OUTSTANDING ACADEMIC RESULTS ACHIEVED IN 1964

We are happy to report that the School's academic standards were maintained at a very high level during the past year. Out of the Upper VI (Grade 13) graduating class of 30 boys, no less than 10 achieved 75% average or better in Departmental examinations. Four won Ontario Scholarships provided by the Dept. of Education requiring a minimum average of 80%. In addition, David Bichan of Toronto obtained a General Proficiency Scholarship at Trinity College and has since been awarded the Geoffrey P. E. Clarkson Admission Scholarship.

Throughout the entire School, from Lower II (Grade 7) to Lower VI (Grade 12) the failure rate was 11.2%. This compares with the Ontario average of approximately 20% which means you can be proud of your School's performance, and reflects much credit on the Staff.

— ATHLETICS —

FOOTBALL—This year's First Team was very young and inexperienced, but showed good spirit and desire by winning their third LBF game against T.C.S. 45-6 after losing to Ridley 14-6 and U.C.C. 22-14. It's interesting to note, however, that the First Team has lost only 5 out of 18 LBF games during the last six years. The Second and Third Teams came out about even in the won and loss columns, and the Under Fifteen had a very successful season winning all their games in LBF competition—so the future looks bright!

SOCCKER—The Soccer Team, coached by Mr. Pitman and Mr. Stoaite, played 13 games, winning 4, tying 3 and losing 6.

HOCKEY—As in football, the First Team was very inexperienced with only three holdovers from the previous year. The highlight of the year was the Old Boys' Hockey Night when a very strong Old Boys' Team defeated the School 7-5. The Third Team came up with the best performance, losing only one game during the season.

BASKETBALL—The First Team started out strongly but, unfortunately, were unable to keep it up and won only one LBF game. The Second and Third Teams were outstanding both having undefeated records.

SWIMMING—This was the best team the School's had in years, finishing a close second to Ridley in the LBF meet at Hart House, despite losing one of its star performers a few days previously with a broken ankle, and the winners were not established until the very last race.

FENCING—Under the guidance of Mr. Bozzay, the School took a prominent part in fencing this year, being host to an International Tournament in March. From a group of thirty competitors, Ren Henderson and Ian Terry of the School team won first and second places.

SKIING—David Cathers won the Ski Race for the third straight year.

CRICKET—Hampered by the weather, the Cricket season is late getting under way but prospects for a good team looks favourable.

— CADETS —

Thanks to a generous benefactor and the Ladies' Guild, the Cadet Corps was completely re-outfitted last year, and proceeded to show its gratitude by winning the Strathcona Cup for the best Cadet Corps in Central Command. The Band lost out by only ½ point for selection to be resident band at the National Cadet Camp in Banff.

This year the Corps is the largest in the history of the School with 267 members organized into 8 platoons, and is commanded by Cadet Lt. Col. R. M. Pash and Cadet Major E. R. Nelles as 2 i/c. In addition to the usual Church Parades, there has been shoots at Camp Borden ranges and weekend schemes.

In DCRA competition in 1964, the School stood fifth out of 1800 teams in Canada. Harry Addison won the Silver Medal in the Youth of the Empire shoot.

— DRAMATICS —

Two excellent productions were put on by the boys during the year in the Ketchum Auditorium—"Pirates of Penzance", directed by Mr. Kamcke and Mr. Allworth, and "Billy Budd", a serious drama of life in the Royal Navy of 1798, directed by Mr. MacPherson.

— OLD BOYS' DINNER —

To the traditional accompaniment of Cadet pipers, 176 sat down at the Old Boys' Dinner held at the School on November 13th. John G. McClelland, S.A.C. '40, was the guest speaker and regaled us with some amusing and interesting anecdotes of his experiences in the publishing field.

A number of staff changes took place last September and, while this may be old news to many, it will bring the rest up-to-date. **Jack Wright**, after 26 years of yeoman service, has become Headmaster of the new independent day school for boys, St. George's College, Toronto. **John Bradley**, after leaving an indelible mark on the School through the influence of music, has joined Jack at St. George's along with **Jock Armitage**, whose quietly effective schoolmastering will be missed. **Henry Holden**, after 19 years at the School, has taken on an executive appointment at Trinity College, Toronto. **Fred Richardson** has moved on to a new appointment in the Metropolitan Toronto area. **Dr. Vince Helwig** has returned to the staff of the Central Technical School, Toronto, and **Gordon Rutherford** has joined the staff of Appleby College. **Dick Gibb** is spending a sabbatical year at O.C.E., but will be returning to S.A.C. in September.

We do hope that it has done something to keep Old Andeans in touch with the School and other Andeans.

Our new staff members have already been with us for the larger part of the school year. **Fred Hiltz** has rejoined the staff and is handling the Physics courses. **Chris Allworth** is taking care of Music. **Fred Coburn** and **Craig Kamcke** have come to us from the public system and are teaching Mathematics and History respectively. **Derek Inglis** has come to S.A.C. from University School, Victoria to teach Maths and Science and **David Timms** from St. John's Ravenscourt, Winnipeg, as a Latin master. **Geoff Smith**, from the Maritimes, looks after Chemistry and **Raj Rajballie**, a well-qualified geographer, is filling in for **Dick Gibb**. All these men are doing excellent work in both an academic and extra-curricular sense, but more about them later. The Housemaster's post in Macdonald House has been filled by **Bill Skinner**, who has taken hold in the sterling fashion expected of an Andean.

MASTERS' SCHOLARSHIP

Something we believe to be a "first" is a new award "The Masters' Scholarship" with an annual value of \$1,800 and to which all members of the teaching staff have contributed. This scholarship, which will be awarded for the first time in 1965-66, has the highest value of any scholarship at the School. A good illustration to all you Andeans of the interest our masters take in the student body.
