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MUNICIPAL REGULATIONS.

FOR PAYMENT OF BILLS AGAINST THE CITY.

All persons furnishing materials or service for the city, or aid to the city poor, should be particular to take the name of the person ordering such service, material, or aid, and should *know* that the person is duly authorized to contract such liability.

The city will not be holden for merchandise sold or delivered on city poor account, except on the written order of the overseer of the poor, and for no longer time than until his successor shall have been appointed and qualified.

Duplicate copies will be required of all bills payable by the city, furnished on county poor account.

All bills against the city must be approved by the person authorizing the charge; and unless this is done, no action can be had upon the bill by the Committee on Accounts and Claims, and no order will be given for its payment.

Bills so certified should be left with the city clerk on or before the second day of the month.

If approved by the Committee on Accounts and Claims, they will be ready for payment on Thursday following the regular monthly meeting of the city government.

The regular monthly meetings of the city government occur on the second Monday of each month.

ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS.

Passed During the Year Ending January 13, 1930.

An Ordinance in amendment of section 28 of chapter 18 of the revised ordinances.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. Section 28 of Chapter XVIII of the Revised Ordinances is hereby amended by striking out after the words "assistant engineer at Penacook," the words "seventy-five dollars,"—and substituting in place thereof the words "one hundred dollars," so that the amended phrase shall read as follows: "assistant engineer at Penacook, one hundred dollars."

Sect. 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed, and the salary herein provided shall take effect from January 1, 1929.

Passed February 11, 1929.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR A RECREATION COMMISSION.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

SECTION 1. The memorial athletic field on South Fruit Street shall be managed by a recreation commission which shall be composed of five citizens of the City of Concord who shall serve without pay.

Sect. 2. Said commission shall consist of the Mayor, ex-officio, and four others appointed by the Mayor subject to confirmation by the Board of Aldermen, of which two shall be appointed for three years, one for two years and one for one year. Successors shall be appointed for three years. In case a vacancy shall occur it shall be filled for the unexpired term only.

Sect. 3. The recreation commission shall have the powers conferred upon such commissions by Chapter 42 of the Public Laws.

Sect. 4. The commission shall from their own number elect a chairman, a secretary and other necessary officers to serve for one year or until their successors are elected.

Sect. 5. The commission shall have the power to adopt rules of procedure and prescribe regulations for the conduct of all business within its jurisdiction. It may employ such play leaders, instructors, supervisors, superintendent and other officers and employees as it shall deem best and as funds may be provided for.

Passed April 8, 1929.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER XXXVIII OF THE REVISED ORDINANCES RELATING TO CITY AMBULANCE.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. Amend section 1 of Chapter XXXVIII of the Revised Ordinances by striking out the whole thereof and substituting therefor the following:

Section 1. The use of the city ambulance shall be subject to such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by the police board.

Sect. 2. Sections 2 and 3 of said chapter are hereby repealed, and section 4 is renumbered as section 2.

Sect. 3. This ordinance shall take effect on its passage. Passed June 10, 1929.

An Ordinance transferring the provisions for fire department salaries from chapter 18 to chapter 43 of the revised ordinances.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. Amend subdivision (x) of section 1 of Chapter XLIII
of the Revised ordinances by striking out the same and substituting
therefor the following:

(x) Chief of the fire department, twenty-six hundred dollars per annum, which shall include compensation for services rendered as assistant building inspector; permanent force at Central fire station, at Good Will and Alert hose houses, Pioneer fire station and Cataract engine house, eighteen hundred dollars each; and captain and lieutenant of Combination No. 1, eighteen hundred and fifty dollars each per annum: chauffeur and caretaker, Old Fort company and engine company No. 5, each three hundred dollars per annum; assistant engineers within the precinct, one hundred and forty-five dollars each; engineers of steamers within the precinct, one hundred and thirty-five dollars each; captains of companies within the precinct, each one hundred and ten dollars per annum; lieutenants of companies within the precinct, one hundred and five dollars per annum; members of steamer and hook and ladder companies within the precinct and house man at Central fire station, one hundred dollars per annum; outside the precinct, Engine companies Nos. 2 and 3, five hundred and ten dollars each, and Pioneer steamer company No. 3, sixteen hundred and twenty-five dollars per annum, engine company No. 5, five hundred and ten dollars per annum, said sum to be divided among the members as each company shall direct: engineer of steamer at Penacook, one hundred dollars per annum; assistant engineer at Penacook, one hundred dollars; assistant engineer at East Concord, twenty dollars; and assistant engineer at West Concord, twenty dollars. Supt. of Fire alarm Ward one, one hundred dollars.

Sect. 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed and this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed June 10, 1929.

An Ordinance amending chapter 18 of the revised ordinances relating to the fire department.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows: Section 1. Amend Chapter XVIII of the Revised Ordinances by striking out the whole thereof and substituting therefor the following:

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Section 1. The fire department shall consist of a chief engineer, two assistants within the precinct, one engineer each from Ward 1, Ward 2 and Ward 3; two steamer and hose companies, one company to consist of thirteen men, including driver, and one company to consist of fourteen men, including driver; one relief steamer company to consist of two men; two hose companies to consist of eleven men, including driver; a combination engine company to consist of four men; a hook and ladder company to consist of twenty-one men, including driver; a house man, two spare men, a general utility man, and a fire inspector at Central Fire Station; steamer Pioneer, not less than twenty nor more than thirty men, including driver; hand engine company No. 2, not less than twenty nor more than thirty men; engine company No. 5, not less than twenty nor more than thirty men. Each company shall be allowed three substitutes, except Hook and Ladder company No. 1, which shall have five.

Sect. 2. The standing committee on fire department of the board of aldermen, together with the mayor, shall constitute a fire board. The chairman of the said committee shall be the chairman of the said board, and the board shall choose one of their own number to be their clerk, who shall keep a correct record of the doings of the said board upon looseleaf forms to be furnished by the city clerk. The original record of each meeting of the board shall be filed by the clerk thereof, within five days after such meeting, in the office of the city clerk, who shall as soon as may be cause the same to be photostated and copies thereof delivered to the clerk of the fire board for the latter's files, also to each other member of the board and to the chief engineer of the fire department.

SECT. 3. The fire board shall have the power to make rules and regulations and amendments thereto for the government, control and direction of the fire department, except as to compensation and allowances, the same to be in force from such date as may be prescribed by the fire board, provided the record of the meeting at which any such rule or regulation is made be seasonably filed with the city clerk in accordance

with section 2 of this chapter. All rules and regulations heretofore prescribed by Chapter XVIII of the Revised Ordinances not inconsistent with this chapter shall remain in force until altered or amended by the fire board.

- SECT. 4. The chief engineer and assistant engineers and all other members of the fire department shall hold their respective offices and places until they are removed, or their offices or places are otherwise vacated or terminated. The fire board may at any time in their discretion remove the chief engineer from office, subject to the confirmation of the board of aldermen. The fire board, in case of a vacancy in the office of chief engineer, shall appoint a chief engineer, subject to the confirmation of the board of aldermen. Any subordinate member of the fire department may be removed at any time by the chief engineer in his discretion, subject to the confirmation of the fire board. The chief, in case of any vacancy in the membership of the department subordinate to him, may fill such vacancy, subject to the approval of the fire board. Upon all questions arising in the fire board under this chapter, a majority vote shall be necessary for effective action. In case there shall be an equal division in the fire board upon any question arising under this chapter, such question shall be determined by majority vote of the board of aldermen.
- Sect. 5. The chief engineer shall give his entire time to the duties of his office, unless herein otherwise provided, and shall not engage in or be connected with any other business or occupation.
- Sect. 6. The chief engineer shall have the care and management of the rooms, apparatus, machinery, wires, poles, and signal boxes connected with the fire-alarm telegraph. He shall prepare rules and directions for giving alarms of fire through the telegraph. He shall have the superintendence, and under the direction of the fire board have control, of the several stations, the apparatus, the furniture therein, and all other property appertaining to the department. He shall, with the assistance of the permanent men at the Central station, make the necessary repairs and take care of the fire-alarm system, including the batteries, all alarm boxes, and everything pertaining to the fire-alarm system. He shall personally be able to master the fire-alarm in every particular, and every permanent man at the Central station shall be obliged to understand the fire-alarm system in order that the chief engineer may call upon any of them to attend to and repair any part of the same. This provision shall not be construed to prevent the chief engineer from employing extra linemen when necessary, or from acting promptly in any emergency.
- Sect. 7. The fire board, subject to the board of mayor and aldermen, shall by themselves or agent purchase all supplies in connection with the fire department, and direct all repairs of apparatus and buildings; and all bills contracted for the fire department must receive their approval before being passed on by the committee on accounts and claims. All

departmental pay-rolls shall be approved by the chairman or by some other member of the fire board before being presented to the city clerk for approval. The board shall hold stated meetings at least once each month at the Central fire station, and all communications to the city government from the fire department must come through said fire board, and annually at the call of the finance committee, in connection with the chief engineer, they shall make recommendations as to the amount of appropriation the wants of the department will require for the coming year.

Sect. 8. Fire department pay-rolls shall be payable at such intervals as the fire board shall determine, except that pay-rolls for other than permanent employes shall be paid semi-annually, the latter to be transmitted to the tax collector, under whose sole direction all sums due to call firemen shall be disbursed.

Sect. 9. A member of the Old Fort engine company No. 2 and a member of engine company No. 5 shall annually be designated by the chief engineer, subject to confirmation by the Fire Board, to act as chauffeur and carctaker of the property in the service of his company, a single salary to cover all services he may perform except such as he may perform as janitor, if elected such. A permanent man shall be stationed at the Pioneer engine house in Ward 1 and another at the Cataract engine house in Ward 3, each of whom shall perform such fire duties as shall be assigned by the fire engineer and shall also, without extra compensation therefor, care for the property in the service of his company and for the engine house building.

Sect. 10. The Veteran Firemen's Association shall be an auxiliary branch of the fire department and its members shall be honorary members of the department, constituting a cooperative working force to serve in emergency. Service rendered by them shall be under the direction and control of the officers of the department and subject to the rules and regulations thereof, and without other compensation than the furnishing by the city of quarters for the Association.

Sect. 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed June 10, 1929.

AN Ordinance amending chapter 5 of the revised ordinances relating to the police department.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. Amend Chapter V of the Revised Ordinances by striking out the whole thereof and substituting therefor the following:

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

Section 1. The chairman of the standing committee on police and licenses shall be the chairman of the police board. The board shall

choose from their number a clerk, who shall keep a correct record of the doings of the said board upon loose-leaf forms to be furnished by the city clerk. The original record of each meeting of the board shall be filed by the clerk thereof, within five days after such meeting, in the office of the city clerk, who shall as soon as may be cause the same to be photostated and copies thereof delivered to the clerk of the police board for the latter's files, also to each other member of the board and to the chief of police.

Sect. 2. The police board shall have the power to make rules and regulations and amendments thereto for the government, control and direction of the police department and all officers thereof, except as to compensation and allowances, and not inconsistent with the provisions of the charter and of this chapter, such rules and regulations to be in force from such date as may be prescribed by the police board, provided the record of the meeting at which any such rule or regulation is made be seasonably filed with the city clerk in accordance with section 1 of this chapter. All rules and regulations heretofore prescribed by Chapter V of the Revised Ordinances not inconsistent with this chapter shall remain in force until altered or amended by the police board.

Sect. 3. The salaries paid to the chief, deputy, night-watchman, and day police shall be in full for all services by them rendered, and in lieu of all fees which they shall receive or be entitled to, on criminal complaints, or prosecutions from any source, except fees received by them from the superior court. Said chief, deputy, night-watchmen, and day policemen shall account and pay over to the chief, in quarterly payments, all fees by them received on criminal complaints or prosecution from any source, except fees received by them from the superior court. Such salaries shall be payable at such times, not less often than monthly, as the police board may determine.

Sect. 4. The police board, subject to the Board of Mayor and Aldermen, shall by themselves or agent, purchase all supplies in connection with the police department and direct all repairs of apparatus and buildings, except that purchases may be made in common for this and other departments in such manner as the Board of Aldermen may approve; and all bills contracted for the department must receive their approval before being passed on by the committee on accounts and claims. All departmental pay-rolls shall be approved by the chairman or by some other member of the police board before being presented to the city clerk for approval. They shall hold stated meetings at least once each month at the police station, and all communications to the city government from the police department must come through said police board; and annually at the call of the finance committee, in connection with the chief, they shall make recommendations as to the amount of money the wants of the department will require the coming year.

Sect. 5. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with

this ordinance are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect on its passage.

Passed June 10, 1929.

AN ORDINANCE REPEALING CHAPTER XXXIII OF THE REVISED ORDINANCES, RELATING TO THE PRINTING OF CITY REPORTS.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows: Section 1. Chapter XXXIII of the Revised Ordinances, relating to printing city reports, is hereby repealed.

Sect. 2. This ordinance shall take effect on its passage. Passed June 10, 1929.

An Ordinance in amendment of section 8, chapter 3, of the revised ordinances relative to finances and accountability in expenditures.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. Amend section 8, chapter 3, of the Revised Ordinances by striking out in the third line the words "once in three months" and inserting in place thereof the word "monthly"; in the fourth line strike out "except the collector of taxes, who shall make such" and inserting the following "by the mayor" after the word, required; and in the fifth line strike out the word "payment," and insert the word "or," so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

Section 8. All city officers, who shall in their official capacity receive any money on behalf of the city, shall pay to the treasurer the amount in their hands monthly or oftener if required by the Mayor, or whenever the sum in his hands shall amount to five hundred dollars. All other persons, who shall at any time have money in their hands belonging to the city, shall forthwith pay the same to the treasurer.

Sect. 2. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage. Passed June 10, 1929.

An Ordinance amending section 4 of chapter 32 of the revised ordinances.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 4 of Chapter 32 of the revised ordinances is

Section 1. Section 4 of Chapter 32 of the revised ordinances is hereby amended by striking out the words "July Ist." and substituting therefor the words and figures following: September 15; so that said section as amended shall read as follows: Sect. 4. Poll taxes shall be paid to the collector on demand without previous notice, and if not paid on or before September 15, twenty cents costs shall be added.

Sect. 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed July 8, 1929.

An Ordinance in amendment of section 4, of chapter 3, of revised ordinances.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. Amend Section 4 of Chapter 3 of the Revised Ordinances by adding thereto the following: All checks shall be signed by the City Treasurer with the exception of those drawn for poor and Soldier's Aid, which shall be signed by the City Clerk, to whose account the City Treasurer shall at the beginning of each month transfer such funds as from time to time shall be approved by the Committee on Accounts and Claims, the same to be accounted for at the end of each month by the order of the Mayor and City Clerk in the usual course; so that said Section as amended shall read as follows:

Sect. 4. No money shall be drawn out of the city treasury, except upon the written order of the mayor, addressed to the treasurer and countersigned by the city clerk, and numbered so as to correspond with the account or claim it shall be drawn to pay; and no account or claim against the city, arising from any contract or agreement for labor, or for the purchase or sale of any materials, goods, wares, or merchandise, in which any member of the board of aldermen or the mayor, or any officer or agent appointed by the board of aldermen or the mayor, has been directly or indirectly interested in a private capacity, shall be approved by any committee, nor shall any order therefor be drawn upon or paid by the city treasurer, unless such contract or agreement shall have been authorized or ratified by the board of aldermen; but such restriction shall not be construed to prevent the purchase of ordinary supplies from members of the board of aldermen or the mayor, who may be engaged in trade, nor the employment of the members of the board of aldermen or the mayor in their or his ordinary vocation, by duly authorized heads of departments. All checks shall be signed by the City Treasurer with the exception of those drawn for poor and Soldier's Aid, which shall be signed by the City Clerk, to whose account the City Treasurer shall at the beginning of each month transfer such funds as from time to time shall be approved by the Committee on Accounts and Claims, the same to be accounted for at the end of each month by the order of the Mayor and City Clerk in the usual course.

Sect. 2. This ordinance shall take effect January 1, 1930. Passed December 30, 1929.

RESOLUTIONS.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING A SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE AND REPORT UPON A POLICY WITH RESPECT TO THE AUDITORIUM.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the Mayor be and he hereby is authorized to appoint a committee consisting of himself, the Committee on Land and Buildings and three citizens not members of the Board of Aldermen who shall be authorized and directed to investigate and report to the full board the question of the future policy with respect to the Auditorium, the cost, desirability of repairs, alterations and new equipment. Said special committee shall have authority to obtain expert assistance in their investigation at the expense of the City.

Passed February 11, 1929.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING A SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE AND REPORT UPON REPAIRS TO THE CITY HALL.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the Mayor and Lands and Building Committee are hereby appointed a Special Committee to make a survey of the City Hall for the purpose of ascertaining and estimating what repairs and remodeling are necessary, if any, to facilitate the efficient handling of the city business. This committee shall render a report of its findings to the full board.

Passed February 11, 1929.

RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR A DISCOUNT ON TAXES.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That a discount of $1\frac{1}{2}\%$ shall be allowed on all taxes assessed for the year 1929, provided the bills are sent out on or before August 1st; and a discount of 1% provided the bills are sent out on or before September 1st. Said taxes to be paid within ten days from date of mailing and same to be stamped on bill.

Note.—The former amounts to an annual rate of $4\frac{1}{2}\%$, the latter amounts to an annual rate of 4%. The rates paid on the two loans during the present year have been 5.11% and 5.28% plus \$1.00 premium, which is, as can be seen, more than the discount which we propose be allowed to our own people. There is, however, additional expense in the Assessor's office and Tax Collector's office when discount is allowed that has to be taken into consideration.

Passed March 11, 1929.

RESOLUTION APPROPRIATING MONEY FOR THE PURCHASE OF THE PROP-ERTY OF IRVING T. CHESLEY ON WYMAN STREET.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the sum of Twelve Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$12,500) be and the same hereby is appropriated for the purchase of the property of Irving T. Chesley located on Wyman Street, subject to the payment of taxes assessed thereon for the year 1928; and that the assessors be authorized and requested upon the taking of title by the City to abate the said taxes.

Said sum to be charged to the appropriation for Roads and Bridges. Passed March 11, 1929.

Resolution appropriating money for permanent construction on the hopkinton road.

Whereas by resolution passed and approved April 9, 1928, appropriating the proceeds of one hundred and thirty thousand dollars of bonds of the City that day authorized, the sum of twenty thousand dollars was appropriated for the construction of a plant for the disposal of waste and garbage, and

Whereas, the project for which such appropriation was made has not been entered upon,

Be it Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the said appropriation of twenty thousand dollars be and the same is hereby rescinded, and that the said sum, or such sum as may have been authorized by the said resolution on April 9, 1928, for the purpose named, be appropriated and used for the construction of a reinforced concrete highway on the Hopkinton Road west of the junction of Pleasant and Warren Streets.

Passed March 29, 1929.

RESOLUTION FIXING AND DETERMINING THE AMOUNT OF MONEY TO BE RAISED FOR THE ENSUING FINANCIAL YEAR FOR THE USE OF THE CITY.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

SECTION 1. There shall be raised and there is hereby ordered to be raised on the polls and ratable estates within said city, the sum of three hundred forty-four thousand three hundred dollars (\$344,300) to defray the necessary expenses and charges of the city for the ensuing financial year, which, together with the sums which may be raised by taxes on railroads and from other sources, shall be appropriated as follows:

Sect. 2. There shall be raised, and there is hereby ordered to be raised a tax of three and 50–100 dollars (\$3.50) on each thousand dollars of the value of the ratable estates taxable within said city for the support of the public schools, which, together with the income of the Abial Walker fund, shall be appropriated and divided among the school districts according to the valuation thereof.

There shall also be raised a sum equal to two dollars (\$2) for each child residing in the city who was enrolled in the public schools in the last preceding school year.

Sect. 3. In addition to the foregoing there is appropriated for the cemeteries of the city one third of the income from the sale of lots and the income derived for the care of lots and grading, which sum shall be deposited by the superintendent, or others receiving them, in the city treasury. The care of lots for which the city holds trust funds shall be paid from the money appropriated for the care of cemeteries, and so much of the income of these trust funds as may be thus expended shall be deposited in the city treasury at the close of the year, and the remainder in each instance credited to the individual fund.

Sect. 4. In addition to the foregoing there is appropriated for the use of the Public Library the income derived from the Public Library Trust Funds.

Sect. 5. This resolution shall take effect upon its passage. Passed April 8, 1929.

RESOLUTION FIXING AND DETERMINING THE AMOUNT OF MONEY TO BE RAISED ON THE TAXABLE PROPERTY AND INHABITANTS WITHIN THE LIMITS OF THE SEWERAGE PRECINCT FOR THE ENSUING FINANCIAL YEAR.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. There shall be raised, and there is hereby ordered to be raised on the polls and ratable estates within the sewerage precinct

of said city, the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), to defray the necessary expenses and charges of said precinct for the ensuing financial year, which shall be appropriated as follows:

For the payment of interest that may become due on precinct bonds \$1,000.00

RESOLUTION CONCERNING ACQUISITION OF THE PENACOOK SCHOOL PROPERTY FROM UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the Mayor be authorized to request the Board of Education of the Union School District, acting under authority granted by the Union School District for the sale of the Penacook School property, to sell and convey the same to the said City of Concord for playground purposes for a nominal consideration.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUE OF THIRTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOL-LARS IN BONDS FOR AN ADDITION TO THE MORRILL SCHOOL OF MECHANIC ARTS.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. That for the purpose of paying for the erection, original equipment and furnishing of an addition to the Morrill School of Mechanic Arts on Rumford Street, the City borrow the sum of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000.) in accordance with the request and upon the terms contained in the vote of the Union School District passed at its annual meeting held April 4, 1929, and upon condition that the Board of Education enter into a contract with the City in accordance with the terms of said vote. The said bonds shall be thirty-five (35) in number and of the denomination of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.) each, shall be dated September 1, 1929, and shall be made payable to bearer with interest coupons attached bearing interest at a rate not to exceed four and one-half $(4\frac{1}{2})$ per centum per annum payable semi-annually on the first day of March and the first day of September in each year. The said bonds shall become due and payable serially, three thousand dollars (\$3,000.) to be payable on the first day of September, 1930, and two thousand dollars (\$2,000.) annually on the first day of September of each succeeding year until and including the first day of September, 1946. The principal of said bonds and the interest coupons attached shall be made payable at the National Shawmut Bank of Boston, Massachusetts, or at the office of the City Treasurer in Concord, New Hampshire, at the option of the holder.

Sect. 2. The City Treasurer is hereby authorized to procure propositions for the sale of the bonds hereby authorized, and whichever bid seems for the best interest of the City shall be accepted by him, provided the same is approved by the finance committee of this Board. The right is reserved, however, to reject any or all bids.

Sect. 3. The Mayor and the City Treasurer are authorized to execute in the name and behalf of the City such agreements in writing between it and the said District as they may deem necessary and advisable to protect the rights of the respective parties growing out of this transaction.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUE OF SEVENTY-TWO THOUSAND DOL-LARS WATER WORKS BONDS.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That a certain highway in the City of Concord known as the Old Dunbarton Road, and described as follows,—Beginning at the end of the Old Dunbarton Road as heretofore discontinued at a point marked C on the plan filed with the petition for discontinuance and extending Westerly a distance of thirteen hundred forty (1340) feet more or less to the Northerly line of the Stickney Hill Road, at a point marked D on said plan,—is hereby discontinued so far as the power of the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of said City of Concord extends,—and that a petition for said discontinuance be made forthwith to the Superior Court for Merrimack County for the consent of the Court thereto,—said proceedings to be at the cost and expense of St. Paul's School, and the Mayor of said City is authorized to sign said petition in the name of the City of Concord.

RESOLUTION RELATING TO THE DISCONTINUANCE OF A CERTAIN HIGHWAY KNOWN AS THE DOLE ROAD, IN SAID CONCORD.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That a certain highway in the City of Concord known as the Dole Road and described as follows,—Beginning at the Northerly line of Stickney Hill Road at a point marked A on the plan filed with the petition for discontinuance and running Northerly thirty four hundred fifty (3450) feet, more or less, to the Southerly line of the Hopkinton Road at a point marked B on said plan,—is hereby discontinued so far as the power of the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of said City of Concord extends,—and that a petition for said discontinuance be made forthwith to the Superior Court for Merrimack County for the consent of the Court thereto,—said proceedings to be at the cost and expense of St. Paul's School, and the Mayor of said City is authorized to sign said petition in the name of the City of Concord.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING CERTAIN PERMANENT IMPROVEMENTS IN THE CITY HALL AND AUDITORIUM.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS.

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

We are ealling your attention to the report of our superintendent, Mr. Percy R. Sanders, showing eash receipts and expenditures for the year 1929, and also statement of the bonded indebtedness showing the amount of bonds outstanding due on various dates from January 1, 1930, to July 1, 1947, amounting to \$216,000. The report reviews in detail extensions made during the year, and also during the year there was considerable new pipe line laid in Penacook to replace the old cement lined pipe, showing that 5,380 feet of new pipe was laid to replace the old.

The large expenditure of the year was the cost of extending the city water service to East Concord, amounting to \$56,438.41. While the revenue from the service extended to East Concord pays a small percentage in income on the cost of the extension, under the present conditions the Board felt that this difference could be absorbed in the income received in rentals from the water takers in the central part of the city. The extension of the water service to the residents of East Concord is very much appreciated by them, and ultimately it will have the effect of increasing the taxable value of the property in that section of the city. We consider that our superintendent did a very splendid job in laying the East Concord extension, keeping well within the appropriation, as the total cost of the extension was considerably less than the estimated budget.

While the expense of the extensions to the Plains, or Concord Heights, and East Concord are behind us, the Board has discussed for several years ways and means and the cost of more efficient high water service to that section of our city comprising Auburn Street, Ridge Road and the new development on the heights west of Auburn Street known as Rum Hill. We have had before us several plans for bettering the high service in these localities, and, while

we feel the importance of a high pressure system in this section of the city, we realize that it is going to mean the expenditure of quite substantial amounts. In due course this whole matter will have the careful consideration of the Water Board.

The budget for the year 1930 calls for the expenditure of substantial amounts in relaying old cement lined pipe and also in extending the city water service at Concord Heights down the South Pembroke Road to the airport and to a group of houses to the south of the airport and adjacent to the new city dump. This extension calls for the laying of about 4,100 feet of pipe.

The financial year 1929 closed satisfactorily with good working balances on hand somewhat in excess of former years, due partly to the bond issue of last year, but the excess balances carried forward will enable us to carry out some additional work needed to be done in various parts of the city during 1930.

Eighty-four new services have been laid consisting of 2,012 feet of 3₄-inch; 10 feet of 1-inch; 56 feet of 2-inch and 25 feet of 3-inch pipe; in Snow Street, Concord Manor, twenty-one services were connected to the 6-inch main of which four were relaid with 103 feet of 3₄-inch pipe and from seventeen, 401 feet of 1-inch were added to the service pipes.

Seventeen services were discontinued of which eight were replaced by new ones and nine discontinued permanently. Eighty-two services were relaid and curb valves placed on fifty-five old services.

Ninety new meters have been set and six have been discontinued.

Ninety-one service pipes were laid; three of these have not yet been connected to house.

Length of service pipes: 2,226 feet of ¾-inch; 36 feet of 1-inch; 28 feet of 4-inch; 21 feet of 6-inch; total, 2,311 feet. Eighty-four meters were set.

Considerably more than the usual amount of work has been done this year in relaying and extending the system.

In South Main Street, the 4-inch main laid in 1894 has been replaced by a 6-inch line which has been further reinforced by the extension of a section of 8-inch pipe in Broadway from Rockingham to Wiggin which connects with the South Main Street pipe. Four hydrants have been set below Wiggin Street.

In Penacook, a three-year program has been commenced to relay the cement-lined pipe laid in 1887. In Main Street, the 12-inch cement-lined main was replaced by the same size of cast iron. In High Street, the 6-inch main was replaced by 10-inch. All services were relaid at the same time.

The high service system has been extended to East Concord in accordance with plans drawn up by Metcalf and Eddy, the cost of which is given in this report.

At the Merrimack River, the crossing was made on steel work built onto the east side of the bridge. A box, two feet inside measurement, was built around the pipe and the whole space filled with coarse granulated cork, similar to the crossing on Bridge Street.

A 100,000-gallon water tower was erected on a lot purchased from Mrs. Ross W. Cate on Shawmut Street, the purchase price of the lot being \$500. Bids for the tank were called for from the Chicago Bridge & Iron Works and the Pittsburgh-Des Moines Steel Co.; the bid of the Chicago Bridge & Iron Works being \$12,650, and of the Pittsburgh-Des Moines Co., \$13,100 above the foundation. The bid of the Chicago Bridge & Iron Works was accepted and the tank was erected in accordance with the plans and specifications.

Bids for the foundation piers were called for from local contractors, and the bid of W. G. Elliott at \$910 was accepted.

The flow line of this tank has been placed at the same level as the high water mark in the high service reservoir, and is 155 feet above the top of the foundation.

The purpose of this tank is to hold in readiness for East Concord a greater amount of water in case of fire than could be supplied by a long line of 8-inch pipe; also in case of any break on this line, the East Concord residents can be supplied with water until the break is repaired.

Hydrants were located approximately 500 feet apart through the thickly settled part of the village.

All the construction work, with the exception of the bridge crossing and tower erection, was done by this department.

The electrically-driven centrifugal pumps are in good condition and are operated alternately. The average amount pumped daily for 1929 was 1,131,099 gallons, measured by the Venturi meter. At the present time, the use in the Plains District averages 6,500 gallons daily, and in East Concord District, 8,000 gallons.

The reservoir was cleaned early in the spring. Aside from the usual growth on the bottom of all ponds and

reservoirs, there was nothing objectionable found. In order to do this work, the reservoir was out of commission about seven hours; during this time, the pressure was kept up by pumping directly into the mains.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER.

To the Board of Aldermen:

In accordance with the requirements of the city ordinance, I herewith submit for your consideration the report of the Fire Department for the year 1929.

The department responded to 91 bell alarms and 433 still alarms.

In addition one fire, entailing loss, occurred for which no alarm was given.

This report will be found to contain statements in detail embracing the amount of expenditures, and a complete roll of the department with residence and occupation of each member.

The number of alarms responded to exceeded all previous records, accompanied by increase in loss over that of the preceding year.

It is saddening to note that notwithstanding the admonitions emanating from the press of the nation and fire department officials, the literature disseminated by the National Board of Underwriters, the observation of fire prevention

week throughout the country, the element of carelessness remains predominant.

Among fires resulting from carelessness during the year in this city may be cited the following causes:

Use of gasoline to accelerate fire in kitchen stove.

Cleansing clothing with gasoline with open flame in same room.

Children given free access to matches.

Throwing cigarette stubs wherever most convenient. Storing oily rags and greasy overalls, inviting spontaneous combustion.

Neglected chimneys.

To the loss sustained through fires from these causes throughout the country must be added the loss by unavoidable and incendiary fires.

Small wonder that from four to five hundred millions of dollars worth of property goes up in smoke annually, not to mention loss of life.

For the second consecutive year the department report is marred by fatalities.

The fire at Rumford Avenue, August 16, resulted in the loss of six human lives. One death resulted from the Durgin Lane fire November 30.

The apparatus, in the main, is in good condition but the combination ear at West Concord, the fire alarm repair truck and the Chief's car must perforce be replaced in the near future.

The fire alarm systems in the Precinct and at Penacook are working in a satisfactory manner. Repairs have been attended to as needed.

One public and one private box was installed during the year.

There are several petitions for boxes awaiting action of your honorable body.

I respectfully recommend the purchase of two thousand feet of hose and the addition of at least one man to the permanent force.

During the month of October I was privileged by your

honorable body to attend the Convention of the International Association of Fire Chiefs held at Birmingham, Ala., a report of which I rendered at that time. I am deeply appreciative of the favor conferred and wish again to return my thanks for the opportunity afforded me to learn.

The apparatus and force of the department is as follows: Precinct, located at the Central Fire Station, one 750-gallon Ahrens-Fox motor-driven combination pumping engine and hose car, attached to Eagle Steam Fire Engine Company (15 men); one second-class Amoskeag engine, "Kearsarge," and auto-combination car, attached to the Kearsarge Steam Fire Engine Company (14 men); one motor-driven combination pumping engine and hose car in charge of Combination Company No. 1; one motor-driven ladder truck, "City of Concord," attached to Hook and Ladder Company (21 men); one Reo fire alarm repair truck; one Chief's car, one house man at Central Station.

The Alert Hose Company (11 men), located on Washington Street, has an auto-combination car, with permanent man.

The Good Will Hose Company (11 men), located on the corner of Concord and South State Streets, has an autocombination car, with a permanent man.

Veterans' Auxiliary Company (30 men).

3 wagons and one ladder truck in reserve.

The "Pioneer" Engine Company, No. 3 (28 men), at Penacook, has a third-class Metropolitan engine, one motor-driven hose wagon and one motor-driven combination pumping engine and hose car with 2 permanent men.

The Cataract Company (30 men), at West Concord, has a modern hose wagon and auto-combination car with permanent man.

Old Fort (30 men), East Concord, has a motor-driven combination pumping engine and hose car, and one hand-drawn chemical engine, 50-gallon, single tank, and hand-drawn ladder truck.

Engine Company No. 5 (30 men), located on the Loudon Road, has a motor-driven combination car.

REPORT OF THE ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT.

CONCORD, N. H., December 31, 1929.

To the Board of Mayor and Aldermen:

Gentlemen: Herewith is submitted the thirty-seventh annual report of the Engineering Department.

An itemized account of all work and expenditures is kept on a card system, which we will be pleased to show and explain to all interested parties.

Fifty-three plans and 2,684 blue prints were made; 12,217 feet of grade stakes were set; 600 transfers of property were recorded; 0.506 miles of streets were laid out in 1929, bringing the total mileage of streets and roads in the entire city up to 178.171 miles.

The deed book of Blossom Hill Cemetery showing transfers of lots was brought up to January 1, 1930.

The work done under the supervision of this office is: general engineering, construction and maintenance of sewers, building inspection, plumbing inspection and examining of plumbers.

An interesting fact is, that out of every dollar raised by taxation, only \$0.0087 of it is used for the maintenance of the Engineering Department, and we are closing the year with an unexpended balance of \$0.53.

It would take up too much space to outline in detail the amount of work done in this office, but I assure you we have been busy handling the work assigned us by your government, heads of departments and citizens, which we trust has met with their approval.

The employees of this department have been: Edward E. Beane, assistant engineer; C. Fred Moulton and Paul Chattock, rodmen, and Frances Richardson, clerk, all of whom have rendered valuable service to the city.

For the support and co-operation of your Board, the heads of departments and citizens of the city, I wish to express my appreciation.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF STREETS.

To the Board of Public Works:

I have the honor to submit herewith my annual report for the year ending December 31, 1929.

The work of the department embraces the construction and maintenance of streets; the collection of garbage; the construction of sidewalks and bridges and the care of trees.

In the superintendent's office a complete record of all purchases, expenditures and detailed costs are maintained for reference.

FINANCE.

The funds for work in this department are received from the annual budget and a bond issue for the construction of bridges and concrete roads.

Construction.

Curb reset, paving blocks relaid and grouted with cement on Pleasant Street extension.

Concrete curb constructed on Main Street, Ward 1, to conform to new grade of street which will be repaired another year.

Hopkinton trunk line from junction of Warren and Pleasant Streets to Concord-Hopkinton town line completed with

concrete, the state and St. Paul's School paying a part of the expense.

Bridge No. 20 over Hackett Brook and bridges on Abbott and Sewells Falls Road built with reinforced concrete.

Bridge over Soucook River at the Concord-Pembroke town line rebuilt with reinforced concrete, the state and town of Pembroke paying their share of the total expense.

Graded roadway and laid Topeka pavement at new High School.

Corrugated iron pipe laid to replace broken tile and stone culverts.

Concrete and tar sidewalks and driveways laid in various parts of the city.

MAINTENANCE.

Trunklines.—Roadways on trunk lines patched, shoulders graded and tarred, sight lines improved, the state paying one half the cost.

Bridges.—Floor system of Lower bridge over the Merrimack River was repaired. While I feel that all recommendations should be made to the board in regular meeting, the condition of this floor system is such that, in my judgment, a new floor should be constructed or new bridge built at the earliest possible moment.

Completed the replanking and laying of traffic treads upon bridge over the Merrimack River on Bridge Street.

Constructed bridge on road from River Road to Island over outlet from Contoocook River.

A gas roller was added to our equipment the past year.

Grading.—Roads have been graded, road machines run, bushes cut and guard rails built on outlying roads.

Wages.—The same rate of wages for labor, trucks and teams was maintained as last year.

Bituminous Surface.—The open winter caused some of our streets to break up so that another application was necessary, thus following our policy of improving our graded streets with surface applications of tar and asphalt.

Garage and Stables.—One Chevrolet sedan was added to our equipment. A number of our trucks having come to a place where it does not pay to have them repaired, and the loss of our tractor in being demolished by train at East Concord, has made it necessary to hire trucks and tractors.

Our horses are all in good condition, and no changes have been made.

Snow Removal.—Snow removal was taken care of as in the past years, the city being divided into fourteen truck, fourteen sidewalk, and two tractor sections.

The business section was cleaned with trucks and teams by hand labor.

Cleaning Streets.—The motor-driven flusher was used with the help of hand sweeping.

Garbage.—The contract of Mr. Holt for the collection of table garbage has been continued and, as in former years, ashes and rubbish have been collected with our own forces.

Land that was bought on the Plains for the disposal of refuse has been fenced in part.

Trees.—We did not set out as many trees this year on account of the large number of stumps to be removed, but plan to make up for this next year. The cleaning of land and the planting of seedlings was continued.

Trees were taken down, trimmed and moth nests removed.

General.—Swimming hole at Soucook River, hockey rink and toboggan chutes built under direction of Mr. Kennedy of the Playground Committee.

Town line signs have been placed on lines of adjoining towns.

The reservoir in Court House yard was filled up on recommendation of the chief of the Fire Department.

Coasting and parking signs were made and painted for the Police Department.

Sand has been used on hills in the winter months, complying with demands from our people.

Road closed signs have been placed on fifteen roads which in our opinion are unfit for travel.

Land was purchased of I. T. Chesley, thus giving us a good supply of gravel for a number of years.

I acknowlege my appreciation of the help given by Mayor Brown, members of the board and employees of the department.

REPORT OF THE SEWER DEPARTMENT.

CONCORD, N. H., December 31, 1929.

To the Board of Public Works:

Gentlemen: The nineteenth annual report to your board, showing work done under the supervision of the Engineering Department, for the year is herewith submitted.

Sewers were constructed in the following streets:

Seventy-eight catch basins were built and connected; 32 manholes were built other than those on construction jobs.

There were 74 private pipe plugs and 33 main line plugs which were immediately removed.

Every sewer and eatch basin that was granted has been completed.

A detailed account of every job, bill, etc., is kept in this office.

The department has three Chevrolet trucks and one Sullivan Air Compressor, and a complete equipment of tools, all of which are in excellent condition. The two department sheds were painted and cement concrete floors laid. The yard has been covered with crushed stone. A coal tar sidewalk has been laid across the entire length of the property on Pleasant Street. An addition of two stalls was made to the heated garage.

The department maintains 53.643 miles of main sewers,

approximately 4,000 house connections and 1,400 catch basins.

For every dollar collected by taxation only two cents of it is expended by the Sewer Department for construction, repairs and maintenance of the sewer systems of the entire city, as well as the maintenance of all property, trucks and equipment.

Our regular employees of the department have been: William H. Murphy, foreman; Joseph Morgan, Richard Morrill, James J. Berryman and Wilbur Kendall, assistant foremen. With the exception of Joseph Morgan, who died July 23rd this year, after a brief illness, the personnel of the department is as above stated. These men are skilled workmen, and as long as they are employed you may feel assured that the sewers will be well taken care of.

During 1929 there were installed electric street lights as follows: 5—200 C.P.; 40—60 C.P.; making the total number of lights in operation December 31, 1929, as follows: 143—600 C.P.; 209—200 C.P.; 566—60 C.P.; 549—40 C.P.

The funds available for the construction of a new library are approximately \$133,500. On the debt created for the purchase of the Armenia White property, there has been paid in 1929 the sum of \$7,500, leaving still due a balance of \$22,500 which, as you will recall, is being liquidated at the rate of \$7,500 a year.

REPORT OF THE CITY LIBRARIAN FOR 1929.

To the Board of Trustees of the Concord Public Library:

Gentlemen: There has occurred but little to make this annual report differ from the preceding one. We have met with a slight decrease in the number of books given out, but desk circulation is a matter of fluctuating gains and losses, and 1930 may swing us back to a higher figure. It should be borne in mind, however, that a growing number of circulating libraries in town threaten our patronage.

Though the 1929 count of volumes loaned was 88,833, about 1350 less than in the foregoing twelvemonth, on the other hand, the worth-while reference room attended to 650 more inquirers than went there for information in 1928. There is a wide range in their questions; this person, making a fancy costume, wants to know how a puritan child's cap was tied in the back; another, has been told to find out how smoke is weighed; a third patron needs material for a debate: "Resolved, That a Christian should not vote."

Our expense account for 1929 ran along its usual lines; the items of outlay were as follows:

As regards the gain to our shelves:

We have bought 1,001 volumes.

We have had given 44 volumes.

We have had bound 25 volumes.

We discarded, because they were worn out or outdated, 411 volumes. The resulting net increase of 639 brings the number of volumes now in the Library to 38,782.

Our most important purchase was the new fourteenth edition of the Encyclopaedia Britannica. The bulletin board notice, advertising that we had this set, led a very small boy to ask if he could "take it out." It was his first call at the Library. Which would have been happier, he or we, if we had had a children's room to lead him to!

For fifteen years we had not taken a registration of borrowers; our list of the same had become very incorrect, owing to deaths and removals from town; therefore, on May 1st, we undertook its revision. Parenthetically we appreciated having a 1929 City Directory to refer to. New borrowers were 737, a somewhat larger number than the ordinary annual influx.

In Ward 3 some of the residents, especially the Rev. and Mrs. Franklin Thompson and Mrs. Levin Chase, have interested their community to fit up a library room where books and magazines can be seen and taken out. It is centrally located, is open two afternoons a week and has had a flood of patronage. This Library congratulates the West Concord people upon their enterprise and will gladly coöperate in all ways feasible. We have made a loan to this new room of 80 volumes which have circulated 200 times. Those instrumental in starting the good work hope the West Concord children in particular will benefit from having a reading-place to resort to.

It is hoped that during 1930 there can be something similar done for Penacook, whereby there may be a supply of books handy for Ward 1 borrowers.

Annoyance from misbehaving school pupils of the higher grades was a feature of our autumn, and Halloween saw the signs relating to opening hours and to dogs torn from the outside doors; the printed notices are continually being walked off with, but this time their frames were broken and thrown away. Three novels displayed on our new book rack have recently been stolen—a mighty mean thing for

anybody to do, as it deprives other persons of their rightful supply of fresh publications to look over.

During 1929 we have continued to send books to schools whenever asked to do so by the teacher. Several hundred volumes have been loaned to the Parker, Dewey, South End and Iron Works schools. We observed Book Week, in November, to the best of our ability. For the several church-reading contests going on briskly, we aim to buy freely the books on their lists. But all these are minor happenings, a matter-of-course in a present-day library. There was, last summer, the large issue, concerning the sale of some of our lot of land, but that is a subject extraneous to the report of the librarian.

In September the New Hampshire Library Association met in Concord very successfully, having a three-day program.

We miss today Mr. W. W. Flint, who for 44 years was trustee from Ward 7, but who ceased automatically to hold that position upon his moving into the city proper last fall. Mr. Flint was clerk of your Board for 37 years, and his minutes of proceedings were models in penmanship, in conciseness and clearness of expression. His long and sincere interest in the Library's welfare led him to an attendance at your meetings which no blizzard was allowed to prevent, and also to a more laborious clerical service when any crisis in the Library's history necessitated the tactful and convincing and persuasive writing of documents to go to the "powers that be."

REPORT OF SEALER OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

Covering Period January 1, 1929, to January 1, 1930.

To His Honor Robert W. Brown, Mayor, and the Board of Aldermen:

During the past year there were six hundred and thirtysix (636) scales tested which were found correct and were sealed, two hundred and eighty-three (283) were adjusted before being sealed, nine (9) were confiscated and sixteen (16) condemned for repairs which were later reinspected and sealed.

There were one thousand, five hundred and eighty (1,580) weights tested which were found correct and were sealed, one (1) adjusted before being sealed and ten (10) confiscated.

One thousand, two hundred and ninety-four (1,294) liquid measures were tested, found correct and were sealed, ten (10) adjusted before being sealed, and nine (9) confiscated. Six dry measures were tested and sealed.

There were four hundred and seventy-one (471) tests of gasoline pumps made, three hundred and sixty-seven (367) of which were found correct and were sealed, ninety-seven (97) were adjusted before being sealed, two (2) condemned for further use, and five (5) condemned for repairs which were later reinspected and sealed.

Two thousand, three hundred and forty-six (2,346) reweighings were made of commodities put up in advance of sale, two thousand two hundred and eighty-eight (2,288) of which were correct, eighteen (18) over and forty (40) under weight.

Four loads of coal in the process of delivery were reweighed, and found to be correct. There were measured twenty-five (25) cart bodies used in the delivery of wood which were found to be in accordance with the law. Two coal bins were measured and contents estimated for private individuals.

As of December 31, 1929.

There was only one change in the litigated cases to which the city was a party, as compared with one year previous. During the year the Superior Court made a decree confirming the discontinuance of the bridge across the Soucook River on the old Daniel Webster Highway. There is still pending, however, the petition for the assessment of land damages for the discontinuance.

During the year the solicitor has attended to at least the usual volume of the ordinary business of the office, having to do with advice and assistance to various city officials and other officers of the City Government. The solicitor has been freely called upon, as he desires to be, and has attempted to give effective assistance wherever desired.

A part of the solicitor's business is attending to the passing of all deeds to which the city is a party, and examination of all titles to real estate to be acquired by the city. The volume of this work in 1929 was considerably more than common.

REPORT OF THE PARK COMMISSIONERS.

To the Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

In addition to the regular routine work of maintaining the city parks, the fence along the north side of Rollins Park has been carried to the western boundary and another section of fence has been added to the White Park line on White Street.

The Memorial Arch on Main Street was turned over to the care of the Park Commission, and the intersection of Center and Washington Streets was cleared and planted to shrubbery.

The West Garden was overhauled and new evergreens and shrubs were set out, adding much to the effect.

The collection of water fowl at White Park has been a source of great appreciation, and has considerably increased in numbers. More ducks are to be added to the Rollins Park collection.

Of the several deer that have occupied the deer enclosure only one now remains, the others having died or are a.w.o.l. If any more deer are to be secured the fence will need substantial repairs.

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
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
