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PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

BIBLE SOCIETY, C. S. A.

The opening service of the second Anniversary meeting of the Bible Society of the Confederate States of America, was held at the Presbyterian Church, in Augusta, Ga., April 20th, 1864, at 8 o'clock, P. M. The preliminary exercises consisted in singing part of the 19th Psalm, "The Heavens declare Thy glory, Lord," prayer by the Rev. H. J. Adams, of the M. E. Church, and reading the Scriptures. These were followed by a sermon from the Rev. Dr. T. V. Moore, of the Presbyterian Church, Richmond, Va., from Matt. iv. 4: "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God."*

. THURSDAY, APRIL 21st.

The Society convened at the Presbyterian Church, at 10 o'clock, A. M. The President of the Society, Hon. Joseph Henry Lumpkin, not being in attendance, or either the Vice-Presidents, on motion of the Rev. Dr. Wilson, the Hon. C. J. Jenkins, of Augusta, was appointed. President pro tem. The Rev. Dr. Wilson conducted the religious service.

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^{*}It is proper to say, that in rendering this excellent service for the Society, Dr. Moore kindly yielded to an unexpected request; for Dr. B. M. Palmer had been engaged to preach on the occasion; but, he was prevented from being present, because of a recent order inhibiting travel on any of the Railroads between Augusta and Richmond. a military necessity making it necessary for the Government to appropriate all the transportation to its own uses. The same fact, doubtless, prevented the attendance of members from the States North of Georgia—except Dr. Moore, who had been some time in this State. The fact is worthy of record, that posterity may know, that even while our Confederacy is in the ageny of a life and death struggle, the servants of God are trying to urge forward their work, as though there were no war.

Members from the States of Virginia, Georgia, Alabama, and Louisiana had their names enrolled.

The Society then called for the Annual Report of the Board of Managers. This document was read by the Corresponding Secretary, Rev. Dr. Myers, as follows:

REPORT.

That gracious Providence, which, amid all the perils of a destructive war, has preserved our young Republic from overthrow, notwithstanding the frequent disasters of the past year, adds to the many mercies bestowed on us further cause for gratitude and praise, by permitting the Bible Society of the Confederate States to convene again in annual session; and the Board of Managers in reporting their second year's labors to the Society, would first of all record their grateful sense of obligation to Almighty God for all His loving kindness.

SUPPLIES OF THE SCRIPTURES.

In the Report of last year, the correspondence of the Board with the British and Foreign Bible Society was given, and the plan detailed, by which it was believed we could get a large supply of the Scriptures from that Society. About the time of the last annual meeting the first shipment from the B. & F. B. Society was received; and other shipments came forward quite regularly for two or three months, until 43 cases of books had reached us. Then there was a suspension of receipts until Dec., when 5 more cases were received-making 48 in all. This suspension was occasioned by no fault of the B. & F. B. Society, but resulted from the difficulty of obtaining transportation from Nassau to our blockaded ports. That Society continued to send forward shipments regularly until Sept. 16th, when 92 cases had been forwarded-44 of which have not reached us; nor is it known whether it is because they have not been reshipped to us, or whether, having been forwa rded, they have fallen into the hands of U. Scruisers. By these shipments the noble proffer of a credit of \$15,000 to this Society by the B. & F. B. Society was exhausted; but not the kindness and the Christian courtesy of its officers. The Rev. Chas. Jackson, its Secretary, generously wrote that if the Board wished to extend its credit, it need not hesitate to apply for the extension; for though he could not officially proffer it, yet he would cheerfully advocate a grant of further credit, and he had no doubt that the Directors of the Society would as cheerfully accord it.

The obstacles in the way of importing our books do not seem likely to be removed. After Messrs. John Fraser & Co., who were bringing them in for us, had sold their steamers, the Chicora Ex. & Im. Co. brought over one shipment, and generously remitted the freight, after it had been paid. Messrs. J. F. & Co. also declined to render bill of charges for the last shipment brought on their steamers. Subsequently, W. C. Bee, Esq., kindly acquiesced in a request to afford assistance to the Board in bringing its shipments from Nassau, and he further proffered to import them free of charge.

In December, 5 cases came to hand on one of the steamers of the Bce Co. Since then, none have been received; and now a recent act of Congress respecting importations increases our difficulties, unless some arrangement can be made with the Government to secure tonnage. Measures have been taken to this effect; but the arrangement has not yet been perfected. If it can be done, and we can within any reasonable time bring forward these 44 cases, (provided they have not fallen into the enemy's hands,) the Board will have a large number of volumes ordered expressly to meet the demands of the soldier.

PUBLISHING THE SCRIPTURES.

As soon as the Board found there was an interruption in the importation of the Scriptures, and that it could no longer rely upon receiving regular shipments, it resolved again to see what could be done toward publishing another edition of the New Testament and Psalms, from its own stereotype plates. In August, it weighed maturely the question as to the propriety of procuring a press and other material, and of undertaking for itself the work of publishing; but after full consideration, it reached the conclusion, in view of all difficulties that presented themselves, that this plan was not likely to prove successful. It was, therefore, dismissed, and the Board resolved to engage for this work, if possible, some publishing house already having all the material and workmen necessary for the purpose.

Accordingly, early in September, the Board advertised extensively for proposals to publish an edition of 100,000 copies of the New Testament and Psalms. Two months passed and no bid was

made. Then the very responsible publishing house of Evans & Cogswell of Columbia, S. C., was solicited to undertake the contract, which with some reluctance on account of its numerous engagements, it consented to do, and with its accustomed energy immediately set about making preparations for the proposed edition to be ready for delivery in instalments of 25,000 copies each. But numberless difficulties have intervened, and up to this time this house has been unable to fill its engagements; though there is reason for believing that the first 25,000 are nearly ready for delivery.

DISTRIBUTION.

Almost all the volumes the Board has distributed have gone to the soldiers. It has been a subject of deep regret, that the constant and urgent demand of our brave defenders for the word of life could not be supplied. Perhaps no martial host ever gathered upon the earth has been so deeply or generally influenced by religious truth as has the Army of the Confederacy, during the last eighteen months. The preaching of the Gospel has wonderfully arrested the attention of the soldiers, and has asserted control over their habits to such a degree as to add many confirmatory proofs of the presence of the supernatural in the religion of Christ. As a legitimate result, men of all classes and of every variety of character are asking for the Scriptures, that they may study for themselves the facts and doctrines and read for themselves the precepts and promises of Christianity. It has been a constant effort on the part of the Board to meet the growing want; how inadequately it has been done, may be inferred from the statement already made of the difficulties it has had to encounter.

The Board, however, has done something toward this result—however little it may appear, when compared with what hope may have anticipated, or religious zeal might have usefully employed. This little we place here upon record as a memorial of our scant progress during the past year.

These Scriptures have been distributed as widely as possible. A very considerable number were sent across the Mississippi river, and we trust they reached their destination. During the year, the Rev. Mr. Buchanan, came from beyond the river to apply to the Board for its sanction to a scheme for making collections in that section, investing the funds in cotton to be shipped from Matamoras, Mex., and the proceeds of its sale returned in the Scriptures. To this plan the Board could give only its best wishes for success, which it did without assuming any pecuniary responsibility. Shortly, however, after Mr. B. returned home, the occupancy of Brownsville, Texas, by the Federals, suspended all operations in that direction.

AGENTS.

The Rev. E. A. Bolles is continued as the see Agent of the Society. His well known zeal in the cause and his great success in making collections are worthy of the highest commendation, and entitle him to the gratitude of all the friends of Bible distribution. The Rev. Dr. J. N. Waddell was an agent, when the Society last met, but very soon afterward he was appointed to a special duty by his Church, and he resigned the agency, except in so far as he might find opportunity to serve the Society in his new field of labor. This he kindly proffered to do, without compensation.

TREASURER'S REPORT.

The Report of G. M. Thew, Esq., Treasurer, properly audited by the Finance Committee is appended. From this document we learn that the income of the year has been—

Out of this sum the Society is to pay for the edition of Testaments and Psalms now publishing—and when opportunity offers, for the books purchased of the B. & F. B. Society.

CHANGES IN THE CONSTITUTION.

At the last meeting of the Seciety, it was referred to the Board to inquire whether any changes in the Constitution may be necessary to give increased efficiency to the operations of the Society, and to report thereon at this meeting. After careful consideration of this subject the Board reached the conclusion, that at the present time it does not seem desirable or necessary to propose any alterations in the Constitution.

BOARD OF MANAGERS.

One vacancy in the Board occurred during the year, by the resignation of Rev. A. T. Mann, D. D., on account of frequent necessary absence from the city. The Rev. W. H. Potter was elected to fill this vacancy. By the provisions of the Constitution the term of service of the following members of the Board now expires: Rev. J. R. Wilson, D. D., Rev. W. J. Hard, Rev. W. H. Clarke, G. M. Thew, D. R. Wright. Dr. L. D. Ford, Dr. J. Milligan, D. B. Plumb, W. L. Mitchell, E. L. Kerrison, W. C. Means and J. E. Broome.

In conclusion the Board must express the regret which every member feels, that so little has been done in so great a work, and offers a fervent prayer to Almighty God that He will at no distant day vouchsafe to our suffering and expectant countrymen that peace which shall open the way for the successful prosecution of this and every other enterprise of Christianity, designed to bring the world to Christ for an inheritance and the uttermost parts of the earth for his possession.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

On Motion of Rev. Dr. Moore,

Resolved, That the Report just read be adopted; and that the thanks of the Society be returned to the Board of Managers for accomplishing so much as they have done, under the trying circumstances, by which they have been surrounded.

On motion of Rev. Mr. Hard, a Committee consisting of Dr. Moore, Rev. Jesse Wood, of Ala., and F. Stringer, Esq., of La., wa appointed to nominate candidates to fill the vacancies now occurring in the Board of Managers. The Committee retired, and on their returning and reporting, the Society proceeded to an election for officers, as follows: Hon. James M. Chambers, of Columbus, Ga., President; Managers, Rev. J. R. Wilson, D. D., Rev. W. J. Hard, Rev. W. H. Clarke, G. M. Thew, Esq., D. R. Wright, Esq., Dr. L. D. Ford, Dr. Jos. Milligan, Hon. C. J. Jenkins, D. B. Plumb, Esq., of Ga.; Rev. C. P. Gadsden, S. C.; E. Nye Hutchinson, N. C.; and Rev. Donald Fraser, Fla.

Hon, J. M. Chambers was then invited to the chair. On taking it, he briefly and appropriately addressed the Society, on the importance of the work in which it is engaged, expressing his unfeigned thanks for the honor conferred by the appointment.

Rev. Dr. Moore moved to strike out the 2nd paragraph of Sec. IV of the Constitution, viz: "The Vice-Presidents shall be the presiding officers of, or be appointed by, the State Societies, Associations, or Conventions. In a failure to appoint, from whatever cause, the Board of Managers shall make the appointment."

He further moved to insert in Sec. VI "and Vice-Presidents," after the word "Presidents," so that the section may read: "The officers of the Society shall be elected by ballot; the President and Vice-Presidents, annually," etc. The motions were seconded, and laid on the table till the next annual meeting, as the Constitution requires.

The Rev. J. Wood offered the following, which was adopted:

Whereas, we have heard and would heed the calls made from the Army for Bibles and Testaments with which to supply those soldiers, whose homes are within the lines of the enemy, and others who are destitute, but finding great difficulty in meeting this demand by either publishing or importing the Scriptures, therefore,

Resolved, That the Board of Managers be instructed to issue a Circular Address to ministers of all denominations requesting them to collect from their congregations such Bibles and Testaments as may be spared, and to send them to the Bible Depository for dis-

tribution in the Army.

The Rev. Dr. Moore, as a Delegate from the Virginia Bible Society, made an interesting and gratifying report of the work done by the Society in the distribution of the Seriptures obtained by the British and Foreign Bible Society through the agency of the Rev. Dr. Hoge, during his visit to England. The Virginia Bible Society has given out 9,000 Bibles, 10,000 Testaments, and 50,000 parts of Scriptures, (gospels) to the soldiers east of the Mississippi. In addition to what has been distributed, they have sold 20,000 copies of the Scriptures. These form only a portion of the books purchased by Dr. Hoge. The remainder are on the way, and some of them will be on hand very shortly. \$8,000 copies of the different books have been received from the British and Foreign Bible Society, and of that number \$7,000 have been distributed, showing that the Society has not been idle during the past year.

Dr. Wilson moved the following resolution, which was passed:

Resolved, That the Board of Managers be instructed to print as large a number of the minutes of this Society, as in their judgment may be deemed necessary.

On motion of Rev. Mr. Hard, it was

Resolved, That the thanks of this Society are due and are hereby returned to the Rev. Dr. Moore for the able and instructive sermon, delivered by him on last evening.

The Board of Managers were instructed to meet immediately after the adjournment of the Society.

The Society then adjourned with a benediction, to meet again on the 3d Wednesday in April, 1865, at 8 o'clock, P, M, in the Presbyterian Church, Augusta, Ga.

CONSTITUTION.

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. SECTION I—NAME.

This Society shall be known by the name of the Bible Society of the Confederate States of America.

SECTION II—OBJECTS.

The objects of this Society shall be classified under two departments, viz: the publishing and the distributing departments, the financial workings of which shall be kept distinct and forever separate.

The framing of the laws which are to govern the Society in its distributions, is left for a more auspicious season.

The objects of the Society, as to the former department, shall be to encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment, by the printing, publishing, or procuring of the same. The only copies in the English language to be circulated by the Society, shall be in accordance with the text now published by the British and Foreign Bible Society.

Further, the Society shall not be debarred from undertaking or aiding in new translations of the Scriptures into Foreign languages.

The only copies to be circulated in other tongues, shall be such versions as shall receive the unanimous approval of the Committee on Versions, said Committee to consist of one from each of the denominations sustaining the Society; Previded, that, until said Committee on Versions shall adopt the needed versions in Foreign tongues, the Society shall circulate those versions issued by the British and Foreign Bible Society.

SECTION III-MEMBERSHIP.

Members of this Society shall be as follows: Annual Members
—being persons who shall annually contribute a sum not less than

five dollars. Life Members—being persons who shall have given the sum of thirty dollars in one payment. Life Directors—being persons who shall have given the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars. Honorary Directors—being ministers of the Gospel whose congregations shall make an annual contribution in aid of the funds of the Society. Patrons—being persons who shall have given the sum of one thousand dollars.

SECTION IV-OFFICERS.

The officers of the Society shall consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, and a Board of Managers, composed of twenty-four members of the Society, seven of whom shall constitute a quorum.

The Vice-Presidents shall be the presiding officers of, or be appointed by, the State Societies, Associations, or Conventions. In a failure to appoint, from whatever cause, the Board of Managers shall make the appointment.

The President and Vice-Presidents, Life and Honorary Directors, and Patrons, shall be entitled to attend all meetings of the Board of Managers, and have a deliberative voice therein.

SECTION V-MANAGERS.

To the Board of Managers shall be committed all the business affairs of the Society, subject to the instructions of the Society, as expressed in its By-Laws.

They shall elect one of their number to be Chairman. They shall also elect such subordinate officers as may be deemed necessary. They shall have power to fill vacancies, occurring in their body.

They shall hold monthly meetings, and shall report annually to the Society the operations, condition and prospects thereof.

SECTION VI—ELECTIONS.

The officers of the Society shall be elected by ballot; the President annually; the Managers to serve for two years; Provided, however, one-half of the Board first elected, to be determined by lot, shall serve for one year.

SECTION VII—ANNUAL MEETING.

There shall be an annual meeting of the Society, when the election of officers shall take place; the report of the Board of Managers be presented, and the affairs of the Society transacted. The time and place of the meeting shall be decided upon by the Society at its previous meeting.

SECTION VIII—CO-OPERATIVE SOCIETIES.

All Bible Societies in the Confederacy which shall express their wish to unite with this Society, and which shall agree to make an annual appropriation in aid of its funds, shall be received as Co-operative Societies, and be entitled to the privileges thereof.

Bible Societies, Associations or Conventions, organized for a whole State, and which shall hold a Bible House or Depository of the Scriptures for the use of the Bible Societies in their State, shall be classed as State Associations. All other Societies shall be classed as Branch Associations.

SECTION IX-BY-LAWS.

The Society shall be empowered, at the annual meeting, to make By-Laws for its government, not inconsistent with its Constitution.

SECTION X-AMENDMENTS.

No amendment shall be made to this Constitution, unless the same shall receive the votes of three-fourths of the members present at an annual meeting; and such amendment must have been submitted and seconded at the previous annual meeting.
