

SELECTMEN'S REPORT.

In conformity with former usage, the Selectmen respectfully offer to the Town their Report of its financial condition for the year 1853-'54, terminating on the last day of January, 1854—being the Sixteenth of the Series of Reports of Receipts and Expenditures of the Town.

The amount of money received from various sources, as will appear in the Report of the Auditors, is \$41,877.06.

The amount expended in the Alms House, is \$3,708 44; which is a much larger sum than the appropriation asked for. Anticipating the removal of the "State Paupers" from this Institution to the "State Alms House" during the past year, we asked for a less sum than for the former year. Such removal has not yet been effected; and we have deemed it best to supply many, who have been in needy circumstances, with provisions and fuel directly from the Alms House. In addition to this, the expense of paying and boarding the hired men and the keeping of the teams has been another important item in our expenses, all of which is accounted for under the head of "Alms House Expenditure."

The number of inmates on the first of February, 1853, was 33. During the year, 42 have been admitted, 38 have been discharged, and 3 have died; leaving 34, on the first day of February, 1854, many of whom are foreigners or of foreign parentage. Many others have been admitted for a short time, and some have been confined as criminals, in the cells, awaiting trial, all of whom were supplied with food from this establishment.

This Institution is still under the same Superintendent and Matron as in former years. Their labors have been much increased by additional inmates, and by attending to the many cases of sickness that have occurred during the past year. The Superintendent has been employed much of the time on the Highways; and in all their various duties, both he and the Matron have been faithful to their trust.

The applications for relief by persons out of the Alms House during the year have been numerous, particularly during the present winter, and many of them have been cases of extreme necessity. The most of these we have supplied directly from the Alms House, as referred to under that head.

The number of persons in the Lunatic Hospital at Worcester, remains the same as last year.

In our Report of last year, in consequence of the bad condition of the roads at the time, and the increased labor required in moving gravel, we recommended an appropriation of \$4,000 for Highways. The whole subject was referred to a Committee, and at the April meeting a Report was adopted, placing

the roads under our exclusive care, with an appropriation of \$3,000, at which period nearly \$600 had been expended by our predecessors, leaving us less than \$2,500, with which to purchase teams, &c., to commence the labor. We have expended much more, and we refer you to the roads themselves as the best return we can give you for the amount thus expended. In carrying out the plan proposed, we have availed. ourselves of the services of the Superintendent of the Alms House, the hired men, and such of the inmates as were able to labor; also of the Town teams, other than those purchased for the purpose, by which means much labor has been performed. The subjoined Table will show the amount of labor by men and teams, also the number of loads of gravel and stone that have been put on to the several streets.

Since the last April meeting, the Town has accepted "Cedar Street," and a part of "Sanford Street." It therefore became necessary to grade and repair them, that they might be safe and convenient for public travel. This has been done, and charged to the Incidental Appropriation. "Linden Street" has also been accepted, and preparations are being made to put it in good passable condition.

At the last April meeting, the subject of enlarging our present Burial Grounds, or the purchasing of a site for a new one, was referred to the Selectmen. Having conferred with the abuttors of the present lots, we do not deem it advisable to purchase additional ground to enlarge them, nor have we been able, as

yet, to present the Town with a bond for the site of a new Cemetery.

The subject of enclosing the whole or a part of the common lands on "Meeting-House Hill" was referred to this board at the last April meeting. After procuring a plan and an estimate of the probable cost of the same, we found it would be necessary to ask of the Town a special appropriation to enable us to carry it into effect.

But little progress has been made during the past year in establishing boundary lines of our streets. Asubject so important will require much labor and time, and we would suggest the expediency of the Town's appointing Commissioners for that purpose.

The Police and Night Watch have become an important item in our annual expenses. Many of our citizens are desirous that different parts of the Town should be patrolled by night; and we have accordingly employed several persons for that purpose. Others are asked for, and we would therefore present the subject for the consideration of the Town.

While it has been our earnest endeavor to keep the annual expenses within the resources provided, that we might thereby meet the reasonable expectations of the Town; we have been compelled in some instances,

by circumstances over which we had no control, to exceed the appropriation, as some of our expenditures will show; while others have been much less than the appropriation. We believe, however, that the money has been *judiciously* expended, and trust that it will meet with the approval of our citizens.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER.

To the Selectmen of Dorchester.

Gentlemen, — This Fifth Annual Report of the condition of the Fire Department is respectfully submitted.

Four companies have been in commission since May 1, 1853, viz. —

FOUNTAIN Co. No. 1.—George S. Esty, Foreman; Henry Crane, Ass't Foreman; Gustavus E. Haynes, Clerk; Edwin A. Smith, Steward.

TORRENT Co. No. 3.—Moses H. Warren, Foreman; Seth D. Durell, Ass't Foreman; George Bridgham, Clerk; David Ripley, Steward.

INDEPENDENCE Co. No. 5.—Joseph C. Robinson, Foreman; Andrew Collins, Ass't Foreman; Dexter C. Curtis, Clerk;

Henry Hart, Steward.

TIGER Co. No. 6. — Foreman; Andrew Sumner, Ass't Foreman; Charles A. Upham, Clerk; Ralph

Ware, Steward.

During the past year the Department has been called out eighteen times, by as many alarms of fire, eight of which were caused by fires out of this town, and at two of which the Engines of this department were used. There have been but two fires in this town, at which the Engines have been used. At those fires, Engines from Roxbury and Quincy were present.

The estimated loss of property in Dorchester by fire the past year, has been \$36,135; on which there was insurance

(as nearly as ascertained) of \$18,600.

During the past year, Engine House No. 1 has been shingled, plastered and painted; and repairs have been made in the interior of Engine Houses Nos. 3 and 6. Houses Nos. 1, 3, 5 and 6 are now in good repair. Houses Nos. 2 and 4 will need some repairs the coming year. The Chief Engineer, by personal observation, finds that the Engine Houses, Engines, Hose and other apparatus, in care of the several companies, are kept in praiseworthy good order and condition. Two hundred feet of new leading hose has been purchased to supply deficiencies occasioned by unavoidable wear.

The amount of expenditures under the direction of the Board of Engineers for repairs of Engine Houses, Engines,

Hose, &c. &c., has been \$882 81.

It is believed that it would be promotive of the welfare of the Department if the town would excuse those persons members of the Department, who might desire it, from serving as jurors, as an inducement for persons to join the companies.
