

Editorial "In the Olde Days"


Remember how cold the water felt in February when you had to take your Red Cross Life Saving Courses in the pool? Memories of shivering bodies covered with goose bumps standing with toes curled and a towel cascading from a wet head, waiting for the next drill. "Do I really need life saving, sir?"

"Hoary" Kendall would be standing at pool side with his bald head reflecting the light coming through the glass panels in the roof. His countenance was one of good humour, mustache trimmed, eves twinkling at the prospect of the upcoming ordeal. During the winter he wore a sleeveless Vneck sweater, grey flannels and the ever present bow tie. He never appeared in a bathing suit but was always content to direct his reluctant pupils from behind the line. "I am afraid you will have to do that again, Trent, your stroke is poor."

Forty years ago competitive swimming was just emerging as an international sport, particularly at the Olympics. Names like the Australian crawl, butterfly, breast stroke and dolphin kick were hardly on everyone's lips. With the onset of technology, whereby water could be filtered and the PH balance maintained so that the pool did not turn into a swamp overnight, the attraction of indoor swimming for recreation and competition grew.

It was not a spectator sport in the olde days.

What with the high humidity and heat generated by the water and every noise echoing off bare walls and ceilings, splashing water everywhere and lack of any regular sitting areas meant that most people were content to learn "Come on in,

second-hand the results of the day's events.

At St. Andrew's, memories of chlorinated laden zephers wafting through the air as you approached the basement showers in Dunlap Hall were enough to discourage most interested aspirants. Few tried out for swimming unless they already had a demonstrated talent, and those that succeeded were a close knit group. "Weights at 2:30 pm and then into the pool until dinner." Once on the team, swimmers had other technical and bureaucratic factors to overcome. Bleary eyed from three or more hours of laps and time trials, the sportsmen would head for the special dinner table where foods conducive to swimmers were served. Studies at night were often performed through a chlorine induced haze. Sleep came exactly one second after hitting the pillow. It did not

matter that some roomates, such as Harry Yuill, stayed up past curfew, reading tomes like "Variety", the swimmers were, "dead to the world". As a result high jinks after lights out were often forfeited, missing a 'six-of-the-best' caning by the Gibber. "This will hurt me more than it does you, Morse. Now bend over."

Swimming in the past was thought of, in some quarters at S.A.C., as a "minor" sport. Even though more time was spent in training than most other endeavours, it did not rank with the 'big' sports, football and hockey.

Despite these handicaps, swimming at SAC has prospered because it offers physical development in a competitive environment. It is healthy and represents a non-contact sport that keeps one's knees and back for future years. It also represents the development of the individual physically and mentally. As with any individual sport, it is the athlete against himself first, and his competitors second.

In the olde days sailors in the British Navy prided themselves on not being able to swim. They reasoned that if they were cast overboard, or victims of a sinking in cold water, they would "go quicker". We are a different breed today, swimming is enjoyable and refreshing, well worth pursuing for everyone. Few of us will ever go down to the sea, professionally.

For the boys at St. Andrew's, swimming represents an increasingly important major sport and one which helps raise the standards of fitness for every boy at the school.

Headmaster's Column Something Different

This is not philosophy, there is no message, no moral in this article. It is just the story of a young old boy - in his own words.

Two new words have crept into our language in the past 18 months; Glasnost and Perestroika!



people and we appreciate all they have done for us.



The Choral Tradition Musical Notes and Comments

When browsing through back issues of the Review, it is notable that choral music figures prominently in the development of our strong musical traditions. There have been many talented men who have successfully developed the love of singing among generations of Andreans.

The strength of any programme is largely due to the interests of those at the top. Nowhere is this truer than at St. Andrew's College where each of our headmasters has made a strong effort to encourage the development of both singing and other musical activities.

Beginning in the 1930's Dr. Macdonald selected Mr. W. Crookshank and Mr. J.Y.S. Ross to plant the seed. A Glee Club was formed and special training was given to treble voices. Among the first pieces attempted were two choruses from Handel's 'Messiah'. No mention was made of how successful the performances of these ambitious selections were, but it is hinted that rehearsals were a bit tedious.

Dr. Ketchum arrived and immediately threw himself into the task of keeping the school singing. He initiated St. Andrew's first Carol Service in 1934 and personally trained the boys for it. Since then the school has celebrated this event annually with pride.

It was Dr. David Ouchterlony to whom Dr. Ketchum passed the torch in 1939. Ouchterlony continued to divide the school into cantors and trebles and to train them to sing harmony and descant parts. The Carol Service, then held in the College Chapel was broadcast over Toronto radio stations in 1941 and 1942. The

school won the prestigious Carnegie Music award in 1943, indicating Ouchterlony's success.

Mr. Ian Galliford and Mr. G.B. Gibson followed Dr. Ouchterlony. Their tenure saw the birth of the Aurora Music Club, in whose concerts St. Andrew's boys sang. A Treble Choir was also robed for the first time in 1945.

Mr. John Bradley succeeded Gibson in 1951. Over the following thirteen years, he was to resurrect the Glee Club, begin the tradition of performing school musicals, learn to play the bagpipes, win 12 First Prizes at Toronto's famous Kiwanis Music Festival with his renowned Treble Choirs, and record two LPs which featured the Carol Service! Following the CBC television broadcast of the 1954 Carol Service, Bradley took his superbly trained trebles to New York City to represent Canada in a Choral Evensong at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine sponsored by the

Royal School of Church Music.

Dr. Coulter called upon Dr. J.A. 'Tony' Dawson to carry on the tradition. Dawson maintained a treble section and introduced senior boys to sing tenor and bass harmonies. Several inter-school music concerts were organized and our boys performed with other musicians from Hillfield-Strathallan College, U.C.C., and St. George's College. This was a fore-runner to the current and highly successful Independent Schools Music Festival held annually at Roy Thomson Hall.

Mr. Julian Greenwood took the helm and, together with Mr. Bob Jones, continued to encourage the continuation of choral and other musical pursuits at every level of the school.

With the arrival of Mr. John Clements and Mr. Aubrey Foy, Dr. Hockin ensured the further success of the Carol Service and saw the blossoming of the School Musical. Both events still grow in popularity and quality.

Currently, Mr. Bob Bedard continues to oversee a successful music programme. Under his guidance, the school still produces a fine Treble Choir and has the ability to produce senior singers for harmony parts. The Choir is once again robed in bright red cassocks and white surplices, thanks to the Lloyd C.

MacPherson Memorial Fund, and it is once again winning awards. Our choir won First Prize at the 1989 Lion's Music Festival in the Treble Choir category.

It is hoped that we will do this lineage proud as we continue the choral tradition at St. Andrew's College.

Old Boys of all ages from all eras helped us celebrate our 90th birthday in fine fashion! Eight hundred and twenty-eight individuals donated \$155,544, up from \$141,955 the year earlier, a 9.6% increase. This is the sixth consecutive year that total income has increased. The average gift hit a new high of \$187.85.

We were very pleased to see how many old boys enthusiastically took part in contributing \$10 per year for each year since their graduating year.






