## PREFACE.

---

THE author began collecting data for this work more than twenty years ago. His object was to obtain for himself and family a record of his ancestors and present kinsfolk. From his earliest boyhood he has always had a fondness for his relatives. Being deprived in very early life of his father, he never had the opportunity to obtain from him any information in reference to his ancestors. The author has often, however, heard his father speak with much tender affection of the latter's mother, whose death occurred when he was a mere boy, and which seemed to make a lasting impression on him. This led the author to inquire, as fully as he could, into the character and ancestry of this dear mother. In very early manhood he became an interested student of heredity, and he is a great believer in inherited traits of character; and whilst he is willing to admit that inherited traits may be greatly modified by environment, he is none the less convinced of the importance of a close study of heredity.

The author was anxious to know from whence he inherited certain traits of character of which he knew he was possessed, and which he felt were not transmitted from his mother's family or the ancestors of his surname. He had not proceeded far in this study until he discovered he was more of a *Moore* in disposition and character, in many respects, than *Passmore*, or *Brown*.

The man who says he cares nothing for his ancestors, or from whence he sprang, whether they were moral or immoral, intellectual or ignorant, cruel, crafty, miserly or otherwise, simply advertises himself as either an ignoramus or a blatant nonentity. Such a man frequently points to a person who has been successful, and as having attained eminence in the world, both for intelligence and goodness,



whose parents were anything else but worthy. This only proves that such an one has inherited from some ancestor, near or remote, such traits of character that enabled him to overcome his environments. The advantage of parents studying this subject of heredity as far remote as possible, will be apparent to any thoughtful father or mother, that they may make strenuous efforts to protect their loved ones from any especial trait which might be developed in their child.

Suppose a father has been very intemperate; his children may, by bitter experience, be led to be total abstainers. Would they not, however, be derelict in duty if they did not throw especial protection around their offspring in this particular direction? What is true of this inherited trait, is true of any others. If the author can arouse in you, his kinsfolk, a desire to study the subject of heredity, and induce you to make practical use of it, he has accomplished a lasting good for your descendants.

The more the author studied into the ancestry of his paternal grandmother, the more deeply he became interested, and finally decided to publish the work, if the kinsfolk felt sufficient interest to assist in the financial expenditure necessary.

He has devoted much time and thought to the study of this subject; it has been a pleasure to him to do so. He is very desirous that all his kindred shall have the advantage of this thought and study, who care anything for their ancestors.

He has no doubt but that there are many errors. Many correspondents were very careless in writing letters, many dates had to be changed, knowing they were not correct.

That there is more said about certain members of the family than others, is simply because their immediate descendants gave the author the information he asked, whilst others declined or neglected to do so. It was no fault of the author.

The author has given considerable space to the enunciation of the principles of the Society of Friends, because he





feels these truths will ever stand, and because so many of the descendants of "ANDREW MOORE" know nothing of them.

The author is under many obligations to hundreds of kinsfolk and others for assistance rendered during these many years, and to them he returns his sincere thanks. The author feels, however, it is only justice to refer especially to Sarah M. Fell, Wilmington, Del.; Mary M. Ross, Charlotte, N. C.; Emma W. McCoy, late of Tyrone, Pa.; Deborah McAlpine, late of Welland, Canada; John Moore, of Burgessville, Canada, and his friend Gilbert Cope, of West Chester, Pa.

To those who have neglected or declined to give him information, the author can only say he is sorry they were not willing to assist him in making this work complete.

The sketch of the author was written by his friend Martin G. Brunbaugh, Ph. D., of the University of Pennsylvania, who has known him intimately for many years.

To those who are inclined to criticise, the author desires to call attention to the fact that nearly all the time given to this work was that which is usually devoted to rest and recreation. Those who know him know he is a busy man.

*Appendix.*—This work is intended to give in detail the history of (1) Andrew Moore, his ancestors and descendants; but for the benefit of other kinsfolk, I have given all the information I could obtain concerning the descendants of Andrew's brothers, and a sketch of the ancestors of Dr. James W. Moore, of Easton, Pa.

*Addenda.*—The information under this heading was obtained after the MS. was in the printers' hands—no fault of the author that it had to be placed here.

*Errata.*—These are errors, mainly in numbers, discovered after the different generations were printed.

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## INTRODUCTION.

---

“Name! If a party had a voice,  
What mortal would be a Bugg by choice?”—*Hood*.

N. I. Bowditch in “Suffolks Surnames” says:

“Surnames are known to have been assumed, in some instances, before the Norman Conquest; but they did not become general in England until two or three centuries later. Every name, no doubt, originally had a meaning, or was at first assumed or imposed from its real or supposed fitness, from some accidental circumstance, or from mere caprice.

“Each individual is distinguished from his fellows only by *his name*.

“Christian names being given in infancy, by friends and relatives, cannot as a general rule have bad significations, or be associated with crime and misfortune. What child was ever christened Judas or Dido? It is otherwise with surnames. These will be found to be of all shades from the best to the worst, the most pleasing to the most ridiculous.

“They originated later in life, after the character and habits of the individual had been formed, and after he had engaged in some prominent occupation, trade or pursuit. They were given by the community in which he dwelt, by enemies as well as friends.

“Fortunes are amassed and dissipated; dynasties rise and pass away, but one's name (slightly changed and marred, it may be by time) is yet safely transferred from father to son—an inheritance from a remote and otherwise unknown ancestry.”



In Edmunds' "Names of Places" we find the following:  
 "Moor, More, Mors, E., from mor, a tract of wild land. Ex.; moor-by (linc) the Danish abode of the Moor; Sedgemoor (Somers) the Sedgely or rushy moor; Mor-ton, 9 places; more-ton, 12 places; Mor-peth (cumb) moor path. The word More is sometimes a corruption of Mere, a pool. Ex.; Blake-more (Heref) anciently Black-mere, a black pool. Mores-ton (norf) the town of the pool."

---

Clifford Stanley Sims, in his work "On the Origin and Significance of Scottish Surnames," says:

"MOORE, Great, Tall."

---

Robert Ferguson, in his work, "Teutonic Name System, applied to Family Names of France, England and Germany," says:

"A stem which may perhaps come in here in 'More' or 'Moor,' respecting which Forstmann remarks: 'An uncertain stem, for which I scarcely dare venture to think of the old high German Môr, Æthrops.'

Now, if there were names derived from the Huns I do not quite see why not from the Moors, which name must have been familiar to most of the German people; at the same time it will, perhaps, be safer to take the most general sense of dark or swarthy complexion, though I do not feel quite sure that it may not in some cases be a degenerate form of Mord (258 as we find in the Diplomata of Pardessus, the person variously called Mora, and Morta.)

On the whole, however, I feel inclined to bring in the stem here.

#### SIMPLE FORMS.

Old German.—Mor, Moor. Dark: Maur, Mauri, Mor, More, Mora, Moor, 6th century.

English.—More, Morey, Maury, Morrow, Moore.

Modern German.—Mohr.

French.—Maur, Maurey, Moré, Moreau."

Charles Waring Bardsley, in his work on "Our English Surnames, their source, and their significations," says:





“Of those compounds which have become surnames, we cannot possibly recite all. The simple More or Moore is very familiar; Atte More or De La More being older forms. It has ever been the favorite name of punning rhymes. In the ‘Book of Days,’ several pieces of this kind have been preserved.”

---

In Lower’s “A Dictionary of the Family Names of the United Kingdom,” we find:

“Moore, from residence at the boggy heath or moor. The mediæval forms are Atte Mor, or More, De Mora, ad Moram, at, ate, atte, atten. The common prefix to early surnames, to designate the locality of the bearer’s residence, for example, at-more, a moor.”

---

Anderson “On Surnames,” says:

“The English names Moor or Moore, and the Scottish Muir, are from the Saxon word, meaning heathy ground. The surname of Westmoreland, from the county of that name, means the western heathy land; and that of Blackmore is from the place in Dorshetshire, meaning the black heath.

Morland, or Moorland, taken from the district of Yorkshire, and Elmore, is from the parish Gloucestershire, the moor which abounds in eels.”

---

Moore was evidently the very common name of the nomenclature of Scotland, as there are over 39,300 persons holding that surname in Scotland.

In Jamieson’s “Scottish Dictionary” we find:

“More, heath.”

---

In Lower’s “Essays on English,” Vol. I., Surnames, we find:

“Moore, Morris. The former may be and probably is derived from topographical expression, as it occurs in the form of atinoor, amoore, etc., q. d. at the Moor.



“Homes of Family Names,” H. B. Guffy:

“Moore. This name is distributed all over England, excluding the south coast, where with the exception of Devon and Kent, it is absent or singularly uncommon. Its principal homes are in East Anglia, in Norfolk, Suffolk and Cambridgeshire, in the north, in Cheshire and Yorkshire, in the western midlands, in Worcester and adjacent counties, and in the southwest of England, in Devonshire.”

---

When Dr. Manners Sutton succeeded Dr. Moore in the Arch-Episcopal chair of Canterbury, the following lines were written:

“What say you? The arch-bishop's dead?  
A loss indeed! Oh on his head  
May Heaven its blessings pour!  
But if, with such a heart and mind,  
In Manners we his equal find,  
Why should we wish for More.”

---

When Sir Thomas Moore was Chancellor, it is said, his great attention to his duties caused all litigation to come to an end in the Court of Chancery. The following epigram bearing upon this fact was written:

“When Moore some years had Chancellor been,  
No More suits did remain;  
The same shall never More be seen,  
Till Moore be there again.”

---

The following is found in Besse's “Sufferings of the Friends,” Vol. II., page 461, Ireland:

“In 1656, John Moore, a soldier in the army, for speaking to him called ‘Dean Worth,’ in the graveyard, was put into a hog-sty. After trial at a court-martial it was decided that he had broken no just law.”

Page 65, same volume, ‘Robert Moore and others were ‘haled’ out of the Meeting and committed to prison four days, without any examination, and then turned out again, some of them being first stript of their clothing under pretence of fees.’”



Same volume, page 475, A. D. 1667, "John Moore, Christopher Pennock and others were taken from their meetings in the city of Cork and committed to prison by Christopher Rye, Mayor."

---

In Besse's "Sufferings of the Friends," Vol. I., page 82, A. D. 1683:

"Edward Moore and others were sent to jail for refusing to pay tithes."

Same volume, page 66, A. D. 1682, "Elizabeth Moore, widow, of Bristol, and others, were sent to Newgate, in Bristol."

# THE MOORES

## IN SCOTLAND AND IRELAND.

---

AFTER the most careful research, the author is satisfied that the Ancestry of Andrew Moore (1) emigrated from Scotland.

Andrew's (1) grandfather, John Moore, resided near Glasgow, Scotland. Sixth Month, 1612, he emigrated from Scotland to Ireland, locating with his family in the County of Antrim.

James I., who ascended the throne in 1603, being the representative of both royal families of Scotland and England, united the crowns. He was the successor of Elizabeth, sometimes spoken of by her subjects as "Good Queen Bess."

The Catholics and Non-conformists both had great hopes from James, but he at once avowed himself as an earnest Episcopalian. He soon began to execute the laws against the Non-conformists with more rigor than even Elizabeth had done.

At the Convocation of Episcopal and Puritan Divines held in 1604, to discuss religious questions, King James became very angry at what he called the obstinacy of the Puritans, who failed to be convinced by his arguments. He sought to conform them by threat. "I will make them conform," said he, as the Convocation closed, "or I will harry them out of the land."

The persecution that followed forced many of the Non-conformists to seek in other lands a safety and protection they could not have in their own.



The Moores in Scotland were sturdy, unyielding Non-conformists, who under no circumstances would yield either to the cajolery or threats of King James; hence their removal to Ireland in Sixth Month, 1612, nine years after the union of the Scottish and English thrones by the accession of James I., and one year (1611) after the translation of the Bible now mostly used by Protestants, called "King James's Version."

It was seven years after the famous "Gunpowder Plot" was discovered, eight years before the "Pilgrim Fathers" located at Plymouth Rock (1620), twelve years before the birth of George Fox (1624), and thirty-six years before George Fox began his ministry in Manchester, England (1648).

The Friends in Ireland, as elsewhere, were cruelly persecuted until 1696, when by an Act of Parliament, Friends were relieved of many of the penalties that had been proscribed against them by law.

John Moore, the Emigrant from Scotland, may have had a number of children. The only one amongst them of whom we have any accurate account, was a son James, who early joined the "Society of Friends." At his house in Ireland, Friends frequently held meetings.

The author regrets exceedingly that he has thus far been unable to get the records of these meetings; they seem to have been mislaid or destroyed.

The author has had considerable search made with reference to Andrew Moore and his ancestry in Great Britain and Ireland, but it has been rather barren of results. He submits some letters and records to show from whom he has tried to get this information.

Births, Marriages and Burials, but not Ireland. I have, however, written to Dublin for the information asked, and the reply is--

"I have carefully searched the transcripts of all the northern meeting records which are here in Dublin, and can find no reference to Andrew Moore. There are some persons of the name of Moore, about 1700, but there is no means of tracing the relationship, if any, to A. M., not having any particulars about him."

A dollar may be sent me by Post Office Order or otherwise.

I duly received thine of the 3d Mo. 18th, and shortly after, a dollar through the Post Office.

I have, as wished, written again to Dublin and search has been carefully made in all their books for the information, but without success in finding the Andrew Moore required. Enclosed is all the information that can be found, for which I have paid 10 s. Sterling. It is not improbable that some of the births or marriages may have occurred before the parties became Friends.

I annex also Extracts from the Scotch books, which seem to supply some of the information required, and the two together may perhaps help somewhat in thy researches, but there are often links wanting which we cannot supply, some having been Friends and some not, and in a few cases the early books having been quite lost beyond all hope of recovery.

The Society's records only commence about 1650, and for some districts later than that. I am sorry we cannot find all thou wants, notwithstanding all the search made, which has been considerable, and occupied much time.

Thou mayest send me 3 or 4 dollars more for same, including the ten shillings I am out of pocket for the Irish ones.

# ANDREW MOORE

## AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

---

### First Generation.

1. **ANDREW MOORE**, son of James and grandson of John Moore, who emigrated to Ireland from near Glasgow, Scotland, 6th Mo., 1612, was born 6th Mo. — 1688, in County Antrim, Ireland. Married in 1715 to Margaret, daughter of Guyon and Margaret (Henderson) Miller.\*

I have been unable to find date of Margaret Moore's death. It is more than probable that she died before Andrew (1) left Ireland. Tradition has it she died on the passage to America, but I can find no authority for that. She was living in 1722, for her son Thomas was born in that year. If she were living when Andrew left Ireland, it is most likely her name would have appeared on the certificate from Ballynacree Monthly Meeting.

Andrew determined in 1723 to emigrate to America. He landed at New Castle, Del., 8-3-1723. "At a Monthly Meeting held at New Garden, Chester Co., Pa., 6-8-1724, Andrew Moore produced to this Meeting a certificate from a Meeting held at Ballanacree in the County of Antrim in the north of Ireland." (See New Garden Monthly Meeting Records.) Andrew was married a second time, 4-24-1725 to Rachel, daughter of William Holliday. He settled on a tract of land on both sides of the Octoraro Creek, now

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\* There has been some discussion as to whether Andrew Moore (1) married Margaret Miller: but the weight of proof is in favor of it. Guyon Miller and his wife left Co. Armagh, Ireland, in 1702, settled in Kennett Twp, Chester Co., Pa.





partly in Sadsbury, Chester Co., and partly in Sadsbury, Lanc. Co., Pa. He erected a Tub Mill near the present town of Atglen, Chester Co., Pa., the ruins of which can still be seen. Henry Moore (371) resides on a part of the old tract which has been in the family since 1736. There has never been a vendue or a mortgage upon it, or a judgment against it. Andrew was engaged in millin'g and farming, took a very active part in the business and other Meetings of the Society of Friends, was largely instrumental in establishing Sadsbury Friends' Meeting and in erecting the first Meeting House there. In 1724, Andrew Moore (1) and Samuel Miller on behalf of themselves and Friends settled about Sadsbury, asked for liberty to build a Meeting House, which being granted by the Meeting, built one in 1725.

Andrew Moore had considerable literary talent, wrote both prose and poetry. I regret the following is the only emanation I have from his pen. It is given just as written by him:

"These I wrote to a Friend's daughter, a little girl who I was told was fond of Meter and wished to have some of Andrew Moore's making, although she was a stranger to me.

"The reason why those lines I pen,  
 Was love to thee my little friend,  
 As I am now a man in years,  
 That has partook of joys and fears,  
 I find that in the bloom of youth  
 We ought to love and seek the truth,  
 And not like some put away  
 Far out of sight the evil day,  
 Saying it's time enough for me  
 I wish more pleasures for to see,  
 But don't consider how that death,  
 May in a moment stop their breath  
 And to this world must bid adieu,  
 Then fearful judgment must insue  
 Or if the sentance then be past,  
 Into the lake let them be cast,  
 That doth with flaming sulphur flow  
 Forever to remain in woe.  
 Therefore my dear let us prepare,  
 While time to us is given ;  
 And strive for to obtain a share,  
 With the blest saints in Heaven.



So now I shall conclude in love,  
 And that to all the human race;  
 Wishing each one for to improve,  
 In the ways of truth and grace."

As a matter of interest the author here inserts a few extracts from Sadsbury Monthly Meeting Records, showing the interest Andrew Moore manifested in this meeting. Monthly Meeting held at Leacock, Lanc. Co., Pa., 3-1-1738.

"The Meeting received Andrew Moore and Naile Mooney, overseers of this Meeting. Monthly Meeting held at Sadsbury, Lanc. Co., Pa., 4-5-1738. "The following Friends *is* appointed to make a visit to such families as in their freedom may be thought fit and use their endeavors to stir them up to their duty and return an a/c of their service to next Meeting. Their names *is* Andrew Moore, Antony Shaw, Samuel Jones and Hatill Varman."

Monthly Meeting at Sadsbury, 6-6-1739, "Andrew Moore and John Chamberlain appointed to make enquiry as usual and prepare a certificate for Samuel Wilkinson he being removed into the verge of Goshen Monthly Meeting, Andrew Moore is appointed to buy a new bound book for recording the proceedings of this Meeting." Monthly Meeting 11-7-1739, "Andrew Moore and Antony Shaw report the marriage of Henry Neal and Sarah Mooney orderly. Monthly Meeting 1-3-17<sup>40</sup>/<sub>39</sub>, "Andrew Moore and others desired to visit Friends."

Monthly Meeting 1-2-1741, "There was no Monthly Meeting last Monthly Meeting time on a/c of the great depth of the snow."

Monthly Meeting 11-3-1742-3, "Andrew Moore and Samuel Miller appointed to examine into the clearness of Thomas Bulla to marry."

Monthly Meeting 6-1-1743, "Andrew Moore and Antony Shaw to draw a testimony against Samuel Boyd for



being married by a Priest to a woman not of us, he being precautioned."

Monthly Meeting 12-6-174 $\frac{3}{4}$ , "Andrew Moore and Thomas Bulla is appointed to attend next Quarterly Meeting."

Monthly Meeting 1-5-1743-4, "Andrew Moore is requested to buy a ream of paper for the Meeting's use and get a book bound of 6 quires to record Births, Burials and Marriage Certificates." Note—First book of the kind for Old Sadsbury.

Monthly Meeting 6-5-1745, "Andrew Moore, Calvin Cooper \* \* \* \* appointed to visit the Meetings on West side of Susquehanna to see how they fare in truth."

Monthly Meeting 9-4-1745, "Andrew Moore and James Chamberlain to attend next Quarterly Meeting."

Monthly Meeting 4-2-1746, "Andrew Moore and John Boyd appointed to attend the marriage of Joseph Williams and Mary Minshall."

Monthly Meeting 8-6-1746, "There appears a difference between Jonas Chamberlain and Benjamin Miller, Andrew Moore and Calvin Cooper is to try and adjust it."

Monthly Meeting 9-6-1746, "There appears a difference between James Love and Sister, Andrew Moore and Calvin Cooper to see into it."

Monthly Meeting 7-7-1747, "Andrew Moore and Aaron Musgrove is appointed to prepare a testimony against Francis Moore and Rachel Jones, for their outgoing in marriage they having been precautioned."

Monthly Meeting 2-2-1750, "Visiting families recommended and the following Friends appointed to preform that Service, Thomas Bulla, Andrew Moore and others."

This is the last time Andrew Moore's name appears on the Monthly Meeting records as taking any part in their proceedings.

He died 7-5-1753, Interred in Friends' Burying Ground, Old Sadsbury, Lanc. Co., Pa. The following Testimony from Sadsbury Monthly Meeting is found in "Friends' Miscellany," Vol. 4, Page 26:

"Andrew Moore settled in the township of Sadsbury in



Chester Co., Pa., and in a short time after he was chosen Elder of Sadsbury Meeting, which then belonged to New Garden Monthly Meeting; in which station he continued during the remainder of his life, being well esteemed by Friends and others. He was of a sober life and conversation, zealous for good order and had a gift in the discipline of the church, in which he was serviceable. He delighted in the unity of the brethern and was often made instrumental to end differences amongst his neighbours. He was a diligent attender of our religious Meetings and exemplary in humble waiting therein. He was much missed by his wife and family, as well as our Meeting.”

## COPY OF ANDREW MOORE'S WILL.

I Andrew Moore in ye township of Sattsbrey, County of Chester, and *Provance* of *Pensalvena*, being weak in body, but, in perfect mind and *memerey*, thanks be given to God for it, calling to mind the *mortallety* of my Body, knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, *doo* make this to be my last will and *Testement*, that is to say first of all, I *recomend* my *soull* to God that gave it, and my Body I *recomend* it to ye Earth to be *Bired* in ye *Bire-ing ground* wher the rest of my *Dead Lys att ye dischraction* of my Executors, hereafter mentioned and as touching such *worly* Estate as it hath pleased God to *blasse mee* in this life. I give demise and *dispos* of *ye sam* in the following *maner* and form. I *geve* and *Bequeth* unto my Son James Moore *ye sume* of Five pounds to be Saved out of my Estate of *Pensylvena* money, to be paid one year after my decease and I also give and *Bequeath unt* his son Andrew Moore *ye Sume* of five pounds to be paid him when he *coms* to age of twenty-one years, but if it should happen that he should *dye* before that *tim* then I order the said money to be *equelly* divided amongst the brothers and sisters that are alive—*Itam* I give and *bequeath daughter* Mary Carson the Sum of Fifty pounds to be paid her out of my *personall* estate of good and *lawfull*—*Pensylvena* money one year after my *deseass*—

*Itom*—I give and bequeath unto my daughter Margrat





Love ye *Sume* of Five pounds of the like *Corrance* to be paid her one year after my *deseass* and I also give and *bequeth* unto *hir* Son Andrew Love the *sume* of Forty pounds to be *raised* and *laved* out of my effects of good and *lawfull* *Pensylvena* Money to be paid unto him when he *coms* to age of twenty one years but if should happen that he should die before he *becom* to *S<sup>d</sup>* age or die without *eschew* then I order the *S<sup>d</sup>* forty pounds to be equally divided *amongst* ye remainder of his Brothers and Sisters. *Itam*, gave and *bequeth* unto my Son—William *More* ye *Sume* of Five pounds besides what I have given *Allredy*. *Itam* I give and unto his Son Andrew ye *Sume* of five pounds *currant* *Pensylvea* money when he arrives to the *eage* of ten years.

*Itam* I give and bequeath unto my son Andrew Moore the tract of land *containg* one hundred and seventy *acers* of *deded* land known by the name of "Gillmore" place when he comes to age of twenty *on* years together *Bildings* *heredetments* whatsoever to his *hairs* and assigns forever, and also I order and my will is that he shall have *p<sup>d</sup>* him ye *sume* of twenty pounds in cash *att* the same time above *Spefyd* as above.

*Itam* I give and bequeath unto my well beloved wife *Rachell* Moore all ye incomes of the Mill *Plantatoin* and *Movebles* about my *hous* and *materals* for *bonfeit* of the plantation to *hir* *yus* for the *maintane* of *hirselse* and five of my youngest children to wit. Robert, John, David, *Rachall* and Sarah Moore that is to say to feed and *cloath* them during the *space* of time she possess it and also to *provid* for the *s<sup>d</sup>* mill what is a wanting *duering* ye *s<sup>d</sup>* time which time is until my son John arrives to the age of sixteen years if he lives so long and then and after that time I *ordr* ye one third part of the mill to remain in *hir* hands during *hir* *natorall* *liffe* and *and* she is to *bere* *hir* proportion *shar* of *damagese* for repairing ye *s<sup>d</sup>* mill and mill *receses* and at the time that she delivers up the two thirds of the *s<sup>d</sup>* mill then I order *order* effects to be sold and my will is that she shall be paid out of my estate two hundred pounds *Corant* money of *Pennsylvena* money and also she shall have the best bed and *forentur* and chest of drawers

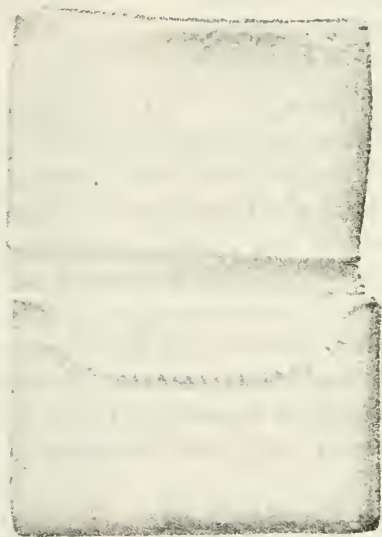

the *discretion* of my *exactors* Item I order a true *apraise-ment* to be *mad* when my *wiffe* *givese* up *hir* property of the two thirds of ye mill and *movebles* by *fore* or five *discreet* and *senseble* and *honast* men of both this two hundred acres of land that I now live on and Mill and all that appertains them with all *Bils* *Bonds* and *Book acts* with all the *movels* *except* what is given to my *wiff* by this will and I also order that a true *inventory* be *mad* and returned into the *Regesters* office in *ordr* to *setel* the *State* and when that is *don* if it *apear* by *ye acts* that there is money *lying* in my *executors* hands then I order and my will is it shall be divided among my children to wit: Joseph, Robert, John, David, Rachell and Sarah equally but if it exceed fifty pounds each then I order the *overplush* to be *equeally* among my other children—that is then alive but if *aney* of my children should *hapn* to die in there age either *malle* or *famell* then I *ordr* *there* part or portion to be *equely* divided amongst all *ye* rest of my living *childdren* and so on as it shall please God to call them away I *aliso ordr* and my will is that if *aney* of my children while they *ar undr* age *ye mall* under twenty one years and the *famel sect* under twenty years be of a bad conduct or *goe* away with *ther mariag* to any way than is the usual amongst us *ye peepel* called quakers that then *that then* I order and my will is that one half part of what I have by my will given them shall be *takn* from or *bak* and delivered to all my children that does well. Moreover I give and bequeath unto my well beloved wife my clock and my *bige* bible and the benefit of *indenturs* and *ye* warming pan and I also *ordr* what money *lys* in my *executors* hands after that which must be paid in in a *littal* *time* *time* for to let it out on interest they giving good *securety* for the benefit of my children last of all I constitute *mak* and ordain my well beloved *wiffe* *Rachell* Moore and James Moore my son my *hole* and sole *executors* to this my last will and testament and I *doo* *hearby* *outerly* *revocke* and disannull all and every other former *testements* wills *lageceys* and *executors* by *mee* *aney* ways before this time named willed and bequeathed ratifying and *confiring* this and no other to be my last will

## WILL OF RACHEL MOORE, WIDOW OF ANDREW (I).

Whereas I, Rachel Moore of the Township of Sadsbury County of Chester and Province of Pennsylvania (widow) being of an advanced age and Compassed with infirmities and Weakness of Body, But through the Lord's Mercies am of a Sound Disposing mind and memory and calling to mind the mortality of my Body Doth for the Settling of my outward affairs make and ordain this my last will and Testament in manner and form following viz:)

And first my will is and I order that my Body may be Interred in a decent and Christianlike manner at the Discretion of my Executors, herein after mentioned and all my Just Debts and Funeral Expenses paid and Discharged. Also my will is & I order that what money is due to me by my son Robert Moore may be Equally divided amongst all my sons Including my Daughter in law Lydia Moore, my son William's widow alike—equal part or share to be paid as soon as will be Convenient after my decease. I also Bequeath unto my son Andrew Moore my Arm Chair and all my other Chairs, and Fire Shovel and Tongs—

I also bequeath unto my son Joseph Moore, Big Iron Pot, and Walnut Table.— I also Bequeath unto my son Robert Moore my Big Bible and Frying Pan.— I also Bequeath unto my son John Moore what money may Remain in his hands due to my Estate he paying my Funeral Expenses out of it.— Also my Clock and Baking Griddle as also my Cow he paying to my sisters Margaret Downing and Deborah Linley the sum of Twenty five shillings each, as a token of my love to them.

I also Bequeath unto my son David Moore my Walnut Cupboard and Thomas Chalkley's Journals and Dog Irons.

I Bequeath unto my daughter Rachel Truman the sum of five shillings also the Feather Bed and Furniture I used to lye on and my wearing apparel with all the residue or



remaining part of my Household Furniture Except my Dough Trough and big Tea Kettle which I Bequeath to my grand Daughter Ann Wallace.— I Bequeath unto my Stepson James Moore the Sum of Five Shillings if Demanded and the like Sum of Five Shillings to Alexander Love if Demanded.

My Will is and I order that if any Interest Should Remain due on Bond by any of my sons that it may be void.

Lastly I nominate and appoint my son John Moore and brother William Downing to be Executors of this my last Will and Testament and doth hereby revoke and Disannul all other will or wills by me heretofore made and doth Ratify and Confirm this to be my last will and Testament. In Witness whereof I have hereunto Set my hand and Seal this Seventeenth Day of the Tenth Month in the year of our Lord 1784.

#### STATEMENT.

The following observations concerning the settlement of his father's estate were written by JAMES MOORE (2), as per copy I have in my possession. It is inserted to show how in early days difficulties were settled without resorting to Law.

Some observations made on the various settlements of my father's Estate By Committees and Arbitrations, &c.

Year 71, John Moore Complained Against James Moore yt he had not Rec'd His legacy Agreeable to his Father's Will. A Committee From the Preparative Meeting being





Apointed Met and Reported as their sense that there Was  
No Cause of Complaint & subscribed their names.

Year 72. John Moore being Still uneasy About his Leg-  
acy we all agreed and set off To Go to Chester and there  
Enter it as an Emicable Suit and have it Settled yt way,  
but being advised by a Frd. on ye Road, it was left to Six  
Arbitrators with proper Seals in Writing Binding them to  
settle ye Estate Agreeable To Law and Consistant with  
the will; who Drew up their award & Sent to us. But we  
aprehended it was neither Agreeable To law Nor Con-  
sistant with the will, yet 3 out of 4 being Bound to Stand  
to it, Complied to pay a yearly sallery to John and David  
For a Number of Years which was by the Judgement of  
Severall Councils Entirely Contrary to the Direction of  
ye will.

Year 82 The Éxr. Requested the Advice of friends  
How to settle his Father's Estate Agreeable to his will.  
The Meeting apointed a Committee to confer together upon  
the *ocation*, who gave in their Report In writing, and  
among other things Concerning a certain Sallery Yt James  
Moore and some others had Paid To John and David  
Moore which say they, We Apprehend it Not Agreeable to  
the Direction of the will.—Therefore could Not advise  
James to pay any More.

Year 83. The advise of a Committee of the Quarterly Meeting was requested which met & Gave it as their sense yt we had best Comply with the Payment of the Money Agreeable to the old award & Siglined by a Friend which advice we Complied with untill John Got uneasy Again and would have his Mother's Part as well as the Real Estate overhalled; & got a Power of Attorney from her on that Acct.

Year 84, 11th Mo, 26th. Brother John Came to my house and told me he was Come to make a Proposal to Settle the Estate & at his Request I got My 4 sons to hear it, and he told me he was willing to have the Matter Reconsidered and settled ageeable to the will, as the Law Directs and seemed very earnest for a re-settlement and after Some More Conversation we left it under Consideration.

Shortly after He Came again To My House wth. brother Andrew & Still insisted for a Resettlement but Desired yt his Mother's Part might be resettled also which Both brother Andrew and I Disalowed of, but I Queried with him If we would allow of it whether he would make up her Defeciencys, If she fell short he s'd he would and should Bind his Estate for it, however we were Not willing and So Parted. (Soon after he came again the Third Time and brother Andrew Also and Still he insisted for a settlement but was not willing then to Make up an difficiencys If his Mother should fall Short as he s'd. He had consulted his Father-in-law who advised him Not to bind himself and would settle on no other Terms than to have his Mother's Part overhall'd wth the Real Estate) With which brother Andrew and I at last Condesended, and with the Company and advice of a Number of Friends on the 31st of 8th Mo, 1785 We Entered into agreement, to leave the Settlement To arbitrations and each of us choose three men and bound ourselves to stand and abide by their Judgement So that it was Made a Rule of Court & all Former obligations To be Made void on Both sides & of None efect. And Likewise Desired yt their Judgement



might be Confirmed by ye Court before either of us knew what it was and accordingly the men chosen Met and agreed and drew up an award. We then all Returned home and the Court Coming on in a Few days John's father-in-law attended The Same unknown to us & Employed an attorney that if he did not Like it he might stop the Confirmation which he Did.—Afterwards My son employed an attorney To Move it at next Court Which was Done and the Part that Emediately Concerned Jno and I was Confirmed.

But the Money not being paid Me by Jno Agreeable to sd. Award—there was a Complaint Entred against him for ye Same, and a Committee being apointed out of the Preparative and Monthly Meeting Met sundry times upon the ocation and in the 6th Mo, 1787 Gave it as their Judgment and advice to us yt we ought to abide by our Agreement and advised Jno. to Pay the Money and Likewise advised my son & I to give Jno. A few lines seting fourth our Consent to get his Part in s'd award Confirmed also which we Did. The Names of the aforesd. Committee were Moses Brinton, James Smith, Joseph Brinton, George Cooper, John Feree & Samuel Simmons And at the next Monthly Meeting Abraham Gibbons and William Brinton was added to their number to have another hearing of the Matter.—And by their Report on the 29th of the 7th Mo they Reversed their Former Judgement and advice giving for their Reasons yt our Agreement and award was void in themselves for want of a Confirmation although William Downing one of the Widows Exrrs.—& all other legatees Concerned being Met Submitted to leave the final Settlement of the Estate to the Arbitrators then chosen yet a few Days after at yt. next Court William oposed the Confirmation Contrary to our Agreement and his own Submission which we Aprehend was the Reason why the Award was not Confirmed—And I believe the arbitrators Judgment has been Made a Rule of Court & Cannot be broken by either parties according to our Agreement and referes to on our attorney's Judgment on ye the same head.

WHEREAS, Jeremiah Starr, son of John Starr, of Ouldcastle, in the county of Meath, and Rebekah Jackson, daughter of Isaac Jackson, of Ballytore, in the county of Killdare having declared their intentions of takeing each other in marriage, before several publick meetings of the people called Quakers, in the county of Cathorlogh, according to the good order used among them whose proceedings therein after a deliberate consideration thereof with regard unto the righteous law of God and example of the people recorded in the scriptures of truth in that case, were approved by the said meetings, they appeering clear of all others and haveing consent of parents and relations concerned and their intended marriage being twice published in the respective meeting which they belong unto (viz.) at Ballytore on the Thirtyeth day of the tenth month and the third day of the eleventh month, in the year one thousand seven hundred and sixteene.

NOW these are to certifie all whom it may concern that for the full accomplishing of their said intentions this tenth day of the eleventh month, commonly called January in the year, according to the English account, one thousand seven hundred and sixteene, they the said Jeremiah Starr and Rebekah Jackson, appeared in a publick assembly of the aforesaid people and others mett together to worship God in their publick meeting place att Ballytore aforesaid, and in a solemn manner, he the said Jeremiah Starr, takeing the said Rebekah Jackson by the hand did openly declare as followeth (viz.) Friends, in the fear of the Lord and before this assembly I take Rebekah Jackson to be my wife, promising through the Lord's assistance to be unto her a loveing and faithful husband untell death separate us, and you are my witnesses.

And then and there in the sd. assembly the said Rebekah Jackson did in like manner declare as followeth: Friends, in the fear of the Lord and presence of this assembly I take Jeremiah Starr to be my husband, promising through the Lord's assistance to be unto him a loveing and faithfull wife untell death separate us.

And the said Jeremiah Starr and Rebekah, as a farther confirmation thereof did then and there to these presents set their hands as husband and wife and we whose names are hereunto subscribed being present





Referring to their first acquaintance, and subsequent married life, the author quotes the testimony of James, as written by himself.

“When I was in the 24th year of my age, I had some thoughts (if it was the Lord’s will) to alter my condition into a married state, and having heard of Ann Starr, daughter of Jeremiah and Rebecca Starr, I went to see her. I stayed but a short time, yet, observing her modest, innocent deportment, my affections seemed, in some degree, drawn towards her. After my return home, the

“John Starr, son of Jeremiah and Rebekah Starr, was born, 10-8-1748.”



thoughts of entering into a married state, were brought deeply under my consideration, having seen and heard of so many miscarriages by people being rashly and inconsiderately joined together. The thoughts of their unbecoming manner of living, bowed my mind with awful desires to the Lord, that if it was consistent with his will, that I should alter my condition, he might be pleased to provide me a suitable companion. As I spread my cause before him under a deep exercise, so I was willing to wait his time. The consideration of such a weighty undertaking, which I apprehended was one of the greatest in this life, often engaged my desires to know the Divine will, whether to proceed any further on that account or not. So after about three months remaining at home, he was pleased to open my way, and I found a freedom to acquaint her with my proposals. And from that time forth we proceeded in an orderly manner, until we were joined together in marriage.

“Ever blessed be the name of the Most High, who was pleased to hear my petitions, and to answer my request in this matter far beyond my expectation, or what I could ask for. She has since told me, that it was much after the same manner with her, that she had desired she might never alter her Condition, unless it was the Lord’s will to provide a suitable help-meet. And I have a full assurance that the Lord will hear the petitions of those that truly look unto him for counsel, and whether they be joined in that weighty affair of marriage or not, he will be their director. As my dear wife and I came together in love, so we remained and lived in love until the day of her death, which was upwards of twenty years, and the Almighty blessed our endeavors both spiritually and temporally. She was a dutiful and loving wife, tenderly sympathizing with me in times of probation, affliction, or distress, either inwardly or outwardly, often giving me a word of comfort in the needful time. To her offspring, she was a tender hearted mother, and their eternal happiness was often her request. She loved all, would do good to all, and her charity abounded to all, but in a particular



manner to the household of faith. Her affections seemed to be bound in love, and nearly united to her friends.

“She was very serviceable in the neighborhood, not thinking hard at any time, if health permitted, to go to any who were in distress, if she could be of any service, and her endeavours under Providence, often proved successful, for she often made use of many things, which were helpful to the relief of her fellow-creatures. When at home, she was very industrious, and careful about her lawful business, both of her own and of my concerns, that nothing might go to loss. She was a diligent attender of meetings, both on first and other days of the week, as also monthly, Quarterly, and Yearly Meetings, when she was of ability; being of a deep, weighty, and grave deportment when there, and often, in reverent fear, concerned in public for the welfare and prosperity, of the Church and people of God. She was also active in the discipline, having a godly care that nothing might be wanting, through her neglect, in order for the cleansing of the Church and promoting the Glory of God. She was likewise a lover of the unity of the brethren in the bond of peace.

“Towards her latter end she would often give me hints, that she thought her time here would not be long, but as she saw it so nearly affected me, she seldom said much; yet it was, in some measure, a weaning time to me. For some months, she appeared to have had a clear sight of her dissolution being at hand, by her making all necessary provisions, and giving directions to her sister what should be done; as likewise by a writing under her own hand, by way of a will, of which she informed me, about two or three days before her last illness, and that she thought she could not get over it, but said she was resigned to the will of God, whether life or death. She continued satisfied and cheerful, until she was taken ill on fifth day afternoon, the 6th of the 8th month 1761. She remained in a weak, low condition, until third day evening following, when the fever seemed to affect her head, so that she became somewhat delirious; yet, through the mercy of God, I do not remember that any unbecoming expressions dropped



from her lips; but the tenor of her discourse, even when her natural understanding was thus somewhat impaired, was in a great degree tending towards her future happiness, and the salvation of mankind generally. A short time after she seemed to get some ease, and fell into a sleep, till near three o'clock, when she quietly departed without sigh or groan; and I have no doubt she has entered into endless joy and peace with God, 'where the wicked cease from troubling, and the weary be at rest.' 'Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord, from henceforth; yea, saith the spirit, that they may rest from their labours, and their works do follow them.'

"She departed this life the 12th of the 8th month 1761, and was buried on the evening of the day following, in Friends' burying ground at Sadsbury, aged forty three years and a half.

"I have particularly mentioned the manner of our coming together, principally, that if this account should fall into the hands of any that are, or may be about to engage in that weighty affair of marriage, they may not rashly, or inconsiderately join together: but when anything of that nature is in view, that they may maturely and weightily consider it, and lay it before the Almighty, while it is yet in the bud. And to such, whether male or female, I may say, let not thy affections be drawn away, until thou hast the mind of Truth uniting with thee in thy proceedings. As thou art careful thus to put thy Confidence and trust in God, I am persuaded he will open thy way, and enlighten thy understanding, to see whether thy undertaking is agreeable to his will or not, then it will be more easy to nip the bud, than to break off a strong branch. But if the Almighty approves of thy undertaking, and thou art sensible in thy mind, that it is consistent with his will for thee to proceed, then, in the next place, see that thou hast consent of parents or guardians; and if it is the Lord's will to join you together, the consent of godly parents or guardians, will be readily granted, which may be to you a great comfort in times of exercises, or trials that may afterwards attend you.





"In the next place, take care that thou proceeds orderly in the fear and counsel of God, in the accomplishment of thy undertaking, agreeable to the good rules and order of the Church; that so thy marriage may not be in or by the will of man only, but of the Lord that hath joined you together. So may your last days be your most comfortable and best days; that, when you are summoned home, being clothed with the robes of righteousness, your souls may ever live to praise the Lord God and the Lamb, ever all blessed for ever and ever more. So be it saith the soul of one who wisheth for the salvation of mankind universally.

"8th mo. 24th 1761."

James further adds:

"The following letter was sent me by my loving wife, when I was on a religious visit to Friends, in Virginia and Maryland, to wit:

"My Dear Heart, In the bowels of unfeigned love and tender affection, I at this time salute thee, and hereby give thee to understand, that, through Divine Providence, I have hitherto been preserved in health beyond expectation, and likewise our Children have had their health; for which I have reason to be humbly thankful to Almighty God. Therefore, my dear husband, I hope these may find thee in the same condition; but, my dear, through Divine Assistance, I have resigned thee up as much as possible; so I hope the Lord, who is ever merciful to his obedient children, will keep thee near to himself, and preserve thee in every needful time; for we have an unwearied adversary to war with. Hoping this may be satisfactory to thee to hear of my welfare, I conclude, and remain as I have reason to be, thy affectionate wife,

The following beautiful exhortation to her children is taken from the latter part of her last will:

“My dear Children, fear the Lord, and love your tender father; be willing always to take his counsel, and, to honour him in his old age, that the blessing of honouring a father and a mother may be your portion, and that you may live long in the land.”

James m. 2nd time in — 1765 to Mary, widow of Thomas Atkinson, of Bucks Co., Pa., and dau. of Joseph and Sarah Wildman. Mary d. 7-13-1766, interred in F. B. G. at Sadsbury, Lanc. Co., Pa.

Speaking of this marriage, James says:

“This I may say, that the way of our first acquaintance, and coming together, was to me, remarkable; and I verily believe, as I have often thought, that it was the Lord’s doings, and marvellous in my eyes. And since kind Providence hath been pleased to favour me with such an helpmeet, in gratitude for the favour, and for the tender affection she manifested to me and mine, I can do no less than leave a brief account of her virtuous qualifications, with which the Lord in mercy was pleased to adorn her.

“It is said, ‘the righteous are taken away, and no man layeth it to heart,’ yet they ‘shall be had in everlasting remembrance,’ with him, before whom we must all appear. Of my dear wife, I may truly say, her tender Care over me and mine hath been great.

“Her solid deportment and exemplary Conduct, both at home and abroad, were edifying; her words being few and Savoury, seasoned with the salt of the kingdom. She was of a cheerful, sweet disposition, although her Countenance was grave and solid.

“Her moderation appeared in all things, both in respect to eating, drinking, apparel and whatsoever else she was concerned in. Being largely favoured with the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit, she was well esteemed by most, if not all, who were acquainted with her. Her mind was not easily moved, either with prosperity or adversity. In regard to a livelihood here, she was industrious, when of



ability, not spending her time in idleness; but more especially was she diligent to gain an inheritance hereafter. And the Lord in his infinite mercy was pleased to commit to her charge, a gift in the ministry, which, I often thought she kept too much from shining, so as to give light to the whole house, and family of God's church and people. But, she was deeply concerned and dwelt under a reverent fear (as she often told me) lest she should be too forward, but when she gave up to the requirings of the holy witness of Truth, she generally spoke as one having authority, and like the good house-holder, brought forth out of the treasury, things new and old. I verily believe her secret travail and labors of love both at home and abroad will be to some like bread cast upon the waters that will return again after many days.

"I may safely say, she had the true marks and qualifications of a minister, for she was in a great degree, blameless, sober, and of good behaviour; no striker for the greatest fault, but generally bore it with patience and meekness. She was not greedy of filthy lucre (as she termed it) in comparison of that eternal weight of glory, or heavenly treasure. She was no brawler, nor lifted up with pride, but one that ruled well her own house, having her children and household under subjection with gravity. Her prudent conduct and wholesome advice, seasonably given, often kept her children both in subjection and fear; for she abhorred deceit and hypocrisy, and with a double-tongue, she had no unity.

"She was a diligent attender of meetings, both for worship and discipline, at home and abroad, when of ability, being remarkable for humble waiting therein.

"The evening before her departure, being first day, there came many friends to see her, and she, earnestly beholding them, requested that they might sit down together, and wait in God's fear, in true silence. After a season of waiting and holy awe, notwithstanding she had been scarcely able to speak above a breath, but being divinely favored at that time, her tongue was loosed, so as to leave her last testimony and dying words after this manner: 'Friends



if you love God, he will love you, but if you do not love God, how can you expect to be loved of Him. If you would gather your families more frequently, and sit down in his fear, drawing your minds from this world to wait in true silence, then you would grow in the Truth.'

"She said more to the same effect, in a tender, awful manner, desiring that they might remember her words; which I believe made a deep impression on many minds.

"After this seasonable and edifying time, she desired friends might withdraw, for she found she was growing weaker and thought her dissolution was near; yet lay in a quiet, composed frame of mind, being resigned to the will of God, and not afraid to die; the terrors of death (as she often said) being taken away; she also said she found nothing as a hindrance to obstruct her entrance into the glorious kingdom of rest and peace.

"She had often requested that I might freely give her up, and not mourn for her, saying I had but a few days to stay behind her, and encouraged me to faithfulness. She likewise desired friends might be still and quiet, until her departure, being sensible to the last moment; and thus quietly finished her course, and ended her day's work in the daytime.

"Let me never forget the hand that brought us together, and the favour that Heaven bestowed upon me, and let me leave these few lines in remembrance of thee, that thou wast dear to me in this life. Let me now condole my present situation, for thou art gone; O! thou hast paid the debt of nature; thou that I much preferred before myself in piety and virtue; thou that wast my help and comfort, my counselor and near friend, thou that wast often concerned for my everlasting peace, and wast my chief delight in this world, my bosom friend, and one that I preferred before all transitory enjoyments whatever. For I may truly say that her chief Concern seemed to be, to meditate on the law of the Lord, day and night; and although she was taken away as in the prime of her days, yet she seemed like a shock of corn, cut down in its season, or like fruit fully ripe for the kingdom. And I have good reason to





believe that she has entered into full fruition of eternal joy and felicity; into the holy City of the New Jerusalem whose builder and maker is God, there to praise, worship, and adore him forever, and there let her rest, saith my soul. Amen."

James m. a 3d time, 5-4-1769, to Ann, widow of Nicholas Newlin, of Concord, Chester (now Delaware) Co., Pa. Prior to her marriage with Nicholas Newlin, she was the widow of James Walter and dau. of Caleb and Hannah (Bennet) Jackson. Ann d. 10-19-1789, in the 70th year of her age; interred in F. B. G., at Old Sadsbury, Lanc. Co., Pa. James pays this tribute to her memory:

"She was a plain, virtuous, religious and sober woman, hating pride and superfluity, and not greedy of filthy lucre. She loved the Truth and the friends of it, and was a diligent attender of our meetings when health permitted."

James m. a 4th time to Ann, widow of James Williams, of Sadsbury Twp., Chester Co., Pa., and dau. of John and Hannah (Saunders) Minshal. Ann d. 9-21-1801, in the 73d year of her age. Interred in F. B. G. at Old Sadsbury. In concluding his testimony, concerning his last wife, he says:

"I believe she endeavoured to live at peace with God, and with all men. She loved plainness, and had a testimony against superfluities, pride, and high-mindedness. In a few words, she was a religious, virtuous woman, and a tender companion to me, in my advanced age."

James was a very remarkable man, considering the opportunities of advancement in those early days, especially when we remember his occupation, that of a miller, which he followed diligently, and which prevented him from having the hours of leisure and reflection, that less exacting and laborious avocations would have afforded. He was considered a most excellent business man. He was careful and particular in every thing, and this excellent trait was a source of benefit as well as gratification to him, in assisting to settle his father's estate; for the author has in



his possession old writings showing how exceedingly well satisfied the other members of the family were, with the manner in which he executed his trust. He was a remarkable man physically, and it is related of him, that he could carry 9 bushels of corn at one time up the mill steps into the mill; also that he could take a 56 lb. weight on each little finger, and tip them together, at the back of his head. He was a friend of the down-trodden and the poor, as is evidenced by the fact, that in his will, he bequeathed a considerable sum of money, in care of the Society of Friends for the education of the children of those members of the Society who were unable to give their children such an education as they desired; but if not required in the Society, for the purpose intended, it should be appropriated to educate those not in membership, irrespective of *color*. This money remains as a School fund in the hands of the Society. He contributed freely toward the erection of the present F. M. H. at Sadsbury, Lanc. Co., Pa., about the year 1760. Although a man exacting in his requirements for the performance of every duty, he was withal exceedingly fond of innocent sports and amusements, and his rich vein of Irish humor, he has, in a great degree, transmitted to many of the descendants in the present generation. He was a man of great piety, and appears to have been greatly concerned for the promotion of righteousness and truth, as well by the use of his pen as by his public labours in the Society.

In the spring of 1751, James being engaged on a Committee with other Friends in visiting families, "his mouth was first opened in public, for the cause and honor of God and his Truth."

While engaged in writing on the subject of war, he says there was a proclamation issued by the Governor of Pennsylvania, for a general fast to be observed by all societies, which deeply affected his mind; and, letting drop the concern he was engaged in, he collected a large number of paragraphs out of the writings of the prophets and other parts of the Scriptures concerning fasts, circumcision, offerings, and set days—to which he briefly added some of



his own sentiments on those subjects. The closing paragraph of this essay may be considered an epitome or summary of the whole, being as follows:

“This is our faith, that the outward ordinances and ceremonial performances of the law, are ceased, and that the spiritual performance of them ought to be observed in each of our hearts and souls, now in this gospel day.”

“Therefore, let all professing Christianity, be awakened, and consider whether their faith be in Christ, yea or nay, and whether they prefer the new Jerusalem above their chiefest joy, and Sion’s prosperity before any worldly delight. As we thus come individually to have our sincere desires and breathings to God, for the promotion of his glory, we shall be as bright lights in the world, and as a lamp that burneth which can not be extinguished. That the brightness and glory of this most excellent gospel day may, more and more, break forth, and the comeliness and beauty thereof appear, and shine forth among the children of men universally, is the sincere desire and breathings of one who wisheth the salvation of every soul.

“JAMES MOORE.”

It appears that he traveled in the service of Truth, as a minister, but how extensively the author is not informed, as he has seen or heard of no Journal of his life and travels, nor any memorial or testimony concerning him; but the following memorandum shows the continued concern of his mind to be usefully employed in doing good:

“In the winter season of the year 1770, I being weakly in body, and not of ability for exercise as formerly; also, being mostly confined in my chamber, and the time seeming tedious, I betook myself to reading, and carefully read over the Old and New Testaments. Having my pen in a trembling hand, I took out some particular passages through the whole for my own comfort and satisfaction, and to have both mind and body employed in some agreeable exercise. At times, I made some small additions and remarks, on the prophecies of Ezekiel and Joel, which I thought seemed to point out, in some degree, the sorrow-



ful distressed state of North America, with a lamentation for Pennsylvania in particular, and likewise some advice to my beloved children."

The Scripture quotations or selections, occupy more than five sheets of paper, closely written.

SOME ADVICE TO MY DEAR AND AFFECTIONATE  
CHILDREN.

"I feel a concern to rest upon my mind for you, my dearly beloved children, to put you in remembrance, and encourage you in your spiritual travel Sion-ward.

"You know it hath been my lot, for some years past, to tread in the path of affliction and bodily weakness, yet I have this testimony to bear for the honour of Israel's King;—that in all the several stages and dispensations of my life, I never had such clear ideas and bright discoveries of the joys of heaven, and of that never fading crown of glory which is laid up for the righteous, as at such times, when under affliction and bodily-weakness; so that I have remembered the saying of the psalmist, 'Before I was afflicted I went astray;' and also of the inspired apostle, that 'All things work together for good to them that love God.' And I do believe it has been through mercy, that I have been visited with affliction, in order to draw my mind from the too anxious pursuit of the perishing things of this world.

"And now my dear children, according to the course of nature, in all probability I must leave you shortly; therefore my earnest desire and prayer to Almighty God is for you, and in tender love, I warn, exhort, and caution you, to keep your eye single to the Lord; and, above all things, endeavor to promote the exaltation of his ever-blessed Truth upon the earth, in your day, age, and generation. Be as valiant soldiers for his great cause, and turn not your backs in times of trial, for the Lord will be your leader.

"I have often thought it is through the goodness of heaven that these outward temporal losses and crosses do come upon us, in order to draw our minds and affections





from these lower enjoyments, and place them upon things divine, and of a more sublime nature.

“In bowels of love, as a tender parent, my mind is concerned for you earnestly desiring that you may give up your names, and have them recorded in the book of life. Be willing to be searched to the very bottom of the wound by the word of God’s eternal fire, for it will destroy nothing but what is corrupt and of a poisonous nature to the spiritual life. It will only destroy the dross and the superfluous part; therefore give up all as a free-will Offering, that is contrary to his holy will; that is for the fire, let it be consumed by the fire; and that that is for the sword, let it be slain by the sword of his mouth; and that that is for the famine, let it be famished, that God over all may be glorified in and by you. Thus, nothing will remain but that which is pure, and without mixture, and which will stand you in stead at that awful moment, when all the enjoyments of this perishing world will be but as dross.

“As you come to enjoy this quiet habitation in the Truth, Oh! how will you shine in this dark and gloomy age, like stars in the firmament of God’s power! My heart rejoices to think there is a remnant that are bowed in their spirits, willing to put their shoulders to the work, and to stand as pillars in our Sion, and that you may be of that number is what I greatly desire.

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“I seem like a vessel wanting vent, while I unbosom myself to you, in giving you a hint of what presseth upon my spirit; my eyes are ready to run down with water, and my poor trembling hand can scarcely write what comes in my heart, in order to set forth the tender love and regard that I feel towards you in relation to your everlasting welfare, with desires, that when our concluding moments shall come, and we must bid adieu to all things here below, we may meet again in that glorious habitation, where he that can not lie, hath promised by the mouth of his prophet, to give “beauty for ashes, the oil of joy for mourning, and the garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness;” where the wicked will cease from troubling, and the weary will be at rest; all tears of sorrow will be wiped from our eyes,



and nothing will remain but joy and gladness, and that forevermore.—This is the lot of the righteous through all ages and generations of the world. Amen.

“Therefore my dearly beloved children, whatever you do, whether you eat or drink, marry or are given in marriage; whether you may be about your lawful callings, and in an especial manner, when you are gathered in your religious assemblies to perform divine worship—let all be done in the fear of God and to the honour of his glorious name. Then will your words be few and savoury, accompanied with a steady decorum in your families; your actions and deportment being as way-marks to your offspring through your pilgrimage in this troublesome world.

“This will be the way to surmount the present afflictions and trials which may be permitted to come upon you, whether inwardly or outwardly, for the trial of your faith;—ever looking as through a prospective glass, to that joy unspeakable and never fading crown of glory in the end and conclusion of your days. That this may be your happy lot, and that your last days may be your best days, is my earnest desire and prayer for you.”

—This long and useful life came to a close, 8-1-1809, having attained the ripe age of 93 years, 2 months and 14 days. His remains were interred in the F. B. G. at Old Sadsbury, Lanc. Co., Pa.

ABSTRACT OF WILL OF JAMES MOORE (2), LATE OF  
SADSBURY TWP., DECEASED.

First. I give and bequeath to my son Jeremiah Moore Three dollars—he having received his full share.

Second. To my son John Moore the plantation, household furniture and riding mare. Also my lot of land in Newport in New Castle Co., Del., and to John Moore 50 £ to be paid out of my personal estate, provided he brings no demands of any debts or accounts against my estate, yet allowing him his reasonable allowance as Executor.

Third. To my son James Moore 10 £. to be paid out of my personal estate—also a bond for 150 £. due from him to me.



Fourth. To my daughter Rebecca Cooper 70 £.

Fifth. To my daughter Ann Walker 70 £.

Sixth. To my daughter in law Elizabeth Moore lot of ground in town of Newport, County aforesaid, and the sum of 40 £.

Seventh. To my grandson James Cooper 40 £.

Eighth. To my grandson Jesse Moore 50 £.

Ninth. To my kinsman Thomas Fulton \$40.

Tenth. To Jacob Birdsall and wife £10, to be under the care of Sadsbury Meeting.

Eleventh. To John MacDonald £10.

Item. I order and direct that my Executors do pay out of my personal estate into the hands of John Truman and Robert Moore the sum of 100 £., to be put out by them in interest with sufficient security for the same and to remain under that circumstance as a fund, and the interest arising therefrom to be applied to the school education of Friends' children who may be in low circumstances at the discretion of the trustees in conjunction with the Committee of Sadsbury preparative meeting or any poor without distinction as to color or religious profession within the limits of said meeting; and if there do not appear any immediate use for said interest, that it may be added to the principal until it doubles itself and after that, if no necessity appears as aforesaid, I allow such interest to be applied to any charitable use within the limits of the monthly meeting of Sadsbury or of the Quarterly Meeting of Caln—except necessity do not appear, then that the interest be applied to the assistance of families that may be in low circumstances, always looking upon Sadsbury preparative meeting to have the prior right, and at the decease of John Truman and Robert Moore that the said monthly meeting at Sadsbury appoint suitable friends to have the care of said fund.

And further, as there was something of a religious concern took hold of my mind in my younger years I thought it my place to leave in manuscript for the promotion, as I apprehended, of truth and the peaceable Christian Testimony that we as a people hold forth to the world, there-



fore I have left three small books on sundry heads and occasions as it opened in my view, with an account of several little visits at several times and places and sundry copies of letters on different occasions, and after inspection of friends they apprehend it may be of use to society by publishing them with such abridgments or alterations as they may think proper, then I order that my Executors pay out of my personal estate the sum of \$70 for printing and binding the worth thereof in books to be disposed in manner following—

4 to the children of my deceased son Andrew Moore.

4 to each of my other children.

4 to each of the monthly meetings following, if the books will admit of it, if not then a less number, to wit: Wrightstown, Concord, Kennett, New Garden, London Grove, Sadsbury, York, Warrington, Newberry, Menallen, Pipe Creek, Goose Creek, Fairfax, Hopewell and Pelham in Upper Canada—if any books remain to be distributed at discretion of my Executors.

Likewise my will is that no interest on any of my bonds for the space of three months after my decease be collected—as a small legacy to my debtors. And also that my Executors give sufficient reasonable time for the payment of those bonds, as it is not my desire to distress any. And when bonds are paid, my Executors to pay off all legacies and donations as before mentioned, and if any money should come in shortly, to be put to use of my children till the settlement of my estate.

I appoint my son John Moore and my son-in-law Asahel Walker Executors.

(Will dated 21st day of 1st month, 1807—Proved August 9, 1809, and recorded in Book K., page 79, in Register's Office of Lancaster Co., Pa.)

3. MARY, born in 1718, m. in 1742, to William Carson. 7-6-1742, Mary made acknowledgement for outgoing in Marriage. 10-3-1750, she produced a Certificate *from* Warrington, M. M. York Co., Pa. 5-1-1751, obtained a Certificate *to* Warrington M. M. (See Sadsbury M. M. records).





3-3-1742, William Carson requested of this Meeting to come under the Care of Friends; the Meeting granted his request (Sadsbury M. M. Records). I find no further mention of William Carson in any of the Meeting Records.

William died on his farm in Menallen Twp., then York, now Adams Co., Pa., in 1750, and Mary removed to Lancaster Co., but in 1751 returned to York County, Penna.\*

"9-15- and 10-20-1753 James Hamel and Mary Carson (widow of William) declared their intentions of marriage. They were m. 11-8-1753. James Hamel produced a certificate from East Nottingham, Chester Co., Pa., dated 5-20-1751. Rachel Carson was a witness on this Certificate. James Hamell was disowned from membership 12-11-1762."

See Warrington M. M. Records.

Mary d. 4-13-1757. The Will of James Hamel, of Tyrone Township, York Co., Pa., was dated 3-23-1764, and proven 3-27-1764. He mentions Step-Daughter Rachel Rogers, Step-Son William Carson and daughter Mary Hamel. He appoints William Delap, Executor. This with the Meeting Records shows he married Mary, widow of William Carson. Andrew Moore bequeathed his daughter Mary Carson, Fifty Pounds. In an itemized statement of Debts and Legacies paid by Rachel Moore, widow of Andrew and one of his executors, the author finds this entry, "Paid James Hamel, £50.-0.s.-0.d." This proves conclusively that this widow Carson was the daughter of Andrew Moore.

4. MARGARET, born in 1719, m. — to Alexander Love. 4-6-1743, Margaret was disowned from membership in the Society of Friends for outgoing in Marriage. (See Sadsbury M. M. Records.) After marriage Alexander settled in York Co., Penna., where he resided for some years. The exact time of his removal from York Co. the author has been un-

able to ascertain. He was living there in 1760. Hence he removed south between that date and 1771, and settled on Fishing Creek about one and a half miles from where the present town of Yorkville, S. C., is located. It was then Craven Co., N. C., afterward Craven Co., S. C., then the New Acquisition, now York Co., S. C.\* Alexander became a prominent and influential citizen in his new home. He was a member of the Provisional Congress of S. C., which met at Charleston in that State 11-1-1775. The members from the "New Acquisition" were as follows: William Byers, James Carson, Robert McAfee, Joseph Howe, William McCullough, Francis Adams, John Howe, Thomas Neel, Joseph Woods, Samuel Watson, Francis Ross, Thomas James, *Alexander Love*, and Robert Dickey, Esquires. When the District in which he lived was laid out he was sent as a member to the Legislature, when he succeeded in having the new District named York, after his old home in York Co., Penna.

The following extracts from letters sent by Alexander Love to his wife's brother, James Moore (2), it is thought would be interesting:

FISHING CREEK, NORTH CARALINA,

July ye 25th, 1771.

Loveing Brother yours I R<sup>d</sup> Deated ye 1 of ye 4th. mo 1771. Which give us great satisfaction to hear of you & all friends, Being well as we are at present, thanks to almighty God for it, hoping this will find you all in ye same.

I am surprised to hear of ye treatment you R<sup>d</sup> for my action and you intirly Both inocent and ignorent of it as a Child unborn, and By a sect of people y<sup>t</sup> pretends be guided By the Holy Spirit of God which Cannot Lie. I humbly Consave they ought to be more Reserve in their Conduct

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\* The separation of North and South Carolina was officially ordered in 1729. It was not effected until 1732. The line was not run until 1735. and then very incorrectly, An order was given by the King for a resurvey in 1763. This gave South Carolina several Counties, which were called the "New Acquisition."

Alexander d. 3- -1784, and was buried at Bethesada Cemetery, adjoining the old Church of that name near Yorkville, S. C., where he had been a ruling spirit from the time of his removing to Carolina. His grave is marked by a Tombstone which bears this inscription: "Alexander Love died March, 1784. Aged 66 years. A lover of Mankind, A friend to his Country." Margaret d.

The following extracts from Alexander Love's Will may be interesting. It is recorded in Book A, Pages 48, 49, 50, 51, 52. No. 27. Craven Co., S. C.:

In the name of God, Amen. I Alexander Love of New Acquisition District and State of South Carolina, Being weak of body but of sound memory and in my proper senses, Do this Twentieth Day of March, in the year of Our Lord, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty one, Make this my last Will and Testament, in form & manner following viz:—My Soul I bequeath to God, who gave it, and my Body to the Dust, in hopes of a happy Resurrection, when time shall be no more, I give and bequeath unto my son Andrew all that tract or parcel of Land, surveyed by Francis Adams and which he is now in full possession of. Likewise I bequeath unto my son James, all that tract or parcel of land which he is now in possession, and which adjoins lands of Michael W. Garaty. Likewise I give & bequeath unto my son Alexander all that tract or parcel of land which he is now in possession of & which adjoins the lands devised to my son Andrew, and the lands devised to my son James likewise One Hundred Acres, of the tract whereon I now live, to be divided off on the side adjoining Samuel Curry's & Alexander Clarks land, Likewise I give & bequeath unto my son William all that tract or parcel of land, whereon I now live, Likewise I bequeath unto my sons Andrew, James, Alexander & William to be held in equal partnership by them, all that tract or parcel of land known by the name of the "Mines." Likewise I do bequeath unto my loving wife Margaret one negro wench named Dinah, during the time her natural



life & then to devolve to my son Andrew. Likewise I do bequeath unto Margaret my wife during the time of her natural life, one negro wench named Kate & at her death to devolve to my son James. Likewise I bequeath to my son William one negro fellow named York & one wench named Jean. Likewise I bequeath unto my son Alexander, one negro wench named Chloe. Likewise I do bequeath to my loving wife Margaret, one large bay pancing horse with a star in his face, also a saddle and all the plenishing & furniture in the House or any ways belonging or appertaining thereunto in whatsoever place it may be, to be entirely divided between my sons, James, Alexander & William & my daughter Elizabeth (married Charles Miles) at such time & in such manner, as Margret my wife shall think proper, and also Margret my wife is to have her choice of any room in the house for her residence, during her life, as also my silver buckles, during her life, and at her decease, my buckles to devolve to my son Alexander, Likewise I bequeath my silver clasps to my son William, Likewise I bequeath my oldest sorral mare to my son Andrew, the remainder of my horse creatures, I bequeath to my son William, Likewise I bequeath to Margaret my wife her choice of two cows out of the whole flock, and I order & will that she have a sufficient maintenance for herself & her creatures, off of the Plantation, whereon I now live, during the term of her life, I bequeath unto my daughter Elizabeth (Miles) three cows & three heifers, three Ewes & three weathers. The remainder of my stock of cattle I bequeath to my sons James, Alexander & William, in equal parts, to be divided. Likewise I bequeath my Harrow, Handscrew & Cross-Cut Land to my four sons. And I do order & appoint whatever else belongs to my Estate, and is not mentioned in this my last Will & Testament, be entirely at my wife's disposal, either to keep for her own use, or divide as she shall think proper, and I do constitute & appoint my sons Andrew, & James to be sole Executors to this my last Will & Testament in trust for the intent & purpose therein contained, In witness whereof I the s<sup>d</sup> Alexander Love

5. THOMAS, born in 1722, d. 8-12-1728. Interred in F. B. G., at Old Sadsbury, Lanc. Co., Pa.

(All born near Atglen in Sadsbury Twp., Chester Co., Pa.)

6. WILLIAM, b. 10-26-1726, m. 5-20-1749, at F. M. H., in Sadsbury, to Rachel, dau. of William & Sarah Marsh, of Sadsbury Twp., Chester Co., Pa. Rachel d. —17—. William married again, 8-31-1751, at Sadsbury, to Lydia, dau. of John and Hannah (Saunders) Minshall, of Sadsbury, Chester Co. He settled on a portion of his father's farm in Sadsbury Twp., Chester Co., where both he and Lydia died. Both interred in F. B. G. at Sadsbury. No children by first marriage.



7. ROBERT, b. 9-1-1728, d. 3-25-1732. Interred in F. B. G. at Sadsbury.

8. DAVID, born in 1731, d. 5-20-1744. Interred in F. B. G. at Sadsbury.

9. ANDREW, b. 12-1-1733, m. 9-26-1754, at Sadsbury F. M. H., to Rebecca, dau. of Jeremiah and Rebecca (Jackson) Starr, of London Grove Twp., Chester Co. Rebecca b. 4-23-1737. Andrew had learned the trade of a miller, but after marriage, settled on a farm inherited from his father, in Sadsbury, Lanc. Co., where he resided until the spring of 1801. Unable, on account of the high price for land, to secure comfortable homes for all of his children, several of whom had gone as far west as Half Moon Valley, Centre Co., Pa., and purchased homes there, he concluded, with his wife and younger children, to follow them. Having settled his business affairs and disposed of his property, he started for his new home with two four-horse wagons laden with household goods, and two cows tied behind them. They journeyed to Harrisburg, Pa., intending to remain that night. Upon entering the (then) village, Andrew, standing on the front of one of the wagons, exclaimed, "*I have come here to lay my bones!*" During the night he was taken seriously ill, and after about nine days' sickness, he died 5- -1801. His remains were taken to Middletown, Dauphin Co., for interment in the F. B. G. His widow returned to Lanc. Co. to settle up his estate; the remainder of the family proceeded to their destination. Having settled her husband's estate, she rejoined her family at Half Moon, and died at the residence of her son Thomas. Interred in F. B. G. at Centre. Warrington, M. M. records show: "Rebecca Moore and dau. Sarah produce Certificates from Sadsbury, 6-13-1801, dated 5-20-1801."

10. JOSEPH, b. 7-13-1736, m. 1-22-1756, at F. M. H., in Sadsbury, to Jane, dau. of Henry Marsh, of Sadsbury, Chester Co., Pa. Jane b. 2-18-1735. He resided on a farm inherited from his father, until 1765, when he removed





to London Grove Twp., Chester Co., and there died 7-13-1805. Jane d. 11-15-1779. Both interred in F. B. G. at West Grove.

11. ROBERT, b. 10-22-1739, m. 11-10-1768, at Sadsbury F. M. H., to Mary, dau. of Moses and Elinor (Verman) Brinton, of Lampeter, Lanc. Co., Pa. Mary b. 6-12-1748. Robert resided on a farm in Lanc. Co., near what is now known as the "Gap Tavern." He d. 2-9-1826. Mary d. 5-22-1841. Both interred in F. B. G. at Sadsbury.

12. JOHN, b. 10-3-1742, m. 5-1-1765, to Sarah, dau. of William Downing, of Bart, Lanc. Co., Pa. He was a miller, and resided at Octoraro Mills, near the present town of Atglen. Sarah d. 2-8-1774, interred at Sadsbury. John married 2d time, 4-2-1777, to Mary, widow of Caleb Mercer, and dau. of ——— Pierce. John d. 6-28-1821; Mary d. ———; both interred in F. B. G. at Sadsbury.

13. DAVID, b. 10-13-1745, m. 10-5-1768, at Sadsbury F. M. H., to Martha, dau. of Joseph and Mary (Minshall) Williams, of Sadsbury. He was a cooper, and resided on his inherited property in Sadsbury, Chester Co., until within a few years of his death, when he removed to the residence of his son-in-law, David Fell, in London Grove, where he died, 1-16-1829. Martha d. 2-22-1822, at the same place. Both interred in the F. B. G. at New Garden.

14. RACHEL, b. 3-12-1742, m. 11-12-1761, at Sadsbury F. M. H., to John, son of Thomas and Ann Truman, of Sadsbury, Chester Co. John was a miller, and resided all his life at what was known as Truman's Mills, near Parkesburg, Chester Co. Rachel d. 7-1-1828. John b. 8-26-1739; d. 10-22-1828.

15. SARAH, b. ———, m. 11-1-1769, at Sadsbury F. M. H., to William Truman, a brother of her sister's husband, after which she lived but a short time, leaving an only child, Mary. William married second time, 12-24-1777, to Susanna Ferree.

Jacob Birdsall formerly resided in Amwell Twp., Hunterdon Co., N. J. 12-9-1765, Ruth Moore obtains Certificate from Kingwood, N. J., M. M., to Sadsbury, Pa., M. M. Ruth d. —.

The following letter was written to Ruth Passmore, by her Mother, Ruth (Birdsall) Moore, soon after her marriage to Ellis Passmore:

It is directed—

Andrew m. a second time, 1-1-1799, to Sarah, widow of James Worstall and dau. of Arnold and Margery Warner, of Blockley Twp., Phila. Co., Pa. Andrew resided near the site of the present town of Christiana, Lanc. Co., Pa., upon property now (1897) owned by Joseph D. C. Pownall. In addition to farming extensively for those early days, he entered into the iron business, at Doe Run Forge, with his son-in-law, Ellis Passmore, Andrew furnishing stock and cash to the amount of £244, 13s. 3½d. The name of the firm was Moore & Passmore. 6-18-1793, they bought land of Robert Barnes on Doe Run in Chester County, and erected upon it a new forge, Andrew again furnishing £94, 17s. 6d.

They ran both the forges at the same time and did a large business, acquiring considerable wealth. The partnership seems to have been dissolved 1-6-1797, by the withdrawal of Andrew Moore.

Andrew was a man of considerable ability as a writer of both prose and poetry, and it is a matter of regret that none of his productions could be found to insert in this volume. He was an active member of the Society of Friends, and zealous in doing works of charity. He was very fond of innocent amusements, and rather disposed to playing practical jokes, a trait inherited by some of his descendants. It is related of him that on one occasion he missed hay from one of his stacks, which had evidently been stolen, but no idea could be formed as to the thief. He, however, concluded to watch for him one bright moonlight night. Presently a man came, took a considerable quantity of hay from one stack, tied it up in a bundle, and started off with it. Andrew, who had been an interested spectator from behind another stack, slipped up behind him, set the hay on fire, and retreated to his hiding place to watch the result. The hay was soon in a blaze, and the thief, with an unearthly scream, dropped the blazing load and ran as for his life. The next morning one of Andrew's daughters told him that John —— wanted to see him in the office; her father told her to say to him that he could not go to the office until after breakfast, and that he should



come into the room. After some hesitancy, John came in. "Rutlie," said Andrew to his wife, "put on a plate for John." John protested, but Andrew insisting, he came to the table, trying doubtless to eat a breakfast which had no relish for him. After breakfast they retired to the office, where John with tears told Andrew how wicked he had been, that he had been in the habit of stealing hay from his stacks, and that on the previous evening while carrying away a bundle of hay, although the weather was cool and clear, a thunderbolt from Heaven had struck it and set it on fire. He begged piteously for forgiveness, which Andrew readily granted, impressing upon him the importance of honesty, saying, "the next time the bolt may hit thee, John." After John's death Andrew told the story, adding that John was never afterward known to do a dishonest act.

Andrew died in 1805, interred in F. B. G. at Sadsbury, Lanc. Co., Pa. His widow, Sarah, removed to Phila., where she d. 12-18-1813.

The following items from Andrew's will may be of interest—the will being executed 2- -1805, and probated 4-9-1805:

"Item. To my daughters Elizabeth and Cassandra each £150 of money of Penna., at the age of 18 years, and should said daughters be unmarried at the time of my death, then at the age of 18 years they are each to have £20 as a wedding outfit, in lieu of what their married sisters received. I direct the plantation on which I live to be sold, also the wood-land on Valley Mountain, and the proceeds to be equally divided among my children, except Sarah Hall—to her only 4 pounds, for reasons best known to myself. The share of my daughter Ann Williams to be put on interest, the income of which to be paid to her during life and at her death to be at her disposal to and among her children. To my son-in-law Ellis Passmore one-ninth of all my estate, after deducting special bequests.

"I give and bequeath unto my well beloved friends of Sadsbury Preparative Meeting, the sum of thirty pounds, to be put on interest and the income thereof to be applied towards





the support of my aged father and mother in law, Jacob and Elizabeth Birdsall or the remaining one of them, during life, and the principal to then refund for the purpose of aiding in educating poor children under the discretion of said meeting."

He mentions an ante-nuptial agreement with his wife as the reason for no provision for her in his will.

17. **REBECCA**, b. 2-16-1744, m. 10-24-1764, at F. M. H., at Sadsbury, Lanc. Co., Pa., to John, son of Calvin Cooper, of Sadsbury Twp., where John resided all his life. He was a farmer, and was also engaged in the manufacture of cloth. He was born 12-9-1739, and d. 2-15-1811. Rebecca d. 3-18-1813. Both interred in F. B. G., at Sadsbury, Lanc. Co., Pa.

18. **JEREMIAH**, b. 4-22-1745, m. in 1766, to Mary, dau. of Jacob and Elizabeth (Yates) Wildman, of Loudon Co., Va.\* Jeremiah learned blacksmithing; he was a skilled and ingenious mechanic. He also followed silversmithing. He seems to have prospered, and to have amassed considerable means for the times in which he lived; but upon the breaking out of the Revolutionary War, being a Friend, he had strong religious scruples against war, and would not in any way aid those who were struggling to throw off the oppressor's yoke. He seems to have become very obnoxious to the patriots, amongst whom he resided; but after the most diligent and patient research, the author has failed to find any overt act of his, or of his sons, inconsistent with the principles of Peace, as inculcated by the Society to which they belonged. 'Tis true there were some Royalists in the section in which he lived, and the author presumes he gave shelter and food to them as well as to the Loyalists, who came to his abode seeking it.

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\* On 3-19-1766, he was complained of for out-going in marriage, but making the necessary acknowledgments, he was not disowned. See Sadsbury M. M. Records.



He and his sons, Solomon and Jacob, have been charged with harboring "The Doanes and Other Refugees," but the author is convinced this statement is false, as his sons (Solomon and Jacob) were not old enough, even at the *close* of the Revolution, to take any part in it, and the following Certificate shows Jeremiah to have retained his membership among the Friends:

"Whereas, Jeremiah Moore, late of this township of Sadsbury, county of Lancaster in Pennsylvania, moved with his family in the 10th month, last past, in order to travel to Niagara, with a view to settle there, and he having requested a Certificate from our monthly meeting, but we, understanding that there is no established meeting of people called Quakers there, thought it was not according to our order to give him one, these may certify that he and his family are worthy members of our meeting.

"Subscribed by us as members of Sadsbury particular meeting in a private capacity, the 7th of the 6th month, 1789.

It is evident Jeremiah had very trying times, and suffered greatly at the hands of the Patriot army. His property was confiscated, and it is related that, on one occasion, some soldiers came to his house, and carried off all their silverware, dishes, etc., even taking the cup from which the baby drank its milk; drove off his cows, horses and sheep, in fact stripped him of everything, so that he had to depend upon the charity of his neighbors and friends. After struggling for a few years in a vain effort to regain his position in the community, he decided to remove with his family to Canada. In the fall of 1788, he started, with



his wife and children, on this long trip, most of it through an unbroken wilderness, beset with all kinds of danger. The only means of conveyance was one horse, on which the wife and mother rode, carrying by turns the younger children. After about two months of toilsome, weary traveling, they reached Canada, 11-3-1788. He settled in Stamford, County Welland, District of Niagara, Canada. Great as had been their trials in Penna., and on their tedious journey, they were destined to undergo still greater ones in their new home. The winter of 1788-9 was unusually severe, and in mid-winter their stock of provisions was reduced to three pounds of flour for the entire family. Solomon and Jacob went out in search of food, and finding some, started for home. When within about three miles of their cabin, Jacob, from sheer exhaustion, gave out, and Solomon took him on his back, and carried him to their house, where, after great exertion, he was restored to consciousness. Their main sustenance was obtained by boiling the bark of spruce, beech, and other trees, and drinking it.

The New York Tract Association of Friends published the following tract, No. xxv. Jeremiah's family is the particular one alluded to in it:

#### "GOD'S CARE OF HIS CHILDREN.

"In the early settlement of Canada, a few families removed from Pennsylvania and passing through a wilderness of considerable extent, settled nearly thirty miles west of Buffalo. They cleared a small tract of land and raised some grain. In the autumn some more families joined them, depending upon their crops, but in consequence of so large an addition to their settlement their provisions failed, and the weather being very cold, and the snow deep, they could not go in search of food. They lived for some time on slippery elm and basswood, of which they made a kind of jelly; but this soon failed, for when the sap began to rise in the trees it made them sick. There now seemed no resource but to die, but He who careth for the sparrows and provideth food for the young ravens, re-



membered them. One morning, when they were almost discouraged, a pigeon was seen sitting on a tree near the door. It was taken by one of the family, and being cooked by the mother, was eaten with thankfulness.

“For fourteen days a pigeon was seen in the same place, and supplied them with food for each day. On the fifteenth, the pigeon did not come, and one of the little boys, who was ill, and lying in bed, was looking for the daily visitant, asked his mother if she thought God was offended with them that He did not send another pigeon. On that morning, the father, going to a stream of water, found the ice was melting, and caught several fish, which, with the sap which soon began to flow from the maple trees, preserved their lives.”

The following summer of 1789, was long remembered as the “Scarce-Season.” After suffering untold hardships for a few years, he became, by industry and economy, enabled to not only comfortably support his family, but even acquired a fair competency, and attained a position in society, honored and respected throughout that entire section. Some years afterward, he and his wife paid a pleasant visit to his relatives and friends in Pennsylvania, coming the whole distance on horseback.

He d. 3-18-1813, in Pelham, County Welland, Ontario, Canada. Mary d. 6-8-1826. Both interred in F. B. G., at Pelham, Ont., Can.

19. **MARY**, b. 6-23-1747, d. 4-26-1748. Interred in F. B. G., at Sadsbury, Lanc. Co., Pa.

20. **JAMES**, b. 7-19-1749, d. 9-6-1755. Interred in F. B. G., at Sadsbury, Pa.

21. **ANN**, b. 9-27-1751, m. 7-20-1769, at F. M. H., at Sadsbury, to Asahel, son of Isaac and Sarah (Garman) Walker. Asahel b. 2-20-1746, in Montgomery Co., Pa. He was a mill-wright, but was also engaged in farming. He settled in Warrington Twp., York Co., Pa., where he resided for a number of years, then removed to Sadsbury,





Pa., where he spent the remainder of his days. He d. 8-5-1838. Ann d. 3-30-1821. Both interred in F. B. G., at Old Sadsbury, Pa.

22. JOHN, b. 7-2-1754, m. 8-24-1775, at F. M. H., at Sadsbury, to Elizabeth, dau. of Robert and Susan (Foster) Fulton, of North Carolina. Elizabeth b. 1-29-1744. John was a miller, resided near the site of the present town of Christiana, Lanc. Co., Pa., and d. 9-1-1819. Elizabeth d. 8-18-1819. Thus after living together for forty-four years, they died within 13 days of each other. Both interred in F. B. G., at Old Sadsbury, Pa.

23. JAMES, b. 8-8-1761, m. 8-13-1782, at her father's residence, to Rebecca Birdsall, sister of his brother Andrew's wife.

Kingwood, N. J., Monthly Meeting records show the following:

"Witnesses at the marriage of (23) James Moore of Sadsbury, Lancaster county, son of (2) James Moore of the same place and Rebekah Birdsall.

Some of these belong to Joseph the Quaker Minister. This looks as if the Wood-bridge, N. J., and Lancaster County Moores were related.

Rebecca d. —. James m. 2d time —, to Jane, dau. of Benjamin and Martha (Whitson) Canby, of Bucks Co., Pa. Jane born 2-2-1772. James learned the milling trade with his father, but it not being congenial to his taste, he



relinquished it, and studied medicine. In 1816, he removed to Ohio, and after a brief sojourn at Mt. Pleasant, Jefferson Co., he purchased a farm in Belmont Co., near the county-seat of St. Clairsville, where he continued to reside until his death. He was esteemed in the neighborhood as an able and successful practitioner, and maintained an honorable standing in his profession, continuing in active practice until near the time of his death. His compositions in both poetry and prose—still extant—show that he was a man of more than ordinary intelligence. He was noted for honesty of heart, integrity of purpose, and a kind, genial disposition.

He d. 4-3-1832. Jane d. 9-9-1839. Both interred at St. Clairsville, O.

25. RACHEL, b. —, m. —, to — Rodgers.

5-9-1767, Rachel offered an acknowledgment for being married by a Priest.

(See Warrington M. M. Records.)

Rachel removed from Adams Co., Pa., to near Taneytown, Carroll Co., Md., where she died without issue. The author has been unable to obtain the Christian name of her husband.

Extracts from Rachel Rodgers' Will, probated 8-3-1825, John Jones, Jr., executor. She mentions as legatees the following:

James Rodgers, Mary Harris, John Brannon, Harriet Jones, Harriet Nail, Mary Sparks, daughter of James Sparks, Mary Sipes, James Sparks and Mary, his wife, but gives no clue as to whether any of these persons are relatives or not.

26. WILLIAM, b. —, m. —, to Catharine Scoggin.



5-31-1759, Finley McGrew was appointed his Guardian. William at this time was only 16 years of age. He was a farmer, resided in Adams Co., Pa. In the account of the executor of the estate of his stepfather James Hamel, occurs this item: "No. 13. By cash paid William Carson a legacy bequeathed him by the Will of William Carson his father whose Executrix intermarried with James Hamel the testator as per his release to this account dated 7-5-1768, 57£. 3s. 9d."

No. 21. By cash paid William Carson a legacy by testator's Will 0£. 5s. od. William was killed in 1789 by lightning together with his son William. His son John and widow Catharine administered on his Estate. Letters granted 10-29-1789; filed their account 7-28-1796. There was a balance for distribution of about \$200. (See Records, York Co., Pa.)

27. ANN, b. —, d. —. In the account of William Delap, Executor of James Hamel, deceased, the executor charges himself with "To the amount of the Testators Wife's share of a dec'd. child of William Carson named Ann, deceased in her minority as app<sup>rs</sup> by Wm. Carson's Will being the third of £22. 10s. of minors Legacy, 7£. 10s. od."

Child of JAMES and (3) MARY (MOORE-CARSON) HAMEL.

28. MARY, b. 11-18-1756, m. 5-3-1786, to Hugh Johnson. Hugh was a farmer, b. 8-10-1760.

Children of ALEXANDER and (4) MARGARET (MOORE) LOVE.

29. RACHEL, b. —, m. —, to Francis Ross, a native of Virginia. When quite young, his parents emigrated to North Carolina, and settled in Mecklenburg County, between Coddle Creek and Rocky River. Before the Revolutionary War he came to the "New Acquisition," now York County, S. C., and located about two miles from where Yorkville is now situated. From his high sense of honor,



wealth, and uncommon grace of manner and person, he acquired in the settlement the title of "Gentleman." In all the old land papers of Ross, though signed with a cross, he is styled "Gentleman" Frank Ross. He was a planter, and owned a mill property long known as Ross's Mill. After the battle of King's Mountain, during the Revolutionary War, Col. Tarleton, of the British army, encamped for some days at Ross's Mill to recruit his forces. At the beginning of the Revolution, Francis espoused the cause of the Whig party, and was an active partisan leader to the time of his death. His first service was in the "Snow Campaign," in the winter of 1775 and 1776. In the summer of 1776 he commanded a battalion from York, which was in the "Keowee Expedition," and in the spring of 1779, in command of a battalion of cavalry, joined Col. Hammond and his "light horse," near Augusta, Ga. On the morning of the 29th of March, 1779, five miles east of Rocky Comfort, they attacked a party of Cherokees. Nine Indians were killed, and some white men who were dressed as savages, three Cherokees and three whites captured. The rest fled and saved themselves. Here Maj. Ross received a mortal wound in the abdomen. From a MS. journal of Gen. Joseph Graham of N. C., we make the following extract: "The brave Major Frank Ross died of his wounds the 31st of March and was buried with military honors the 1st of April, in sight of and opposite Augusta on the Carolina side (near where the present town of Hamburg, S. C., is located). Major Frank Ross was more than six feet in height, of a muscular frame, and weighed above two hundred pounds, had dark hair, eyes and complexion, of noble presence and commanding port. He was cut off in the meridian of life, being only about thirty-five years of age at the time of his death. He left three sons, little lads, James, Alexander and William. A faithful negro belonging to their father from boyhood, going always under the sobriquet of 'Cracker Tom,' managed their plantation after his master's death, working himself as well as making others do it, and during the minority of Major Ross's sons,





making the finest crops, keeping everything in order on the premises, and proving himself worthy the confidence reposed in him. When Alexander and William removed from the homestead of their father, 'Cracker Tom,' now verging toward old age, begged to stay in his 'old cabin-home.' They indulged him, and every year sent abundant supplies for his support. At last the decrepitude of years made him willing to go to 'Mar's Alex's' to be taken care of till he died. Rachel was a rather remarkable woman. The night before her husband was killed, she dreamt that he had been killed, and was so impressed with her dream that she was not surprised when his death was announced to her. She d. 4-26-1790. Interred in Turkey Creek Presbyterian Cemetery, York Co., S. C.

30. ANDREW, b. 9-12-1747, m. 3-22-1770, to Anna Latimore. Andrew was a planter. He was a very active Whig, and when the Revolutionary war broke out, he was one of the first to take up arms in the cause of his country. Served with General Sumter. He rose to the rank of Colonel, and was wounded at the battle of 'King's Mountain.' He was, in common with the rest of the Americans of Scotch-Irish ancestry, particularly severe on those who remained loyal to the British Crown, and were termed by their neighbors, 'Tories.' One of Col. Love's sisters married a Loyalist. It was reported to Col. Love that there was to be a meeting of Loyalists at his brother-in-law's house on a certain evening. With a portion of his command, he surrounded the building, and ordered the inmates to surrender. This of course they refused to do. Col. Love then notified them he would shoot the first one who came out. His sister, no doubt thinking she could appease her brother, appeared at the door and came out, unfortunately wearing a hat. One of the soldiers, mistaking her for a man, fired and killed her. This was of course a great cause of regret to all parties. Col. Love was a daring officer, and being a man of great physical power, was beloved by his men and equally as much hated by his enemies. After the close of the war, he returned



to his plantation on Fishing Creek, York Co., S. C., where he resided until 1805, when he removed to Livingston, (now Crittenden) Co., Ky., where some of his children had previously removed. He represented York Co., S. C., for several years in the Legislature. Col. Love had that rich vein of humor for which so many of our Irish ancestors were noted. He is said to have been full of jokes, and very fond of practicing them on his friends. He was a very industrious man; even in his old age, he could not bear to be idle. For many years after removing to Kentucky, he was actively engaged in farming. 3-26-1821, he went out to work on his farm; not returning when he was expected, search was made for him, and he was found in one of his fields, dead. In the "Legend of Ford's Ferry," it is stated, that, "Col. Love was the only witness for the Plff. in a case against the notorious Major James Ford, proprietor of Ford's Ferry. This Ferry was located about fifty-four miles from Paducah, Ky., on the Ohio river, and is still known by that name. On the day before the trial was to come off, Col. Love, bearing marks of violence, was found dead on his own farm, no doubt the victim of some of Ford's outlaws." James Ford was afterwards shot on the veranda of his own house, whilst in the custody of officers, by some one unknown, though it was vaguely hinted it was Col. Love's son, Robert. Col. Love was buried on his farm, about fourteen miles from Marion, Crittenden Co., Ky. Anna d. 5-18-1814.

31. JAMES, b. ——. In trying to assist a man across a river, he fell in and was drowned, when a young man. Unmarried.

32. MARY, b. —, m. —, to David Horner. David was a native of the County of Antrim, Ireland. He emigrated to America about the year 1760, and settled on a farm in Mt. Joy Township, York (now Adams) Co., Pa. He was a farmer, and resided there the rest of his life. He d. —. Mary d. —. Many of the descendants of David Horner became active and influential members of



Emmitsburg, formerly Tom's Creek and Piney Creek Presbyterian churches.

33. JANE, b. —, m. —, to John, son of James Murphy. James was a native of Ireland, but emigrated to America and settled in S. C., where John was b. — 17—. John was a farmer, and a soldier in the Revolutionary war. He removed from S. C. after the Revolution to Miss., where he died in 1834, in Lowndes County, and is interred in Unity Presbyterian Cemetery, near Caledonia, Lowndes Co., Miss. In 1780, John was elected a ruling elder in Bethesda Presbyterian church, York Co., S. C. He became a prominent and useful member thereof. He was the leader of the music in worship.

Jane d. — suddenly, while on a visit at her son Eli's, near Athens, Ga.

34. ELIZABETH, b. —, m. —, to Charles Miles. Elizabeth is named as a legatee in her father's will, dated in 1781. After the most diligent enquiry, nothing further could be learned about this family.

35. MARGARET, b. —, m. —, to James Sterling. Margaret and her daughter Sarah are named as legatees in Alexander Love's will, dated in 1781.

36. SARAH, b. —, m. —, to John Sterling. Sarah was killed by her brother, Col. Andrew Love, or one of his men, by mistake, as previously related. Sarah is said to have left no issue.

37. ROBERT, b. —. He was a soldier during the War of the Revolution, and was engaged to be married to Margaret McDowell. After the close of the war, he was so anxious to see his affianced that he walked seventy-two miles in a day and part of a night to visit her; the exertion was too much, he was taken sick with a fever, and died suddenly. Margaret afterward married Robert's brother, William.



38. **ALEXANDER**, b. —, d. —. He was of a very jovial disposition, a great patriot, never married.

39. **WILLIAM**, b. —, in S. C., m. —, to Margaret McDowell, of Spartanburg Co., S. C. About the year 1806 he removed to Mississippi, settled near Natchez, but after a few years removed to Pike Co., Miss., where he spent the remainder of his days in the peaceful pursuit of farm life. Margaret died in 1834, and William in 1839.

Children of (6) **WILLIAM** and **LYDIA (MINSHALL) MOORE**.

(All born in Sadsbury Twp., Chester Co.)

40. **ANDREW**, b. 10-21-1752, m. 4-30-1777, at Sadsbury F. M. H., to Jane, dau. of William Downing, of Bart Twp., Lanc. Co., Pa. He was a farmer, and resided all his life in Sadsbury, Chester Co.

41. **HANNAH**, b. 9-15-1754, m. to Gravener Marsh. She was his second wife. Removed to Tennessee, where both died. No children.

42. **JOHN**, b. 10-21-1756, m. 4-2-1788, at Sadsbury, to Elizabeth, dau. of Joseph and Deborah Gest, of Sadsbury, Lanc. Co. Elizabeth d. 10-17-1819. John m. second time 12-13-1821, to Alice, dau. of William and Catharine Evans, of Lampeter, Lanc. Co. He resided on a farm at Sadsbury, Chester Co. No children by second marriage.

43. **WILLIAM**, b. 11-20-1758, d. 1-22-1759.

44. **RACHEL**, b. 12-11-1759, m. 12-5-1787, at Sadsbury F. M. H., to Nathaniel, son of Gaius and Mary (Newlin) Dickinson, of "The Forest," Robeson Twp., Berks County. Nathaniel was a farmer. They settled in "The Forest," Berks Co., Pa., where both died and were interred in F. B. G., at Robeson, Berks Co., Pa.

45. **WILLIAM**, b. 6-22-1762, m. 3-13-1805, at Sadsbury F. M. H., to Rachel, widow of George Mercer, and dau.





of David Frame. He was a farmer, and lived in Sadsbury, Chester Co. No children.

46. JOSEPH, b. 3-15-1765, m. 3-10-1813, at Sadsbury F. M. H., to Susanna, widow of Joshua Williams, and dau. of James and Elizabeth (Dickinson) Moore. This James Moore was a blacksmith, the son of James of Ballinmoney, County Antrim, Ireland, a brother of (No. 1). Joseph was a carpenter and farmer, (See Appendix), and resided in Chester Co., where he d. 8-18-1838. Susanna b. 11-27-1771, d. —. Both interred in Sadsbury F. B. G.

47. JOSHUA, b. 8-21-1767, d. 11-13-1771.

48. ELI, b. 12-26-1769, m. 4-8-1801, at Sadsbury F. M. H., to Elizabeth, dau. of Joshua and Hannah (Green) Way. Eli was a cabinet-maker, and resided all his life in Sadsbury, Chester Co., d. 1812. Elizabeth b. 10-21-1779. Both interred in F. B. G. at Sadsbury.

49. LYDIA, b. 10-27-1772, m. —, to James, son of Gravener Marsh. James' father (Gravener) m. Lydia's sister Hannah. James was a farmer, resided in Sadsbury Twp., Chester Co., Pa., d. in 1843. Lydia d. 5-13-1850. Both interred in F. B. G. at Sadsbury.

Children of (9) ANDREW and REBECCA (STARR) MOORE.

(All born in Sadsbury Twp., Lancaster Co., Pa.)

50. JEREMIAH, b. 8-18-1755; m. 4- -1800, at Columbia, Pa., by a magistrate, to Phebe, dau. of William and Mary (Brinton) Jones, of Columbia. Phebe b. 12-27-1776, in Birmingham Twp., Chester Co., Pa. Jeremiah being a deaf mute, could not be married by Friends' Ceremony. He learned mill-wrighting, and became a very skillful and ingenious mechanic. In the spring of 1877, the author visited his son, Jeremiah, then of Jennerville, Chester Co., Pa., by whom he was shown his father's account book. It was a model of ingenuity; when he had difficulty in spelling a word, as for instance "Plow," he would make



the drawing or representation of it. He lived in Sadsbury Twp., Lanc. Co., until 1801, when he removed to Centre Co., Pa., but in the latter part of 1807, returned to Sadsbury, where he continued to live until his decease, 4-18-1834, in which place he was interred in the F. B. G. Phebe died, 11-23-1845, interred in F. B. G., at Centre, Half-Moon Valley, Pa.

51. **RACHEL**, b. 11-6-1757, m. 11-8-1775, to James, son of Calvin and Phebe (Hall) Cooper, of Sadsbury, Pa. James was a farmer. They settled in Lanc. Co., but in 1795, removed to York Co., Pa., where Rachel d. 12-15-1799, and was interred in F. B. G., York, Penna. James m. a second time—Catharine Powell. After James' second marriage, he moved to near Muncy, Pa. 10-23-1806, he procured a certificate for himself, wife, minor children, and sons, James and Thomas, to Whitewater M. M., Indiana. (See Muncy M. M. Records.)

52. **JAMES**, b. 1-8-1760, m. 4-6-1785, at Sadsbury F. M. H., to Lydia, dau. of Abraham and Anna (Young) Sharpless, of Lower Providence, Del. Co., Pa. She was born in Hockessin, Del. James was a farmer, and resided in Sadsbury until 1795, when he removed with his family and settled in Half-Moon Twp., Centre Co., Pa. In 1810, they again removed, crossing the Alleghany Mountains, and settled on a large tract of wild land, in what is now called "Grampian Hills," Clearfield Co. He built the first saw and grist mill in that section. "James Moore and wife Lydia, and children Abraham, Esther, Lydia, Anna, and Jeremiah, moved up the Susquehanna to Huntingdon Co.; obtained Cert. from York M. M., 8-10-1796, which was presented to Warrington M. M., 10-8-1796." Lydia d. 4-24-1828, at her home in West Branch; James d. 9-17-1834, at the residence of his son Jeremiah in Pennsville, Pa. Both interred in F. B. G., at West Branch, Clearfield Co., Pa.

53. **ANDREW**, b. 4-16-1762. He died when a young man, unmarried.



54. **ISAAC**, b. 5-8-1764; m. 10-12-1786, at F. M. H., New Garden, Chester Co., Pa., to Lydia, dau. of James and Amy Wilson, of Hockessin, New Castle Co., Del. Lydia b. 5-14-1764. Isaac was a farmer and miller, and lived a short time at Kennett Square, Chester Co., Pa. Removed to Centre Co. about the year 1795. The following extracts are from Warrington M. Isaac resided the remainder of his life in Half-Moon, Pa., and died there, 10-5-1844. Lydia d. 1840. Both interred in F. B. G., at Centre, Half-Moon Twp., Centre Co., Pa.

55. **THOMAS**, b. 5-9-1766, m. 8-18-1790, at F. M. H., Hockessin, Del. Co., Pa., to Dinah Wilson, a sister of his brother Isaac's wife. In early life he was a miller, but afterward went to farming. In 1794, he moved to Half-Moon, Pa., and settled on the farm where his grandson, Thomas M. Way, now lives. The three brothers, James, Isaac, and Thomas, had adjoining farms. The following extracts are from the records of Warrington M. M.: "Thomas Moore and others make request in writing to this meeting, 11-12-1796, for the establishment of a meeting at Centre, and he is also named as one of the overseers thereof. The request was forwarded to Quarterly Meeting, and granted, 5-22-1797." Thus it appears he was one of the founders of the Centre Meeting. He died at his residence, 12-23-1851. Dinah was b. 11-2-1767, and d. 11-11-1822; both interred in F. B. G., at Centre, Pa.

56. **REBECCA**, b. 11-6-1768, m. 1-8-1795, at Sadsbury, at F. M. H., to Benjamin, son of James Fenton, of N. J. Removed the same year to Half-Moon, Pa., where they lived until 1804, when they settled on the West Branch of the Susquehanna River in Clearfield Co., Pa. Warrington M. M. records say: "Rebecca Fenton's certificate from Sadsbury M. M. to Warrington M. M. received 6-7-1800, dated 2-9-1800. Benjamin Fenton, of Centre Meeting, was also



received into membership, 3-9-1799, and their children, Elisha and Thomas, admitted by parents' request, 12-11-1802. Rebecca d. 3-23, 1816.

57. **SAMUEL**, b. 4-6-1771, m. 10-18-1793, at Hockessin, Del., to Lydia, dau. of John Way, of Mill Creek, Del. Samuel d. 2-10-1794, interred in F. B. G., Sadsbury, having lived but about four months after his marriage. His widow, Lydia, married a second time, David Richards. No children.

58. **ELISHA**, b. 3-18-1773, m. —, to Elinor Barber, of York Co., Pa. He was a well educated man, and for many years followed the profession of teaching; he finally settled in Bellefonte, Pa., where he was elected a magistrate, and became widely known as "Squire Moore." He died in Hollidaysburg, Pa., 9-25-1841. Elinor d. 3-16-1821, and was interred in Union Cemetery, Bellefonte, Pa.

59. **ELIJAH**, b. 8-9-1775, m. 1-13-1798, at Newberry Meeting, York Co., Pa., to Sarah, dau. of James and Elizabeth Allen, of London Grove, Chester Co. He settled in Half Moon, a short time before his marriage, and was a farmer, and d. at Half Moon, 5-29-1809. Sarah d. 10-20-1819. Both interred in F. B. G., at Centre.

60. **SARAH**, b. 8-9-1777. In 1801, removed with her mother to Half Moon; m. at Centre Meeting, 3-24-1803, to David, son of David and Elizabeth Allen, of Little Britain Twp., Lanc. Co., Pa. There being no M. M. at Centre, they were obliged to go to York Co., to "pass meeting," and in the 2nd mo. four of them started on horseback for the Warrington M. M., where they gave in their intentions personally, and remained over one month, until after the next M. M., when they were at liberty to consummate their marriage according to the Society of Friends. The remainder of their married life they resided at Half Moon, where Sarah d. 4-25-1845, and was interred in F. B. G., at Centre. She was a great sufferer most of her life, but bore her affliction with patience and Christian resignation.

Their children all had their hearing and speech, and in his anxious desire to know if they could hear he would sometimes make a loud noise, and then intently watch if they would notice it. He kept bees, and at one time had some stolen, and early next morning went to one of the neighbors, tapped one of the thieves on the shoulder, and by signs charged him and some others with the theft; which proved to be correct, and all of whom Joseph pointed out.

He was a member of the Society of Friends, and would gaze intently at the minister, as if he gathered something of what was delivered. Various instances might be mentioned of his finding out circumstances, and of his pointing upward, intimating that he had great faith and confidence in the way of truth and right.

He took part in the struggles of the Revolution for Independence, and on one occasion, when returning home (after being out for several months with a scouting party to prevent the British from plundering the inhabitants of Bucks, Chester, and Montgomery counties)—his time having expired January, 1778—he, with his father and several companions, were overtaken by British horsemen, and all taken prisoners. His father was barbarously wounded for not yielding readily, having made a desperate struggle to escape.

This occurred near Spring House Tavern, Montgomery Co., Pa. They were taken to Philadelphia, and kept in the Old Jail for five months; the father (Thomas) dying in jail eight days after their capture, from severe wounds and want of attention. His son (Charles) was obliged to drive him in a rough wagon, at a rapid rate, with the blood trickling through the crevices, and the horsemen swearing at him for not driving faster. When the jail was reached, they were separated, and never again saw each other on earth. It is said he is interred at Montgomery Square, Mont. Co., Pa.

In the fall of 1780, *Charles* was at Stony Point, in General Anthony Wayne's command, when Arnold's conspiracy was discovered, and he with his companions marched all night along the Hudson River, to prevent the enemy from landing.

Next day, they began a march for West Point, through a cold, heavy rain, so penetrating and chilling as to oblige them to seek shelter in the woods, where they nearly perished from the cold and wet; some creeping under rocks, others under logs, where they remained until morning, when they resumed their march, reaching West Point at five o'clock that evening. They were at once detailed for duty, and it fell to his lot, with others, to go to "Britain's Defiance," a half mile beyond the Point, over the mountain. Already spent with fatigue and hunger, and ready to faint from weakness, they thought they could not possibly climb the mountain; but youth and ambition conquered, and at a little after dark, they reached the Fort, and he was one of the first sentinels placed on guard that evening.

When relieved, he found his companions cooking and baking cakes, having broken open stores. It was long before his turn came to cook, and as he was almost starved (having had nothing to eat for three days but some wild cherries they found in a hollow along the Hudson), he searched until he found a barrel of shad, and voraciously fell to eating them raw, thinking them the best he had ever eaten.

This is all that is left of an account of his war experience, written by himself, the other pages having disappeared, to our intense regret.

Ruth was of rather a frail constitution, but of a lovely, sweet disposition, a most amiable companion, a loving and indulgent mother. Her early death was an irreparable loss to her sons, whose training was mainly left to her, as her husband was deeply engrossed in business, and absent from home much of his time. The author has often heard his father speak of her, in the most affectionate manner, long years after she had been laid to rest. Ellis m. 2d time 10-6-1813, to Sarah, the widow of William Hall, and sister of his first wife. Ellis learned the blacksmith's trade with his father, after whose death he became the owner of the forges, and also the farm on Doe Run. He was a man of great energy and superior business qualifications. About 1803 he bought a tract of land on Big Elk Creek, in New London Twp., and erected thereon what



was long famous under the name of the Pleasant Garden Iron Works. The hills on either side of the creek were densely covered with timber and laurel, and wild turkeys and other game were abundant. He was also interested in other iron works situate on the same creek, near Turkeytown, Cecil Co., Md. In 1814, he moved back to his property on Doe Run, and in 1816, in conjunction with his brother-in-law, Benjamin Jones, of Philadelphia, purchased 4,000 acres of land on the Potomac River, in St. Mary's Co., Md., at \$8.00 per acre, and moved thereon with his family in May, 1817. In September of that year (the sickly season), he sent his children to Chester Co., Pa., and he with his wife also started for the same destination, stopping on his way, in Loudon Co., Va., to visit some relatives, where he was taken violently ill with a fever, and after a brief illness, died at the residence of Whitson Birdsall, who was his cousin, 10-5-1817. Interred in F. B. G., at Goose Creek, Loudon Co., Va. Ellis was noted for his physical strength and activity. It is said he was never thrown in a fair wrestle, and that, with the use of a pole, he could jump entirely over a covered wagon on its wheels. The late Hon. William Williamson, of West Chester, Pa., often related the following incident concerning him: "At the raising of a barn at Doe Run village, and when Ellis was about 19 years of age, after the labor was over they amused themselves, as was the custom in those days, by engaging in wrestling and other athletic sports, in which no one could throw him; but some carpenters were present from Lancaster, Pa., and said they knew a man who could do it. Some time afterward, while Ellis was repairing fence along the roadside, a stranger rode up and inquired for "Doe Run Tavern." He said also that he had never been thrown, and had come on to have a trial with Ellis Passmore of that neighborhood. Our fence-maker told him he knew the young man he was inquiring for, quite well, and suggested that he go over into the field and try him, when he could determine whether it would be worth while to seek Ellis. Entering into a mutual agreement that neither should get out of



humor, they "took holds," and the stranger was thrown several times in succession. Ellis then made himself known, invited the Lancaster man to his home, where he took dinner with him, and had his horse cared for; after which he went on his way, very clearly satisfied that he had met a man who was his superior in physical power and agility. Ellis was an ingenious mechanic, skilled and successful, and could make two horse-shoe nails "at one heat."

Thus we see two brothers marrying two sisters who were their cousins. Soon after, Solomon and Jacob, with their young wives, went to Canada, and settled in the Township of Pelham, County Welland, Province of Ontario. Solomon was a man of great physical strength and agility, and marvelous stories are told of his feats in jumping and wrestling. During the War of 1812, he was captain of a company, serving under the British General Isaac Brock. After the burning of Ft. George, in 1814, Capt. Moore asked for and obtained permission to go over to Buffalo,



N. Y., and get the countersign from the Americans. Having accomplished this most perilous task, he returned and led the attack on that city, which was pillaged and burned. At the close of the war, he returned to his old occupation of farming, in Pelham, where he spent the residue of his life, and d. 12-25-1825. Elinor d. ——. Interred in F. B. G., at Pelham.

131. JACOB, born in 1768, m. in 1792, in Loudon Co., Va., to Rachel Wildman, sister of his brother Solomon's wife. Jacob emigrated to Canada with his parents, but returned to the United States, as narrated in the history of his brother, Solomon. Going farther inland, they met some Esquimaux. The band becoming separated, Benjamin spent the winter in a snow-hut with a hermit. In the spring he made his way into Canada, but here a new trouble awaited him. The war between the United States and England was in progress (1812) and he was arrested by the British as an American spy and confined in a block-house until the place was taken by the Americans, when he was released. He then went to visit his mother's brother, Benjamin Canby, who had settled some years before in Canada. His uncle was wealthy and offered him a home and property if he would take the oath of allegiance to the British Government. The young American refused to do this and returned to his father's home in Penna. The following is furnished by his daughter Barbara. "At one time, in a storm at sea, the captain ordered a boy to climb the mast, and furl the sail. The storm was furious, and the boy, very naturally, was afraid to try it.





My father prepared to go in his place. He secured his *bible next his heart, feeling the need of Divine protection*, and began to climb the mast. The furious gale bent the mast over the sea, and it seemed as if he must fall into the foaming depths below. But at last he gained the top, accomplished his work, and descending reached the deck with his precious bible in safety. In relating this anecdote afterwards he would (to the amusement of his hearers) stop in the middle of the story and remark 'And Bab (meaning me) lost that bible at last.'" In 1816 he removed with the rest of his father's family to Ohio, and in a few years later to Mercer Co., Ky., where he resided for some years, teaching and farming. In May, 1835, he was unanimously chosen Professor of Mathematics in Morrison College of Transylvania University, Lexington, Ky., at a salary of \$800 per annum, a position which his fine mathematical ability enabled him to fill with credit to himself and profit to his students. He relinquished his position after some years and purchased property in Illinois, near Springfield, removing to it. He there spent the remainder of his days. From numerous letters and other writings of his which the author has examined, it is evident he was a man of superior natural abilities, highly improved by study and a varied experience.

He d. 9-15-1871, and was interred in Rock Creek Cemetery, 7 miles south of Petersburg, Ill.

She was a woman of rare traits of character, gentle in disposition, possessed of a kind heart and most agreeable manners. She was a devoted wife and mother. A firm believer in the religion of Jesus Christ, having been an active member of the Methodist Episcopal church for over 30 years.

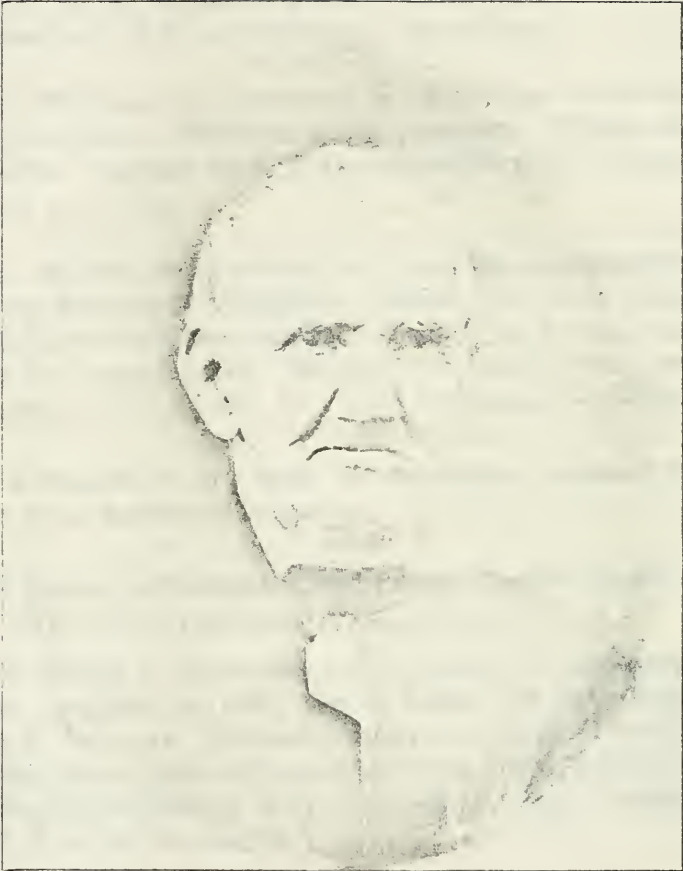

The following extract is taken from a Memorial concerning him, published in the Minutes of the Baltimore Yearly Meeting of the Society of Friends for 1875:

"In the year 1796, Jeremiah removed with his family, and settled in Centre County, then nearly a wilderness. The advantages of education were, at that early day, limited, yet amid these privations, they earnestly endeavored to train up their children, to habits of honesty, industry, and temperance, which characteristics distinguished them during life. In 1810, they crossed the Alleghanies, and settled in Clearfield County, where they were the pioneers in the establishment of West Branch Monthly Meeting in 1833, an indulged meeting having been held at their house for several years previously. The subject of this memoir was early impressed with a sense of the Divine Presence, stimulating him to obedience to its requireing, and showing him that this alone would give him peace. He was a regular and faithful attender of all his religious meetings, in which his ministry was profitable and edifying. His communications were generally brief, yet in the authority of





the Gospel of Christ; and his gift having been early acknowledged by his Monthly Meeting, he traveled in the service of truth within the limits of other Yearly Meetings. In the year 1857, he attended Ohio Yearly Meeting, and most of the meetings composing it; and on his return, expressed the satisfaction and peace of mind he felt in the accomplishment of this service. In 1864, he was taken ill, and during his prostration, he felt the overshadowing of Divine Love, and he was made sensible that he would be accepted if he continued faithful to the end; he often referred to this season as a foretaste of joys to come. He was much inclined to reading and meditation, and as age advanced, spent much of his time in retirement. The following extract from a letter written to one of his daughters, then at a distance from home, will give evidence of the state of his mind:

“As thou art absent from thy friends with whom thou didst love to mingle, and from our meetings where strength is to be obtained, hold on thy way in the path of virtue; for in every place we shall be preserved if we keep inward and watchful, for the Scripture saith, ‘Greater is he that is in you, than he that is in the world,’ and again, ‘Hold fast to those things which thou hast learned,’ and ‘Have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather reprove them.’ I sometimes feel lonely, but have many kind friends, and the love I feel for them tends to make life happy; and above all, as my time in this world is fast coming to a close, I have an unshaken confidence that when it comes, I shall pass to a purer state of happiness, to meet with many who are gone before to their everlasting rest.’

“He was an attentive peruser of the Holy Scriptures, to the truth of which he could bear testimony by living experience. On being told that some of his friends were coming to hold a meeting in his room, he replied that it ‘rejoiced his heart.’ When no longer able to read, he requested to have the Scriptures read to him, until frail nature gave way. Almost the last words that were audible were, ‘We know not in what watch of the night the



Son of Man cometh.' His remains were followed by a very large concourse of Friends and others, and a solemn meeting was held on the occasion, in which testimonies were borne to the purity of his life and peaceful close."

"They traveled with their household goods in a wagon to Pittsburg, Pa., where they bought a flat-boat, and set out on their voyage down the Ohio river. The crew, all told, consisted of husband, wife, and a one year old son, accompanied by their faithful dog. Drifting by day with the current, and at night mooring their boat, sometimes sleeping by a fire on the shore, and sometimes in the boat—having anchored it at cable's length out in the river, that they might be safe from the wild beasts of the forest, in having it easy of access. They continued on their perilous journey, and at last reached Cincinnati, O., where they sold the boat, and proceeded by conveyance to Waynesville, Warren Co., O., where Isaiah secured employment and a home for the winter. Afterward they located more permanently at a point six miles from Wilmington, Clinton Co., where he set up a blacksmith's forge, and followed the trade for some years, when he bought a farm in the same county and located on it in 1839, and continued to live there, where Elizabeth d. 12-23-1858. She was a



member of the Society of Friends, and lived a useful and exemplary Christian life. Interred in F. B. G., at Lytle's Creek, Clinton Co., O." Isaiah d. 2-23-1873.

298. THOMAS, b. 2-22-1802, m. in 1830, at Centre F. M. H., to Sarah, dau. of David and Lydia (Way-Moore) Richards, of Half Moon Valley, Pa. Lydia was the widow of (57) Samuel Moore. From about 1825 to 1830, he was editor of a paper, and also frequently taught school. He was also interested in flouring and woolen mills from 1835 to 1840, and was part owner. In 1840 he took an active part in the anti-slavery movement, and undertook to promote free-labor ideas, in establishing a store at Stormstown, Pa., where no slave-labor products were allowed to be sold, but it failed to receive the requisite patronage. From 1840 to 1844, he owned and worked a farm some three miles from Stormstown, when he removed to Stark Co., O., where he lived one year, and then went to Gurneysville, O., 6 miles from Wilmington, and settled down to blacksmithing until 1855, about which time he moved to Cincinnati, O., hoping to secure better medical aid for his sick wife, but she died in 2- -1856, after which several of the children went to Indiana and Iowa. Thomas m. 2d time, and spent part of his time in the West. In 1860, he was a Justice of the Peace in Iowa. He connected himself with the famous "Iowa Graybeard Regiment," and served out his full time. He again followed teaching in which he was quite successful, and in 1869, when he was stricken with paralysis and became unfitted for work, his 2d wife d., and he then lived with his children, either with those in the West or in W. Va. He d. in Charleston, W. Va., 6-1-1876, in which place he was interred in the "Spring Hill Cemetery." The following peculiar statement concerning him, is furnished us by his son: "In about 1840, on account of his claimed 'liberal views,' he joined the 'Progressive Friends.' He afterwards adopted spiritualism, in which belief he continued until his death. He had particularly declared to the wife of one of his sons, that (after death) if opportunity



offered, he would 'come back' and talk to her. "He was a man of lovely character, as were all his brothers and sisters, gentle in manner, even in temperament, and 'Friends' in everything but profession."—(E. W. McC.) On a neat monument marking his last resting place in Pequea Presbyterian Cemetery, is inscribed the following:

He became the owner of a large tract of land, which he cultivated, and at the same time followed his profession. He cultivated the first field of wheat grown within the present limits of the State of Mississippi. He was a member of the Territorial Legislature, and afterwards in the Legislature of the State. In athletic sports he excelled, and could jump 36 feet in three successive jumps. He was a beautiful penman, a forcible writer, and skilled and successful in his chosen profession. His health being impaired, and hoping for relief by a visit North, he resolved to visit his friends in Pennsylvania. He went by water to Wheeling, Va., where he purchased a horse and carriage, and drove to Bedford Springs, Penna. Here he was taken suddenly ill, and d. 6-27-1839, his brother—the late Hon. B. J. Passmore—only arriving in time to attend his funeral. Interred in the Presbyterian Cemetery, Bedford, Pa. His




widow m. Jackson Warren, and lived near Canton, Miss., until her decease, 5-10-1891.



“Israel Cooper, a prominent citizen of Columbia thirty or more years ago, died at the residence of his son, Jeremiah, in Glen Hope, Clearfield County, on the 16th day of April, 1878, aged about eighty-five years. For thirty years he was the most extensive builder in Lancaster County. He erected all the public buildings along the line of the Columbia and Philadelphia Railroad, and a number of the bridges also along the line. He erected all the lock-houses and offices along the Tide Water Canal, and some of the locks.

“He was a person endowed with wonderful energy and endurance. It was no unusual occurrence for him to walk



from Columbia to this city, and return to the former place in the same manner, and walk perhaps ten or fifteen miles further to inspect his work and instruct those employed by him. He was the first person to enter his shop in Columbia, at daylight, and see that every one had his proper work assigned him, and that all were properly at work as soon as daylight appeared. He always had several apprentices, and he was careful that they did not run out of work should he be accidentally away from home one or two days, for he gave them at least a week's work in advance. It was always his custom to send his apprentices to school during the three winter months, for three, four and five years. He was taciturn, and very strict with his boys, and never permitted them to be out of his house after nine o'clock in the evening. He had uncommon courage and nerve and self-possession.

“Although a Quaker, and opposed from principle to the use of force against force, we have seen him stand before a crowd of men, who undertook to bull-doze and cow him into measures, and even threatened his life; unmoved, he would look a man through and through. He was waylaid and attacked by robbers at night, two or three times, and never lost his presence of mind. His quick wit and nerve saved him. An incident occurred in Columbia about the year 1841, which will illustrate one of these traits. While on his way to Friends' Meeting-House on Cherry Street, on Fifth-day (Thursday), he observed the roof of his shop, a few hundred yards distant, to be on fire. He did not hesitate a moment, but went straight to meeting, and after it was out leisurely walked to his shop. But little damage was done. He asked no questions, but pursued his business as if nothing unusual had taken place.

“He married Rebecca Peart, daughter of Thomas Peart, who was taken prisoner by the Indians, with the Gilbert family, ninety years ago. She was an amiable, intelligent and Christian woman. She died a few years ago, over eighty years of age.”

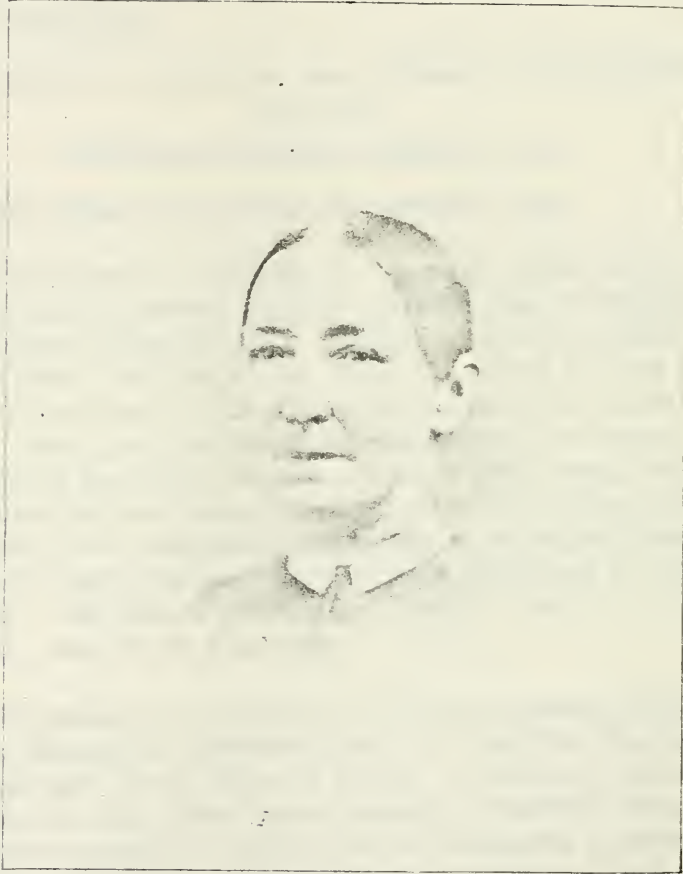

“My father d. at Moore’s Mills, Lanc. Co., Pa., March, 1823. I remained home for two years. After one year with Uncle Ab’m Bell, at Bayside, Long Island, and in New York City, and with Uncle Robt. Moore on the farm near the Gap, Lanc. Co., Pa., up to July, 1827. Then I entered the service of the State of Pennsylvania, as Sub. Ass’t Engineer under Maj. Jno. Wilson, Chief Engineer. Mr. Haynes, Principal Ass’t; Robt. Pettit, Ass’t Rodman; Jno. Edgar Thompson (since the President of the famous ‘Pennsylvania Railroad’) and myself as Sub. Ass’t Chain-bearers; Joshua Scott, Topographer; and a Mr. Dawson as Axe-man. This party, at the summit of Mine Ridge, Lanc. Co., Pa., commenced the *first* survey for a railroad in Pennsylvania, if not the very first in the United States, excepting the gravity power railroad at Mauch Chunk; and I am now, I believe, since the demise of J. Edgar Thompson, the oldest civil engineer in the United States living. I continued in the service of the State as civil engineer until March, 1833, a period of five years and nine months. Then, after surveying and locating the Philadelphia and Columbia Railroad, first at Lancaster, and then at the Gap the latter half of the time, a singular circumstance occurred: I was then a Sub. Ass’t, and had entire control of the Gap division (10 miles), the most difficult

and intricate to locate of the whole 80 miles of the road. In locating my section I had departed from the original lines of survey, and was censured for so doing; but in passing over that road in 1876, on my way to the Centennial Exposition at Philadelphia, it was a source of no little satisfaction and gratification to my pride to see and know that my location of the "Gap Division" was the *only* ten miles of the whole road that had not been improved upon or altered; and that after a test of more than forty years the ideas and work of those inexperienced days had not been substituted by anything of the scientists of the present advanced day. In March, 1833, I left the service of the State, and afterward became Resident Engineer of the Little Schuylkill R. R. and Coal Co. (Edw. Keating, President), and was stationed at Tamaqua, Schuylkill Co., Pa., and remained until Oct. 1, 1834 (1½ years). While in their employ I dispensed with all the horse-power on the road, but continued to do the same amount of transportation by the steam-power already on that road. They had previously worked thirty horses or more. This greatly reduced the company's current expenses. On Oct. 1, 1834, on account of failing health, I obtained leave of absence for the winter (the company refusing to accept my resignation), and went to Philadelphia in search of superior medical aid. Finding no relief, I soon sailed for Charleston, S. C. In the month of November I took passage in the Brig Cronstadt, Capt. Hatch, and after a severe and tempestuous journey of seven weeks at sea, we arrived safely at Marseilles, France. After spending the winter there, I visited the naval city of Toulon, then traveled over the mountains of Sardinia, and on to the beautiful lake and city of Geneva, Switzerland. Returning again on my way to France, I visited the ancient Roman cities of Aosta and Nîmes, the silk-manufacturing city of Lyons, and besides other places of less repute, and finally reached the fascinating city of Paris. After a most pleasant and agreeable sojourn in this bewitching centre of modes and fashions, I left the attractive scenes of France, by way of Rouen and the port of Havre, crossing the British Channel



to Portsmouth and Southampton, thence to London, Birmingham, Manchester, Sheffield, York, and other notable places in England. Then I went to Edinburgh, and Glasgow, and the Highlands of "Auld Scotia," after which crossed St. George's Channel, to Belfast, Dublin, the Giant's Causeway so famed in the Emerald Isle. Leaving this hospitable and humorous people, I visited Wales, and proceeded thence to Liverpool. After sojourning awhile with my distant relatives (the Bells), I sailed from that port in one of my Uncle Ab'm Bell's ships, the bark *Nashua*, Capt. Pollard, and after a long but not unpleasant voyage arrived safely at Mobile, Ala., on the day of the winter solstice in 1835. I resided there until May, 1837, during which time I made a preliminary survey, and then located and had constructed nine miles, and put on a locomotive and train of cars on the Mobile and Cedar Point R. R., which extended a distance of  $27\frac{5}{8}$  miles toward New Orleans, after May, 1837, the time when nearly all the banks and most of the commercial business men of the whole country either suspended or failed altogether. By this time my health had become so impaired that I was compelled to desist from further business, and went to Mobile, and by way of New Orleans I sailed for the island of Cuba, arriving there early in January. I spent the winter on the island, but most of the time in bed in the city of Havana. In April, 1839, I returned to Alabama, so reduced in strength as to be entirely confined to my bed, and in August following was conveyed on a mattress to White Sulphur Springs, Talladega Co., Ala., where I remained confined to my bed until April 18th, 1840, when I was able to arise, walk out and set foot on the ground, a feat I had been unable to perform for fourteen or fifteen months before. During all this time I continued to study the French "Le Roy Pelgas" system of medicine, under which treatment I was raised from my bed of languishing.

"In November, 1840, in company with my preceptor, Dr. P. B. Raynal, I went back to Mobile, where we practiced together until 1st Monday in August, 1841, when I re-



moved alone to Marion, Perry Co., Ala., and practiced medicine until the close of the year 1856. During these 17 years, I cured many cases of chronic and long standing diseases, which had been given up as incurable by many other physicians. Some of my patients came from far-off States. From constant practice and exposed to the unhealthfulness of the sick-room, I became completely broken down again in health, and after being confined to my bed most of the winter, I returned the next summer to my old quarters at Talladega Springs, and remained without any perceptible improvement until the stormy season of the autumnal equinox, at which time my extreme suffering greatly distressed me in mind, for I felt persuaded that I should be unable to withstand the severity of the approaching winter, if I remained anywhere within the bounds of my native United States. Knowing that the Spanish language (which I could not then speak) was spoken in all the warmer climates to which I could readily resort in my extreme condition, and believing the current reports of the bloodthirstiness of the race, who would not hesitate to take human life for the sake of a few gold dollars, I was greatly distressed, and had become, as I thought, entirely sleepless; but this must have been somewhat illusory, for, whether sleeping or waking, I had a very remarkable dream. And as this was not the first strange dream I had, and all of which had come to pass in after years, I did not hesitate to follow the course my present dream seemed to point out.

“Consequently, as soon as the day came, assistance was procured, and I was placed in my buggy in a recumbent position (being unable to sit upright), and in this low condition I traveled alone 80 miles, through much of a wilderness country, to the town of Marion, Ala. My health improving but little, and still keeping in view the impressions of my dream, I made the necessary preparations for my prospective journey, and on the 6th of November, 1852 (Presidential Election-day), I left Marion, and, taking a steamer of the Vanderbilt Line from New Orleans, sailed for Juan del Norte, Nicaragua. I visited the British settle-





inent in the Mosquito country, and several of the Central American States. In Costa Rica, I stood upon the brink of the crater of Cartago volcano, 11,100 feet above the level of the sea. With my feet fixed upon the ground, without moving them, I looked over one shoulder and plainly saw away out into the vast blue expanse of the Pacific Ocean; then over the other shoulder I looked down, apparently almost under my feet, and beheld the agitated waters of the Atlantic in the Caribbean Sea. Mr. Stephens, the New York writer of travels, was the only American—prior to my visit—who ever beheld at once, standing on the land, this magnificent view, and was able to look away off, apparently into mid-ocean, of the two greatest waters on the face of the globe.

“I realized in that country the complete fulfillment of my late dream, for as I had dreamed, our boat really became unmanageable, and dashing down the greatly swollen and rapid current of the river Sarapitei, the lives of our party were all endangered; but, finally, after great exertion and extraordinary skill of some of the natives—one man taking a line in his mouth, dived into the rushing current more than 20 feet deep, down to the bottom of the river, then crawled out and up the bank on shore, and made the line fast to a tree—we eventually were safely landed on terra firma. In the excitement and dangers of the moment, I cried out, ‘I’ve got safe on shore without even wetting my feet!’ when I immediately recollected that these were the words which I had used in my dream some months before at the Springs; and I ought to have said too that I was very thankful to God for His great preservation. The other incidents of my dream (and they were numerous) were all either literally or symbolically fulfilled. But to return from this episode, I will repeat that I made my home either in Mobile or Marion, Ala., from the last of December, 1835, until the first of the year 1857, being 21 full years. In the month of March of that year, I arrived for the first time in Texas, so that I have now lived here over 21 years also. Upon my first arrival here, I engaged in the stock business, and traveled over



many portions of the vast territory of this great State. In 1858, with a friend, I went across the plains and into Mexico, and purchased a large herd (4,000) of sheep; we drove them up into the north-western part of the State, on the upper waters of the Brazos River, where we intended to make our homes, but in the latter part of that year, the Comanche Indians broke in upon the frontier settlement; and having no protection from the general government against these hostile savages, we were obliged to abandon our enterprise and fall back to the older settlements. In 1859, I purchased the place of my present abode on Doe Run Creek, near the historic town of Washington, on the Brazos, in Washington County, Texas, which has been my constant home since February, 1860.

“Thus have I given you some of the incidents and checkered scenes of my life, scarcely relating more than bare facts; leaving out some singular occurrences, especially one very uncommon one, which I shall here relate. It is the remarkable dream which I have already referred to. When I was 17 or 18 years old, residing on the farm with my Uncle Robert, one Saturday night I dreamed that I was in the ‘barn-field,’ and that it was then in ‘corn-stock ground,’ and I had with me a strange-looking instrument, which stood upon *three legs*, with a handle to it, by which I could *turn the world*. I thought the world was not properly fixed up, or at least was not in the right position; accordingly I placed the instrument firmly on its three legs, then laid hold of the handle, and proceeded, as I thought, to make the necessary alteration, and correctly adjust the position of this world. As if to aid me in my undertaking, toward the south there appeared in the heavens a very peculiar-looking cloud, having a perfectly straight line on top, which I perceived in after years as seeming to represent a certain railroad embankment, and the cloud not being fixed solidly to the earth, answered for an object as a guide, to enable me to determine with accuracy. I thought I ought to bring this sublunary problem, which seemed very much out of place, to a properly adjusted position, and succeeded in accomplishing the



object in view to my entire satisfaction, and thus ended my dream.

“Next morning, soon after arising, I walked out on the front porch, the sun being about a half hour high; away out on the southern horizon I beheld a peculiar-looking cloud, having a straight top. My first thought was, ‘Why, I have seen that cloud before!’ Then again I bethought myself, ‘No! that is impossible, for I have just arisen, and only finished rubbing my eyes after the night’s sleep!’ In a moment the incidents of my dream flashed across my mind; the real cloud bore the exact resemblance of the one I had seen in my dream. At the breakfast table I related to my mother and the rest of the family the incidents of my dream.

“Some seven or eight years after this period, when I had become an assistant engineer on the Col. and Phila. R. R., and stationed on the ‘Gap’ division (in which was included my Uncle Robert’s ‘barn-field’), my chief, Major Wilson, having gone to the Island of Cuba in search of better health, and Mr. H. R. Campbell, second in rank, lying disabled at Downingtown, having a pistol-ball shot in his leg, I was left in command, and had full control of the operations of this division, and was master of my own actions—I took my three-legged transit instrument, went into my Uncle Robert’s ‘barn-field,’ it being then in ‘corn-stock ground,’ just as I had seen it in my dream 7 or 8 years before. I placed my instrument and laid hold of the handle, and if I *did* not then turn the seeming corporeity of this mundane sphere, I certainly did then and there turn all the many ‘ins and outs,’ up and down deflections of the most sinuous location of the Phila. and Columbia R. R., into one grand, straight, tangent line, from the ‘Gap’ summit, over all the intricacies of the face of that section of the county down to Moore’s mill-dam, near the outlet of the line into the great Chester Valley. This insubordinate, and I might say, somewhat *intuitive* act of mine, was, it may be safely said, the original of what were afterward called ‘Air-Line Railroads.’ It was a great innovation on the ideas of that day, and I was severely



censured for my boldness; but it could not be revoked, for before any of my superiors arrived on the ground, the construction and work were too far advanced to make any change without unreasonable expense and loss to the State."

(the first attempt of the construction of a passenger railway in the United States). In 1830 he was engaged on the Minehill and Schuylkill Haven R. R., and in 1832 we find him completing the Phila. and Germantown R. R. (the first road engaged in actual passenger traffic); in 1833, as Asst. Engineer on the Phila. and Trenton R. R.; in 1834 on the Rensselaer and Saratoga road, at which time they also constructed the bridge across the Hudson at Troy. In 1835 he became Chief Engineer of the Elizabethtown and Somerville R. R., and in 1838 built a bridge over the Brandywine River in Delaware, remaining on the Elizabeth and Somerville until 1845, when he was engaged as Chief Engineer in widening the Morris Canal. In





1846 he was called to locate the Vermont Central R. R., and subsequently became its Chief Engineer and Superintendent, building in the meantime, the Vermont and Canada road, the Sullivan branch, and other roads.

In 1854 he was called as Superintendent of the Michigan Southern and Northern Indiana Railroad, where he remained with his headquarters at Adrian, Mich., bringing order out of chaos, until 1856, when he returned East, and contracted to build the East Pennsylvania road from Allentown to Reading, thus completing the last link in the great chain now known as the Allentown route to the West, which he had always predicted would be the result of the construction of the Elizabethtown and Somerville road, commenced in 1835.

In 1860 he was called once more to his old field of labor, as Chief Engineer of the New Jersey Central R. R. The South Branch road, from Somerville to Flemington, then the extension from Elizabeth to Communipaw, with the famous bridge two miles long over Newark Bay, which was completed in 1864, then the Newark and New York road with a series of bridges over the streets, and penetrating to the very heart of the city of Newark, have all been completed under his direction and supervision. He was also engaged in constructing the Elizabeth and Perth Amboy, and the New York and Long Branch roads, as well as the connecting bridge across the Raritan river, 4,400 feet long, with six iron spans, and with a draw 472 feet in length, the largest in the world.

He was appointed by President U. S. Grant as one of the Commissioners to re-examine the entire main line of the Union Pacific R. R. from Omaha to Ogden, with the view to ascertain if it was in all respects finished in accordance with the provisions of the Acts of Congress, by which the company was to receive its full and complete grants of the public lands. Associated with him was a member of Congress, and the son of the Secretary of the Interior, Mr. John S. Delano, and accompanying them were the Prest. of the Union Pacific R. R. and some of the Directors. Prest. Grant, in appointing Col. Moore to this



position of great trust and responsibility under the Government, made a wise selection of an engineer at once scientific, practical, and of great experience.

Besides the railroads already enumerated, with which he was identified, we have the names of the following: Coburg and Peterboro; Grand Trunk or Great Western; Champlain and St. Lawrence; Toronto and Guelph; Prescott and Bytown; Sullivan and New Hampshire; York and Wrightsville, and Philadelphia, Wilmington and Baltimore. He has assisted in surveying, locating and building over *twenty-five* railroads, and built over *fifty miles* of bridges. He was for many years General Superintendent of the New Jersey Central R. R. Residence, No. 125 Madison Avenue, Elizabeth, N. J.

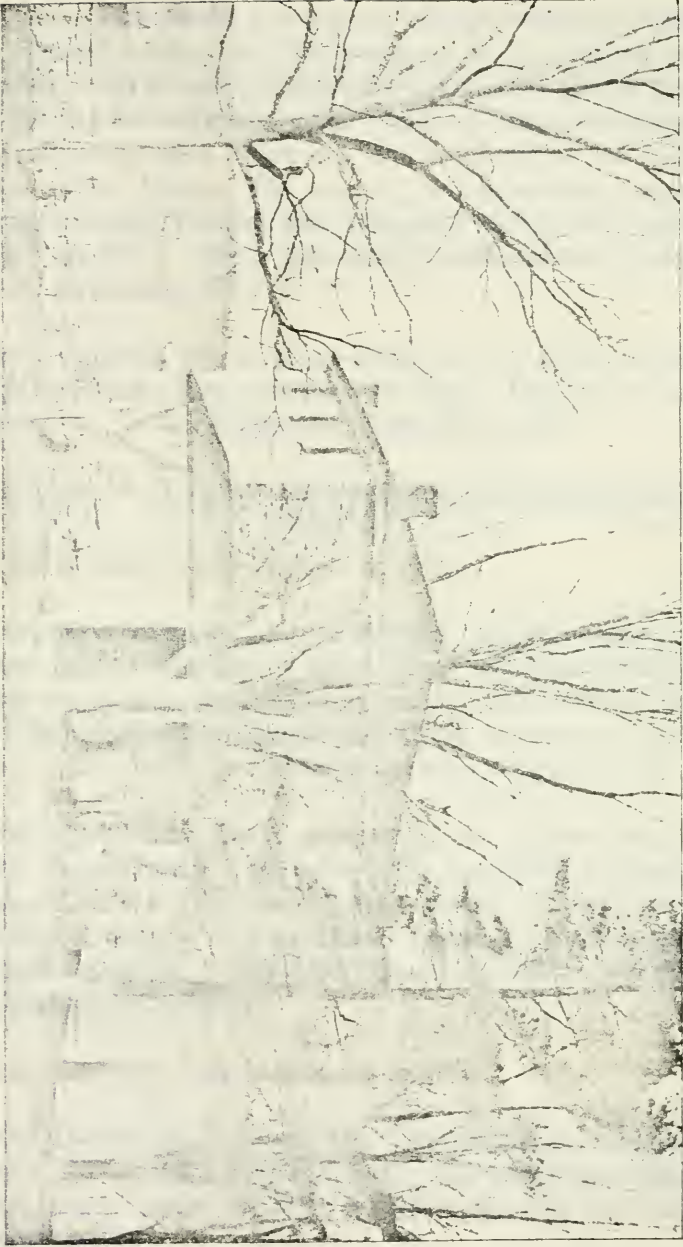

John H. went into the engagement next day, and in common with thousands of other brave boys, gave his life as a sacrifice to his country, and with the consciousness of having done something to soothe the last hours of a devoted and noble wife.

people were then called. Most of the latter straggled back in a fortnight and the Government replaced the mules. At another time, he was himself captured by a band of outlaws, from whom, after two or three weeks, he escaped while they were asleep. One of Prof. Gray's contemporaneous workers was Prof. A. Graham Bell, the latter of whom, though probably anticipated in point of time by the caveat of Gray, was granted a broad patent for speaking telephone on March 8, 1876, only twenty-three days later than the date of Prof. Gray's caveat. As to who was entitled to the credit of the invention of the telephone it has required almost constant litigation in the courts for the past sixteen or seventeen years to decide, and although it has been awarded to Bell, there are many dissenters from the justice of this decision. Prof. Gray is also the inventor of the telautograph. Prof. Gray is universally esteemed, both as a man and as a scientist, and the confidence reposed in him by the profession has found manifestation in various ways, not the least of which was his election to the arduous post and responsibilities of Chairman of the Committee on the Electrical Congress of the World's Columbian Auxiliary. In this last position with which he has been honored, he has been thrown into many trying situations which would have discouraged and upset a less well-balanced person, but which he has surmounted with dignity, and to the credit of himself and the trust so wisely reposed in him. In manners he is affable and genial, inviting approach, and manifests his Quaker origin, which is not disguised in his personal appearance, by a proneness to interchange of confidence, which, so delightful to meet with, has not always worked to its possessor's advantage." 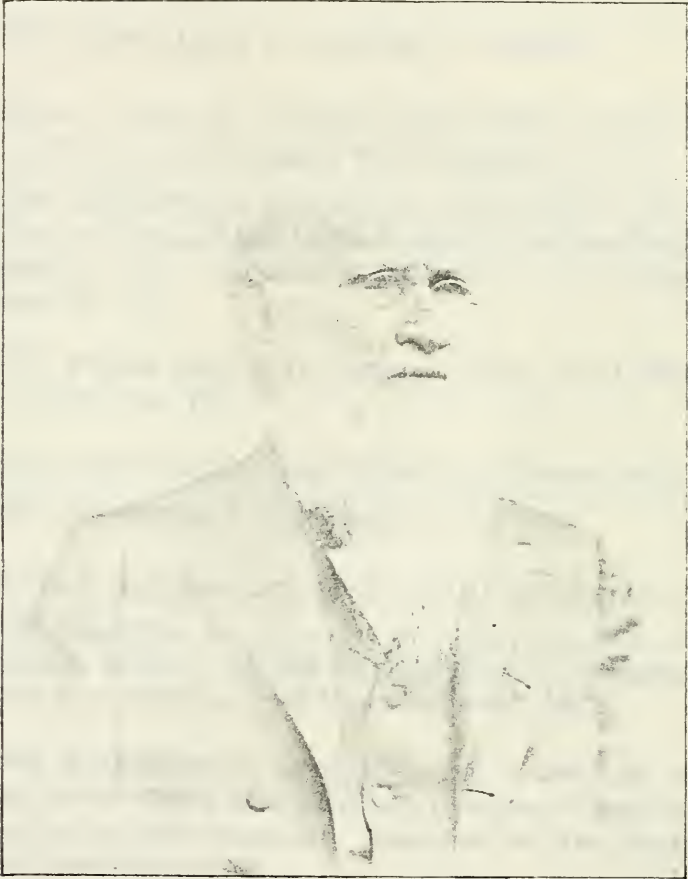

Wallace (with twenty-seven men, including himself) encountered a rebel force under Col. Jenkins, at Cove Gap. Under cover of ambush, his men opened a well-directed fire, and the enemy, believing a large force to be present, retired to wait for the coming forces under Genl. Lee. For this coup d'etat he was complimented by Maj.-Gen. Couch. Upon his expiration of term of service, he returned to Philadelphia, and is the present assistant manager of "The Presbyterian." He is now (1897) Commander of General Geo. G. Meade Post, No. 1, Department of Penna. G. A. R. Place of business, 1510 Chestnut St., Phila.

2048. CHARLES C., b. 6-10-1835. Unm. When nineteen years of age (April, 1854) he went to visit some relatives at Pekin, Ill., and joined a party of six who were going across the plains to California. At Salt Lake City he tarried ten days to rest and recuperate, and then started on his perilous journey of some 1,400 miles, along which latter distance he subsisted upon roots, game and fish. The principal want was water; there was plenty along the trail, but it was alkali. Finally, after being two days without water, he lay down along the banks of the Bear river, completely exhausted, and slept. He dreamed he was standing on the banks of a river, and, as he stooped to quench his thirst, the waters receded from him. When at daybreak he awoke, he heard the trickling of a little mountain stream, which his dull senses had failed to dis-





cover the night before. He drank freely of it, and felt refreshed and strengthened. Resuming his journey, he crossed the great American Desert and the snow-capped Sierras, reaching California in the month of September, barefoot and ragged. Arriving in San Francisco, and disappointed at not meeting his brother, who had taken passage on a vessel to Australia, he, nothing daunted, set resolutely to work to carve out his own fortune, and soon won the respect of those around him. He is now living in Nevada. P. O., Eureka, White Pine Co., Nevada, and San Francisco, Cal.

## "IN MEMORIAM.

"Upon the morning of Feb. 3, our community was deeply grieved to learn that Mrs. Emma Wallace McCoy, wife of General Robert A. McCoy, after a long and weary illness, was no more, and while in all the notices of her decease given in the press her wish to avoid publicity has been most kindly respected, yet after a careful consideration of all the circumstances in the case, those who knew Mrs. McCoy the best and loved her the most feel that some fuller mention ought to be made of the departure from our midst of one who, by her rare and rich personality, attracted to herself such a large circle of admiring and devoted friends.

"No one of any intelligence could be in the company of Mrs. McCoy without realizing that she was a woman of unusual intellectual power. She had read widely and well, so that she was not only conversant with many of the classics that the past has preserved for us, but also with the current literature, so that she was qualified to discuss the questions of the day and grasp at once the salient points, and with clearness and precision present in a few words the correct status of each subject.

"And united to such intellectual power was a sympathy just as wide in its range and remarkable in its character. Nothing that was human was alien to her. Indeed, nothing that God had called into existence was too small or insignificant to pass unnoticed. The bud opening upon the trees which in summer shaded her threshold, the birds which lingered for a moment to peer in at the window, the flowers sent by loving hands to brighten her sick chamber, the children trooping along to school, the sick and the sorrowing within our borders, the friends who sought her presence and enjoyed her company, the varied interests of the Church of Christ both at home and abroad, to all and to everything that came within the range of her keen observation, she gave freely of her sympathy expressed in practical help, in kindly words, and in a genial sunshine which seemed to disperse the gloom and lift the shadows of the darkest day.



“But the crowning grace of Mrs. McCoy’s life was her Christian character. Early in life she professed her faith in Christ and her love for Him as her personal Saviour, and this love was the great inspiration of her being, urging her forward in the fulfillment of important duties in the church for which she was so richly qualified, and also supporting her when, physical health failing, she was compelled to give up one by one the cherished plans and purposes of life and patiently wait the good pleasure of her Heavenly Father’s will. Thus she waited, not in sackcloth and ashes, but adorned with the radiant garments of a cheerful resignation which was a perpetual benediction to her home and family, and a continual inspiration to those who were fortunate enough to be numbered among the circle of her friends. But the months sped and the seasons came and went, some bringing to anxious hearts the promise of returning health, while others appeared freighted with dreary forebodings. But all, like the chisel of some angelic sculptor, were divinely sent to complete in this rare character the image of Christ. At last the end came, but not in the way anticipated. Over her home there fell the thick dark pall of a terrible sorrow. She bowed with quiet resignation to her Father’s will and then resolved, if possible, to live not for herself, but for others, whose lives without her presence would be doubly lonesome and bereft. But that marvelous will-power which so often in former days had come to her rescue, now failed to respond, and the worn and wasted body, deprived of such assistance, gradually sank, until with the dawning day, in the full peace and comfort of the Gospel, she passed gently away to be with her Saviour. Thus, in the calm serenity of her Christian life, and in her gentle transition from earth to heaven, did she illustrate most beautifully the last message of the Scriptures which fell upon her ears: ‘I will both lay me down in peace and sleep, for thou Lord only makest me to dwell in safety.’

“This feeble tribute, like some torn and tattered wreath, the merest semblance of what it ought to be, at the request of a bereaved and sorrowing circle, we modestly and rever-



ently offer to the memory of one whose death has made heaven richer, but earth lonelier and poorer.”

Robert A. studied law, and was admitted to the Cambria County bar in about 1860. At the beginning of the late Civil War, he raised a company of infantry, and although entitled to the captaincy, selected that of 2d lieutenant, insisting that men of military experience take the other higher offices. This company became Co. A., 11th Regt., Pennsylvania Reserves, Col. Thomas F. Gallagher commanding. They were connected with the Army of the Potomac, and participated in all of its battles from June, 1861, to 1864. Lieut. McCoy was among the prisoners captured at the battle of Gaines' Mill, Va., and was of the first number incarcerated within the walls of Libby Prison at Richmond, Va. For gallant and meritorious services, he was promoted regularly, from 2d Lieut. to Lieut. Col. of his regiment, and in the last year of service was transferred to the staff of Gen. S. W. Crawford, Commander of the Pennsylvania Reserves, as Adjutant General and Inspector General of the Corps—filling both positions at the same time. For bravery on the field, he was brevetted Brigadier General. Upon being mustered out of the service in June, 1864, he and Genl. Lemuel Todd were appointed by Gov. Andrew G. Curtin to organize the militia of the State. In 1865, he became Private Sec'y for Gov. Curtin, which position he held until the close of his administration. From 1867 to 1874, he was Chief Clerk in the Land Department of Pennsylvania, when he was tendered and accepted the position of cashier of the Blair County Banking Company, of Tyrone, Pa., a position he held until his death. A near friend of Gen. McCoy's writes as follows: "Gen. Robert A. McCoy was a perfect gentleman, a fascinating conversationalist, a brave soldier; a man brimming over with kindly good will for all who needed it."

Chambers, pastor of the Penn St. Presbyterian Church, Harrisburg, Pa., in his address at her funeral obsequies paid a glowing tribute to her heroism, usefulness and spirituality, and read the following extract from one of her letters, written a few months prior to her death: "It would, indeed, be glorious to have this sick body made well and strong again, and escape the painful death that must be mine; \* \* \* \* Yet I should not speak of a painful death, for I have had the strong conviction that God will take me to Himself before the pain becomes unendurable, if it is not His will to cure me. \* \* \* \* It is cowardly to run away from what God may have for us to do; therefore, I have never prayed to go any sooner than He wants me to. \* \* \* \* Above health and strength, I want a consecrated heart." Dr. Chambers then adds: "These are the breathings of a soul that has come into contact with Jesus Christ. They indicate a heroism than which that which led many a martyr to the stake was not greater."

John A. M.'s boyhood was spent on a rugged Octoraro farm in his native township. A portion of his time was occupied in assisting in the mining of chrome ore. Deprived in early life of a father's fostering care, his education and training devolved on his mother, a woman of rare energy and judgment. At sixteen he began teaching school, and at once showed such aptitude in this profession that he was induced to take a four years' course (scientific) at the Pennsylvania State Normal School at Millersville, then under the principalship of one of America's greatest educators, Dr. James P. Wickersham. He graduated in 1860. He at once removed to Pottsville, Pennsylvania, where he taught successfully for a number of years. During his residence in Pottsville he was for many years a member of the Board of Education, and for eight years its President.

In 1877 he was nominated by the Republican State Convention of Pennsylvania for Auditor-General, over Hon. Howard J. Reeder, by a vote of over two to one, but the entire ticket was defeated by apathy in the party and treachery on the part of some of its leaders. He was again a candidate in 1880, but was betrayed by professing friends. After the disastrous campaign of 1882, he was urged to be a candidate for State Treasurer, but refusing to accede to the demands and promises required of him, he was not nominated. In 1890 his friends, thinking the party had done him an injustice, brought him forward as a candidate for Lieutenant Governor; his candidacy was endorsed by hundreds of the leading men of Philadelphia and of the entire state, and he had a majority of the delegates to the convention pledged to him; but finding orders had been given by the "Boss" to slaughter him, he had his name withdrawn from the convention.

The estimation in which he was held by his fellow citizens, after a residence of twenty-six years in Pottsville, Pennsylvania, is best attested by the following, taken from the "Miners' Journal," on the occasion of his re-





moval to Philadelphia: "Few men have lived a life more useful to his fellow-citizens during his residence of more than twenty-five years amongst us. With much warmth of feeling, Mr. Passmore has united great strength of will; he has filled many posts of trust and occupied various positions of importance in the charitable, educational, political and business life of Pottsville; indeed, it may be justly said of him that no man more entirely devoted his energies to forward whatever work he undertook to perform. It was mainly to him that the "Home" of the Pottsville Benevolent Association is indebted for its existence and usefulness. In the public schools he introduced with success, in the face of discouragement and opposition, the co-education of the sexes, which is now established in this community. His opinions are decided, and his expression of them outspoken. As a friend and neighbor, he has left a proud record. He will bear with him to his new home, the kind wishes and affectionate remembrance of many friends."

He is an ardent, aggressive Republican, but aspires to no public office. He is an active, live worker, and devotes much of his time in striving to benefit mankind. His greatest interest is centered in educational matters, neglected children and the insane.

He served three years as a trustee of the State Normal School at Millersville, Pennsylvania; six years he was a trustee on behalf of the State, of the State Normal School at Kutztown, Pennsylvania, and is now (1897) a trustee, by appointment of Governor Daniel H. Hastings, of the Asylum for the Chronic Insane, at Wernersville, Pennsylvania.

He is a devoted Pennsylvanian, believing most implicitly in his State; and an uncompromising American. He was during the late Civil War, a member of Company A, 27th Regiment, Pennsylvania State Militia, in the service of the United States, and was honorably discharged by reason of expiration of term of service.

He is bold and aggressive in his advocacy of what he believes to be right.



Having relinquished teaching, he engaged in the life insurance business. Then he became the general manager in Pennsylvania for D. Appleton & Company, publishers, N. Y., and when that firm disposed of its interests to the American Book Company, he united his fortunes with it, and is (1897) their representative in Philadelphia.

He moved to Philadelphia in 1886, and during his first week's residence in this city, was elected a member of the Board of Directors of "Friends' Home for Children," a position he still holds with credit to himself and profit to the institution.

He is a life member of the Historical Society of Pennsylvania, State Teachers' Association, the Association of Friends' Home for Children, a Past Master and life member of the A. Y. M., a member of the Genealogical Society of Pa., member of the Royal Chapter and Knights Templar, Past Grand of the I. O. of O. F., and member of the Grand Lodge, a Past Chancellor of the K. of P., Past President of Camp 36, P. O. S. of A., member of the Teachers' National Educational Association, a member of the Good Intent Fire Company of Pottsville, Pennsylvania, member of Gen. George G. Meade Post 1, G. A. R., and also an active member of the Union League of Philadelphia. He was very frequently chosen as a representative of his party in Schuylkill county as delegate to Republican state conventions, was a delegate to the Republican National Convention at Chicago, in 1884, that nominated Hon. James G. Blaine for the Presidency.

He was for many years a local representative of the Board of Public Charities of Pennsylvania in Schuylkill county, and a member of the Board of Visitors on Lunacy. He did a most praiseworthy work, having accomplished or put in the way of being accomplished, very much to make the condition of the pauper insane more tolerable.

In 1866 he was admitted to the Schuylkill County Bar, and has also been admitted to practice in the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, but he preferred a more active life than that of the law.

Reared as a "Friend," his religious convictions are



very strongly in sympathy with the tenets of the "Society of Friends." In early life, with his family, he removed into a community where there was no meeting of this society, and believing that every one should connect himself with some religious denomination, after mature deliberation, with his family he united with the Protestant Episcopal Church.

Mr. Passmore is a princely generous man. He is optimistic and cheerful in disposition, devoted to his family and friends, and has the happy faculty of making and retaining a large circle of warmly devoted friends. He has been a benefaction to hundreds of young people, and has carried sunshine and renewed courage to thousands. He is as widely known and as sincerely loved as any man in Pennsylvania. He has always been considerate of others, and has not failed to seek the place of suffering to himself if thereby he could make a place of gladness and strength for others.

In his business he is methodic, polite and sagacious. His word is implicitly relied upon, and his courteous treatment of his business associates and customers has always intensified the love and gratitude he so justly merits.

He is a man of conscience and deep religious fervor. His faith is abiding and constant. He finds in the church and family the avenues of deep religious culture, and his philanthropy is a benediction to many young people.

It would be unfair to him did I not state that to me the sacredly sweet spirit of his home life touches my heart with gratefulness and my life with gladness. As husband and father he has held close to his heart the devotion and love of a noble wife and equally noble children. These forces in his life have made him a model man. His heart always longs for home, and the pure life of the family circle has made his own life sweeter, purer, nobler and stronger than my pen can report. To be a friend of Mr. Passmore means to be treated in the spirit of loving kinship. The hallowed associations of home to him always recall the broken circle, the memory of a loving mother, whose closing months were made serenely glad and peace-
