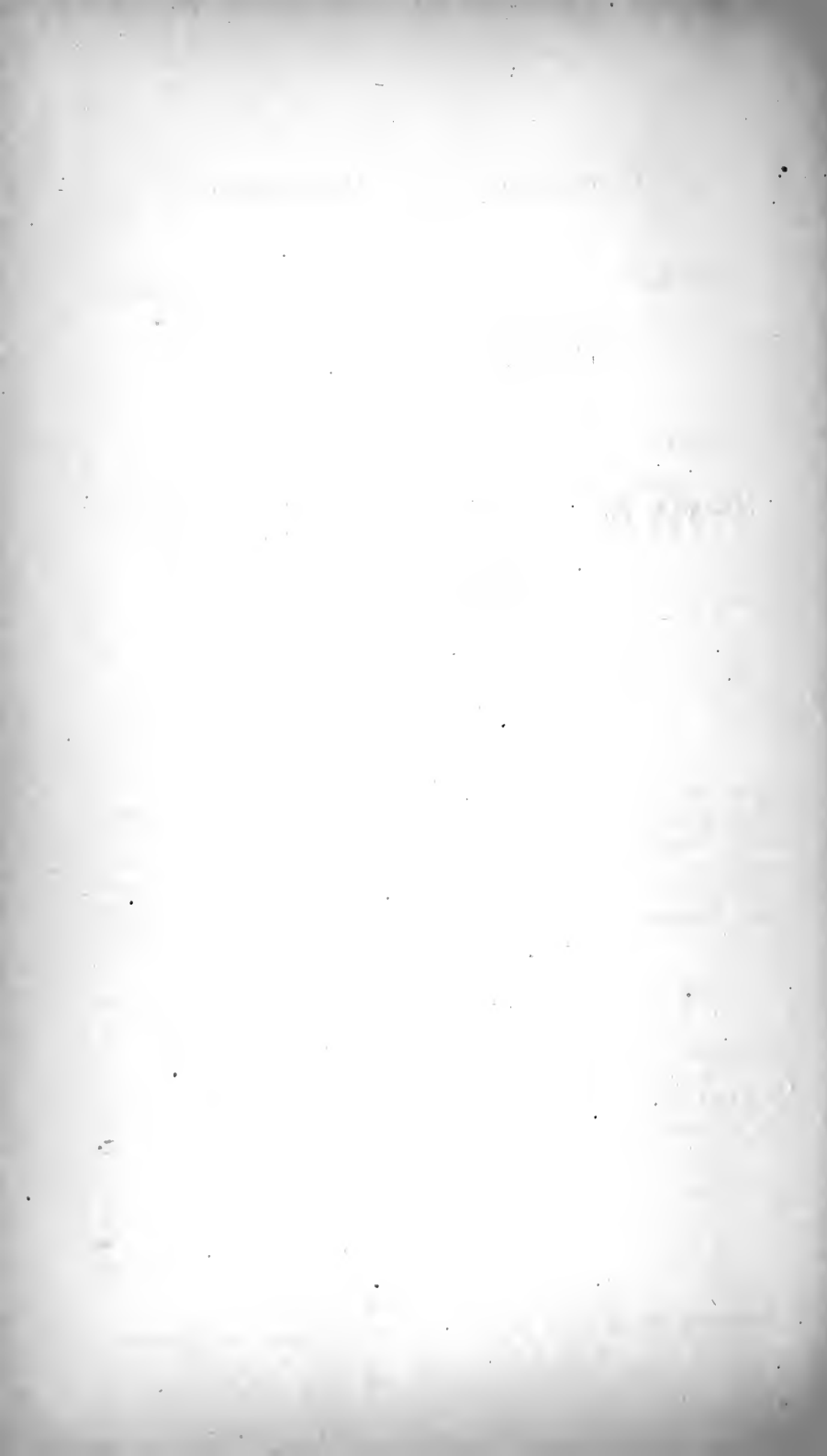

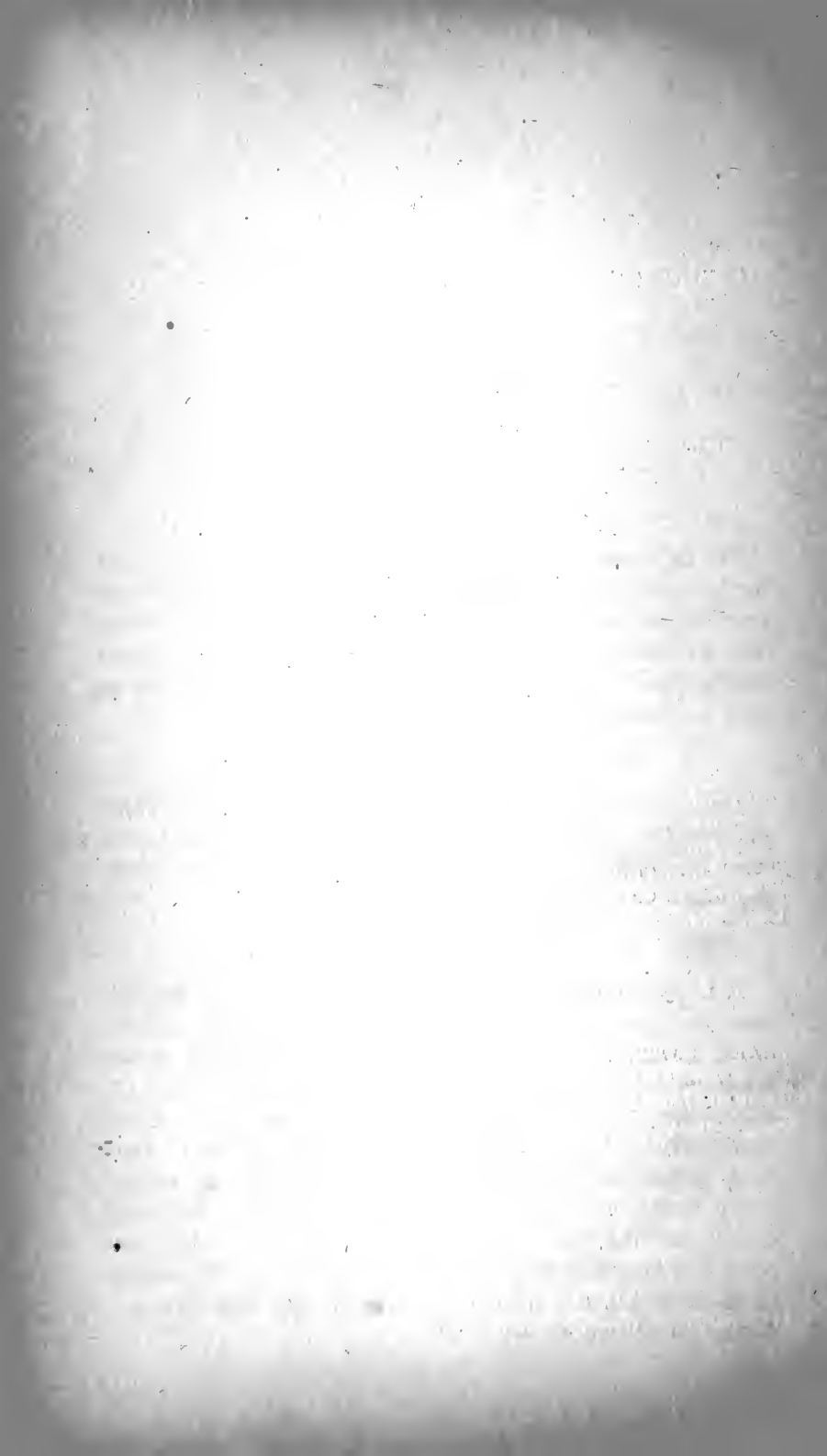

SELECTMEN'S REPORT.

The Selectmen of Hyde Park, in presenting to the town the following statements of the expenditures for the financial year ending Jan. 31st, 1876, would state that we have endeavored to avoid any outlay in excess of the appropriations which come under our immediate control ; and, as will appear, have, in the main, been successful.

INCIDENTALS.

The appropriation for incidentals was \$8,000, of which amount \$2,126.13 was drawn for school, and \$5,701.72 for other incidentals ; these amounts include \$1,042.73 drawn to pay bills contracted previous to Jan. 15, 1875.

HIGHWAYS AND BRIDGES.

The appropriation for highways and bridges, including the amounts appropriated to build Roxanna street, and to improve Central avenue, was \$3,765 ; the amount of orders drawn was \$2,922.53, and includes the sum of \$242.60 for outstanding claims contracted prior to the present financial year. With the amount expended the streets have been kept in fair condition, the sidewalks improved, and several new culverts built. The bridge at Bridge street has been rebuilt, and the Fairmount bridge has been materially improved by strengthening the arches ; this bridge will need to be re-planked, and perhaps the abutments will need attention during the coming season.

In view of the small amount appropriated for highways, it was deemed advisable to dispose of two of the horses belonging to the town to save cost of keeping, and they were sold early in the season at auction, bringing satisfactory prices.

Although very many of our accepted streets, as well as the sidewalks, might be much improved, it is conceded that they will now compare favorably with those of our neighboring towns.

The guide-boards are in good condition throughout the town; and in this connection we would call the attention of the town to the practicability of placing proper notices on the several unaccepted streets, stating that they are private ways, &c.

RIVER STREET.

As some explanation should be made in regard to the apparent excess of expenditure over the appropriation for River street, we would state that the town is entitled to draw from the County Treasury \$3,211, a portion of which has already been paid into the Town Treasury; and we have, by decision of the County Commissioners, unexpectedly been called upon to pay \$750 for land damages on the second section; and there has also been charged to this appropriation the sum of \$720.30 for legal expenses incurred by vote of the town on account of this street.

STREET LAMPS.

During the past year, citizens have erected at their own expense thirteen additional street lamps, which are lighted at the expense of the town, making one hundred and twenty-eight now in use, and are, as last year, in charge of the New England Gas Light Company of Boston. Their agent has been faithful in the discharge of his duty, and the quality of the light is excellent.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The appropriation for the Fire Department was \$6,400; the amount of orders drawn, \$6,054.37; of this amount,

\$1,203.49 was drawn to pay bills incurred previous to Jan. 15, 1875, making the actual expense of the Department for the current year less than \$5,000. It has been the constant aim of the Engineers, we are pleased to say, to avoid all unnecessary expenditures, and no considerable outlay has been made by them without consulting the Selectmen. We are assured that the best of feeling prevails among the members of the Department, and for its discipline and efficiency the town is to be congratulated. As will be noticed in the report of the Engineers, they recommend that some action be taken in regard to further water supply. It appears to be an actual necessity that additional reservoirs should be constructed, which could be done at comparatively small expense in several localities.

GENTLEMEN,—The undersigned, Engineers of the Hyde Park Fire Department, hereby submit the following report: During the past year the Department has been called out twenty-two times, and the fire apparatus has proved itself fully efficient (where water could be obtained) for extinguishing fires. Six hundred and fifty feet of new hose was purchased in December, making four thousand three hundred feet of serviceable hose now in the Department.

All necessary repairs have been made, and it is with pleasure we report that the Department is entirely free from debt. The actual expenses of the current year amount to \$4,850.88. Accompanying our report you will find a list of fires, alarms, causes, &c. We take this opportunity to heartily thank each member of the Department for the unity, good will and interest taken in responding when they have been called upon for duty; and in conclusion we would add that at a small expense water might be obtained from Stony Brook, near West street; also on Dana avenue, Fairmount district, and in the Sunnyside district.

REPORT OF CHIEF OF POLICE.

To the Board of Selectmen:

GENTLEMEN,—I herewith submit my annual report for the year ending Dec. 31st, 1875, together with the record of criminal arrests and prosecutions: Number of persons arrested, 144, and were prosecuted for the following crimes: Assault and battery, 39; drunkenness, 36; common drunkards, 7; larceny, 9; receiving stolen goods, 4; single sale of liquor, 4; keeping open shop on Sunday, 4; liquor nuisance, 1; assault on officer, 2; adultery, 1; fornication, 1; arson, 1; keeping unlicensed dogs, 6; cruelty to animals, 2; disturbing peace, 1; threats, 1; common railer and brawler, 1; malicious injury to property, 1; vagabonds, 16; juvenile offenders, 8. I would state (what must seem obvious to every one) that owing to the large territory to be protected, and there being but one patrolman on duty during the night, it is impossible to afford protection to a very extensive portion of the town; and would recommend that every person take particular notice that their premises are securely fastened before retiring. Quite a number of vacant houses have been entered, and all of the lead pipe above ground carried away. Probably in most instances these depredations have been committed by boys or tramps. Crime has decreased in town during the past year, which is due in part to the removal from town of some of the worst characters. Food and lodgings have been provided for 879 tramps during the year, at an expense of \$90, which is a dead loss to the town; and I would recommend that in the future all tramps be obliged to perform some labor as remuneration for food and lodging. The lock-up is in as good condition as can be expected under the circumstances. Subjoined is a

list of the property contained in and belonging to the Station House:—16 pairs blankets, 8 matrasses, 8 pillows, 4 slop buckets, 4 quart pots, 7 pairs handcuffs, 3 pairs toggles, 4 billies, 4 rattles, 2 lanterns.

POOR DEPARTMENT.

REPORT OF THE OVERSEERS OF THE POOR.

The Overseers of the Poor respectfully submit the following Report:

The depressed condition of all kinds of business has caused a considerable increase in the expenditures of this Department. Many persons (mostly those of the laboring class) having large families to support are without the means to live. It is probable that the majority of the new applicants, through causes beyond their control, are in this condition. Many of them have no settlements, and in rendering the aid of the Town, the Board assume that they would not be justified in sending whole families, who are temporarily in want, to the State Alms-House. Consequently, while exceeding the appropriation, the Board have only met the requirements of the law and the common dictates of humanity. Although every case has been carefully investigated, it is possible that in a very few instances imposition may have been practiced. It is believed, however, that in this matter it is better to err on the safe side, so that no person shall knowingly be allowed to suffer for food or shelter. The Board would recommend that some suitable place be provided for persons sick and destitute, and also a burial place for the poor.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

The labors of the Board of Health have been apparently attended with good results. Various nuisances have been abated, and sanitary laws enforced so far as practicable. There have been three cases of small-pox, one of which proved fatal. The Town, otherwise, has been free from epidemic, and the mortality has not exceeded that of previous years.

BY-LAWS.

At a meeting of the legal voters of the town of Hyde Park, held August 2d, 1875, it was voted to adopt the following, By-Laws, to wit:—

NOTIFICATION OF TOWN MEETINGS.

Every town meeting shall be notified by posting copies of the warrant calling the same, in ten public places in the town, seven days, at least, before the day appointed for said meeting; and a copy of the warrant shall be published in the local newspapers of the town once at least before said meeting.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING.

The annual town meeting shall be held on the first Monday of March of each year. The meeting shall be opened at eight o'clock A. M., and the polls shall be kept open until sunset.

RULES FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF TOWN MEETINGS.

1.—Every meeting shall be opened with prayer.

2.—All questions submitted for the consideration of the town, involving the expenditure of money, shall be in writing.

3.—No vote fixing the period for closing a ballot shall be reconsidered after such ballot shall have commenced; but it may be in order to extend the period without such reconsideration.

4.—When a question is under debate, motions shall be received to adjourn, to lay on the table, the previous question, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone indefinitely, to commit, or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are herein arranged.

5.—The powers and duties of the presiding officer, not especially provided for by law, or by the foregoing rules, shall be determined by the rules of practice contained in Cushing's Manual, so far as they are adapted to the condition and powers of the town.

6.—No vote shall be reconsidered except upon a motion made within one hour after such vote has passed, unless such reconsideration is ordered by a vote of two-thirds of the voters present.

FINANCIAL YEAR.

The financial year of the town shall begin with the first day of February in each year, and end on the thirty-first day of the following January.

MEETINGS OF TOWN OFFICERS.

The selectmen, overseers of the poor, board of health, surveyors of highways, and school committee, shall post in some conspicuous place at their official rooms, a notice of the times of their respective meetings, and shall also give notice of the same through the local newspapers.

COLLECTION OF TAXES.

1.—The assessment of taxes shall be completed, and a list of the same delivered to the collector, on or before the first day of August of each year.

2.—All taxes which may be assessed, if paid on or before the first day of October next after the assessment, shall be entitled to such discount as the town shall vote at its annual meeting. All persons who may be assessed a poll-tax only, shall pay the same on demand. All taxes shall be paid in full on or before the first day of November next following the assessment of said taxes, and if not so paid, interest shall be paid at a rate not exceeding twelve per cent. per annum, if so voted by the town.

3.—The assessors shall annually, on or before the first day of July, post a copy of the list of poll tax payers, on the outside of the building containing their office.

4.—It shall be the duty of the selectmen to insert the following article in the warrant calling the annual meeting, viz:—"To see what discount shall be allowed on all taxes paid on or before the first day of October next."

DUTIES OF THE AUDITORS.

1.—The auditors shall examine the accounts of the selectmen, school committee, treasurer, collector, trustees of the public library, and the custodian of the town hall, and all other officers or committees entrusted with the expenditure of money, and shall certify as to the correctness of the same, in the printed annual report.

2.—Before certifying to the accounts of the selectmen and school committee, they shall examine the original bills and pay rolls, and ascertain that they are correct and properly receipted.

3.—Before certifying to the accounts of the treasurer, they shall examine his cash-book, wherein shall be entered his receipts and payments, as they occur from day to day, shall see that he has paid out no moneys except on proper vouchers, carefully examine all payments for interest, and see that the funds on hand are intact.

4.—Before certifying to the collector's accounts, they shall examine his cash book showing the amounts collected from day to day, and showing when the same were paid over to the treasurer; shall see that he has collected interest on all taxes overdue, and shall see a complete list of abatements, and also a list of unpaid taxes.

5.—They shall see that the accounts of the trustees of the public library, and the custodian of the town hall, are kept in a correct manner, and that all payments are accompanied with proper vouchers.

6.—The auditors shall have access to the accounts of the several officers at such stated times as said auditors shall deem for the interest of the town, and shall audit the accounts of the treasurer and collector quarterly.

UNEXPENDED APPROPRIATIONS.

All unexpended balances of the regular annual appropriations shall, at the close of each financial year, be paid into the sinking fund to be used in extinguishing the town debt.

MEASURERS OF WOOD AND BARK.

It shall be the duty of the selectmen to appoint measurers of wood and bark.

REMOVAL OF BUILDINGS AND OBSTRUCTION OF HIGHWAYS.

1.—No building shall be removed over a public street without the written permission of the selectmen.

2.—The owner of such building, or the person or persons removing the same, shall pay the town all damages, costs, and expenses for which the town may be liable or compelled to pay by reason of said street being obstructed or encumbered.

3.—No person shall place, or cause to be placed, in any of the public streets, sidewalks, lands, or upon any of the common lands of the town, without a written license from the selectmen, any manure, dirt, gravel, stones, building materials, wood, coal, barrels, boxes, merchandise, or any rubbish of any kind whatever, and suffer the same to remain for twenty-four hours.

4.—All persons who shall obstruct the sidewalks or streets of the town to the molestation of travelers, shall be subject to arrest as offenders against the public peace. Constables and police officers are instructed to enforce this rule rigidly.

5.—No person shall ride or drive a horse in any street in the town at a rate faster than eight miles an hour.

6.—No person shall play at ball, or throw balls, snow-balls or stones, or discharge any gun or fire-arm, or make any bonfires or other fires, in any of the streets or public places in the town.

COASTING.

Coasting on any of the public streets of the town is prohibited, except upon such streets as the selectmen shall designate each year by public notice.

PASTURING OF CATTLE OR OTHER ANIMALS ON STREETS OR WAYS.

1.—The town hereby adopts and avails itself of the provisions of chapter 45 of the general statutes, relating to the pasturing of cattle or other animals in streets or ways.

2.—No person shall be allowed to pasture any cattle, goat or other animal upon any street or way in said town, either with or without a keeper, except within the limits of such way adjoining his own premises, and field-drivers are instructed to enforce this by-law.

TRUANCY.

The proper officers of the town shall rigidly enforce the provisions of the truant laws of the commonwealth.

JUNK-DEALERS.

Every keeper of a shop for the purchase, sale or barter of junk; old metals, or second-hand articles within the limits of this town, shall keep a book, in which shall be written at the time of every purchase of any such articles, a description of the article or articles purchased, the name, age and residence of the person from whom, and the day and hour when such purchase was made; such book shall at all times be open to the inspection of the selectmen and any person by them authorized to make such inspection; every keeper of such shop, shall put in some suitable and conspicuous place on his shop, a sign, having his name and occupation legibly inscribed thereon in large letters; such shop, and all articles of merchandise therein, may be examined by the mayor and alderman of any city, or the selectmen of any town, or by any person by them respectively authorized to make such examination, at all times; no keeper of such shop shall, directly or indirectly, either purchase or receive by way of barter or exchange any of the articles aforesaid, of any minor or apprentice, knowing or having reason to believe him to be such; and no article purchased or received shall be sold until a period of at least one week from the date of its purchase or receipt shall have elapsed.

The selectmen are required to incorporate the above by-laws in every license which shall be granted for dealing in the articles therein mentioned, and shall revoke the same on reasonable proof of any violation thereof.

LIST OF TAX-PAYERS.

The names of all persons paying a tax on real or personal property shall be published annually in the town report, together with the amount of tax assessed upon each, and whether the same is paid or unpaid.

PUBLICATION OF BY-LAWS.

The selectmen shall publish these by-laws annually in connection with the town report.

PENALTIES UNDER THE BY-LAWS.

Every violation of any of the foregoing by-laws shall be punished by a fine of not less than one dollar nor more than twenty dollars, to be recovered by complaint before any trial justice in the county of Norfolk, or any other court having jurisdiction.

PROSECUTION UNDER THE BY-LAWS.

Any citizen may, and the selectmen and constables shall, prosecute every violation of any of the foregoing by-laws, by complaint before any trial justice in the county of Norfolk, or any other court having jurisdiction.

REPEAL OF OLD BY-LAWS.

All former by-laws of the town are repealed on approval of these by-laws as provided for in the following section.

BY-LAWS, WHEN TO TAKE EFFECT.

These by-laws shall go into effect from and after their passage and their approval by the superior court within and for the county of Norfolk.

REPORT.

At the close of another year your Committee report that the schools of the town have been, on the whole, well conducted, the teachers competent and faithful, the pupils attentive and well-disposed, and the general results satisfactory. There have been, however, important changes in some particulars, to which we ask attention.

SALARIES.

The salaries of the teachers have, in accordance with the unmistakable will of the Town, been reduced ten per cent., and that of the Principal of the High School from \$1,900 to \$1,600 per annum. This reduction was reluctantly decided on as necessary in view of the financial embarrassments of the time, but neither implying reproach to any of the teachers, nor without objectionable effects on the schools. The teacher's position should be made as permanent as possible. He must, to do the best work, identify himself with his school, and value and cherish its reputation and success as his own. But our vicinity to the City of Boston inevitably tends, under a great disparity of salaries, to cause restlessness among the teachers, and the looking at our schools only as stepping-stones to a higher place. If the heart is not in the school, some of the strongest as well as best motives to effort are wanting. While, on the other hand, the most devoted teacher can hardly be blamed for accepting an invitation to a school in the City at a salary much larger than ours.

It should be remarked that this reduction of salaries has not been in operation during the whole of this year, and its effect on the school expenses will not be shown till the next annual report. The schools are now running on a basis of \$19,500 per annum, and, as was anticipated, the Committee have drawn on the unexpended balance of last year.

EMPLOYMENT OF MASTERS.

Last year the system of employing female teachers in all the classes of the Grammar Schools, under the care of one general Supervisor, was introduced as an experiment. The report of 1874-5 speaks of it as such; and as entered on with some misgivings on the part of at least a portion of the Committee. It was fairly tried; the Supervisor, Mr. G. M. Fellows, was particularly fitted for his place by previous acquaintance with the schools and their teachers, and he performed his duties faithfully and with as much success as the circumstances rendered possible. But such is the distance of the schools from each other, and so many and so various were the questions of discipline and instruction constantly crowding on him in the short time he could spend in each school, that it was plain to the Committee, after careful scrutiny, that this system is not the best for our Town. A master was placed in the highest class of each school, and at a small increase of expense a manifest and gratifying improvement in the order in and about the school buildings, and in the progress of the classes, began, which will no doubt prove permanent.

PROMOTIONS.

We think it would be well for parents and pupils to realize that promotions from class to class must depend strictly on

the attainments of the pupil, and not upon the time nominally or actually spent in the school. The standard is not high ; and each school suffers, necessarily, from the presence of those ill-fitted to go forward in new work, from their ignorance of the old. Such pupils are in the wrong place, to their own disadvantage and to the injury of the rest. In some cases this backwardness is caused by sickness. Even then, the misfortune, which is bad enough for the individual, must not hinder all his companions, while he is in no way helped by their delay. But probably idleness, irregularity, and other reasons for which parents and pupils are responsible, are the sources of the trouble. In all cases, a regular standard of excellence is essential to our graded schools ; let the progress be thorough at every step, and the real advancement will be more rapid in the end. This is likewise true of the High School, where the diploma must be the pledge of actual proficiency in study, in the case of every scholar receiving it, and not merely the sign of his having been so many years connected with classes ; or it is hardly worth the fabric on which it is written. It is not a farce ; it is a fraud !

CO-OPERATION OF PARENTS.

We respectfully urge the active co-operation of parents in visiting the schools, partly for a moral support and encouragement of the teachers, and also in order that the impulsive prejudices of the children may be corrected by the direct knowledge and mature judgment of those who can thus influence them to the best result ; and we earnestly invite the counsel of parents in relation to the schools they may thus become well acquainted with, in order to remove any actual evils, and to make still better what is commendable.

ATTENTION TO SCHOOL-DUTIES.

We suggest closer attention to school duties as a chief object of the pupils' life at home. Those duties are not exhaustive, but they are rather highly salutary to the bodies and to the minds of the children. There is no excessive amount of study required of any of them, but rather their thoughts should be more habitually occupied with school and school matters. Failures of health come from causes out of the school-room and unconnected with its work.

While we then realize that an abundance of out-door exercise and play is essential, we ask whether the hours of sleep, the kind and amount of amusement, (especially for the older scholars), and the general occupation of their time, may not be so arranged for those who are "going to school," as to promote, and not to hinder, their habits of study. The pile of excuses in every teacher's desk in town, in the High School as well as in the Primary classes, induces us to ask the question, whether domestic and family arrangements may not be made to conduce to the greater regularity and interest of the pupils; we do not mean study at home, so much as we mean avoidance of anything which distracts their attention from the work of education, during the short season most of them can give to that important object.

The Committee once more call attention to the absolute danger of the crossing of the Providence Railroad at the so-called "White's Crossing." At present, the children living on the east side of the railroad are constantly exposed to fatal injury. This is their only way of going to the school they are bound by law to attend, and it is astonishing that no life has been lost at this place. How much longer these innocent but heedless children will enjoy immunity from some

shocking accident, their parents and our citizens may estimate. We are aware that in our town, children are abundant and money is scarce, but we seriously suggest whether the saving in taxes is to overbalance the safety of our boys and girls.

VOCAL MUSIC.

Instruction in vocal music has been given in the High School, as well as in the Grammar and Primary classes, by Mr. H. J. Whittemore, who regularly devotes half his time to the schools.

DRAWING.

Drawing is also taught systematically in all the schools in town. Let it be remembered that this is not a mere accomplishment of an ornamental character, but that it is of great practical utility in almost every mechanical art, and its value for every child will not be overlooked.

EVENING SCHOOLS.

Evening Schools have been held for sixteen weeks, five days in each week, males and females together, in a satisfactory manner, under the charge of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Noyes, in the Damon School-House, with an attendance of 52 for the first month, and of 32 for the whole term; and under Mr. E. De Merritte and Miss A. E. Tower, in the Grew School-House, with an average attendance of 13 1-3 for the term. The pupils were those deprived of the advantages of the day schools, who eagerly improved this opportunity to learn. The average total expense has been \$37.50 a week. We repeat the judgment of last year's report, that "we think the appropriation wisely made and judiciously expended."

SPECIFIC REPORTS.

HIGH SCHOOL.

The Committee on the High School respectfully submit their annual report:

The school year began with the old corps of teachers, F. W. Freeborn, Principal, and Misses Weld and Dutton, Assistants. At the close of the Summer Term Miss Weld resigned, and Miss S. L. Barnes, for several years connected with the Quincy High School, was elected in her place. Miss Barnes has proved to be a devoted and successful teacher, making entirely good the loss sustained in the retirement of Miss Weld.

Mr. Freeborn tendered his resignation about the first of December, to take an Ushership in the Boston Latin School, and Mr. W. H. Knight, a graduate of Middlebury College, and for several years Principal of the Cohasset High School, was elected as his successor. It is too early to speak with entire assurance in regard to Mr. Knight's success, but his superior qualifications, long and successful experience, and the hearty earnestness with which he has thrown himself into his new field of labor, give your Committee reason to expect the best results. By Mr. Freeborn's resignation, with a day's notice, the High School was suddenly thrown upon the hands of your Committee. Feeling that a successor should be provided at the earliest possible moment, but conscious that in a matter of so grave importance it was the part of wisdom to make haste slowly, your Committee provided a temporary supply, received applications, made investigations, and finally elected a permanent teacher during the holidays.

Most of the pupils of the High School deserve great praise for the excellence of their conduct during the interregnum. If, a part of the time, there was among a few of its members a degree of forgetfulness—to use no harsher term—of the great responsibility resting upon them, the cheerful alacrity with which they returned to their duties when the new term opened, showed a commendable desire to atone for the momentary fault.

There is a good public sentiment prevailing in this school, all the more gratifying in view of the trying circumstances through which it has recently passed. So emphatically has this subject been brought home to the minds of your Committee, they cannot forbear dwelling a moment on the vital importance of a high-toned public sentiment among the pupils of our schools.

While this is important in all, it is especially so in the High School, for the greater maturity of its pupils make them more amenable to reason, and they are of necessity more constantly thrown upon their honor.

It should be the ceaseless aim of the High School teacher to secure this public sentiment, by ever placing before his pupils a high standard of motive and action, by constant appeals to the nobler elements of their natures, to what is manly and womanly, and above all by the power of an upright and honorable example. What the teacher is, more than what he does, has power over the young. Nor are the manners of the school-room to be forgotten as an element of government. They should be those of polite society.

The intercourse between teacher and pupil should be marked by mutual courtesy and respect.

We believe that a wise and judicious teacher, supported by the parents—for the *home* must supplement the *school* in this work—can establish such a public sentiment in his school in favor of law and order that gross violations of either will be well-nigh impossible. In its presence rudeness will be shamed into propriety, thoughtlessness into care, and indolence into activity.

Nor is this inconsistent with the most unquestioned authority of the teacher and the equally unhesitating obedience of the pupil.

Moral power is a far more effective means of government than physical force, for he who possesses it will govern the inward spirit as well as the outward action, will correct the misconduct by removing the evil disposition that inspires it.

In a school so controlled the occasional censure or severity will be more effective from the very infrequency of its occurrence.

The teacher thus entrenched in the esteem of his pupils will achieve results no other can—he will achieve that highest and noblest work of his profession, the development of *character* as well as *intellect*. At his deserved reproof the eye of the pupil will drop, not in sullenness but in shame, and when

again uplifted to that of the teacher, will flash, not in anger but with the light of a noble resolve—*to do better*. In his presence the pupil will be but the vine in the hands of the gardener, yielding itself to be pruned of useless and hurtful growth, but the marble in the workshop of the Sculptor, waiting to be chipped into grace and beauty by the master hand.

Closely connected with this is another duty and privilege more especially within the province of the High School teacher, that of shaping to some extent the destiny of his pupils. He should act with great caution in attempting to lead their minds towards particular pursuits, and in consultation with parents ; but sometimes the “ bent of genius ” is so plain to the careful observer that there can be no doubt as to the sphere in life it ought to fill. In such a case a timely word, a little friendly interest, on the part of the teacher may save the mistake of a lifetime. Many a noble career can be traced to the wise counsel and kind encouragement of an appreciating teacher. At all events it is always safe to seek to inspire the young with a laudable ambition to make the most of themselves and their talents.

The tendency of the times in matters of education is towards *utility*, and wisely so ; but in an age of enterprise and invention like this, the best talent and the highest culture are needed in the mechanic arts and in practical business as well as in the learned professions. Does it not seem like a low standard of aspiration that during nearly four years past not a pupil in our High School has aimed at a higher education than is furnished by its limited curriculum ?

In the Fall of 1872 one of its pupils, George Rollins, entered Yale College and has taken a high rank in his class. But is our High School to rest content on the laurels of its one College graduate ? Are there not in it to-day some of the elements of distinction in some direction, could they receive the proper development ? But, perhaps, instead of regretting the lack of aspiration for a higher education that has characterized the members of the High School in the past, we ought rather to lament their indifference to the advantages of the High School itself. The falling off in the attendance from year to year has been painfully large. Four years ago the entering class numbered thirty of both sexes. Last Summer at the graduating exercises of the same class but three brave young ladies were left to take their diplomas, and tell the tale of class disaster.

To say nothing of the depressing effect such a state of

things has on the character and standard of the High School itself, what an accumulation of "lost opportunities," for which future years will bring to many certain but useless regrets.

Your Committee would report, in closing, that they have frequently visited the High School and that it has generally appeared well. The teachers have, in the main, been devoted to its interests and successful in their work.

While there is much to commend, and it may seem invidious to specify, your Committee cannot forbear to speak of the marked success of the instruction in mathematics. Miss Dutton has few equals in this department.

GREW SCHOOL.

TEACHERS—*G. M. Fellows, Master; J. C. Alexander, F. J. Emerson, Lucina Davis, M. A. Alexander, Genevieve Brainard, and S. S. Lancaster, Assistants.*

At the opening of the Fall term in September, Mr. George M. Fellows, the former Supervisor, was appointed to the Mastership of the Grew School. But one change has been made in the corps of subordinate teachers. Miss Brown resigned during the long vacation, and her place was filled by Miss Genevieve Brainard. Miss Brainard had shown excellent tact in the management of little children while substituting in the Blake School during the early part of the year.

Her work has been satisfactory thus far in the Grew. The improvement in this school since the return to the system of a Master at the head of each building has been marked.

Disorder in the school grounds, and the still greater disorder and rudeness on the street, so frequently complained of before, have entirely disappeared. While the upper divisions specially show the effect of the constant presence of a Master, it is perceptible in every room in the building. The subordinate teachers have a sense of security, a consciousness

of immediate support in case of need, that render their government more easy and complete, and their labor in imparting instruction more successful. The very fact that there is at hand power equal to any emergency is a constant restraint to the ill-disposed. The principle is an old one that the *existence* of ample authority obviates to a great extent the necessity of its *use*.

The Grew School has never been in so good a condition as it is to-day. The teachers are laborious and highly successful in their various departments; the greatest harmony exists among them, and last but not least there is the best of feeling between teachers and scholars.

DAMON SCHOOL.

This school, under the supervision of Mr. Cross, an experienced and painstaking teacher, has taken a new start in usefulness and profit to the scholars. The general discipline has been carefully maintained, and the classes are steadily approaching the desired grade. Certain unavoidable drawbacks call for unceasing diligence and patient labor on the part of the teachers of this District. Many children, either by choice or necessity, discontinue their studies, often more than once in a term, to work in the factory; and on their return to school extra efforts are required of the teacher in order to

pursue the studies called for by the curriculum, with that degree of thoroughness which may be of profit to the whole class.

The teaching of Misses Bunker and Witherbee in the Grammar grades gives proof that the essential requisites of successful after-studies are never lost sight of; and it is to be regretted that so few scholars are able to continue their course as far as the High School.

The Primary classes are in charge of Misses Crosby and Walker, who by their versatile efforts in making study attractive to their young pupils, have been rewarded this past year by an unusually large attendance.

GREENWOOD SCHOOL.
