You will notice the salaries of teachers are \$1000 more than for the year preceding. This is so because, although the school account shows an overdraft (of which we speak later) there are no outstanding unpaid salaries and more than \$800 of this increase came over from last year. The other \$200 results from a few increased salaries and the necessary establishment of a school room for a second division of the second grade owing to the overcrowding of the first and second grade rooms, which had something over 130 children.

The transportation increase speaks for itself. About \$100 of this increase was in settlement of a claim of several years standing and to avoid a law suit. You will easily recognize that under the mandatory provisions of the law and the varying claims for this service from year to year, the cost will vary. Last year the amount paid for this service was low and some of the cost came over into 1904.

We now come to the increase in expense of maintenance outside of instruction and transportation. By referring to the table you will find a net increase of about \$1800 the past year. In round numbers this increase results from Books \$1000, Repairs \$500 Insurance \$600, less decrease, account fuel, \$300

Considering these items in detail we desire to say that text books are supplied free and for nearly ten years there had been no thorough renovation. The past summer all books were called in, sorted and listed. By what was then, or at the time of the transaction, deemed a desirable trade a large order was given a book firm to renew and replace antiquated and worn out text books. The necessity of some such action was imperative, the main advantage coming to us in the allowance made for worn out or unused books. We are making an earnest effort to look after our text books, their use and care, and it is fair to assume this item will drop to the normal amount the coming year, the steady increase in the number of children being taken into account.

In the matter of repairs the school buildings at North Springfield and Chester, and Parker Hill have been thoroughly repaired, substantial repairs made on North Springfield and Baker district school houses, and slight repairs on most of the others. The coming year the Goulds Mills school house should be thoroughly repaired and certain substantial repairs made at the High School building. Included in the repairs at this building the past year was the fitting up

of one school room, one recitation room and indoor connection with the village water supply.

The insurance item also speaks for itself. Up to this year no fire insurance had been carried on this expensive building and we feel sure every taxpayer approves of this action when they consider the risk heretofore borne by our community with its heavy debt, and as they recall the loss by fire of the school buildings in one or two of the towns of our state during the past year. This insurance was written for four and five years, hence the average annual cost for the five years 1904-1909 will be only about \$150 for an insurance protection of \$40,000. This item will therefore be small for the next four years.

The fuel at the High School building cost \$300 less for the past year than for the year preceding. As your auditor advises you, there are practically no outstanding unpaid bills on the school account.

In comparison with the income our school account shows an overdraft of \$2100 for the current year. The increase in expense is about \$3500. The income receipts were about the same. The fact of the overdraft, your Directors, however, believe justified, not only by the intrinsic need of the service, but by the fact that the credit balances belonging to the school account for the past three years viz: 1902 \$381 55, 1903-\$33 82, 1904 \$1084 11, amounting to 1499 48 have been transferred and covered into the General Town Fund, and the school account, though charged with taxes, is deprived of the money. The REAL overdraft therefore is about \$600 and as you will notice in the Auditor's comment following the school account, there are credits due from the town of Chester and land rents, that will nearly meet the deficit. It is but fair to add there were deficits for several years preceding those named.

We desire to call your attention to certain general matters. The new school year began in the fall with only

eight teachers facing the same schools as in the spring time and it necessarily requires time to adjust teaching and service to produce the best results.

With few exceptions we believe the town fortunate in the personnel of its teaching force, and we believe it but justice to say that honest, adequate and efficient work is now being done and cordially invite parents and others interested to visit our schools.

The Superintendent's report presents school matters from his point of view. We concur with his views to more closely relate our district schools with the grade work leading to the High School and in regard to employing teachers with normal training, or experience, or both.

We have endeavored to improve the sanitary conditions of the various school buildings and to maintain the health and comfort of the children and we appeal to parents to assist by insisting on continuous uninterrupted attendance so far as possible.

It is our belief that the present degree of service and efficiency can be maintained the coming year for the same tax, 65 cents.

School Superintendent's Report.

To the School Directors:—

GENTLEMEN—I herewith submit my first annual report as your superintendent of schools. You will appreciate the limitations under which, by law and precedent, the superintendent labors, his duties being largely advisory. It has been my purpose chiefly thus far to acquaint myself with the conditions and needs of the schools, and through consultation with the principal and cooperation with him, to plan for greater future efficiency and results and more uniformity in the work of the schools in the outlying districts with that of the graded school.

The large number of changes in the corps of teachers, including the principal, has made the year in an unusual degree an experimental one, but the steady adjustment to new conditions and the new administration has been most gratifying and promises well for the future. It is increasingly evident that in your choice of a principal no mistake was made. The adoption of new courses of study in the high school is already justified by a growing spirit of studiousness and better work, which is felt as well in grades below the high school. This cannot but raise the standard of the school, and better meet the needs of the community. There is no good reason why we should not have a high school, which in its requirements and opportunities, shall be second to none in the state.

The steady increase in the enrolment of pupils in the graded schools is already forcing the problem of enlarging our capacity. If the present rate of increase goes on, it will soon be necessary to provide more room and more teachers. For the immediate future the problem may be solved, and in my judgment wisely, by resorting to half-day sessions for the first and second grade pupils. I urge the serious consideration of this plan with a view to its

adoption another year. It is one that is adopted in many of our best schools and recommended by many of our best educators. It is in the interest both of the health and the best mental development of the children, as well as of economy.

Some much needed repairs and improvements have been made the past year in the school houses outside the village and perhaps under present conditions little more can justly be expected, but if the question of transportation can be satisfactorily arranged, and we are confident it can be, if parents and others will cooperate with the directors, there are at least two of these schools which in the interests of economy and the advantages to the pupils should be closed because of the very small enrolment.

There is much dissatisfaction on the part of the teachers with the readers now in use, and a call for supplemental reading matter. With both the dissatisfaction and the call I am in sympathy. They appear to me to be well grounded. If it does not seem advisable to change readers at present, the demand for supplemental reading matter should at least be granted. A suggestion made by the principal has my approval. It is that a different series of readers be adopted for the outside schools, which may be exchanged at the middle of the year with those used in the graded school.

Behind the highest efficiency of our schools towards which we are aiming are two conditions to which I invite your serious consideration. The first is that as rapidly as possible and as thoroughly as possible the outside schools should be graded and made to give results as good as those obtained in the village schools. The difficulties are obvious, but can in a large degree be overcome by the enforcement of a progressive policy. It will be necessary to adopt a new course of study for all grades, as has been done in the high school, to have it printed, and insist on conformity to it. The superintendent, with the assistance of the princi-

pal, hopes before the opening of another year to submit such a course for your approval.

But even more important and fundamental is the need of adopting the policy of requiring of candidates for positions in our schools more experience and more normal training. Our outside schools especially are suffering from this lack, in most cases, of experience and a technical education. It is not only in the interest of the patrons of the schools, but also in the end in the interest of the teachers themselves that more thorough preparation for the work of teaching should be required. Graduation from our high school is not an adequate preparation either in point of age or in the matter of information. If preference is to be given to our own high school graduates, then it should be with the understanding that their equipment be equal to that of other candidates. This we realize cannot be accomplished at once, but it is our hope that it will become the settled policy of the board of directors.

REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER.

In this my third annual report I am happy to say that many improvements have been made in our school houses, which make not only for the health of both teachers and scholars but also their comfort.

HIGH SCHOOL.

The high school building I have reported every year as all right, and for the present it is all that can be required, but the time is coming when some changes will have to be made on account of the increased attendance.

NORTH SPRINGFIELD.

Thanks to the school board we have jacketed stoves in both rooms, and one needs only to make a visit to see the

improvement in ventilation. On the coldest day of this winter there has not been over ten degrees difference in temperature in any part of the room, and should not be even this if the work on the ventilation had been finished up as first intended. As this is the first improvement of the kind in town the work was not thoroughly understood and was not arranged quite as it should have been, but with a few changes can be made perfectly satisfactory. The building has also been repaired, and the out buildings much improved but are not yet as they should be, but we are in hopes to have them in satisfactory condition the coming season.

SPRINGFIELD AND CHESTER

Here I find the traditional red school house and with many needed improvements, and although the ventilation is not what it should be, with the few scholars in attendance it seems very satisfactory.

BAKER DISTRICT

Although this school house is not ventilated as it was last year we find it in fair repair.

PLEASANT VALLEY

This building is in fairly good repair, but needs new blackboards and stove, and the out buildings are not as they should be.

SPENCER HOLLOW

Here I find a new stove, and the buildings in very good condition but should be repainted soon, and new blackboards, walls painted and ceiled overhead.

GILL DISTRICT

We have here one of the pleasantest school houses in town and although the ventilation is bad, with only four to eight scholars, it is not as essential as would be the case with a larger school.

GOULD'S MILLS

I do not know where to commence in criticism here. The house needs thorough repair and painting, new blackboards and new stovepipe are sadly needed. The paper on walls should be removed and walls painted and ceiled overhead. I hope this will be the next place for jacketed stoves.

SCRABBLE DISTRICT

The building here is in fairly good repair. The wall paper should be removed and walls painted and some changes made in the out buildings.

PARKER HILL

Here we find great improvements, newly painted outside, newly sheathed inside, and altogether much better than the average country school house.

We find in several schools a serious defect in adjusting the light, especially in the Gill district. The injurious effect on the eyes, of both scholars and teachers, render it imperative to remedy this trouble with sectional shades at the windows that can be drawn from both top and bottom. I have brought this matter before the school board and it is already receiving their attention in several schools.

NOTIFICATION.

The legal voters of the town of Springfield are hereby notified to meet at the Town hall in said town on Tuesday, the seventh day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to transact the following business:

ARTICLE I

"Shall licenses be granted, for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?" in accordance with section Section 2 of the act to regulate the traffic in intoxicating liquor.

ARTICLE II

To receive and act upon the report of the town auditors.

ARTICLE III

To choose all officers for the ensuing year that the law directs.

ARTICLE IV

To see if the town will fix the salaries of town officers for the ensuing year, and instruct the selectmen to draw orders for the payment of the same:

ARTICLE V

To see if the town will vote the sum of seventy-five dollars to defray the expenses of Memorial Day.

ARTICLE VI

To see if the town will vote the sum of three hundred dollars for the support of the Springfield brass band, upon condition that the band give concerts in the square the same as last year.

ARTICLE VII

To see if the town will vote the sum of five hundred dollars for the support of the Springfield town library.

ARTICLE VIII

To make appropriations for schools, highways, care of the poor, present indebtedness of the town, salaries of the town officers, and for all other purposes which the law requires or which the town may legally vote, and to provide for raising a tax therefor.

ARTICLE IX

To see if the town will vote to pay the taxes to the town treasurer.

ARTICLE X

To see if the town will vote to authorize the town treasurer to borrow money subject to the approval of the selectmen, to meet the requirements of the town the ensuing year.

ARTICLE XI

To do any other business that can legally be done under this notification.
