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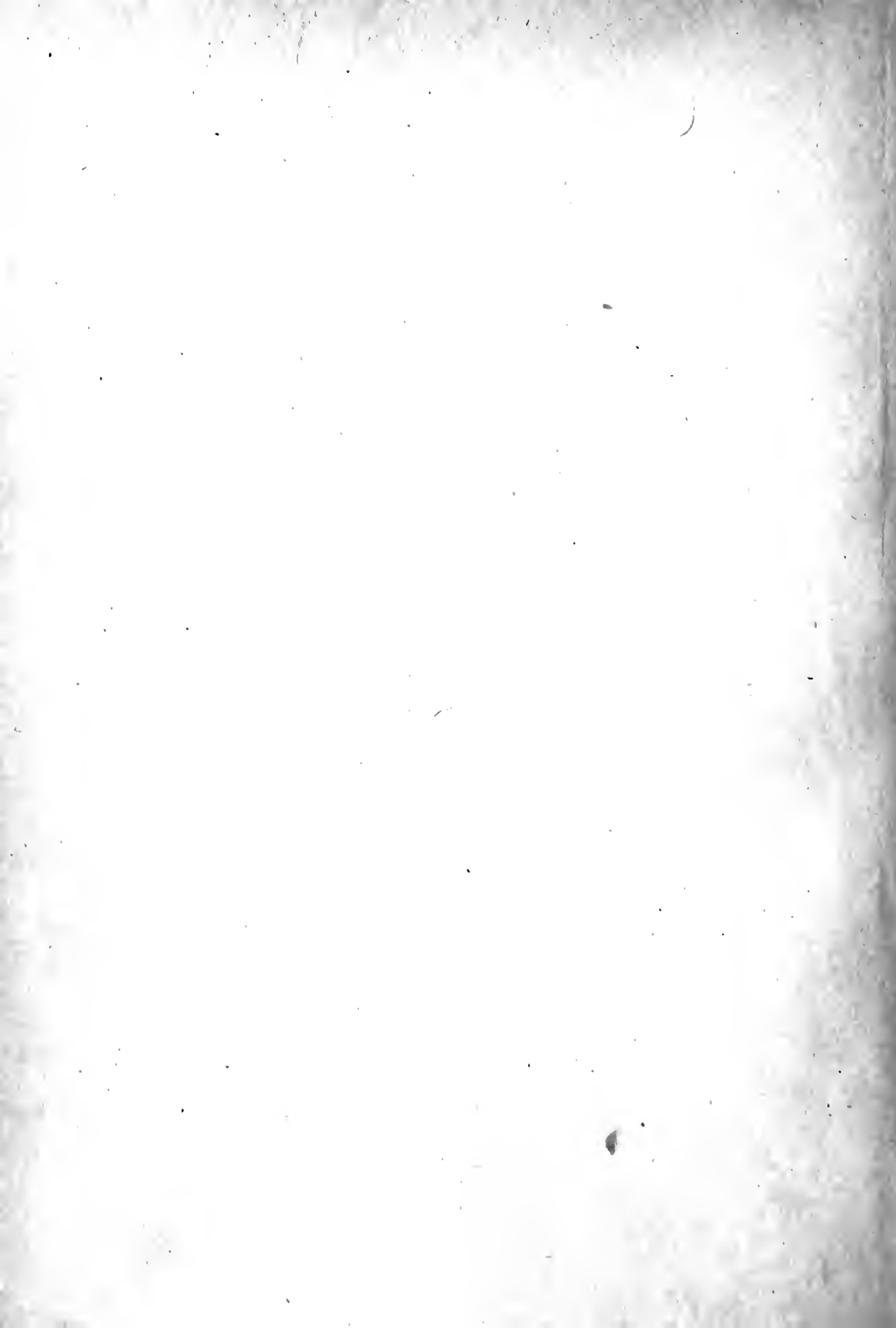

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## FOREWORD

This work was begun some years ago, the intention being to gather what records were available regarding the four lines which make up the ancestry of my husband's family, Smith-Montgomery, Forshee-Weaver. The War caused all such things to be dropped, and only this past year have circumstances permitted a resumption of the correspondence with the widely scattered families.

This book, though small, represents a large amount of time, as it is almost all new material, gathered from family records, family Bibles, tombstone records, etc. A few books have been published giving the genealogy of the Hamlin, Cole, Reed, Baird, and Sanders families, and as these books are out of print I have incorporated in full their early generations in my work; the rest is here published for the first time, and up to date.

The study of these records has proved most interesting. The original immigrants came to America, landing at Boston or Salem, and while many of the inter-related lines settled in Massachusetts or Connecticut or in some of the New England towns, the four lines in which we are particularly interested came among the first settlers to Cayuga County in Central New York, and located where the townships of Mentz, Throop and Aurelius come together.

The Montgomery and Dunning families, we find first settled in Vermont, near Bennington; they later moved across the Hudson River to Salem, Washington County, New York State, and from there in the winter of 1795-6 went by ox-cart and sledges to Cayuga County. There was with them, probably, the young boy St. Clair Smith, who was born in Williamstown, Mass., and brought up in a neighbor's family, by the name of Lyon, also of the group of 1795 settlers. Later this St. Clair Smith married Betsey Montgomery, and their son was Henry Montgomery Smith.

About this same time there journeyed from Tappan, New York, to Cayuga County, a group made up in part of the two families Weaver and Forshee, both originally from Holland. The Weavers we find in Trenton, N. J., during the Revolutionary War, then in Tappan, N. Y., where was also the Forshee family, and there Polly Weaver was married to David Forshee, before going to Central New York. Their daughter, Catherine Forshee, married Henry Montgomery Smith, and lived, as noted elsewhere, on the homestead farm at Forshee's Corners, where were born their six children around whom the main interest of this book centers.

I regret that I have not been able to work out the service of more of those known to have taken part in the Revolutionary War, but I have indicated where such service may be looked for. In regard to Alpheus D. Smith, I first applied to the Bureau of Pensions, and found they had no records under that name. The Adjutant General's Office in Washington, D. C., gave no help. The Section of Manuscripts and History, of the New York State Library at Albany, sent a transcript of several certificates for service for one Alpheus Smith, which may or may not refer to our man. But I feel quite safe in concluding that he served as elsewhere stated, and that he was killed in the Indian campaign under Major General Arthur St. Clair, in 1791.

I make no claim that these pages are without mistakes. As often as many as three sets of dates have come to me from as many members of the same family. These I have sifted and tried to arrive at the accurate date in each case. However, I send this forth as the best I could do under the limitations of time and strength.

If anyone having additions or corrections to make will communicate with me, I shall be most grateful.

## SMITH LINE

ALPHEUS D. SMITH<sup>1</sup>, b. about 1744 in Scotland? Came to America before the Revolutionary War, in which he served under Gen. John Stark, and Gen. Arthur St. Clair, for whom he named his son St. Clair Smith<sup>2</sup>.

m. MISS BENNETT, sister of Dr. W. C. Bennett, who was the first physician in the section of the State of New York now known as Cayuga County; he was also the first Justice of the Peace, and sat in the first court, May 17, 1805, which met in Auburn, made the County seat in 1804. From all I can gather from family traditions, it seems probable that Alpheus D. Smith was a friend of Arthur St. Clair possibly in the old country, and may have come over with him. Arthur St. Clair was b. 1734, in Thurso, Scotland, and d. Aug. 31, 1818, near Greensburg, Pa. He served in the Rev. War as General, at Louisburg, 1758; at Quebec, 1759; took part in the victories of Trenton and Princeton; commanded in 1777 at Ticonderoga, which he evacuated before Burgoyne; he was present at Yorktown. In all of these campaigns he may have been accompanied by our Alpheus D. Smith, of whose life we as yet know so very little, as also that of his wife, who must have died at the birth of their son, as we know he was brought up by Capt. Lyons, and with him and the Montgomery and Dunning families moved to Cayuga County in 1796. Alpheus D. Smith is supposed to have been killed in the campaign against the Indians, 1791.

Enlisted in that branch; took his course at Berkeley, California; trained at Memphis, Tenn.; Dallas, Texas; Wichita Falls, Texas; Dayton, Ohio; then went across and saw active service in France, from the north to the south, back to England and at Montrose, Scotland, for a time; on the North Sea with the Royal Flying Corps of England when the Armistice was signed. He was ordered home, and would have been mustered out in a short time thereafter, but was taken ill and obliged to go to a hospital, and when convalescent went to the Government Hospital at Cooperstown, N. Y. On May 3d was out on Otsego Lake in a canoe, a squall coming up, the canoe capsized, and though an expert swimmer, he and his companion were drowned. The body was taken to the home of his parents in San Diego, California, by three of his companion officers. At the funeral service a squadron of five airships flew over the cortage as the body was taken to Greenwood Cemetery, with twenty officers as escort.

Item—I give and bequeath to my son Ansel Montgomery, 1 Beaver hat, 1 great-coat, my best straight-bodied coat and 2 vests.

Item—I give and bequeath to my eldest daughter, Eliza Montgomery, 1 Feather Bed, 1 small spinning wheel, 1 looking glass, 1 stand, 1 pair of flat irons.

Item—I give and bequeath to my daughter Ann Mari Montgomery, 1 Feather bed, 1 dish kettle, 1 frying pan, 1 puter platter.

Item—The remainder of my property to be sold and applied to the payment of just debts, etc., and the remainder divided equally between the children Ansel Montgomery, Eliza Montgomery, Martha Murett Montgomery, Emily Angeline Mont-

gomery, and Loretta Montgomery, and to wife Lydia a sum equal to two of the children."

Then follows instructions to his brother Hugh Montgomery for defraying expenses of the estate, etc.

Some time in 1659 he moved to Northampton, Mass. in company with Rev. Eleazer Mather, the first minister of North-

ampton. In 1660 he was chosen one of the selectmen of the town, and afterwards was representative to the Great General Court of Massachusetts. He was commissioned by the Crown, in company with Mr. Joseph Hawley, the ancestor of the well-known Major Joseph Hawley, a Justice of the County of Hampshire. This commission was from James II, and we still hold the seal in our family."

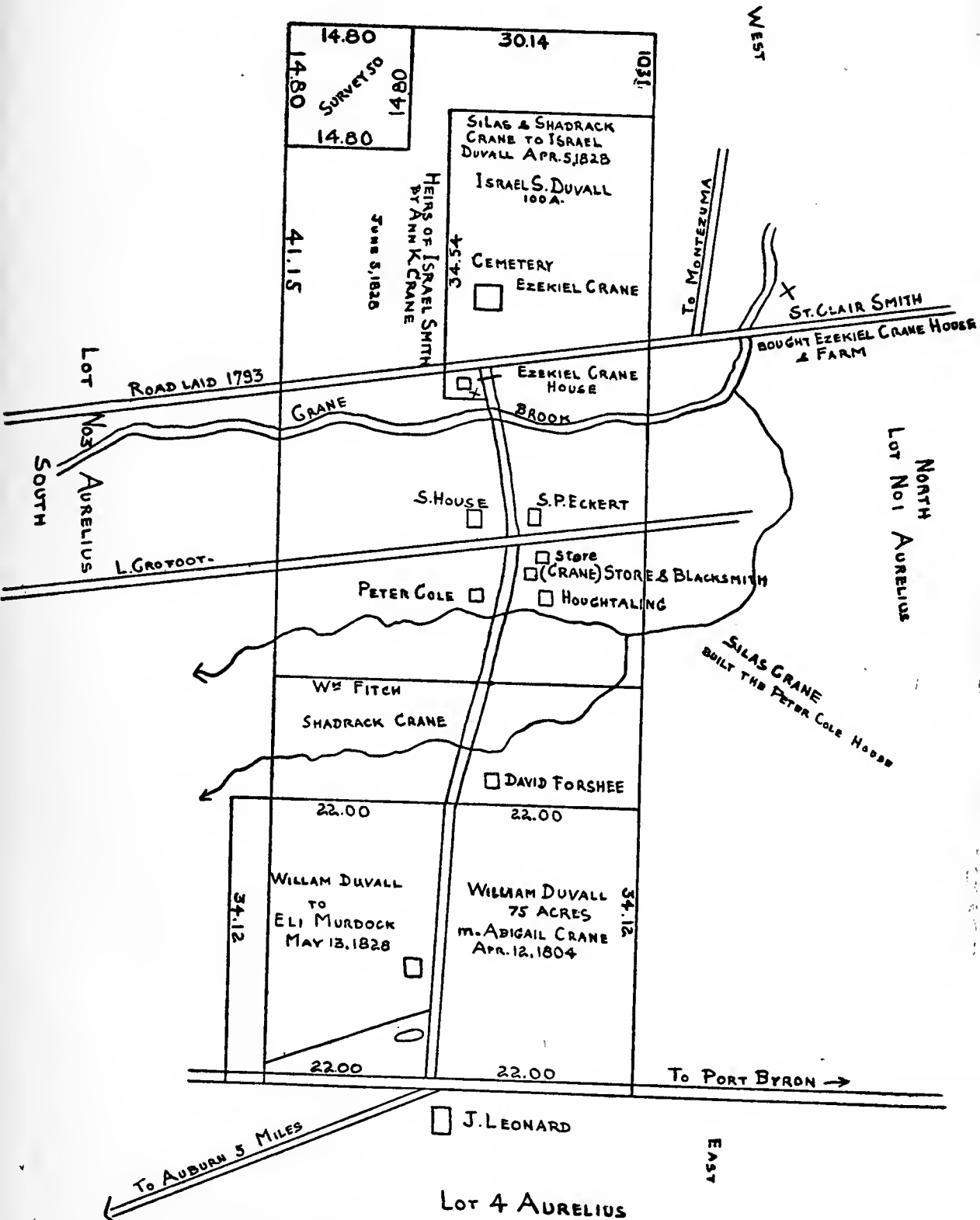

### CRANE LINE

JASPER CRANE<sup>1</sup> was the Settler, and fifth in line from him was EZEKIEL CRANE<sup>5</sup>, b. Oct. 9, 1747; d. March 15, 1813, Morris County, New Jersey.

They removed in 1790 from Morris Co., N. J., near Whippany, 7 miles N. E. of Morristown, to Lot No. 2, Township of Aurelius, Military Tract, now in the town of Throop, Cayuga Co., New York, not far from Montezuma. He built the house standing at the junction of the east and west, with the north and south roads a few rods west of Crane Brook. This house is marked with an X on the outline map, was bought by St. Clair Smith with the farm; here Henry Montgomery Smith<sup>3</sup> lived (Forshee's Corners), and here their six children were born.

Ezekiel Crane<sup>5</sup> was the first settler of the town of Mentz, as the town was called at the time of his death; for a few years previous it was called Jefferson. He was the first Supervisor of the town of Aurelius, 1794. Was appointed Justice of the Peace, and Associate Justice of the Court of Common Pleas, commissioned by Gov. John Jay, March 9, 1796. Was 2d Major in Col. John L. Hardenburgh's Regt., April 2, 1796. Was at Valley Forge, afterward a Capt. in the Western Battalion of New Jersey State Troops.

The four children of Ezekiel Crane<sup>5</sup>, Shadrack<sup>6</sup>, Abigail<sup>6</sup>, Silas<sup>6</sup>, and Ann Kimball Crane<sup>6</sup>, were all born in Hackensack, N. J.

He gave his son Shadrack<sup>6</sup>, 100 acres, and Silas<sup>6</sup>, 75 acres,

and William Duvall<sup>1</sup> had 75 acres on the east end. The homestead, 100 acres, was given to Israel Smith Duvall<sup>2</sup> (father of Gen. John S. Clark<sup>3</sup>), only child of William Duvall<sup>1</sup> and Abigail Crane<sup>6</sup>, and where he lived when John S. CLARK<sup>2</sup> was born. Many of the first settlers were buried on the Hill just above.

Eunice Haywood, wife of Ezekiel Crane<sup>5</sup>, had a sister, who resided near the Crane's, and married a Mr. Baldwin, probably the father and mother of Naomi Baldwin, the 2nd wife of William Duvall<sup>1</sup>.

### THE HAMLIN FAMILY

The early history of this family is taken from "The History of the Hamlin Family," by Mr. H. F. Andrews.

In a letter to Mr. Frank Adams Reed, dated Jan. 14, 1896, he writes from Audubon, Iowa, giving what information he had gotten regarding Perez Hamlin, etc. Some of the Hamlin's or, as the name was often spelled, Hamblin, accompanied William the Conqueror from Normandy to England in 1066, and since that time the name has been common there. Their names appear preserved on a "Roll" in the church at Dives, Normandy, and also on the "Battle Abby Roll" of those who fought at the battle of Hastings, 1066, when the Conqueror William won the crown of England.

Perez Hamlin<sup>5</sup> lived for a time in New Concord, N. Y., and later in Lenox, Mass., and was called "a miller" in 1783. It is stated in Sears Genealogy, p. 414, that Perez Hamlin (Hamblen) was an officer in the Revolutionary War. Several of his brothers, also a number of cousins, served in the



Revolutionary War. One of his name (and it is the family tradition that it was), Perez Hamlin<sup>5</sup>, served in the Commissary Department, and is listed as in Col. William B. Whitney's 7th Albany Company, Militia Regt., Feb. 26, 1787. He was Captain of a force of men who came over from New York into Berkshire County, Mass., in Daniel Shay's Rebellion, and had a skirmish with the Massachusetts Militia near Sheffield, where he was wounded and taken prisoner. He was arrested and tried as a spy, and financially ruined, and though acquitted of his connection with the Rebellion, he was entirely broken up, and removed to Newhaven, Vt., prior to 1796. May 5, 1787, Perez Hamlin<sup>5</sup> of Lenox, and Asa Hamlin<sup>5</sup> of Ballston, Albany County, New York, conveyed property to Cyreneus Hamlin<sup>5</sup>. Hannah, wife of Asa<sup>5</sup>, released her dower in the deed. In August, 1800, Perez<sup>5</sup> resided in Newhaven, Vt. In June (12), 1813, he resided in Auburn, N. Y., and in a letter speaks of his son Stephen as being well. In another letter from Aurelius, N. Y., to Joseph Howland, a son-in-law, he says that he visited their mother's grave on the previous Sabbath. It is said that he was a very religious man, and was supported in his association with Daniel Shay by a large class of people in Berkshire County.

The will of David DUNNING<sup>4</sup> was executed April 22, 1766, proved Oct. 7, 1783, his son David Dunning<sup>5</sup> being made Executor.

According to a leaflet sent me by Mr. David M. Dunning<sup>8</sup>, of Auburn, this David Dunning married Hannah Sheppard in 1738, and that she was the daughter of John and Abigail (Allen) Sheppard and the grand-daughter of Gideon Allen, of Auburn, N. Y., as stated above.

In a letter dated June 23, 1920, Mr. Frederick I. Allen, of New York City, writes me that "Mr. E. N. Sheppard, who in 1880 was visiting near Auburn, gave him the following item: Hannah, fourth child of Mr. John Sheppard, and Mrs. Abigail Allen<sup>3</sup> (daughter of Gideon<sup>2</sup>, George<sup>1</sup>, of Sandwich, Mass.) was born November 11, 1715, and married David, son of Benjamin and grandson of Michael Dunning, of Jamaica, Long Island, residence Brookfield, Conn." This last is evidently an error, as we know David<sup>4</sup> to be the son of Benjamin<sup>3</sup>, but he was the son of Benjamin<sup>2</sup>, of Jamaica (Michael<sup>3</sup> being his brother, not his son), and Theophilus<sup>1</sup>.

I think the explanation is simple. He had two wives; by the first, Hannah Botsford, he had

## FORSHEE LINE

JAN FORSEUR<sup>1</sup>, was the first of this line to come to America, probably about 1700. There are many variations in the spelling of the name; a few are as follows: Fescheur, Fesjeur, Feschuer, Fouseur, Fousieur, Vasio, Vasee, Vouschie, Forshie, Fashie, Vasieur, Vasiur, Vasee, Fesuw, Fesuir, Fasui, Frasio, Fasei, Fasier, Fasche, Feseur, Fauchee, Fesyeur, Fesche, Fazier, Fagier, Fesyer, Fosuw, Foshier, Forshey, Forshee. It was not till David Forshee<sup>4</sup>, who married Polly Weaver<sup>2</sup>, that this settled down to be the form of this line. See Note on the book compiled by Rev. David Cole, on family of Isaac Kool (Cool or Cole) and Catherine Servin.

Then to his "son Benjamin \$5.00 and it is my wish and request that if said Benjamin dies without heirs his property which I have already given him amounting to \$1000.00 be equally distributed between my heirs. To my son David Forshee the house and outbuildings attached together with 40 acres of land immediately connected with it, all one parcel. The remainder of my property I will to my children William, John, Garrett, Betsey, Lany, Katherine, and Nancy equally between them; excepting the Beds and Bedding and all female clothing, and all the wollen, linen, and cotton clothes belonging to the house I give to my daughters Betsey, Lany, Katherine, and Nancy equally. In consideration of the infirm and weak state of health of my son Garrett, it is hereby provided that the portion belonging to him shall be under the care of my Executors, and be paid out by them for board, apparel, and all expenses of his sickness, and if he dies without heirs his share shall be divided among all my heirs, except David.

I appoint William Forshee, my son-in-law Francis Mullen, and Abia F. Baird executors without compensation.

### BAIRD LINE

The Bairds are supposed to have come from Ballycastle, County Antrim, Ireland, having in all probability come over from Scotland. History tells us of the planting of colonies by James I when the crowns of England and Scotland were united in his person. The most successful of these was the picked colony, men especially chosen for their superior qualifications, which he brought over from Scotland and planted in the province of Ulster, in the north of Ireland. Ulster comprises Donegal, Londonderry, Antrim, Tyrone, Down, Fermanagh, Monegan, and Cavan. This has been called "The Great Plantation," and so well fulfilled the expectation of the monarch that in three generations the north of Ireland, which had been a barren waste at the time of their coming, is said to have "blossomed as the rose." They were not only expert in agriculture, they excelled in weaving, producing a cloth celebrated for its superior quality. Despite all their prosperity the Scotch were not happy in Ireland. They were looked upon as usurpers by their Roman Catholic neighbors, while the severe measures used by the Established Church of Great Britain in dealing with dissenters, made their lives truly perilous. During twenty-seven years it is estimated that eighteen thousand men and women perished for the sake of their religious belief. It was during the latter part of the 17th century that emigration commenced from the north of Ireland to America, after 1700 continued in increasing numbers until 1750, after which the tide greatly diminished.

As this work is out of print, I have taken the following summary from its pages:

FRANCIS BAIRD<sup>1</sup>, the pioneer, was among the early settlers of the town of Warwick, New York, coming about 1765. He had previously been a merchant for a long time in New York City. Shortly after his arrival, he purchased a large tract of land about 220 acres. In 1766 he built a stone house on Main Street, which was standing in 1912, owned by William B. Sawyer. The house as originally built, had a large frame addition on the south side one and a half stories high, which was the kitchen, and contained two old-fashioned fireplaces, with a stone back-log, and a brick oven, with a stone chimney built into the south end of the stone part of the house.

This house was the leading tavern, or inn, in the village from the time it was built up to 1830. The room opening off the kitchen to the west is said to be the room where Gen. George Washington slept when he and his wife stayed over night during the Revolutionary War, when he was en route to his Newburgh headquarters, July 27, 1782. Warwick is 28 miles from Newburgh, and 12 from Chester.

From records of the First and Second Presbyterian Churches of New York City, we learn that Francis Baird<sup>1</sup>, married Esther Eagles, June 21, 1758. He was a man of wealth and prominence. Was a trustee and incorporator, Oct. 22, 1791, of the Presbyterian Church, which was the predecessor of the Reformed Church, and stood on the same ground. He was a patriot, and a signer of the non-importation pledge. He died, and left a will dated Dec. 18, 1799, and probated May 12, 1800. Francis Baird left six children.

## MORSE FAMILY

The name perpetuated in the form of Moss, Mose, Morse.

The Normans might have brought the name from Moss, a seaport of Norway, sixty miles south of Christiania. The race of Samuel Morse, who emigrated to America in 1635, have ever written their name as Morse.

In 1358, in England, occurred the name of Hugo Morse, Knighted. The Coat of Arms with the motto, "I trust in God, not in man," goes back to the order of Edward III. It indicates a rank to which pertained hereditary possessions. It was in the family in the south of England, and has been retained and handed down in the Morse families in America. Grace Morse, daughter of Gillman Morse of Westboro, Mass., uses the Morse Coat of Arms, and will supply anyone desiring a copy with the original form and colors.

Daniel Morse, who came over with his father, settled on the west side of Charles River. He purchased, about the year 1656, a tract of 800 acres of choice land, and was a leader in the early erection of a town hall and the Church in what is now called Sherborn. Each successive generation has lived on land called "The Farms" in the eastern part of the town where Samuel Morse was born, and prob-

ably all his children. They experienced great hardships, but true to their convictions lived honest and truthful lives.

## THE BOUCK FAMILY

History of Schoharie County—William E. Roscoe, pp. 176 et seq.

The Boucks came to this town (Fulton) at a very early date William Bouck having been the first settler bearing the name. Christian Bouck, a Palatine immigrant of 1710, was no doubt the progenitor of the family, and he may have settled with the Palatines

in the valley in 1713, but it is doubtful. We believe one of his sons, William, to have been the first one of the family in Schoharie, the father going from the Camps to Albany, where he settled.

William was the progenitor of the family under notice. He, in company with Nicholas York and Jacob Fred Lawyer, purchased 2,945 acres of land, including the Island, in 1755. The lands were partitioned June 5, 1759, the Island becoming the property of Bouck, who in course of time settled his three sons upon it.

Christian received that part now occupied by Hon. Charles Bouck.

John, north of it, while William, Jr., settled upon the south. The lands were held by the family intact until 1795 or 1796, when John disposed of his part and removed to Schoharie village, and become Assistant Judge of the County.

William, Jr., familiarly called Wilhemus, reared a family, as follows: William W., Frederick, Tobias, Mrs. Simon Hagar, Maria, and Mrs. Jeremy Berner.

Christian remained upon his portion of the estate until 1836, when he died at the age of 83, having lived an eventful life, and reared a son who was to preside as Chief Magistrate over his native state, and to perpetuate the family name by a long political career free from ostentation and corruption.

William, the progenitor, was an aged yet robust man during the Revolution and was taken prisoner by a party of Indians in July, 1780. After the fact became known at the upper fort Capt. Hagar sent a squad in pursuit, and overtook the party in the present town of Jefferson the following day. The Indians, finding the patriots were greater in numbers than their own, fled precipitately, leaving their prisoners together with their booty in the hands of their pursuers. Those taken by Mr. Bouck were negro servants who had accompanied him from the Fort to the farm. The old gentleman was then a widower, his wife having died in 1770. Upon the hill near William Mitchell's residence stands an ancient tombstone, marking her resting-place, and from it we learn that she was born in Amsterdam, but the date being so crumbled we are not able to decipher it.

Judge Brown says: "Johannes Earhart, William Bouck, and Elizabeth Lawyer, were the first white children born in Schoharie." It may be possible, but we would have more faith in the assertion if he had said, "in the Camps," as we are yet to find proof of either the Lawyer or the Bouck families coming to Schoharie before the year 1720 and 1730. To harbor the idea that the Germans living

here from 1713 to either of those dates without issue, is acknowledging insanity or ignorance of their customs. From the first the family was a very prominent one in the County, especially in a political sense.

William C. Bouck was born in the old family mansion upon the Island, on January 7, 1786, and was baptized by the good old Dominie Wackenaher, in August of the same year. He early labored upon the old homestead, but was not negligent of his studies. The first English school in the town was commenced in the neighborhood in 1795, which the coming Governor, at that time nine years of age, attended. We here copy the register of the school bearing date of November 23, 1795, kindly furnished by our old friend John Gerhard, Jr. The teacher was Isaac Bushnell, a "New England" school-master, whose wages were "£10, this quarter."

It will be seen that the future politician attended the greatest number of days. His first public position was Clerk of the Town, and next as Supervisor of Schoharie, and after filling several such local offices he received the appointment of Sheriff in 1812, holding the same one year only, as the following season he was elected to the State Assembly and re-elected in 1815 and 1817. In 1821 and 1822 he was State Senator, where he became connected with the Clintonians in the interest of public improvements, especially the Erie Canal enterprise, and received the appointment by the Legislature as Canal Commissioner March 29, 1821, which office he held until 1840, when political influences led the Whig legislature to remove him and place one of their faith in his stead. In the latter year he was the Democratic candidate for Governor, but was defeated by William H. Seward, but upon being nominated again in 1842 he was elected, and made one of the most watchful and economical Governors the people have had. A vast amount of humor was indulged in during the campaign, but nothing disturbed the confidence all parties reposed in his administration. Being brought up under the economical customs of the early settlers of the country, he infused the principles in every department over which he had control.

His manner was plain and unpretending, yet dignified and graceful, and won the confidence of every one he met.

## JANS—VAN GIESEN—SPEAR LINES

Rockloff Jants or Jans<sup>1</sup> married Anneke Webber (in Holland) in 1628. He and his wife came to New Amsterdam (New York) in 1630 and settled on the tract of land which Prince William of Orange, the cousin of Anneke Jans, granted to her in that part of lower New York City on which Trinity Church stands. Soon after arriving here her husband, Rockloff Jans, died leaving her with four children—Rachel, Jennette, and Jans, who did not marry, and Sarah, who married Hans Kurstead. In 1633 Wouter Van Twiller came over accompanied by Dominie Bogardus and 104 soldiers. In 1635 Dominie Bogardus married Anneke Jans and had four children—William, Cornelius, Peter and Janas Bogardus. After Anneke married Bogardus they lived on the property which became known as the Dominie's Bowery. In 1647 the Dominie became involved in disputes with the church (Trinity) officers, and late in that year he set sail for Holland. The ship was wrecked in Bristol Channel, and Bogardus lost his life. Anneke Jans Bogardus died in 1663.

The first Giesen to receive the "Van" was Reyner or Reynier, and the first English woman to marry in the family was (Lady) Jane Sanford, who married William Van Giesen in 1753.

## COLE GENEALOGY

The following is taken from the book published in 1876, compiled by Rev. David Cole, D.D., pastor of the Reformed Church of Yonkers, New York, entitled "Isaac Kool (Cool or Cole) and Catherine Serven, married October 15, 1764, at Tappan, Rockland County (then a part of Orange Co.), New York. Their descendants complete to May 1, 1876; also their American ancestors from the settlement of New York City." This work is now long out of print, and I thought some of the facts regarding the early period which pertain as well to our lines which are affiliated with that of the Cole family, through the marriage of Anna Cole with Barent Forshee, and her sister Elizabeth Cole with Cornelius Forshee be given. The father of Barent and Cornelius Forshee was Johannes Forseur (or Forshee), and he was a brother of William Forshee who married Elizabeth Blauvelt, this William dying before his father; but the es-



tate which should have come to him was equally divided between his children, as elsewhere stated. Their son David Forshee married Polly Weaver, and their daughter Catherine Forshee married Henry Montgomery Smith, as given in the main part of this work.

The Cole Genealogy is divided into four parts; the first gives an account of the American ancestors from the settlement of New Amsterdam, comprising one Holland-born and three American-born generations. The second part gives an account of their forming themselves into a Church, and of their immediate children. The third is devoted to genealogies of the families of Wood, Shatzel, Blauvelt, Van Houten, Forshee, Meyer, Palmer, Bogert, Wyckoff, and Van Deventer, which have interlocked with the Cole family in marriage. The fourth gives the descendants of Isaac Cole and Catherine Serven.

In the introduction are some remarks on Holland names, which I will summarize as follows: He says that the early part of his genealogy was gathered from documents and registers prepared or kept by Holland settlers in America, and in pure Holland style. The names are in Holland form and are marked by features to us very peculiar. The people of Holland continued till a late period the ancient practice of designating the individual by a single name only, as Jan (John), Jacobus, Petrus, Anna, Maria, Sara, etc. To the names of females the appendage "je" was often added, as Annetje, Marretje, Saartje, etc. The "je" seems to have originally indicated endearment, but later it degenerated into mere form. For purposes of distinction the son or daughter in addition to a name given in baptism, took the name of the father with the termination "sz," "szen" or "sen," denoting "son of"; or the termination "s," or "se," denoting "daughter of." Thus "Jacobus Jansen" and "Phebe Jans or Janse" means "Jacobus" and "Phebe," son and daughter of "Jan." "Em" denotes uncle, "met" denotes aunt. No legal steps were ever taken to introduce surnames till A.D. 1811. In 1810 Holland became incorporated into, and for a period continued to be a part of the French Empire. On August 18, 1811, an Imperial decree was issued requiring people to take surnames. The nobility gradually took the names of their possessions as "Van Wassenaer," "Van Trylingrn," "Van Egmond." Patrician families soon were known by some name given to or adopted by them, and they generally clung to these, as "Hooft," "De Groot," etc. Others—a great many—took or received some personal surname, some of the family keeping it and some not. It was in this way someone received the

name "Kool." His children retained or dropped it till finally it became fixed. In the 16th century some, in the 17th many, and in the 18th nearly all families came to be known by their surnames. In this way surnames grew to be common, though no legal steps had ever been taken to bring it about. At the time of the discovery of New York (New Amsterdam), well-to-do people of the burgher class had generally taken family names, though they were often free as to whether they used them or not. Isaac Cole lived in Rockland County down to 1794; the name is frequently given as "Kool," or "Cool," but oftener "Cole," and it is not known that any of his fifteen children ever wrote it Kool and within the nineteenth century Cole is the only form used. It took about a century to fix the name, the letter "C" not being in use in Holland, only the "K."

#### PART III—PAGES 86-90, THE FORSHEE FAMILY

This family connects with the Cole family through Barent (Barnard) and Cornelius Forshee, brothers, who respectively married the sisters Anna and Elizabeth Cole. The sources of information about it are family registers and the church records of Tappan, Clarkstown, and Kakiat. What we know of the name indicates that it is of French origin. Tradition says that the first American ancestors came to this country during religious persecutions in France not far from 1700. There is a tradition in the family that a far back ancestor bore the name of Jan (of course this form was given here and not in France); that he lived to a great age, 110 years, and in his 110th year walked one day twelve miles with a grandson, and proved himself the better walker of the two. The family think this "Jan"—wife unknown—must be set down as the head of the Forshees in this country.

The original name was, we think, "Forsieur." On the Reformed Church record it is most frequently written "Forseur." Other orthographies, which abound, are Fosjeur, Forsheur, Faseur, Fashaw, etc., and are blunders of copyists. These are found in almost endless variety. Some of them so disguise the name that none but those familiar with the family connections could possibly detect it. The numerous descendants now write it Vorseur, Forseur, Forshee, Forshay, etc. One a physician residing in Philadelphia, Penna., writes his name William W. Fouché. But the original, we think, was "Forsieur." In pronunciation, it followed the analogy of the familiar term of address—"Monsieur." The proverbial difficulty of this combination to one not born French, accounts for all corruptions.

The first positive date I have with the name "Forseur" is that

of a birth taken from the family records. *Johannes Forseur* was born at Tappan, N. Y., January 15, 1733; the same records have his death at Kakiat, April 21, 1818, at the age of 85 years, 3 months, 6 days. Was this the grandson with whom the very aged grandfather walked twelve miles? If so, let us see if we can find the intermediate link.

With the fact before us of this *Johannes Forseur* living from 1733 to 1818, let us look at the church records to see if we can find his wife and children.

Under the dates May 31, 1752, and June 29, 1760, *Jan Forseur* and "*Catherine his wife*" (surname not given in either entry) appear on the baptismal register of the regular church at Tappan, as witnesses at baptisms. In the first instance (1752) the child baptised is, as far as I can see, no relative of the Forshee family. In the second (1760) the child is John (b. June 8, 1760), son of Johannes Forshee and Magdalena Banta (see below). So the Tappan record leaves us in the dark as to the full name of this "*Catherine his wife.*" But on the baptismal record of the irregular organization at Tappan (this has been explained), under the date Feb. 9, 1768, Jan Forseur and Catherine Waldron appear as witnesses at the baptism of a child the child is Catherine, daughter of Willem Fosjeur and Elizabeth Blauvelt. It is not here said that Catherine Waldron was the "wife of Jan Forseur. But the fact that Jan Forseur and "*Catherine his wife*" were found in two other places makes this certain. And this record shows that they were already married at the first date, May 31, 1752, and that they were still living at the last date, Feb. 9, 1768.

We now pass to another source of information. There is a Will still in possession of the family drawn up by one John Forseur, who names in it his "wife Elizabeth." These parties also are found once on the regular baptismal record at Tappan, and again twice on the record of the irregular Tappan organization, under the dates Jan. 1, 1780, March 27, 1774, and Dec. 4, 1774, as witnesses at baptisms (children not known to be relatives). The Will and the records are both alike, silent as to the surname of this wife.

Here, then, we have *Jan Forseur* and *Catherine Waldron*, 1752 to 1768, and *Jan Forseur* and *Elizabeth his wife* in 1774.

I have no doubt that this is the same *Jan Forseur* twice married. And he is the father of Johannes Forseur, born Jan. 15, 1733 (wife Magdalena Banta), at the baptism of whose first child John at Tappan, he and his "wife Catherine" appear as witnesses June 20, 1760. The Will of Jan Forseur (wife Elizabeth), above mentioned, reveals

the fact that he lived in Harrington, Bergen County, New Jersey. It leaves his property to his wife Elizabeth, his children—Jane, who married Daniel Perry, Peter, Barent, Johannes, *and the children of his son William (deceased)*.

From these traditions and later sources of information, I make up the following line:

JAN FORSEUR<sup>1</sup> (wife unknown), who lived to 110 years.

JAN FORSEUR<sup>2</sup> wives Catherine Waldron, and Elizabeth ———.

JOHANNES FORSEUR<sup>3</sup> (wives Magdalena Banta and Rebecca Wood, see below), born January 15, 1733; died April 21, 1818.

None of the present family, by personal knowledge, go back of the last of these names. The Will spoken of reveals the second, and tradition speaks of the first. The Will, as stated, finds the family in Harrington, Bergen Co., N. J., at the middle of the last century. (This book was printed in 1876, so he means middle of the 18th century, about 1750.) About that time they moved to Kakiat. A large farm at the latter place became from that date the residence of several of the Forshee generations. Some of it is still in possession of the family. It lies between one and two miles to the west or southwest from Kakiat (now West New Hempstead) Church.

Johannes Forseur, born Jan. 15, 1733, married twice. His first wife was Magdalena Banta, born at Tappan, Oct. 8, 1736, and baptised there Oct. 31, 1736. She was the eldest of four children of Abraham Banta and Annetje Van Horne. The other was Cornelius Banta, b. Dec. 5, 1738.

Jacomyntje Banta, b. Jan. 26, 1747.

The date of Magdalena's death is not known. She is buried in the "Brick Church" yard at Kakiat, but unfortunately her grave has no stone.

The second wife was Rebecca Wood. Family tradition has it she was a cousin of the first. I cannot connect her with any record in my possession.

HISTORY OF ROCKLAND COUNTY, NEW YORK—  
J. B. BEERS, P. 283—FORSHAY'S

In 1851 Mr. W. S. Forshay erected about one mile north of Viola, a small shop for the manufacture of cigars, which in 1860 was supplanted by the present enlarged structure. Mr. Forshay employs about 12 men, and turns out 600,000 cigars per year.

In the year 1812 there were seven persons in the town (Ramapo) by the name of Forsheur (Forshay).

p. 282—Forshay's Corner.

The old stone house which was situated at this point until within the last decade, when it was torn down by Mr. Abram A. Forshay, was one of the polling places of the town of Ramapo, prior to the formation of the three election districts as now constituted. During the Revolution it was owned by Joseph Conklin, who there ran a distillery in the early part of the present century. It was afterwards purchased by Abram I. Forshay, father of the present owner.

p. 292—Baptist Church, Viola.

The first Baptist Church to be located in the Ramapo stood on the southeast corner, where the road from Tallmans to Sherwoodville crosses the New City road, and was built not far from 1815. In its early days it was strong and flourishing, supported by such persons as Cornelius Inachenbosh, Henry Frederick, John DeGrôte, John Forshee, and son, William Springstead, and others. Their most noted preacher was Elder Beebe, and their doctrines "the hardest of the hard and strongest of the strong."



## WEAVER LINE

JAN WEAVER<sup>1</sup>, b. Holland? Came to America, lived in Trenton, New Jersey, at the time of the Revolutionary War. m. Wife unknown, had at least one son and two daughters.

Smith<sup>4</sup> visited him, his mind had failed, the house had burned down, and all records lost.

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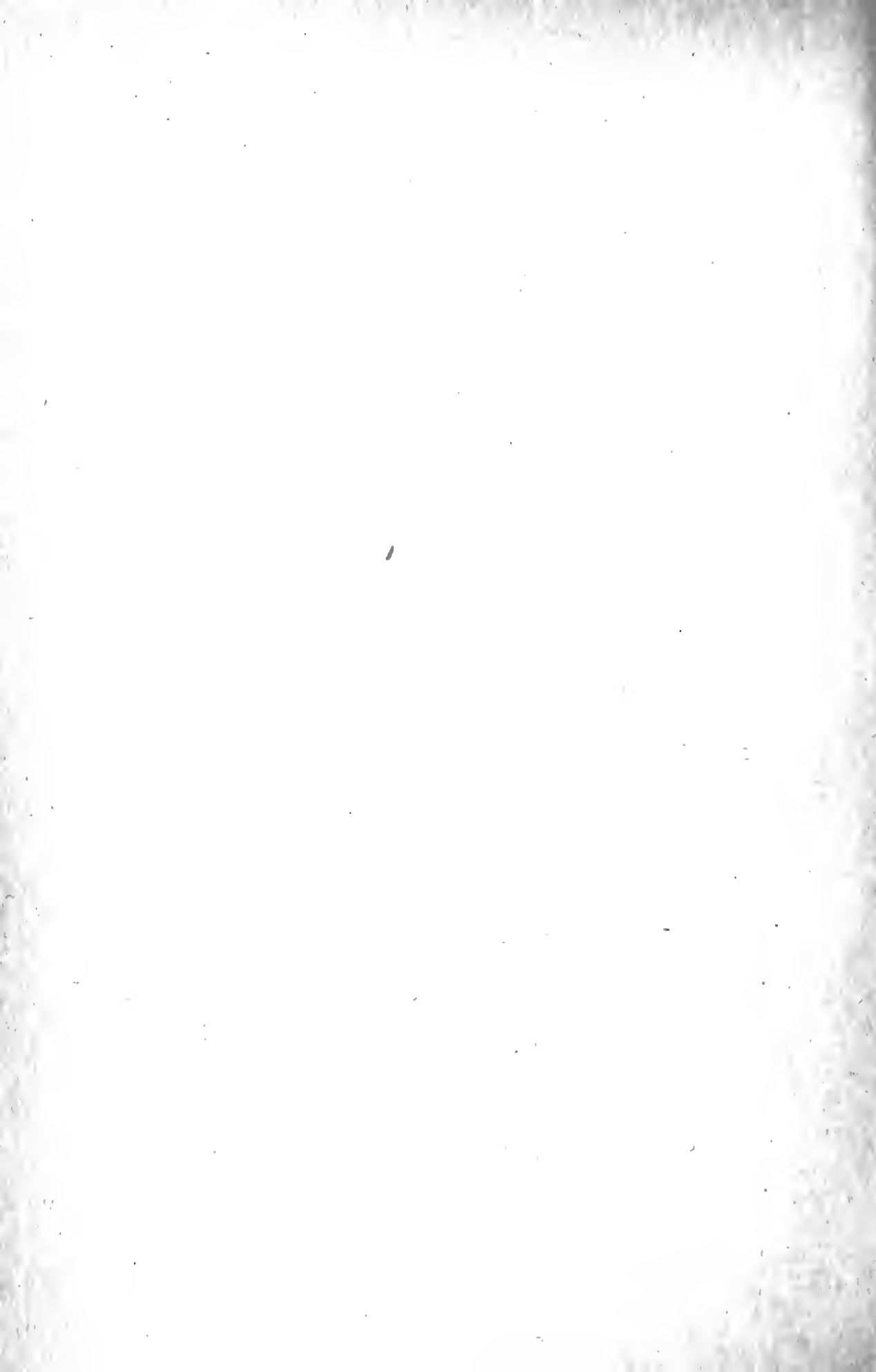
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
