman, se flát wið ænne bisceop, þe wæs genemned Alexander, wís and riht-gelyfed. Þa cwæð se gedwolman, þæt Crist, Godes Sunu, ne mihte na beon his Fæder gelic, ne swa mihtig swa he; and cwæð, þæt se Fæder wære ær se Sunu, and nam bysne be mannum, hu ælc sunu bið gingra þonne se fæder on þisum life. Þa cwæð se halga bisceop Alexander him togeanes, God wæs æfre, and æfre wæs his Wisdom of him acenned, and se Wisdom is se Sunu, ealswa mihtig swa se Fæder. Þa begeat se gedwola þæs caseres fultum to his gedwylde, and cwæð gemót ongean þone bisceop, and wolde gebigan eal þæt folc to his gedwyldum. Þa wacode se bisceop áne niht on Godes cyrcan, and clypode to his Drihtne, and þus cwæð, þu, Ælmihtiga God, dém rihtne dóm betwux me and Arrium. Hi comon þa þæs on mergen to þam gemóte. Þa cwæð se gedwola to his geferum, þæt he wolde gán embe his neode forð. Þaða he to gange cóm and he gesæt, þa gewand him út eall his innewealde, æt his setle, and he sæt þær dead. Þa geswutelode God, þæt he wæs swa geámtgod on his innoðe, swa swa he wæs ær on his geleafan. He wolde dón Crist læssan þonne he is, and his godcundnyse wurðmynt wanian. Þa wearð him swa bysmorlic deað geseald, swa swa he wel wyrðe wæs.

Oþer gedwolman wæs, se hatte Sabellius. He cwæð þæt se Fæder wære, þaða he wolde, Fæder, and eft, þaða he wolde, he wære Sunu, and eft, þaða he wolde, wære

Halig Gast ; and wære forþi án God. þa forwearð eac þes gedwola, mid his gedwylde.

Nu eft þæt Iudeisce folc, þe Crist ofslogon, swa swa hé sylf wolde and gepafode, secgað þæt hí willað gelyfan on þone Fæder, and na on þone Sunu þe hyra magas ofslogon. Heora geleafa is naht, and hí forþi losiað. For ure alysednysse Crist gepafode þæt hí hine ofslogon. Hit ne mihte eal mancynn gedón, gif he sylf nolde. Ac se halga Fæder gesceop and geworhte mancyn þurh his Sunu, and he wolde eft, þurh þone ylcan, us alysan fram helle wite, þaþa we forwyrhte wæron. Butan ælcere þrowunge he mihte us habban, ac him þuhte þæt unrihtlic. Ac se deofol forwyrhte hine sylfne, þaða he tihte þæt Iudeisce folc to þæs Hælendes slege ; and we wurdon alysed, þurh his unscyl-digan deað, fram þam ecan deaðe.

We habbað þone geleafan þe Crist sylf tæhte his apostolum, and hí eallum mancynne ; and þone geleafan God hæfð mid manegum wundrum getrymmed and gefæstnod. Ærest Crist, þurh hine sylfne, dumbe and deafe, healte and blinde, wode and hreoflige gehælde, and þa deadan to lífe arærde ; syððan, þurh his apostolas and oðre halige men, þas ylcan wundra geworhte : nu eac, on urum timan, gehwær þær halige men hí restað, æt heora deadum bānum God wyrceð fela wundra ; to þi þæt he wile folces geleafan mid þam wundrum getrymman. Ne wyrceð God na þas wundra æt nānes Iudeisce mannes byrgene, ne æt nānes opres gedwolan, ac æt riht-gelyfedra manna byrgenum, þa þe gelyfdon on þa Halgan þrynnysse, and on soðe ánnysse áne Godcundnysse.

Wite gehwá eac, þæt nān man ne mot beon tuwa geful-lod ; ac gif se man æfter his fulluhte aslide, we gelyfað þæt he mæge beon gehealden, gif he his synna mid wópe behreowsað, and be láreowa tæcunge hí gebet. We sceolon gelyfan þæt ælces mannes sawul bið þurh God gesceapen ;

ac hwæpere heo ne bið na of Godes ágenum gecynde. Þæs mannes lichaman antimber bið of þam fæder and of þære meder, ac God gescypð þone lichaman of þam antimbre, and asent on þone lichaman sawle. Ne bið seo sawl nahwar wunigende áror, ac God hí gescypð þærrihthe and beset on þone lichaman, and læt hí habban ágenne cyre, swa heo syngige, swa heo synna forbuge. Þeah-hwæðere, heo behófað æfre Godes fultumes, þæt heo mæge synna forbugan, and eft to hyre Scyppende becuman, þurh góde gearnunga; forþon þe nán man ne deð butan Gode nán þing to góde.

Eac we sceolon gelyfan þæt ælc lichama, þe sawle underfeng, sceal arisan, on dómes dæg, mid þam ylean lichaman þe he nu hæfð, and sceal onfón edlean ealra his dæda; þonne habbað þa góðan ece líf mid Gode, and he sylð þa méde ælcum be his gearnungum. Ða synfullan beoð on helle-wite á ðrowigende, and heora wite bið eac gemetegod, ælcum be his gearnungum. Uton forþi gearnian þæt ece líf mid Gode, þurh þisne geleafan, and þurh góde gearnunga, seðe þurhwunað on Þrynnysse, án Ælmihtig God, áá on ecnysse. Amen.

Eft, ymbe undern dæges, eode þæs wíngeardes hláford út and gemétte opre hýrmen standende ydele on þære stræte, and hé cwæð him to,

Gað in to minum wíngearde, and ic sylle eow þæt riht bið. Hí þa eodon to his weorce be þam beháte. Ymbe midne dæg and nón-tíde, eode se híredes ealdor út, and dyde hand swa gelíce. Æt nextan twa tída ofer nóne, eode se hláford, and gemette má wyrhtan standan, and him to cwæð, Hwí stande ge hér ealne dæg æmtige? Hí andwyrdon, Forþan þe ús nán mann ne hyrde. Se hláford cwæð, Gað in to minum wíngearde. Witodlice on æfnunge cwæð se hláford to his wícne, Clypa þas wyrhtan, and agyld him heora méde; fóh on þam endenextan, oð þæt þu cume to þam fyrmestan. Þa comon þa endenextan, þe on æfnunge wæron gehyrede, and heora ælc underfeng ænne pening. Hwæt, þa fyrmestan, þe on ærne-merigen comon, wendon þa þæt hí máran méde onfón sceoldon: þa underfengon hí ænlipige penegas, swa swa þa oþre. Mine gebroðra, gelome ic eow sæde þæt heofonan ríce getácnað þas andwerdan gelaðunge; forþan þe rihtwisra manna gegaderung is gecweden heofenan ríce. Se híredes ealdor is ure Scyppend, seþe gewylt þa þe hé gesceóp, and his gecorenan on þisum middanearde geágnað, swa swa



hláford his híred on his healle. He hæfð þone wíngearð gewislice ealle þa geleaffullan gelaðunge, swa swa se witega cwæð Isaias, Soðlice Godes wíngearð is Israhela híwræden. Mid þam naman is geswutelod eal Godes folc. Be ðam wíngearde cwæð Drihten to Iudeiscre þeode, Ic secge eow þæt Godes ríce bið eow ætbroden, and bið forgyfen þære þeode þe his wæstmas wyrcað. Þyssere mildheortnysse welan besceawode se sealm-sceop, þaða hé to Gode þus clypode: Min gefylsta! Þe ic synge; forðan ðe þu, God, eart mín andfenga, mín God, and mín mildheortnys. Efne se sealm-wyrhta understód on hwilcum gedeorfum þis mennisce líf is gelogod, and forði clypode God his gefylsta. Hé gecígde Drihten his andfenga, forþan þe hé underfehð ús in to ecere reste fram þisum andweardum geswince. Hé beheold þæt God gesihð ure yfelnyssa, and ure gyltas forþyldgað: and swa-þeah hé sparað ús arfæstlice, and þurh behreowsunge to þære ecan méde gehylt. #### OTHHERE'S NARRATIVE.

OTHHERE sæde his hlaforde, Ælfrede kynincge, þæt he ealra Norðmanna norðmest bude. He cwæð þæt he bude on þæm lande norðweardum wið þa West-sæ ; he sæde peah þæt þæt land sy swyðe lang norð þanon, ac hit is eall weste, buton on feawum stowum sticcemælum wiciað Finnas on huutaðe on wintra, and on sumera on fiscoðe be



þære sá. He sáede þæt he æt sumum cyrre wolde fandian, hu lange þæt land norð-rihte læge, oððe hwæper ænig man be norðan þæm westene bude ; þa fór he norð-rihte be þæm lande, let him ealne weg þæt weste land on þæt steorbord, and þa wíð-sé on bæcbord, þry dagas : þa wæs he swa feor norð swa ða hwæl-huntan fyrrest farað. Þa fór he þa-gyt norð-ryhte swa he mihte on þæm oðrum þrim dagum gese-glian ; þa beah þæt land þær easte-ryhte, oððe sio sá in on þæt land, he nyste hwæper, buton he wiste þæt he þær bád westan windes, oððe hwón norðan, and seglede þanon east be lande, swa swa he mihte on feower dagum gese-glian ; þa sceolde he bídán ryhte norðan windes, forðan þæt land þær beah suð-rihte, oððe seo sá in on þæt land, he nyste hwæper. Þa seglede he þanon suð-rihte be lande, swa swa he mihte on fíf dagum gese-glian. Ða læg þær án mycel eá úp in þæt land ; þa cyrdon hý up in on ða eá, forðæm hý ne dorston forð be þære eá seglian for unfriðe, forþæm þæt land wæs eall gebún on oðre healfe þære eá. Ne mette he ær nán gebún land syððan he fram his ágnum hame fór ; ac him wæs ealne weg weste land on þæt steorbord, butan fiseeran and fugeleran and huntan ; and þæt wæron ealle Finnas, and him wæs á wíð-sé on þæt bæchord.

Ða Beormas hæfdon swiðe well gebún hyra land, ac hi ne dorston þær-on cuman ; ac ðara Terfinna land wæs eall weste, butan þær huntan gewicodon, oððe fisceras, oððe fugeleras. Fela spella him sædon þa Beormas, ægðer ge of hyra agenum lande ge of þæm landum<sup>a</sup> þe ymb hy utan wæron ; ac he nyste hwæt þæs soðes wæs, forþæm he hit sylf ne geseah. Þa Finnas, him þuhte, and þa Beormas spræcon neah án geðeode.

Swiðost he fór ðyder, to-eacan þæs landes sceawunge, for þæm hors-hwælum, forþæm hi habbað swyðe æðele bán on hyra toðum. Þa teð hy brohton sume þæm cyninge ;

and hyra hýd bið swiðe gód to scip-rápum. Se hwæl bið micle læsse þonne oðre hwalas, ne bið he lengra þonne syfan elna lang. Ac on his ágnum lande is se betsta hwæl-huntað; þa beoð eahta and feowertiges elna lange, and þa mæstan fiftiges elna lange; þara hé sæde þæt he syxa sum ofsloge syxtig on twám dagum. He wæs swiðe spedig man on þæm æhtum þe heora speda on beoð, þæt is, on wildeorum<sup>a</sup>: he hæfde þa-gyt, þa he þone cyning sohte, tamra deora unbeohtra syx hund. Ða deor hi hatað hránas, þara wæron syx stæl-hránas; þa beoð swyðe dyre mid Finnum, forþæm hy foð þa wildan hránas mid. He wæs mid þæm fyrstum mannum on þæm lande, næfde he þeah ma þonne twentig hryðera, and twentig sceapa, and twentig swyna; and þæt lytle þæt he erede he erede mid horsan; ac hyra ár is mæst on þæm gafole þe ða Finnas him gyldað, þæt gafol bið on deora fellum, and on fugela feðerum, and hwæles báne, and on þæm scip-rápum þe beoð of hwæles hyde geworht, and of seoles. Æghwile gylt be his gebyrdum, se byrdesta sceal gildan fiftyne mearðes fell, and fif hránes, and án beran fell, and tyn ambra feðra, and berenne kyrtel, oððe yterenne, and twegen scip-rápas, ægþer sý syxtig elna lang, oþer sý of hwæles hýde geworht, oðer of sioles.

He sæde þæt Norðmanna land wære swyðe lang and swiðe smæl. Eall þæt his man aper oððe ettan oððe erian mæg, þæt liið wið þa sée, and þæt is þeah on sumum stowum swyðe cludig, and liegað wilde moras wið eastan, and wið uppon emnlange þæm bynum lande. On þæm morum eardiað Finnas. And þæt byne land is easteward brádst, and symle swa norðor swa smælre: easteward hit mæg bion syxtig mila brád, oððe hwene brædre, and midde-ward pritig oððe brádre; and norðeward, he cwæð, þær hit smalost wære, þæt hit mihte beon þreora mila brád to

þæm more, and se mór syðþan on sumum stowum swa brád swa man mæg on twam wucum oferferan; and on sumum stowum swa brád swa man mæg on syx dagum oferferan.

Ðonne is to-emnes þæm lande suðewardum on oðre healfe þæs mores Sweoland, oþ þæt land norðward, and to-emnes þæm lande norðewardum, Cwenaland. Ða Cwenas hergiað hwilum on þa Norðmen ofer þone mór, hwilum þa Norðmen on hy. And þær sint swiðe micle meras fersce geond þa moras; and berað þa Cwenas hyra scyfu ofer land on þa meras, and þanon hergiað on þa Norðmen. Hy habbað swyðe lytle scipa, and swiðe leohte.

Ohthere sæde þæt sio scír hatte Halgoland, þe he on bude. He cwæð þæt nán man ne bude be norðan him. Þonne is án port on suðewardum þæm lande, þone man hæð Sciringes-heal, þyder he cwæð þæt man ne mihte geseglian on ánum monðe, gyf man on niht wicode, and ælce dæge hæfde ambyrne wind. And ealle þa hwile he sceal seglian be lande, and on þæt steorbord, him bið árest Isaland<sup>a</sup>, and þonne þa igland þe synd betwux Isalande<sup>a</sup> and þissum lande. Þonne is þis land oð he cymð to Sciringes-heale, and ealne weg on þæt bæcbord Norðwege. Bi wið suðan þone Sciringes-heal fylð swyðe mycel sá up in on þæt land, seo is brádre þonne ænig man oferseon mæge; and is Gotland on oðre healfe ongean, and siðða Sillende. Seo sá lið mænig hund mila up in on þæt land.

#### WULFSTAN'S NARRATIVE.

WULFSTAN'S sæde þæt he gefore of Hæðum, þæt he wære on Trúso on sýfan dagum and nihtum, þæt þæt scyp wæs ealne weg yrnende under segle. Weonodland him wæs on steorbord, and on bæcbord him wæs Langaland, and Læland, and Falster, and Scóneg, and þas land eall hýrað to Denemearcan. And þonne Burgendaland wæs ús on bæcbord; and þá habbað him-sylf cyning. Þonne æfter Burgendalande wæron ús þas land þa synd hátene, ærest Blecingég, and Meore, and Eowland, and Gotland on bæcbord, and þas land hyrað to Sweon. And Weonodland wæs ús ealne weg on steorbord oð Wisle-muðan. Seo Wisle is swyðe mycel eá, and heo tolið Witland and Weonodland; and þæt Witland belimpeð to Estum, and seo Wisle lið út of Weonodlande, and lið in Estmere; and se Estmere is huru fiftene mila brád. Þonne cymeð Ilfing eastan in Estmere, of þam mere þe Trúso standeð in staðe, and cumað út samod in Estmere Ilfing eastan of Eastlande, and Wisle suðan of Winodlande; and þonne benimð Wisle Ilfing hire naman, and ligeð of þam mere west and norð on sæ; forðy hit man hæð Wisle-muðan.

Ðæt Eastland is swyðe mycel, and þær bið swyðe manig burh, and on ælcere byrig bið cyninge, and þær bið swyðe mycel hunig and fiscað; and se cyning and þa rícostan men drincað myran meolc, and þa únspeðigan and þa þeówan drincað médo. Ðær bið swyðe mycel gewinn betweenan him, and ne bið ðær nænig ealo gebrowen mid Estum, ac þær bið médo genoh. And þær is mid Estum ðeaw, þonne þær bið man dead, þæt he lið inne unforbærned, mid his magum and freondum, monað, gehwilum twegen: and þa

kyningas and þa oðre heahðungene men swa micle lengc swa hi maran speda habbað, hwilum healf geár þæt hi beoð unforbærned, and licgað bufan eorðan on hyra husum. And ealle þa hwile þe þæt lic bið inne, þær sceal beon gedrync and plega, oð ðone dæg þe hi hine forbærnað. Þonne þy ylcan dæg hi hine to þæm áde beran wyllað, þonne to-dælað hi his feoh þæt þær to lafe bið, æfter þæm gedrynce and þæm plegan, on fíf oððe syx, hwilum on má, swa swa þæs feos andefn bið. Alecgað hit þonne forhwæga on ánre mile þone mæstan dæl fram þæm tune, þonne oðerne, þonne þæne þridan, oppe hyt eall aled bið on þære ánre mile; and sceall beón se læsta dæl nyhst þæm tune ðe se deada man on lið. Ðonne sceolon beon gesamnode ealle ða men ðe swyftoste hors habbað on þæm lande, forwhæga on fíf milum, oððe on syx milum fram þæm feo. Ðonne ærnað hy ealle toward þæm feo; ðonne cymeð se man se þæt swifte hors hafað to þæm árestan dæle and to þæm mæstan, and swa ælc æfter oðrum, oð hit bið eall genumen; and se nimð þone læstan dæl se nyhst ðæm tune ðæt feoh gearneð. And þonne rideð ælc hys weges mid ðan feoh, and hyt motan habban eall; and forðy þær beoð þa swyftan hors ungefohge dýre. And þonne his gestreon beoð þus eall aspended, þonne byrð man hine út, and forbærneð mid his wæpnum and hrægle, and swiðost ealle his speda hý forspendað mid þam langan legere þæs deadan mannes inne, and þæs þe hy be þæm wegum alecgað, þe ða fremdan to ærnað and nimað. And þæt is mid Estum þeaw, þæt þær sceal ælces geðeodes man beon forbærned; and gyf þær man án bán findeð unforbærned, hi hit sceolan miclum gebetan. And þær is mid Eastum án mægð þæt hi magon cyle gewyrcean, and þy þær licgað þa deadan men swa lange and ne fuliað, þæt hy wyrcað þone cyle hine on; and þeah man asette twegen fætels full ealað oððe wæteres, hy gedoð þæt oþer bið ofer-froren, sam hit sy summor sam winter.

## THE DEATH OF CYRUS.

CIRUS Persa cyning, þe we ær beforan sædon, þa hwile þe Sabini and Romane wunnon on þam west-dæle, þa hwile wann he, ægþer ge on Sciððige ge on Indie, oð he hæfde mæst eallne þæne east-dæl awest; and æfter þam, fyrde gelædde to Babilonia, þe þa welegre wæs þonne ænig oðer burh, ac hine Gandis seo ea lange gelette þæs ofer-færeldes, forþam þe þær scipa næron; þæt is eallra ferscra wætera mæst, butan Euftrate. Ða gebeotode án his þegenas þæt he mid sunde þa ea oferfaran wolde, mid twam tyncenum; ac hine se stream fordráf. Ða gebeotode Cyrus þæt he his þegen on hyre swa gewrecan wolde, þa he swa gram wearð on his móde, and wið þa ea gebolgen, þæt hy mihton wífmen be heora cneowe ofer-wadan, þær heo ær wæs nygan mila brád, þonne heo flede wæs. He þæt mid dædum gelæste, and hi up-forlet on feower hund ea, and on syxtig ea; and syððan mid his fyrde þær-ofer fór; and æfter þam, Euftrate þa ea, seo is mæst eallra ferscra wætera, and is yrnende ðurh middewearde Babilonian burh, he hy eac mid gedelfe on menige ea upp-forlet, and syððan, mid ealum his folce, on þære ea-gang, on þa burh farende wæs, and hy geræhte. Swa ungelyfedlic is ænigum men þæt to gesecganne, hu ænig man mihte swylce burh gewyrcean, swylce seo wæs, oððe eft abrecan.

Nembrað se ent ongan árest timbrian Babilonia, and Ninus se cyning æfter him, and Sameramis his cwén hi geendade æfter him, on middewerdum hyre ríce. Seo burh wæs getimbrad on fildum lande, and on swiðe emnum, and heo wæs swiðe fæger on to locianne, and heo is swiðe rihte feowerscyte, and þæs wealles mycelnyss and fæstnyss is ungelyfedlic to secgenne, þæt is, þæt he is i. hund elna brád, and ii. hund elna heah, and his ymbgang is hund-seofantig mila, and seofeðan dæl ánre mile, and he is geworht of tigelan and of eorð-týrewan, and ymbutan pone weall is

se mæsta dīc, on þam is yrnende se ungefotlicosta stream ; and wiðutan þam dīce is geworht twegra elna heah weall, and bufan þam maran wealle, ofer eallne þone ymbgong, he is mid stānenum wig-húsum beworht. Seo ylce burh Babylonia, seope mæst wæs and árest ealra burga, seo is nu læst and westast. Nu seo burh swyle is, þe ár wæs eallra weorca fæstast and wundorlicost and mærast, gelīce and heo wære to bysne asteald eallum middanearde, and eac swylce heo sylf sprecende sy to eallum mancynne, and cweðe, Nu ic þus gehroren eom and aweg-gewiten, hwæt ge magon on me ongitan and oncnawan, þæt ge nanuht mid eow nabbað fæstes ne stranges, þætte þurhwunian mæge.

On þam dagum þe Cirus, Persa cyng, Babylonia abræc, þa wæs Cræsus, se Liða cyning, mid fyrde gefaren Babylonium to fultume ; ac þa he wiste þæt he him on nānum fultume beón ne mihte, and þæt seo burh abrocen wæs, he him hāmweard ferde, to his ágenum rīce, and him Cirus wæs æfter-fyligende, oð he hine gefeng and ofsloh. Ond nu ure Cristene Romana besprycð þæt hyre weallas for ealdunge brosniað, nalæs na forþam þe heo mid forhergunge swa gebysmerad wære, swa Babylonia wæs, ac heo for hyre Cristendome nu gyt is gescyld, þæt ægþer ge heo sylf, ge hyre anweald, is ma hreosende for ealddome, þonne of æniges cyninges niede.

Æfter þam Cirus gelædde fyrde on Sciððie, and him þær án giong cyning mid fyrde ongean fōr, and his modor mid him, Damaris. Ða Cirus fōr ofer þæt land-gemære, ofer þa ea þe hatte Araxis, him þær se geonga cyning þæs oferfæreldes forwyrnan myhte, ac he forþam nolde, þy he mid his folce getruwade, þæt he hine beswican mihte, siððan he binnan þam gemære wære, and wic-stowe name. Ac þa Cirus geaxsode þæt hine se geonga cyning þær sæcan wolde, and eac þæt þam folce seldsyne and uncupe wæron wīnes drencaš ; he forþam of þære wic-stowe afōr, on áne

digle stowe, and þær beæftan forlet eall þæt þær liðes wæs and swetes, þæt þa se gionga cyning swiðor mycclre wénende wæs þæt hy þanon fleonde wæron, þonne hy ænigne swicdom cyþan dorstan, þa hy hit þær swa æmenne gemetton. Hy þær þa, mid mycelre bliðnesse, buton gemetgunge, þæt wín drincende wæron, oð hi heora sylfra lytel geweald hæfdon. He þa Cirus hy þær besyrode, and mid ealle ofsloh, and syððan wæs farende þær þæs cyninges modor, mid þam twam dælum þæs folces, wunigende wæs; þa he þone þridan dæl mid þam cyninge beswicen hæfde. Heo þa seo cwén Dameris mid mycelre gnornunge ymb þæs cyninges slege hyre suna þencende wæs, hu heo hit gewrecan mihte, and þæt eac mid dædum gelæste, and hyre folc on twa todælde, ægðer ge wífmén ge wæpnedmen, forðan þe þær wífmén feohtað, swa same swa wæpnedmen. Hio mid þam healfan dæle beforan þam cyninge farende wæs, swilce heo fleonde wære, oð hio hine gelædde on án mycel slæd, and se healfa dæl wæs Ciruse æfterfyligende. Þær wearð Cirus ofslegen, and twa þusend manna mid him. Seo cwén het þa þam cyninge þæt heafod of-aceorfan, and bewyrpan on áune cýlle, se wæs afýlled mannes blodes, and þus cwæð, Ðu þe þyrstende wære mannes blodes xxx. wintra, drinc nu ðine fýlle.

#### CÆSAR AND POMPEY.

ÆFTER þam þe Romeburh getimbred wæs VI. hund wintrum and LXVII., Romane gesealdon Caiuse Iulius seofon legion, to þon þæt he sceolde fíf winter winnan on Gallie. Æfter þam þe he hy oferwunnen hæfde, he fór on Brytoniæ þæt ígland, and wið þa Bryttas gefeagt, and geflymed wearð on þam lande þe man het Cent-land. Raðe þæs he gefeagt wið þa Bryttas eft on Cent-lande, and hy wurdon aflymede. Heora þridde gefeagt wæs



neah þære ea þe man hæf Temese, neah þam forða þe man hæf Welinga-ford. Æfter þam gefeohte, him eode on hand se cyning, and þa burhware þe wæron on Cyn-ceastre, and syððon ealle þe on þam iglande wæron.

Æfter þam Iulius fór to Rome, and bæd þæt him man brohte þone triumphan ongean. Þa bebudon hy him þæt he come mid feawum mannum to Rome, and ealne his fultum beaftan him lete: ac þa he hánweard fór, him coman ongean þa þry ealdormenn, þe him on fultume wæron, and him sædon, þæt hy for his þingum adræfde wæron, and eac, þæt ealle þa legian wæron Pompeiuse on fultume geseald, þe on Romane onwealde wæron, þæt he þe fæstlicre gewin mihte habban wið hine. Ða wende eft Iulius to his ágenum folce, and wepende mænde þa unáre, þe hy him, buton gewýrhton, dyde, and swiðost para manna þe for his þingum forwurdon, and he him aspeon to sippon þa seofon legian þe wæron on Silomone þam lande. Ða Pompeius, and Cato, and ealle þa senatus þæt gehyrdon, þa foran hy on Greacas, and mycelne fultum gegaderodan, and on Thraci þære dúne. Þa fór Iulius to Rome, and tobræc heora madm-hús, and eall gedælde þæt þær-inne wæs, þæt is unalyfedlic to secganne, cwæð Orosius, hwæt þæs ealles wæs. Æfter þam he fór to Samariam þam lande, and þær let þreo legian beaftan him, to þon þæt he þæt folc to him genyddon, and he sylf, mid þam oðrum dæle, fór on Ispaniæ, þær Pompeius legian wæron, mid his prim latteowum, and he hi ealle to him genydde. Æfter þam he fór on Creacaland, þær his Pompeius, on áure dúne, onbád, mid xxx. cyningan, buton his ágenum fultume. Ða fór Pompeius þær Marcellus wæs, Iuliuses ládteow, and hine ofslah mid eallum his folce. Æfter þam Iulius besæt Torquatus, Pompeiuses latteow, on ánum fæstene, and him Pompeius æfter fór; þær wearð Iulius geflymed, and his folces feala forslagen

forþam þe him man feaht on twa healfa, on oþre healfe Pompeius, on oðre healfe se latteow. Siððan fór Iulius on Thessaliam, and þær his fultum gegaderade. Ða Pompeius þæt gehyrde, þa fór he him æfter mid ungemætlicum fultume, he hæfde hund-eahtatig coortana, þæt we nu truman hatað, þæt wæs on þam dagum of hund manna and án  $\bar{m}$ . Þis eall he hæfde buton his ágenum fultume, butan Catone his geferan, and buton þara senatuses; and Iulius hæfde hund-eahtatig coortana. Heora ægðer hæfde his folc on prim heapum, and hi sylfe wæron on þam midmestan, and þa oðre on twam healfa heora. Ða Iulius hæfde ænne þæra dæla geflymed, þa clypode Pompeius him to, ymbe Romane ealde gecwydrædene, þeah þe hi sylf gelæstan ne þohte, Gefera, Gefera, gemyne þæt þu ure geferrædenne and cwydrædenne to lange ne oferbræc. Ða andwearde he him and cwæð, On sumere tíde þu wære mín gefera, and forþam þe þu nu ne eart, me is eall leofost þæt þe is laðost. Ðæt wæs seo gecwydræden þe Romane geset hæfdon, þæt heora nán oðerne on þone andwritan ne sloge þær þær hi hi æt gefeohtum gemetton. Æfter þam wordum Pompeius wearð geflymed mid eallum his folce, and he sylf siþþan oðfleah on Asiam, mid his wífe and mid his bearnum, and syððon he fór on Egyptum, and his fultumes bæd æt Ptolomeuse þam cyninge, and raðe þæs þe he to him com, he him het þæt heafud of-aceorfan, and hit syððon het Iuliose onsendan, and his hring mid; ac þa man hit to him brohte, he wæs mænende þa dæde mid miclum wópe, forðon he wæs ealra manna mildheortast on þam dagum. Æfter þam Ptolomeus gelædde fyrde wið Iuliose and eall his folc wearð geflymed, and he sylf gefangen, and ealle þa men Iulius het ofslean, þe æt þære láre wæran þæt man Pompeius ofsloh; and he swa-þeah eft forlet Ptolomeus to his ríce. Æfter þam Iulius gefeahrt wið Ptolomeus þriwa, and æt ælcon cyrre sige hæfde.

Æfter þam gefehte ealle Egypti wurdon Iuliuse underpeowas, and he him syððon hwearf to Rome, and eft sette senatus, and hine sylfne man gesette þæt he wæs hyrre þonne consul, þæt hi hetan tictator. Æfter þam he fór on Africe, æfter Catone þam consule. Ða he þæt geahsode, þa lærde he his sunu þæt he hi ongean fóre, and hine him to friðe gesohte, Forðon, cwæð he, þe ic wát þæt nán swa góð man ne leofað swa he is on þisson lífe, þeah þe he me sy se laðosta; and forðon eac ic ne mæg findan æt me sylfum þæt ic hine æfre geseo. Æfter þam worde he eode to þære burge weallum, and fleah út ofer, þæt he eall tobærst. Ac þa Iulius to þære byrig com, he him wæs swyðe uneaðe, þæt he to him cucon ne com, and þæt he swylcon deaðe swealt. Æfter þam Iulius gefeagt wið Pompeiuses genefon, and wið manige his magas, and he hi ealle ofsloh, and siððon to Rome fór, and þær wæs swa andrysne þæt him man dyde feower siþon þone triumphan, þa he háam com. Siþon he fór on Ispanie, and gefeagt wið Pompeiuses twam sunum, and þær wæs his fole swa swiðe forslagen, þæt he sume hwile wénde þæt man hine gefón sceolde, and he for þære ondrædinge þæs þe swiðor on þæt werod þrang, forþon þe him wæs leofre, þæt hine man ofsloge, þonne hine man gebunde. Æfter þam he com to Rome, and ealle þa gesetnyssa þe þær to strange wæron and to hearde, he hy ealle gedyde leohtran and liðran. Hit þa, eallum þam senatum ofþincendum and þam consulum, þæt he heora ealdan gesetnyssa tobrecan wolde, ahleopan þa ealle, and hine mid heora mét-seaxum ofsticedon, on heora gemót-erne: þara wunda wæs xxvii.

### THE STORY OF ORPHEUS.

Hit gelamp gio þætte án hear- pere wæs, on þære þeode þe Thracia hatte, sio wæs on Creca ríce ; se hearpere wæs swiðe ungefrægllice gód, þæs nama wæs Orfeus, he hæfde án swiðe ænlic wíf, sio wæs haten Eurydice. Ða ongann monn secgan be þam hearpere, þæt he mihte hearpian þæt se wudu wagode, and þa stánas hi styredon for þam swege, and wild-deor þær woldan to-irnan and standon, swilce hi tame wæron, swa stille, þeah hi men oððe hundas wið eodon, þæt hi hi na ne onscunedon. Ða sædon hi þæt ðæs hearperes wíf sceolde acwelan, and hire sawle mon sceolde lædan to helle. Ða sceolde se hearpere weorþan swa sárig, þæt he ne mihte on gemong oðrum mannum bion, ac teah to wuda, and sæt on þam muntum, ægþer ge dæges ge nihtes, weop and hearpode, þæt þa wu- das bifodon, and þa ea stodon, and nán heort ne onseunode nænne leon, ne nán hara nænne hund, ne nán neat nyste nænne ándan ne nænne ege to oðrum, for þære mirhþe þæs sones. Ða ðæm hearpere þa þuhte þæt hine þa nánnes þinges ne lyste on þisse worulde, þa þohte he þæt he wolde gesecan helle gatu, and onginnan him oleccan mid his hearpan, and biddan þæt hi him ageafan eft his wíf. Ða he ða þider com, þa sceolde cuman þære helle hund ongean hine, þæs nama wæs Ceruerus, se sceolde habban þrio heafdu, and ongan fægenian mid his steorte, and plegian wið hine for his hearpunga. Ða wæs þær eac swiðe egeslic geat-weard, þæs nama sceolde beon Caron, se hæfde eac þrio heafdu, and se wæs swiðe oreald. Ða ongan se hearpere hine bid- dan, þæt he hine gemundbyrde þa hwíle þe he þær wære, and hine gesundne eft þanon brohte. Þa gehet he him þæt, forþæm he wæs oflyst þæs seldcupan sones. Ða eode he furðor oð he gemette þa graman gydena þe folcisce men hatað Parcas, þa hi secgað þæt on nánum men nyton

nāne āre, ac ælcum menn wrecan be his gewyrhtum; þa hi secgað þæt wealdan ælces monnes wyrde. Þa ongann he biddan hiora miltse; þa ongunnon hi wepan mid him. Ða eode he furþor, and him urnon ealle hellwaran ongean, and læddon hine to hiora cyninge, and ongunnon ealle sprecan mid him, and biddan þæs þe he bæd. And þæt unstillu hweol þe Ixion wæs to-gebunden, Laiuta cyning, for his scylde, þæt oðstóð for his hearpunga, and Tantalus se cyning, þe on þisse worulde ungemetlice gifre wæs, and him þær þæt ilce yfel fyligde þære gifernesse, he gestilde. And se uultor sceolde forlætan, þæt he ne slát þa lifre Tyties þæs cyninges, þe hine ær mid þy witnode; and eall hellwara witu gestildon, þa hwile þe he beforan þam cyninge hearpode. Ða he ða lange and lange hearpode, þa clipode se hellwarana cyning, and cwæð, Uton agifan þæm esne his wíf, forþam he hi hæfð geearnod mid his hearpunga. Bebead him þa, þæt he geara wiste, þæt hine næfre underbæc ne besawe, siþþan he þononweard wære, and sæde, gif he hine underbæc besawe, þæt he sceolde forlætan þæt wíf. Ac þa lufe mon mæg swiðe uneape forbeodan; wei la wei! hwæt Orfeus þa lædde his wíf mid him, oððe he com on þæt gemære leohtes and þeostro; þa eode þæt wíf æfter him. Ða he forð on þæt leoht com, þa beseah he hine underbæc wið þæs wífes; þa losede heo him sona. Ðas leasan spell lærað gehwílcne man, þara ðe wilnað helle piostra to fionne, and to þæs soþan Godes lichte to cumenne, þæt he hine ne besio to his ealdum yfelum, swa þæt he hi eft swa fullice fullfremme, swa he hi ær dyde; forþam swa hwa swa, mid fullon willan, his móð went to þam yflum þe he ær forlet, and hi þonne fulfremeð, and he him þonne fullice liciað, and he hi næfre forlætan ne þencð, þonne forlyst he eall his ærran góð, buton he hit eft gebete.

## THE STORY OF ULYSSES.

HIT gebyrede gio on Troiana gewinne þæt þær wæs án cyning þæs nama Aulixes, se hæfde twa þioda under þam kasere. Þa ðioda wæron hatene Iðacige and Retie; and þæs kaseres nama wæs Agamemnon. Ðase Aulixes mid þam kasere to þam gefiohte for, þa hæfde he sume hundred scipa. Ða wæron hi sume ten gear on þam gewinne, þa se cyning eft hám cerde from þam kasere, and hi þæt land hæfdon gewunnen; þa næfde he na má scipa þonne án, þæt wæs þeah þre-reþre. Þa gestóð hine heah weder and storm sáe, wearð þa fordrifen on án iglond út on þære Wendel-sæ; þa wæs þær Apollines dohtor, Iobes suna, se Iob wæs hiora cyning, and licette þæt he sceolde bion se hehsta god, and þæt dysige folc him gelyfde, forþam ðe he wæs cyne-cynnes, and hi nyston nænne oþerne god on þæne timan, buton hiora cyningas hi weorþodon for godas. Ða sceolde þæs Iobes fæder bion eac god, þæs nama wæs Saturnus, and his swa ilce æl cine hi hæfdon for god<sup>a</sup>. Þa wæs hiora án se Apollinus, þe we ær ymb-spræcon. Þæs Apollines dohtor sceolde bion gydene, þære nama wæs Kirke; sio hi sædon sceolde bion swiðe drycraeftigu, and sio wunode on þam iglande, þe se cyning on fordrifen wearð, þe we ær ymb-spræcon. Hio hæfde þær swiðe micle werode hire þegna, and eac oðerra mædena. Sona swa hio geseah þone fordrifenan cyning, ðe we ær ymb-spræcon þæs nama wæs Aulixes, þa ongan hio hine lufian, and hiora ægþer oðerne swiðe ungemetlice, swa þætte he for hire lufan forlet his ríce eall, and his cynren, and wunode mid hire oð þone first þæt his ðegnas him ne mihton leng mid gewunian; ac for hiora eardes lufan, and for þære wrace, tihodon hine to forlætanne. Ða ongunnon lease men wyrcean spell, and sædon þæt hio sceolde mid hire drycraeft þa men

WITH AN ACCOUNT OF THE POET CÆDMON.

WÆS ymb syx hund wintra and hund-eahtatig from þære Dryhtenlican menniscnesse, þætte seo ærfeste Cristes þeowe, Hild, Abbudisse þæs mynstres þe is cweden

Streoneshalh, swa swa we beforan sædon, æfter monigum heofonlicum dædum ðe heo on eorþan dyde, to onfonne þæs heofonlican lifes mede, and heo of eorþan alædded, leorde, þy fifteorþan dæge kalendarum Decembrium, mid þy heo hæfde syx and syxtig wintra, þæm wintrum to-dældum efenlice dæle: þreo and þrittig þa árestan heo æpellice gefylde in weoruldháde drohtiende, and efen feolo þa æfter-fylgendan heo æpelicor in munuc-life Drihtne gehalgade. Wæs heo eac swylce æpele in weoruldgebyrdum, þæt heo wæs Edwines þæs cyninges nefan dohtor, se wæs Hereric haten; mid þy cyninge he to bodunge, and to láre þære eadegan gemynde Paulinus, þæs árestan biscepes Norþan-hymbra, Cristes geleafan and geryno onfeng, and þone unwemme geheold, oðþæt þe he gearnode þæt he to his gesihðe becom.

Ða gehet heo þa Godes þeowas to hyre, þa þe on þam ylcan mynstre wæron, and heo þa-gyt hi mánode and lærde, þæt hi betweoh him heoldon and eallum Godes mannum sibbe and lufan, and betweoh þa word hyre trymnesse and láre, heo bliðe deað geseah ; and gen soðre, þæt ic Drihtnes wordum sprece, þæt heo of deaðe ferde to life.

Ða wæs on þære sylfan nihte, þæt se Ælmihtiga Drihten hyre forðfore on oþrum mynstre fyr gesettum, þæt heo þy ylcan geara éar getimbrade, and is nemned Haconos, mid sweotolre gesyhðe, wæs geeaðmodad to onwrienne. Wæs on þam sylfan mynstre sum haligu nunne þære nama wæs Beguswyð, seo wæs Dryhtne gehalgad on clænum mægþháde, má þonne þritig wintra ; and heo þær on munucháde Dryhtne þeowade. Ða was heo restende on sweostra slæperne, þa gehyrde heo semninga on þære lyfte uppcundne sweg, and hleoþor clucggan þære hi gewunedon to gebedum gecigde and awehte beon, þonne heora hwylc of worulde gefered wæs. Ða geseah heo, openum eágum, þæs þe hyre þuhte, of þæs huses hrofe ufan micel leoht cuman, and eall þæt hús gefyllde. Ða heo þa on þæt leoht behydilice locade, and hit georne beheold, þa geseah heo þære forespre-

cenan Godes þeowe saule, Hilde þære abbudissan, on þam sylfan leohte, engla weredum gelædendum, to heofonum úp-geborene beón.

Mid ðy heo þa þy slæpe tobræd, þa geseah heo oþre sweostor ymb hi restende, þa onget heo, ge on þam swefne ge on hyre modes gesyhðe, hire ætywed beón þæt heo geseah; and heo sona arás, mid micle ege afyrhted, and arn to þære fæmnan, þe þa þæs mynstres abbudysse wæs, Hylde geongra, þære nama wæs Freogyð, and heo mid wópe and mid tearum wæs swiðe geondgoten, and longe sweorettunge wæs teonde; and hire sægde, ealra heora moder Hilde abbudissan þa of weorolde geleoran, and, hyre geseondre, mid micle leohte and mid engla preatum, to þæm ecan leohte heofona ríces wuldres, and to gemanan þara uplicra ceaster-werena astigan. Ða heo þa þæt gehyrde, þa awehte heo ealle þa sweostor, and het to cyrcan gán, and in gebedum and on sealm-songe for heora modor sawle georne þingedon. Ða hie þæt þa georne dydon þa lafe þære nihte tíde, þa comon, swiðe éar in dagunge, sume broðor, þa þe hire forðfore sægdon from þære stowe þe heo forðfered wæs; andsweredon hie and cwædon, þæt hi þæt ilce éar wiston and ongeaton; and þy hie þa þurh endebyrdnesse þam broþrum aræhton, hu hie þas þing and hwænne hie geleornodon; and hie him sædon in hwylce tíð heo of middangearde leorde. Þa wæs gemeted þætte hire geleornes wæs in þa ylcan tíð þe hire þurh þa gesihðe ætywed wæs; ond, mid fægerre geþwærnesse þara wisena, wæs godcundlice foresewen, þæt mid þy hie hire útgong gesawon of þyssum lífe, þa þa úp hire ingong ongeton in þæt ece líf haligra sawla. mid godcundre gyfe gemæred, and geweorþad ; forþon he gewunade gerisenlice leoð wyrcean, þa þe to æfæstnesse and to árfæstnesse belumpon ; swa þætte swa hwæt swa he of godcundum stafum þurh boceras geleornade, þæt he æfter med-miclum fæce in scóp-gereorde, mid þa mæstan swétnesse and inbryrdnesse geglencde, and in Englisc gereorde wel gehwær forðbrohte ; and for his leoð-songum, monigra monna móð oft to worolde forhohnesse, and to geþeodnesse þæs heofonlican lífes onbærnde wæron. Eft he cwæð, seðe mid him sprecende wæs, Hwæðere þu meahst me singan. Cwæð he, Hwæt sceal ic singan. Cwæð he,

Sing me Frumsceaft. Ða he þa þas andsware onfeng, ða ongan he sona singan, in herenesse Godes Scyppendes, þa fers and þa word þe he næfre ne gehyrde, þara endebyrdnes þis is.

Ða com he on marne to þam tún-gerefan, seþe his ealdormon wæs, him sæde, hwylce gyfe he onfeng, and he hine sona to þære abbudyssan gelædde, and hire þæt cyðde and sægde. Þa het heo gesomnian ealle þa gelærdestan men and þa leorneras, and him andweardum het secgan þæt swefn, and þæt leoð singan, þætte eallra heora dome gecoren wære, hwæt oððe hwonon þæt cumen wære. Ða wæs him eallum gesegen, swa swa hit wæs, þæt him wære from Dryhtne sylfum heofonlic gifu forgifen. Ða rehton hie him and sægdon sum halig spell, and godcundre láre word : bebudon him þa, gif he mihte, þæt he him sum sunge, and in swinsunge leoðsonges þæt gehwyrfde. Ða he þa hæfde þa wísan onfangene, þa eode he hám to his huse, and com eft on morgen, and, þy betstan leoðe geglenged, him asong and ageaf þæt him beboden wæs.

Ða ongan seo abbudyssse clyppan and lufian þa Godes gyfe in þæm men, and heo hine þa monode and lárde, þæt

he weoroldhād forlete, and munuchāde onfenge; ond he þæt wel þafode; and heo hine in þæt mynster onfeng mid his góðum, and hine geþeodde to gesomnunge þara Godes þeowa, and het hine léran þæt getæl þæs halgan stæres and spellas; ond he eall þæt he in gehernesse geleornian mihte, mid hine gemyngade, and, swa clæne nyten eodorcende, in þæt swéteste leoð gehwyrfe, and his song and his leoð wæron swa wynsum to gehyrenne, þæt þa sylfan his láreowas æt his muðe writon and leornodon. Song he árest be mid-dangeardes gesceape, and be fruman moncynnes, and eall þæt stær Genesis, þæt is seo áreste Moises bōc, and eft be útgonge Israela folces of Ægypta londe, and be ingonge þæs gehát-londes, and be oðrum monigum spellum þæs halgan gewrites canones bōca, and be Cristes menniscnesse, and be his þrowunge, and be his up-astignesse on heofonas, and big þæs Halgan Gastes cyme, and þara apostola láre; and eft bi þam ege þæs towardan dōmes, and be fyrhto þæs tintreglican wites, and be swétnesse þæs heofonlican rīces, he monig leoð geworhte; and swylce eac oþer monig be þam godcundum fremsumnessum and dómum he geworhte. On eallum þam he geornlice gymde þæt he men atuge fram synna lufan and mán-dæda, and to lufan and to geornfullnesse awehte góðra dæda; forþon he wæs se mon swiðe æfest, and reogollicum þeodscypum eaðmodlice underþeoded; and wið þam þa ðe on oþre wísan dón woldon, he wæs mid wylme micelre ellenwóðnesse onbærned, and he forþon fægere ende his líf betynde and geendade.

Ða wundrade se þeng for hwon he þæs bæde, forþon him þuhte þæt his forðfore swa neh ne wære, dyde hwæpere swa swa he cwæð and bebead : ond mid þy he þa þær on reste eode, and he gefeonde mode sumu þing ætgædere mid him sprecende and gleowiende wæs þe þær ær inne wæron, þa wæs ofer middeniht þæt he frægn, hwæper hi ænig husel þær-inne hæfdon ? Ða andswarodon hie and cwædon, Hwilt þearf is þe husles ? Ne þínre forðfore swa neh is, nu þu þus rotlice and þus glædlice to us sprecende eart. Cwæð he eft, Berað me hwæpere husel to. Ða he hit on handa hæfde, þa fræng he, hwæper hi ealle smylte móð, and butan eallum incan, bliðe to him hæfdon ? Ða andswarodon hi ealle, and cwædon, þæt hi nænigne incan to him wistan, ac hi ealle him swiðe bliðe móde wæron, and hi wrixendlice hine bædon þæt he him eallum bliðe wære. Ða andswarode he, and cwæð, Míne broþro þa leofan, ic eom swiðe bliþmóð to eow and to eallum Godes monnum. And he swa wæs hine getrymmende mid þy heofonlican wegneste, and him oþres lífes ingang gearwade. Ða gyt he frægn, hu neh þære tíð wære, þætte þa broðor arísan sceoldon, and Godes folc léran and heora uht-sang singan ? Andswearodon hi, Nis hit feor to þon. Cwæð he, Tela, utan we wel þære tíde bidan ; and þa him gebæd, and hine gesenade mid Cristes róde-tácne, and his heafod onhylde to þam bolstre, and med-mycel fæc onslæpte, and swa mid stillnesse his líf geendade. Ond swa wæs geworden, þætte swa swa he hluttere móde and bylewite and smyltre willsumnesse Drihtne þeowde, þæt he eac swylce swa smylte deaðe middangeard wæs forlætende, and to his gesyhðe becom. And seo tunge þe swa monig halwende word on þæs Scyppendes lóf gesette, he þa swylce eac þa ytemestan word on his herenesse, hine sylfne

seniende, and his gast in his handa bebeodende, betynde. Eac swylce þæt is gesegen <sup>a</sup>, þæt he wære gewis his sylfes forðfore, of þam þe we nu secgan hyrdon.

Þa wurdon heo on spece, oððet Dunstan rehte be S̄co Eadmundo, swa swa Eadmundes swyrd-boræ hit ræhte Æpelstan kynges, þaða Dunstan geunc mon wæs, and þe sweord-boræ wæs forealdod mon. Ða sette ðe munuc alle þas gerecednysse on anebóc, and eft, þaða ðeo bóc com to us, binnon feawum gearum, þa awende we hit on Englisc, swa swa hit her æfter stont. Þe munuc

þa Abbo, binnon twam gearum, wende hām to mynstre, and wearð þa to abbode iset on þam ylcan mynstre.

Eadmund, þe ædigæ East-Englæ kyng, wæs snoter and wurðful, and wurðode symle mid æpele ðeawum þone Almihtigæ God. He wæs eadmod and ipuncgen, and swa anræde purhwunede, þæt he nolde bugæn to bimerfulle leahtræ, ne on nane healfe he ne ahydde his þeawæs, ac wæs symle mundig þare soþan lufe. Gyf þu eart to heofod-men iset, ne ahæfe þu ðe, ac beo betweox monnum swa swa an mon of him. He wæs cystig wædlum and wydewum, swa swa fæder, and mid wæl-willendnesse wissode his fole simle to rihtwisnesse, and þam reðan styrede and isæligelice leofode. Hit ilamp þa æt nyxtan, þæt ða Deniscæ leodæ ferden mid scyphere, hergende and sleande wide geond lond, swa swa heoræ wune is. On þam floten wæron ða fyrstan heafodmen, Hinguar and Hubba, geanlæhte purh deofel, and heo on Norðhumbrelond gelændon mid æscum, and wæsten þæt lond and ða leoden ofslogen. Ða wende Hinguar east mid his scypum, and Hubba belaf on Norðhumbrelande, wunnum sige mid wælreownesse. Hinguar bicom þa to East-Englum rowende, on þam geare þe Ælfred æpeling an and twentig geara wæs, þe þe Wæst Seaxene king syððan wearð mære. And þe fore-sæde Hinguar færlice, swa swa wulf, to londe bistalcode, and þe leodæ sloh, weræs and wif, and þa unwittige child, and to bysmere tucode þa bilewite cristene. He sende þa syððan sona to þam kynge beotlice ærende, þæt he bugon sceolde to his monrædene, gif he his feores rohte. Ðe ærendracæ com þa to Eadmunde kynge, and Hinguares ærende him heardlice abead: “Hinguar ure kyng, kene and sigefest on sæ and on londe, hæfð felæpeodæ iwæld, and com nu mid ferde ferlice her to lande, þæt he her winter-selt mid his werode hadde. Nu hæf he þe dælen þine diglan goldhordæs, and þine ældrynæ streon hærlice wið hine, þæt þu beo his under-kyng, gif þu cwyc

beon wult, forþan ðe ðu næfst þa mihte, þæt ðu mage him wiðstandæn." Hwæt þa, Eadmund kyng clypede ænne biscop, þe him þa hendest wæs, and wið hine smeade, hu he þam reðan Hinguare berstan sceolde. Þa forhtede þe biscop for þam færlice gelimpe, and for þæs kynges life, and cwæð, þæt him ræd þuhte, þæt he to þam abuge, þe Hinguar him bead. Ða swywode þe kyng, and biseah to þare eorðan, and cwæð þa æt nyhstan kynelice him to : "Eala, þu biscop, to bysmere beoð itawode þæs earman lond leodæ, and me nu leofre were, þæt ic on feohte feolle, wið þam ðe min folc moste heoræ eardes brucæn." And þe biscop cwæð : "Eala, þu leofe kyng, þin folc liþ ofslagen, and þu næfst þonne fultume, þæt ðu feohten mage, and þas flotmen cumæð, and ðe cwicne bindæþ, buten þu mid fleame þine feore burge, oððe þu ðe swa burge þæt ðu buge to him." Ða cwæð Eadmund kyng, swa swa he ful kene wæs : "Þæs ic wilnige and wisce mid mode, þæt ic ane ne bileafe æfter mine leofum þægnum, þe on heoræ beddum wurdon, mid bearnum and wifum, ferlice ofslagene from þisse flotmonnum. Næs me næfre iwunelic þæt ic wrohte fleames, ac ic wolde swiðor swelton, gif ic þyrft, for mine agene earde, and þe Almihtigæ God wat þæt ic nylle bugan from his bigengum æfre, ne from his soðan lufe, swelte ic libbe ic." Æfter þissum wordum, he wende to þam ærendracan ðe Hinguar to him sende, and sæde him unforht : "Witodlice þu wære nu weorðe slæges, ac ic nelle fylæn mine clæne handæn on þine fule blode, forþam ðe ic folgige Criste, þe us swa bisnode; ac ic bliþelice wyll beon ofslagen þurh eow, gif hit God foresceawæð. Fare nu swiðe ræpe, and sæge þine ræpum laforde, ne buhþ nefre Eadmund Hinguare on life, hæþene heretogæn, buton he to Hælende Criste ærest mid geleafan on þisse lond buge." Ða wende þe erendracæ heardlice awæg, and imette þone wælreowan Hinguare mid alle his ferde fuse to Eadmunde, and sæde

þam arleasum hu him iandswæred wæs. Hinguar bead þa mid bealde þam scyp-hera, and þæt heo þæs kynges anes alle cepan sceoldon, þe his here forseah, and hine sone bindæn.

Hwæt þa, Eadmund kyng, mid þam ðe Hinguar com, stod innan his halle, þæs Hælendes imyndig, and awearp his wepnæ, wolde efenlæcen Cristes gebisnungum, þe forbead Petrum mid wæpnum to feohten wið þa wælreowan Iudeiscan. Hwæt þa, þa arleasan Eadmundum bundon, and bysmoreden hyxlice, and beoten mid sahlum, and swa syððan læddon þonne ileaffulne kyng to ane eorðfestum treowe, and tegdon hine ðærto, mid hearde bendum, and hine eft swungon longlice mid swipum, and he symle clypode, betweox þam swincglum, mid soþan ileafan, to Hælende Criste; and þa hæpene þa, for his ileafe, wurdon þa swyðe yrre, forþam ðe he clypode Crist him to fultume: heo scytæn þa mid gaelocum him togeanes, oððet he all wæs biset mid heoræ scotungum, swylce yles burstæ, swa swa Sebastianus wæs. Ða iseah Hinguar, þe arlease flotmon, þæt þe ædele kyng nolde Criste wiðsacen, ac mid andræde ileafe hine æfre clypode, hæf hine þa bihæfdian, and þa hæpenan swa dyden. Betweox þam þe he clypode to Criste þa-gyt, þa tugon þa hæpene þone halgan to slæge, and, mid ane swencge, slogon him of þæt hæfod, and sawlæ siðode isælig to Criste. Þær wæs sum mon gehende ihealden, þurh Gode behydd þam hæpenum, þe ðis iherde all, and hit æft sæde, swa swa we sæcgæð hit her. Hwæt þa, ðe flot-hera ferde þa eft to scipe, and behyddon þæt heafod þæs halgan Eadmundes on þam ðiccum bremlum, þæt hit biburged ne wurðe. Þa æfter fyrste, syððan heo ifarene wæron, com þæt lond-folc to, þe þær to lafe þa wæs, þær heoræ lafordes lic buton heafde þa læg, and wurdon swiðe sarig for his slægie on mode, and hure þæt heo næfdon þæt heafod to þam bodige. Þa sæde ðe sceawere, þe hit ær iseah, þæt þa flotmen hæfdon þæt heafod mid heom, and wæs him



iþuht, swa swa hit wæs ful soð, þæt heo hydden þæt heofod on þam holte. For-hwæga heo eoden þa endemes alle to þam wude, sæcende gehwær, geond þyfelas and brymelas, gif heo mihten imeten þæt heafod. Wæs eac mycel wunder þæt an wulf wæs isend, þurh Godes willunge, to biwærigenne þæt heafod, wið þa oðre deor, ofer dæg and niht. Heo eoden ða sæcende and cleopigende, swa swa hit iwunelic is þæt ða þe on wude gaþ oft: "Hwær eart þu nu, gerefa? <sup>a</sup>" And him andswyrde þæt heafod: "Her, her, her." And swa ilome clypode andswarigende, oððet heo alle bicomen, þurh þa clypunge, him to. Þa læg þe grægæ wulf þe bewiste þæt heafod, ant mid his twam fotum hæfde þæt heafod biclypped, gredig and hungrig, and for Gode ne dyrste þæs hæfdes onburigen, ac heold hit wið deor. Ða wurdon heo ofwundroden þæs wulfes hordrædene, and þæt halige heafod ham feroðen mid heom, þankende þam Almihtigan alre his wundræ. Ac þe wulf fologede forð mid þam heafde, oððet heo on tune comen, swylce he tome wære, and wende æft syþþan to wude ongean. Ða londleodan þa syððan lægdan þæt heafod to þam halige bodige, and burigdon, swa swa heo lihtlucost mihten on swylce rædinge, and cyrce arærdon on-uppon him. Eft þa on fyrste, æfter felæ geare, þa ðeo hergung aswac, and sib wearð igyfen þam iswæncte folce, þa fengon heo togadere, and wrohten ane circe wurðlice þam halgan, æt his burigene, æt þam bed-huse þær he iburiged wæs. Heo wolden þa ferian, mid folclice wurðmente, þone halgan lichame, and læcgen inne þære circean. Þa wæs mycel wundor þæt he wæs all hal, swylce he cwic wære, mid clænum lichame, and his sweoræ wæs ihaled, þe ær forslagen wæs; and wæs swulce an solcene ðred embe his sweoræn, monnum to swutelunge hu he ofslagen wæs. Eac swylce wundæ, þe ða wælreowan hæpenæn, mid ilome scotunge, on his lice

makedon, wæron ihealede, þurh ðone heofonlice God ; and he liþ swa ansund oð pysne andweardne dæg, abidende æristes and þæs ecen wuldres. His lichame us cyð, þe lið unforsmolsnod, þæt he buton forligre her on worulde leofoðe, and mid clæne life to Criste siðode. Sum wydewa wunede, Oswyn ihaten, on gebedum and fæstenum, monige gear syððan. Þeo walde efsian ælce gear þone sont, and his nægles ceorfæn syferlice mid lufe, and on scryne healdon to haligdome on weofode. Þa wurðode þæt lond-fole mid ileafæn þone sont to wurðmente. Ða comen on sumne sæl unsælig þeofæs eahta, on ane nihte, to þam arwurðæn halgan, and wolden stelon þa madmæs þe men ðider brohton, and cunnedon mid cræfte hu heo in-cumen mihte. Sum sloh mid slæge swyðe þa hæpsan, sum heo mid fyle feoledon abutæn, sum eac underdealf þa dure mid spade, sum heo mid læddræ wolden unlucæn þæt æh-þyrl ; ac heo swuncon on ydel, and earmlice ferdon, swa þæt þe halgæ wæs heom wunderlice bont, ælcne swa he stod strutigende mid tolæ, þæt heora nan ne mihte þæt morþ gefremman, ne heo þeonan styriæn ; ac heo stoden swa oð maregen. Men þa ðæs wundredon, hu þa weargas hangedon, sum uppon læddræ, sum leat to dælfæ, and ælc on his weorce wæs feste ibunden. Heo wurdon þa ibrohte to þam biscope alle, and he het heom ahon on heagum gealgum alle ; ac he næs na imundig hu þe mildheorte God clypode þurh his witegan þas word þe her stondæþ : Eos qui ducuntur ad mortem eruere ne cesses, “ Ða þe mon læt to deape alys ut symle.” And eac þa halgan canones ihadedon forbeodæþ, ge biscopum ge preostum, to beonne embe ðeofæs, forþan þe hit ne buræð þam ðe beoð icorene Gode to þenigenne, þæt heo þwærlæcen scylon on æniges monnes deape, gif heo beoð drihtines þægnæs. Eft þaða Ðeodræd biscop, syððan he his bec sceawode, he reowsode mid geomerunge, þæt he swa ræpne dom sette

þam unsæligum þeofum, and hit bisaregede æfre, oð his lifes ende, and þa leode bead georne þæt heo him mid fæstæn fullice ðreo dagæs, biddende þone Almihtigæn God, þæt he him ariæn sceolde.

On þam londe wæs sum mon Leofstan ihaten, rice for worulde, unwittig for Gode, þe rad to þam halgan mid ricetere swyðe, and het him æteowan orhlices wyðe þone halgæ sont, hwæðer he isund wære; ac swa raðe swa he iseah þæs sontes lichame, ða awedde he sonæ, and wælreowlice grymetede, and earmlice endode yfelum deape. Ðis is þam ilic þe halga papa Gregorius, on his isetnesse [awrat] be þam halgum Laurentium, þe lið on Rome-burig, ðæt men wolden sceawian hu he læge; ac God heom gestyrde, swa þæt ðær swulton on ðare sceawunçe æne seofe men atgædere, þa swike þa oðre to sceawenne ðone martyr mid mennisce dwylde. Fela wundræ we iherdon on folclice spæce bi þam halgan Eadmundum, þe we her nyllæð on write setten, ac heom wat gehwa. On þissum halgum is swutel, ant on swylcum oðrum, þæt God Almihtig mæg þone mon aræran æft on domes dæge ansundne of eorðan, þe þe healt Eadmundne halne lichame, oð ðene myclan dæg, þeah ðe he on moldæn come. Weorðe wære ðeo stow for þam wurðfullæn halgum, þæt hire mon wæl wurðode and wælegode mid clæne Godes þeowum to Cristes ðeowdome; forþan ðe þe halgæ is mærræ þone men magon asmean. Nis Angol bidæled Drihtnes halgene, forþam on Englæ londe licgæþ swylce halgan, swylce þes halgæ king, and Chutbertus þe eadigæ, and Æpeldryþ on Elig, and eac hire swuster, ansund on lichame, geleafæn to trumunçe. Beoð eac fela oðræ on Angel-cynne, þe fela wundræ wurcæð, swa swa hit wide is cyp, ðam Almihtigan to lofe, þe heo on ilyfden. Crist sylf swytelæp monnum, þurh his mæren halgan, þæt he is Ælmihtig God, þe makæþ swylce wundræ, þeah þe ða earman Iudeiscæn hine allungæ wiðsocon, forþan þe heo

beoð awarigede, swa swa heo wiscton heom sylfum. Ne beoð nane wundrae iwrohte æt heoræ burigene, forþam þe heo ne gelyfæð on þone lyfigenden Crist; ac Crist swutelæp monnum hwær þe gode ileafæ is, þenne he swylce wundrae wurcæð, þurh his halgan, wide geond þas eorðan, þam beo wuldor and lof a mid his Heofenlice Fæder.

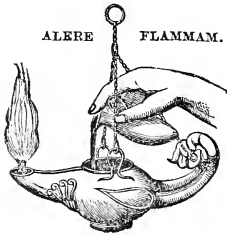
