REPORT

OF THE

COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

CHIEF ENGINEER'S REPORT.

To His Honor the Mayor, and the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord:

The undersigned, Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, would report as follows:

There have been during the past year eleven fires and alarms: May, 1856.—Fire at Fisherville; burning of a barn.

June 2d.—Fire in the rear of B. F. Dow's buildings, West Concord.

June 6.—Alarm; caused by the burning of straw in the house of Charles Pettingill.

July 20.—Fire on Spring and Fulton streets; totally destroying a double house belonging to Robert Chase, and damaging two other cottage houses, one belonging to Mr. Chase and the other to Mr. Rowe.

Oct. 4.—Alarm; occasioned by the burning of a bed in the house occupied by Mr. Dadmun, on Walnut street.

Aug. 29.—Fire at the buildings of Jeremiah Abbot; barn struck by lightning and totally destroyed, together with about twenty tons of hay, &c.

Sept. 24.—Fire at Fisherville.

Dec. 28.—Fire at the Phenix Hotel; the building was totally destroyed, but a portion of the furniture was saved. The building and furniture were partially insured.

Jan. 22, 1857.—Fire occasioned by the partial burning of the stationary engine house at the Concord Railroad.

Jan. 23.—Alarm occasioned by the bursting of a boiler at the steam mill of Messrs. Kimball and Clough, at which Loren A. Webster was instantly killed, and Mr. Keniston seriously injured.

Feb. 1.—Fire at Philip Sargent's shop on State street; partially destroyed.

The location of the Fire Apparatus belonging to the city is as follows:

CONCORD, No. 2—Located at the north end of State street, near the Prison, and has five hundred and fifty feet of hose, all in good condition.

MECHANICS, No. 3—Located at the south end of Main street, near Messrs. Abbots' Coach Manufactory, has five hundred feet of hose in good order.

MERRIMACK, No. 4—Located on Warren street, has six hundred feet of hose in good order.

CATARACT, No. 6—Located at West Concord, has four hundred feet of good hose, and one hundred feet of old hose.

OLD FORT, No. 7—Located at East Concord, has three hundred feet of hose, a quantity altogether too small for an engine of that capacity.

PIONEER, No. 8—Located at Fisherville, has five hundred feet of hose, all in good condition.

Hook & Ladder Co., No. 1, is located on Warren street, in the same building with Engine Co. No. 4.

Besides the above, the city own two old engines, one at the north end of Main street, and the other at the south end of Main street, now occupied by young gentlemen from 15 to 18 years of age.

The various engine companies in the city have, for a long time, been anxious to have some runners for their engines; and recently, by the vote of the Board of Engineers, I was instructed to procure them, and have accordingly done so. During the recent deep snows, great inconvenience and loss of time was experienced for the want of them.

There has been constructed during the past year, under the superintendence of the Chief Engineer and the Mayor of the city, a reservoir on Rumford street, near the residence of Judge Minot, at an expense of about twe hundred dollars. Two other reservoirs were ordered to be built by the City Council, one at West Concord near the City Farm, which has been commenced but not completed, and the other near Fayette street in Ward 6, which, owing to the extreme wet weather, was not commenced last Fall. They will both be finished as soon as the ground shall be sufficiently dry.

The reservoirs in the city heretofore constructed, are as follows:

One at the south end of Main street, near Abbot's carriage manufactory;

One near the South Church, at the intersection of Main and Pleasant streets;

Three in front of the State House;

One at the intersection of Main and Centre streets;

One opposite the Merrimack County Bank, Main street;

One in front of J. H. George's house, Main street;

One on State street, near Sewell Hoit's house;

One on South street, near Daniel H. Fletcher's house;

One on Pine street;

One on School street, opposite S. G. Sylvester's house, near the Unitarian Church;

One on Main street, front of J. R. Hill's shop;

One on State street, near Mr. Parker's house;

One on State street;

One on the corner of State and West street;

One on Pleasant street, opposite the house of G. H. H. Silsby;

One on Main street near F. N. Fisk's house.

There are also several others not strictly public; three on Warren street, one in rear of Call's Block, one at the intersection of State and Washington streets, one in Railroad Square, and various others of small capacity.

At Fisherville, about 1000 feet from the canal, are two reservoirs.

Notwithstanding the amount of money expended by the city in the construction of reservoirs, still, probably, no city in New England is so poorly supplied with water, in case of fire, as the main village of Concord. The appropriations for reservoirs have not kept pace with the increase of building. An appropriation each year for one or more reservoirs is absolutely required for the public safety; for no matter how energetic and efficient the Fire Department may be, without water they are compartively useless.
