## ORNAMENTAL BRANCHES.

Drawing and Painting.-This department receives liberal attention. Superior facilities are furnished, under a competent Instructor, exclusively devoted to this department, for the study and practice of Linear and Perspective Drawing, Pastel and Monochromatic Painting, Painting in Oil and Water Colors,

Music.-Music receives special attention.
The ladies are allowed to substitute these branches, together with German and French, for some of the higher studies in Mathematics, and for the Greek Language.
The classes in Mensuration, Leveling, and Surveying, are practiced in the use of the Quadrant and other instruments, and in Plotting.
In the department of Ancient Languages, the classes are practiced in oral and written exercises in Latin and Greek, throughout the Course ; and, in the third year, in writing translations from Latin into Greek, and from Greek into Latin. In addition to the books above named, Zumpt's Latin Grammar and Kuhner's Greek Grammar are used.
Anthon's Classical Dictionary, Smith's Dictionary of Greek and Roman Biography and Mythology, Ramshorn's Latin Synonyms, Robinson's Lexicon of the New Testament, and Forbiger's Ancient Geography, are recommended as books of reference.

Lectures will be given from time to time in the various departments.

The classes in the First Year of Academic studies have exercises in reading and analyzing Milton, Thompson, and other poets, in connection with a course of familiar Lectures on the Principles of English Grammar.

A Normal Class will be formed, (when required), and special attention will be given to those who may wish to prepare themselves for the important duties of teaching.

A Biblical Class will also be formed for the benefit of such as have the Ministry in view.

## LOCATION.

Wildiamsport is one of the most beautiful and healthy places in the State. It has never been subject to epidemies of any kind. Many coming to the School sickly have returned fully restored. The location is central and accessible from all quarters. Railoads bring us within a few hours' ride of Elmira, Lock Haven, Erie, Danville, Pottsville,

## organization.

The school is organized on the most approved plan of the best institutions of New York and New England. It embraces both sexes, under the same government and instruction. The members of the Faculty occupy apartments in the building, eat at the
ind same table, and have a constant oversight of all the Students.

The Ladies' private and public rooms are entirely separate from the others, and there is no association of the sexes but in the presence of their instructors. The Ladies and Gentlemen have less freedom of intercourse here than at home.

The happy influence, mutually exerted in their slight association in the recitation-room, at the table, and in the public exercises of the chapel, is to be seen in the cultivation of a cheerful and animated disposition - in the formation of good habits and manners in ardent devotion to study, and in the attainment of high moral character. These, with many other valuable results, have established the fact that the best plan for a school is, according to the evident design of Providence in the constitution of society, on the basis of a well regulated Christian family.
acCommodations.

ROONS AND CLOTHING

The rooms are furnished with all heavy articles, but the Students must bring their own sheets, (for double beds), pillows, pillow cases, blankets, counterpanes, ond thei and find their own brooms, mirrors, coal-oil and lamps.
Students should be supplied with warm, durable clothing, heavy boots and shoes, an sheuld should be carefully marked with the full name.

## apparatus

The Seminary is furnished with a collection of apparatus, together with full sets of Globes, Maps, and Charts, and a Cabinet of Minerals, thus affording facility for illustration and experiment.

## DISCIPLINE.

The discipline is firm, but mild and impartial. While every encouragement will be given to the orderly and studious, and due allowance be made for youthful indiscretion yet the lawless and rèfractory cannot long remain among us.

## RELIGIOUS SERVICES

Every Student is required to attend religious services daily, as well as public worship, morning and evening every Sabbath, at such place as parents or guardians may designate. N. B.-Each Student must be supplied with a Bible, to be read without note or secturian comment, in the services of the Chapel. The whole school read in concert.

## LITERARY SOCIETIES.

Besides the regular weekly exercises in Composition and Declamation, there are three flourishing Literary Societies in the Institution: the "Belles Lettres," "Gamma Epsilon," and "Tripartite Union," each of which "prepares and reads to the School a paper once a month. About 1,700 volumes are in the Societies' Libraries.

## MERIT AND DEMERIT

A strict weekly record is kept of all the exercises of the School, from which record the Students will be graded.

A record of demerits is also kept. Tardiness, unexcused absences from required exercises, and all disorderly conduct, will subject the Student to demerit marks. Ten such marks bring a private reproof before the Faculty; twenty a public reprimand before may send the offender away. Sess parents when requested.

## A WORD TO PARENTS.

1. Try to have your children here on the first day of the term, but not before, as we will not be ready to receive them. The classes are on the second day formed, and it will be better for all concerned that the Student starts regularly with his class.
2. If possible do not call them away during the session. Absence, if only for a few days, disarranges the class, and is generally the beginning of irregularity on the part of the scholar.
3. Do not allow your children to leave the school before the examinations, unless it camnot be avoided. Serious inconvenience, to all concerned, often arises from a neglect of this caution.
4. Supply them very sparingly with spending money. Parents cannot be too cautious on this point.
5. Select for your child one of the Instructors, as a patron, to distribute his funds. In this way a more judicious use of your money will be made, and your child will be kept from many temptations.

Students not boarding in the Institution must observe the following additional rules:-

1. Attend Daily Prayers.
2. Must attend all the Seminary Exercises punctually
3. Must spend the intervals between Recitations in the Study Hall.
4. Must account for all absence by written excuse without delay, time and number of recitations being specifiec
5. Must not visit the rooms of boarders without permission.

BY-LAWS.

1. During the hours of study the students shall not be umnecessarily absent from thei rooms.
2. At the time appointed to attend prayers, recitations, Lecture, or other exercise, eacl student shall repair quiectly and promptly to the place designated.
3. At no time shall any student loiter in the halls, or about the doors, or indulge in jumping, wrestling, loud talking, whistling, or any other unnecessary noise, or soil the building with tobaceo.
4. The students shall not be absent from their rooms at night after the hour of study indicated by the ringing of the bell, nor shall they attend parties or mixed assemblies without permission from the President; nor shall they at any time visit taverns, eatinganes, or oher places of public resort, or on any occasion indulge in the use of intoxi eating liquors.
5. All profane and indecent language, playing at games of chance, injuring the merty of the Institution or of citizens, quarreling, fighting, the carrying of fire arms ther dangerous weapons, are strictly forbidden
6. No student shall leave the limits of the town for a longer time than one hour without permission from the President.

13. The Sabbath must be strictly observed by all. No walking about, visiting, or receing visits, will be allowed. All must attend public worship twice during the day ach places as they or their guardians may prefer
14. No lady shall, at any time, receive calls from gentlemen at her own room. Friend ma distance can see the ladies in the parlor
15. The young ladies will not be allowed to leave the Scminary grounds, at any time without permission; and the gentlemen will be restricted at the discretion of the Faculty,
16. No student shall change his or her room, or boarding place, without special permission from the President
17. No student will be permitted to leave the school during the session without an express request from the parent or guardian, made to the President, and with the consent of the Faculty.
18. Any student who, without just cause, shall fail to attend the examinations will be considered under censure.
19. Permission to be absent from any exercise must be obtained, if possible, before the absence occurs.
20. No student will be permitted to leave any class without the consent of the Faculty.
21. The ladies and gentlemen must not visit each others apartments, walk or ride together, without permission, nor converse together from the window
22. Students from the neighborhood will not be permitted to visit home at such times as will interfere with the regular exercises of the school.
23. Any offending student may be punished, according to the nature of the offence, by private or public reproof, suspension, dismission, or expulsion.
24. None but students can attend the society meetings, unless by express permission of the Facuity.
25. No special meeting of the students shall be held at any time, without permission of the President.
26. Any temporary prudential regulation for the government of the school that the Faculty may see fit to adopt shall be equally binding with these by-Laws.
