

TRUSTEES' REPORT.

To His Excellency the Governor and the Honorable Council.

The Trustees of the Worcester Lunatic Hospital respectfully submit their fifty-third annual report, containing that "particular statement of the condition of the hospital and all its concerns," which is required by the statute.

The year has been one of general prosperity and success, and yet in its activities and responsibilities it has been unprecedented in the history of the institution. The number of patients cared for (1,067) has been larger, by 84, than in any previous year, and the daily average number (764.59) has been larger by 14. The full measure of the building's capacity has been reached. And while the Trustees have no reason to doubt that all have received substantially that degree of care and attention required by the circumstances and conditions of each, they are still constrained to believe that the service would be better if the numbers were smaller, and if the physicians and employees were thus enabled to bestow more time and care upon individual cases. are aware that the crowded condition of this and other similar institutions is a subject of anxious consideration with all who are in any way officially related to the subject, but they would be false to their convictions of duty if they neglected to bring to the attention of such officials the results of their experience and almost daily observation.

Some measure of relief should unquestionably be provided. And that the first movement in this direction should be toward a separate provision for the criminal insane

appears to our board perfectly clear. This class of patients is a disagreeable and disturbing element in every hospital for the insane. That they should be treated upon the same terms as, and allowed to associate with those innocent of criminal act or thought, is opposed to every sentiment of propriety and justice. They should be treated by themselves, and in a building specially arranged for their secure and safe detention as well as treatment. No criminal, insane or otherwise, should be sent, to serve out his sentence, to a hospital designed and constructed for the care and cure of innocent and respectable persons who are so unfortunate as to be sick in mind. The law, requiring the judges of our courts to sentence to a hospital for life, a person found guilty of murder, but acquitted by a jury on the ground of insanity at the time the murder was committed, should be repealed. It is discreditable to the State. A hospital which is designed to be curative, should not be made use of as a penal institution. It is the opinion of this Board that a suitable provision for this class of patients might be made in connection with any one of the Lunatic Hospitals of the State, and without unreasonable expense. There is land enough in connection with either Taunton, Northampton, Worcester or Danvers, to serve the purpose without an additional purchase, and a building in close proximity to one or the other of the hospitals at these places, sufficient to provide for 200 or 250 persons, might be built at comparatively small outlay. It would not be at all necessary that it should cost more than \$300 or \$400 per bed. And it might be under the supervision and management of the same corps of officers as the hospital adjoining, thus effecting a saving in cost of administration. It is the earnest hope of this Board that the legislature will in its wisdom devise and carry out some plan for disassociating the innocent and the criminal insane.

The number of deaths during the year has been 68, and it is very interesting to note that almost the whole mortality has been from chronic disease in various forms. One patient died of erysipelas and two by suicide, but all the others died of lingering sickness, and for the most part of sickness incident to their mental disorder. And it is proper to mention in this connection that, not only have there been but few

deaths from acute affections, but that there has been in the house, throughout the year, a remarkable exemption from acute disease of any kind. This speaks well for the sanitary condition of the premises, and for the care bestowed upon the inmates with regard to food, and dress and manner of life.

Nothing shows more the advantage of such an institution as this, than the fact that discipline, uniformities of system, and intelligent watchfulness, can save its inmates from the sickness to which elsewhere imprudence and licentiousness would expose them. Some needed improvements in and about the hospital buildings have been made during the year, the expense having been defrayed from the moderate surplus at our disposal. Of these the most notable and important have been the placing of a clock in the tower, the procuring and putting up of fire escapes for the several wings of the building, and the enlargement of the coal sheds. By this latter improvement, the steward is able to store the whole quantity of coal required for the year at one time, which enables him to make his purchase upon more favorable terms than formerly. For the present year he has paid \$4.83 per ton, of 2,240 pounds.

The Board have continued to give their attention to the sale of the land in the neighborhood of the asylum on Summer Street. Less has been accomplished, however, in this direction during the present year than formerly, as will be seen by a reference to the statements made in the Treasurer's report. The land sells slowly, and the prices obtained are not high, but it is the policy of the board to have the lots improved as fast as they are sold, as an encouragement and inducement to new purchasers.

It will be observed with interest, that the whole amount received from sales thus far (going back to the first authorization of sale), has been \$135,527.79. There will be found in the Treasurer's report, an account of the book fund, to which allusion is always made in our reports. The statement is made this year more in detail than usual. This is "the invested fund" of the hospital, and the account submitted will give a clear idea of what it is and of the uses to which it has been set apart. And here, once for all, we beg

leave to refer to the Treasurer's admirable report for all the information which may be required with regard to the financial history of the year.

In Dr. Park's report to the Board, which is herewith transmitted, and in the tables which are appended, will be found, as is believed, all the information required by law upon other than financial matters, and to them we also respectfully refer.

On the 5th of May, in compliance with the provisions of the law, the Board made choice of a female assistant physician, electing to that office Dr. Elizabeth Earle, concerning whom favorable reports had been received, and she entered upon her duties in July. No other change has occurred in the staff of officers. All the members of last year are still with us, and to all we desire to make public and cordial acknowledgment of the efficiency and value of their services. But especially to Dr. Park, to whose good judgment and excellent administrative ability so much of the success of this and previous years is due.

An event of melancholy interest in the history of the year has been the removal by death, of our esteemed associate Dr. Robert W. Hooper of Boston, who had been for twenty-seven consecutive years a member of the Board of Trustees. Dr. Hooper was a gentleman of liberal culture, refined tastes and high social position. His manner was cordial and familiar and his disposition generous. Of excellent judgment, trained by large experience in the management of charitable and other public institutions, and with sympathies that warmed toward the unfortunate of every class, he seemed especially fitted for the position and responsibilities with which he was so long and honorably connected. His long term of service covered one of the most interesting and eventful periods in the history of the hospital. It covered the years of financial struggle and embarrassment incident to the high cost of supplies during and immediately after the war, and the long years of agitation and discussion which preceded the final determination to abandon the old and build the new hospital; and again, the burdensome years of care and responsibility incident to the building and the early occupancy of the new structure.

But it covered, too, at last, for him, happier years of comparative comfort and repose in the enjoyments of the accomplished work and its beautiful surroundings. And in all these years, and in all the duties they had brought for the board of management, he had borne a prominent and an influential part. Fitted by nature for the place he occupied; fond of the hospital and interested in the individual and daily life of its inmates and officers; munificent in his benefactions to the institution and faithful in all his relations,—his name and his memory will be cherished as long as the hospital endures.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the Trustees of the Worcester Lunatic Hospital:

I respectfully submit the following fifty-third annual report of the hospital, with the statistical tables, giving in detail the operations of the year.

There were remaining in the hospital September 30, 1884, 749 patients, — 378 males and 371 females.

The number of admissions since has been 318, representing 304 persons, —161 males, 143 females; making the whole number under treatment, 1,067, —548 males and 519 females. The daily average number has been 764.59. The largest number on any one day was 787 on September 28, and the smallest number 749 on October 20. Of this number 14 have been readmissions, and transfers from other institutions have been as follows:—

Massachusetts State Prison, 7; Reformatory for Women, 4; Tewksbury Almshouse, 1 male and 1 female; Industrial School for Girls at Lancaster, 1; Taunton Lunatic Hospital, 1 male.

There have been 281 discharges, — 162 males, 119 females. Of this number 74 recovered, 10 of whom had previously been inmates of the hospital, and been discharged recovered from one to ten times each, the ten representing 27 recoveries; 32 were discharged much improved; 39 improved; 68 not improved; and 68, 39 males and 29 females, died.

The general health of the inmates has been good; there has been no epidemic and the sickness and deaths which have occurred have been due to causes incident to age or the disease for which they were committed to the hospital. The case of typhoid fever mentioned in the last report proved

to have been contracted by the attendant before coming to the hospital. No other case occurred. The year closes with a larger number of patients than ever before, and the institution has been practically full for a number of months.

The new hospital at Westboro' is still unfinished and will not probably be ready for even partial occupancy before another summer. The last legislature passed a law authorizing the Board of Health, Lunacy and Charity to place at board in suitable families in the Commonwealth insane persons of the chronic and quiet classes.

The object of this law was to give relief to the crowded hospitals, but as a very few state patients are suitable to live in private families but little help can be expected from this source. One patient has been removed from this hospital by the Board to a private family. A much larger number of chronic cases, whose mental condition and habits render them fit to board out, could be found among the patients paid for by the towns; but the law does not give the Central Board authority over these cases, and they can only be so supported by the consent of the town authorities where they have a settlement. Some attempts have been made by the State Inspector of Charities to secure this consent, but so far with little success. At present I understand the overseers of the poor are quite content to leave their wards in the hospitals. I am inclined to believe that this law will not furnish as much numerical relief to the hospitals as has been given by the removal of patients to the asylums which a number of the cities have within a few years attached to The result will be that the present prestheir almshouses. sure will continue until new buildings are erected by the State, either as a separate asylum, or as annexes upon the estate of existing hospitals. The former I consider the better plan, with possibly two exceptions, - at Northampton, where buildings for the additional accommodation of 400 incurable insane could be erected, the patients to come from the territory west of Framingham or Concord, and at Westborough, where similar buildings would accommodate the chronic insane of the section east of Framingham. With these exceptions filled, the number of inmates would be but little above 800 at either establishment.

I am satisfied that only by the adoption of some such plan as indicated can the rapidly increasing class of chronic insane be economically and comfortably provided for by the State.

The importance of providing separate buildings for the criminal insane has been spoken of in various reports. We have at present between forty and fifty of this class who could be thus accommodated with benefit to themselves and comfort to the inmates who remain.

In the construction of this hospital no ward was arranged for the special care of the suicidal insane. I would recommend the subject to your consideration, to the end that, if possible, this defect may be remedied by an addition to the present building, or the rearranging of one or two of the wards. It may be found possible to accomplish this object by removing some of the division walls and thus throwing a number of rooms into one.

The report of the treasurer shows that the total expenditures for the year have been \$156,941.06. The amount spent for new buildings and extraordinary improvements has been \$8,303.22. Of this amount \$3,300 was expended for excavating and building the superstructure for the extension of the coal vaults. By this addition of 50 by 40 feet, with a cellar twelve feet deep, we are able to store 1,600 tons of coal - a supply for a year; thus obviating the inconvenient necessity of drawing in the winter months half The 1,600 tons of anthracite of the amount consumed. coal have all been delivered at an expense of \$4.83 per ton of 2,240 pounds. A room in this new building has been fitted up for a paint shop and the storage of painters' supplies, and another room for a hose carriage. Six fire escapes of iron have been connected with the hospital at convenient locations. They were built and put up by C. W. Walls of this city, at a contract price of \$1,876.67.

A tower clock, with striking attachment and four dials, eight feet in diameter, furnished by the Seth Thomas Clock Company of New York, has been placed in the tower of the hospital. The hours and half hours are struck on an 800 pound bell. It has so far performed its work with remarkable accuracy and is a source of great satisfaction to the

inmates. The total expense of clock, bell and dials was \$1,063.62.

New water closets and bath rooms have been added during the year, at an expense of \$631.61. The walls of one ward have remained unpainted until the present year, when this work has been done at an expense of \$489.50 for labor and materials. The balance of the amount charged to extraordinary improvements has been expended on walls and ditches and in building a hennery. The total current expenses of the hospital have been \$147,810.88. The average number of patients has been 764.59. This gives the cost per patient for the year, \$193.01, or \$3.70 per week.

There has been an addition of 262 books made to the library. As it was well supplied with standard works the selections this year have been made from the lighter literature of the day. The Hospital Newspaper Society has made several acceptable donations of papers, periodicals and Christmas cards. The proprietor of the "Worcester Evening Gazette" continues to furnish, free, one copy to the institution.

The products of the farm have been usually abundant and the land is each year brought into a higher state of cultivation. In thi department, the patients have been employed more largely than ever before.

In accordance with the provision of the statutes, Miss Elizabeth Earle was appointed on the medical staff and entered upon her duties July 1. With this exception, there has been no change in the corps of officers. I believe they have performed their duties faithfully and well and that the comfort and welfare of the patients, so many of whom are unable to appreciate either, have been most carefully and kindly looked after, and every means used to promote their restoration to mental and physical health.

As usual, a great many changes have been made in attendants; some disliked the service, and many were not fitted by temperament or education for the work required. The necessity for such frequent changes is a matter of regret. Their wages have during the last year been somewhat increased, with the hope of securing a better and more per-

manent service, but the result has not been wholly successful, as within the last twelve months, out of a full complement of 80, 35 female and 28 male attendants left, and 9 females and 18 males were discharged for cause or found unsuited for the work required of them.

By the death of Dr. Hooper, who has been for 27 years a member of the Board of Trustees, the hospital has lost one of its best friends,—a gentleman of refined tastes and generous impulses, he always manifested a personal interest in the misfortunes and sorrows of the patients. His numerous gifts, which have been noticed in former reports, remain as witnesses of his interest in the welfare and success of the institution of which he was for so long a time an officer.

When I took charge of the hospital the number of patients was about 480; at the present time that number is greater by more than 300. The care and responsibility of its management have proportionally increased, but the burden of this responsibility has been lightened by the ready assistance and cordial support of the Board of Trustees.
