MUNICIPAL REGULATIONS

FOR PAYMENT OF BILLS AGAINST THE CITY

All persons furnishing materials or service for the city, or aid to the city poor, should be particular to take the name of the person ordering such service, material, or aid, and should *know* that the person is duly authorized to contract such liability.

The city will not be holden for merchandise sold or delivered on city poor account, except on the written order of the overseer of the poor, and for no longer time than until his successor shall have been appointed and qualified.

Duplicate copies will be required of all bills payable by the city, furnished on county poor account.

All bills against the city must be approved by the person authorizing the charge; and unless this is done, no action can be had upon the bill by the Committee on Accounts and Claims, and no order will be given for its payment.

Bills so certified should be left with the city clerk on or before the second day of the month.

If approved by the Committee on Accounts and Claims, they will be ready for payment on Thursday following the regular monthly meeting of the city government.

The regular monthly meetings of the city government occur on the second Monday of each month.

ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS

PASSED DURING THE YEAR ENDING JANUARY 19, 1934.

AN ORDINANCE IN AMENDMENT OF SECTION 3, CHAPTER 13 OF THE REVISED ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF CONCORD.

Be it ordained by the Board of Alderman of the City of Concord, as follows:

1. That Section 3 of Chapter 13 of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Concord be amended by striking out the whole of said section and substituting the following:

"The sanitary officer shall perform the duties imposed upon him by virtue of his office, and shall serve all orders and notices, and enforce all rules and regulations issued by the board of alderman or the board of health, and enforce all ordinances and rules relating to nuisances or other conditions affecting the health and comfort of the public."

2. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER XLIII OF THE REVISED ORDINANCES RELATING TO SALARIES.

Be it ordained by the Board of Alderman of the City of Concord, as follows:

That chapter XLIII of the Revised Ordinances be amended by adding thereto the following sections:

SECTION 2. All salaries in excess of one thousand dollars shall be reduced by ten per cent for one year following the passage of this ordinance, except that no salary now in excess of one thousand dollars per annum shall be reduced to less than one thousand dollars.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall take effect as of April 15, 1933.

Passed April 10, 1933.

AN ORDINANCE IN AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER THIRTY-SIX OF THE REVISED ORDINANCES.

Be it ordained by the Board of Alderman of the City of Concord, as follows:

SECTION 1. Amend Chapter thirty-six of the Revised Ordinances by striking out sections two and five thereof and renumbering the remaining sections in order from one to four.

SECT. 2. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

AN ORDINANCE IN AMENDMENT OF SECTION 2, CHAPTER 35 OF THE REVISED ORDINANCES RELATING TO STANDING COMMITTEES.

Be it ordained by the Board of Alderman of the City of Concord, as follows:

SECTION 1. Amend Section 2, Chapter 35 of the Revised Ordinances by striking out the whole thereof and substituting the following:

"SECT. 2. At the commencement of each municipal term, there shall be appointed by the Mayor, subject to the approval of the Board of Aldermen, the following standing committees of the Board of Aldermen: A committee on Finance, consisting of the Mayor and four members of the Board of Aldermen, of which the Mayor shall be Chairman, and a Committee on Accounts and Claims, A Committee on Fire Department, a Committee on Lands and Buildings, a Committee on Bills, second reading, a Committee on Elections and Returns, a Committee on Engrossed Ordinances, a Committee on Police and License, and a Committee on Public Instruction, each to consist of four members of the Board of Aldermen. The first named member of each committee shall be the chairman of such committee. Said committee shall perform the duties heretofore performed by similar committees of the City Council and Board of Mayor and Alderman.

SECT. 2. This ordinance shall take effect January 23, 1934.

RESOLUTIONS

RESOLUTION DONATING THE SUM OF TWENTY-FIVE DOLLARS OUT OF THE INCOME FROM THE DAVID OSGOOD TRUST.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

SECTION 1. That the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) be hereby donated out of the income from the David Osgood Trust, to the poor children of the French Parochial School, who are inhabitants of the City of Concord, for the purpose of buying school books for said children.

SECTION 2. That said sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) be paid to and expended under the direction of the principal of said school.

Section 3. This resolution shall take effect upon its passage. Passed February 13, 1933.

RESOLUTION REGARDING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A COMMERCIAL RADIO STATION IN THE CITY OF CONCORD.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Considering that a radio broadcasting station under capable experienced management and operation would be an asset to the City of Concord; would supply a radio service of great regional value and interest which is not available at the present time in Concord; would provide an additional means of utilizing and developing local artistic talent; would serve the business interest of this city by providing a powerful publicity medium regularly reaching some 150,000 listeners in central New Hampshire; and would become an important medium of diffusing official Municipal and State bulletins, public information and instruction, and educational programs through gratis cooperation of the radio station on prescribed schedule; be it hereby

Resolved that the proposed building, installing and operating of a broadcasting station in Concord on 250 watts output during daylight hours be approved and encouraged as a project of public interest, convenience and necessity. And be it further

Resolved that by extending its hours of operation until 8:00 P. M., E. S. T. at least one night weekly the public value of this station as the voice of the Capitol, by reaching more people over a greater area during these early evening hours, would be greatly augmented, and is therefore desirable.

Passed March 13, 1933.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY SOLICITOR TO FILE A COM-PLAINT IN THE NAME OF THE CITY OF CONCORD WITH THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION AGAINST THE NEW ENGLAND TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH CO.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Whereas it appears that the tariffs charged by the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company for hand sets, so called, and for extension telephones and cords are unreasonable, unjust and excessive,

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the City Solicitor be and hereby is authorized to negotiate with the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company with a view to obtaining a decrease in said tariffs, and file a complaint in the name of the City with the Public Service Commission against the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company for the purpose of obtaining an adjustment of said tariffs, in this State.

Passed April 10, 1933.

RESOLUTION APPROPRIATING MONEY FOR WORK RELIEF.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.) be, and hereby is appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated for work relief the same to be deducted

from the appropriation for City Poor the amount to be supplemented with funds received from R. F. C.

The said sum to be expended under the direction of the Overseers of the Poor and for persons receiving City aid.

Passed April 10, 1933.

RESOLUTION RELATING TO SALARIES OF MUNICIPAL OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen be instructed to communicate to the Board of Public Works and all subordinate boards and committees of the City of Concord, the passage of an ordinance reducing the salaries of Municipal Employees ten per cent, and request that they take such action as may be necessary to effect a reduction in the salaries and wages of all employees, except those who receive less than one thousand dollars per annum on an annual employment basis and not to reduce any salaries now in excess of one thousand dollars to less than one thousand dollars per annum.

Passed April 10, 1933.

RESOLUTION APPROVING AN ORDER OF THE FIRE BOARD.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Whereas the Fire Board, in its efforts to strengthen the department, and bring it to the highest possible degree of efficiency, at the least possible cost to the City find it necessary to make certain changes, and

Whereas engine companies number three, five, seven and eight are paid a specified sum to be divided among the members as the companies shall direct, and Whereas some of the companies were allowing the number of members in the company to drop to the minimum requirements and

Whereas at a meeting of the Fire Board held January 5, 1933 it was voted: "That effective February 1, 1933, Engine Co. number three shall consist of two permanent and thirty (30) call men, Engine Company number five (5) shall consist of thirty (30) men, Engine Company seven shall consist of thirty (30) men and Engine Company number eight shall consist of thirty (30) men, now therefore be it

Resolved by the Board of Alderman of the City of Concord, as follows: That the above action taken by the Fire Board is hereby confirmed by this Board.

Passed April 28, 1933.

RESOLUTION IN RELATION TO A DISCOUNT ON TAXES.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

SEC. 1. That a discount equal to the rate of five per cent per annum be allowed on all taxes assessed for the year 1933 which are paid on or before June 1, 1933.

SEC. 2. This resolution shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed May 8, 1933.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO DEED THE ALERT HOUSE LOT LAND.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the Mayor is hereby authorized to deed to Mrs. E. M. Silver in behalf of the City of Concord a lot of land on Washington Street, known as the Alert House Lot Land, for a consideration of one dollar.

Passed May 8, 1933.

RESOLUTION FIXING AND DETERMINING THE AMOUNT OF MONEY TO BE RAISED ON THE TAXABLE PROPERTY AND INHABITANTS WITHIN THE LIMITS OF THE SEWERAGE PRECINCT FOR THE ENSUING FINANCIAL YEAR.

Resolved by the Board of Alderman of the City of Concord, as follows:

SECTION 1. There shall be raised, and there is hereby ordered to be raised on the polls and ratable estates within the sewerage precinct of said City, the sum of thirty-four hundred and fifty dollars (\$3,450.) to defray the necessary expenses and charges of said precinct for the ensuing financial year which shall be appropriated as follows:

For the payment of bonds,

\$2,500.00

For the payment of interest that may become due on precinct bonds,

950.00

SECT. 2. This resolution shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed May 8, 1933.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY SOLICITOR TO FILE A PETITION WITH THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION RELATIVE TO THE SAFETY OF THE RAILROAD BRIDGE ON WATER STREET.

Resolved by the Board of Alderman of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the City Solicitor be and hereby is authorized to file a petition with the Public Service Commission setting forth that the present bridge crossing the railroad on Water Street is inadequate, unsafe, and dangerous to public travel, and that the Commission order the construction by the Boston & Maine Railroad of a proper crossing.

Passed May 22, 1933.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE SALE OF THE CORNING FLATS, SO-CALLED, AND THE EXECUTION OF A TRUST AGREEMENT WITH FRED A. EMERTON.

Resolved by the Board of Alderman of the City of Concord, as follows:

Whereas, on the fifteenth day of April, 1925, the City of Concord, New Hampshire, a municipal corporation, entered into

a lease with Margaret Sullivan and Fred A. Emerton by the terms of which the said Sullivan and Emerton became the lessees of the so-called Corning Flats at 54 Pleasant Street, Concord, New Hampshire, for the terms of their natural lives, and the life of the survivor; the lessees paying therefore (1) as rent the sum of one dollar per year, (2) paying for all necessary repairs, (3) protection of the premises from loss by fire through insurance in the sum of not less than twelve thousand dollars for the benefit of the City of Concord; and

Whereas, the said Margaret Sullivan has deceased and the said Fred A. Emerton is the sole lessee of the said premises: and

Whereas, on the tenth day of April, 1926, an agreement was entered into by and between Carl H. Foster, Nathaniel E. Martin and Harry H. Dudley, then Trustees of Trust Funds for the City of Concord and in behalf of the said City of Concord, with the Roman Catholic Bishop of Manchester, a corporation sole, by the terms of which the said City of Concord agreed to sell to the said Roman Catholic Bishop of Manchester, New Hampshire, for the sum of fifteen thousand dollars the so-called Corning Flats above mentioned, and upon the further agreement that the City of Concord would deed said premises to the said Roman Catholic Bishop of Manchester, New Hampshire, as soon as the said Fred A. Emerton should cease to have any interest therein: and

Whereas, the said Fred A. Emerton has expressed himself in writing as being desirous of releasing any interest he may have in said premises and has agreed to execute any release or agreement that may be necessary in connection therewith upon consideration that he shall receive, during the remainder of his natural life, the income from the said fifteen thousand dollars to be paid to the Trustees of said Trust Funds of the City of Concord by the said Roman Catholic Bishop of Manchester:

Now, therefore, be it resolved:

(1) That the Mayor be and hereby is authorized to execute in the name of the City of Concord a quitclaim deed in behalf of the City of Concord for the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.) to the Roman Catholic Bishop of Manchester, a corporation sole, to a certain tract of land, situated in said Concord, with the three apartment house thereon, known as No. 54 Pleasant Street, bounded and described as follows:

"Beginning at a drill hole in a stone post on the northerly line of Pleasant Street, said point being 428 feet easterly of the southwesterly corner of land of Charles R. Corning Estate; thence northerly 157.7 feet to a stake: thence westerly 27 feet to the westerly line of said Corning land; thence southerly by said westerly line 160 feet to said street; thence easterly 47.8 feet to the bound begun at. Reserving for the use of the occupants of other portions of the land of the said Corning Estate the use of the driveway on the easterly side of said apartment house."

and cause to be transferred to the Trustees of Trust Funds of the City of Concord the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.).

(2) That the Trustees of Trust Funds of the City of Concord be and hereby are authorized to execute, with the Mayor, in the name of the City of Concord a trust agreement with the said Fred A. Emerton in which they shall agree to hold for the benefit of the said Fred A. Emerton the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.) during the term of his natural life, and to pay the income therefrom when and as earned to the said Fred A. Emerton in convenient installments.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO GIVE A QUITCLAIM DEED TO FRANK BOULAY.

Resolved by the Board of Alderman of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the Mayor be authorized in the name and behalf of the City, to execute and deliver a quitclaim deed to Frank Boulay of Lot No. 4733, Assessor's Map, Sheet 11, taxed to Daniel Q. Cole and sold to the City for non-payment of taxes. The consideration for said lot to be twenty-five dollars (\$25.).

Passed June 12, 1933.

RESOLUTION FIXING AND DETERMINING THE AMOUNT OF MONEY TO BE RAISED FOR THE ENSUING FINANCIAL YEAR FOR THE USE OF THE CITY.

Resolved by the Board of Alderman of the City of Concord, as follows:

SECTION 1. There shall be raised and there is hereby ordered to be raised on the polls and ratable estates within the City the sum of three hundred sixty-four thousand six hundred thirty-five dollars, (\$364,635) to defray the necessary expenses and charges of the City for the ensuing financial year, which together with sums which may be raised on railroads and from other sources which are approximately two hundred fifteen thousand six hundred ten dollars (\$215,610), shall be appropriated as follows:

NOTE: There has been excluded from the budget the appropriations formerly allocated to the Concord District Nursing Association and the Family Welfare Society.

We are, however, in each of the above cases, as well as for the Red Cross, furnishing office room including heat and light at the expense of the City.

SECT. 2. In addition to the foregoing there is appropriated for the cemeteries of the City one-third of the income from the sale of lots and the income derived for the care of lots and grading, which sum shall be deposited by the Superintendent, or others receiving them, in the City treasury. The care of lots for which the City holds trust funds shall be paid from the money appropriated for the care of cemeteries, and so much of the income of these trust funds as may be thus expended shall be deposited in the City treasury at the close of the year, and the remainder in each instance credited to the individual fund.

SECT. 3. In addition to the foregoing there is appropriated for the use of the Public Library the income derived from Public Library Trust Funds.

SECT. 4. This resolution shall take effect on its passage.

Resolution appropriating twenty-nine thousand seven hundred sixty-nine and 41/100 dollars (\$29,769.41) to pay for real estate sold to the city of concord for unpaid taxes for the year 1932.

Resolved by the Board of Alderman of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the sum of twenty-nine thousand seven hundred sixty-nine and 41/100 dollars (\$29,769.41) be, and the same hereby is, appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pay the amount due the City of Concord for real estate purchased at the Tax Collector's sale of real estate for the unpaid taxes for the year 1932.

Passed July 10, 1933.

RESOLUTION APPROPRIATING MONEY TO PAY TAXES ASSESSED IN 1932 ON NON-RESIDENT REAL ESTATE SOLD TO THE CITY OF CONCORD FOR UNPAID TAXES.

Resolved by the Board of Alderman of the City of Concord, as follows:

SECTION 1. That the sum of sixteen and 24/100 dollars (\$16.24) be, and the same hereby is, appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated to pay taxes assessed in 1932 on non-resident real estate sold to the City for unpaid taxes as follows:

RESOLUTION IN RELATION TO THE REBUILDING OF SOUTH MAIN STREET EXCLUDING THE GAS HOUSE BRIDGE.

Resolved by the Board of Alderman of the City of Concord, as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

The Board of Water Commissioners, in presenting its sixty-second annual report by Superintendent Sanders, feels that the work has been carried on successfully in a very active year, with the result that much important work has been done.

On examination of his report, we find that there has been expended.

For maintenance,	\$52,979.77
For new construction,	7,368.36
For relaying distribution pipes in Penacook	
and West Concord,	13,212.19

Total expenditures,

\$73,560.32

During the year \$22,000.00 of the City of Concord Water Bonds became due and were paid. Also, there has been paid out of the earnings of the water works interest to the amount of \$11,676.25 on the outstanding City of Concord Water Bonds. After the deduction of the above expenditures the City Treasurer reports a balance as of January 1, 1934 of \$35,536.69 as a balance for the year 1933 on account of the Concord Water Works.

It is gratifying to note that during most of the year the height of water in Penacook Lake has enabled our water system to supply the water takers of the city from this source, resulting in not requiring the pumping of water from the Sanders Pumping Station at North Pembroke for about nine months of the year. This pumping station has been practically closed down since March 20, 1933 except for occasionally starting the pumps to see if they are in working order.

A rather disturbing activity happened last fall when a group of citizens proposed the taking over of Forge Pond. so-called, for the use of a bathing and swimming pool for the public. The water in Forge Pond mingles with the water in Penacook Lake and extends from the intake in Penacook Lake to the dirt dam and roadway at the West Concord end of the Pond. To carry the project out it was planned to separate the two waters by a dam. On account of this activity the Water Board felt justified in requesting the State Board of Health and the City Board of Health to express their opinions of the plan as suggested, with the result that they both immediately wrote the Water Board that in their judgment it would be a menace to the city's water supply and they would be in opposition to any such plan. There soon followed a meeting of the members of the Water Board with Mayor Brown present and it was unanimously voted to disapprove of any such project or plan. Since then the matter seems to have quieted down and we have heard nothing more from those favoring the plan and presume the project has been abandoned.

We are still supplying the water takers of the system from the chief water supply, Penacook Lake, and from the height of the water at the present time it would seem likely that there would be sufficient water at the Lake to supply our system through the coming year.

Three old hydrants have been replaced by new ones.

Forty-six new services have been laid consisting of 1038 feet of 3/4-inch and 31 feet of 2-inch pipe; of these, 7 were relocations of old services and 2 had previously been supplied with another consumer, netting 37 new consumers and adding 902 feet of service pipe.

Forty-four services have been discontinued permanently, of which 37 were supplies for standpipes formerly used by the street department for sprinkling streets; 406 feet of pipe discontinued.

Four hundred and fifty-six services were relaid and curb valves placed on 120 old services.

Fifty-one new meters were set and 7 have been discontinued.

We have this year completed the program of relaying the original cement-lined mains in Penacook as planned in 1929, with the exception of the main from West Concord to Stark Street.

The large number of services relaid in the City was occasioned by the resurfacing of most of the streets by the Board of Public Works.

On March 20 we resumed supplying high service from Penacook Lake with pumping at the North State Street station. The Lake was at such height that it looked as if the normal spring rise would make a level equal to our demand and above the overflow and this proved to be a correct forecast, for the mean height of the Lake for the year was 183.43, the highest since 1928.

To the Board of Mayor and Aldermen:

In accordance with the requirements of the City ordinance, I herewith submit for your consideration the report of the Fire Department for the year 1933.

The department responded to 534 alarms.

The number of alarms for this year was ninety less than the previous year, and with the greatly reduced fire loss, I feel that we can be proud of this record.

We are gradually reaching the stage where all of the apparatus will be in the best possible condition. During the past year a ladder truck was installed at the Penacook station which will remedy a very serious condition that existed in that section of the city.

This truck was built by the men of the department, saving the City many thousands of dollars. No small measure of credit is due them for this work.

Another truck is under construction which, when completed, will replace one that has been in service since 1915. A light chassis has been purchased which will replace a truck that has been in service since 1913. These improvements will modernize all of the apparatus.

We still have a serious condition pertaining to ladder equipment in the City proper. We are depending on one ladder truck which is a situation that should be remedied, and I urgently recommend that an Aerial ladder truck be added to the equipment of the department.

The Fire Alarm system is in good condition. New plates were installed in the batteries. Under our present system of motor generator charging, the plates are renewed every three years. By installing rectifiers, the plates would last eight years. I respectfully recommend that the rectifiers be installed this coming year.

All detached keys and glass enclosed key boxes have been removed, and all boxes that were adapted for such were fitted with Quick Action Doors, and others with Peerless Door Bolts.

All hose in the department have been tested and found to be in good condition. Six hundred feet of poor hose have been turned in to other departments. One thousand feet of hose should be purchased during the present year.

A central telephone switch board was installed in Department Headquarters which added greatly to the efficiency of the department.

A new running card governing the response of apparatus to alarms was installed July 1st, and results so far have been gratifying.

All department stations have been renovated during the year. The work was done by members of the department at a minimum cost to the City.

Fire prevention activities have been carried on by the permanent force. There were four thousand seven hundred and twenty-eight inspections made, all men rotating in this work. A great deal has been accomplished in this line.

I wish to thank the citizens for their hearty co-operation with this department pertaining to fire prevention.

For the support and co-operation of your board, and the heads of departments, I wish to express my appreciation.

The deed book of Blossom Hill Cemetery showing transfers of lots was brought up to January 1, 1934.

The following streets were laid out in 1933: Chase Street, Cornell Street, Central Avenue, (Davis Street, West Concord), Duncklee Avenue, Durgin Street, Martin Lane, Runnells Road, Water Street at River bridge. Franklin Terrace.

The work involved has been the removing of dead trees and branches, and the removing of brown tail and gypsy moths from the trees in the streets and on private property. The work on private land was charged to the owner, and it is evident from the number of complaints as to the cost of removing these pests on private property, that it would lead us to believe that the property owners should care for their own trees.

Construction

The early thaw in January and subsequent freezing left our tar treated roads in very poor condition. So much so that we worked the entire season in trying to bring them back to serviceable condition. 995.815 square yards of road surface were tar treated.

The street car tracks were taken out, and the City filled the depressions and tar treated pavements where this type existed; where the hot-top pavement prevailed the surface was given a hot-top treatment. 17,762 square yards in all.

On Washington Street, Penacook, 450 square yards of hot-top was laid.

Gravel roads were patched, shoulders rebuilt and road machined.

The State, under the Emergency Relief Unemployed set up \$21,189.61 for work on Class V roads. This work was financed by the Roads and Bridges department and reimbursed by the State. All of the appropriation was expended but \$0.09. The labor was obtained from the Commissioner of Labor of the State of New Hampshire, and the following roads were built:

Virgin Road, Intervale Street, River Road, District No. 4 Road, Hooksett Turnpike, Little Pond Road, Garvins Falls Road, Loudon-Penacook Road, 2 miles, Shaker Road, Hot Hole Pond Road.

Total number of miles built 13.40.

The City participated to the extent of 1.36 miles additional in extension of the roads in the northwest part of the city on the Warner and Webster Roads.

The Federal Government, under the Civil Works Administration made several small appropriations and this money was expended on the following projects:

Trees — Project No. 317. We are still working on this project. Project No. 278 which is the Runnells Road Construction is still operating. Project No. 280 which is the Snow Pond Road construction is still operating. Project No. 364 is for miscellaneous work about the City. Sylvester Street is being built under this allotment, and about 500 hitching posts have been removed. This is still an active project.

Bridges

A new bridge was built by the State over the Merrimack River just north of the old lower bridge, and approaches are graded complete. The old bridge was removed by the State. The Loudon bridge needs replanking, and we propose to do this work the early part of 1934.

Culverts

Ten culverts were repaired.

FENCES

Guard rails have been repaired, and new ones built where needed. This work is continuous work.

SNOW REMOVAL

The streets and roads were plowed nine times taking 21 days of time. Total depth of snow 68 inches. Sidewalks were plowed 25 times.

CLEANING OF STREETS

The motor driven flusher was used and three patrol men worked on North and South State Streets, North and South Main Streets, Park, Capitol, Green, School, Warren, Pleasant, Prince and South Streets.

GARAGE AND STABLES

Both are in good repair. In the fall, the heating plant was condemned and a new boiler installed. Work on trucks is now all done at the garage by competent workmen.

EQUIPMENT PURCHASED

Two Chevrolet $1\frac{1}{2}$ ton trucks for roads and bridges. One Chevrolet $1\frac{1}{2}$ ton truck for Sewer Department.

Equipment Discontinued

Two International trucks were discontinued as they were unserviceable, and parts could not be obtained on account of the age of the trucks.

SIDEWALKS

Walks were repaired and new walks laid when petitioned for. About four miles of gravel walks were resurfaced.

The Engineering Department also handles the examination of plumbers, plumbing, building and zoning inspections. There were 89 plumbing permits issued and 178 inspections made.

GENERAL

We have on file in our office, progress maps which show the road work done each year.

Our records are kept on a card system which shows all expenditures. We would be pleased to show them to anyone interested.

Work has been done for committees and departments when requested. Requests from citizens were granted when it was possible to do so.

For the many courtesies extended me by Mayor Robert W. Brown, the citizens, heads of departments and your board, I wish to express my appreciation.

To the Board of Trustees of the Concord Public Library:

Gentlemen:

The past year opened with the library comforting the down-hearted; it ended with the library assisting the hopeful. That is to say, whereas in 1932 we felt that the library was a kind of ark whereunto could resort those overwhelmed by the flood of depressing and idle conditions, before 1933 closed the library was more like a tool-house, supplying books for study. The classes formed so eagerly under the leadership of Mr. Charles A. Walker and with the financial aid of the CWA have needed technical works on various subjects, such as Russian grammar, the new system of recording finger prints, arts and crafts, mathematics, dressmaking, chalk talks, etc.

We hope the coming months will make many such worthwhile demands upon us.

Circulation statistics are always of interest; those for 1933 follow:

A gain of 6,839 but that is small compared with 1932's gain of over 30,000. This let-up in popular reading is partially explained by a recent Monitor item saying that in a Pennsylvania town the distinct increase in employment was accompanied by a 45 per cent decrease in the adult reading at the public library.

Our reading room has not been congested as it was last winter when the Trustees of the Shakespeare Room kindly allowed its use by women who found all seats taken down stairs.

The reference room was visited by 6,261 persons in search of information.

We have noted among our 1.152 new customers a larger number than usual of young men, many of these being CWA workers

Last spring the offer was made to supply the library for some weeks with workmen who would be paid from the City's Unemployment Fund. It was an offer gladly accepted; accordingly during the summer the building and grounds were put into better condition than they have been in for years. Painting, cleaning, grading, grassing, removed the shabby look of the exterior and interior of the library. For the general oversight of this good work thanks are due the Trustee from Ward 8, Mr. Perley B. Phillips.

Toward the close of 1933 we were again benefitted unexpectedly, this time through the Civil Works library projects put into action in New Hampshire by the State Library Commission. We were informed that two federally paid young women could help us for ten weeks, along any needed line of work. We decided that the taking of an inventory was the urgent job. It has been completed in season to give in this report the number of bound volumes now in the library—namely, 39,355. The same two helpers compiled statistics of our 1933 circulation according to classes. As always fiction was way in the lead, at 78 per cent. That this is a little higher figure than usual may be due to the diverting character of the reading especially sought nowadays.

The making of an inventory affords opportunity to discard some dead matter from the shelves. It also brings to light losses by thievery. Works on radio, mechanics, stamps, army practice, athletics, the useful arts and even some on psychology have been purloined.

Our bulletin board owes its success to Miss Brown who displays upon it material appropriate to holidays, current events and anniversaries.

Every summer friends of the library have brought to it bouquets from their gardens, notably those from Jacklands. Late into last fall Mr. Edwin L. Hutchinson of the Hopkinton Road kept us in flowers. We always welcome good fiction when it is brought in to us by people who have been weeding out their own libraries.

Once more the library has lost by death a Trustee, Charles H. Sanders, the dean among you in point of length of service; he was elected to the office from Ward 1 in 1891. At this writing it is not known of what his personal library consisted which he bequeathed to our Penacook Branch.

Nineteen hundred thirty-three brought me the benefit and pleasure of a trip abroad, and I wish to express again my gratitude for the long leave of absence. Affairs at the library ran perfectly during the fifteen weeks I was away. I had delegated to Miss Dennett the seeing to bills; to Miss Brown opening the mail; to Miss Melvin care of the Penacook Branch, and to Miss Holt selection of some midsummer publications. It was no surprise to me that the staff did all and more than was expected of them, and that the interest and assistance of the President of the Board were never lacking.

For during his seven years of direction of the library, he approached each problem of the institution with good cheer and great tact and stimulated all its activities. The public is indebted to him more than it realizes for advance steps taken. To his resignation from this Board we are not at all reconciled.

REPORT OF THE OVERSEER OF THE POOR

Concord, N. H., December 31, 1933.

To his Honor Mayor Brown and the Board of Aldermen:
GENTLEMEN:

I herewith submit my report as Overseer of the Poor for the year ending December 31, 1933.

Due to the continuance of the depression period the City is giving aid to approximately 170 city families and 330 county families making a total of 500 families.

Immediately after the New Year came in Miss Eunice Patch called on me and offered the assistance of the State Unemployment Relief Organization by placing one or more trained workers in my office to assist in the work of earing for the needy. About the first of February Miss Elizabeth Badger came and along about the first of March Miss Mary MacKay was sent as added county worker. The above two named persons confined their work to investigating home conditions of families receiving aid and although they came not only as strangers to our City but also to local conditions their work along these lines was satisfactory.

July 1, 1933, as you all know, saw a radical change in the caring for needy in our State by the passage of House Bill 417, so-called, by the 1933 Legislature, whereby a state wide organization was set up for said purposes. There came into being here in Concord, immediately, the establishment of a welfare office with some four or five persons as personnel which took over the work which I had been endeavoring to struggle along with, with my regular staff of clerks in the City Clerk's Department.

Since July 1, I am still acting in the capacity of Overseer of the Poor and endeavor to co-operate in every possible way and render assistance in an advisory capacity. I have taken care of all night and week end calls, of which there have been many, by giving direct relief and calling medical assistance. As I am more or less familiar with the majority of our cases they naturally turn to me in an emergency.

During the early part of the Spring the Board of Aldermen made possible an appropriation for so-called made work which was a great help not only financially but to the persons receiving said work.

The expenditures for this department for both City and County for the first six months of the year will be found in the financial statement of the City of Concord in this report.

The expenditures for the last six months of the year do not, however, show up in said financial statement due to the fact that I was unable to get them in time from the State Financial Relief office to make them a part of this report. The expenditures for this period will have to be paid out of the appropriations for 1934. I explained this matter fully to the Board of Aldermen at a meeting held January 8, 1934.

In conclusion let me express my thanks to his Excellency Honorable John G. Winant for the R. F. C. money given to the City during the year, to Miss Eunice Patch now State Director of Relief, to Mayor Robert W. Brown and the Board of Aldermen, to the Board of County Commissioners and all private agencies for all the assistance rendered during the year both financially and otherwise which certainly was a great help in carrying on the work.

REPORT OF SEALER OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES FOR THE CITY OF CONCORD

To His Honor the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen:

During the year 1933 your scaler tested 949 scales, 624 of which were found correct and were scaled, 295 were adjusted before being scaled, 15 were confiscated, not being susceptible of repair, and 15 were condemned for repairs, later being reinspected and scaled.

There were 1,434 weights tested, 1,407 of which were found correct and were sealed, 2 adjusted before being sealed, 20 confiscated, and 5 condemned for repairs which were later reinspected and sealed.

Of the 5,915 liquid measures tested, 5,879 were found correct and were sealed, 5 adjusted before being sealed, 22 confiscated, and 9 condemned for repairs. There were 20 dry measures tested and found correct.

There were 438 tests made of gasoline pumps: 330 indicated that correct measure was being given and were, therefore, sealed. It was necessary to make adjustments on 85 of these devices before sealing and condemn 23 for repairs, which were later reinspected and sealed.

It is customary for the merchants to wrap commodities in advance of sale and 3,627 reweighings were made of such packages with the following results: 21 were found over weight, 47 under weight, and 3,559 contained the amount indicated on the wrappers.

There were 9 reweighings made of coal in the process of delivery, 4 being found correct, 3 over weight, and 2 under weight.

Twenty-seven cart bodies used for the delivery of wood were measured, only 2 of which were found incorrect.

There were 30 tests made of automatic pumps used in the sale of grease at the garages and filling-stations. Three were found to measure inaccurately and were consequently condemned; the remaining 27 pumps were found correct and were sealed.

One tank wagon used in the delivery of gasoline was measured and 3 meters on such vehicles were tested, one of which was condemned.

Numerous requests were received from individuals, such as for measuring piles of loose wood for the purpose of ascertaining their amount, and your sealer responded in each instance and in the discharge of his duties endeavored to serve the City of Concord and its citizens to the best of his ability.

REPORT OF THE CITY SOLICITOR

January 1, 1934.

To the Board of Mayor and Aldermen:

In accordance with the provisions of Section 3 of Chapter XI of the Revised Ordinances, I herein submit a report of my activities as City Solicitor for the year 1933.

In addition to the usual duties of the Solicitor in preparing contracts, leases, resolutions and ordinances and furnishing to the Board of Mayor and Aldermen and special committees of the Board legal opinions on any subject in connection with the ordinary conduct of municipal affairs, the work of the Solicitor was considerably increased during the year 1933 by the decision to submit to the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works applications for loans and grants for public works under the provisions of the National Industrial Recovery Act. Because of this it was necessary for the Solicitor to engage stenographic services from October 1, 1933 to the end of the financial year covered by this report.

With the cheerful co-operation of the City Clerk and his staff, and the Commissioner of Public Works and his assistants, applications consisting of approximately three thousand nine hundred typewritten and photostated pages were prepared and filed seeking federal funds for the construction of the following projects:

Prospect Street Storm Sewer.

Walker Street Storm Sewer.

Concord Manor Sewer.

Plains Sewer.

South Street Sewer.

Addition to the Central Fire Station.

Reconstruction of Pleasant, Warren and School Streets.
Reconstruction of South Main Street.

Reconstruction of South State Street.

Crematory at Blossom Hill Cemetery.

Grading and water systems in various cemeteries.

Fencing at Woodlawn and Blossom Hill Cemeteries.

Drainage and constructing a dam at Blossom Hill Cemetery.

Because of the federal regulation requiring that all bonds purchased by the Federal Government be approved by bond counsel of recognized national standing the firm of Storey, Thorndike, Palmer and Dodge, of Boston, Massachusetts was retained for that purpose.

At the direction of the Board, a petition was filed with the Public Service Commission setting forth that the Gas House Bridge on Water Street owned and maintained by the Boston & Maine Railroad was inadequate and requesting that the railroad be ordered to reconstruct it. A hearing was held before the Commission and it was decided that the railroad was now furnishing to the people of the City of Concord and the State of New Hampshire an adequate structure in accordance with the terms of its Charter. Subsequently at the direction of the Board and with the co-operation of Mr. James M. Langley a test case was brought in the Superior and Supreme Courts to determine the right of the City to appropriate money for the purpose of reconstructing Gas House Bridge if it was deemed advisable so to do.

The following cases mentioned in my report for the year 1932 were disposed of during the year:

- 1. Maurice Fitzgerald vs: Roland Moran and the City of Concord. After trial, this case was settled by the insurance company.
- 2. Charles R. Maltais vs.: City of Concord. This ease has been settled by the insurance company.
- 3. John J. Dooning vs: City of Concord. This was an appeal from an award of damages in con-

nection with the discontinuance of the old road over the Soucook River and has been pending since April 13, 1926. It was settled by the payment of \$25.00 to the administratrix of the estate of John J. Dooning after a vote of the Board to that effect

- 4. City of Concord vs: Edwin B. Hale. A voluntary nonsuit was entered in this case due to Hale's financial irresponsibility.
- 5. Petition of Arthur H. Knowlton, Receiver for Derby Jewelry Company. In the above entitled case I filed a brief for the City on the question of the legality of the 1931 assessment of taxes, which involved four alleged defects. The Superior Court decided in favor of the City and ordered the Receiver to pay the taxes due.
- 6. Charles P. Mullins vs: The City of Concord. In the above case a hearing was had before Joseph S. Matthews, referee, who found that Mullins was not entitled to additional compensation as he alleged.

In co-operation with the Sanitary Officer and Milk Inspector two cases involving violation of the milk ordinance were prosecuted, the respondent in each case paying a substantial fine.

One prosecution was commenced for failing to connect with a public sewer within one hundred feet of the premises but was not prossed upon the agreement by the owner to connect immediately, which was done.

With the co-operation of the Secretary of the local Chamber of Commerce two prosecutions for violation of the "false advertising statute" and "transient vendor's statute" were successfully completed. The third was enjoined because of the alleged unconstitutionality of the statute. This case is being defended, however, by the Attorney General's Department.

The following cases mentioned in my report of 1932 are still pending:

Maurice Fitzgerald vs.: Thomas Nawn.

Leon Trembly vs: The City of Concord and Milan R. Piper.

Ethel Blankenburg vs.: The City of Concord.

Three new cases were brought during the year.

- 1. W. Fred Lane vs: The City of Concord. A suit in which the plaintiff alleges that because of the dumping of refuse by the City in the Merrimack River the course of the river was so changed that his property on Bridge Street was unnaturally flooded and damaged.
- 2. Bektash Real Estate Association vs: The City of Concord. This was an appeal from the refusal of the Board of Assessors to abate taxes alleged to be excessive on property owned by the corporation.
- 3. Henry Bean vs: The City of Concord. An appeal from an assessment of damages by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen alleged to have been caused by a change in the grade of a road at Concord Manor.

While the number of parcels of real estate sold for non-payment of taxes were somewhat less than the number sold in 1932 there was still sufficient to make it necessary to have forms printed for notifying the mortgagees as required by law.

At my request the Board of Mayor and Aldermen passed a resolution authorizing the filing of a petition with the Public Service Commission seeking a reduction in the charge made by the New England Telephone & Telegraph Company for the so-called "hand set" or "French" telephones. Before it was possible to get sufficient evidence and prepare a petition, the Public Service Commission announced that the telephone company had consented to a "voluntary" reduction in this charge, at an estimated annual saving to the people of the State of nine thousand dollars. Inasmuch as the new rate was substantially that which had been ordered by Public Service Commissions in other states, no further action was taken.

May I take this opportunity to express my appreciation of the assistance rendered to me by Mayor Brown, members of the Board of Aldermen, the City Clerk and staff and the heads of all departments and to thank them for the courtesy shown me.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT

REPORTS OF THE SANITARY OFFICER AND

Milk Inspector

To the Honorable the Mayor, the Board of Health and the Board of Aldermen:

I have the honor to submit herewith a report for the Health Department for the year 1933.

During the year just closed good health in general prevailed in Concord. Deaths were largely in the later years of life and came mostly as a result of degenerative conditions such as heart disease, cancer, apoplexy and diabetes. The death rate among true residents was 13.6. The crude death rate was swelled to 21.5 by our large hospital and institutional population. A low level of mortality was experienced with diseases associated with pregnancy, child birth and infancy and with diseases of children and young adults.

The City was unusually free from acute communicable diseases except undulant fever and a moderate prevalence of mild scarlet fever. Every case of scarlet fever and undulant fever and the one case each of typhoid fever and infantile paralysis was carefully investigated to disclose possible sources of infection.

Environmental sanitation was a major item in the years work. In addition to the usual inspections and the abatement of nuisances there was added inspection of boarding homes for children over the age of three years and inspection for parrot fever of parrots and parrakeets shipped to local dealers. Among the occupational diseases stone-cutters disease or silicosis with its associated tuberculosis continued to present a serious hazard. A report on milk sanitation activities follows under a separate heading but we should record here a gratifying increase in the use of pasteurized milk.

Venereal disease clinics were held weekly by Dr. Chancey Adams. Eight hundred twenty-eight treatments were given and fifty patients discharged as arrested or cured. Protection against diphtheria was offered children at clinics in charge of Dr. Charles H. Parsons. Monthly tuberculosis clinics were held by Dr. Robert B. Kerr under the auspices of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association.

During the first half of the year Mrs. Marion W. Norris was Acting Sanitary Officer. In July, Travis Pollard Burroughs became Sanitary Officer. Dr. Burroughs graduated from Harvard Medical School in 1925 with the degree of M. D. and from Johns Hopkins School of Hygiene and Public Health in 1933 with the Certificate in Public Health. Dr. Burroughs was also elected School Physician of Concord Union School District and devoted his full time to these two public health duties.

Appreciation is felt and is here recorded for the cordial co-operation experienced during the year from the authorities and personnel of the other departments of the City Government, the schools and the several volunteer organizations interested in the public welfare and health.

REPORT OF THE PLAYGROUND COMMITTEE

The playground activities of 1933 were again carried on successfully under the supervision of Paul G. Crowell, Director, with the assistance of the instructors.

The Committee feels that a great many improvements are needed at this time to carry on the work successfully.

The Committee wishes to acknowledge with sincere thanks the co-operation extended them by the Mayor, heads of the various departments and their assistants.
