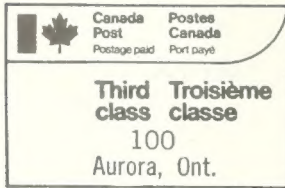

Fall Sports Programme 1972

"UCC 15 - SAC 6" This score closely reflects the present status of our inter-school teams this year. Not as losers, of course, but as a school with greater drive and pride than in the past two years. "13 wins - 1 tied" - another statistic produced by the Macdonald House 'A' soccer team that reflects our strength at the Lower School level. For the 1st soccer, the season resulted in a series of 0 - 0 tied games against Ridley, UCC, St. George's and TCS (2 - 2). They were right in there every game and with the odd break could have come out on top. A first attempt was made to qualify for the Ontario High School finals but after beating out Woodbridge H.S. (6 - 3) we lost the regional final to Bracebridge H.S. (2 - 1).

Back to football for a moment. First football is on the upswing if we can consider this season as an indication. In spite of a 32 - 6 loss to Ridley our "Saints" played one heck of a series defeating TCS, Appleby, Lakefield & Hillfield. Those of you who witnessed the first game against UCC I'm sure pleased were pleased with the way the boys fought 100% of the time. Three or four players deserve mention here as team stalwarts. They are Peter Calverly and Sean Whitehead, who gave us many exciting moments, and Murray Todd who, without prior QB experience stepped in and held the team together for the best part of the season until John Greenough returned from his injury. Greenough handled the team capably in the final two games. The Seconds coached by Walter Froese and Bill Skinner had an undefeated season, thus becoming ISAA champions. The closest they came to defeat was a 0 - 0 tie with Upper Canada.

A new team was created this year in Under 15 Rugger with its prime objective to give young boys who enjoy contact sports, the opportunity to learn the fundamentals of ball carrying and tackling under the able coaching of Mr. Geoff Smith.

Biology at S.A.C.

One of the plus benefits of the new science building, McLaughlin Hall, is provision of a Biology Lab which enables the School to offer a biology course for the first time.

The Grade 13 biology course being offered at St. Andrew's since the fall of 1971 introduces the student to many of the disciplines of biology. Topics such as cellular biology, genetics, molecular biology, comparative anatomy and ecology are just some of the general areas that are studied in some detail.

The student is fortunate to have the most modern facilities known to complement the various topics studied. Experiments such as studying cells through microscopes, measuring light absorption of certain biological molecules with a spectrophotometer and maintaining the 300 gallon fish tank are a few of the many student experiments performed throughout the year.

To give a student a better understanding of himself the study of human anatomy and physiology are incorporated into the zoology section of biology course. By dissecting various types of animals the student is able to understand both the function and evolution of the human body.

The biology course at S.A.C. is designed not just to prepare the student for university but to give him as well some insight into his relationship with life in general.
