CONSTRUCTION UNDERWAY ON NEW COLLEGE BUILDINGS

The Board of Governors unanimously decided at a recent meeting to proceed with the major portion of our building and rehabilitation plan, postponing the construction of the auditorium until sufficient funds are in hand.

This decision was arrived at after a full discussion of the progress of the campaign to date, which showed that approximately two-thirds of the funds required for the building and rehabilitation needs have so far been contributed and pledged. Arrangements have been made to borrow the additional funds required.

Tenders were received from eight topnotch general contractors and were felt to be reasonable, the spread between the highest and the lowest being around 2%. The contract has been awarded to the Mollenhauer Contracting Company, Ltd., who over the past twenty years have completed a number of Bell Telephone Exchanges and several office buildings and plants in the Toronto area.

It is a source of regret that the full building program cannot be completed at this time, this being considered most essential to the forward progress of St. Andrew's College.

September 1962 Deadline Will Be Met

Our contractor has assured us that the September, 1962, deadline will be met, so that the new buildings and the improvements will be available for the fall term in 1962.

1904 Spade Used To Turn Sod

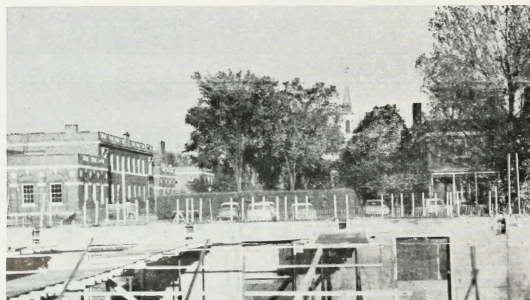
At two o'clock in the afternoon of Thursday, October 5, the first sod for the new buildings was turned by the Chairman of the Board of Governors. Witnessing the ceremony were members of the Building Committee, the Staff and the Head Prefect. The spade used by Mr. Macdonald was that with which the first sod was turned for the Rosedale School. A silver plaque on the handle, partially hidden by Mr. Macdonald's left hand, bears the inscription "SPADE used to turn first sod of St. Andrew's Buildings April 22nd 1904".

"Expression of Faith And Confidence"

At the traditional ceremony of turning the first sod for the new buildings, Mr. Macdonald told the assembled guests that the decision of the Board of Governors was an expression of faith and confidence that the Building and Scholarship Fund drive would achieve its original objective of \$1,195,000. Money in hand guarantees completion of two thirds of the building program. The work being undertaken at once includes additional classrooms and the Great Hall. There will also be extensive renovations to residences for the School's 238 boys who are boarders and to the infirmary. Other sections will be repaired, renovated or refurbished, as required.

The second part of the overall program calls for an auditorium in conjunction with the new classrooms and a scholarship and bursary fund of some \$250,000. The annual income from this fund will then release money, now being taken from fees, for other purposes.

The existing buildings were designed for 180 boys. This year 270 boys are being taught at the School under very crowded conditions and the Headmaster was forced to turn away many boys whom he considered would have benefitted by attendance at St.

Andrew's and would have been a credit to the College. The additions will accommodate another 30 boarders and will eliminate current overcrowding.

Making Progress, But .. Still A Long Way To Go

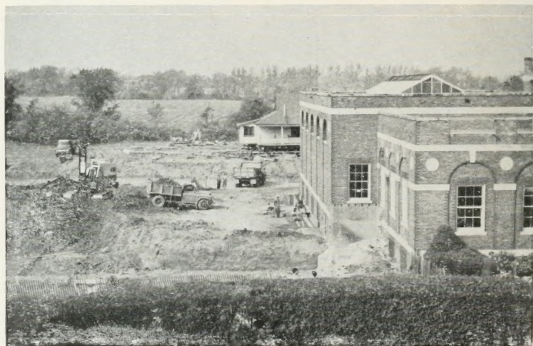
