



REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN.

HYDE PARK, January 31, 1883.

FELLOW CITIZENS:-

We herewith present a detailed report of receipts and expenditures for the current financial year, with such other matter as we deem of interest; also, reports of Town Clerk, Treasurer, School Committee, etc.; and invite your careful consideration of the same.

HIGHWAYS.

At our last annual meeting the town saw fit to make a very small appropriation for highways, and as a consequence very little has been attempted in the way of repairs beyond keeping our streets safe. The planking on bridges on Hyde Park, Central Park and Metropolitan avenues, has been renewed, and they are now in good condition. heavy showers, during the summer, washed the hillside streets, the repairs on which occasioned quite an outlay. All bills have been paid to date. Pierce, Davison and Walter streets, and Central avenue, have been built in accordance with plans accepted by the town, and at a cost within the appropriation. In building these streets, as in the repairs on highways, the Selectmen employed a competent superintendent, (Mr. Patrick Rooney,) who has had entire charge of the work, under the direction of the Board; and having attempted but one piece of work at a time, the men have been under constant supervision, with very much better results than under the old system. Our streets are now

very badly worn, and a large appropriation will be needed the coming year, if we would keep them up to the standard of neighboring towns.

By a decree of the County Commissioners, dated March 19th, 1872, Metropolitan avenue was laid out and ordered to be built; but the order had never been enforced. During the past winter (1881-82) some of our citizens, in connection with citizens of Milton, called the attention of the County Commissioners to this fact, and, as a consequence of their labors, this town, by an order dated March 21, 1882, was directed to commence the construction of said avenue within forty days. The execution of this order would have involved the town in an expenditure of from seventy-five to one hundred thousand dollars. The Selectmen petitioned the Commissioners for a hearing, and, upon a representation of the excessive cost and disproportionate benefit, together with some legal points involved, they decided not to enforce the decree, and there the matter rests.

In response to a petition of the Boston and Providence Railroad Company, the County Commissioners gave several hearings in the matter of a bridge over that railroad on River street, and, by a decree dated October 25, 1882, authorized said Company to build a bridge in accordance with plans on file in their office. Subsequently the Selectmen, at the request of the officers of the railroad, consulted with them in relation to the expense of said bridge, the railroad company asking the town to assume all grade damages and expense of building retaining wall on River street. The Selectmen refused to assume any part of the expense on behalf the town, and the railroad company have applied to the Superior Court to appoint a commission to determine by whom the cost of said bridge and approaches, and any other expense connected therewith, shall be paid.

By a decree dated September 26, 1882, the County Commissioners ordered a widening of Williams avenue from

Brush Hill road to Prospect street, the expense of which will have to be paid the coming year.

Early in the year we called the attention of the New York and New England Railroad Company to the dangerous crossing of their road of Fairmount avenue; and, after repeated notice, they have erected a gate for the better protection of travellers. We also requested that company to erect gates or station a flagman at Bridge street crossing, which they agreed to do, but up to the present time have not; and we have applied to the County Commissioners to investigate the matter.

STREET LIGHTS.

Agreeably to the expressed wish of the citizens at our last annual town meeting, we contracted with the Dedham and Hyde Park Gas Company to light all lamps on the line of their mains to the number of 75, at a cost of (20) twenty dollars a lamp per year. The service has been entirely satisfactory, and we recommend a renewal of the contract. The balance of the lamps to the number of 125, have been lighted by the United States Company, at a cost of 5 1-4 cents a lamp per night, or Twelve dollars and sixty cents (\$12.60) per year.

The service has been very unsatisfactory, and at our regular meeting in January it was voted to cancel the contract, but before this was accomplished, we were notified by the company that they were unable to fulfill their contract. We have since concluded a contract with the Globe Company at 6 cents a lamp per night.

LICENSE.

At our last annual meeting for the election of Town Officers, the following article was before the citizens: "Shall licenses for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town be granted." A majority of those voting said

"Yes," and in accordance with this instruction the following licenses have been granted, and the amount received is as follows:—

Of this number, two first, and one fourth class have been revoked, for violation of the conditions contained therein.

A majority of the Selectmen are not in favor of license, and had it been left with them, no licenses would have been granted, but inasmuch as the issue was squarely before the citizens, and they decided in favor of license the Board felt bound by their action. For this they have been criticized, and it has been urged that they were not bound by this vote, as the "No" vote representing the temperance element was very light. But why were there so few "No" ballots cast? Clearly because of the indifference of our so-called temperance leaders, who can always be heard at temperance meetings and through the columns of the local press; but when they are needed on election day, are conspicuous by their absence from the polls!

POLICE.

The police force is constituted about the same as for the past few years, with the addition of Mr. Charles E. Jenney, who has been appointed Chief, and to his report we refer for information as to the doings of the force.


COLLECTOR OF TAXES.

ENGINEERS' REPORT.

Engineers' Room, H. P. F. Dep't, Hyde Park, Jan. 31, 1883.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:—

Gentlemen,—In laying before you our annual report of the fire department for the year ending January 31st, 1883, we do so with a great deal of pleasure.

The department is in excellent condition, and the gentlemanly deportment of its members, and prompt response to every call, is an honor to any town, and Hyde Park should be justly proud of them.

In our last report we called your attention to the condition of our steamers, and stated our views on the same, and the year has proved that our judgment was correct. We have been obliged to call for an extra appropriation of two thousand dollars to put in new boilers, which the citizens generously granted; and we think that the money has been very economically expended, for they are now in first-class condition, each having a new boiler and many necessary improvements.

We have in the department twenty-five hundred feet of cotton hose, in excellent condition, and about two thousand feet of leather hose, which is almost worthless.

We would earnestly recommend the town to appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of hose this year. We would recommend cotton hose in preference to any other.

We have in the department two steamers, as good as new; two hose carriages; one hook and ladder truck, fully

equipped; one chemical engine; one fuel wagon; two sets swinging harnesses,—all in good repair; and hose as above described.

We take this opportunity to heartily thank each and every member of the department, for their gentlemanly conduct and splendid discipline.

You will find with this report a list of alarms and fires; also, the officers and number of men belonging to each company.

REPORT OF OVERSEERS OF THE POOR.

The work of this department for the past year has not been of a character to call for special mention. With our manufactories and other business interests in satisfactory and regular operation, the large majority of our poorer classes are able to maintain themselves without our aid, and, besides the few, who from limited ability to earn, find the aid of the town necessary each year through the winter months, we have had only the ordinary number of new applicants, and those have been mostly cases of sickness.

The annual appropriation for this department was \$2,500, which, in the judgment of the Board, was about the necessary amount to meet the year's expenses, and in consideration of our having to pay nearly \$500 of unpaid bills, laid over from the former year, the town also voted to allow us all amounts reimbursed by the Commonwealth and others on account of aid rendered in the previous year. This action had especial reference to our claim of about \$1,500 against the State for our small pox expenses of 1881, from which we expected to receive about \$550. Although we have received only \$30 of this small pox claim, our appropriation has, under that vote, been somewhat increased by other receipts, so that, besides the bills of 1881 and bills of the Board of Health, which were charged to our appropriation as shown below, we have paid all of this year's expenses of \$2,349.98, except \$150.60.

We take satisfaction, also, in stating that after considerable labor and through a proper co-operation with the State authorities, we have succeeded in getting our small pox claim audited, and we have notice that a further payment of \$564.05 will be paid as in February, and that another pay-

ment will be made as soon as it is proved that the State is liable therefor,—the legal settlement of one of the parties being still under investigation.

We have aided during the year 137 persons. number 15 were fully supported, 6 being insane adults, 2 sane adults, and 7 children; and 122 received only temporary and partial aid. Of the 15 fully supported, all but one have settlements in this town, and legally claim its support. Only 50 of the 122 have a legal settlement in Hyde Park, and, except in a few undecided cases, the aid rendered to the others is a claim against the Commonwealth or other We have noted against the names in the statement below the legal settlement of each one. REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

The Board of Health herewith present their report for the year ending February 1, 1883. The duties devolving upon the Board the past year have been numerous. A large number of complaints regarding the sanitary condition of different portions of the town have been received and acted upon. In a large number of these cases the remedy sought was the clearing out and disinfecting of vaults and cesspools. These complaints have received our attention; and, in nearly every instance, our demands upon the owners of these nuisances have resulted in their abatement, without cost to the town.

About one hundred complaints have been made to the Board during the year, from nearly all parts of the town. There are quite a number of places in town that will need close watching by the Board of Health for the next few years to come, and it is the duty of every one who knows of cases that are not in proper condition, to report the same to the Board, or some member of it, at once.

During the year our physicians have generally reported to the Board cases of typhoid fever, scarlet fever, and diphtheria, so that we have been able, with their help, as far as possible to prevent the spread of contagious diseases.





THE ELEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

HYDE PARK LIBRARY BOARD.

The Board of Trustees of the Hyde Park Free Public Library herewith submit their eleventh annual report:—

The Library is now one of the useful and pleasant institutions of the town. It comprises over seven thousand well selected volumes; all the leading magazines of the land; various weekly, semi-weekly and daily newspapers; has brilliantly lighted and pleasant rooms; and a new catalogue free to every family. There is nothing, therefore, to prevent any and every citizen from enjoying its privileges and sharing in its benefits.

During the past year three hundred and fifty new books have been added by purchase, and others by gift from various parties, as elsewhere particularized.

The new catalogue is interleaved in such a manner that at each letter of the alphabet there is opportunity, for a considerable time in the future, to enter all new books added to the Library, and as the Trustees propose to publish, from time to time, classified lists of all additions, each person who wishes can, with very little trouble, have always a complete catalogue of the entire Library.

The number of new cards given out in 1882 was 381. The amount received from fines was \$52.85. The increase in the number of books drawn from the Library in 1882, over the number in 1881, is nearly 6,000, as will be seen by the following statement:—

Of this large number not a book has been lost,—a fact that speaks well both for the users of the Library, and for the efficiency and good management of the Librarian, Mrs. H. A. B. Thompson, who has had entire charge of the Library and rooms, and with but occasional assistance has performed all the duties connected therewith.

The Library Fund, which during the time of general shrinkages was somewhat reduced, is now, through accumulation of interest, slightly larger than ever before.

The constantly increasing number of persons using the Library, together with the natural growth of the Library itself, now rapidly encroaching on the very small amount of available space, warn us that in the near future some provision must be made to accommodate the increase.

The lease of the present premises expire next December, and it is for the Town to consider whether it will continue to occupy its present quarters, will look for others, or build a suitable library building for itself.

Until the debt of the town is still further reduced from its original proportions, the latter plan would hardly meet with favor from the tax-payers, however desirable in itself. Possibly, however, some public spirited citizen might be induced to put up a suitable building, provided the town would take a long lease of it at a price that would pay a fair interest on the investment. Such a building might be made an ornament to the Town, and open up the advantages of the Library to a larger number of its inhabitants than have heretofore found it convenient to avail themselves of its privileges.

BY-LAWS.

At a meeting of the legal voters of the town of Hyde Park, Mass., held December 14th, A. D. 1882, it was voted to adopt the following By-Laws, to wit:—

NOTIFICATION OF TOWN MEETING.

Every town meeting shall be notified by posting copies of the warrant calling the same, in ten public places in the town, seven days, at least, before the day appointed for said meeting; and a copy of the warrant shall be published in the local newspapers of the town once, at least, before said meeting.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING.

The annual town meeting shall be held on the first Monday of March of each year. The meeting shall be opened at eight o'clock A.M., and the polls shall be kept open until sunset.

RULES FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF TOWN MEETINGS.

1. - Every meeting shall be opened with prayer.

2. — All questions submitted for the consideration of the town, involving the expenditure of money, shall be in writing, when so required by any legal voter.

3. — No vote fixing the period for closing a ballot shall be reconsidered after such ballot shall have commenced; but it may be in order

to extend the period without such reconsideration.

4. — When a question is under debate, motions shall be received to adjourn, to lay on the table, the previous question, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone indefinitely, to commit, or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are herein arranged.

5. — The powers and duties of the presiding officer, not especially provided for by law, or by the foregoing rules, shall be determined by the rules of practice contained in "Cushing's Manual," so far as

they are adapted to the condition and powers of the town.

6.— No vote shall be reconsidered except upon a motion made within one hour after such vote has passed, unless such reconsideration is ordered by a vote of two-thirds of the voters present and voting.

FINANCIAL YEAR.

The financial year of the town shall begin with the first day of February in each year, and end on the thirty-first day of the following January.

MEETINGS OF TOWN OFFICERS.

The selectmen, overseers of the poor, board of health, surveyors of highways, and school committee shall post in some conspicuous place at their official rooms, a notice of the times of their respective meetings, and shall also give notice of the same through the local newspapers.

COLLECTION OF TAXES.

- 1.—The assessment of taxes shall be completed, and a list of the same delivered to the collector, on or before the first day of August of each year.
- 2.—All taxes which may be assessed, if paid on or before the first day of October next after the assessment, shall be entitled to such discount as the town shall vote at its annual meeting. All persons who may be assessed a poll-tax only, shall pay the same on demand. All taxes shall be paid in full on or before the first day of November next following the assessment of said taxes, and if not so paid, interest shall be paid at a rate not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, if so voted by the town.
- 3.—On the first secular day of each month, the Collector shall pay over to the town Treasurer all the taxes collected by him; and he shall on or before the first day of February in each year, make up his account and render the same to the Auditors.

DUTIES OF THE AUDITORS.

- 1. The anditors shall examine the accounts of the selectmen, school committee, treasurer, collector, trustees of the public library, and the custodian of the town hall, and all other officers or committees entrusted with the expenditure of money, quarterly, and shall certify as to the correctness of the same in the printed annual report.
- 2.—Before certifying to the accounts of the treasnrer, they shall examine his cash-book, wherein shall be entered his receipts and payments, as they occur from day to day, shall see that he has paid out no moneys except on proper vouchers, carefully examine all payments for interest, and see that the funds on hand are intact.

- 3.— Before certifying to the collector's accounts, they shall examine his cash-book, showing the amounts collected from day to day, and showing when the same were paid over to the treasurer; shall see that he has collected interest on all taxes overdue, and shall see a complete list of abatements, and also a list of unpaid taxes.
- 4.— They shall see that the accounts of the trustees of the public library, and the custodian of the town hall, are kept in a correct manner, and that all payments are accompanied with proper vouchers.

REMOVAL OF BUILDINGS AND OBSTRUCTION OF HIGHWAYS.

- 1. No building shall be removed over a public street without the written permission of the selectmen.
- 2.— The owner of such building, or the person or persons removing the same, shall pay the town all damages, costs, and expenses for which the town may be liable or compelled to pay.
- 3.— No person shall place, or cause to be placed, in any of the public streets, sidewalks, lands, or upon any of the common lands of the town, without a written license from the selectmen, any manure dirt, gravel, stones, building materials, wood, coal, barrels, boxes, merchandise, or any rubbish or obstruction whatever.
- 4. No person shall obstruct the sidewalks or streets of the town to the molestation of travelers, or accost or address another person with profane or obscene language in a street or public place. Whoever violates this by-law shall be subject to the provisions of section 35 of chapter 207 of the public statutes. Constables and police officers are instructed to enforce this by-law.
- 5.— No person shall ride or drive a horse in any street in the town at a rate faster than eight miles an hour.
- 6.— No person shall play ball, or throw snow-balls, or stones, or discharge any gun or fire-arm, or make any bonfires or other fires, in any of the streets or public places in the town, unless by written consent of the Selectmen.
- 7.— No person except the Selectmen or the Surveyors of highways, in the lawful performance of their duties, or those acting under their orders, shall break or dig up the ground in any street or public way in the town, without first obtaining a written permit from the Selectmen; and all persons acting under such permit, shall put up and maintain a suitable railing or fence around the part of the street so broken up, so long as the same shall remain unsafe or inconvenient for travellers, and he or they shall keep one or more lighted lanterns fixed to such railing or fence, or in some other way exposed every night from twilight in the evening through the whole night, so long as such street or way shall be or remain unsafe or inconvenient for travellers.

8. — Loud crying of wares or merchandise, or hallooing, hooting or making loud and unseemly noises on the public streets or squares of the town, to the annoyance of citizens, is prohibited.

COASTING.

Coasting on any of the public streets of the town is prohibited, except upon such streets as the selectmen shall designate each year by public notice.

PASTURING OF CATTLE OR OTHER ANIMALS ON STREETS OR WAYS.

- 1. The town hereby adopts and avails itself of the provisions of chapter 53 of the public statutes, relating to the pasturing of cattle or other animals in streets or ways.
- 2. No person shall be allowed to pasture any cattle, goat, or other animal upon any street or public way in said town, either with or without a keeper, except within the limits of such way adjoining his own premises, and field drivers are instructed to enforce this by-law.

TRUANTS.

- 1. The town hereby avails itself of the several provisions of the statutes of this Commonwealth, now in force, relating to habitual truants and absentees from school.
- 2.—All children convicted of habitual truancy hereunder, and children between the ages of seven and fifteen years, residing in said town, and who may be found wandering about the streets or public places of said town, having no lawful occupation or business, not attending school, and growing up in ignorance, may be committed to the Lawrence Industrial School, of Lawrence, Mass., or to any house of reformation which has been or may hereafter be established by the County Commissioners of the County of Norfolk, or to any place provided by this town within its limits, for confinement, instruction and discipline.
- 3. Two or more truant officers shall be appointed annually, whose duty it shall be to inquire into all the violations of the truant laws, and of the law relating to compulsory education, and to do all the acts required of them by the laws of the Commonwealth.
- 4. It shall be the duty of every truant officer, previous to making any complaint under these laws, to notify the truant, or absentee from school, also his parent or guardian, of the offence committed, and of the penalty therefor, and if the truant officer can obtain satisfactory pledges for the restraint and reformation of the child, he may, at his discretion, forbear to prosecute so long as such pledges are faithfully kept.

- 5. It shall be the duty of the School Committee, the teachers of the public schools, and the citizens generally, to aid the truant officers as far as possible in the discharge of their duties.
- 6.—It shall be the duty of the truant officers to keep a full record of all their official acts, and make an annual report thereof to the School Committee, who shall publish the same with their own report.
- 7. Nothing in these by-laws shall be so construed as to alter or impair the obligation and duty of teachers to enforce punctuality and regularity of attendance, and to preserve good order and discipline.

JUNK DEALERS.

The Selectmen are authorized and instructed to enforce the provisions of chapter 102 of the public statutes or acts amendatory thereot, or additional thereto, relating to junk dealers.

LIST OF TAX-PAYERS.

The names of all persons paying a tax on real or personal property shall be published annually in the town report, together with the amount of tax assessed upon each, and whether the same is paid or unpaid.

UNEXPENDED APPROPRIATIONS,

Any unexpended balance of the regular annual appropriations, excepting those for public schools and the Public Library, shall, at the close of each financial year, be paid into the sinking fund, to be used in extinguishing the town debt.

DUTIES OF TOWN CLERK.

The Town Clerk shall keep a file of all town reports, reports of all committees chosen by the town, and all original documents relating to the affairs of the town which may come into his possession; he shall, as soon as practicable, after any election has been held by the town, in addition to the notices he is now directed to give to officers who are required to take an oath of office, also issue a written or printed notice to all persons who have been elected to any other office, or chosen to serve on any other committee, stating the office to which such person has been elected, or the duties which such committee was chosen to perform.

DEFENCE OF ACTIONS.

The Selectmen shall have full authority, as agents of the town, to employ counsel, and appear for and defend suits brought against it, unless otherwise specially ordered by a vote of the town.

CONVEYING.

Whenever it shall be necessary to execute any deed conveying land, or any other instrument required to carry into effect any vote of the town, the same shall be executed by the Selectmen, or a majority of them, in behalf of the town, unless the town shall otherwise vote in any special case.

BY-LAWS IN RELATION TO THE PREVENTION OF FIRES, TO WIT:

It shall be the duty of every person who shall commence the erection of any building within the town of Hyde Park to notify the Board of Engineers thereof before he shall commence building the chimneys therein.

All chimneys in wooden buildings shall be built of brick, stone, or other fire-proof non-conducting material. All brick flues shall be smoothly plastered *inside* with mortar from top to bottom and *outside* below the roofing.

In no case shall chimneys rest upon any flooring without a footing of masonry or iron supported by iron beams, having a secure bearing of masonry or iron at either end.

All flues shall be topped out at least four feet above the roof of the building to which they belong. The brick topping out of chimneys shall not have more than two inches projection, unless covered by a cap of metal or stone properly secured.

Hearths of fireplaces or grates shall be laid upon brick or other trimmer arches, or upon bars of iron supporting a bed of brick-work.

No wood-work of any kind shall be placed at a less distance than one inch from the outside brick-work of any flue. In no case shall a nail be driven into the masonry of any flue.

No wood-work shall be placed at a less distance than one inch from any tin or other metal flue or flues, pipe or pipes, used or intended to be used to convey heated air or steam in any building, unless such flues or pipes shall be eased with metal, leaving a free circulation of air all around the same.

No smoke-pipe in any such wooden or frame building shall hereafter enter any flue, unless the said pipe shall be at least twelve inches from either the floors or ceiling; and in all cases where smoke-pipes pass through stud or wooden partitions of any kind, whether the same be plastered or not, they shall be guarded by either a double collar of metal, with at least four inches of air space and holes for ventilation or by a soap-stone ring, not less than three inches in thickness and extending through the partition.

The Board of Engineers shall examine into all shops and other places where shavings or other combustible material may be deposited or collected, and at all times be vigilant in the removal of the same, whenever, in the opinion of any majority of them, the same may be dangerous to the security of the town from fires; and direct the owner, tenant, or occupant of said shops, or other places, to remove the same; and in case such owner, tenant, or occupant's refusal or neglect so to do, to cause the same to be removed at the expense of such owner, tenant, or occupant.

It shall also be the duty of said Engineers to take cognizance of all buildings in the town in which any steam engine shall be used, and of all buildings in the town in process of erection or alteration, and to make a record of such thereof as in their judgment may/from any cause be dangerous, and report the same to the Selectmen forthwith. And whenever in the opinion of a majority of the Board of Engineers, any chimney, hearth, oven, stove, stovepipe, fire-frame or other fixture, or any camphene or other explosive or inflammable fluid or material, or whatever else may give just cause of alarm, should be altered, repaired or removed, they, the said Engineers, shall forthwith notify and direct the owner, tenant or occupant of the premises upon which the same are situated, to alter, repair, or remove the same, as the said Engineers shall direct. in case such tenant, owner or occupant shall refuse or neglect so to do, the said Engineers shall cause the same to be removed, altered or repaired at the expense of such owner, tenant, or occupant. And any person who shall obstruct the Engineers, or any of them, in carrying out the provisions of this section, shall be liable to the penalty hereinafter stated.

The removal, extension or essential alteration of any building; also, the rebuilding or repairing of any building which has been partially destroyed by fire, shall be subject to the same restrictions which are imposed by the foregoing By-laws on the erection of buildings.

PUBLICATION OF BY-LAWS.

The selectmen shall publish these by-laws annually in connection with the town report.

PENALTIES UNDER THE BY-LAWS.

Every violation of any of the foregoing by-laws shall be punished by a fine of not less than one dollar nor more than twenty dollars, to be recovered by complaint before any trial justice in the County of Norfolk, or any other court having jurisdiction.

PROSECUTION UNDER THE BY-LAWS.

Any citizen may, and the selectmen, constables and police officers shall, prosecute every violation of any of the foregoing by-laws, by complaint before any trial justice in the County of Norfolk, or any other court having jurisdiction.

REPEAL OF OLD BY-LAWS.

All former by-laws of the town are repealed on approval of these by-laws, as provided for in the following section:—

BY-LAWS, WHEN TO TAKE EFFECT.

These by-laws shall go into effect from and after their passage and their approval by the superior court, or any justice thereof.

REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

FOR THE SCHOOL YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1882.

To the Citizens of Hyde Park:-

The School Committee herewith submit their annual report.

ORGANIZATION.

At the commencement of the current year, the following Sub-Committees were appointed by the Chairman and approved by the Board:—

High School, Richard M. Johnson, Andrew Washburn, Henry S. Bunton; Advanced Grammar Class, Edward I. Humphrey, Richard M. Johnson; Damon School, Henry S. Bunton, Charles G. Chick; Fairmount School, Andrew Washburn, Edwin R. Walker; Greenwood School, Edwin R. Walker, Richard M. Johnson; Grew School, Charles G. Chick, Edward I. Humphrey; Everett Primary School, Edward I. Humphrey; Evening Schools, Edward I. Humphrey Charles G. Chick; Supplementary Reading, Henry S. Bunton, Andrew Wasbburn.

You are referred to the reports of the several Local Committees for specific information in regard to their respective schools.

RESIGNATION.

On the 29th of May Mr. Walker resigned his position as a member of this Board. The Selectmen and School Com-

mittee in convention, on the 5th of June, elected Mr. George M. Fellows as his successor. Mr. Fellows at once entered upon the discharge of his duties, and was appointed to fill the vacancies in the above Local Committees occasioned by Mr. Walker's resignation.

ORAL EXAMINATIONS.

Public oral examinations were held in each of the schools at the close of the Spring term. They were conducted to the evident satisfaction of the goodly number of parents and friends who were in attendance.

DRAWING.

A course of lectures for the benefit of our teachers have been given in the High School room, by Prof. C. M. Carter of the State Normal Art School. Good results have been manifest in the improved quality of the instruction given in this branch.

MUSIC.

Mr. Henry J. Whittemore has conducted the exercises in vocal music, with the assistance of his daughter in the lower grades, and good satisfaction has been given.

WRITING.

While excellent work is being done by individual teachers, notably in primary grades, yet the penmanship of the average scholar is not satisfactory. The Committee believe that better results would be obtained in the class-room if the services of a special instructor were provided, or normal instruction given to the teachers.

TRUANCY.

The Board has found the same difficulty in dealing with this evil which has been experienced by its predecessors, the lack of suitable provision by the town for habitual truants. Our attention being called by the State Board of Education to the fact that we should forfeit our share of the income of the Massachusetts School Fund unless such provision was made, the Committee at once caused By-Laws upon the subject to be framed and submitted to the town's committee on revision of By-Laws. The same have since been adopted and approved.

BY-LAWS RELATIVE TO TRUANTS.

- 1. The town hereby avails itself of the several provisions of the statutes of this Commonwealth, now in force, relating to habitual truants and absentees from school.
- 2.—All children convicted of habitual truancy hereunder, and children between the ages of seven and fifteen years, residing in said town, and who may be found wandering about the streets or public places of said town, having no lawful occupation or business, not attending school, and growing up in ignorance, may be committed to the Lawrence Industrial School, of Lawrence, Mass., or to any house of reformation which has been or may hereafter be established by the County Commissioners of the County of Norfolk, or to any place provided by this town within its limits, for confinement, instruction and discipline.
- 3. Two or more truant officers shall be appointed annually, whose duty it shall be to inquire into all the violations of the truant laws, and of the law relating to compulsory education, and to do all the acts required of them by the laws of the Commonwealth.
- 4. It shall be the duty of every truant officer, previous to making any complaint under these laws, to notify the truant, or absentee from school, also his parent or guardian, of the offence committed, and of the penalty therefor, and if the truant officer can obtain satisfactory pledges for the restraint and reformation of the child, he may, at his discretion, forbear to prosecute so long as such pledges are faithfully kept.
- 5. It shall be the duty of the School Committee, the teachers of the public schools, and the citizens generally, to aid the truant officers as far as possible in the discharge of their duties.
- 6. It shall be the duty of the truant officers to keep a full record of all their official acts, and make an annual report thereof to the School Committee, who shall publish the same with their own report.
- 7. Nothing in these by-laws shall be so construed as to alter or impair the obligation and duty of teachers to enforce punctuality and regularity of attendance, and to preserve good order and discipline.

REVISION OF COURSE OF STUDY.

Early in the year Messrs. Washburn and Bunton were appointed a sub-committee to examine the Course of Study, and report such proposed changes as in their judgment were

meeded to promote the efficiency of the schools. Subsequently, when the consideration of the High School course was reached, Mr. Johnson was added to the sub-committee. They were materially aided in their work by the opinions and experience of our masters and teachers, and other practical educators. Their report, with some modifications, was adopted by the Board, and the re-arrangement has been accomplished with but little friction, and to the apparent benefit of all who are affected thereby.

The changes in what may properly be styled the Grammar School Course are mostly matters of detail. A text book in Intellectual Arithmetic has been substituted for the intermediate written arithmetic, which has had rather an unsatisfactory place in the course. We feel that a thorough mental training is a very essential preparation for the higher mathematics, as well as for the active responsibilities of life. Of late years there has been a disposition to underrate the importance of this branch, and to endeavor to combine it with the written arithmetic, but not successfully, if we may judge from our own experience.

The judgment of the majority of the Board, as well as the voice of public sentiment, dictated the omission from the course of the Advanced Grammar Class, as it had existed for the two preceding years. The arguments which had led to its establishment were still pertinent, to wit: the need of a more complete and well-rounded course for the scholar whose education ends with the Grammar School, and the toning up of the High School by the more thorough preparation and greater maturity of the students entering upon its The two years' or Business Course which has been instituted in connection with the High School, is intended to provide for the first mentioned class, and our Classical Course will compare favorably with the courses prescribed for High Schools in other municipalities of similar standing with our own. It had been a number of years since any change had been made in the High School course, as laid down, and the

present revision was necessary to bring the written law into consonance with the order which experience had gradually developed as best adapted for the needs of the school.

CONCLUSION.

In closing this general report, the writer desires, in behalf of the Board, to return thanks for the words of commendation and appreciation which their labors have received; also for that wholesome criticism which has called attention to matters of administration requiring amendment or careful consideration.

School committees are human, and liable to go astray when they attempt to innovate on usages which have prevailed in the past. Experts differ as to the *most approved* methods in education. It is claimed that there is an undue tendency on the part of school authorities to experimentalize, and to substitute the ornamental far the practical.

To quote from a recent and distinguished critic:

"Some of the matters to be taught, as the teachers are examined in them, are music, drawing, physiology, physics, botany, zoology, geology, astronomy, chemistry, psychology, Greek, Latin, French and German. But the spelling book is banished."

Nevertheless, the common school system, while it may have its defects, stands as one of the grandest monuments of modern civilization, and as Abraham Lincoln said of our form of government, is "of the people, by the people, and for the people."

More depends upon the wisdom, judgment and experience of the teacher than upon the curriculum, however skillfully devised.

We are glad to report that our present corps are, for the most part, well equipped for their work, and faithful and successful in its performance.

The principal event of the High school the past year has been the change in the course of study. The old course was retained, as in the Grammar schools until the end of the Spring term, and the new was inaugurated with the beginning of the Fall term

Just previous to the opening of the Fall term the Board were reluctantly obliged to part with Miss M. C. Clark who had so long and so creditably filled a place in our corps of assistants. On this account and in consequence of the necessity for increased assistance under the new course the services of two ladies well known among our citizens as faithful and competent instructors,—Miss E. M. Hatch and Miss S. L. Miner,—have been secured, so that the school at present has three assistants instead of two as formerly.

With the modifications adopted, looking to increased efficiency in furnishing every requirement for a liberal education such a school can be expected to supply, the Committee confidently look for the very best results, and so far the new arrangement works well, though of course not fully tested. As no plan of education however well considered and wisely constructed will prove perfect, this like all other systems may need some changes as further experience, better methods and increased demands for a more complete mental culture develope.

The Committee desire to express their high appreciation of the faithful work of the school and the cheerful acquiescence of the teachers in the exacting demands of their position.

The school the past year has fully maintained its former creditable standing. A higher position however is possible and will be attained.

There has been no change in the organization of this school during the year, and the condition of the several rooms has been, with very rare exceptions, entirely satisfactory. The two junior teachers, Misses Rooney and Sears of the Twelfth Class, deserve special commendation for the ambition and painstaking which has been manifest in their work.

It is to be regretted that the circumstances of so few of the Damon scholars admit of their completing the Grammar School course, and receiving the diploma of graduation. The disparity in the numbers of the entering and graduating classes is more marked in the Damon than in any other school in our town. The cause is apparently beyond the control of the school authorities, but the fact demonstrates the importance of making the instruction in the lower grades as thorough and practical as possible.

In view of the difficulty which has been experienced in suitably heating the building, the Local Committee have provided a third furnace in addition to the two brick furnaces, which were found to be insufficient. This they have done by refitting, at a cost considerably less than that of a new furnace, a portable furnace, formerly in use, but which had been discarded. Other improvements have been made in the heating apparatus. A heavy item in our expenditure for incidentals is that of books furnished to scholars who by reason of indigence or neglect have failed to procure them. The lists are furnished to the Assessors, and when practicable, collections are made from parents or guardians on their tax bills.

In September last, the school was the recipient, by the generosity of Mrs. J. Huntington Wolcott, of Milton, of a

well-selected library of seventy-five volumes, consisting largely of historical and biographical works suited to the ages of the scholars. Contributions from the teachers and others have considerably increased the size of the collection. Its educational influence has been very noticeable in moulding the literary tastes of the young people, and furnishing them with reading of an elevating character. We learn, also, that since the advent of the library there has been a material improvement in the discipline of the upper classes, which the teachers attribute to this salutary agent.

We are happy to report a successful school year with very few changes beyond the regular promotions from grade to grade.

Miss Stocking whose services here have been very highly appreciated, was transferred from the Ninth Class to the Grew school, to fill a vacancy existing there; and Mrs. M. H. Cushing, who had previously been a successful teacher of the class, and had been compelled by ill-health to take a long vacation, was again placed in charge. Her success has been very marked, and it is to be hoped that the school may long profit by her faithful labors.

Complaint has been made that many small children in this district have to walk on a private street, and cross private land, or else go a long distance to reach the school; and a petition was presented asking that a Primary School might be opened in the Butler Schoolhouse, but no definite action upon it has yet been taken, on account of the pending claim on the property.

We regret to be obliged to allude to the resignation of Mr. J. L. Curtis, who has so long held the position of Principal of the Greenwood School. His record is too well known here to call for praise.

Mr. D. G. Thompson, an experienced and successful teacher, has been secured to fill the vacancy, and is entering heartily upon his work. We are glad to be able to say, that this school is in good condition, is doing excellent work, and deserves the high respect it enjoys.

The organization of this school remained the same as at the time of our last report until the close of the school in June, 1882, when Miss Mary Morey teacher of the Ninth Class tendered her resignation, which was accepted with great reluctance by the Committee. By this resignation the town loses a teacher of great merit and experience. At the beginning of the present school year Miss Florence E. Leadbeater was promoted to the position left vacant by Miss Morey, and Miss Ella J. Stocking, who had successfully taught for a number of years in the Fairmount School, was transferred to this school and placed in charge of the classes formerly instructed by Miss Leadbeater.

The work of the school during the year will compare favorably with that of preceding years. The discipline is good, and the pupils receive careful and systematic instruction in the various branches of the course. Writing has received more than ordinary attention, especially in the lower grades.

It must be said that the work of the school has suffered somewhat during the present year from the prevalence of the measles among the younger children, to this cause may be attributed the lower per cent. of attendance as compared with former years.

During the Summer vacation the various rooms were thoroughly cleaned, the walls were tinted and ceilings whitened, this was deemed necessary as the plastoring had become badly smoked and cracked, presenting a dingy

and unwholesome appearance. The cost of this improvement will be found among the incidental expenditures of this school during the past year.

The blackboards have also been carefully repaired, and are now in good condition for a number of years of use.

The roof of the building will require some repairs during the coming year and true economy would require that the outside should be well painted. In closing this report we are happy to say that at present although the rooms are well filled, none are overcrowded.


