


TRUSTEES' REPORT.

To His Excellency the Governor and the Honorable Council of the Commonwealth:

The Trustees of the Worcester Lunatic Hospital beg leave to present their Fifty-First Annual Report.

They have held their monthly meetings at the hospital, and frequent visits and inspections have been made at other times by individual members of the board.

Never before in the history of the hospital has there been such a large number of patients as during the present year. The whole number in August was 750, and an average number for the year of 712.

To properly control and watch over the safety and to restore to health or improvement such a large number of patients, composed of individuals suffering from the various forms of mental malady, from the highest state of excitement to equally dangerous forms of depression, calls for care, foresight and experience on the part of officers and attendants such as can hardly be appreciated by the public.

During the year just closed, no serious accident has occurred. No epidemic disease has invaded the hospital. The number of deaths has been unusually small, about five per cent., and the number of recoveries about twenty-seven per cent.

The continuance of this recovery depends on the habits and the surroundings of these patients when returned to society. The hospital has done its best for them while here. The sale of land in the vicinity of the asylum goes on slowly, as it is sold lot by lot to persons who build on the premises at once. It was thought better policy to sell in this way than to let it fall into the hands of speculators. Some control is now had upon the class of buildings that are put up.

The financial condition of the hospital has improved a little from that of last year. The receipts from all sources have been \$144,962.96, the expenses \$128,588.70, the items for which will be found in the Treasurer's report.

The average cost for each patient is \$3.46 a week. As this last sum exceeds the amount paid by state and town patients, it is made up by the receipts from private patients, who pay from \$3.50 to \$5.00 a week and upwards.

The hospital receives not only the poor, but it is the refuge for any citizen of the Commonwealth who labors under a mind diseased. The number of cases of insanity is about equally divided between the rich and the poor. None are exempt, the humble and the exalted are equally liable to seek for aid here, and it is but just that everything should be done for the comfort and happiness of all alike.

There was at the beginning of the year a balance of \$17,772.03 to the credit of the hospital. This has been increased by a small amount this year and serves as a working capital, from which prompt payments for supplies are made at much better rates than could be had by a system of credit.

One great need that is felt is occupation for the patients. All work is of course voluntary; some find occupation in the garden or on the farm; some in the laundry and kitchen; but the great majority pass their time in idleness.

Books are furnished to those who will read, amusements of various kinds to such as can enjoy them, and out-of-door exercise to all who can leave their rooms. Knitting for the women has lately been introduced with some success. About sixty or seventy patients took to this with great eagerness. Some learned to knit who had never done so before. Some who for months had been quite idle, became at once industrious.

This work has been suspended in a great measure during

the summer months, when the patients pass most of the day out of doors, but will now be resumed, we hope, more successfully and with good results.

The Trustees desire to express their entire confidence in the faithfulness of the Superintendent and other officers and employés of the hospital in their respective duties.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the Board of Trustees of the Worcester Lunatic Hospital.

Gentlemen: — I herewith present the following fifty-first report of the hospital and its operations during the last year.

There were in the hospital at the close of the last official year, Sept. 30, 1882, 351 males and 330 females; a total of 681.

The number of admissions during the year has been 275; 122 males and 153 females; making the whole number of cases under treatment, 956.

The number of admissions represents 258 persons, 46 less than were admitted during the previous year.

Twenty-four females were transferred from Danvers, 6 females and 1 male from the McLean Asylum, 1 female from the State Almshouse at Tewksbury, 13 convicts from the State Prison at Concord, and 6 from the Reformatory Prison for Women at Sherborn. The largest number on any one day was 750, on August 10, which is about the capacity of the house, and the smallest number 671, on October 17. The number of discharges has been 225; 108 males, 117 females. Of this number 61 or 27.11 per cent. were recovered, 27 much improved, 43 improved, 41 not improved and 53 died, or 5.64 per cent. of the whole number of persons treated.

Of those who recovered 12 had been former inmates of this hospital, of whom 9 had been discharged recovered; 2 eight times, 1 four times, 1 three times, 1 twice and 4 once each; 3 had been discharged improved. These 12 persons thus represent 29 recoveries up to this year, and before they die will probably make a large addition to this number.

The general sanitary condition of the institution has been satisfactory, as the small percentage of the deaths and the usual good health of the inmates attest.

Some changes whereby better ventilation of the water-closet hoppers would be obtained could be advantageously made by running the ventilating pipes into a heated shaft opening through the roof, thus securing at all times a current of air into it, whatever the temperature of the outside atmosphere might be. Brick shafts were put in adjacent to all the water-closets when the building was constructed, and sufficient heat to raise the temperature of the air in them a few degrees could be supplied by steam pipes. All the walls of the wards of the hospital but two on the male side have been painted.

The wear and tear is so great in a large hospital for the insane that one spare ward should always be available whenever repairs are needed in any of the others; but as the Massachusetts hospitals are filled about as fast as they are built, most of the repairs have to be done with the wards occupied, or with temporary discomfort to the patients if they are vacated.

The number of convict insane received this year suggests again the matter of their management, and the plan of separate provision for them which has been recommended in my previous reports is again renewed. The number of this class is yearly increasing, and some plan should be adopted which will lead to a better classification and allow of their employment. As at present provided for, the architecture of the State hospitals is such that the constant supervision which they require renders it necessary to restrict them much of their liberty and deny them of the privileges which other patients enjoy and which could be given them if a building should be erected for their special needs. proper accommodations malingerers could be better watched, and the really insane convict could be put to some useful labor without danger of his escape. This is thus strongly recommended on purely practical grounds and entirely apart from any feeling of sentiment, though I am inclined to believe that the opposition to the mingling of the vicious classes of the community, after they become insane, with those unfortunate inmates of a hospital who have led upright and honorable lives, is a healthy sentiment which should receive due consideration.

Fifteen or twenty acres of land, with perhaps four or five acres of it enclosed with a fence of suitable height, within which vegetables and small fruits could be cultivated; a building, two stories high, for the accommodation of one hundred and twenty-five patients, the ground story to be used for sleeping rooms and the first for day rooms, diningroom and workshop; each room constructed with no recesses or dark corners, so that the eye would be able to take in every part of it,—would furnish an establishment much better adapted for the care and cure of the criminal insane than any which the State now possesses.

Information as to the subsequent history of persons who have been discharged from this hospital as recovered on their only admission, and on their last re-admission, as tabulated in Table 30, confirms the results shown in the same table last year.

About 50 per cent. suffered no relapse, but as no answers were received to one-third of the circulars sent, and taking into account the liability to relapse of those now reported well, I am inclined to believe that this percentage should be reduced one-half.

It should be remembered that of the appropriation of \$10,000 made by the State in 1882 for an additional water supply, \$2,715.87, being the unexpended balance, with interest, was returned to the State Treasurer. During the present year \$7,284.13, being the entire sum expended for this purpose, has been returned to the State. The whole appropriation of \$10,000, therefore, was in effect but a temporary loan to the institution by the State, which has been paid back in full. No similar financial transaction is known to exist outside of an insane hospital in the history of appropriations for institutions of the Commonwealth.

Since the last report two summer-houses have been built for the use of the male patients, and a boat-house, twentyfive feet square, has been constructed on the shore of the lake.

The products of the farm have suffered from the long and

severe drouth of the year, but the first premium was awarded, as usual, to the hospital by the Worcester County Agricultural Society for the best display of vegetables.

The report of the treasurer shows the total current expenses of the institution to be, exclusive of the extraordinary expenditures, \$128,588.70.

The average number of patients during the year has been 713.43. The annual cost of each patient has therefore been \$180.24, or \$3.46 per week.

At the commencement of the year, Dr. Ernest V. Scribner was compelled on account of his health to resign the position of second assistant physician, During his term of service he performed his duties in a most faithful and conscientious manner.

Drs. Flood and Houston were advanced to the positions of second and third assistants, respectively, and Dr. F. H. Daniels was appointed to the office of fourth assistant.

Changes have also been made in the offices of farmer and clerk, Mr. Henry A. Graves being appointed to the former position, and Miss S. J. Breck to the latter.

The officers and employés who remain have faithfully performed their various duties, which are always trying and perplexing, and frequently thankless. Emergencies which occur from sickness, or the discharge of unfit attendants, require from those who remain additional labor. It not infrequently happens that employés who have been on duty all day are suddenly called upon to sit up a part or the whole of the night. These extra duties have, as a rule, been readily and uncomplainingly assumed.

In closing this report, I desire again to express my gratitude for the aid and comfort and advice which your board has always given to me, and to which I owe whatever measure of success I have achieved in the management of the hospital and its concerns during the last five years.
