MUNICIPAL REGULATIONS.

FOR PAYMENT OF BILLS AGAINST THE CITY.

All persons furnishing materials or service for the city, or aid to the city poor, should be particular to take the name of the person ordering such service, material, or aid, and should *know* that the person is duly authorized to contract such liability.

The city will not be holden for merchandise sold or delivered on city poor account, except on the written order of the overseer of the poor, and for no longer time than until his successor shall have been appointed and qualified.

Duplicate copies will be required of all bills payable by the city, furnished on county poor account.

All bills against the city must be approved by the person authorizing the charge; and unless this is done, no action can be had upon the bill by the Committee on Accounts and Claims, and no order will be given for its payment.

Bills so certified should be left with the city clerk on or before the second day of the month.

If approved by the Committee on Accounts and Claims, they will be ready for payment on Thursday following the regular monthly meeting of the city government.

The regular monthly meetings of the city government occur on the second Monday of each month.

ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS.

Passed During the Year Ending January 10, 1901.

CITY OF CONCORD-ORDINANCES.

AN ORDERANCE IN AMENDMENT OF SECTION 4. TRAPPER 36 OF THE REVISED ORDERANCES IN RELATION TO TRAMS.

Be a primared by the Emeri of Aliermen of the City of Concord in Juliana.

Section 1. Amend Section 4. Chapter 36, of the Revised Ordinances, by surking out all of said section after the word "team" in the second line and inserting in the place thereof the following. Eight dollars per day of nine hours or such proportionate part of eight dollars as the time worked bears to nine hours for each two-horse team with driver " so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

"Szor. 4. Heads of departments employing teams for the use of the city are authorized to pay for said teams eight dollars per day of nine hours or such proportionate part of eight follars as the time worked teams to nine hours for each two-house team with thirty."

Szor. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances mountaint with this ordinance are beceby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed March 26, 1930.

AN CREATURE RELATING TO THE ERECTION OF SCHOOL AND ADVERTISE-

Be it ordained by the Eward of Aldermen of the City of Omcord, so follows:

Szornov 1. No person shall place, establish or maintain any sign or advertisement over any part of any street, lane, alley, or solevalle, without first having obtained a permit therefor from the Board of Public Works.

SECT. 2. Stock sign or advertisement shall be safely and securely fixed and supported and shall be at least eight feet above the solewalk.

Secr. 3. Persons applying for a permit to erect a sign or advertisement shall state its size and weight, the nature of the material of which it is to be constructed and the manner in which it is to be supported.

Sacr. 4. Any person or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be hable to a fine not exceeding eventy follows.

SECT. 5. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed April 12, 1920.

AN ORDINANCE IN AMENDMENT OF SECTION 28, CHAPTER 18, OF THE REVISED ORDINANCES, RELATIVE TO PAY OF ENGINE COMPANIES OUTSIDE OF THE PRECINCTS.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. The pay for engine companies outside of the precincts shall be as follows: Engine companies Nos. 2 and 3, five hundred and ten dollars each, and Pioneer Steamer Company No. 3, sixteen hundred and fifty dollars each, per annum, said sum to be divided among the members as each company shall direct.

Sect. 2. This ordinance shall take effect as of January 1, 1920. Passed April 12, 1920.

AN ORDINANCE RELATIVE TO THE SALARY OF THE SANITARY OFFICER.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

SECTION 1. Amend Section 8 of Chapter 41 of the Revised Ordinances as amended so that the same shall read as follows:

"Sect. 8. The sanitary officer of the Board of Health shall receive in full for his services the sum of \$2,000 per annum."

Sect. 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed April 12, 1920.

AN ORDINANCE EXTENDING THE GARBAGE PRECINCT.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. The garbage precinct is hereby extended to include McKinley Street from the west side of South Main Street to and including the premises of Mrs. Kate Webber.

SECT. 2. This ordinance shall be construed to include the abutters of said McKinley Street alone and not to include any land between the present south boundary of the garbage precinct and the north line of the abutters on the north side of said McKinley Street.

Sect. 3. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage. Passed April 12, 1920.

AN ORDINANCE PERTAINING TO THE SALARY OF THE CITY MESSENGER.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

SECTION 1. The city messenger shall receive the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) per annum in full for his services as city messenger.

SECT. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed April 12, 1920.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE APPOINTMENT OF A SPECIAL TRAFFIC OFFICER.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

SECTION 1. Amend Section 13 of Chapter 41 of the Revised Ordinances as amended so that said section shall read as follows:

Sect. 13. The sergeant of police shall receive in full for his services the sum of eighteen hundred and twenty-five dollars per annum.

Each regular policeman during the first year of service shall receive the sum of sixteen hundred and eighty dollars and for services thereafter the sum of eighteen hundred dollars per annum, which shall be in full for all services rendered by him as watchman and day police. The special police shall be paid four dollars for each day's service, except that the city marshal is hereby empowered to appoint a special traffic officer during the period from May 1 to October 31 in each year, and the salary of said special traffic officer shall be at the rate of eighteen hundred dollars per annum, and said special traffic officer shall be entitled to be off duty without loss of pay one day in each fifteen days. The chauffeurs shall be paid eighteen hundred dollars per annum, which shall be in full for all services rendered by them to the City of Concord.

Sect. 2. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage. Passed August 9, 1920.

RESOLUTIONS.

RESOLUTION IN RELATION TO A TEMPORARY LOAN NOT EXCEEDING ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$150,000).

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the Committee on Finance is hereby authorized to borrow on the credit of the city a sum not to exceed one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000) for expenses in anticipation of taxes for the municipal year 1920, upon such terms and for such amounts as the committee shall determine, said loan to be payable from the taxes of the said municipal year.

Passed January 27, 1920.

RESOLUTION IN RELATION TO PAYING SALARIES, PAYROLLS AND RENTS.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the mayor be, and hereby is, authorized to draw his warrant on the city treasurer for the payment of all salaries, payrolls and rents, as the same shall become due during the present municipal term, and all bills so paid shall be laid before the committee on accounts and claims at their next meeting.

Passed January 27, 1920.

RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE PRINTING OF THE ROSTER OF THE CITY GOVERNMENT.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the city clerk be instructed to prepare a roster of the present city government and cause copies thereof to be printed, and that the expense of printing the same shall be charged to the account of printing and stationery.

Passed January 27, 1920.

RESOLUTION ASKING FOR SEALED PROPOSALS FOR PRINTING AND BINDING THE ANNUAL CITY REPORTS.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the city clerk be, and hereby is, instructed to ask for sealed proposals for printing and binding the city reports for the year 1919 and

submit the same to the finance committee, who shall have full power to act in the matter.

Passed February 9, 1920.

RESOLUTION RELATIVE TO THE EXEMPTION FROM TAXATION OF CERTAIN PROPERTIES OF ST. PAUL'S SCHOOL IN CONCORD, UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF CHAPTER 115, LAWS OF 1913, BEING AN ACT TO EXEMPT PROPERTY OF EDUCATIONAL, CHARITABLE AND RELIGIOUS INSTITUTIONS AND OF TEMPERANCE SOCIETIES FROM TAXATION.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. That the taxable items in the funds held by St. Paul's School for educational, charitable, and religious purposes to an amount in value not exceeding \$3,000,000—and the following items of real estate, to wit—the School, the Old Boiler House, Cricket House, Tool House, Middle School, Old Infirmary, Chapel, Squash Racquet Court, Annex, School House, Old Chapel, Gymnasium, Skate House, Lower School, Manual Training Building, Heating Plant, Library Building, Laboratory, Stone Dormitory, Upper School, Cemetery, New Infirmary, and Lower School Study Building, and the land upon which they are located, as shown on a plan of lands and buildings of St. Paul's School, on file in the office of Board of Assessors of said Concord, of the value of \$500,000, be and the same hereby are exempted from taxation under the provisions of Chapter 115, Laws of 1913, making the amount of the exemption, as valued herein, over and above the \$150,000 exemption provided in said act, the sum of \$3,350,000.

Sect. 2. The resolution relative to the exemption from taxation of certain properties of St. Paul's School in Concord, passed March 13, 1916, is hereby repealed, and this resolution shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed January 27, 1920.

RESOLUTION APPROPRIATING TWENTY-EIGHT AND 55-100 DOLLARS (\$28.55) TO PAY FOR NON-RESIDENT REAL ESTATE SOLD TO THE CITY OF CONCORD FOR UNPAID TAXES FOR THE YEAR 1919.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the sum of twenty-eight and 55–100 dollars (\$28.55) be, and the same hereby is, appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pay the amount due the City of Concord for non-resident real estate purchased at the tax collector's sale of non-resident real estate for the unpaid taxes for the year 1919.

Passed March 8, 1920.

RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR A DISCOUNT ON TAXES PAID PRIOR TO JULY 15, 1920.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That a discount of two per cent shall be allowed on all taxes assessed for the year 1920, which are paid on or before the fifteenth day of July, 1920.

Passed March 26, 1920.

RESOLUTION IN RELATION TO INDEXING THE RECORDS IN THE CITY CLERK'S OFFICE.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the city clerk is hereby authorized to purchase at a sum not exceeding twenty-five dollars, a set of index cards and the necessary subdivision cards to index the city records, and that he be allowed the necessary clerk hire for such indexing, the same to be charged to the appropriation for incidentals and land damages.

Passed March 26, 1920.

RESOLUTION RELATIVE TO EXEMPTION FROM TAXATION OF CERTAIN PROPERTIES OF ROLFE AND RUMFORD ASYLUM UNDER A PROVISION OF CHAPTER 115, LAWS OF 1913, BEING AN ACT TO EXEMPT PROPERTY OF EDUCATIONAL, CHARITABLE AND RELIGIOUS INSTITUTIONS AND OF TEMPERANCE SOCIETIES FROM TAXATION.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

SECTION 1. That the real and personal property of Rolfe and Rumford Asylum be, and the same hereby is, exempted from taxation under the provisions of Chapter 115, Laws of 1913, to the amount of \$150,000, in addition to the \$150,000 exemption provided in said act.

Sect. 2. This resolution shall take affect upon its passage. Passed March 26, 1920.

RESOLUTION TO EXEMPT FROM TAXATION FOR A PERIOD OF TEN YEARS, CERTAIN NEW BUILDINGS AND MACHINERY OF THE RUMFORD PRINTING COMPANY.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. That the Rumford Printing Company or its Successors, is hereby exempted from taxation for a period of ten years from the date of the passage of this resolution, upon new buildings to be erected on land owned by said Company bounded by North Main, Washington and Pearl Streets, and from taxation on new machinery to be installed

therein, and also upon new buildings to be erected for storage purposes on land of said Company, fronting the railroad, south of the Ford Foundry property; provided, however, that during said ten years, said Rumford Printing Company or its successors shall pay taxes, to be levied on the present assessment valuation, upon buildings which may be razed to provide for the erection of said new buildings.

Sect. 2. This resolution shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed March 26, 1920.

RESOLUTION APPROPRIATING MONEY TO PAY TAXES ASSESSED IN 1919 ON NON-RESIDENT PROPERTY SOLD TO THE CITY IN 1917.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. That the sum of one and 98-100 dollars (\$1.98) be, and the same hereby is, appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pay taxes assessed in 1919 on non-resident property sold to the city in 1917.

Sect. 2. That the city treasurer is hereby authorized to pay to the collector of taxes said amount of one and 98-100 dollars (\$1.98).

Sect. 3. This resolution shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed April 12, 1920.

RESOLUTION APPROPRIATING MONEY TO PAY FOR HOWARD DAMPER INSTALLED AT THE CENTRAL FIRE STATION.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the sum of seventy-five dollars (\$75) be, and hereby is, appropriated to pay for the Howard Damper installed at the Central Fire Station in 1919, said sum to be charged to the account of incidentals and land damages.

Passed April 12, 1920.

RESOLUTION APPROPRIATING MONEY TO PAY TAXES ASSESSED IN 1919 ON NON-RESIDENT PROPERTY SOLD TO THE CITY IN 1918.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

SECTION 1. That the sum of one and 80-100 dollars (\$1.80) be, and the same hereby is, appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pay taxes assessed in 1919 on non-resident property sold to the city in 1918.

Sect. 2. That the city treasurer is hereby authorized to pay to the collector of taxes said amount of one and 80-100 dollars (\$1.80).

Sect. 3. This resolution shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed April 12, 1920.

RESOLUTION FIXING AND DETERMINING THE AMOUNT OF MONEY TO BE RAISED FOR THE ENSUING FINANCIAL YEAR FOR THE USE OF THE CITY.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. There shall be raised, and there is hereby ordered to be raised, on the polls and ratable estates within said city, the sum of one hundred sixty thousand dollars (\$160,000) to defray the necessary expenses and charges of the city for the ensuing financial year, which, together with the sums which may be raised by taxes on railroads and from other sources, shall be appropriated as follows:

Sect. 2. There shall be raised, and there is hereby ordered to be raised, a tax of three and 50–100 dollars (\$3.50) on each thousand dollars of the value of the ratable estate taxable within said city for the support of the public schools, which, together with the income of the Abial Walker fund shall be appropriated and divided among the school districts according to the valuation thereof.

There shall also be raised a sum equal to two dollars (\$2) for each child residing in the city who was enrolled in the public schools in the last preceding school year.

- Sect. 3. In addition to the foregoing there is appropriated for the cemeteries of the city one-half of the income from the sale of lots and the income derived for the care of lots and grading, which sum shall be deposited by the superintendent, or others receiving them, in the city treasury. The care of lots for which the city holds trust funds shall be paid from the money appropriated for the care of cemeteries, and so much of the income of these trust funds as may be thus expended shall be deposited in the city treasury at the close of the year, and the remainder in each instance credited to the individual fund.
- Sect. 4. In addition to the foregoing there is appropriated for the use of the public library in the purchase of books the amount collected for fines.
 - Sect. 5. This resolution shall take effect upon its passage. Passed April 12, 1920.
- RESOLUTION FIXING AND DETERMINING THE AMOUNT OF MONEY TO BE RAISED ON THE TAXABLE PROPERTY AND INHABITANTS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE SEWERAGE PRECINCT FOR THE ENSUING FINANCIAL YEAR.



REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

At the last annual meeting of Union School District it was voted to accept the State Law for medical inspection for school children in the district and, to carry out the provision of the law, the School Board engaged the services of Dr. Clarence M. Kelley as school physician. We mention this department particularly at this time, because we feel its importance and, consequently, are anxious that the parents appreciate the service rendered by Dr. Kelley and the school nurse in caring for the health of the pupils who are attending the public schools.

The School Board takes this opportunity of expressing, on behalf of the citizens of the district, the appreciation of the services of the several doctors who have given their time without any charge for the clinics conducted at the Walker School, for the treatment of teeth and examination of the eyes.

The Board also wishes to express its appreciation of the services and co-operation of the superintendent, assistant superintendent, heads of departments and teachers in helping maintain the schools of the district with very satisfactory results.

As far as the Board can judge, Concord stands high in school work. During the last few weeks the members of the School Board have been much interested in reading through the public press the various suggestions and criticisms of the manner of teaching certain subjects in the schools, and note some parents evidently feel that their children are seemingly hurried through the schools. It has also been suggested by some that the pupil would get far more out of the schools if the course of study was so arranged as to give another year.

While the School Board does not mean to go into any discussion of these matters at this time, they do feel, in justice to the superintendent, Mr. Rundlett, and in justice to the present system (which has been in operation for the past eleven years and with apparently good results) that the whole matter should have a very careful analysis. Certainly the superintendent and the Board welcomes such an examination. We feel justified in saying this—that well-known educators look upon the Concord school system with much approval as a progressive system.

The School Board and the Finance Committee are very glad to co-operate with the recommendations of the City Government and Chamber of Commerce that the appropriations asked for by the School Board should not be

increased over last year.

EDUCATIONAL.

The educational world is much disturbed by the instability which attaches to about all other activities. Such a state of affairs hinders the progress which all seek and must be realized to keep the world from retrograding.

The state educational system has not escaped criticism nor has the local system. This state plan, inaugurated during one of the most trying periods in the history of the country, has not had a reasonably fair trial. In the main, no other measure has begun such a far-reaching beneficial state-movement as this law.

The present period, one of readjustment in about everything, is as prominent in education as in other public institutions. It is marked by unusual energy in educational associations which are working toward the uplift of the entire people and manifest in the following things: Lengthening the school year to twelve months; measuring the intelligence of the children; conserving the health of the school children; better school accommodations; reasonable wages for teachers; the Americanization of the foreign population; closer supervision of the schools; and many other things of vital importance to the general welfare.

In this city we have been doing and propose to do our part in this great work and no place is so small nor so remotely located as not to be a factor.

SUPERVISION.

School supervision is now conducted on broader lines than ever before. In specific form this breadth is shown in:

Intense work in English.

Specific tests for mentally deficient pupils.

Medical inspection of all pupils.

General intelligence tests of pupils.

Inquiry into the retardation of pupils.

Pupil guidance in choosing work among the pupils of the Junior and the Senior High Schools.

The specific tests and medical inspection are dependently

related, the aim being to acquaint the parents and the teachers with the physical and the mental defects of pupils which, in connection with home environments, may account measurably for their deficiency in school work and suggest remedies that mean economy for both the home and the school. All this has required the combined efforts of the superintendents, teachers, medical inspectors and parents. Much praise is due Superintendent Clayton, Dr. Kelley, and Miss Elliott for their effective work along these lines. In due course of time we hope to have a complete tabulation of all the pupils on file at this office so that in particular cases remedies may be applied quickly and intelligently.

English is being looked after carefully in all grades. I have noticed a growing interest in this work both by teachers and pupils, followed by an attempt to counteract the handicap of non-English speaking in the home and the insufferable slang of the street.

New spelling-lists have been provided for classes I and J. The mid-winter tests in this subject showed far in advance of those given in the years immediately preceding.

The advanced arithmetic recently adopted for classes L, M, N, deals specifically with the common affairs of life and business usages that all children should know and be able to use.

The requirements of the State Department are faithfully carried out. The number of grade meetings for discussing the work has been larger than in previous years and the number of meetings for professional uplift have been conducted successfully in all grades.

PUPIL ATTENDANCE.

For an extended period previous to this, pupil-attendance has not presented much of a problem in our schools. Since the ending of the World War, however, the enrollment has been gaining steadily until in some sections and particularly in the intermediate grades it demands immediate attention. At the present time classes I, J, in the city proper

are badly crowded. You may see how badly from the following statement:

Penacook School—I, J classes, 49 pupils Franklin School—I, J classes, 47 pupils Kimball School—I, J classes, 47 pupils Rumford School—I, J classes, 44 pupils Walker School—I, J classes, 41 pupils

No school can do first-class work that has an enrollment of over thirty-five pupils. The congestion may be relieved at the North End by starting another school in the Walker or the Franklin building. South of Pleasant Street there is no room available. The only relief in sight, without additional construction, is the fitting up of the Ward House on West Street, or by resuming the transportation route to the Harriet P. Dame School where there is an empty room. The incoming classes next fall promise to be as large as usual. Gain in enrollment for 1918–1919. 81 pupils Gain in enrollment for 1919–1920. 70 pupils

Transportation.

The number of different routes have been reduced from fifteen to thirteen through consolidation but the cost has risen steadily so that it now reaches a total of \$9200 for the year. This is a large sum but I see no way of reducing it under the existing State Law. More pupils will graduate from the rural schools next summer who are to enter the Junior High School in the fall. The law requires their conveyance.

THE JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOLS.

The accomplishments of these schools have been positive and gratifying. Changes have been made in the amount and character of the matter to be covered suited to the age of the child and to his capacities. This is particularly true of the studies arithmetic and language. Both are being

tried out and eventually will be adjusted reasonably according to the combined judgment of the superintendents and the teachers. The subject of Latin is begun in class N. The time formerly assigned this subject in class M has been given over to English grammar. The Chandler, Walker, Garrison, and Eastman Schools have accomplished distinct results in their various capacities. Last year I called to your notice the need of housing the first and the second years under one roof and under one corps of teachers. I urge this all-important matter for your early consideration.

THE PARKER SCHOOL.

In this school we find that more ambition for good scholarship has been aroused by giving an insignia of attainment to each pupil having a satisfactory average in his school work. The giving of intelligence tests has brought out facts that assist the teachers in placing pupils and in giving proper directions. The graduating class of last January gave the school a beautiful vase for the piano. An attempt has been made to make the morning assemblies typify the spirit of the school and it has succeeded admirably. The socialized recitation has received much attention so that school work may be made more adaptable to life. It has been done in English by taking problems from every-day matters so as to interest the pupils in current events. This is also true of the work in science. In the study of geography, excursions have been made to neighboring manufactories and in mathematics, actual measurements of the height of inaccessible objects have served to enliven the subject.

Talks have been given by Mr. Porter of the New England Telephone and Telegraph Co., by Mr. Foster of the State Forestry Department, and by Mr. Piquet of the Chamber of Commerce. Parents' Night was observed December 10, 1920. The usual contests of the National Playground and Recreational Association occurred in May. Seventeen girls and fifty-one boys passed the tests. In Latin, pupils have been so interested that they have taken Latin stories home to read for their own amusement.

THE SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL.

The items of interest in this school which have been prominent during the last year are as follows:

Exercises on all holidays.

Gifts to the school of a silk flag by the New Hampshire Department of the Woman's Relief Corps in memory of the late Mrs. Fanny E. Minot.

Winning the foot-ball championship.

Banquet to the winners.

Books and victrola records by the graduation classes.

The number of graduates this year was smaller than usual. Military drill has been discontinued because of a lack of volunteers.

The new idea of arranging the studies so that the individual needs of the pupil will be the better served has been in practice since the beginning of the school year. Another change has been made requiring at least two years for pursuing any study in order to have the units count for a diploma. These changes are along the line of true education and should serve to the pupils' great advantage. There is need of a new cabinet for filing records and an accounting machine for the commerce classes.

In high schools, particularly the athletic prowess of a limited few seems to overshadow about everything else, scholarship, discipline, school morale, and a scholarly atmosphere. The law requires that the school money shall be spent for the education of the child, not the few, but the many. Athletic supremacy is highly desirable and healthful athletic activity for the entire student body necessary. Why should not a body of citizens get together and subscribe a fund to furnish sweaters for educational attainment. A simple insignia in one school has raised the standard of scholarship wonderfully.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS.

Elementary school work has been the subject of much thought. More complete adjustment of the work has been

made in all the studies with the advice of the teaching corps, and the apportionment of time more clearly defined. The charge that the children are being unduly hurried has been declared in all grade meetings to be not true and I can sustain this by recorded facts. In any course of school work adjustments must be made constantly to work with as little friction as possible. New books and rearrangement of requirements demand long periods to find out what is the best apportionment of the work and it is at this point that outside criticism always comes and the point at which the teaching corps becomes disturbed. The work of these schools is open to the inspection of all citizens.

The new book in English is popular and effectively workable. This is shown by unmistakable advance in the use of the mother tongue. When final adjustments are made it will prove its worth.

The schools need a new geography. The ones in use are old and not up-to-date. New spellers have been provided for classes I and J. The mid-winter examinations showed advancement in this branch.

THE KINDERGARTENS.

The kindergartens have been successful and well-attended. Since the death of Miss Southgate the detailed work of her department has been handled successfully by Miss Iyla Chamberlin, who was transferred from the Garrison kindergarten to the Dewey kindergarten. The part which these schools play in our general scheme is invaluable.

RURAL SCHOOLS.

The work of the rural schools has been marked by steady advances in many ways. Useless repetition is avoided and pupils who enter the Junior High School maintain a creditable standing. Through free transportation the enrollment is larger than it would be otherwise. At regular intervals the special teachers visit these schools thus keeping up the advantages given the pupils in the schools of the city proper.

A carpenter's bench has been installed in the Mountain School for the use of the boys but there is need of systematic instruction to realize the best results.

THE DEWEY TRAINING SCHOOL.

Fifteen young women are now in this school training for the profession of teaching. Four graduate next June. The work of the graduates who have gone to other fields of action outside of Concord reflects the strong training received in this excellent school. Our local schools are helped very much by the services of the girls from the training classes and this accounts for the unbroken sessions of our elementary grades. Continuous work could never have been realized if we had been obliged to rely on outside substitutes. The superintendent has given regular instruction in reading to both classes.

DRAWING.

Discontinuing the Domestic Arts Course made the employment of two drawing teachers unnecessary. Miss Faith C. Stalker, who had taught here for many years, resigned at the end of the spring term. The course has been carried on successfully by Miss Mary A. Jones whose work shows strength and is received favorably by parents, teachers, and superintendents. Miss Jones's time is so fully occupied that visits to the different schools are too infre-

quent. The time allotted for high school work is too limited to realize the most desirable results. Several changes have been made in the general outline including the introduction of color design, construction, lettering, paper-cutting, and book-binding. These are both instructive and interesting.

. SEWING.

Sewing, below the Senior High School, is now confined to classes I, J, K, L, M, N. This arrangement makes the work logically continuous and more coherent. The elective courses also have been rearranged. The classes in the Chandler School are so large that we have had to resort to the use of the science room for class work two afternoons each week. The various exhibitions of this work have been unusually excellent and subject to great praise from all who have had a chance to look them over. We gratefully acknowledge the courtesy of Harry G. Emmons for the use of his show-window for the February exhibit.

Cooking.

A change was made this year by putting cooking, below-high school grades, entirely in classes O and P. The girls are now required to give a double period for cooking following a prescribed course and a single period for theory and recitation each week. A readjustment of the prices for school lunches has been of great convenience to the pupils in making a selection of their menus. Under the present plan the girls gain a more thorough knowledge of food and food values than under the old plan.

- School Lunches.

These lunches have been conducted under a schemedifferent from that of previous years. The cost of lunchtickets has been raised to meet the advancing prices of foodstuffs. Large quantities of preserved fruits have been prepared by the pupils thus obviating the necessity of purchasing at current market prices. The study of food hasbeen emphasized this year in the high school elective classes in cooking. Stress has been laid on lunches for rural schools in the training class of the Dewey School.

Music.

Good tones, ability in sight-singing, and cheerful enthusiasm have marked the efforts of the elementary schools. In one-half year, one hundred twenty-five tests in individual sight-singing with a maximum of 86.6 per cent. Excellent work in three and four part singing can be heard in classes M, N, O, P. The director does not speak as favorably of the high school work because the time allowed is not sufficient for good results. The Girls' Glee Club is worthy of high praise and the class in musical appreciation is making satisfactory progress.

MANUAL TRAINING.

Changes in the Corps of Instructors.

At the end of the spring term, Mr. Carl E. Taylor and Mr. Harry R. Sturm resigned and their places were filled by Mr. Arthur G. Paige and Mr. Arthur W. Andrews respectively. Both are doing good work. The entering classes in February were so large that another instructor was needed. Mr. Forrest Hall was added to the staff. His work is effective.

Morale.

The morale of the teaching corps and the pupil body is worthy of the highest praise. Each teacher has done professional work during the summer vacation and co-operation is realized effectively.

The Aim.

Emphasis has been placed upon concentrated thought and the formation of correct habits among the boys. Their work in constructive thinking and their good demeanor has raised the standard of the school.

Expense.

The expense of the school is heavy but the work done for the district has reduced it to an appreciable extent. This is realized in repairs done at the various buildings and in the printing department.

Work for the District.

Three new pieces of equipment have been added to this department this year: a second-hand 12 inches by 18 inches Golding Press; a second-hand paper cutter and a new Crescent Universal Wood-Worker. These will pay for themselves eventually in various ways.

Occupations.

This subject is essentially community civics dealing particularly with the human element. Its purpose is to aid pupils in the choice of life work. The general work comprised in Shop Mathematics, Mechanics, Applied Physics, Electricity, Wood-working, Pattern-making, Machine Shop Work, Mechanical Drawing, Forging, etc., have been handled in a most admirable way by a corps of teachers of whom Concord should be proud. All the work has been under the immediate direction of Mr. Roland G. Hartwell, the most competent principal the school has ever had.

MEDICAL INSPECTION.

This particular work under the supervision and direction of Dr. Clarence M. Kelley is systematic and effective. The work of examining over three thousand children is long and laborious. It is the work of one man for the greater part of a year. I am quite certain that the pupils of our schools never before have been so carefully guarded from all kinds of contagious diseases; cases of malnutrition have been looked up and successfully handled and the mentally unfortunate have been taken care of. The work of the inspector and the school nurse is worthy of the greatest praise.

JANITOR SERVICE.

The cost of janitor service has advanced correspondingly with that of other lines of work. Applications for such positions have multiplied during the last year so that vacancies can be filled without delay. The janitors are capable, faithful, and, aside from their compensation, take a keen interest in the success of the schools and lend aid whenever it is asked.

In the fall, Henry D. Robinson, one of the oldest janitors in point of service, resigned his position because of ill-health. Mr. Robinson deserves the highest commendation for his faithfulness and his unvarying courtesy to all during his term of service which extended over a period of twenty-eight years.

TEACHERS.

The teachers of our schools are earnest, faithful and wellmeaning. In a body of teachers you will find an expression of humanity in all its forms just as in any other body of people. Nearly all the elementary and the Junior High School teachers are normally trained and in these grades we find the most methodical and scientific teaching. Our teachers are not overpaid. They give value for all they get. The high school corps is the most uneven of all because it is more difficult to retain teachers in these grades for long periods than in the others. A large number live in other places and are more inclined to change location than are residents. In these times the number of available teachers. especially the excellent, is exceedingly limited. They are not to be had for ordinary salaries. One case of contractbreaking was reported to the State Department, and the teacher's right to teach in this state has been revoked. Such cases interfere with the even working of a school and injure the esprit de corps.

OBITUARY.

Helen Louise Southgate.

Born May 23, 1874. Died November 2, 1920. First appointed September, 1895, Chandler kindergarten.

Franklin kindergarten, 1896.

Dewey kindergarten and supervisor of kindergartens, 1896 to November 2, 1920.

Miss Southgate's services in Union School District were marked by efficiency and by lasting benefit to the schools. Her sunny, optimistic disposition, self-denial, and faithfulness in all public work will be missed in no small degree.

THEN AND NOW.

The reflex action of a great war has manifested itself in unjust attacks upon the local school system. The two tests that should determine the efficiency of an educational system are:

1. Are the children being properly educated?

2. Are the children being injured in health while being thus educated?

These two things always have occupied the mind of the superintendent out of concern for the children of others and for his own children both of whom have received their preliminary education under this system. As far as his public and private experience goes, backed by most competent authority from other places, he may answer positively—1.—Yes. 2. No.

It may be of interest to you to know that the large majority of the children are promoted regularly and like to go to school. The small minority always have been and always will be dissatisfied with results under any system whatsoever.

It may be of interest to you also to note that the character of entertainments of today bears no comparison, as far as wholesomeness goes, to that of former years. A recent census of the pupils taken reveals the following:

I ask in justice to school work, Is it not possible that the cheap stuff shown on the films may have a bad effect upon the growing child? Is it not possible that the eyesight of the child may become so affected as to hinder him in the daily work rather than help him?

I make this statement without fear of contradiction. Any normal child, in good health, who is controlled by his parents, who goes to bed early, who is not distracted by outside amusements, and who eats nutritious food, is not injured by the requirements of any grade of school work.

The question of expert testimony has been ridiculed recently by those who should and do know better. It is quite noticeable that these people call in an expert physician to attend their children when ill; that they hire an expert veterinary to look after their sick horse, dog or cat; that the "Man of the Street" hires an expert accountant to straighten out his tangled accounts; and that a man of expert religious training is called for comfort and for spiritual guidance in times of distress; but the men who have given the best part of their lives to educational thought, training and practice are declared unfit to direct the education of children. This must be left to other people. The conclusion should be obvious to those free from disordered minds.

If the education of the "Then" was better than that of the "Now," records and criticisms to be found in former school reports fail to justify it. The same conditions, the same criticisms, and similar critics prevailed under the tenyear elementary scheme of school work "Then" that are to be found under modern plans "Now." The schools of this district deserve well from its citizens. They are a credit to all concerned and should be built up by constructive thought rather than torn to pieces by destructive criticism.

I am appreciatively mindful of the great help given me in the past year by the Board of Education, by Assistant Superintendent Clayton, the teachers and all other officers of the district in trying to keep Concord in the educational van.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT

To Mr. Louis J. Rundlett, Superintendent of Schools,

DEAR SIR: I am submitting herewith a report on the work of the assistant superintendent for the season 1920–1921. This report will cover briefly adult educational activities and supervisory work in the high schools and in the grades below the high schools. Night school statistics appear elsewhere.

The adult educational activities have been conducted largely along lines developed last year. The work during the current year has been more carefully organized and more completely fitted to the needs of the pupils enrolled in the several courses. The general plan has involved the forming of unit courses, i.e., short courses dealing with specific aspects of the subject treated and so arranged that a pupil could obtain more nearly what he actually needed in his occupation. The courses in English though designed to group pupils with respect to familiarity or non-familiarity with English were in both instances highly individualized by the personal attention of the teachers to the special needs of the pupils. Pupils entered these classes at any time during the session, for it was impossible for many to enter when the school opened on October 13. The classes in vocational subjects were given in the Morrill School while those in English were conducted in the Senior High School. The centralization of the entire work in these two buildings provided as they are with a common heating system and the same janitors reduced the cost of maintenance below that of last year.

Senior High School:

Beginners' English Mrs. Grace L. Putnam Intermediate English Mrs. Della I. Lewis Mrs. Putnam acted as principal for the two classes.

During the year partial readjustments have been made not only in the junior and senior high school courses, but especially in the arrangement of these courses in the curricula. Certain revisions will be suggested for the coming year. The adjustments are designed to secure the following objectives:

1. Closer adaptation of school-work to the needs of the pupil;

2. Closer observation of the pupil's progress from year to year in order to secure economic planning of time and effort;

3. Stating the aims of courses that methods may be made more effective;

4. Closer co-operation between parent, pupil, and teacher;

5. More serious attitude of pupil in planning his program of courses;

6. Unity and continuity in the entire high school program of the pupil by means of centralized supervision of the same.

Naturally such a readjustment will require several years if the welfare of the pupil is to be guarded. It calls for a high grade of co-operation on the part of both teachers and parents. The cost of maintaining efficient high schools is so great today that any attitude other than serious application to work on the part of pupils reinforced by parental co-operation is an abuse of educational opportunity. The readjustments are designed to inject a purposeful attitude into the high school years.

The readjustments contemplated in the high school involve the supervision of recreational activities. I believe a constructive move has been the introduction of supervised

assembly dances. In these the etiquette, as well as the correct form, of social dancing has been taught by an experienced teacher, Mrs. Arthur E. Dole.

Encouraging results have been obtained in the continued readjustment of the work of English in the grades and in the junior high schools. The subjects of grammar and spelling have been given special consideration in the changes being made.

A limited amount of work in determining the mental age of pupils in the elementary grades has been done. This type of work is designed to find out the needs of the individual pupil, to assist the teacher in methods, and to help the child make a better adjustment to school and to life. The findings in this form of child-study are compared with those of the medical inspector, and with all other data of a reliable character. This sort of study promises invaluable results in conserving the child and in fitting the program to his needs.

During the summer of 1920 school gardens were operated and supervised as usual. It is unfortunate that the garden movement—even among children of the city—is so lacking in unification of direction. There were three agencies at work last summer on the same project—gardens—within Concord, but they were in no way co-ordinated. Our school district has set aside a small amount for this work but that amount should be increased if we are to make this important activity a real educational asset to the city.

At the opening of the fall term a Harvest Festival designed to bring together in some concrete way the significance of the garden work, was given in the State Armory. In this festival the joy of a completed work was expressed in carefully selected and grouped folk-dances in which over five hundred children took part. The High School Chorus enriched the program with appropriate choral music. The exhibit of vegetables and flowers represented the products of about four hundred and fifty gardens. REPORT OF THE MEDICAL INSPECTOR.

Mr. Louis J. Rundlett, Superintendent,

DEAR SIR: I have the honor of submitting a report of the work accomplished in medical inspection during the current school year, dating from October 15, 1920.

In the routine inspection, the general plan followed has been as complete a survey as practicable of the physical condition of the pupils, beginning with those in the lower grades. Up to the time of writing, 1,649 physical examinations have been made and the results recorded in each case. A duplicate record of every case has been kept on file and has already been used in connection with another department. Several additional examinations have been made to determine individual requirements in school work or fitness for employment. Defects which interfered with the mental and physical efficiency of the pupils have been brought to the attention of the parents and, in many instances, relief has been obtained for the pupils by follow-up work consisting of interviews in most cases and by arranging for treatment in others.

Considerable attention has been given to the state of nutrition of the pupils. The high correspondence between such defects as those of posture, decayed teeth, enlarged glands, easy fatigue, etc., and subnormal weight with the respect to height shows that the problem of nutrition is a fundamental one and that the method of attack is essentially sound. In this connection, the Nutrition Clinic has been continued successfully in collaboration with the Concord Charity Organization Society, which has furnished milk to such children of the clinic who have not obtained a sufficient amount at home. The clinic is not a "charity," however, and is attended by children from all types of homes. Instructive talks have been given by several physicians of the

city and the weight of each child has been carefully observed. A system of individual charts has been adopted and merits in attendance and gain are indicated by colored stars, which have increased the already keen interest of the children.

The Modern Health Crusade, a campaign for developing hygienic habits in childhood and now said to have enrolled over four million American school children, has been resumed in certain classes and its extension is desirable in promoting cleanliness and general health.

Conditions in and about school buildings have been inspected and hygienic safeguards of a high order were found already installed. As occasion arose, recommendations have been made which have been effectively carried out. Subjects of special inquiry, such as left-handedness, etc., have also been investigated.

One hundred and eighty-four pupils have benefited by the generous work of the dentists of Concord, at the Dental Clinic, the value of which cannot be over-emphasized.

Appreciative acknowledgement is made to the several physicians who have generously given of their skill and time in the treatment of certain pupils who would otherwise have continued under physical handicaps; to the dentists for their invaluable services at the Dental Clinic, to Dr. William A. Young for the donation of a hypodermic syringe and to Dr. Harlan C. Besse for the donation of cotton pliers and a rubber-dam holder; and also to the Concord Female Charitable Association for the gift of \$10, which has been devoted to the purchase of glasses for children in need.

The efficiency of the department would be considerably increased by (1) the installation of telephones in several of the school buildings and, (2) provision for quick conveyance. The work of the school nurse, in particular, would be greatly increased, as at present considerable valuable time is lost in transportation. Adjustable seats are needed in some of the classrooms. Other requisites for the most wholesome development of both boys and girls are: an athletic field appropriate to the dignity of the city and large enough to

accommodate athletic activities for all pupils, and a gymnasium of adequate size. Through the public spirited co-operation of the Young Men's Christian Association, its gymnasium has been available for certain groups of girls on designated days each week but, obviously, only a small proportion of the pupils can enjoy this benefit.

A summary of the work of the department is enclosed. The achievements have been very largely due to the able guidance and staunch support of the superintendent, to the faithful and competent assistance of the school nurse, and to the unstinted co-operation of the teachers.

In accordance with the foregoing warrant a meeting of the legal voters of Union School District No. 8 was held at the Auditorium on Prince Street, in Concord, N. H., on the evening of the seventh of April, 1920, at 7.30 o'clock.

The meeting was called to order, and the warrant read, by Louis C. Merrill, moderator.

- ARTICLE 1. On motion of Hon. Henry H. Metcalf, duly seconded, the clerk was ordered to cast one ballot for Louis C. Merrill for moderator for the ensuing year. Mr. Merrill was duly elected and sworn.
- ARTICLE 2. On motion of Harry F. Lake, duly seconded, the moderator was ordered to cast one ballot for Earle C. Gordon for clerk for the ensuing year. Mr. Gordon was duly elected and sworn.
- ARTICLE 3. On motion of Dr. Charles Duncan, duly seconded, the clerk was instructed to cast one ballot for John P. George and Henry H. Metcalf for auditors for the ensuing year. Mr. George and Mr. Metcalf were duly elected.
- ARTICLE 4. On motion of Arthur F. Sturtevant, duly seconded, the report of the Board of Education, as printed, was accepted and placed on file.
- ARTICLE 5. On motion of Henry H. Metcalf, duly seconded, it was voted to proceed to the election of three

members of the Board of Education to fill the vacancies arising from expiration of term of office.

It was declared polls would close at 8.15 P. M.

On motion of Henry H. Metcalf, duly seconded, the moderator was instructed to name three tellers. The moderator named: Harry H. Chase, Arthur F. Sturtevant and Charles C. Sanders.

Harry F. Lake moved that the meeting proceed to the consideration of the remaining articles of the warrant.

ARTICLE 6. On motion of Dr. Dennis E. Sullivan the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That there shall be raised and is hereby ordered to be raised by tax on the polls and ratable estates within Union School District No. 8 the sum of sixteen thousand three hundred ninety-five dollars (\$16,395) of which sum ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) shall be appropriated for the payment of the bonds maturing July 1, 1920, and six thousand three hundred ninety-five dollars (\$6,395) for the payment of the interest on its funded debt accruing during the year.

ARTICLE 7. On motion of Dr. Charles Duncan the following resolution was adopted: *Resolved*, That there shall be raised and is hereby ordered to be raised by tax on the polls and ratable estates within Union School District No. 8 and appropriated for the support and the general administration of the public schools for the ensuing year, such a sum as in addition to the amount required by law will amount to the sum of two hundred thirty thousand five hundred and eleven and ten one hundredths dollars (\$230,511.10).

ARTICLE 8. Dennis E. Sullivan, moved that the provisions of Article 83, Laws 1913, relating to medical inspection, be and hereby are adopted by Union School District

No. 8. The question being stated by the moderator, discussion ensued, on a *viva voce* vote the motion prevailed.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS.

CONCORD, N. H., January 15, 1921.

To His Honor the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen:

There is nothing important or unusual to report for the past year. The condition of the water system is first class in every respect and gives general satisfaction.

During the past year, the bonded indebtedness has been reduced \$30,000. The investment funds amount to \$43,107.67, and the cash on hand January 1, 1921, is \$18,445.83. The total bonded indebtedness amounts to \$354,000.

January 1, 1922, there will come due \$302,000 of 4 per cent bonds. Probably about \$250,000 of these bonds will have to be paid by a new issue.

No large expenditure of money is expected during the coming season for extensions or repairs.

High Street, Penacook, south from Stark Street, 252 feet of 6-inch cast iron pipe and 336 feet of 2-inch galvanized iron pipe, replacing 226 feet of $1\frac{1}{4}$ -inch cement-lined.

Birch Street, south from Clinton Street, 1,010 feet of

14-inch galvanized steel pipe.

Princeton Street, extended south, 75 feet of $1\frac{1}{4}$ -inch cement-lined pipe.

On hydrant branches, 51 feet of 6-inch cast iron pipe.

Total length of main and distribution pipes now in use, 376,961 feet, equal to 71.39 miles.

Seven gates were added during the year.

Four new hydrants have been set:

Gladstone Street, west side at No. 13.

Summit Street, Penacook, at southeast corner of Pleasant.

Twenty-three services have been laid, consisting of 446 feet of $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch, 28 feet of 1-inch and 19 feet of 2-inch cement-lined pipe. One 6-inch connection has been made to the high service for Hall Bros.-Llewellyn Co. for sprinkler system. One 6-inch and one 8-inch connection have been made for the New Hampshire State Hospital for hydrant service, 4 6-inch hydrants being installed.

Fifteen services have been discontinued.

Total number in use, 3,894.

Total length of service pipes, 92,130 feet or 17.44 miles.

Twenty-nine services have been relaid and curb valves placed on 28 old services.

Sixty-eight new meters have been set and 10 meters have been removed, making total now in use, 2,647.

The pipe ordered to relay South Street was delayed in transportation and was received so late this fall that this work was postponed until next season.

In addition to this, it is planned to lay a 10-inch fire service line in the alleyway east of North Main Street which will be connected to the 20-inch high service Main Street pipe, installing three 4-way independent nozzle valve hydrants.

The report of the engineer of the pumping station shows that there have been pumped for high service consumption, by the electric pump, 308,879,000 gallons; power used, 156,610 K.W.H., with a pump efficiency of 84.34 per cent, at a total cost of \$13.16 per million gallons. The cost of pumping by steam in 1914 before rising prices entered into expense accounts at such a rapid rate was \$13.12 per million gallons.

A great advantage of this method of pumping is the speed with which the pump can be put in commission especially in case of fire; at the Opera House fire as soon as it was seen that a serious fire was in progress, the pump was started and kept going until the fire was under control. It may be interesting to note that as near as it can be estimated there were used at this fire from the two six-way high service hydrants and the three low service hydrants, approximately, 1,200,000 gallons of water, half the amount that is used on an average to supply the total city uses for twenty-four hours.

The buildings at the pumping station have been painted. A bathroom and a heating apparatus have been installed in the cottage of the caretaker at the dam in West Concord and a few men have been employed cleaning the brush around the shores of Penacook Lake.

All hydrants are in good working order and have been tested regularly during the winter months.

I wish to express my thanks to the members of the Board of Water Commissioners for their advice and support during the past year.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER.

To the Board of Aldermen:

In accordance with the requirements of the city ordinance, I herewith submit for your consideration the report of the Fire Department for the year 1920.

The department responded to 33 bell and 215 still alarms

This report will be found to contain statements in detail embracing the amount of expenditures, a complete roll of the department with residence and occupation of each member, a record of all fires and alarms which have occurred during the year and the causes thereof as nearly as could be ascertained, with the names of the owners or occupants and the value, loss, insurance, and insurance recovered in each case.

Two fires entailing heavy loss occurred during the year, November 8th and 30th, Capital Hardware Co. and the Opera House.

The apparatus is in good condition. Engine repairs on Combination 1 and wheel repairs on Combination 3 at West Concord cost approximately seven hundred dollars.

Four of the stations were painted outside at an expenditure of three hundred and sixty-five dollars—quite a saving

being effected at the Central Station—the permanent men doing the work. The roofs of three stations were repaired and the water service pipes at the Central Station were renewed at an aggregate expense of two hundred and sixty-seven dollars.

The fire alarm systems of the precinct and Penacook are in good condition.

The duties incumbent upon the undersigned in the line of inspection of wires and buildings have been performed.

Recent events at West Concord merely emphasize the needs of that district in the line of fire protection and recall to mind the recommendations of a year ago.

During the month of July, I had the pleasure of attending the convention of the International Association of Fire Engineers, held at Toronto, Ontario, a report of which I rendered at that time. I wish again to take occasion to thank your honorable body for the opportunity afforded me to attend.

The Alert Hose Company (11 men), located on Washington Street, has an auto-combination car, with permanent man.

The Good Will Hose Company (11 men), located on the

corner of Concord and South State Streets, has an auto-combination car with permanent man.

Veterans' Auxiliary Company (30 men).

One chemical engine, one hand engine and four wagons in reserve.

The "Pioneer" Engine Company, No. 3 (28 men), at Penacook, has a third-class Metropolitan engine, with two hose wagons and one auto-combination car with permanent man.

The Cataract Company (30 men), at West Concord, has a modern hose wagon and auto-combination car with permanent man.

Old Fort (30 men), East Concord, has a $4\frac{1}{2}$ -inch cylinder Hunneman hand engine and hand ladder truck, and one hand-drawn chemical engine, 50-gallon, single tank, and one auto-combination car.

PUBLIC LIBRARY.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES.

To the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Concord:

The trustees of the Public Library are pleased to report that the work of the library during the past year has been carried on in the usual satisfactory manner under the immediate supervision of the librarian. Her condensed report is hereto attached which shows concisely the activities of the past year.

At the annual meeting of the trustees held on January 15, 1921, it was voted to ask for the same appropriation (\$7,000) that we had last year. This is upon the theory that the income from the Eastman Fund should not be used to pay for the current expenses of the library but should be added to the principal, thus materially increasing the building fund. This is in accordance with the recommendation of the trustees which was made last year as to the disposition of the income. By strict economy the ordinary expenses of the library can be kept within the appropriation above requested.

Gentlemen: My annual report has become a brief affair, which is no cause for regret, in this day when cost prohibits reprints of reports for friendly and informing exchange among librarians, and when, furthermore, this particular library has no new or especially interesting tale to tell.

Last year I explained that the New Hampshire Library Commission wisely requests librarians to observe a certain order in making out their reports, and statistics have first place in this recommended form, the financial statement leading off; ours is as follows:

Compared with the circulation of 1919, we have suffered a large decrease—8,000 volumes. This, in my opinion, is due to the fact that people cannot read and at the same time ride in automobiles and go to see moving pictures, both of which pleasures engross them more and more. I say it "more in sorrow than in anger."

There are a few other matters to mention which relate to our library:

Ruth M. Chase, who began to work for the library by the hour in 1912 and who for five years has been here on full time, resigned November 1 to accept a position with the

Capital Fire Insurance Company. Miss Chase was an assistant so acceptable to the public and to the rest of the staff that her going is greatly regretted.

It is doubtless known to you all that prices on books and binding are still advancing; also that some paper-pulp is deteriorating so that it is difficult to keep the reading room free from torn newspapers.

The behavior of young folks, especially on Sunday afternoons in the library, has never been better than during the past year.

The men's class at the Evening School has again paid a visit to the library and had pointed out to them its free privileges. As to out-of-town calls for material, work for thousands of inquirers in our reference room, the passing along of worn volumes to Jail, Sanitorium and people living miles away. I can only say that we function along all these lines as heretofore.

We have had from quite a number of citizens the gift of books and when the house was cleared where lived the Southard Marshalls and Miss Helen Southgate, 315 volumes were turned over from their bookcases to this library, where they will be most useful as replacements.

Our trust funds are increasing somewhat, and perhaps we can begin to speak of a budding building fund and to ask residents to remember it in their wills—or before!

In October the New Hampshire Library Association held a meeting in Concord, and this library was able, in some small ways, to further its success.

In August the first New Hampshire Library Institute, with about thirty in attendance to receive instruction, was held in Durham. Library conditions in the state are making progress; and though our library seems not to be working more extensively, it is certain that we are as busy as five persons can well be, and indisputable that the institution every day proves it is a necessity to the community.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

New prints showing the location of hydrants and firealarm boxes were made and turned over to the chief of this department; new hydrants installed the past season making new plans necessary.

BUILDING PERMITS.

In company with the chief of the fire department, I have attended hearings upon thirty-five petitions. All petitions

have been filed with the city clerk with our action endorsed thereon.

CEMETERIES.

The large plan of Blossom Hill Cemetery has been brought up to date, showing the latest additions of blocks laid out.

Three prints of block "BB," block "Z," and block "DD" were made and turned over to the superintendent.

Plans showing the changes in block "P" were made and copies given to the superintendent.

Plans for changes in the old stable at Blossom Hill Cemetery were made and filed for future use.

Plans for an office, in the waiting room at Blossom Hill Cemetery, were made and the room completed in accordance with those plans.

Assessors.

All property transfers have been kept up from the transfers furnished by the register of deeds. Lists of real estate owners made for the assessors as soon after April first as the March transfers were available.

A plan showing the property of the Rumford Printing Company, on Washington, North Main and Pearl Streets, was made for this board.

A blue print showing ward lines and the fire precinct was also made for this board.

The many changes in ownership and the dimensions of lots sold has made much extra work on the maps during the past season.

Miscellaneous.

Considerable time was spent in procuring information and in making plans for a proposed Comfort Station, under the Police Station.

Three schemes were developed and considered by the committee having this matter in charge. Upon the adoption of one of these plans, six sets of prints were made and turned over to the mayor.

Plans for the clinic room, over the police station cells, were made, and prints of the same delivered to the committee on lands and buildings, the contract made and the work completed under the direction of the above mentioned committee.

A plan for the change in the roof, over the dressing rooms for the Auditorium, were made, the roof changes completed and the desired result obtained, under the direction of the committee on lands and buildings.

Plans for the Annie Ford case were made for the city solicitor and delivered to him.

A plan of the lay-out of the children's gardens, at Rollins Park, was made and delivered to the committee having this matter in charge.

Speed tables were made for the city marshall, for use of the police department in regulating the automobile traffic in the city streets.

A survey of "Rolfe Park" in Ward 1, was made, plans drawn, and copies of same furnished the city solicitor to enable him to make deed to the city. Some delay in the completion of this transaction was occasioned by our discovery of a right-of-way over the easterly side of the premises. The rights of former owners in this passway have been deeded to Mr. Rolfe, and the property will be transferred to the city without any encumbrance.

My judgment being that a financial report does not exactly show the activities of a department wish to call attention to the following facts:

GENERAL MAINTENANCE.

Wages were advanced 13 per cent on May 10, 1920. The present wages are as follows for a nine-hour day:

Able-bodied men, \$4.50 Other men, \$3.96 to 4.18 Teamsters, 4.68

Holidays and overtime labor paid at the rate of time and one-half and Sundays at double time rate.

The rate of pay for hired double teams in the city was increased on March 29th to \$8.00 per day.

Approximately 84 miles of walks plowed after each storm; largest route 8.7 miles and shortest 4.8 miles. All plows in city proper run from city stables.

The sum of \$15,185.27 was spent for snow removal.

The sum of \$2,437.00 was spent for addition to garage at city lot.

Blacksmith and repair shop fitted up at city lot; all repair work, with few exceptions, is now being done by our own employees.

Resurfacing of our dirt and gravel streets with crushed screened gravel.

Tractor used in operating our road machines and drags in place of horses.

Improved pavements, so-called, repaired or patched by our own employees.

Started to drain, reshape, gravel and excavate side ditches on our country roads.

Driveways paved with granite block paving.

84,300 sq. yds. of improved pavement swept each day.

Guard fences on country roads rebuilt.

All drinking fountains in city proper repaired.

Streets and roads dragged after each storm.

Several bridges had stringers replaced, replanked and guard rail built.

The sum of \$6,747.21 spent on improvements on Dimond Hill and Bridge Street under the supervision of State Highway Department.

Gutters built on Dimond Hill; Federal and State Government paying for same.

Buick automobile, scarifier and four new horses added to our equipment at an expense of \$3,697.23.

White's Park ball grounds graded in co-operation with the White's Park Ball Grounds Committee.

Crushed stone sold to all that applied for it.

Seal coat of tar placed on trunk lines in co-operation with State Highway Department.

CATCH BASINS.

All basins in city proper located and mapped; blueprints showing location on file in this and city engineer's office.

March 8th the citizens of the city helped locate and clear gutters and basins.

Victory nozzle purchased allowing department to more quickly clear pipes from basins to sewers.

Basins cleaned out as soon as possible after each storm. Nine new basins built and twenty-three repaired.

SIDEWALKS AND CROSSINGS, NEW AND REPAIR.

Specifications prepared by city engineer, adopted by your board and now in use in the department.

Number of square yards laid as follows:

48 sq. yds., crossings 658.21 sq. yds., sidewalks Repair.

130.98 sq. yds., crossings 3066.76 sq. yds., sidewalks 23.57 sq. yds., gutters

Snow added to cost of collection. Truck overhauled and painted by our own employees. 13,900 cu. yds. of ashes collected. 2,750 cu. yds. of paper collected.

SPRINKLING.

Streets in center of city flushed once each week. Automobiles replaced horse drawn sprinklers.

Calcium chloride used on a part of Thorndike and North Spring Streets; no sprinkling necessary from August 2nd, date of application.

Automobile sprinklers used for dragging streets when not used sprinkling.

TREES.

This amount was spent gathering moth nests and removing several limbs.

Conclusion.

Believing that my recommendations should be made to your board in regular session, have prepared this report with the idea that an annual report is useful principally as a record of work performed.

REPORT OF THE CITY ENGINEER.

To the Board of Public Works:

Gentlemen: The tenth annual report to your board showing the work done under the supervision of the Engineering Department, for your board, is herewith submitted.

SEWERS.

There was laid during the past season 198 feet of 33-inch segmental sewer in Beacon Street, replacing the old 12-inch pipe.

Scarcity of labor resulted in another delay in completing this much needed improvement, which should be started early next season to relieve this congested main. We were in the deepest portion of this work when compeled to stop work upon it, thus making additional expense in again opening up the ditch.

Flooded premises near the head of Walker Street were caused by the accumulation of boards, sticks, etc., in three manholes in Walker Street.

The boards were too long to have entered the sewer through any catchbasins or house connections. How these boards came into three manholes in this street, we are still guessing.

The sewer system was flushed and cleaned in the spring and fall as usual.

REPORT OF TREE WARDEN.

To the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen: I herewith submit the report of the tree warden for the year ending December 31, 1920.

With the appropriation of \$1,500 made in March and the \$1,000 appropriated later it was impossible to do any where near the amount of work on the trees for which there was a demand. No trimming was done except where very necessary and only the more dangerous trees were removed. No inspection for moth pests was made of the trees on private property or any notices sent as required by the state law. However some work was done on private property where requested and the money collected was deposited with the city treasurer. The total amount collected was \$222.25 of which \$200.22 was reappropriated to meet the deficiency in the appropriation leaving a balance of \$22.03 in the city treasury.

There were less brown-tail moth nests found than in previous years but the gypsy moth is still with us as well as the elm tree beetle. I do not think that they are increasing as in the past.

There has been a great call to have poplar trees removed especially at the south end of the city where they are causing property owners considerable trouble. There are a large number of old and dangerous trees that should be removed and new ones should be set out to take their place and a large amount of trimming is needed all over the city.

The amount appropriated for trees for a city the area of Concord and with so large a number of trees should be at least \$4,000. Cities of less size are expending more and if we wish to preserve the beauty which good shade trees give to any city and which I am sure add to the attractiveness of

ours there should be considerable done on them. At least the necessary work should be done each year on the old trees and new ones should be planted.

REPORT OF SEALER OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

To the Honorable Henry E. Chamberlain, Mayor of Concord:

SIR: I have the honor to submit to you a report of the work done as city sealer since my appointment March 30, 1920.

I have found a ready co-operation with all those that I have had dealings with and the attitude of the average dealer is that he would welcome the sealer more than once a year for the satisfaction of knowing that his scales were correct.

I call attention to the small number of dry measures found; the merchants today finding it more satisfactory to sell all commodities by weight rather than measure.

Three complaints have been sworn out during the year. On one a conviction was secured, another is in the county solicitor's hands for service and the third, after a consultation of the defendant, the county solicitor and state commissioner of weights and measures, was not brought into court.

Beside the actual work of sealing and testing under the directions of the commissioner, a campaign of education is being conducted consisting of the distribution and display of conspicuous signs in public places and the distribution of pamphlets to the house-keeper.

I wish to thank your Honor for the many courtesies shown me and also Mr. Harold Webster, the commissioner, for the ever ready aid and encouragement received from his office.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

To the Board of Mayor and Aldermen:

The Board of Health submits the following report for the year ending December 31, 1920. The organization of the board was as follows: Mayor Chamberlin, ex officio, chairman; Dr. Charles H. Cook, city physician, secretary, and Dr. Sibley G. Morrill, member. Mr. Charles E. Palmer served as sanitary officer. Regular meetings were held on the first Monday of each month at 4 o'clock p. m. These meetings were well attended and much interest was shown by the members in the matters presented for discussion. In the absence of emergencies the business transacted was largely of a routine nature. Members of the City Government and the general public should feel free to attend these meetings if interested in any matter pertaining to the public health.

The report of the sanitary officer to the Board of Health, which is herewith transmitted and made a part of this report, covers the ground so thoroughly and is so replete with detailed information concerning departmental activities as to make further comment almost needless.

However, we wish to call attention to that part of the report which refers to the lack of facilities for the proper care of small-pox or other pestilential diseases. We can think of nothing more forceful to say upon this subject than that which was said in our report for the year ending December 31, 1919, to which report you are respectfully referred. Realizing that something ought to be done to relieve the situation a conference of the hospital trustees, a committee from the City Government, the Board of Health and the sanitary officer was held last spring. At this

conference the whole matter was gone into at some length and various proposals were considered but definite action was deferred ostensibly on the ground of prohibitive cost of building. Here the matter rests and it is probable that no definite action will be taken until some emergency compels a definite and sharp realization of the city's needs in this regard. This is quite natural in view of the fact that cases of the nature in question are quite rare and that as a consequence any building devoted exclusively to handling of such would be practically an unused structure. If not devoted entirely to the care of such cases, in other words, if it was used part of the time for other cases, it might not be instantly available when needed and we should be no better off than we are now. It is a rather vexing problem and it would seem that it is one that could best be solved as a county problem rather than as a municipal one.

You will note there were over 800 cases of measles during the year with no deaths. There were, however, 3 deaths from pneumonia reported with measles given as a contributory cause. It is probable, also, that other deaths resulted indirectly from an attack of this disease. It is known, furthermore, that troubles of a serious nature are prone to follow even a mild attack of this exanthem. Thus suppuration of the middle ear often involving the mastoid cells is not uncommon and various ocular and nervous manifestations are met with from time to time. The above considerations among others that could be given should tend to discourage those parents and others who believe that a child should be exposed to measles so as to "have them over with." On the contrary the greatest care should be exercised at all times against exposing children, and adults for that matter, to infection of this nature. Measles is a serious disease and should be treated with the consideration due any disease fraught with such harmful possibilities.

WATER SUPPLY.

Concord is very fortunate in having a plentiful supply of pure water delivered to consumers largely by gravitation. Penacook Lake or Long Pond is a beautiful body of water fed largely by springs. The catchment is remarkably free from possible sources of pollution. The gradual acquisition of the land around the shore and the inforestation of the same will serve to insure posterity a copious and clean supply of water. As pointed out in former reports of this board it may become advisable sometime in the future to install a chlorination plant for the purpose of taking care of any chance pollution.

TUBERCULOSIS IN CATTLE.

The question of bovine tuberculosis has been rather forcefully presented to the public through the newspapers and in other ways during the past year. At the time this is being written the question is receiving considerable attention in the state legislature, it being proposed to appropriate rather large sums for carrying on the work and for partly compensating owners for cattle killed. This board is now and has been for years very much interested in this matter and ready and anxious to coöperate in all ways that give reasonable promise of tending to free our meat and milk supply from this source of contamination.

However, it is thought that the present state of our knowledge with respect to this question is so incomplete and unclarified as to make it impossible to map out a proper course of action and inadvisable to expend large sums of money at this time. There can be no question about the advisability of destroying all cattle that are obviously tubercular or that can be demonstrated to be tubercular by the ordinary means of physical diagnosis. This is particularly true in the so-called open forms and still more particularly where the lacteal organs are known to be involved. When, however, it is proposed to destroy a herd of valuable cattle that has every appearance of health because the individuals composing the herd have shown a positive reaction to the tuberculin test we believe it advisable to make haste slowly as the authorities seem to differ as to the advisability or necessity of such a course of action. We do not intend to raise the question as to whether we are justified in requiring that all cattle be tuberculin tested in view of the opinion held by some apparently good authorities that this procedure sometimes serves to make active latent tuberculosis thus appearing to introduce an active form of the disease where it was non-existent before the test was made. However this may be, there are some high authorities who go so far as to maintain that human tuberculosis is never caused by the ingestion of bovine tubercle bacilli. Others maintain that human infection may result from exposure to bovine tuberculosis but that such infection will be of a mild type and would serve to confer subsequent immunity to an attack of human tuberculosis!

We shall await with interest further developments in the hope that some of these conflicting opinions may be brought into harmony and a rational course of procedure suggested for the guidance of health officials.

REPORT OF THE SANITARY OFFICER.

To the Board of Health:

Gentlemen: Herewith is submitted the report of the sanitary officer for the year ending December 31, 1920.

There were 485 deaths during the past year, 31 more than in 1919, myocarditis and pneumonia each claiming 51 or 14.56 per cent with the exclusion of the stillbirths. This was the largest number of deaths from any one cause. Estimating the population at 23,000 and excluding the non-resident deaths, 180, and the stillbirths, 19, the death-rate is 12.43 per cent. There were 271 deaths at the six public institutions and 214 in the nine wards of the city.

During the epidemic of influenza and continuing through 1919 there was almost no contagious disease, therefore it is not surprising that measles were again in evidence; the number reported was 805 with no deaths. There were 39 cases of scarlet fever, 13 cases of diphtheria, 1 death resulting, and 11 cases of typhoid fever with 3 deaths. Practically all of the cases of typhoid were traced back and the patients were found to have been taken sick while in some other locality.

Concord is more fortunate than most cities of its size in health facilities but it is again necessary to call the attention of the public to the fact that we are at present without an isolation hospital of any description for small-pox. Should there be a case of small-pox reported the Board of Health would be obliged to hold it regardless of its location.

There has been a tuberculosis clinic with a nurse in charge opened by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association which is under the supervision of the board and the total number of cases examined since the middle of August, when it was opened, is 190. This fills a long felt need and much benefit should be derived from it.

After the war there was an intensive campaign against venereal disease which has met with more favor each year, as the first duty was to educate the public. The advance along these lines has been very marked during the year; the doctors have coöperated in reporting cases and in the latter part of November a clinic was organized under the direction of Dr. Weaver, Federal Officer of Venereal Disease Control for New Hampshire and the local Board of Health. During the month the clinic has been in operation 50 patients were examined and those requiring it were placed under treatment.

For the past two years the privilege of keeping a pig has been allowed by the board but complaints of abuse of this privilege necessitated a new ruling and by vote of the board, citizens were allowed to keep one pig, if the pen was 100 feet from any house and kept in a clean, sanitary condition. Since enforcing this rule I have had very few complaints from this source.

The care of the milk supply has been a very interesting feature of my work this year. Out of the 129 milk farms I have visited, 106 were in very good sanitary condition, 19 were fair and 4 were poor, the barns were dirty and the cows needed cleaning which I requested done at once. From the 82 samples of milk I collected from the various producers and had examined at the State Laboratory, 54 were above the minimum required standard of the state. There has been a great improvement in the milk supply over that of last year. Most of the producers have made special effort to have their milk clean and of good quality. The board voted to publish, every two months, the findings afforded by the examination at the State Laboratory of all samples of milk, thereby giving the public an opportunity to know the quality of milk they are using.

There have been the usual number of complaints and nuisances to be inspected and disposed of. These came chiefly from dead animals, odors from pigs, stables and rubbish, unsanitary plumbing, refuse and ashes in yards and general conditions of premises. By inspecting the alleyways in the rear of the business blocks weekly any accumulation of rubbish has been avoided.

Although there has been practically no building going on in Concord there were 61 plumbing permits issued and 99 inspections made.

The city water supply at Long Pond has been inspected regularly and I have found it to be in most excellent condition. Analysis shows the water to be of the usual fine quality.

The appropriation for the year was \$4,300 and the total expenditures were \$4,175.33 leaving a balance of \$124.67. In the care of contagious disease \$571.69 was expended; most cases requiring assistance by this department during quarantine were cared for at the Foster Ward, Margaret Pillsbury Hospital. One hundred and seventy-seven dollars was received from milk license fees and \$4.35 from fumigation.

REPORT OF THE CITY SOLICITOR.

Concord, N. H., January 24, 1921.

To the Board of Aldermen:

I herewith submit to the board my tenth annual report relative to legal matters in which the city has been interested during the past year.

Mabel G. Tyrrell v. Concord was an action brought for the death of a horse which was alleged to have gone through a culvert on the Canterbury Road. This case has been settled for \$50 without costs.

Irving J. Sargent v. Concord was an action brought for the death of a horse caused by said horse breaking through a bridge in the Snaptown District. This case likewise has been settled for \$50 without costs.

Annie Ford v. Concord, a claim for \$3,000, for damages to lands and buildings has been settled for \$250.

I have attended the trial of the Gas Company consolidation case at the direction of the board. Through the kindness of the Public Service Commission, I was enabled to work with their engineers and with their expert, Mr. Hubbell. The hearings were finished before my term of office expired and the case is now awaiting decision by the Public Service Commission.

The Concord Street Railway rate case was a petition for increase of fares. While there was no expert assigned to this case by the Public Service Commission, their regular engineers worked on it and I was given access to the files of the Commission and to the work of the Commission's said engineers. Hearings were held by the Commission which I attended at the direction of the board. The hearings in this case have likewise been terminated and the matter is now before the board for decision. Meanwhile

the proposed increase in fares has been suspended pending a decision of the case.

Leon F. Savoy v. Concord is a petition to the Superior Court for leave to file a statement of claim for damages alleged to have been caused by injuries received on one of the highways of the city.

Philippe St. Pierre v. Concord is a suit claiming \$1,000 damages for the destruction of an automobile alleged to have gone over an embankment, due to a defective railing. This case will be in order at the next April term.

DeWitt C. Howe, Executor of Estate of Mary A. Norris v. Concord, Herbert G. Sargent, Thomas W. Cragg is an action for the death of Mary A. Norris alleged to have been caused by the joint negligence of the city and the two other defendants on the main highway near Penacook. Damages in the sum of \$10,000 are asked in this case and the case is returnable at the next April term.

St. Mary's School for Girls v. Concord is a petition for abatement of taxes assessed upon real estate of the school corporation and is returnable at the next April term.

In closing, I desire to express my appreciation of the uniform courteous treatment received by me from the various members of the board, and in fact from the members of all the boards I have served during the period since July, 1910. My one recommendation would be that the salary of the office be increased so that the city solitor will will not feel that he is using valuable time for inadequate pay. In view of the responsibilities a solicitor must assume in the many important matters arising, in which the city is vitally interested, it is my opinion that with the present day scale of prices, the salary provided for this office is inadequate, and it was solely for that reason that I was not a candidate for re-election.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PLAY-GROUNDS AND BATHS.

The playground season of 1920 comprised the months of July and August, as in past years. The South End Playground and the John Kimball Playground, which are the largest of the city playgrounds, had regular trained supervisors for both boys and girls, throughout the season. Public Bath was in charge of a regular supervisor, and two afternoons in each week were reserved for women and girls. There was a large attendance at the baths during the season, with no accidents reported. The present bath house is poorly located and entirely inadequate, and the committee hope that better accommodations may soon be possible, together with telephone connection for use in emergency calls in case of accident. The purchase of two lungmotors for the Police Department was strongly advocated by the members of this committee and this equipment, now in use, is an added safeguard which is most valuable.

The appropriation of \$1,500.00 was used for salaries of supervisors and in keeping playground apparatus in repair with some expenditure for new equipment, the total amount expended being \$1,086.46. The standard of conduct and deportment of the children was very good, and very little damage to, or misuse of, playground property developed during the season. The committee desires to thank all those who assisted in making the season a success, and to express their appreciation of the faithful services rendered by the supervisors, Miss Myrta B. Lowe and Mr. Henry T. Dee at the John Kimball Playground, Miss Florence A. Clough and Mr. Merton Messer at the South End Playground, and Mr. Charles E. Reardon at the Public Bath.


