MUNICIPAL REGULATIONS.

CITY CLERK'S OFFICE, CITY OF CONCORD, FEB. 1, 1873.

To persons having claims against the City:

All persons furnishing materials or service for the city, or aid to city paupers, should be particular to take the name of the person ordering such service, material, or aid, and should *know* that the person is duly authorized to contract said liability.

The city will not be holden for merchandise sold or delivered on city pauper account, except on the written order of the Overseer of the Poor, and for no longer time than until his successor shall have

been appointed and qualified.

Duplicate copies will be required of all bills payable by the city fur-

nished on county pauper account.

All bills against the city must be approved by the person authorizing the charge; and unless this is done, no action can be had upon the bill by the Committee on Accounts, and no order will be given for its payment.

When bills are certified to as above, and left with the City Clerk before twelve o'clock of the day of meeting of the Committee on Accounts, they will be audited by them, and, if approved, be ready for

payment on the Wednesday following.

Meetings of the committee are held on the Thursday next preceding the last Saturday of each month, at two o'clock P. M., which will occur the present year, Feb. 20th, March 27th, April 24th, May 29th, June 26th, July 24th, Aug. 28th, Sept. 25th, Oct. 23d, Nov. 27th, Dec. 25th; 1873, Jan. 29th, Feb. 26th.

The number of applicants for aid the past year was 217; number of persons aided, 212; number of deaths, including two at the Alms-house, 15,—males 7, females 8.

The number of persons aided exceeded by fifty those of the year preceding. There has been among the poor the past year, including those in Ward 1 under the care of Assistant City Physician Dr. C. C. Topliff, an unusual amount of sickness requiring medical attendance. The want of suitable hospital accommodations for the sick and unfortunate, constantly increasing among us,—who have no home or friends of ability to care for them when sick, or disabled by accident, for a time, to provide for themselves,—is felt and acknowledged. I would suggest that our Alms-house is not so far removed from the city proper, or so crowded with inmates, as to prevent, it seems to me, the practicability of fitting up one or more rooms in connection therewith, for the better accommodation of such, thereby lessening the expense to the city, and increasing the comfort of the sick.

Of the sanitary condition of the Alms-house, the expense of the maintenance of the poor therein, together with the details and general management of the city farm, you have been made acquainted by personal inspection, and from the report of the Committee on the Poor Farm, already submitted.

The report of the City Physician, Dr. G. P. Conn, whose services, when requested, have been promptly rendered to those under the supervision of the city, will give all further necessary information relative thereto.

REPORT OF CITY PHYSICIAN.

To the Honorable City Council and Overseer of the Poor of the City of Concord:

Gentlemen: I have the honor to report to you that the past year has been one of usual health among those who, from misfortune, claim our sympathy and attention to keep

them from suffering and want.

There has been no unusual amount of sickness in this section of the State, and no one disease has been prevalent enough to be characterized as an epidemic,—which has been very fortunate for the poor, as an epidemic generally is met with in the abodes of the poor and needy sooner than in the habitations of those who are more fortunate in having that which renders them comfortable in house and home.

At the City Farm there has been but very little sickness, and but two deaths. There were a few cases of scarlet fever there at the end of last year, and at my first visit I found all convalescent except one, who was suffering from the secondary effects of the disease, and who died in a few days from effusion of water on the brain. The other death was from consumption, the patient coming there a few weeks prior to her decease.

Among the poor outside the Farm, I have been called into twenty-two different families, but the most of them required attention but a short time. There have been three deaths among this class,—one of dropsy, one of consump-

tion, and one of typhoid fever.

There have been one murder, one suicide, and two cases of persons found dead, which claimed the attention of the

city authorities.

We have had small pox and varioloid in five different places during the last four mouths, and have been fortunate enough to keep it confined to its original localities each time. There have been ten cases in all, with only one death; and I think we have reason to congratulate ourselves that we have had less of this loathsome disease than any

other place in the State with the same number of inhabi-

tants, and less than many with half our population.

I would make but a single suggestion. The population of our city, and its prospective increase, seem to demand that suitable provision should be made to meet the requirements for public safety, when small pox, or any other infectious disease, appears in our midst; and a pest-house or small pox hospital should be erected and maintained by the city, in a proper location, where such cases as in the judgment of the health officers require removal can be taken at once, to be properly cared for and made comfortable. It would save much expense, and those who might be so unfortunate as to need to be isolated for the public good could be provided for in a proper manner without any delay.

REPORT

OF THE

TRUSTEES OF THE PUBLIC LIBRARY.

By the Report of our excellent and faithful Librarian, appended to this, we find that our Public Library is in as good condition as in any former year. In one respect, at least, it presents a better aspect than ever before. The number of persons who have used the Library, as reported, is 223 more this year than was reported last year. This certainly is a fact most encouraging, for, decidedly, the usefulness of the Library is increased in proportion to the number who avail themselves of its benefits.

A Public Library, to effect its best results, should reach the largest possible number of the reading community, and can never attain its legitimate object until this is attained. To do this, two things are absolutely necessary. First, that the number of the books should be increased in proportion to the reading population. And, second, that the books should be *readable*, that is, such as the people will read, as well as good books.

It is only a waste of money to fill a library with other books. They will never be taken from its shelves, or, if taken, will not be read. A public library for a Christian community should, of course, have religious books, whether denominational or otherwise. It must have books of science, history, biography, and travel, written in a popular, pleasing manner. It must also have books of fiction, only, however, of the better class. Amusement as well as instruction is to be the object of a public library; for, unless amusement of a healthy character be offered, it will be impossible for any people to be kept from degradation and vice.

As last year the "Board of Trustees of the Public Library" pleaded for an enlargement of the Library by bequests and donations of individuals, so now would they plead for an increase of appropriations from the city authorities, believing that every dollar so appropriated will be tenfold increased by the increase of virtue, morality, and religion, and by the decrease of cost in sustaining the Poor-house, the Reformatory, and the Jail.

The committee have expended no more money than seemed to be absolutely required for this purpose, and unless a small appropriation is made annually, the walks must be neglected.

REPORT

OF THE

CITY SOLICITOR.

To the City Council of the City of Concord:

The City Solicitor reports that during the last municipal year a large amount of business has been transacted by him, as must be apparent to any one having any knowledge of the multifarious legal questions continually arising in the management of the affairs of a city so large as ours, and especially when engaged in so many improvements.

Questions in regard to taxation, sewerage, highways, and claims for damages thereon, paupers, small pox, and upon a great variety of subjects have received consideration, and have been made the subjects of more or less examination. The business before the Police Court has been very

large, two hundred and ten persons having been arraigned for offences of almost every grade between murder and intoxication. The greater portion of the complaints and warrants have been made by myself, and the investigation and trial of some of them have occupied considerable time and attention. In performing this part of my duty I have had the intelligent aid of the City Marshal and his assistants, which has been of great value.

The cases now remaining upon the dockets of the court are the suit of John B. Palmer v. Concord, in Strafford county, which could not be tried, because the judges who have held the terms of court in that county have been residents of Concord, and were therefore disqualified; the suit of Chase Philbrick and Jeremiah F. Donovan v. Concord. in Hillsborough county, brought to recover the sum of \$300, the amount of a reward offered by the city for the arrest and conviction of Carroll Sanborn; and the suit of Cooledge v. Concord, in Merrimack County, brought as I understand, to recover an increased amount of damages for land, &c., taken by the Water Commissioners, near Long Pond—a suit which will probably be managed by the commissioners, as they have employed counsel, and no information of its pendency has been given me from any source. In this connection I will also state that the reference between the Holdens and the city was a matter of the Water Commissioners, and one in which I had no part.

The suit of Pickering v. Concord, mentioned in my last report, has been satisfactorily adjusted between the parties. Mr. Pickering received \$125.75 in full settlement of his claim and costs.
