One of the cadets was selected a member of the Twelve-man Cadet Rifle Team shooting for Canada at Bisley, England, this summer. The Fencing Team (coached by Tibor Bozzay) placed 3rd of 24 competitors in the Ontario Open Fencing Championships. Among tournament engagements was a home-and-home with a B.S.S. Team. Cricket enthusiasm was maintained in spite of soaking weather during most of the short season. The Firsts lost good matches to T.C.S. and U.C.C. but came through in the final match to beat Ridley, -80 to 79, in one of the most exciting matches ever! Track and Field had a good season. How did we ever get along without the new track and field facilities?! The Junior and Senior Cross-Country races were run under ideal conditions with a large field and a goodly number of trained competitors. The Tennis Courts have been in constant use. Rugger Teams showed up well in a sudden-death schedule of matches for the Central Ontario Area. That pleasant Summer Term relaxation — Golf on the Lower Field (Malone) had its usual quota of devotees, but not for several years have we witnessed fly-casting at paper targets on the greensward! The Senior Play, "Richard of Bordeaux" (directed by Lloyd MacPherson) was not presented on schedule because the "Queen" had the mumps! But it was performed this Term. The Junior Play appeared later. Variety Night, an entirely informal, boy-produced show was its usual success with a better than average show of talent. The Kenneth Ketchum Auditorium has proven a great boon — has been in constant use. The Review should reach you during the summer. The Ladies' Guild brightened the campus again on the occasion of its annual meeting and luncheon. Its quietly effective efforts on behalf of the School provide much that otherwise would
