THE DINNER

Held this year at the King Edward Hotel, the annual get-together was a tremendous success. Suspense was high before Ham saved the day for the Committee by producing Ed Ballon ('42) as winner number three! The Headmaster was introduced by Tom Chipman and received a standing ovation from the over 200 present. His address covered a wide field, from the functions of education generally to the carrying on of traditions at St. Andrew's. He most definitely left the feeling with all O.B's that their School was under capable and inspired leadership.

'ROUND AND ABOUT THE SCHOOL

These days, that curious feeling of expectancy of winter causes one to look out of the window first thing each morning - just in case there IS a covering of snow - then one would KNOW that the months had fled! But they have been good months 'round and about the School. There has been enthusiastic and optimistic application on the part of all hands to the work in hand — studies, football, etc. The First Football Team played hard and well and, having won all their games, seemed to be heading for an outright L.B.F. championship when U.C.C. won the last game, turning the outright championship into one shared with B.R.C. The Third Team (Under Seventeens) in the C.O.S.S.A. League were less successful but did win three and tie one of a total of seven games. The Under Fitteen Team (mostly Mac House) won all their L.B.F. games and lost only two of a total of nine. Four Clan Teams played a series of intramural games which were spirited and keenly contested, ending up with the Wallace Clan on top. The Joe W. Taylor award for punting, for the first time was won by the School punter - the Football Captain! The new Track has been completed, not only providing track and field facilities second-to-none but a change of landscape that makes for considerable improvement. The site is high; there is distant perspective — an exhilerating prospect. The **Hockey** and **Basketball** Teams have been out since Half-Term and at all levels look promising. The usual repairing of boards around the Back Rinks and wire-netting behind the goals has been carried out in preparation for the first floodings. Consistently useable ice "out back" for several years now has made an action-packed area! Last week the **Debating Team** won their opening round in a debate with U.C.C. The **Upper School Play** is in rehearsal for the production of "The Winslow Boy." Some of you will remember the 1953 presentation. Practices for the Carol Service are well under way with Mr. Bradley wielding the baton. Dr. (Ken) and Mrs. Ketchum are well — living in their house on Old Yonge Street directly across from the School. Last information about Dr. Macdonald is that while he is not at all strong and is resting much, he likes to see people. In recording Archie Hallett's appointment to an assistant professorship at U. of T., other Old Andreans who are working in the university sphere were brought to mind - W. A. MacIntosh, Principal of Queen's; Roly MacLaughlin, Head of Engineering at U. of T., Gilbert Robinson, Don Fraser, Fraser Grant, Milt Wilson - all Profs at U. of T.; E. S. Magill ('22-'24) Prof at U. of Manitoba; Victor Rodwell, Ass't Prof at U. of California. The agricultural "green belt" that used to separate the School from the City of Toronto is rapidly disappearing. Housing developments and shopping centres "mushroom" almost overnight. Aurora itself has expanded in all directions. The farm south of the Orchard has recently grown a subdivision — and the word is that the reason for the apple crop not being harvested in the Aurora Orchards is that the land has been "opt'ed" for subdivision — and THAT is right up to the S.A.C. fence line! Still — with the School's acreage — it is yet "a school in the country"!
