ATHLETIC BUILDING PLANS NEAR COMPLETION

The Building Committee, with T. George Armstrong as Chairman, has been diligently refining the architect's preliminary plans for the new Athletic Building. It is anticipated that the contract will be let soon for an early Spring start on construction with completion in October, barring any setbacks. The new building will be located adjacent to and connected with McLaughlin Hall, behind Dunlap Hall. The floor plans appear on the next page.

While the 1977-78 Capital Campaign has not yet reached its overall objective, the \$1,000,000 required for this facility, top priority item in the 1977-78 Capital Campaign, has been subscribed with over half the amount in cash and the balance in pledges over a five year period. Peter Dalton, General Chairman of the Campaign, announces in a progress report that the funds have been acquired from the following sources:

Mr. Dalton said his Campaign Committee is particularly encouraged and pleased with the response from the business community. Over one hundred and twenty corporations have made donations.

More than 60% of parents of present students have participated in the Capital Campaign to date and Mr. Dalton felt sure more would be heard from. Personal canvassing took place in the Toronto and Aurora-King-Richmond Hill areas, but parents in other areas had to be canvassed by letter, which is not nearly as effective.

A solid core of several hundred loyal Old Boys have almost succeeded in reaching the objective for this group, but Mr. Dalton expressed disappointment that more have not contributed to this point. It was particularly surprising and distressing to find that many canvassers have not completed their assignments. He stressed to the Andrean that it is not too late for Old Boys to participate, since the Campaign period extends over five years.

The Ladies Guild have come up with a magnificent donation of \$16,000 mainly through a most successful art show last October but including other activities.

The staff of the School has also been generous, contributing to the Capital Campaign as well as continuing the Staff Scholarship inaugurated fifteen years ago and awarded annually to a student attending St. Andrew's.


Mr. Dalton singled out the present students of the school for their truly outstanding effort in raising over \$10,000. This came mostly from "Marathon Day" last April in conjunction with Havergal College, who involved in a fund-raising campaign, and from "Mayfest" staged by S.A.C. students at Aurora.

The Campaign Chairman emphasized that the "books are still open" for those readers of the Andrean who wish to make a donation. Although the funds have been provided for the Athletic Building, there are several additional objectives of the Capital Campaign. These include augmenting the Coulter Scholarship fund which now stands at over \$100,000, replacing furnishings in residences, and eventually rebuilding the swimming pool.

Donations are deductible for income tax purposes and are payable to St. Andrew's College Foundation. For further information, contact Jim Hamilton, Campaign Coordinator, at the Foundation Office at the School.



S.A.C. Art Programme

With the implementation of the grade nine course this year, St. Andrew's will have an art class in all grades for the first time in its history. The decision to go ahead with a complete programme was made by Dr. Coulter five years ago and has evolved under Dr. Hockin to the point where there are over one hundred and thirty boys involved from Upper and Lower schools. This represents about one third of the student body.

There are three major objectives which the present programme ultimately strives for: to teach the language of images in order to assist a boy to understand and cope with his visual environment; to expose a boy to as many media as time will allow so that he may gain some versatility; to teach a boy how he may express himself effectively in a language other than a written one.

In a world so full of images, the importance of visual literacy cannot be overstated. Through exposure to the expressions of other times and places the student gains some sense of context to the present. Through manipulation of the elements of visual language in any medium the student can recognize how others are creating images. Through encouraged selfexpression students will gain confidence, self-satisfaction and perhaps a career.

So students are taught about properties of line, colour, texture, value and shape; how to arrange and present ideas through composition and layout. They are taught drawing, painting, printmaking, weaving, sculpting, ceramics, photography, basics of architecture, commercial art and design in short as many facets or methods of artistic expression as possible. Most importantly they are encouraged to express ideas, feelings, and thoughts with increasing sophistication as their experience grows.

If the interest and the talent is there, students can go on to further study in visual arts; perhaps find a career for themselves. This is for the few at present but it could expand easily since the talent is here. For all, it is an experience and a learning situation they can enjoy and continue individually beyond S.A.C. if they choose.

First Hockey Retains I.S.L. Hockey Title Wins Silver Medal in all Ontario Playdowns:

The 1977-78 First Hockey Team did what most experts expected them to do - they won the Independent Schools' championship for the third consecutive year by posting a record of 11 wins, 1 tie and no losses. This is the second straight year that the Saints have gone undefeated in I.S.L. play. In addition to this feat, Captain Jeff Baun and his Assistant Captains Greg Baun and Andy Dalton led their team mates to a third straight Georgian Bay title with a series win over a tough Almaguin High School of Sundridge; the squad also captured the prestigious Loyola of Montreal Invitational High School Championship with very impressive wins over the host school, Loyola, Michael Power of Toronto and Sydney Academy, the Number One team from Nova Scotia. These successes alone would have made for a great season but, the team saved its best hockey for the month of March as they embarked on the All-Ontario

High School Playdown trail. In District play, St. Andrew's and Grand River High of Kitchener qualified to advance to the All-Ontarios in Ottawa from March 15th through the 18th. In all, the NINE top teams from across the province qualified for the elimination tournament. St. Andrew's scored convincing wins against Michael Power (3-0), Lucas High of London (7-3) and Bell High School of Ottawa (5-1). This puts the Saints in the Grand Final against a very good Monarch Park team from Toronto. It took almost 6 minutes of sudden-death overtime before a deserving Monarch Park aggregation won the final by a 4-3 count. Winning a Silver Medal in Provincial competition is a FIRST for St. Andrew's and the Andrean salutes coaches Ed Meagher and Gary O'Meara, and all members of the team. Some of them have played together for the past five years so this season was a fitting clixax for them.

CHARLES PRIOR DIES AT 103

Some Old Boys of the Rosedale era may remember Charles Prior, at one time head janitor at St. Andrew's.

Born in 1874 at the Royal Mews in London. England, where his father was head groomsman for Queen Victoria, Mr. Prior came to Canada at the age of 20. He worked on a farm for a year then became caretaker of Mr. J.K. Macdonald's summer residence before taking on the job at St. Andrew's. Subsequently, he went to a summer camp on Manitoulin Island with which Dr. D. Bruce Macdonald was connected, where he spent the rest of his working life. Mr. Prior worked for the Macdonalds for 64 years. Predeceased by his wife, he lived with each of his two sons for a few years and then entered Centennial Manor in Little Current in 1967. He died there last year at the age of 103. According to his sons, he always looked forward to receiving the ANDREAN with its news of the school.
