

Hon. Josiah Quincy,

Mayor of the City of Boston:

SIR, — In compliance with the requirements of Section 24 of Chapter 3 of the Revised Ordinances, the Board of Election Commissioners respectfully submits its annual report for the year 1898.

We are pleased to state that the work of the department during the past year was carried on not only within the appropriation allowed by the City Council, but that a substantial balance remained to the credit of this department. This result was due principally to two causes. One of these was because there was less than the usual activity prior to both the State and City elections, and in consequence the number of registered voters was smaller by about four thousand than in the previous year, which was the basis of our estimate of probable expenditure during 1898. This year the voting-list for the city election contained the names of 98,457 male voters. Another cause which contributed to the reduced expenditure was the effect of the act of the last Legislature which provided that there should be no supplementary assessment after October 1.

There was very little supplementary registration in consequence, after this date, which made it unnecessary to add to the office force, as has heretofore been required in order to properly attend to registration and the other work of the office, at this, the busiest season of the year. In other ways, too, we have reduced expenses, and our efforts have been directed towards an economical administration of the department in every respect.

The laws governing the conduct of caucuses and elections are now in a much more satisfactory condition since the passage of Chapter 548 of the Acts of 1898, commonly known as the "Election Act of 1898." This codification has been of

great assistance in carrying on the work of the office, condensing and simplifying laws which previously in many respects were confusing and unsatisfactory.

CAUCUSES AND ELECTIONS.

During the year, in addition to the seven caucuses and two elections usually held, there have been two special caucuses and elections to fill vacancies in the Legislature, one in the eleventh Suffolk Representative District caused by the resignation of the incumbent to accept a high Federal office, and the other caused by the death of the senator from the Second Suffolk Senatorial District.

The caucuses were uniformly conducted in an orderly manner and the returns were generally made with promptness and accuracy. Yet there is room for improvement in this respect in some portions of the city where the delay in forwarding the returns is very great and the inaccuracies in such returns are beyond understanding. We recognize the fact that at the fall caucuses in some of the wards more votes are cast than at the subsequent elections, the great number of votes being caused by the large field of candidates striving for the nomination to the Legislature or the Common Council, or by the efforts of interested parties to secure delegates favorable to certain candidates for other elective offices. As the returns from these largely attended caucuses are not received until hours after the polls are closed, it cannot be claimed that lack of time is an excuse for the failure of the officers to make an accurate return of the result. To the credit of the caucus officers at most of these large cancuses it must be said that their returns are on the whole accurately made.

In the conduct of elections, too, there has been much to commend in the work of the election officers. We are fortunate in having at our service a large number of citizens who have had experience as election officers and who respond willingly to the demand made upon them for further service. The work of such officers is highly satisfactory, and were it not for the fact that a large minority of them is composed of

men totally inexperienced in such work there would in our opinion be little to criticise in the work of the election officers.

In one instance during the past year the returns of the election officers were of such a character as to call for inquiry and investigation by this Board. In this case the returns were so grossly inaccurate that all the election officers from the precinct were summoned before the Board and separately examined with a view to ascertaining and fixing the responsibility for the flagrant errors in the returns. The result of the examination by us was far from satisfactory, and was such as to leave in our minds some doubt as to whether one or two of such election officers acted honestly in the discharge of their duty, and we believed it to be our duty under the circumstances to report the matter to the District Attorney for such action by him as might be called for.

After a thorough examination by him of all the facts he concluded that the errors and inaccuracies were due to carelessness and neglect rather than to any criminal intent, and no proceedings therefore were instituted against them. We failed utterly to understand after careful oral and written instructions had been given these officers, two of whom had served in a similar capacity before, how they could have made such gross errors.

We desire to reiterate our opinion, emphatically expressed in the report of last year that the appointment of deputy election officers, as now required by law, is unnecessary and the saving of the amount paid to them for practically no service would be a substantial one. If the number of polling-places in the city should be increased, as is called for by many citizens, and which seems to us to be desirable in the interest of a more prompt canvass and return of votes we believe that the polling-places would be properly manned by a warden, clerk and two inspectors in each precinct, instead of four inspectors as at present.

This further reduction in the force of election officers in each precinct would save a large sum of money, and this change would be especially beneficial if the number of polling-places is increased.

We have noticed the past year a very great improvement in the preparation of nomination papers for candidates to be placed upon the official ballot, and we believe that the political committees and candidates now fully understand the importance of exercising great care in the preparation of such nomination papers and that they are solicitous to fulfil the requirements of law in this respect.

RECOUNTS.

Again we must call attention to the great abuse of the right to petition for recounts. No other State in the country gives such latitude in the right to petition in this regard. The past year has been simply a repetition of the experience of this Board in previous years. A very large number of petitions for recounts have been presented and acted upon where the difference in the return of votes did not justify such petitions, even under the most liberal view of the law. While the law, without the desired limitations, accords citizens the right to petition for recount of votes, such petitions will be numerous and must be acted upon. Could not some discretion be vested in this board? We understand that a proposition to bring about a change is now before the legislature, and we hope it will be favorably received. The abuse of the right to petition exists specially as regards caucuses, and is not generally felt at election recounts. The latter as a rule are justifiable.

During the past two years we have discovered a growing tendency in some localities, where politics are very active, no matter what condition exists elsewhere, to make use of pasters or ballots at caucuses, and when this was done within the statute, as we construed it, and in the absence of objections, the names so pasted were counted at all recounts held by us. This evil assumed greater proportions during the past year in these localities, and at the recounts following the fall caucuses objections were raised to counting blanket pasters which contained the names of all persons on the official ballot, and only those names, and which were so prepared that they could be marked by interested parties outside the polling-place, taken into the voting compartment by the voter, and pasted on or over the official ballot, given to him by the caucus officer. These blanket pasters in size of type and other respects were very similar to the official ballots.

After a careful consideration of the objections we decided them to be well taken, and refused to count such blanket pasters. We were of the opinion that they were not within the law, and most palpably were an evasion of the spirit and intent of the Australian system of voting. At the time we prepared a full statement of our findings and our grounds therefor, which was printed in the daily papers. We are gratified to state that since our action, as above set forth, there has been no attempt to use blanket pasters at any caucus in the city.

The general recount after the last city election was conducted by this department under much more favorable circumstances than ever before. A large hall was secured in the immediate vicinity of our offices where sufficient floor space was available for twelve tables, at each of which two clerks were detailed to count the votes. We were enabled thereby to finish the work in four days instead of six as heretofore, and there was room not only for each of the numerous candidates affected by the petitions to be present and watch the count, but enabled us to allow each of the political committees of the two leading parties to have a representative present at each table. The recount proceeded without friction and we think to the entire satisfaction of the parties interested. We were so favorably impressed with the success of the change that we shall not in the future attempt to carry on as heretofore a general recount of the votes of the city in the small and ill-ventilated room which forms one of our offices for the general business of the department.

ELECTION BOOTHS AND POLLING-PLACES.

As was stated in our last annual report would be necessary, we were called upon this year to provide a large number of voting-booths to take the place of the seventy-five or more school-houses which previously the School Committee had allowed to be used as polling-places at elections. We have been obliged to vacate the school buildings for reasons which then seemed to us good and sufficient. After an investigation which lasted for a year we concluded to purchase one hundred booths to be made of thin corrugated steel, and bids were publicly advertised, a loan of \$30,000 for such booths and the furniture required therefor having been authorized by the City Council. Among the many competitors the Van Dorn Iron Works Company of Cleveland, Ohio, were the successful bidders and the contract was awarded to The booths were of a pattern, and, built of material similar to the booths used in other cities of the country at the fall elections, and we were informed that these booths had been used in a western city at an election in February, and

that they proved to be suitable for use in cold weather. The new steel booths were constructed in Cleveland in parts, were put together in Boston under the careful supervision and inspection of the City Engineer's Department, and were used for the first time at the State election early in November. So far as we know no valid objection was then raised against them. At the city election in December the weather was unusually severe, and with zero temperature the booths proved entirely unsuitable for voting purposes. Although the stove and fuel provided, we believed, would be sufficient to properly heat these booths, it proved insufficient, and the discomfort of the election officers on duty during the day, and in some cases well into the night, was very great. With a view to making these booths suitable for future use in cold weather, which may be reasonably expected at the city election, we have recently caused four of them to be lined with wooden sheathing and by practical use at a special election held on February 7, 1899, it was demonstrated that with such a lining the booths will be available for use in the future. This improvement is attended with so great an expense that it will be impossible to continue it with all the booths within the appropriation this year allowed the department by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The sum of \$7,000 additional will be required for the purpose.

In the early spring of 1898, during the excitement caused by the prospect of a war with Spain, we were called upon by the Mayor at the request of the State authorities to have the old booths ready to be used as temporary barracks for our troops when the call came for their enlistment into the service of the country. The summons came soon after, and the fifty-six knock-down wooden buildings, all in first-class condition, constituting our whole equipment, were turned over to the State. Most of them were sent to Fort Warren for the use of the First Regiment, while the remainder were loaned to the Naval Brigade. On the cessation of hostilities most of these booths were returned to us with a portion of the furniture and appointments loaned, but, as might naturally be expected, their condition was not the same as when they left our hands. The expense of moving and repairing these buildings, which was large, was by agreement to be borne by the State. A statement of the full amount due the city has been submitted to the State authorities, a part only of which has been allowed and paid. Another demand came later for the use of these wooden buildings at the City Hospital, to care for the sick and convalescent soldiers returning from active duty. We were also called upon to loan thirteen of these wooden booths to the Bath Department. have not been returned to us, and no compensation has been paid for their use. These thirteen booths, with the twelve now remaining on the hospital grounds, will be greatly needed another year for election purposes. Without them we shall be seriously embarrassed. In the situation in which we found ourselves in the early autumn of 1898, having an insufficient number of booths, including the new steel buildings, for polling-places, we were obliged to have twenty new wooden buildings constructed. These new wooden booths are of a smaller size than the old ones, but are amply sufficient. Their first cost is much less, and as they can be moved without being taken to pieces, as is necessary with the old booths.

there will be a substantial saving in this regard.

If funds are provided to make the steel booths comfortable in cold weather, as above suggested, we shall not be obliged to provide additional accommodations for polling-places. Otherwise it will be necessary to have more of these wooden booths constructed at an expense of \$175 apiece, unless we secure from the School Committee again the right to use a sufficient number of school buildings. As stated above, we believed in 1897 that the objections of the School Committee to the use of their buildings for election purposes were reasonable; but the conditions are now changed, and in the present financial condition of the city, we believe, rather than incur the large expense of building new booths or hiring stores or houses which we have found cannot be done at reasonable prices, that the School Committee should allow the use on election days of some of their buildings for polling-places. It should be said, too, in this connection that many citizens have complained the past year because they were not allowed to vote in school-houses as heretofore, which they claim are much more comfortable and suitable than the voting-booths.

JURORS.

The present system of preparing the jury-list by this Board seems on the whole to meet with the approval of the public, and secures men of the character and intelligence desired for The selection of names is made by us during the months of January and February in each year as provided by law, and the jury-list for the year 1899 will be submitted to the Board of Aldermen prior to March 1 for its approval.

The names are selected by us from the general register of voters, which is each year prepared from the returns of the

assessors submitted to us between May 1 and July 1. As a rule, we do not consult the supplementary registration in selecting names for jurors, as it is so largely made up from the floating population of the city, which class is not desirable to draw upon for jurors. There has been some surprise manifested that names drawn by the Board of Aldermen from the jury-list prepared by us prove in some cases to be those of non-residents. When these persons appear in court in response to the summons this fact is disclosed, and they are for this reason excused as they are exempt from such service in this city. All such cases when brought to our attention are investigated, and in no instance has it been found to be an error chargeable to us. These persons were residents of the city on May 1, according to the returns of the assessors, and having been on the voting-list the previous year their names were continued on the list. They acquired a residence elsewhere by moving out of the city between May 1 and the time when they were drawn as jurors, which may have been more than a year later, as the jury-list prepared by us in January and February is the list for the twelve months following. The only remedy for this which occurs to us, and that is only a partial one, is to amend the law so that this Board shall be required to select the names at an earlier date, say in July or August. In this event six months would be gained in the preparation of the list. In the autumn months the other work of the department is so great that it would be a difficult matter to properly prepare the jury-list at that time.

The exemptions from jury service allowed by law include so large a body of citizens that we believe such exemptions should be reduced. We see no good and sufficient reason why members of the volunteer militia and of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company should be relieved from serving as jurors, and we believe that an advantage would be gained if the limit of age were increased from sixty-five to seventy years. We therefore recommend such changes in the law. As the term of service of jurors is now so short, we believe it would be wise and expedient to further change the law, so that a person shall be liable to be drawn and serve as a juror once in two years, instead of three years as at present.

As the Ballot Law Commission of the City of Boston, we were called upon during the past year to hear and determine but a single case, which was not of special interest to the public. Objection was made to a nomination paper to fill a vacancy caused by the withdrawal of a caucus nominee in Ward 6, on the ground that no vote was passed by the

caucus authorizing the filling of such vacancy. The evidence was adjudged to be insufficient to sustain such objection.

During the past year two complaints only for illegal registration were filed in this department. Summons were issued in both cases, and hearings took places under the new method of procedure in such cases, established by the Legislature of In one case the evidence was found to be sufficient to sustain the complaint, and a transfer of the person complained of was made from one precinct to another of the same In the other case the evidence was deemed to be insufficient, and the complaint was dismissed. We believe the change in the method of procedure in these cases, above referred to, was called for, after our experience in 1897, as was fully stated in our report for that year, and in which we suggested this change in the law among other changes, and gave the reasons therefor. It seemed to us only right and proper that at least forty-eight hours, instead of twenty-four hours, should be the minimum limit of time intervening between the issue of the summons and the date of hearing, in order that the person complained of should have time to answer the complaint; and the requirement that the complainant should be obliged to make out a prima facie case at least, in case of the non-appearance of the person complained of in response to the summons, we believed to be called for, in order that the procedure and the rules of evidence should conform more nearly to those of judicial proceedings. One important matter though was overlooked by the Legislature in considering changes in the law in these cases. The complainant should be entitled to process to summon witnesses to sustain the complaint, and an adequate penalty should be attached to the failure to respond to such summons.

We have herein referred to the Election Act of 1898 as being of great assistance to us in carrying on the work of

this department.

Though errors and omissions in this codification of the laws regulating caucuses and elections have come to our attention, they are of little importance and we did not feel called upon so soon to recommend to the present Legislature any changes in the law: We think though we should allude to one defect in the law which we encountered the past year.

A recount of votes cast at a caucus resulted in a tie for the third place in the nomination for the Common Council. There was not sufficient time to call a new caucus, and the time for filing nomination papers had expired. Two names only therefore could be placed upon the official ballot, instead of three to which the political party was entitled. A pro-

vision of law allowing the executive committee of the political party to fill a vacancy existing under such circumstances would be all that is required.

EXPENSES.

At the beginning of the year the Board submitted as an estimate of the probable expenditures of the department the sum of \$145,000, but the City Council appropriated therefor the sum of \$137,000. A further sum of \$30,000 was provided by special loan for the purchase of 100 steel voting-booths, and the furniture and fixtures required therefor.

There has actually been expended by this department during the year 1898, chargeable, to the regular appropriation the sum of \$130,190.67; and on account of the Special Loan for new voting-booths the sum of \$29,595.73. There remained therefore to the credit of this department on the first account the sum of \$6,809.33, and on the second account the sum of \$404.27.




