Here we go again! - off into another School Year! Since the last Andrean reached you, much has happened. It has been redecorated, linoleum has been laid on the floor, numerous lighting outlets have been provided. New book-shelves, study tables and lamps should be in place before long. It promises to be what it is hoped it will be - an inspiring, spacious, well-equipped hall of learning - set apart as a library and supervised as such. Now - books being part of the decor of a library - and the new library being so much larger, more books are needed.
